## Cancer drug repairs stroke damage

Details of BRNI study will come out on Tuesday

Scientists at the Blanchette Rockefeller Neurosciences Institute have discovered that a drug previously used for cancer patients can be used to treat and repair brain tissue within 24 hours of a stroke — more than doubling the window of treatment time.

A report to be published in the Tuesday edition of the *Proceedings of the National Academy of Sciences*

will detail how Bryostatins, a drug once used for cancer treatment, and a related class of drugs discovered at BRNI can save and repair brain tissue.

BRNI is a nonprofit institute dedicated to the study of memory and memory disorders. Affiliated with both WVU and Johns Hopkins University, it was founded by Sen. Jay Rockefeller, D-W.Va., in memory of his mother, Blanchette Rockefeller, who died of Alzheimer's disease.

According to 2007 statistics from

the American Heart Association, about 700,000 people suffer strokes each year in the United States. More than 150,000 die from the condition, making strokes the country's third leading cause of death.

Of the 5.7 million stroke survivors in the U.S., many are living with permanent stroke-related disabilities that developed after help came too late.

BRNI Scientific Director Dr. Daniel Alkon, a senior author of the National Academy of Sciences

article with BRNI scientist Dr. Miao-Kun Sun, said the only drug currently used for stroke treatment must be given within three hours, and even then, it cannot repair damaged tissue.

About 95 percent of stroke victims don't receive treatment within three hours, he said.

"They can't reach the hospital soon enough. They're not found or they can't get there," Alkon said. "This drug opens a whole new time window in which we'll be able to

reach many, many more stroke victims."

A stroke occurs when the brain is deprived of necessary blood and oxygen — either because a blood vessel bursts, or it is blocked by a blood clot or another particle. As the blood and oxygen in brain tissue is depleted, neurons begin to die.

But in animal testing, Bryostatins and the related class of drugs have been shown to repair dying neurons, stimulate the growth of new neuron connections and restore memory capacity — unlike other treatments that simply stop a stroke from worsening, Alkon said.

The treatment works by stimulating synaptogenesis — the for-

## Many in Preston still await clean, reliable tap water

Amy Lewis, of Bruceton Mills, would like her family to have a clean, reliable water supply. The Lewis family has access to a well, but the water is not suitable for drinking, she said. Unless she boils her water, she does not use it.

"If I let my water sit for long enough, it becomes slimy," she said. "Sometimes the water starts to smell so bad that we can't stand to turn it on."

All across Preston County, water projects are in the works or in planning stages. But officials say the need is great, and water projects cost a lot of money.

Randy Debiase, chairman of Preston County Public Service District 1, said, "There are no official figures, but I know that there are quite a few people who need water in Preston County."

Although there has been no official survey, Debiase said one should be done to gauge the need.

Lewis, a mother of four, lives less than a half mile from the public water cutoff point. She is in the service area of PSD4. Her house, located on the site of an old saw mill, is situated on W.Va. 26 near the border with Pennsylvania.

"It amazes me that they cannot get us water and we live on a main road," Lewis said. "We do not have the luxury of tapping into a spring."

This pushed the Lewis family to invest in a water treatment system, with a price tag of \$3,500. Her attempts were mostly in vain, though, she said, because her water is still full of iron.

Because of that, Lewis' water can sometimes be

## Powerful storm raises fears from Caribbean to Gulf

KEY WEST, Fla. — Hurricane Ike grew to fierce Category 4 strength Saturday as it roared on an uncertain path that forced millions from the Caribbean to Florida, and Louisiana to Mexico, to nervously wonder where it would eventually strike.

Preparations stretched more than 1,000 miles as the massive, 135-mph storm took a southwesterly shift that could send it over Cuba and the Florida Keys by Tuesday before heading into the warm open waters of the Gulf of Mexico. And once again, a possible target was

New Orleans and the already storm-weary U.S. Gulf Coast.

"These storms have a mind of their own," Florida Gov. Charlie Crist said after a meeting with mayors and emergency officials. "There are no rules, so what we have to do is be prepared, be smart, vigilant and alert."

First in Ike's path was the low-lying British territory of Turks and Caicos, already pummeled for four days this week by Tropical Storm Hanna. At the airport in Providenciales, Patrick Munroe had hoped to catch a departing flight, but was turned away, even

before the airport shuttered.

"It looks really, really serious," he said. "And I think it's going to be devastating."

In Haiti, authorities tried to move thousands of people into shelters ahead of Ike, while they still struggled to recover from Tropical Storm Hanna. Rescue workers feared Hanna's death toll could rise into the hundreds in the flooded city of Gonaives and that aid efforts could be further impeded as Ike approached.

Hanna did not pack the same punch Saturday while racing up the U.S. Eastern seaboard, but did

cause one death in a traffic accident on Interstate 95 in Maryland. It also brought fits of wind and pelting rain on its trek toward New England.

But Ike is another matter. Tens of millions of people in countries spread over a swath of the hurricane zone monitored the trajectory of a storm that had a huge footprint, with tropical storm-force winds stretching up to 140 miles from its eye.

At 4 p.m., Ike's center was located about 90 miles east of Grand Turk Island as the storm moved west-southwest at about 15 mph, the National Hurricane Center in Miami said.

## WVU faculty to meet with BOG chair

Presidential search will likely be discussed

**THE WVU FACULTY** Senate will meet at 3:15 p.m. Monday in assembly room A/B at the National Research Center for Coal and Energy on WVU's Evansdale campus.

WVU Board of Governors Chairwoman Carolyn Long will answer questions from the university's Faculty Senate on Monday.

Long will likely discuss the search process for a new president at WVU — a topic the Faculty Senate will also consider when it decides how to select representatives for the search at Monday's meeting.

Faculty Senate Chairwoman Virginia Kleist said Long volunteered to address the faculty at Monday's meeting. Though the agenda indicates that she will present a report, Long said she plans to have an open discussion and get to know the faculty.

"I thought it was important," Long said. "I had not been on the board that long. I had not met a lot of the faculty and I wanted them to know who I was."

A BOG chair has not addressed the Faculty Senate as part of the agenda in at least two years, according to agendas posted online. Parviz Famouri, a former Faculty Senate chairman, said a BOG chair has not been on the agenda in "a while."

"In the past, we've had the mem-

## Sunday

### Driver cited for July 30 accident

W.Va. State Police cited a truck driver with failure to maintain control after causing a July 30 accident on Interstate 68 at the Cheat Lake Exit 10.

David Gilb, of Aurora, Ind., was hauling railroad ties, when his truck hit a tanker truck and a BMW. No one was injured.

The charge is punishable by a possible fine and license points.

### HSC: Growth blamed for woes

Unprecedented growth at WVU's Robert C. Byrd Health Sciences Center led to the structural and staffing issues that the facility has been working to resolve, according to Dr. Fred Butcher, interim vice-president of health sciences at WVU.

In June, an investigation by the newspaper revealed shortages of cardiothoracic surgeons and anesthesiologists that left both departments understaffed.

Butcher said the root cause of both was rapid growth that HSC leaders failed to adapt to. He said he is confident that the Health Sciences Center and hospital will come out stronger.

### High Street project delayed

The majority of the construction on the High Street streetscape project is expected to be completed by Sept. 26, a city official said.

The project is about 25 days behind. Terry Hough, city engineer, said the delays were due to "unforeseen circumstances" because of unmarked utilities.

The streetscape is part of a multi-year project to spruce up the downtown area. The areas between Willey and Walnut streets have been completed. The city plans to do streetscaping between Pleasant and Kirk streets in 2009.

## Monday

### Area case may gain federal help

The investigation into a cleaning service that allegedly smuggled stolen items from Target in garbage bags will go far beyond Granville, Police Chief Ron Snyder said.

On Aug. 28, Granville Police charged Rosalba Manuel Sanchez, 25, and Serafin M. Sanchez, 19, with misdemeanor petit larceny for stealing from Target. Both were still in the North Central Regional Jail on Tuesday in lieu of \$25,000 bond each.

Federal Immigration and Customs agents are involved.

### Apartment building damaged

Two-thirds of Morgantown's fire department — 25 firefighters — responded to an early morning blaze that damaged an apartment building on Willey Street Aug. 30.

Morgantown Fire Chief Dave Fetty estimated the damage to the building to be \$150,000 to \$200,000. No one was injured.

### Preston deputy returns

Josh Bolyard, 29, returned to his alma mater. This time as a Preston County Sheriff's deputy.

Bolyard, a deputy since 2002, is the new school resource officer at Preston High School. An Arthurdale native, he is a 1996 graduate of Preston High and has a bachelor's degree in criminal justice from Fairmont State.

## Tuesday

### Sunnyside wants more police

A resident of Sunnyside, a predominantly student-populated area, said he's seen house parties and students get out of hand since the beginning of the school year, and he would like to see more police officers patrolling the area.

City police, however, say they're doing the best they can, given the nature of the incidents. Calls regarding car wrecks or fights would take higher priority than a call regarding noise violations or minor vandalism, such as a trash can being knocked over.

### Mon schools tackle bus issues

A report about overcrowding and delays on Monongalia County school bus runs in the Cheat Lake area were addressed by school administrators.

Schools Transportation Director Irv Schuetzner said the number of students allowed per seat is not mandated by law.

William Hendershot, Monongalia County Schools manager of transportation, said they had sent out extra buses in the Cheat Lake area to help correct the transportation issues at the schools. He said the transportation department will add the buses needed.

## Wednesday

### Brothers drown in Marion

Luis Alberto Rubio Cleofas, 29, and Victor Rubio Cleofas, 26, both natives of Mexico, drowned Monday night at Valley Falls State Park in Marion County.

Both worked as cooks at the Mi Pueblo Mexican Restaurant at Middletown Mall.

Detective Shawn Mathews of the Marion County Sheriff's Department said Luis Cleofas was jumping from rock to rock across the falls when he lost his footing, slipped and fell 15 to 20 feet into the water. Victor Cleofas jumped into the water to save him but was overcome by a strong undertow.

### Logging near Cheat River

Allegheny Wood Products, a hardwood lumber company in Petersburg, will continue to cut trees from the Snake Hill Wildlife Management Area until its timber rights expire on Feb. 14, 2009.

The lumber company bought the timber rights to the land in the early 1990s before the state Division of Natural Resources purchased the land, Public Affairs Director Donna Reckart said.

The Snake Hill Wildlife Management Area consists of 3,092 acres and is located three miles north of Dellslow.

### Stakeout nets arson suspect

A Morgantown man is accused

of setting fire to a bag of soil, a plastic chair and an apartment deck. A firefighter stakeout led to his arrest.

Jeremy M. Hartley, 22, of 716 Timberline Apartments, is charged with first-degree arson for the incidents at Timberline.

### Man could face grand jury

A Fairview man arrested for stealing copper wire from two mine sites now faces a possible grand jury indictment.

Jeremy Caswell, 19, is charged with conspiracy, breaking and entering, destruction of property and grand larceny. Monongalia County Magistrate Hershel Mullins found probable cause at a preliminary hearing Tuesday and bound Caswell's case over to circuit court.

State Police said Caswell stole copper wire from Federal No. 2 mine property on Thomas Run Road and attempted to steal copper wire from the Eastern Associated Coal fan site near Daybrook.

### Contaminated kerosene recalled

Kerosene purchased in the region within the past few months may be contaminated with gasoline and poses a risk of fire or explosion, said Karen Walsh, spokeswoman for Pittsburgh Terminals Corp.

People can return kerosene to BFS Foods on Fairchance Road in Morgantown, and to Valley Fuels Inc. on Bull Run Road in Mason-town.

In Pennsylvania, returns can go to Gnagey Gas & Oil on Gardner Street in Uniontown, and Jacobs Petroleum Products on Washington Street in Waynesburg.

Customers can expect a full refund and money for the container in which the kerosene was returned. Info: (800) 692-6016 or ppcterminals.com.

### 17-year-old girl killed in crash

A 17-year-old Pennsylvania girl died in Monday's crash on Interstate 79.

Monongalia County Sheriff's Department said Alyssa Maria Boff, of Carnegie, Pa., died at the scene of the 5 p.m. crash on I-79 South near milemarker 143, just past the Goshen Road Exit.

Goff was a passenger in a 2003 Ford Escape driven by George Cash Sr., also of Carnegie. Anyone with information on the crash is asked to contact the Monongalia County Sheriff's Department at 291-7260.

## Thursday

### 9 Mon schools fail federal test

Half of Monongalia County's 18 schools did not meet the Adequacy Yearly Progress standards set by federal No Child Left Behind mandates.

Brookhaven Elementary, Mason-Dixon Elementary and the two new elementarys — Skyview and Mylan Park — did not pass AYP standards. Westwood and South middle schools, Morgantown, University and Clay-Battelle high schools also did not pass.

All schools fell short in reading and/or math.

At all nine, the substandard scores were found in two student populations — special education students and those with low socioeconomic status (low SES).

But Westwood also had its overall population of white students fall short in reading.

### 2 arrested in Preston for heroin

Two Preston County men were arrested Tuesday evening and charged with possession of heroin with intent to distribute.

Trooper Isaac Harmon, of the West Virginia State Police Kingwood Detachment, said Stephen P. Taylor, 30, of Reedsville, and Nicholas R. Barto, 34, of Newburg, were arrested at a traffic stop.

Recovered from the vehicle, a Mitsubishi Galant, were 73-75 postage-stamp size bags of heroin, street valued at more than \$3,000.

### Girl died of fatal dose of CO

An autopsy confirmed that the 12-year-old girl who died in the carbon monoxide accident on Apple Meadow Lane last month died from a fatal dose of the poisonous gas, State Police said Wednesday.

Cheyenne Hise was pronounced dead at the scene Aug. 12. Investigators blame a faulty pool heater attached to an indoor pool for the carbon monoxide leak that killed Hise and sickened six others.

Hise was a student at Westwood Middle School.

### Friday

#### UHA chief stepping down

Dr. Jeffrey Neely announced on Thursday that he will resign as president and CEO of University Health Associates, effective Oct. 31.

Dr. Gary Marano, a WVU radiologist, was unanimously approved by UHA's Board of Directors Wednesday to serve as Neely's interim replacement.

### Residents say no to blasting

Airport Boulevard residents want to block a neighborhood development because the developers plan to use dynamite for site preparation.

Homeowners have drafted a petition against the blasting because their property, and much of the other property in that area, is undermined.

Monongalia County Commissioners voted to send a letter to Place Properties in support of the residents.

### WVU to raise parking fees

Drivers parking in WVU lots will pay more, with the money going for improvements to university parking facilities.

WVU is also launching a program to promote alternative transportation options available to students and employees in hopes of reducing traffic congestion, decreasing demand for parking and cutting fuel costs. Parking rates will increase starting Oct. 1, ranging from an additional \$1 each month for employee gravel lots to \$14 a month for Area 98 vendor passes that permit parking in multiple locations.

Regular campus parking for students will increase from \$102 per semester to \$120, and gravel parking for students will increase from \$78 to \$84.

Parking rates for employee surface lots will go up by \$4 — from \$18 per month to \$22. Employees who park in gravel lots will now pay \$14 a month.

### Dialysis care comes to Mon

Monongalia General Hospital patients will no longer have to go somewhere else for kidney dialysis. Nurses in the Intensive Care and Coronary Care units began treating patients in July after receiving dialysis training from hospital educators.

Mon General has also acquired four nephrologists from the WVU Department of Nephrology to oversee the dialysis program.

### Local man indicted for tax fraud

Booker T. Walton, who owned and operated Walton and Associates Financial Services in Morgantown, was indicted by a federal grand jury in Clarksburg on Wednesday for charges of federal tax violations and related offenses.

Walton is being charged with five counts of aiding and abetting the making and filing of false tax returns and one count of conspiracy to

defraud from November 1994 through October 2003.

## Saturday

### Woman shot in Grafton

A woman was shot Friday by an unknown assailant who is still at large, Grafton Police Chief Robert Beltner said.

Beltner said a man was entering a house on Haymond Street when a woman living there pulled a handgun on him. Police would not name the woman and didn't know the man's name. Beltner said the man more than likely knew the woman and the family living at the home.

Beltner said the woman told police the man grabbed the gun away from her and used it to shoot her once before fleeing.

### 3 animals killed in house fire

Morgantown firefighters saved two homes damaged in a five-alarm fire Friday, but three dogs died in the smoke and flames inside the carport of a small house gutted by the blaze on Mildred Street, in 1st Ward.

Morgantown Fire Chief Dave Fetty said no people were injured in a two-hour battler that involved two-thirds of the city's department — about 25 firefighters — three fire engines and one ladder truck. A fourth company was on stand-by. Fire Capt. J. Bolyard said that when firefighters got the call, they were busy clearing the scene of a small fire on Willey Street. He said that although it took more time to get to the fire because of heavy traffic at about 5 p.m. on High Street, the three companies answered the call within a few minutes.

### Police shot Fairmont woman

A Fairmont woman was shot by police after a chase into Virginia in a stolen car.

Law enforcement officers said Vicki Lynn Gallo, 47, was shot in the shoulder after the vehicle in which she was riding attempted to strike a police officer. The incident began with a stolen vehicle report in Fairmont.

David Miles and Gallo, his passenger, were seen leaving a gas station in Bluefield without paying for gas, Virginia State Police Sgt. Michael Conroy said. Officers ran the vehicle license plate numbers and discovered the vehicle had been reported stolen, Conroy said.

A pursuit ensued and it continued over the Virginia border.

There, Conroy said, officers from both states tried to box the vehicle in to get Miles, of Harrison County, to stop. The Miles vehicle and a Bluefield police cruiser collided in the median when the suspect traveled the wrong way on a Bluefield, Va., road.

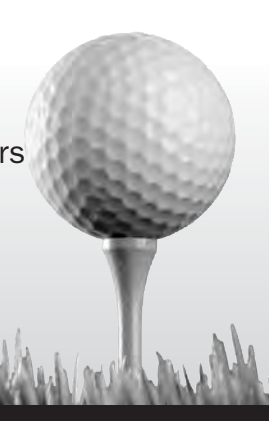

bers of the BOG attending our meetings," Famouri said. "They didn't speak or anything, but they've attended."

Long said former BOG chairman

Steve Goodwin made sure board members were aware of faculty meetings and encouraged them to attend. BOG members attended as their schedules permitted, she said.

"It's not as if the board has never been to a Faculty Senate meeting," Long said. "I think the board has

always been open and tried to have open communication with the faculty."

Kleist said both Long's visit with the faculty and a lunch scheduled later in the week with the Faculty Senate executive committee will be good for WVU. "I'm pleased she's coming. I'm pleased she volunteered," Kleist said. "I think it shows the Board of Governors is reaching out to the faculty for the [presidential] search."

Long said she plans to tell faculty members more about herself on Monday and answer any questions they might have.

She said she will offer only general information about the proposal she plans to present to the BOG on Friday for WVU's upcoming presidential search. The search procedure will not be finalized until it's approved by the board and the state's Higher Education Policy Commission.

Long said her proposal includes suggested numbers for the constituencies represented in the search, an ethics statement to be signed by search participants and traits to look for in presidential candidates.

"I really have just outlined what's in the Higher Ed policy," Long said, referring to a new set of rules that will determine how West Virginia's public colleges and universities search for, select and pay their presidents.

The rules, approved by the state's Higher Education Policy Commission last month, will require the commission to approve all search procedures and remove a college governing board's ability to appoint members to an already established search committee. Noland would serve as a nonvoting member on search committees, and the commission would be able to conduct its own finalist interviews.

HEPC Chancellor Brian Noland

said the commission will meet Wednesday to consider a change recommended by the Legislative Oversight Commission on Education Accountability that will allow search panels to choose their own leaders. That is the only change the commission will consider at its meeting, Noland said.

The Faculty Senate will determine how to select the faculty representatives that will serve on the presidential search committee at Monday's meeting.

The Faculty Senate executive committee voted last month to recommend creating a subcommittee to choose faculty members from a list of submitted nominees. The panel would consist of the elected members of the executive committee and two members of the Faculty Senate at large.

"In general, there seems to be support of this approach," Kleist said Friday. "I haven't had anyone

speaking against it. We're looking forward to having a dialogue on Monday. We're open to suggestions."

Kleist sent an e-mail to faculty late last month asking that nominations be submitted to the Faculty Senate office by noon on Friday, in case faculty members opted to vote on representatives at Monday's meeting. Faculty Senate office staff did not return calls to *The Dominion Post* Friday to comment on the number of submissions.

If the Faculty Senate chooses to go with the executive committee's recommendation, Kleist said she hopes to extend the deadline for nominations to serve on the search panel to Friday.

"If we had to run a ballot, we needed time to prepare the ballot," Kleist said. "That was the only reason we had such a short time frame."

Soliciting additional nominations will help encourage inclusiveness and a broader representation of faculty in the search process, Kleist said.

mation of neuron connections in the brain. The majority of synaptogenesis occurs early in a person's life, but Alkon said Bryostatatin and the related drugs allow the brain to reestablish connections the brain typically doesn't make as a person ages.

"This drug allows existing cells to reach their full health and make new connections without introducing new cells," Alkon said.

BRNI has submitted a proposal to the Food and Drug Administration to begin clinical trials of Bryostatatin for Alzheimer's disease — a use for the drug that was discovered at

BRNI. Because of its ability to help the brain repair itself, Alkon said the drug can also be used to treat brain damage in people with Alzheimer's disease and traumatic brain injury.

"You can start it many, many hours after the trauma and still get a very good therapeutic result," Alkon said. "We're anticipating that this class has potential to treat a whole variety of conditions that affect the brain."

Alkon and Sun's research on Bryostatatin was conducted at a BRNI facility at Johns Hopkins University in Rockville, Md., but BRNI Director of Operations D. Max Francis said both scientists will relocate to a new \$30 million, 78,000-square-foot space scheduled to open in Mor-

gantown in October.

"We're going to be focused mainly on research, not treatment," Francis said. "Their research was done in Rockville at a Johns Hopkins facility, and much of that work will be done here."

Francis said a total of seven scientists will move to the new facility located near Ruby Memorial Hospital and WVU's Health Sciences Center, joining one scientist already located in Morgantown.

Crews are putting the finishing touches on the building, installing interior signage and finishing the cabinetry.


"We are confident that everything will be in place for the opening of the facility by Oct. 17," Francis said.

A dedication ceremony is scheduled for Oct. 17. It will follow BRNI's first-ever International Forum on Memory and Memory Disorders — an event that is expected to bring some of the world's leading researchers to the WVU Alumni Center on Oct. 16.

Francis said the forum, the dedication and the National Academy of Sciences article will be good recognition for BRNI and WVU, Francis said.

"It brings recognition to their good work," Francis said of the article. "When you bring recognition to their good work, it benefits the image of the institution, and ultimately, the image of the university."



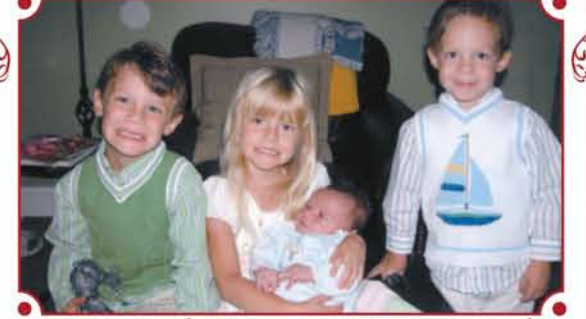

# Difficult decisions force even harder choices

## Costs have effect on who gets water

Rosemary Born, of Arthurdale, hasn't yet used her new washer and dryer because of the bad water coming into her home.

"It stains everything," she said.

Born travels to her daughter's house in Masontown to do her laundry.

She buys her drinking and cooking water, five gallons per week, at the store. It is hard to have company, she said, because she does not have enough water to entertain many people.

Born had expected to be part of a Preston County Public Service District 1 water project in 1996, but that didn't happen because of rocky ground and the expense to get a line to her home, the PSD told her back then.

Roy and Gloria Sapp, of Independence, have water service now — but they had to wait 12 extra years because of the same problem.

### Rosemary Born

Rock puts a damper on any water project, because of the extreme cost of drilling through it, said Robert Bailey, chairman of PSD4.

Born said she had expected to be part of PSD1's first project.

There was to be another house built on her property, so she paid two tap fees.

Plans changed when PSD1 sent Born

a letter explaining her situation. In the letter, dated Sept. 13, 1996, the board informed Born there were "limited funds" for expansion. Her tap fee was refunded with the letter. The decision was made during an August board meeting.

Born attended the next meeting, she said, and the board told her the project became unfeasible because of how much it would cost to drill through the rock to bring water lines to her home.

Current PSD1 board members said they could not answer questions about what happened back then, as none of them were on the board.

Glen Holmes, of Arthurdale, a PSD board member in 1996, said the PSD had to consider the expense of getting water to the Born property and compare that to getting water to other properties.

The goal is to serve as many homes as possible with the money available. The decision, he said, involved input from the project engineer and the state Public Service Commission.

If a project encounters rock, Bailey said, the situation needs to be re-evaluated because drilling raises the price exponentially.

He said that if there are only one or two people on the line where drilling is needed, he cannot move forward with the project. Those same funds could be used to bring water to a greater number of people elsewhere.

"We are governed by finances," Bailey said.

### The Sapps

Roy and Gloria Sapp also expected to

be included in the same project, which was completed in 1996.

The plan, drawn up in 1985, included Preston County 33, the Sapps' road, in the construction. There were 33 people who signed the petition to bring water to the area.

When it came the time for construction, plans changed, Gloria Sapp said. After the feasibility report had been finished, the project became economically unfeasible.

Sapp said she contacted PSD1 and was told there was too much rock in the way to drill through.

Preston 33 was replaced in the construction plan with Stoney Run Road. The Sapps said they received no notice of the change of plans. They had to figure it out for themselves.

"It was very disappointing," Roy Sapp said.

From 1996 on, the Sapps were consistently in attendance at water meetings for PSD1. Their presence did not go unnoticed. On reports leading up to the later Seven Road Project, the stretch of Preston 33 that was excluded from the first project was nicknamed the "Gloria Sapp Area." Sapp jokes that she had no idea she was that loud.

"We should not have had to fight," she said.

Both Sapps were frustrated.

"It is funny how the county can spend money on things that don't amount to a hill of beans, but there are still people that need clean water," Roy Sapp said.

Water service was extended to the Sapps and their neighbors on Preston 33 in February.

According to the Sapps, there was no mention of rock the second time around.

Randy Debiase, chairman of Preston County PSD1, said rock was not an issue this time because there was ample funding to pay for the drilling.

Debiase did say, though, that, "the beginning of Route 33 going down into Independence was the area with the most rock."

While it took longer than they expected, the Sapps are satisfied with their new water supply.

"It gives us one less thing to worry about," Roy Sapp said.

Before water lines were extended to their area, the Sapps had a well serving two houses.

There was plenty of good water, they said, but it could sometimes be a lot of work.

"We are in our 60s and we might get to a point where we cannot work our well's pump," Gloria Sapp said. The pump took four people to remove and service if anything went wrong.

While the Sapps were still on well water, they had to plan ahead in case of an electrical outage. The Sapps had large amounts of water frozen at all times, because they never knew when they would need it. If the power went out, there would only be enough pressure in their tank to give them a few more gallons of water.

It is a joke around the house to freeze water now, especially when there is a storm outside.

"I tell her," Roy Sapp said, "that she needs to draw water before the power goes out."

orange. Her shower and sinks, if not cleaned daily, begin to take on an orange stain. And washing clothes is a challenge.

"My whites are not white," she said.

To keep her clothes from being ruined, Lewis said she uses a lot of bleach. She must also use a rust stain removal product to clean the inside of her machine.

While her son Dawson was on his baby formula, Lewis said, she had to switch to an already-mixed formula, because the water was making him sick. After the switch, his sickness cleared up, Lewis said.

### The joy of water

Preston County has 29,334 residents, according to 2007 census figures.

Kingwood has its own water system. Rowlesburg also has a brand new treatment plant. Masontown is served by the Morgantown Utility Board. Newburg buys water from Taylor County PSD.

There are three PSDs — 1, 2 and 4. Kingwood sells water to PSD2.

PSD1 completed its Seven Road Project in 2007.

"Three people thanked me for their first water bill," said Joyce Myers, PSD1 office manager. "They said their bill was beautiful."

During Christmas week 2007, when Myers and PSD1 Chief Operator John Keener turned on water for W.Va. 92 residents, who are served by the Seven Road Project, they wore Santa Claus hats, Myers said.

After more than 10 years of working toward getting water lines for this area's residents, Myers said, it was only right that Christmas week would be the first time many of them had public water.

"Citizens fought hard to get it, and they deserve it," she said. "I know what it is like to have water in your house that you are afraid to let your kids drink."

Myers was among the 140 customers given the gift of water that Christmas week.

The Seven Road project serves W.Va. 33, 92 and 25, along with Wigley Pond Road, McKinney Cave Road, Spurgeon Holmes Road and Old Jack Brown Road.

### The problems of delivery

Lewis said she and her neighbors have pleaded their case for water at PSD4 meetings, but have been turned down.

"They told us that they had no plans of extending water service to our area," said Lewis, who has lived on W.Va. 26 for eight years.

Robert Bailey, chairman of PSD4, said that when the lines were initially being laid down, the residents of Lewis' stretch of W.Va. 26 refused to grant PSD4 the rights-of-way to finish the project. Thus, the work stopped and the extensions were cut off.

Lewis said she can see the cut-off point for the public water lines when she looks up W.Va. 26 from her driveway.

Jamie Roach plans to build a

house on W.Va. 26, in the area where Lewis lives. She said PSD4 asked that she make a map showing all the houses interested in hooking up to public water, along with at least 12 signatures on a petition.

Bailey confirmed that he requested the petition and map. But he has not seen or heard of any progress in submitting either item.

Carl Collins, PSD4 treasurer, explained that the PSD needs at least 12 customers per mile for a project to be feasible.

Asked about the delay, Roach and Lewis said coordinating their schedules with going to the water meetings is difficult.

Roach said the PSD4 board said it may take up to five years to get water service for her stretch of W.Va. 26. In the meantime, Roach said, she will dig a well, which will cost from \$6,000 to \$10,000.

Bailey and Collins said that, being volunteers with full-time jobs outside of the PSD4 office, they do not have the time to gather the information they need to move forward with a new project on W.Va. 26. Residents of the area will know the area, and their neighbors, better than the board, Bailey said. This would help make the process easier.

"You can't just do a water project and have it done in a year," Bailey said.

The process of getting a water line extension is not as cut and dried as many may think. It takes a minimum of five years for a project to be completed.

Bailey said he can't give an estimate of what a possible project might cost, because the prices of materials, labor and transportation fluctuate so often.

In the meantime, Collins said, "Anyone that is not satisfied with the job we are doing can call the Public Service Commission."

### The money problem

Robbie Baylor, executive director of the Preston County Economic Development Authority, said the growth Preston County has seen is reason enough to push for water extensions.

Also, because of its proximity to Pennsylvania and Maryland, Baylor sees a need to become more competitive for businesses.

"If a site is not fully served by utilities, a business is not going to come out here," she said.

So why does it take so long to get water to a community?

"We are governed by finances," Bailey said.

Baylor agrees. "The big hold-up is the funding for these projects."

The grant programs used by many areas to aid in paying for water lines have become extremely competitive. Preston County has to compete with every other county in West Virginia's 1st Congressional District — 20 counties in all.

PSD1 has a \$1,402,700 Small Cities Block Grant, but recent growth may make getting future grants a problem, she said.

To qualify, she said, an area must be deemed "low income." This is decided by judging an area's median household income, or MHI. Few places in Preston County qualify for this, she said.

Bailey believes MHI figures are not accurate, and leave those in need stranded. He says accurate MHI figures are skewed on the wages earned by workers in the Hazelton prisons.

Their wages, which are much higher than the average Prestonian's, Bailey said, inflate the MHI for most of his projects. "It is almost impossible to get a Small Cities Block Grant."

PSD1's Seven Road project took more than 10 years to finish, Myers said, because of funding setbacks. Rising prices of gas and pipe caused the original project estimate of \$2,794,000 to climb another \$806,838. The final cost was \$3,600,838.

The Drinking Water Treatment Revolving Fund, a national loan program, came through with the extra \$806,838 PSD1 needed, she said. PSD1 also received a loan for \$1,391,300 from West Virginia's Infrastructure Jobs Development council.

Acquiring all of this funding is not an instant process, and is most of the reason it takes so long, Myers said. "If we had an unlimit-

ed amount of grants, there would be no stopping us getting people their water."

### Abandoned Mine Lands money

If it can be proved that mining activity has contributed to an area's water being tainted, there is a possibility of receiving grant money from the U.S. Bureau of Land Management's Abandoned Mine Lands program, said Angela Chestnut, AML waterline administrator.

AML is a national fund created by the Surface Mining and Reclamation Act of 1977, which was enacted to control surface mining's effect on the environment. The act set up a per-ton tax for all coal still actively mined in the United States.

On surface-mined coal the tax is 35 cents, and on underground coal it is 15 cents.

Funds from AML are distributed to municipalities and public service districts after they go through an approval process. After a consultant is assigned to a project, AML must first determine if there was pre-1977 coal mining in the area. If there was, the process moves forward to water testing.

Chestnut said her consultants are not making judgments on water safety. A consultant's job is only to look for evidence of water contamination from mining. Water is tested for iron, manganese and sulfate. The pH (acid level) of the water is also scrutinized.

At the end of the study, AML calculates what is called an "eligibility percentage." This number is based on the number of people with contaminated water versus the area's population. That number is used to decide how much of a project's estimate AML will cover.

Chestnut said the process takes about six months from receipt of the application until an approval is reached, but it is well worth the wait.

A project serving 341 residents in Lenox and Cuzzart — PSD4 area — has recently received a 100-percent eligibility rating. AML is covering the full \$6,865,750

## Feds commit cash to projects

The U.S. Bureau of Land Management's Abandoned Mine Lands program has committed to funding eight water projects, said Angela Chestnut, waterline administrator. Two more projects are being considered.

Chestnut said the Lennox/Cuzzart project is her "favorite." The project, which AML is coordinating with Public Service District 4, will bring water to 341 new customers, and has 100 percent of the cost covered by a grant.

### AML-funded project under construction

Community of Preston: The project, which will serve 18 customers, has 100 percent AML funding. Total cost: \$354,830.

### AML-funded projects not yet under construction

■ Lennox/Cuzzart: This \$6,865,750 project will serve 341 customers, and has 100 percent AML funding.

■ Town of Terra Alta: AML has committed \$2,456,361 to the \$2,729,290 project. The new lines will serve 150 customers.

■ Ridge Road 21-22: AML has committed \$431,707.69 toward funding the \$465,202.25 project, which will serve 25 customers.

■ Buckeye/Blazer/Kanetown roads: AML has committed \$649,745.75 to this project, which will serve 57 customers. Total cost: \$879,425.

■ Rohr Road to Bull Run: AML has committed \$358,875 for this \$478,500 project, which will serve 32 customers.

■ Pell/St. Joe/Birds Creek: AML has committed \$2,300,627 to fund this \$2,771,840 project, which will serve 122 customers.

■ North Union Community Road: AML has committed \$870,102 toward this \$1,074,200 project, which will serve 43 customers.

### Projects under consideration

■ 9 County roads: Would serve 54 customers.

■ Herring: Would serve 320 customers.

for the project.

In 2006, AML efforts in West Virginia got a boost. Public Law 102-432, an amendment to the SMRA, was passed, which reallocated money to states with the biggest need. Through that reallocation, West Virginia was awarded one-fifth of the nation's funds; money that will be disbursed during the next 15 years in fluctuating amounts.

AML has one project under construction in Preston County, and seven still in the planning phase. The total projected cost for the projects is \$16,212,755. AML's share will be \$14,287,998.44.

### Other projects

Tunnelton, in an extension project, will be buying its water from the new Rowlesburg facility. The facility was built to replace the town's original treatment plant, which was constructed in 1963.

Mayor Barbara Bannister said, "The people could not stand the water before we finished this facility."

Rowlesburg residents and county officials gathered to dedicate the new plant in mid-August. It can treat 200 gallons per minute.

Bannister said the new water is "almost as good as bottled water."

The new facility serves nearly 400 customers in Rowlesburg and will allow them to serve more than 700 Tunnelton customers. The water comes from the Cheat River.

The \$3.6 million project was funded with a Small Cities Block Grant from the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development, along with grant and loan funds from the USDA's Rural Util-

ities Service.

Newburg, which buys its water from Taylor County, is also extending water service to Fellowsville. The \$1 million for the Fellowsville project came through the USDA Water and Waste Disposal Loan and Grant program.

Masontown has recently begun using water from the Morgantown Utility Board.

The project, which was completed Oct. 10, extended water lines from MUB to Masontown to guarantee the town a quality water supply.

Residents of the Bull Run community, near Masontown, have been working to get city water for about 15 years.

Masontown Mayor Lydia Main said, "We're going to extend water lines to Bull Run and North Union as soon as we get the grants to do it. We have some money, but we're not even half way. There's not enough money unless we get some grants to extend those lines. We've had our water in Masontown for a long time, and we've hooked into the Morgantown Utility Board at Snake Hill Road. We had a lot of new homes going in and we couldn't supply them all so we hooked up with MUB to supply them with water."

David Price, president of the Preston County Commission, said that, with the recent release of AML funds, there are more water projects in the county than ever before.

Using the soon-to-be-completed Rowlesburg water treatment facility as an example, Price said, "As a commission president, I am extremely happy with the progress of the water projects in Preston County."

**FBI's civil rights initiative: no trials yet**

WASHINGTON — Flanked by officials from the NAACP and the Southern Poverty Law Center, FBI Director Robert Mueller last year announced with considerable fanfare a new partnership between his agency and civil rights organizations.

The goal: To bring justice in long-ignored murders from the civil rights era.

The outcome: Not one case has been prosecuted under the FBI's Cold Case Initiative, which actually began two years ago with no fanfare at all.

The civil rights leaders present at Mueller's February 2007 news conference — John Jackson of the NAACP, who now works for a pri-

vate firm, and Richard Cohen, director of the Southern Poverty Law Center — have come to question the government's motives.

"I've been disappointed that more cases have not been brought," Cohen said. "I worried that too many people would get their hopes up. I don't want to be part of a show."

Some of the killings occurred up to 60 years ago. Evidence was sometimes destroyed to prevent further investigating. Some crime-scene samples — clothing, hair strands, blood stains — were lost.

Memories have faded, and witnesses have died. Of those still alive, some are afraid to come forward even now.

**7 years on, Sept. 11 is so far and yet so close**

It is not a tidy anniversary this year. Seven years between that awful day and this Sept. 11, the terrorist attacks linger somewhere between the immediate, a conscious part of our days, and the comfortable remove of the distant past. No longer yesterday and not yet history.

What happened seven years ago colors American life today. There are the two wars, of course. But in smaller ways, too: We sing "God Bless America" at the ballpark. We weigh "evil" as a campaign issue. We slip off our shoes at airport security, buy the zip-top bag for liquids and gels.

And yet there is an unmistakable distance now. No one speaks of the "new normal" anymore. All of those things are just normal.

This Thursday — Sept. 11, 2008 — will be nothing like the first anniversary, when people were allowed, even encouraged, to take the day off work to reflect, when airports were eerily empty, when silence settled over cities.

But it will also be nothing like what life in America was on Sept. 10, 2001, the day before.

What does 9/11 mean, seven years on? What do we make of it now?

Yet we are close enough that video of the towers' collapse — is so painful it almost never airs anymore, and when it is shown, as in a montage at the Republican Nation-

al Convention, it is utterly halting.

No one will forget. But when is it OK to move on? For some, seven years means enough time to pick up, sometimes to pack up, to start anew.

Cathy Faughnan's husband, Christopher, a 37-year-old bond trader, was killed in the trade center. She was 37 then, too, and remembers thinking she was too young to be a widow for the rest of her life.

She does not like to watch TV coverage of these anniversaries. Her family remembers Christopher in other ways. September also

means the start of college football, and they go to cheer his beloved Colorado Buffaloes once a year.

This year, for the first time, she took the three children she had with Christopher — Siena, Juliet and Liam, who are now 14 and 11 and 9 — to ground zero, where steel from the rebuilding now pokes above street level.

"I think that was the first time it really maybe hit them how many people died," their mother said. "I saw them with their mouths open."

# Blast permits not required

## Officials differ on regulation

Most people agree there should be oversight of construction site blasting. But whether that responsibility should fall to the county or state government is a matter of opinion.

The lack of regulation came to light after Airport Boulevard resi-

dents voiced opposition to planned blasting at a nearby development. The residents fear the effect it could have on undermined property.

Anthony Carrico, deputy state fire marshal with the Licensing and Regulatory Division, said the State Fire Marshal's Office is responsible for issuing permits to people handling explosives, which is a power given the office in accordance with state code.

However, Carrico said, there is no regulation that requires a permit to blast at a given site.

Delegate Bob Beach, D-Monongalia, said the permitting process

needs to be examined. "I think that needs to be changed," he said. "It should be addressed in a piece of legislation."

Beach said developers who intend to blast in a certain area should be required to file papers with the County Commission or the Planning Commission, stating where the blasting will occur and how many homes are in the area around the blasting zone.

The regulations should be managed on a county level, Beach said, and he believes the County Commission should be the entity to put those regulations in place. (Calls to other del-

egates were not returned in time for this report.)

Chris Ilardi, president of the Monongalia County Planning Commission, said that site blasting would not be regulated in the county's proposed zoning ordinance, even if the ordinance was in effect.

"We don't have anything addressing that in the zoning ordinance, because its outside of the scope of zoning," Ilardi said.

The area the development is being built in sits between the WVU farm and

## New technology links various law-enforcement agencies

When police chiefs from around West Virginia met in Morgantown this weekend, they had an opportunity to see the next generation of law-enforcement software.

Monongalia, like West Virginia's other 54 counties, has relied on a hodgepodge of software records systems.

"Everyone did their own thing," Morgantown Police Chief Phil Scott said.

But a \$236,000 federal grant written by Granville Police Chief Ron Snyder has put them In-Synch. That's the name of the information software county law enforcement agencies are piloting in the state, all at no cost.

In-Synch software puts all the agencies in the same data bank. For example, if Granville Police arrest someone, Morgantown, Westover, Star City, Granville, WVU Police, West Virginia State Police, Monongalia County Sheriff's deputies and the prosecuting attorney know it

Airport Boulevard, would be part of the proposed West Run zoning district.

New regulations would have to be put in place to regulate blasting in the county, Ilardi said, which are referred to as land use development ordinances.

"Zoning tells you what can go where," he said. "Land use development ordinances tells you how something can be done."

Land use development ordinances regulate things such as the width of roads or site clearances, Ilardi said.

"Other than that, there's nothing, to my knowledge. There's isn't anybody that has to say 'yes you can blast here,' or 'no, you can't,'" he said.

There are six different permit classes for handling explosives, starting with a "helper" permit, which allows the permit holder to take on an apprenticeship in the explosives industry.

According to the state Fire Marshal's Office, those applying for a "helper" permit must be at least 18 years old. People applying for any of the other permit classes must be at least 21 years old.

The permit classes include agriculture blasting, demolition and blasting operations in quarries, open pit mines and aboveground construction.

In order to get a permit to use explosives, an individual must submit an application, which can be found at the State Fire Marshal's Web site, firemarshal.wv.gov, along with two forms of identification (one of which must be a picture ID) and a letter of recommendation from an employer.

Only individuals handling the explosives are required to have a permit.

Previously, those applying for a permit had to also take an open book examination, Carrico said, but the exam was discontinued in January because the State Fire Marshal's Office found out it didn't have the authority to require a test as part of the application process.

"There is not any legislative rule that authorizes us to do that," he said. "There is probably something that needs to be done, but we don't have the authorization to do anything without firm legislative backing."

Carrico said the U.S. Bureau of Alcohol, Firearms and Tobacco per-

forms a background check on the applicant, and the State Fire Marshal's Office also does a background check. If the background check comes up clean, the applicant will receive a permit.

Carrico said applicants are sometimes denied permits if, for example, the background check reveals that the applicant has a criminal history, an addiction to alcohol or drugs or an affiliation with a terrorist group.

Applicants will also be denied certain classes of permits, if they do not have enough experience, Carrico said.

"We don't issue any permit to anyone," Carrico said. "We don't issue unlimited blasting permits to people who don't have experience."

Explosives handlers are required to start out with the "helper" permit, Carrico said, and train under the guidance of an experienced blaster.

Carrico said the State Fire Marshal's Office has had very few problems with the explosives handlers permit system to this point.

"The explosive industry is very self-regulatory themselves," Carrico said. "Because there are such great consequences there."

as soon as the information is entered into the computer. By the same token, Granville officers will know immediately if their new prisoner has had any prior run-ins with other local law enforcement agencies.

"Everybody in this county has jumped on this information sharing," Snyder said.

The training is ongoing. Scott said that while, "We have officers here who have never done a paper report," and adapt well to new software, "the older you are — nobody likes teaching an old dog new tricks."

Snyder joked that when he first entered police work, "We did reports with a stone tablet and chisel."

Police chiefs at the conference saw a live demonstration of the software. The maker has developed three-year equipment and software leases for police forces that couldn't afford to purchase it outright, Snyder said.

"I've talked to a few chiefs who are really, really interested in it and about why we rave about it," Star City Chief Vic Propst said.

Monongalia County police have applied for another grant, this one \$272,000, to implement the software's next step. That would include putting computers with the software in cruisers, so officers could run checks on motorists' licenses and on outstanding warrants without using their radios to call the station. That's important in an area where the air waves are so full of radio traffic it's sometimes hard to make a call, the chiefs said.

"When the county grows, you have to grow with it," Westover Police Chief Jimmy Smith said.

The West Virginia Chiefs of Police Association has more than 100 members and more than half attended the annual fall conference in Morgantown. They met socially Friday night at a picnic at Mylan Park, which is a great opportunity to network, Propst said.

Smith said the conference is a

chance to share ideas and to make contacts in other areas, so that, if they ever have to call another agency, "you're always more comfortable with people you know."

On Saturday, they met at The Waterfront Place Hotel, where vendors set up displays of new technology and equipment.

Each conference also includes training classes. This year, the focus was on managing stress. Congressman Alan Mollohan, whom Snyder said was instrumental in obtaining federal funding for In-Synch, also stopped by. The conference concluded Saturday evening with an awards banquet.

Wheeling Police Chief Kevin Gessler, president of the West Virginia Police Chiefs Association, said the meetings are "almost like a lessons learned type environment. It saves us from making mistakes that have already been made."

Regardless of size, all police departments face similar problems, Gessler said, such as recruiting qualified applicants. And similar solutions can work as well. He's been hearing Monongalia County police chiefs rave about the In-Synch system, so Ohio County, where Wheeling is located, sought a company demonstration.

Ohio County is now considering investing in the system, Gessler said. He likes how it not only shares information among West Virginia departments but police agencies nationwide. And, unlike other systems, such as NCIC that contain warrants and information on more serious crimes, it gives officers access to information on local crimes or even times officers have encountered someone before.

"It's sharing a lot of information across a seamless network," Gessler said.

# Fertilizing in the fall essential for winter legume forage yields

**THE HIGH COST** of fertilizer this year has caused forage producers to be as efficient as possible with application rates.

If you haven't already done so, be sure to get a soil test on any field that has not been tested in the last three years. Potash and phosphate can be applied just as easily, maybe more so, in the fall, rather than applying on muddy pastures in the spring.

Dr. Doug Beegle, Penn State University extension specialist, recently noted that many locations have experienced excellent forage yields.

As a result, we can expect that nutrient removal by the crop may be up significantly.

This, combined with increasing fertilizer prices, especially for potash, has raised questions about the need for fall fertilization of forage stands.

Though his discussion is centered around legumes grown in Pennsylvania, the principles discussed are also valid for grass-based and grass-legume mixes commonly grown in northern West Virginia.

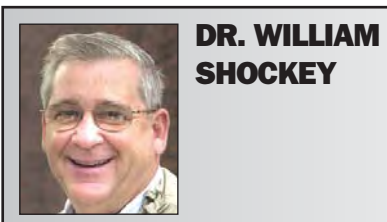
The principal nutrients of concern for legume forages are phosphate and potash. An alfalfa crop, for example, removes approximately 15 pounds of phosphate and 50 pounds of potash per ton of yield, and at an annual yield of five-ton it will remove 75 pounds of phosphate and 250 pounds of potash. This removal is built into the soil test recommendations.

However, if yields are higher than anticipated when the soil test was run, even if the recommended nutrients have been applied earlier in the year, additional maintenance applications of P and K may need to be made to replace the higher removal.

Fall is an excellent time to make this adjustment.

In the late summer and fall, potash especially becomes a nutrient of agronomic concern. Potassium in the plant is largely found in the sap serving as a regulator of numerous metabolic processes.

A major benefit of sufficient potash in the soil is winter hardi-

ness, provided it is available in time for uptake by the crop before dormancy occurs.

Thus, if soil test levels are in the low optimum or below optimum range, potassium should be applied in the fall because this should help to improve winter survival for the long term benefit of the stand.

Fall is the best time to apply manure to fields. This is a way to supply the additional nutrients that might be required.

There is less chance of stimulating weeds, and there is good cover in these fields in the fall, over the winter and early spring, to minimize nutrient losses to the environment.

Agronomists want to make sure that producers replace the higher removal of potash if needed, but don't overdo it. Excessive soil potash will be taken up by plants, whether they need it or not.

This can result in unnecessary fertilizer expense, high K levels in the forage, and less K available for future uptake.

Sampling soils now will indicate whether the higher yields have reduced soil K levels to the point where a fall fertilizer application is necessary.

On the other hand, regardless of higher yield, if the soil reserves are still adequate, the soil test can tell you not to make any expensive and unnecessary fertilizer applications.

**Garden tips**

Lawns or bare spots reseeded with grass now will have a chance to get established before winter sets in. Water often and mulch.

You can still enjoy garden flowers indoors. Sow these annuals inside: sweet alyssum, dwarf marigold, browallia, ageratum and nasturtium. Grow them in a moderately cool (60 degrees), sunny window.

**Nutrition tip**

Paula Strawder, WVU Extension Service Nutrition and Health Team, reports that cool drinks, those between 40-50 degrees, are absorbed more quickly than lukewarm ones. The cooler temperature (not freezing) may actually help ease your thirst more.

Cooler water also forces the body to warm the water up during digestion and may burn more calories than lukewarm water. Remember to drink a lot of liquids, especially cool water.

## DOH looks into West Run Road improvements

The state Division of Highways is considering improving West Run Road to address safety issues and accommodate increased traffic, according to District 4 Maintenance Engineer Jeff Pifer.

A new development is planned at the intersection of West Run and Point Marion roads. It will house 16 one-bedroom apartments, four two-bedroom apartments and 12,000 feet of office space in four floors, including the basement.

Property owner Kurt Ly said the exact number of offices will depend on how much space each tenant is interested in. The facility is designed for small, home-based business offices and is slated for completion by the end of the year.

Ly said he initially received approval from the state Division of Highways to access the development from Point Marion Road, but DOH officials asked him to move the entrance after they decided it was too dangerous.

"I think it's too dangerous, too," Ly said. "There's been four or five accidents there since I started my development. I don't want to take that risk."

Two people were killed near the intersection last month when the motorcycle they were riding struck a Subaru in a head-on collision, but Pifer said DOH officials asked Ly to move the entrance because of limited sight distance at the intersection.

Ly said vehicles will now enter and exit the development via a 40-foot entrance on West Run Road.

DOH officials have told him West Run Road will be widened near the development, but Pifer said the DOH is considering its options.

Pifer noted that the developers of two larger projects on West Run Road — West Run Apartments and Copper Beech Townhomes — have paid for improvements at the intersection of West Run and Stewart roads.

The number of units included in a development and the amount of traffic it's expected to generate determines whether a developer

will be required to pay for road-way improvements, Pifer said. Ly's development "didn't meet that threshold," Pifer said, but if another developer pursues a project nearby that will significantly affect traffic, he or she may be asked to help improve the road-way.

In the meantime, the DOH is considering ways to redesign the intersection with Point Marion Road.

"We're looking at what we can do," Pifer said.

## Friends of Deckers Creek receives grant for youth learning program

One-third of the youth who reached the 30+ service hour mark were participants involved with Friends of Deckers Creek.

YAB's next service project will be marking storm drains with the South Hills Neighborhood Association, in conjunction with the Morgantown Utility Board, at 6:30 p.m. Thursday.

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## Residents hope to unite Parkway Drive

### Some say crime, vandalism plague neighborhood

Parkway Drive residents say they are concerned about crime in their community and plan to do something about it.

Drugs, speeding, littering, vandalism and delayed emergency responses were just some of the concerns neighbors shared with local officials at a recent meeting.

Dr. Suzanne Gosden Kitchen organized Tuesday's meeting as the start to a neighborhood watch. She invited her neighbors, local police officials and 911 directors.

They conducted the meeting in her front yard.

"There were 40 people in our front yard and eight police cars," Kitchen said. "That got a lot of attention and I'm glad."

Kitchen said the push toward neighborhood unity began this summer when a suspected drug dealer was arrested — living right across the street from where neighborhood children play and not far from the school many of the children attend.

"We'd already been putting up with loud music, traffic in and out, and speeding up and down our street," she said. "That was the straw that broke the camel's back."

Kitchen said that while they can't control who lives in their neighborhood, they can work together to keep the neighborhood as safe as they can.

"Anytime there's a problem, I'm going to call the police," she said. "Anytime there's a disturbance, I'm going to call the police."

She encouraged her neighbors to do the same.

Neighbor Katherine Forman

said it's time the neighborhood banded together to keep the area safe.

"It will bring all of our neighbors in. We'll share what we're thinking and what we're concerned about and keep an eye out for each other," she said.

Forman said drug deals occur on their street. People litter. People speed. There's vandalism. One neighbor, she said, had their mailbox glued shut and their windshield wipers glued to their car's windshield.

Kitchen said kids often walk through their yards as a means to get somewhere else.

One side of Parkway Drive is in the city limits; the other side is the county's jurisdiction. When residents call 911 to report problems, the wrong police department often responds. When that happens, the incorrectly responding department has to call the correct department to handle the call, Forman said.

Monongalia County Emergency Management Coordinator Ryan Thorne said he explained that 911 callers on that street need to be specific. If they are calling from the city side and give their city address, but the problem they are calling about is on the county side, they should specify.

Thorne said he was glad to clear that issue up.

"That's what our office is here for," Thorne said.

Monongalia County Sheriff's Department Chief Deputy Al Kisner also encouraged residents to call with concerns.

"If it seems suspicious, don't think you are annoying anybody by calling and saying something strange is going on," he said.

Kisner said the Parkway Drive neighbors expressed concerns about suspicious cars in their neighborhood. Some even reported cars pulling in their driveway and just sitting there, he said.

Kisner told them not to confront the driver, and instead asked them to call police.

He said the residents also worried about drugs in their neighborhood and the strange cars that frequently visit the neighborhood.

One neighbor, who didn't want to be identified, said her family was startled from their sleep one night by someone fighting loudly across the street. She didn't like it.

"I almost think I need to move but there are problems in every neighborhood," the woman said. "I decided let's stay here and fight it."

She hopes that's what neighborhood watch will do and said she's happy Kitchen organized it.

"I'm so glad she took the lead. That's what we needed," she said.

Kitchen said another meeting will be organized soon. They are also thinking about holding a neighborhood block party in October.

She'll contact neighbors with the information they left at the meeting. She also will likely go door-to-door.

## Couple enjoys wine making with friends

WINFIELD — When Ruel and Deborah Armentrout have a few friends over for a glass of wine, there's nothing small about it.

Throughout the next few weeks, they will produce more than 4,400 bottles of wine. That's 960 gallons of grape juice. And the Winfield couple, along with dozens of their closest friends, will enjoy every minute of the process that takes about a year from juice ordering to bottling.

The Armentrouts' first foray into winemaking was 10 years ago, when another couple asked them to join in their hobby.

"Danny and Linda Raines asked us to make wine with them," Deborah said. "Linda's grandfather and dad made wine. We made around 10 cases each that first year."

Now the group has expanded, with Deborah organizing and Ruel as the master winemaker. The friends — this year Deborah ordered juice for 32 couples or individuals — make a wide variety of wines, including beaujolais, cabernet sauvignon, chardonnay, chianti, ries-

ling, merlot, pinot grigio, zinfandel, sangiovese and more.

"Everyone decides what type of wine they want to make and we order the juice from California," Deborah said. "It comes in October in 50-gallon containers or 5-gallon buckets. It depends on what we order."

The wine is then placed into glass jugs called carboys or into large metal vats. Various friends own the carboys (which cost about \$50 each) and the vats (which run up to \$800), which reside in an expanding space behind the Armentrouts' home.

"Poor Ruel keeps losing more of his garage as we make our wine-making space bigger," Deborah said.

The wine room has racks of bottles covering a large wall, all varieties from past years. Wine glasses hang from racks overhead. Ruel has tacked a tight row of corks along the ceiling as faux-crown molding.

"When you put the grape juice into the carboys and vats, it starts working," Deborah continued.

Two to three weeks later, the Armentrouts "rack" the juice/wine, taking it out of the jugs and vats, cleaning the sediment out, and then putting it back into the containers. This process happens again around January or February, and it helps to condition the wine, improving the taste.

Deborah said in the early stages of fermentation, as the grapes begin to bubble, the noise in the steel vats "is like a freight train."

The Armentrouts learned a chemistry lesson the first time they went into their winemaking room after they had filled the carboys and vats with the grape juice.

"I built this place pretty tight, to keep the temperature constant," Ruel explained. "When we came in here, that juice had started to work, and we couldn't catch our breath." The fermentation process had used the oxygen in the room, and the Armentrouts quickly learned to open the door of the room to allow fresh air in before entering.

The bottling process happens over several weeks in August and September.

### House explosion kills 2 in

**Chicago suburb**  
FRANKFORT, Ill. — Authorities in northern Illinois say an explosion has destroyed a house and the bodies of the elderly couple who occupied the home have been found in the wreckage.

The mayor of the Chicago suburb of Frankfort says he knows of

no other injuries from the Saturday morning blast.

Officials say at least seven other homes in the neighborhood were damaged or destroyed.

Mayor Jim Holland says the dead couple were longtime residents of Frankfort, a town about 25 miles southwest of Chicago.

Investigators did not immediately say if they suspect a natural gas leak in the explosion, but representatives of the gas distribution company Nicor are at the scene.

### Police: Bomb scare on train in NJ was hoax

**NORTH BERGEN, N.J.** — Authorities in New Jersey say a bomb scare involving a package on a freight train appears to have been a hoax.

Police in the town of North Bergen say dozens of officers searched through more than 1,000 packages taken from the freight train and finally found one package with an electronic device — but no bomb.

Police Chief Bill Gavin said the search was sparked by a tip from CSX Transportation that a package on the train from Florida contained a pipe bomb.

CSX says it stopped the train in North Bergen on Friday and uncoupled four cars there to be searched.

The police chief said the woman who shipped the package is in custody in Florida and federal authorities are investigating.

### US Airways to cut Pittsburgh-Fla. flights in '09

**PITTSBURGH** — US Airways will be cutting direct flights between Pittsburgh and three Florida cities beginning in January.

US Airways is the busiest carrier at Pittsburgh International Airport. But the latest cuts mean it will only have 54 daily flights leaving from the airport. Barely eight years ago, there were more than 500.

US Airways spokesman Morgan Durrant said the cuts are part of a plan to cut capacity to offset high fuel prices. US Airways will cut domestic seating by 5 percent this year and up to 10 percent in 2009.

Other carriers, including Southwest Airlines and AirTran Airways, also offer direct flights from Pittsburgh to Florida. AirTran has plans to increase its daily flights from Pittsburgh to Orlando in October.

### 4th Pa. teen charged in killing of immigrant

**POTTSVILLE, Pa.** — Authorities in Pennsylvania say a fourth teenager has been charged in the fatal beating of a Mexican immigrant.

Schuylkill County prosecutors charged the teen in juvenile court Friday with aggravated assault, ethnic intimidation and other offenses. His name and age are not being released.

Three others are charged as adults in the July attack in the town of Shenandoah on 25-year-old factory worker Luis Ramirez.

Homicide charges are filed against 16-year-old Brandon Piekarsky and 17-year-old Colin Walsh. Eighteen-year-old Derrick Donchak faces aggravated assault and other charges.

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# Yellowstone RV park full despite fuel costs

YELLOWSTONE NATIONAL PARK, Wyo. — In the heart of the park here on a recent warm day, all 358 spaces at the Fishing Bridge Recreational Vehicle Park were jammed with RVs and camping equipment.

Despite high fuel prices and a sputtering economy that have hurt RV sales and caused many people to put the brakes on vacation plans, plenty of the lumbering, gas-guzzling rigs have taken to the road this summer.

"If you want to stay out here and do this, you just suck it up and go," said Leyman Williams, lounging on a folding chair outside his 39-foot RV at Fishing Bridge.

The Williams live year-round in their motor home, which has all the comforts of a traditional home — running water, refrigerator, kitchen, private bathroom and bed space for up to six people.

But the huge vehicle gets only about 10.5 miles to the gallon. With diesel prices above \$4 a gallon much of the summer, filling the 90-gallon tank means shelling out around \$400.

"I learned to drive a little slower," William said, noting the RV gets better highway mileage at around 60 mph.

More than 1.1 million RVs visited National Park Service campgrounds through the first seven months of this year, according to preliminary figures.

The numbers are down about 6 percent from the same period last year, said Park Service spokesman Jeffrey Olson. But July and August are the busiest months for RV camping in national parks and many campers are out during the fall, he said.

RV and campground trade associations say 2008 appears to be just as busy as previous years, though with some variations that could be

attributed to fuel prices.

A survey earlier this year by the Virginia-based Recreation Vehicle Industry Association found that high fuel prices weren't stopping RV travelers, but in some cases were prompting shorter trips, said Kevin Broom, spokesman for the 550-member association.

Perhaps more importantly, the association expects a 14-percent decline in this year's RV sales. That

comes on top of a 9.5-percent drop last year.

Broom said the same economic forces plaguing the housing market affect RV sales. Manufacturers have responded with new designs over the last several years to emphasize fuel efficiency. The large, luxurious RVs get as few as 6 miles to the gallon, while the smaller ones can get up to 18, he said.

While fewer people are buying RVs, more are renting them, Broom said. On average, RV rentals cost about \$1,500 a week, he said.

Even with the higher fuel prices, Broom maintains RVs are still an economical way to vacation because RV users save money on the motel and restaurant bills that are part of traveling by airline or car.

"The savings overwhelm any fuel cost increases, especially when you can adjust by instead of, say, taking a 1,000-mile trip, you take a 100-mile trip," Broom said.

Some RV enthusiasts compromise on their vacations by parking their RVs for the summer at a close-to-home campground and staying there on weekends, said Linda Profaizer, president of the National Association of RV Parks and Campgrounds.

# Iraq may buy Lockheed Martin F-16s to strengthen air force

WASHINGTON — The Iraqi government is considering a multi-million-dollar purchase of Lockheed Martin F-16s as it moves toward strengthening its military and rebuilding its anemic air force to prepare for an eventual withdrawal of U.S. forces.

Air Force Lt. Col. Patrick Ryder, a Pentagon spokesman, said Friday that the Iraqi government has asked the Defense Department to supply information on the pricing and availability of 36 F-16s "to enhance Iraqi security forces' future defense capabilities."

The sale would require approval by the Pentagon, Congress and the State Department and could face resistance from lawmakers concerned about turning over sophisticated U.S. military technology to the Iraqi government.

Ryder said the Pentagon received the request Aug. 27. He cautioned that foreign governments sometimes require preliminary information on pricing and availability for planning purposes and don't always follow through with a purchase.

A U.S.-Iraqi deal would be a boost to Lockheed Martin's Fort Worth, Texas, plant, which has built thousands of F-16 Fighting Falcons since the first one flew in 1976.

Twenty-five nations including the United States have bought more than 4,400 models of the multi role fighter. Of the 14,000 workers at the Fort Worth plant, about 2,600 are assigned to F-16 production.

The single-engine warplane, which sells for about \$50 million, is a highly maneuverable fighter that would enable Iraq to provide air support for its still-emerging ground forces.

Rep. Kay Granger, R-Fort Worth, whose congressional district includes the Lockheed Martin plant, said the request signals the Iraqi government's intent to take responsibility for its own security to hasten the timetable for phasing out the U.S. military presence.

"We keep saying that the Iraqis have to take care of their own security," Granger said. "If the request is approved, then it would help move them toward providing their own security."

This past summer, the professor received an appointment at WVU that will make his global mission even more so. He was named interim director of the Office of International Programs. He will oversee the office's study abroad efforts and other outreach around the world.

He replaces Daniel Weiner, who left this summer to accept a similar post at Ohio University. A national search will be opened later for a permanent director.

Lastinger's appointment, as he said, will hardly seem foreign to a scholar who is well at home in foreign locales.

"This is really just a broader effort of what I've been doing all along at WVU," Lastinger said. "The idea is to get our students out there, beyond classroom walls and past borders. We're taking that line about how 'travel broadens the mind' literally — because it does."

Lastinger, in fact, just returned to Morgantown this past weekend from Mexico, where he met with faculty and administrators at the University of Guanajuato, which has long partnered with WVU in international exchange efforts.

"It was a fantastic experience," he said. "Our two schools have been friends for a long time. Mexico is a beautiful country with caring, gracious people. I was nothing but impressed by the students and faculty of Guanajuato."

From Australia to Zimbabwe, WVU's Office of International Programs helps manage nearly 80 partnerships, including Guanajuato, with other schools across the globe. The office also participates in 33 other international exchange programs for students and faculty.

Like stamps on a passport, Lastinger wants to add to that. And WVU — like any good traveler, he said — is already packed and more than ready to embark.

"We're a global university, and that's all there is to it," he said. "I want us to foster the great exchange programs we already have while making new friends. Five years from now, I want us to be the leader in a higher education system that surpasses boundaries and borders in our international mission. We can do it because we're getting there now."

Interim Provost E. Jane Martin said Lastinger's enthusiasm as an educator makes him a hit anywhere — from Morgantown to Morocco.

"I can't think of a better person to head such an important office," Martin said. "Mike Lastinger is a true Mountaineer ambassador, and he knows that our students who go forth in the world to do good work are too."

Lastinger has taught more than 15 courses in French language, literature and humanities in the Eberly College of Arts and Sciences since setting foot on campus in 1989. He specializes in 19th century literature and culture, and is an authority on French thinkers and writers Arthur Rimbaud, Honore de Balzac and Emile Zola.

# New year, new professors

## Selgin, Sooter among recent faculty additions at WVU

According to Fred King, assistant dean of research for WVU's Eberly College of Arts and Sciences, the school hired 22 new tenure professors last year — a common change. He said WVU is always looking for new teaching talent.

George Selgin, a recent hire in the College of Business and Economics, said it's a good policy for any university.

"When the university is bringing in new faces constantly, that means that they are trying to stay on the cutting edge of education," he said. "When the university grabs one good professor, others will hear about it and follow."

Selgin started teaching in 1985 at George Mason University. After a brief stay there he went to Hong Kong to teach for a year.

After returning to the United States, Selgin went to teach economics at the University of Georgia.

"I was at the University of Georgia for almost 16 years," Selgin said. "Whenever you're at a place for that long you make good friends and get comfortable, I had to be given a special opportunity to leave there."

He found out about WVU when he went to a convention with local faculty and graduate students.

"I really liked what everyone had to say about the future of WVU and the opportunities that existed here. I was invited to give a seminar here and it went very well, so I was naturally interested in maybe coming here to teach."

Letha Sooter, another new hire, came to WVU this semester to work on nano-biotechnology. She came to WVU from a U.S. Army research laboratory.

"I really liked the idea of having a collaborative teaching environment where the chemistry and biology departments work together," she said. "I decided to come to WVU because I believe that this school provides professors with unique opportunities that are rare within universities this size."

Sooter is doing strictly research this fall, but in the spring she will be teaching upper-level biology and chemistry classes.

"I am currently doing

research in the biology department without any graduate students as of yet, so am excited to get into the classroom and start interacting with the students," she said.

King said adding Sooter to the staff was excellent for the

university.

"Professor Sooter, as any new hire does, brings new expertise to a strong program in the biological sciences," King said. "I expect that over time she will develop a very strong research program at the inter-

face of biological sciences, chemical sciences and engineering that will lead to advances in each of those fields and give our undergraduate and graduate students the best possible training for their future careers. She will also be another outstanding

role model for aspiring female scientists at WVU."

Selgin is in the classroom already, and is currently teaching a writing class on The Great Depression. In the spring, he will be teaching another class on the moral foundations of capitalism.

"I feel that there are two kinds of classes that I teach. One in which I feel that I am an expert on the subject and it is one that I have worked with recently, and others which I have not familiarized myself with in awhile," Selgin said. "When I deal with a subject that I feel very comfortable with, I will approach it as a lecture. Then when I embark on teaching something that I need to catch up on a little I will have a seminar approach so that the students and I will learn together."

No matter what type of situation he's put in, Selgin said he likes to make the students feel comfortable and excited to learn.

"When the students are interested it is much easier for me to teach and for them to excel," he said. "Higher education has a competitive, business-like atmosphere to it, and WVU is trying to compete at a high level educationally," Selgin said. "The business department is trying to teach real life tools to these kids so they can go out and compete in the job market, instead of teaching abstract economic concepts."

Some of Selgin's students also had positive things to say about what they have already seen from him in the classroom.

"He has his own unique style about him," said Chris Williams, a senior economics major. "I like how he makes class interesting. Professor Selgin goes out of his way to make the material fit his style and so far it has worked well. Everyone seems to be interested."

Vanessa Logan, also a senior economics major, agrees with Williams. "He is able to form the subject to his knowledge well," Logan said. "He is very knowledgeable about the subject he is teaching and was a great hire for the university."

"I hope to stay put for awhile," Selgin said. "I love the entire atmosphere that I have seen so far here in West Virginia."

# Asselin shatters record

Gold-Blue meet opens cross country season

No wonder Sean Cleary was smiling Saturday morning, at the WVU agronomy farm.

The WVU cross country coach watched as one of his star runners, Marie-Louise Asselin, finished her first 2 1/2-mile run looking as if she had barely broken a sweat.

And this was on a hilly course Cleary touts as "the toughest course in the country."

Not one bit of huffing or puffing could be detected from WVU's junior All-American.

Sure enough, Asselin shattered the course record — 15:19 — by 55 seconds, completing her run in 14:24 during the Mountaineers' intrasquad Gold-Blue race.

Sophomore Kaylyn Christopher also broke the course record she established with fellow sophomore Kate Harrison a year ago. Christopher finished in 15:17.

Redshirt freshman Ahna Lewis, a Morgantown High graduate, joined the record-breaking group with a time of 15:07 on her second run. Harrison finished in 15:25.

The runners paired up with a partner, with each runner running the course twice.

"I ran this course my freshman year," Asselin said. "It's nice to come back and run it again. It's really hilly, but it's a nice course. It is one of the toughest courses we run."

For Cleary, the most encouraging aspect of Asselin's performance is this: She's really just beginning to increase the intensity of her training.

"That's her first really hard effort since the [indoor track] NCAAs in March," Cleary said.

Asselin became WVU's third cross country All-American this past fall, finishing 14th at the NCAA championships. She earned All-America honors at the indoor track championships as well, placing seventh in the 3,000-meter run.

Asselin wanted to go for the All-America hat trick in the outdoor season. However, her body would not cooperate, leading Cleary to red-shirt her. She spent the summer back home in Sarnia, Ontario.

"I really needed the rest last year," she said. "I was really tired and was having stomach problems. I really needed to go home and get things back on track and rest and be with my family."

"When I came back here this fall, I was ready to run, ready to come back and perform. I felt ready and rested enough that I would be good to go and run all year long."

Asselin has been running 80 miles a week and will progressively increase the intensity of her workouts. The plan is for Asselin, along with fellow junior stars Keri Bland and Clara Grandt, to begin competing Oct. 3, when WVU travels to Bethlehem, Pa., for the Paul Short Invitational.

"I'm going to give it a few more weeks," Cleary said. "Today, they gave a race effort. Next week, those girls will go see the course in Princeton" — at the Princeton Invitational, where the NCAA regionals are held. — "We'll still run a good team there. Our team looks fit. We're in good shape right now. We might even be a little ahead of where I thought we would be."

ROCK HILL, S.C. — WVU went 1-1, defeating North Carolina Central and losing to Morehead State, at the Hilton Garden Inn Classic.

The Mountaineers (2-4) beat N.C. Central (0-7), 3-1. The scores were 25-17, 25-16, 20-25 and 25-12. Redshirt sophomore setter Nicole Jones posted a double-double, with 34 assists and 11 digs.

Freshman outside hitter Kylie Armbruster tallied 12 kills, 13 digs and three service aces. Junior outside hitter Kristina Gallahan led the team with 12 kills.

Morehead State (6-1) defeated the Mountaineers, 3-1 (20-25, 25-16, 26-24, 25-15).

Jones posted her second double-double of the season, with 29 assists and 10 digs. Gallahan led in kills with 11, while sophomore libero Bonnie West recorded 23 digs.

WVU opens its home season Friday, when state-rival Marshall visits the Coliseum for a 7 p.m. match.

# Michigan wins for Rod, limps past Miami

Minor's late score puts the stubborn Red Hawks away

ANN ARBOR, Mich. — Michigan's first win for new coach Rich Rodriguez was far from easy. Brandon Minor's 15-yard touch-

down run with 8:12 to go finally put away Miami of Ohio, helping the Wolverines to a lackluster 16-6 win Saturday.

A week after losing at home, to Utah, in Rodriguez's greatly anticipated debut, Michigan (1-1) started strong, with 10 points on its first two possessions. Then the Wolverines struggled until the drive that ended with Minor's clinching score.

The RedHawks (0-2) trailed by

four points entering the final quarter, giving themselves a shot to end the Mid-American Conference's 0-23 skid against college football's winningest program.

Rodriguez will not be able to enjoy his first win at Michigan long — a visit to Notre Dame is up next.

Rodriguez also might not be closer to finding a No. 1 quarterback. Steven Threet started for the first time, but was just 6-of-13 for 63

yards in a rotation with Nick Sheridan, who completed 4 of 5 passes for 40 yards.

Michigan ran the ball better than it did in the previous week's loss. Sam McGuffie gained 74 of the team's 178 yards, and the freshman had a 27-yard reception to set up Minor's TD.

Miami's Daniel Raudabaugh was 20-of-33 for 191 yards with a fumble before being knocked out in the

fourth quarter, getting sandwiched by the Wolverines on a running play.

Nathan Parseghian — a great-grandnephew of famed Notre Dame coach Ara Parseghian — kicked a field goal in both the second and third quarters to pull the RedHawks to 10-6.

The game was not a sellout and drew 106,724 fans, the smallest crowd at Michigan Stadium since it was expanded in 1998.

## L.A. takes over N.L. West lead

LOS ANGELES — The Arizona Diamondbacks gave Manny Ramirez three chances to hurt them Saturday. He came through twice, and that was enough for the streaking Los Angeles Dodgers.

Ramirez hit a three-run homer in the fifth inning to break a scoreless tie and added a two-run double in the sixth, helping the Dodgers beat Brandon Webb and the Diamondbacks, 7-2, to take over sole possession of first place in the N.L. West for the first time since April 4.

Chad Billingsley (14-10) took a shutout into the seventh for Los Angeles. By winning their seventh straight after an eight-game skid,

the Dodgers moved a half-game ahead of Arizona entering today's finale of their three-game series — the last regular-season game between the teams this season.

Webb (19-7), who issued a career-high six walks while failing in his third attempt to reach 20 wins for the first time, fanned Ramirez on three pitches with the bases loaded and two outs in the third.

But after Webb walked Andre Ethier again to bring up Ramirez in a clutch situation for the second time, he hit the right-hander's first pitch into the right-field pavilion to give the Dodgers all the offense they would need.

Ramirez has 521 homers, good for a tie with Ted Williams, Willie McCovey and Frank Thomas for 17th place on the career list, and 1,706 RBIs, putting him 20th.

Ramirez has 11 homers and 34 RBIs in 34 games for the Dodgers since being acquired from Boston on July 31.

### American League Blue Jays 7, Rays 4

TORONTO — Gregg Zaun hit a game-ending grand slam in the 13th inning and Toronto beat Tampa Bay to extend its season-high winning streak to seven.

Lyle Overbay added two solo homers for Toronto, which matched its longest winning streak since Sept. 22-29, 2002.

The East-leading Rays, who entered with a 2 1/2-game advantage on Boston, have lost four of five.

### Tigers 6, Twins 4

MINNEAPOLIS — Curtis Granderson and Magglio Ordonez each a hit two-run homer in the eighth inning and Detroit battered Minnesota's struggling bullpen.

As the losses piled up and titles escaped him, Roger Federer insisted he felt fine, he wasn't

washed up and his game would come around. Oh, did Federer look good against Novak Djokovic in the U.S. Open semifinals.

Buoyed by a stellar start and a fantastic finish in a rematch of the 2007 final, Federer beat Djokovic, 6-3, 5-7, 7-5, 6-2, Saturday, in New York to move one victory from a fifth consecutive U.S. Open championship and 13th Grand Slam title overall. He wasn't going to know until today at the earliest who would be his next opponent. Tropical Storm Hanna hit the New York area in the afternoon, dumping enough rain to force the suspension of the semifinal between No. 1 Rafael Nadal and No. 6 Andy Murray in the third set, with Murray ahead 6-2, 7-6 (5), 2-3. They'll resume play at 4 p.m. today. The weather also forced the postponement of the women's championship match, between Serena Williams and Jelena Jankovic, originally scheduled for Saturday night. Instead they will play at 9 p.m. today. The men's championship match was moved to 5 p.m. Monday.

### Golf

Camilo Villegas overcame a four-putt double bogey and birdied his final hole for a 4-under

66 that gave him a one-shot lead on Jim Furyk after the second round of a marathon day at the BMW

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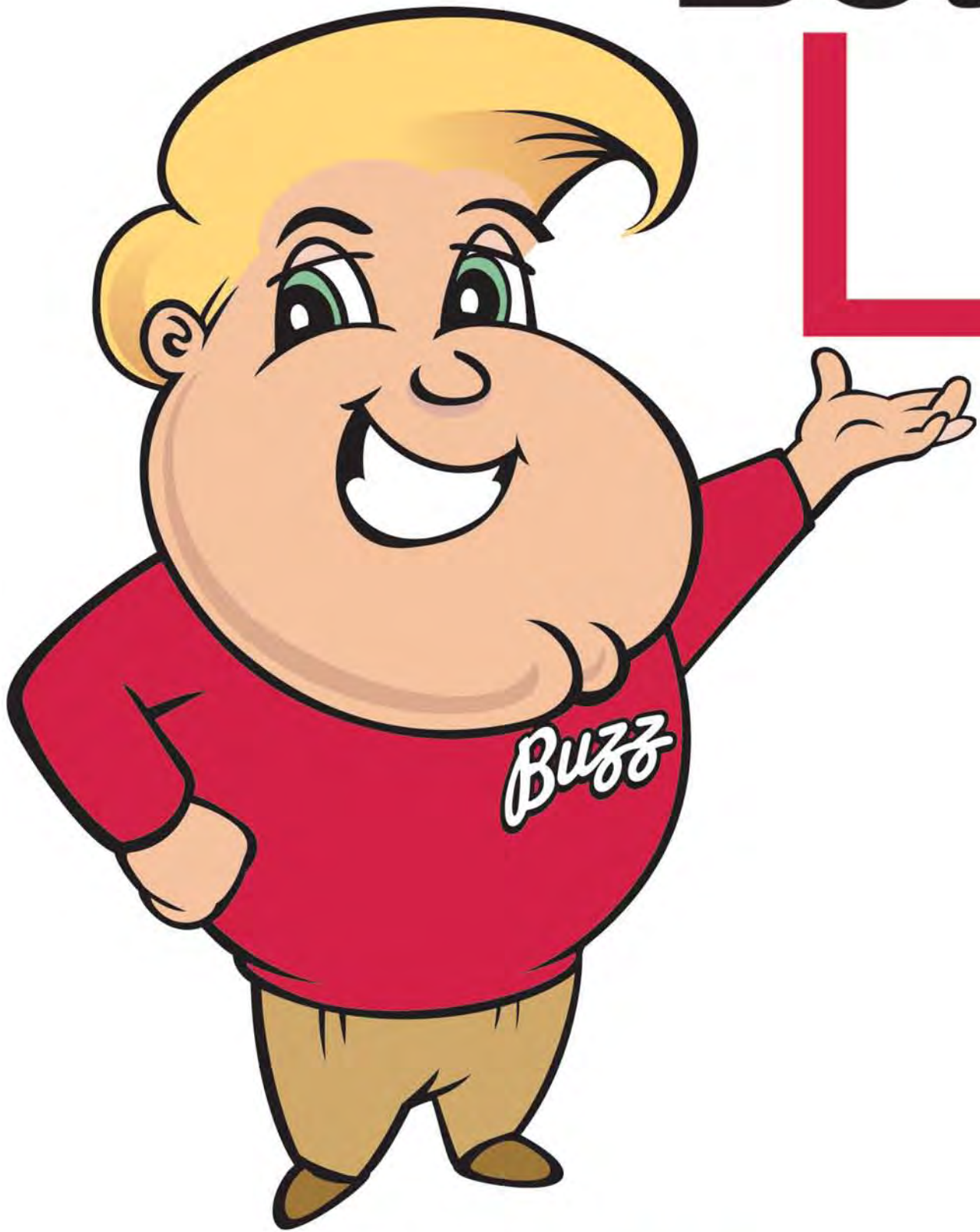
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# UConn escapes Temple

PHILADELPHIA — Donald Brown rushed for a career-high 214 yards on a rain-soaked field and scored the winning touchdown in overtime to lead Connecticut to a 12-9 victory against Temple on Saturday.

Brown held on tight all game to a slick ball and finally burst through into the end zone on a 7-yard run on UConn's first possession in overtime. He helped the Huskies (2-0) overcome sloppy play and missed field-goal attempts that had them trailing 6-0 entering the fourth quarter.

Jake Brownell kicked three field goals for the Owls. Temple (1-1) was denied its first 2-0 start since 1981.

The two teams did almost nothing but run on every play, especially in the second half, when heavy rain all but kept the ball out of the air.

Brown did more than enough to bail out the Huskies — and they needed the help.

Temple coach Al Golden put too much faith in his developing Owls and they went for it on fourth-and-1 at their own 35 and the score tied late in the fourth. Lamar McPherson's rush came up short, and suddenly the Huskies had yet another opportunity to take the lead.

Tony Ciaravino — who missed two field-goal tries in the first half — this time missed a 47-yard attempt with 2:33 left in the game. Ciaravino did kick a 37-yarder earlier in the fourth made the score 6-6.

### (4) Oklahoma 52, Cincy 26

NORMAN, Okla. — Sam Bradford overcame two interceptions and threw for a career-best 395 yards and five touchdowns and Oklahoma (2-0) overpowered Cincinnati (1-1).

Freshman Ryan Broyles had a breakout game with 141 receiving yards, Jermaine Gresham caught two touchdown passes and the Sooners extended the nation's longest home winning streak to 20 games.

### Louisville 51 Tennessee Tech 10

LOUISVILLE, Ky. — Hunter Cantwell threw for 203 yards and two touchdowns and Victor Anderson ran for 114 yards and a score as Louisville routed Tennessee Tech.

Brock Bolen added two touchdowns on the ground and Louisville's defense continued its dominant play as the Cardinals bounced back following a season-opening loss to Kentucky.

Louisville (1-1) rolled up 451 yards of offense and added touchdowns on defense and special teams. The Cardinals had 202 yards in the first quarter alone — just three fewer than they managed in the loss to Kentucky — and manhandled the over-matched Golden Eagles (1-1).

### Akron 42, Syracuse 28

SYRACUSE, N.Y. — Chris Jacquemain threw three touchdown passes, including a 12-yarder to Andre Jones midway through the fourth quarter to break a tie, and Akron (1-1) held off struggling Syracuse (2-0).

# Give ECU credit, WVU players insist

GREENVILLE, N.C. — The WVU football team failed to have a 100-yard rusher or a 100-yard passer. East Carolina had the ball 11 minutes longer and converted eight of 16 third downs, while the Mountaineers moved the chains just three of 12 times in the same situation.

It all led to the Pirates' 24-3 win against WVU, their third straight defeat of a top 25 team. ECU beat then-No. 17 Virginia Tech this past week and Boise State in the Hawaii Bowl, this past season.

This Mountaineers' offense had been slowed in two of the past three years against this ECU defense, and the WVU players maintain that East Carolina didn't catch them off guard.

"The coaches called plays for us to win, and we didn't do it," WVU senior offensive lineman Ryan Stanchek said. "It was all the players. I can't stress that enough. We played terrible. You've got to give East Carolina credit."

While the WVU defense had trouble keeping the Pirates off the field, ECU kept the Mountaineers from threatening. WVU drove into the red zone only once on the afternoon, ending with Pat McAfee's field goal.

White finished with 97 yards rushing and 72 yards passing. ECU quarterback Patrick

Pinkney completed 22 of 28 passes for 236 yards and a touchdown.

"They did a great job up front. I think we were just a block away, a block here and there from breaking the big play," WVU center Mike Dent said. "They are a senior defensive front. They did a good job executing."

The WVU offensive line admits it let ECU get into the backfield too often, which kept White on the run as he tried to complete passes.

"It was just very uncharacteristic of West Virginia football,"

WVU coach Bill Stewart said. "I hated that we just couldn't get into the flow of the game."

### One big deficit

Not only did ECU snap a seven-game losing streak and beat the Mountaineers in Greenville for the first time since 1995, but the Pirates also did so by convincingly.

East Carolina, which was No. 27 in the AP poll before the game, was the first opponent to defeat the Mountaineers by 21 or more points since Maryland won, 41-7,

in the 2004 Gator Bowl.

WVU trailed by 14 points at halftime for the first time since 2005, when Louisville led 17-0 at Mountaineer Field, before the Mountaineers staged a 46-44 come-from-behind victory.

South Florida led WVU 21-3 early in the third quarter in 2007.

It was the first time since 2001, a 45-3 loss to Miami, that the Mountaineers, now 5-2 in games in Greenville, failed to score a touchdown in a game.

### Three new starters on defense

WVU senior middle linebacker Reed Williams did not dress for Saturday's game, but instead sported a team polo shirt, just as he did the previous weekend. Senior Mortty Ivy, who started at strong side linebacker, moved over in the middle, and John Holmes started his first game since 2006 on the outside with J.T. Thomas.

Sophomore Pat Lazear started against Villanova, but moved to the second string. Defensive lineman Pat Liebig and Sidney Glover also started against the Pirates, in places of first-game starters Zac Cooper and Boogie Allen.

For the second straight weekend, freshman running back Terence Kerns did not dress for the game.

### Hanna gone by kickoff

On his way out of bounds, White reached up with his left hand, straining for the first down. The ball popped out.

On television replays, White's right hand appeared to have touched the ground outside the sidelines before the ball left his left hand, but officials ruled the play a fumble and it resulted in a turnover.

"I reached out for the first down, I thought I was down, but I guess I was not," White said. "We all know what the ruling was on that. Can't argue."

From where he was standing on the opposite sideline, Stewart didn't get the best look at the play. Still, he was moved to call a timeout to challenge the ruling, but stopped.

"Seven officials and a TV camera figured it out," Stewart said. "They don't need my input. I started to call a timeout and was told it was already looked at."

"They said it was checked."

Even from the press box, where he was calling the game, offensive coordinator Jeff Mullen said he didn't get a good view of what turned out to be the play that swung the momentum in the Pirates' favor for the rest of the game.

"I couldn't tell," Mullen said. "It was on the ECU sideline and there were too many people around."

As Stewart admitted, that was "the big, big turning point."

Thereafter, the Pirates drove downfield and ate up the clock, while the Mountaineers found themselves living a nightmare of missed tackles and missed opportunities.

Both teams exchanged field goals on the next two possessions. Then, the Pirates capitalized on a fumble by the Mountaineers' Jock Sanders to put up one more score before halftime.

ECU quarterback Patrick Pinkney picked apart the WVU defense with

long passes of 15 and 22 yards. On second-and-10 from the Mountaineers 13-yard line, Pinkney hit wide receiver Alex Taylor in the corner of the end zone to give the Pirates a 17-3 lead at the half.

In the third quarter, it seemed as if everything went wrong for the Mountaineers, while the ECU offense played as if it could do no wrong.

WVU's offense got the ball first but was unable to capitalize on the opportunity — ECU's C.J. Wilson hunted down White in the WVU backfield on third-and-9, and sacked him for a loss of 4 yards, forcing the Mountaineers to punt.

On the other side of the field, the Pirates' receivers had found a rhythm.

Pinkney hit T.J. Lee for a 26-yard pickup.

Then his receiver bailed him out on the next play, dropping to his knees to catch an underthrown ball and turning a potential incompleteness into a 13-yard gain.

Pinkney marched his squad downfield on a 12-play, 86-yard drive that culminated in Williams' 1-yard touchdown run that put the game away for good.

For the second week in a row, the Pirates — who finished with 386

yards of offense to WVU's 251 — toppled a ranked opponent.

They beat then-17th-ranked Virginia Tech the previous weekend, 27-22.

This weekend, they upended the No. 8 team in the country at home, in front of the largest crowd ever seen at Dowdy-Ficklen stadium throughout head coach Skip Holtz's tenure.

Even after the students stormed the field to mob their team, and the scoreboard still read ECU 24, WVU 3, Holtz still could not verbalize his emotions.

"I don't think you can put it into

to keep the 4:30 p.m. kickoff. While heavy rain and strong winds came through the area late Friday and early Saturday, the sun had peeked out by game time. The two teams thought rain could be in the forecast, but none fell and the field appeared to be in decent shape, as the wind continued to fade as the game wore on.

### Magic uniforms no more

Since 2001, the Mountaineers had been unbeatable (9-0) while wearing the road uniform combination of white jerseys and blue pants. That win streak was snapped Saturday, in Greenville. The ninth and last win with that combo came in WVU's 2008 Fiesta Bowl victory, 48-28, against Oklahoma.

### Polar opposite starts

WVU has started its first two games with vastly different play calling. Against Villanova, the Mountaineers threw the ball on six of their first seven plays. Against East Carolina, WVU opened with nine straight runs — all of its offensive plays in the first quarter.

Trailing 10-0, White connected with Jock Sanders for a 6-yard gain, WVU's first pass of the afternoon. White rushed for 36 yards and Noel Devine 12 in the first quarter, while Pinkney was 6-of-6 passing for 62 yards in the first quarter.

White had seven pass attempts in the entire first half, completing four for 25 yards.

# Cincy QB Grutza out one month with broken leg

NORMAN, Okla. — Cincinnati quarterback Dustin Grutza broke his right leg on a fourth-quarter play Saturday in which three Oklahoma players sacked him and then piled on top of him. He is expected to miss about a month.

Bearcats coach Brian Kelly said a decision would be made Monday on whether Grutza should have surgery on his broken fibula, and he could be out four to five weeks.

Grutza briefly avoided a pass rush by defensive end Jeremy Beal before getting dragged down by linebacker Travis Lewis. Defensive tackle Cory Bennett then landed on top of the pile, and offensive lineman Trevor Canfield was called for a personal foul for knocking Bennett off him following the play.

Oklahoma linebacker Ryan Reynolds was also flagged for unsportsmanlike conduct on the play.

"Hopefully, I can be back in three or four weeks and recover quickly," Grutza said. "We have a great medical staff that can help me do that."

Grutza had thrown for 218 yards on 19-for-29 passing with one touchdown and one interception. He also had a 1-yard touchdown run on a goal-line sneak.

Grutza moved back into the starting lineup this season after the NCAA denied Ben Mauk's appeals for another season of eligibility. Mauk is still trying to fight in court for the chance to play again.

Kelly said Tony Pike, who replaced Grutza, would start in his place.

before halftime.

But after the game, just as has been the case since he took over this job, Stewart didn't appear down and out.

At all.

"I am not going to get in there and rip anybody," Stewart said. "I am disappointed for them. I am not going to scream. I am not going to call them dirty, filthy, vulgar names. I'm not doing that. If that's what people want, then they got to get me somewhere else because it ain't happening. I am going to build this football program the best way we know how, and that's with class and with character."

Somehow and some way, ECU put WVU in the worst kind of funk during the game. The way Stewart described the game, ECU was "free-wheeling," and having fun. Stewart said the Mountaineers found out what happens when the momentum swings totally against you.

The funk wasn't lingering, accord-

ing to safety Quinton Andrews.

"Due to what everyone said in the locker room, we will be able to bounce back," he said. "We are a team that looks adversity in the face."

It's a new staff, however, with different coaching tactics, new types of teaching and ways of reacting after losses. This was a bad one, but the players seemed disappointed, not depressed. Frustrated, but confident this wasn't the tell-all of this squad.

"I think it was probably something that was needed. I can't give you any reason why I say it was needed, but it's all about life and sometimes you get knocked down," said WVU receiver Tito Gonzales, who had two catches for 17 yards. "The most important thing in life is when you get knocked down, you don't stay down, but you get up and dust yourself off and keep on the road of life."

"I think that's what this team has to do tonight. I think it's going to be very hard to recover, but when we watch the film tomorrow, we just need to put it behind us and get focused. This is a long journey."

WVU had at least eight missed tackles Saturday.

"We didn't tackle well at all," Casteel said. "It's a game about being able to tackle and put them on the ground, and when you're struggling to do that, you're going to have situations like this."

WVU allowed 243 yards through the air, and 143 yards on the ground. Pinkney were 23-of-29, and averaged 10.6 yards per completion.

Thomas led the Mountaineers' defense with 10 total tackles and one tackle for a loss of 8 yards, while fellow linebacker Mortty Ivy had nine tackles, including 1.5 for a loss of 2 yards.

"We knew coming into this game that they'd be a tough team to get on the ground," Thomas said. "We just have to do a better job of taking them down."

"We gave it our best effort. ECU was the better team today. They didn't surprise us, we just didn't execute as well as should have."

## Ohio U. drives Buckeyes nuts

### Ohio State can't clinch until late punt-return TD

COLUMBUS, Ohio — Beanie Wells didn't play. The Ohio Bobcats sure did.

Lightly regarded, even in the Mid-American Conference, Ohio put a scare into No. 3 Ohio State before the Buckeyes righted things in the fourth quarter and went on to win, 26-14, Saturday.

With star tailback Chris Wells sidelined by a foot injury, the Buckeyes (2-0) struggled to move the ball until Brandon Saine's short plunge on the third play of the final quarter finally put them on top. Ray Small added some breathing room with a late 69-yard punt return.

This was not the tuneup the Buckeyes needed before traveling next week to meet No. 1 Southern California.

Ohio (0-2) had five costly turnovers — two in the fourth quarter — to help its bigger, badder neighbors escape.

Wells, mentioned as a Heisman Trophy hopeful after gaining 1,600 yards a year ago, injured his right foot a week ago, in a 43-0 rout of Youngstown State. He watched the game from the sidelines while three players got his carries.

A week after a capacity crowd sat in stunned silence when Wells was injured, this time they were silenced by Ohio's inspired play. Ohio State had not lost to an in-state foe since a 7-6 setback to Oberlin in 1921 — a string of 36 victories, most lopsided.

Ohio led 7-6 at the half, 14-6 midway through the third quarter and 14-12 heading into the fourth.

#### No. 2 Georgia 56 Central Michigan 17

ATHENS, Ga. — Knowshon Moreno rushed for 168 yards and tied a career high with three touchdowns to lead Georgia past Central Michigan (1-1).

Matthew Stafford hooked up with Mohamed Massaquoi on a pair of TD passes, and the Bulldogs (2-0) also got an unlikely score from 282-pound defensive end Demarcus Dobbs. The sophomore picked off a deflected pass and rumbled 78 yards for his first career touchdown, giving Georgia a 28-0 lead late in the first half.

#### (9) Auburn 27 Southern Miss 13

AUBURN, Ala. — Chris Todd threw for 248 yards in his first start and gave Auburn's passing game a needed lift in a win against Southern Miss.

Todd led a late scoring drive for Auburn (2-0) after Southern Miss (1-1) surged back with a pair of touchdowns against a defense that had pitched a shutout for the first 102 minutes of the season.

**(11) Wisconsin 51, Marshall 14**  
MADISON, Wis. — The Badgers had to rally from an early two-touchdown deficit to the Thundering Herd (1-1), reeling off 51 straight points to turn a potential upset into a walkover.

A loss would have snapped the second-longest home winning streak in major college football and cost the Badgers (2-0) momentum heading into a tough test at Fresno State.

But after watching Marshall shut down its highly regarded running game, Wisconsin got big plays out of new starting quarterback Allan Evridge and the defense to pull out its 16th straight win at Camp Randall Stadium.

Evridge, a transfer from Kansas State who backed up Tyler Donovan last year, was 17-for-26 for 308 yards and a touchdown after throwing only 10 passes in Wisconsin's victory against Akron the week before.

#### (15) BYU 28, Washington 27

SEATTLE — Jan Jorgensen busted through the line and blocked Ryan Perkins' 35-yard extra-point attempt with 2 seconds left in regulation, and No. 15 BYU held on to beat Washington.

Jake Locker drove the Huskies 76 yards in 17 plays, capped by his 2-yard plunge to pull Washington one behind. But Locker was called for unsportsmanlike conduct after the touchdown. Replays showed him throwing the ball in the air before jumping with his teammates in the end zone.

Perkins approached the kick slowly and hit it low, giving Jorgensen a chance to get his paws on the kick.

Max Hall led the Cougars with 339 yards passing and three touchdowns, including a 15-yarder to tight end Dennis Pitta with 3:31 left.

#### (18) Oregon 66, Utah State 24

EUGENE, Ore. — Justin Roper returned from a concussion and helped Oregon to a school-record 688 yards against Utah State.

#### (19) Penn State 45 Oregon State 14

STATE COLLEGE, Pa. — Evan Royster ran for three touchdowns and a career-high 141 yards and Penn State's defense didn't miss a beat without two suspended starters.

Quarterback Daryll Clark threw for two scores and added an 18-yard touchdown run for Penn State, which led 35-7 by halftime. Wideout Jordan Norwood had a touchdown and a career-high 118 receiving yards.

#### (20) Wake Forest 30, Miss. 28

WINSTON-SALEM, N.C. — Sam Swank kicked a 41-yard field goal with 3 seconds left to cap a dramatic final minute and give Wake Forest a win against Mississippi.

#### (24) Illinois 47 Eastern Illinois 21

CHAMPAIGN, Ill. — Juice Williams ran for a school-record 174 yards and two touchdowns to lead the Illini (1-1).

## Big-bore air guns no watered down-weapons

**YOU MAY NOT BELIEVE IT**, but they make air guns that are powerful enough to kill a buffalo.

These guns aren't anything new. They've been around since about 1600. Meriwether Lewis, of the famous Lewis and Clark expedition, carried one that was a .31 caliber. He hunted with it and the Indians were amazed when he shot it for them.

A friend of mine from Ohio told me about his .50 caliber air gun made by Dennis Quackenbush. This isn't a new thing for Dennis because more than 100 years ago a relative of his, Henry Quackenbush, started mass producing air guns, and indoor shooting ranges began to pop up everywhere.

Dennis, located in Urbana, Mo., turns out replicas of the large-caliber rifles that were used 200 years ago. Just like the originals, these guns can be charged with a hand pump, but only a purist would be willing to give the gun

the 1,200 pumps necessary for a full 10-shot charge. These modern replicas are made so that the shooter can charge the gun with carbon dioxide purchased at a welding supply store.

You rarely hear or see anything in the hunting and shooting media about air guns. The air gun enthusiasts are a small and select group numbering about 5,000. What makes the air gun pleasant to shoot is the fact that you don't have to wear ear protections, since there is no noise, and your shoulder doesn't hurt, due to no recoil.

Air guns are very popular in

Europe, since they are the only guns people in some countries can own. Gun laws are much stricter in many countries than they are here.

A very popular Quackenbush rifle is the XL. It's a full-size .22 caliber pellet rifle that can be used for small-game hunting and target shooting. It is very accurate out to 50 yards, perfect for squirrel hunting.

Now for a word of caution if you live in Morgantown: Don't go buy one of these guns and bring it home. Not only are they illegal to shoot within the city limits, they're also illegal to possess. If you are caught with one of them, the police will confiscate and destroy it. If you really want one and live in town, buy one and give it to me to store at the farm. I promise I won't shoot it, much.

It is legal to hunt small game with an air gun in West Virginia. However, if you get one of the

large-caliber air rifles, it's illegal to hunt deer in this state with it.

Quackenbush has a line of mostly large-bore rifles he calls The Outlaws. They look like modern center-fire rifles made of blued steel and have oiled walnut stocks. They weigh about 7 1/2 pounds, plus or minus 4 ounces due to the density of the walnut stock. The barrel is 25 inches long and the overall length of the gun is 42 1/2 inches.

The first one Quackenbush built was called the Brigand. The idea for this gun came about when he was attending an air gun show and a friend bought a gun that had been made in the Philippines. When they tried to charge it, it leaked. They tore it apart to fix it and found that the construction was very poor at best.

Dennis knew he could do a better job. Quackenbush built the first Brigand in 1995.

The Brigand shoots a .375 lead

ball just like the ones used in .36 cap and ball revolvers. The gun can be charged with either CO2 or air. It will shoot an 84-grain bullet 600-650 feet per second with 67-80 foot-pounds of pressure.

The Brigand is no longer made because it is CO2 powered and doesn't work well in very cold weather. Since a lot of hunting takes place in cold weather, the rifle needed to be pre-charged.

Another rifle Dennis no longer makes is the Rogue. It's a .44 caliber that shoots 130 grain bullet at 800 fps. About the same time, Dennis made a .50 caliber rifle he called the Bandit. It performed much better than the Rogue, so he quit making it.

The Bandit shoots a 180 grain bullet at 790 fps. This is a large enough bullet to take deer and wild boar. Dennis opted to use the 180 grain bullet because it shoots flatter than a heavier one. Game does not always appear at the

same distance every time when you're hunting. A flatter trajectory is more important than a heavier bullet just for energy's sake.

A couple of other rifles he makes are the Knave and Exile. The Knave is a .25 caliber but will handle the 27-32 grain pellets. It will shoot a 27 grain pellet 1,200 fps. The Exile is a .308 caliber or the standard 30 caliber that we shoot in 30-30, 30-06, or .308.

If you were to get one of these rifles and want to put a scope on it, you'd better ask if the extra Leupold you have lying around will work. I don't know this for sure, but I doubt it will. I do know that you have to have a special scope for smaller air guns.

If you want to inquire about these guns, you can call Dennis, at (417) 993-5262. He's open from 10 a.m. to 7 p.m. and doesn't take calls on Sundays.

## Don't fear deer: Try planting these

**ASK ALMOST ANYONE** who lives in an outlying housing development and they will tell you planting flower gardens is difficult because the deer eat everything.

You can also go to downtown Morgantown — I mean right in Morgantown — and find many residents who want someone to get rid of the deer because they are trashing their flower gardens.

Then you have developments such as Greystone, with more than 120 deer per square mile. That area can ecologically hold around 20 deer per square mile. It's a wonder anything grows in Greystone.

Even more interesting is the fact that a few residents there are feeding the deer. I would think the increased risk of Lyme disease would scare the bejebeers out of them, but apparently not.

I live in Orchard Acres, on the Fairchance Road, and there are deer in my yard (and I'm five yards from the woods) every night. My wife, Cathy, has five flower gardens, plus my vegetable garden (fenced) and three apple trees. The deer have eaten some plants in all our gardens, but we've found some deer-proof flowers.

So, knowing that many readers have trouble with deer, I've decided to take the plunge, and give you some ideas on what plants you can use that deer will not eat.

Before I begin, there is a disclaimer: I cannot guarantee that deer will not eat some of these plants. There are variables that are explainable, such as droughts that create natural food shortages for deer, and at that time they will eat things they normally don't find palatable.

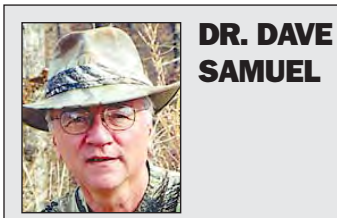
A bad winter with deep snows can also force deer into bad eating habits (at least bad for your yard). And if there are too many deer (common in our area housing developments), and the deer are starving, they may eat most anything.

Then there are variables that are unexplainable. There are plants that deer gobble up in one yard, yet they won't touch them in another. Take hosta, for example. For years I had folks tell me that deer chowed down on their hosta (and they do love it), yet my hosta was not touched.

Well, not touched until two years ago, and then things changed. The deer started eating it, and that continues today. Go figure.

Having said that, what follows are two columns with ideas for you to try. Many of these plants will provide you a variety of garden color and the deer will not eat them.

I've also sought the advice of Jane Michael, from Harewood, near Cheat Lake. Jane has some beautiful gardens with some deer-proof plants.

### PART 1

Remember, now: These are plants that Jane and Cathy have found deer don't eat. That doesn't mean they won't eat them in your garden, but they usually don't.

Let's start with sure-fire deer-proof ornamental grasses. Deer don't eat them, they need little maintenance, there are tons of varieties and they can be attractive. You can get tall varieties for the back of your garden, or shorter varieties for edges. Maintenance is easy. Just cut down the previous year's growth each spring, before new green leaves appear.

Purple iris not only are beautiful, but deer don't eat them. Every two or three years, dig them up and split them for transplanting to new areas. They flower better when not cramped, so spread them out.

I transplanted some this spring to my daughter's new home, in Whispering Woods, up on Coopers Rock, with dry, acid soils and tons of deer. They've done very well. We also have a yellow variety that my neighbor Carol Brown gave us. I love that Mountaineers football color combination, blue and gold.

Cathy isn't convinced. Go, Mountaineers.

I really like buddleia, the butterfly bush. Yes, they attract lots of butterflies, have nice blooms and deer do not eat them. Just plant on sunny, well-drained soils.

Russian sage will add color to any garden, has a sage-like odor and is never eaten by deer. I'm always surprised more people do not have this species in their garden. It adds a beautiful color and blooms for months, starting in July.

You may ask why I wrote this column at this time of the year. One reason is because I'm hearing so many gardeners complain about what the deer ate this summer, and I've seen what they didn't eat in our flower gardens. I know the timing of this column won't help you this summer, so save it and when next spring comes along, you will be ready to create a deer-proof garden.

Next week, more plants that deer don't (usually) eat.

### GO FISH! (W.VA. DNR)

#### Monongahela River

The water temperature is still 76-79 degrees. Fishing has been good for all species below the Morgantown Dam. Most species are attracted to the currents in the tailwaters of the locks and dams. Channel catfish can be caught on the Morgantown or Westover side of the dam using chicken liver or prepared stink baits. Start fishing for sauger and walleye about an hour before sunset because they will begin feeding at dusk. Jigs with minnows or worms are particularly good baits but 30-inch plastic grubs will also be productive. White or chartreuse is a good color. Large drum and carp are common along the shoreline between Deckers Creek and the dam. Warm water discharges at the Rivesville and Morgantown power plants are still attracting fish. A pier at the Morgantown plant makes fishing safe and convenient. This is also good area for channel catfish and carp. The discharge at the sewage treatment plant below the Star City Bridge also attracts lots of fish, particularly carp. Largemouth bass anglers should fish the weed beds along the shoreline between Star City and the state line.

#### Cheat Lake

Fishing is good throughout the lake. Largemouth bass are being caught off the shoreline in 15 feet of water using tube jigs. Channel catfish are doing well and 2- to 3-pounders are abundant, particularly in the area from Mont Chateau upstream. The embayments at the Cheat Lake Park and Trail are good areas for bank anglers to catch sunfish and largemouth bass. Fish for yellow perch in 10 to 15 feet along any shoreline using a piece of a nightcrawler and several split shot. Large sunfish are abundant along the shoreline across from the Sunset Beach cove up to the I-68 bridge. Try the tailwater fishing pier for walleye and sauger. Jigs with minnows or 3-inch power grubs are the best baits. White or chartreuse is a good color. Start fishing at dark, when sauger and walleye begin feeding. The pier is about 25 minutes from Morgantown. Take U.S. 119 to Point Marion, Pa., turn right after crossing the Cheat River and proceed four miles to Cheat Dam. The pier is lighted for night fishing and is handicap accessible. Info: [cheatlaketoday.com](http://cheatlaketoday.com).

#### Tygart Lake

The lake is 4 feet below the summer pool level. The water temperature is 80 degrees from 5 to 10 feet, 78 at 25 feet, 73 at 50 feet and 70 degrees at 100 feet. White bass feed on minnows at dawn on the surface and can be seen breaking water in the coves. Spinners, crankbaits, and casting spoons are good baits for white bass. Fish the shoreline using crankbaits or tube jigs for largemouth or smallmouth bass. Walleye will be scattered throughout the lake and could be at any depth during the day. Info: 265-5953.

## WVU's last call to join debate

University should lead area dialogue on drinking age

"Our lives begin to end the day we become silent about things that matter."  
— Martin Luther King Jr.

A university can be known by the silence it keeps on certain subjects. One such subject is binge drinking.

Earlier this summer, the Amethyst Initiative was launched to renew the debate about lowering the drinking age from 21 to 18.

The initiative does not endorse or reject the idea, however, some of its supporters do favor lowering the drinking age in an effort to curb binge drinking.

Nearly 130 college presidents, chancellors and deans have signed on to the statement that notes that despite raising the drinking age to 21, a culture of binge drinking still exists on campuses.

We agree with these leaders of higher education and applaud them for their support of an

"informed and unimpeded debate" on the drinking age.

At least two college presi-

dents in West Virginia have agreed to support this debate. However, WVU remains mum about the subject.

No one's suggesting the university has not taken action to curb binge and underage drinking. Actually, it sponsors a host of programs, including University 101, a course that acclimates freshmen to campus, WVU All Night and requires athletes, fraternities and sororities, to undergo presentations on alcohol abuse.

Yet, the university hierarchy and its student government has yet to comment on this initiative except to say it's new and they will continue to gather information.

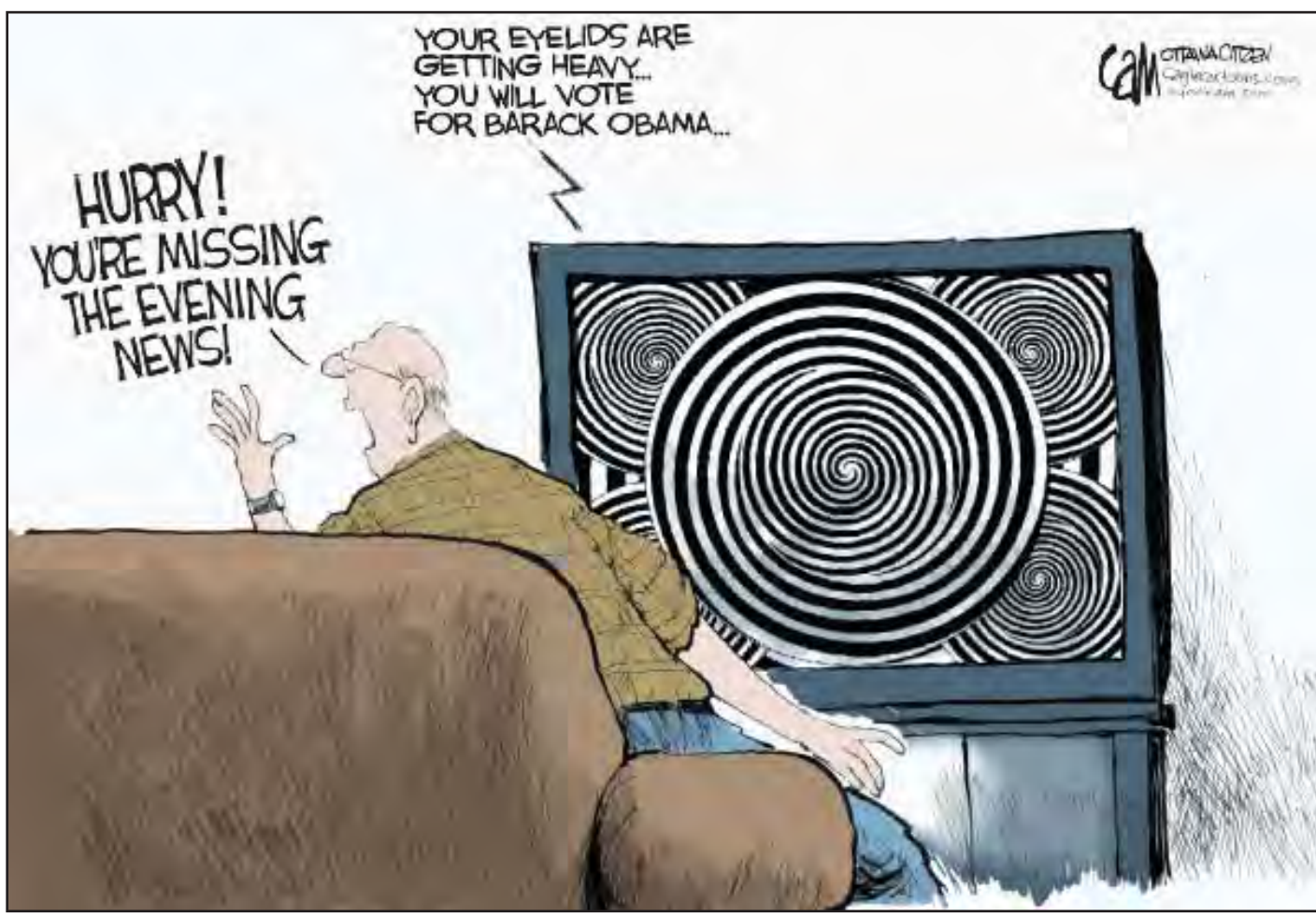
We call on the WVU community, including the university's interim president, to initiate a conversation about the Amethyst Initiative with students and faculty.

Show leadership by engaging the university community in the pros and cons of lowering the drinking age.

Everyone agrees that alcohol abuse by college students is a huge problem. Some research has found that more than 40 percent of college students reported at least one symptom of alcohol abuse or dependence. Some would say things have gone from bad to worse, while others will say lowering the drinking age would only exacerbate or allow the problem to trickle down.

But everyone will also admit the current law isn't working. The initiative cites a "culture of dangerous, clandestine binge-drinking." And it's hard to reconcile that while adults under 21 can vote, marry and enlist in the military, they are "told they are not mature enough to have a beer."

Though no one can be sure where this dialogue will lead, it's imperative that WVU take the lead in addressing this issue.



## Hail Sarah pass may work

OK. So HOW ABOUT A SINGLE WORD to describe John McCain's selection of Sarah Palin as his vice-presidential running-mate?

"Sensational." If he becomes the next president, he may well look back and see this decision — this long Statue-of-Liberty pass downfield — as ending the game for him before Labor Day.

What's so terrific about Governor Palin?

How much time do you have? She's a young, articulate, can-do-it-all mother of five. Got into politics at 28 running against tax increases. Four years as mayor of Wasilla, Alaska, give her more executive experience than Messrs. Obama and Biden combined — in addition to her executive years as governor. A reform-minded Alaskan (the state's first female governor and, at 44, its youngest) who threw out the (Republican) bums.

Anything else? She's a change agent who is a finger in the eye of Obama's vacuous 'change' mantra. She also does crucial things for Republican success Nov. 4:

■ As a woman, she peels away at least some of the Hillary feminists disenchanted with Obama-Biden. They wanted the Democrats to offer the first black and the first woman for vice president. Now Sarah Palin, a Republican, is the only woman among the Big Four.

■ Obama belied his commitment to change by going with Caroline Kennedy's recommendation and choosing — in six-term Senator Biden — one of D.C.'s tightest, most ingrown insiders. McCain, who has rattled the cage of the status quo for most of his political life, reached for his running-mate to the governor of a state as far from Washington as one can get — and to the former mayor of precisely the heart-of-America small-towners Obama oddly insists cling to their religion and their guns because they are deeply "bitter" about their lot in life.

■ Not only did Palin throw out corrupt Republicans in Alaska but she also declares straight-up she is a conservative both "fiscally and socially." So her selection stresses the division between the two tickets: the Republican emphatically conservative, the Democratic (consisting of the Nos. 1 and 3 farthest-left members of the Senate) mired in the fever swamps of liberal Democratic orthodoxy.

Doesn't this polarization of both tickets reflect a troubling polarization of the electorate?

Perhaps. But two points. First, self-described conservatives in the electorate outnumber self-described liberals by about 2-1. That's why the forthrightly conservative ticket usually wins. So McCain's selection is politically sound.

Second, about 10 percent of the voters remain undecided. They're looking for the practical achiever — the demonstrated doer. Both Obama and Biden are known for what they have said and how they have said it — not for what they have done. So McCain-Palin trumps Obama-Biden in the achievement score 14 ways to Thursday.

Yet I thought that presidential elections were heavily about the presidential nominees, not their running-mates — that vice-presidential choices historically affect campaign outcomes hardly at all.

No question. This election is fundamentally about Barack Obama and his motivating ideology. And that compounds the problems facing McCain.

Consider. Obama is a greatly gifted orator whose words offer little beyond vapid leftist bromides. He won local and state elections giving zero push-back to the Chicago machine that raised him up. Now, on the national stage, with utterly no tangible (as opposed to electoral) accomplishments, he has beaten a Clinton, for Heaven's sake. He has bewitched a fawning national press.

And there he was last week accept-

ing the Democratic nomination before 80,000 in the Broncos stadium on a stage fashioned by Britney Spears' set-designer — the whole hosannah scene suggesting the main player's ascension to Olympus.

McCain is hardly Obama's rhetorical equal. Yet his achievements and experience run circles around Obama's, and McCain embraces the preferable political philosophy — by far. His party, under Reagan a vehicle for ideas and reform, has grown leaden and too-often corrupt. And his president's popularity seems each day to set new records for low.

So?

So with Obama getting maximum attention, McCain had to do something. He needed to change the campaign dynamic. Simultaneously he needed to fire up Republican partisans and — to invite further consideration by independents — somehow break public fixation on the Obama spectacle.

Do we know what she believes, or has said, about anything?

Try these Palin quotes: (1) 'You can be a reformer and a conservative.' (2) 'America needs leadership devoted to the public interest — not to the special interests.' (3) 'I believe in a strong military and sound energy policy.' And (4) 'It's nonsense not to tap a safe domestic source of oil' — and America has those sources in abundance."

Will McCain's Statue-of-Liberty pass — his Palin pick — work?

Obama-bound bloggers and pressies will do all they can to see that it doesn't. Yet so far it evidently has, big-time. Stay tuned.

And long-term?

With an Obama defeat, or a one-term McCain presidency, don't bet against a tilt pitting Sarah Palin against Hillary Clinton — or maybe against that other Clinton with dynastic potential, Chelsea — in 2012.

## Students get a fair hearing

SCHOOL ADMINISTRATORS can gain from a recent court decision some much-needed guidance on how to react to student voices they dislike.

The good news for students — and for all Americans — is that this newest legal lesson supports more speech instead of placing more limits on student expression.

A landmark 1969 U.S. Supreme Court decision — *Tinker v. Des Moines Independent Community School District*, involving students and Vietnam War protest armbands — put forth the idea that young citizens don't surrender their First Amendment rights at the schoolhouse door.

But since then, courts at various levels have set about defining when and how officials legally could shut down student expression. A number of those legal limits have been driven by security, education or drug-related concerns.

No principal, no superintendent — and no judge, for that matter — wants to be the person whose inattention, inactivity or decision results in another Columbine-style massacre. Judges have recognized that teachers cannot teach and students cannot learn amid chaos or fear. And the dangers of drug use are painfully obvious.

Still, in various cases in just the past five years, students have been silenced because the message was politically incorrect or offended administrator sensibilities or community views. After voicing or writing sharp political views about the war in Iraq or illegal immigrants or gay rights or after penning provocative illustrations involving Old Glory, students have been told to sit down, shut up and wait their turn as citizens until they leave school — or face suspension or worse.

Many disputes are settled out-of-court, more often than not with an apology to the student and reinstatement. But the 8th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals weighed in on Sept. 2 with a commonsense decision supporting the rights of students to object to — of all things — a school policy.

A three-judge panel agreed that school officials in Watson Chapel, Ark., violated the constitutional rights of three students in 2006 who were disciplined for wearing black armbands or wristbands to school to protest a new policy enforcing school uniforms, and for handing out a flier objecting to the policy.

The administrators agreed in court that the protest did not disrupt classes or order at the school.

The 8th Circuit panel said that despite restrictive decisions since it was handed down, including the 2007 Supreme Court decision in the so-called "Bong Hits for Jesus" case, "Tinker remains good law." Students in both Tinker and the Watson Chapel case were exercising a right of protest against a government policy — something officials in every school ought to celebrate by example, not denigrate.

Advocates for student expression have feared that school officials and lower courts would expand legal controls into other areas of student free expression based on the ruling in that "Bong Hits" case. In that case — officially called *Morse v. Frederick* — the high court said officials may clamp down on student speech regarded as encouraging drug use.

In an era in which educators struggle to motivate students to think critically, and to instill American values of good citizenship, arbitrarily denying basic rights to speak out, to write in protest, to assemble and to peacefully "seek redress" seems wrong-headed.

Students should learn about the First Amendment in the classroom rather than the courtroom.

# The best of all systems: Economics

T.V. Williams (DP-Aug. 18) made some arguments about the "free market" and "socialistic" systems recently. His economic fundamentalism has become too much a part of our entire system of viewing the world. Our desire for clarity and simplicity, where nuance and complexity are called for, appears to me to have put blinders on our ability to solve problems.

Our economy is private and public-free, market and socialist. It is a mixed economy. Unfortunately, the free market concept has become dogma, and socialism has become a dirty word that can't be discussed rationally. I believe that where the free market works to the benefit of the United States, leave it alone and encourage it, and where it doesn't, move, in part, or all the way, to socialism.

Where, as Williams points out, "thousands of — modest and intermediate entrepreneurs — employ more than 60 percent of the workforce" leave it alone. We should also leave "socialism" alone where it works. My case in point is the Veterans Affairs healthcare system, the largest health-care system in the country. Since the mid-1990s the VA's system has become the best, most successful and least expensive healthcare system in the country.

The VA healthcare system also happens to be a 100 percent government enterprise. It is socialistic. Instead of taking an outstanding system and saving billions by enrolling veterans and their families, what are we doing? We are making it difficult for veterans to gain access, we are underfunding it, and we are closing its hospitals. We will simply force people out of the best care system and into an inferior free market health-care system.

An example of a wasteful, dysfunctional, socialistic system that should be run by a dogmatic, fundamentalist small government advocate is the military. The Pentagon wastes more billions while at the same time growing exponentially. The Pentagon has become the 100-pound tail wagging a five-pound dog. In this instance we close our eyes to "abusive incompetence."

"free market" is beyond Williams' "mischievous." Williams believes that the wealthy put their money back into the system thereby creating jobs and prosperity. That is only partly true. Much of that new tax-break-for-the-rich money has gone into unregulated, unproductive, speculative oil futures and sub-prime mortgages. Productive wealth is not produced and our national revenues have fallen drastically. Of our monstrous national budget deficit, 48 percent of it is the result of tax cuts for the wealthy since 2001.

If our national treasure were redistributed to the lower-middle and poor economic classes, the money would much more likely be spent on basics: food, clothing and shelter. No speculation here. I say this spending is better for the nation as a whole and that these people are as worthy as the "heirs" of the wealthy. Besides, wealthy heirs just become more dependent on their wealthy families. How can that be good when Williams knows that redistributing wealth to poor people makes them dependent? The logical answer is that rich and poor people are really different. Hopefully, not many believe this to be true.

And don't confuse the purpose of redistributing wealth. It is not to punish people who actually earn it. Its purpose is to level the economic arena so that all children have as equal an opportunity as possible to succeed. Redistributing wealth has a much longer history than modern socialism. All great religions and philosophes claim charity, generosity and social justice as virtues.

We voted for a president who puts anti-government incompetents in top positions and then when programs fail, we blame big government in general. Can you imagine putting dogmatic, fundamentalist socialists in charge of General Motors? There are many areas, perhaps the Bill of Rights, where some fundamentalism is warranted, but let us have an open dialog about economic systems.

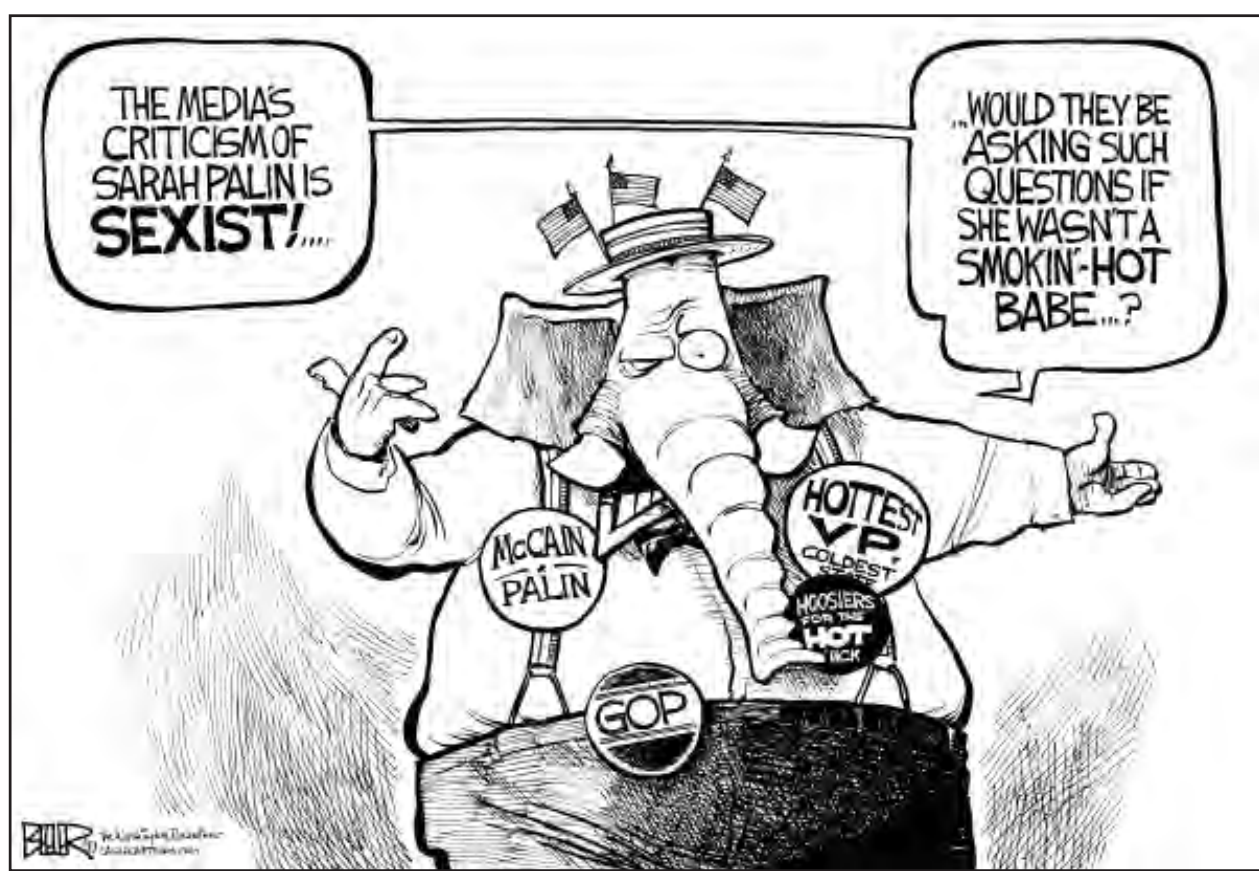
## Community organizers big part of American history

# A walk down the Main Street of her youth

In 1960, I started attending Morgantown Business School. At that time it was run by Stephen Callen. I lived near Bruceton Mills and caught a ride with some real nice guys, who worked as plumbers and pipefitters. George, Hobert and Calvin Benson, and Leslie Bowers, the latter being my father. I would get out of the car at the university island and walk around to High Street and then down High to the business school around 5:30 a.m. Mornings in the winter were so cold. That summer I drove our car and some other students rode with me.

On the east (left) side of High Street then there was Frank Ramsey's grocery store, a Chinese laundry, the Farmers & Merchants Bank, High Street Market — that sold a lot of fresh produce — the Darling Shop, Kinney's Shoe Store and Comuntzis' Restaurant, there by the steps going up to the business school. Mr. Comuntzis would always open the door in the winter and let me in when he saw me standing in the cold waiting for the school to open. He always had the best cinnamon and pecan rolls and the best hot chocolate and hot tea. A lady who worked there — Katherine — would pay for my hot chocolate and roll if I didn't have any money. Her son, Joe, also went to the business school. He got a job in 1962 in Washington, D.C., and lived in the same boarding house that I did then, too. What memories.

Also along High Street there was McCroy's, Montgomery Wards, G.C. Murphy's, City Pharmacy, Bakers Hardware, Morgantown Pharmacy, Slaven's Jewelry, Dr. Ryan's office,

an eye doctor and the A&P near South High Street Bridge. I can't remember all of the stores.

Along the west side of High Street was the WVU bookstore, a restaurant, the Dairy Queen, a service station, a hot dog shop, a leather store, Laidley and Selby's office machine store, Monongahela Power, a pool hall, Morrison's Department Store and Pike's Bakery. They had the best lemon and chocolate meringue pies, home baked rolls, pecan rolls around and the best ham salad sandwiches. For a \$1 you could get a roll filled with ham salad, a glass of Coke and a piece of pie there. A lot of us from business school ate lunch there once a week. Nowadays that might cost you \$10. On down from there was a shoe repair shop, Courthouse Square, and the Monongahela Building. I believe the First National Bank was located there and there was an employee there named Linda Lee Bowers. That was my name, too, so when I made deposits in my savings account there I use to tell her make sure you get the money in the right account and we would laugh. There was also Morrison's Department Store and the Metropolitan Theatre, where for 50 cents a group of us business college students went to see "Love Me Tender" with Elvis and we came out crying. There was also the Morgantown Hotel and the Morgantown Post Office. There were a few other stores on this side of the street but I've forgotten their names.

People were so friendly and it seemed everyone knew your parents or each other. I don't ever remember any robberies or killings

or drugs being sold on High Street back then. Everyone felt safe to walk up and down the street.

During WVU's Homecoming game there was always a big parade on Friday night. Those parades were so great. All the way down High Street. Frank Ramsey used to put out a long wooden step ladder so my sister and I could stand on its steps so we could see the parade over the crowd's heads.

I believe there was also an Italian foods shop on the upper side of High Street also. Back in those days I think gasoline might have been 10 cents a gallon and food was real cheap. Clothes were cheap also and they were American made. Most of all everyone cared about each other then. I've traveled a lot since I left my home near Bruceton Mills, but I've always missed West Virginia

and Morgantown and all the wonderful people I knew there.

I still love WVU football games and watch them on TV every time they're on or have tuned them in on my radio when I was living within the signal range. I think West Virginia is fortunate to have a governor like Joe Manchin. He showed he really cared about West Virginians when he left the football game to fly home to the Sago mine disaster.

I hope I've stirred up some good memories for some of you. I get so homesick sometimes for my mountain home in West Virginia.

They like that she's run a business. That she's comfortable in the outdoors, around hunting, fishing or snow-machine racing. That she can talk knowledgeably about firearms with her Secret Service agents. That she played basketball then; that she coaches it now. That she won a beauty pageant then, and probably still could now. (OK, maybe that last one is just me.)

They like that she's been on the PTA. That she's a hockey mom. That she made hockey moms cool with one ad lib on pit bulls and lipstick. That she seems more like them than any other national-ticket contender in memory.

They like having a pro-life candidate who walks the walk.

They like her acceptance speech. Well, they love her acceptance speech. It showed that she could be tough yet good-humored, whether on offense against her opponents or in defense of herself and her family. They like her love of the people in small-town America.

They like that she showed her strengths in some policy areas, such as reform and energy, and that she's ready to tackle others, including foreign policy. That she made it plain there's a place in Washington for someone from outside the Beltway — especially someone way, way outside the Beltway.

They like the phrase she uses to describe how elected officials should approach their jobs: with a servant's heart. And they were moved to tears by her promise to be an advocate in the White House for families with special-needs children.

They even like the media. Maybe that's going too far. How about, they appreciate the irony of one question they've heard nonstop this week: Is this person qualified to be president?

If the initial response is silence, don't worry. They're not dodging the question. They're stunned speechless. They can't believe the wailing and gnashing of teeth over Palin's resume when their own concerns about a certain presidential candidate were dismissed for so long. When they do answer, expect them to highlight the executive years of their No. 2 vs. the Democrats' No. 1. For them, one can't be talked about without the other.

And don't expect this debate to go away. Neither side will satisfactorily answer the other between now and November. Sarah backers are from Venus; Obama's are from Mars — or, in some cases, even farther out (maybe it's me).

The delegates who arrived here are not the same ones who will be leaving. If anything, they like Sarah Palin even more. Really, really like her. That's not just me.

## Betting on US or world economies misses point

While Wall Street is still debating which economies abroad might join the U.S. in a slowdown, investors shouldn't wait for an answer.

Readings from Spain to Japan to still-emerging economies like China and India point to economic headwinds of varying strength, but observers say it's too early to count out some of the star performers of the international markets of the past four years. At the same time, with the prospects for the U.S. economy still murky, it's likely prudent for many investors to rebalance their holdings rather than make an ill-conceived shift that leaves too much exposure to one economy.

Jeffrey Mortimer, chief investment officer at Charles Schwab Investment Management in San Francisco, likens the U.S. economy to the front of a train that started down a hill when the rest of the train — the remainder of the world — stayed on level ground.

Schwab recommends about 25 percent of an investors' portfolio be in international holdings.

"The question is, does the U.S. pull the rest of the world (down) that hill? I think that in fact it may be playing out that way, that the world will now slow. But what the U.S. does is still a wild card," he said.

Still, Mortimer contends investors who have had a good ride in international investments shouldn't give up on them; Schwab recommends about 25 percent of an investors' portfolio be in international holdings. Mortimer said investors who let international names grow to represent too much of their portfolios might consider diverting some money to beaten-down markets, including the United States.

"Take from the winners and give to the losers," he said.

Steve Tyson, chief investment officer at MFC Global Investment Management in London, has concerns about the U.S. economy but says Wall Street, having been in the doldrums longer than some other markets, could be poised for a rally — even if areas like consumer spending remain weak.

"The economic data coming out of the States recently is not as bad as the data we're seeing in Europe or the slowing in Asia. However, I think this is a false dawn in the U.S. economy and I think the U.S., like Europe, is going to be mired in economic problems for the next year or two whilst we overcome what I call the consumer hangover," he said.

Tyson predicts that the recent drop in oil prices and other commodities will help curb inflation in many economies and could make investors more willing to jump into markets like the United States that have been hit by economic worries.

"With what's happening with commodities rolling over, I just can't see where inflation is going to come from in the short term," he said. "It's just a reasonable time to be putting money back in."

Some of those who forecast an acceleration of the U.S. economy and a resulting turn higher by U.S. stocks point to the dollar, which has been showing signs of life. The stronger greenback has made the currency more at-

tractive to foreign investors and helped lower oil prices, and in turn, prices at the gas pump. The easing in the cost of everything from fuel to food could help consumers and businesses alike.

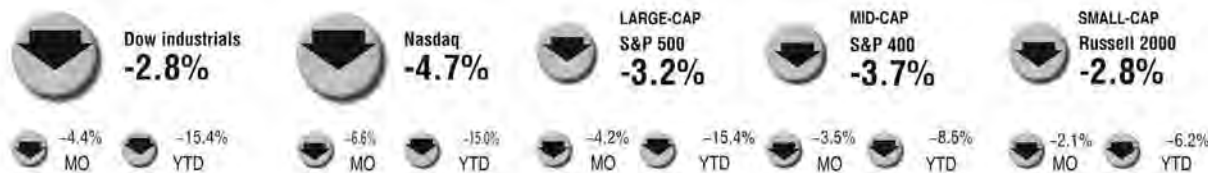
"Falling oil prices are an instant, ongoing rebate check into the pockets of consumers," said Rafael Resendes, portfolio manager of the Treador Large Cap Core Equity Fund in Fresno, Calif. He sees a more robust dollar as a boon for the U.S., even if it makes some goods made here more expensive for foreign buyers.

"A strong and rising dollar tends to be good for the U.S. stock market," he said. If the dollar continues to flex some muscle it could drive down the cost of raw materials and other goods for U.S. companies, which could in turn boost profit margins.

But determining where U.S. and international economies are headed is difficult, so investors should look beyond what has done well and try to make reasonable predictions about areas that could be ripe for a turn higher, Mortimer said.

An investor with too much weight in international stocks could gradually add to U.S. small-cap names, he said, without abandoning either market.

## Why marriage is bad for your wallet

Waiting to get married and have children is a good thing for both women and men, at least financially, says David Loughran, senior economist at the RAND Corp. think tank. He co-wrote a paper that's scheduled to be published in the Journal of Human Resources in early 2009. In it, he challenges conventional thinking about marriage's effect on men's earnings.

## Millions of Americans are laboring past the traditional retirement age amid shortfalls in savings.

While the average retirement age remains 63, that standard may soon be going the way of the gold watch. For 64-year-old John Lee, "retirement" bears a strong resemblance to his full-time working career — full of 40- and 50-hour weeks as an IT technical support specialist. He's not strapped but likes the extra cash and the feeling of being needed. But for Melissa Fodor, 68, a retired travel agent who works part time as a caregiver for the elderly, the extra work "keeps my head above water."

A slowing economy and stock market also are contributing. In an April survey conducted for AARP, 27 percent of workers age 45 and over, and 32 percent of those 55 to 64 said they had pushed back their planned retirement date because of the economic downturn. "We have people who are healthier, who are living longer and have more economic reasons to stay in the work force," says David Certner, AARP's legislative policy director. "On the employer side, you have greater demand for experienced (older) workers. That all adds up to longer work lives." Woeffel Research polled 1,002 respondents by phone. The survey carried a sampling error margin of plus or minus 3.1 percentage points.

And you found that having kids knocks down women's wages by 2 to 3 percent during the year of the birth?

Those are in line with what has been estimated in previous studies. The basic hypothesis is: When women have children, they take time off from work, and sometimes they take substantial time off. It just puts them behind other women who are working during that period of time. It may be difficult to recover from that long absence.

Much of the traditional thinking says marriage helps men's wages.

There, the hypothesis is that marriage is inspiring and makes you more productive. It gets you to be serious about your lives. (Another hypothesis) is that it's a positive signal, and employers take (married men) more seriously.

What did you find?

We find exactly the opposite. Marriage lowers the wages of men. The effects are really quite comparable (to women). What we see with men is not an immediate bump down but lower wage growth over time (by 2 percentage points). That was a surprising result for us. We weren't expecting to find that.

Does having kids affect men's wages?

For men, we don't see any effect. Perhaps it's the decision that women are going to stay home and take care of the baby for however many months. The man doesn't experience the same reduction in work experience. (But) marriage is still having a negative wage growth effect.

So, if you're seeing less wage growth early in your life, it could add up to big losses.

We don't simulate what the long-term effects are, but we surmise they are substantial. Delaying marriage can actually be beneficial from that standpoint.

Why is marriage hurting future wage growth for both men and women?

It's difficult to maximize and do the best you can do in your career if you're tied to another individual. A number of studies show that mobility is a very key aspect to advancing in your career. You very rarely get the perfect job the first time. If you have a spouse it's harder to (move around a few times in search of the perfect job).

Is there a point where the financial advantage of waiting to get married diminishes?

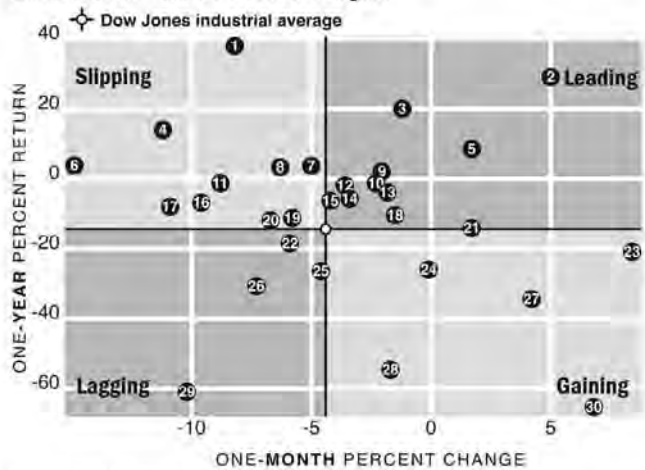
All we're showing is that by delaying marriage and childbearing, you can delay this inevitably negative effect. ... The benefit of waiting isn't that you're going to diminish (the negative wage effects), but you're going to put it off.

But there are gains from marriage and kids, outside the financial.

I'm about 40 now, and I have a three year old. ... I know I'm going to suffer financially for this reason, but this makes sense for me to do that. For other people, it may be better to wait and make some money.

#### Consumer goods

One tale of a downturn is told clearly enough by demand for consumer goods. While shoppers are less willing to spend on discretionary items, they are determined to find discounts on necessities. Teen retailers serve as one good example. Results have been bleak, with Wet Seal Inc. (WTSIA), Abercrombie & Fitch Co. (ANF), and American Eagle Outfitters Inc. (AEO) all faring poorly in August.

The flip side of the coin shows discounts and warehouse clubs. Wal-Mart Stores Inc. (WMT) reported a 3 percent gain in August for sales at stores open at least a year. That was almost twice analysts' projections. Costco Wholesale Corp.'s (COST) same-store sales rose 9 percent in August.

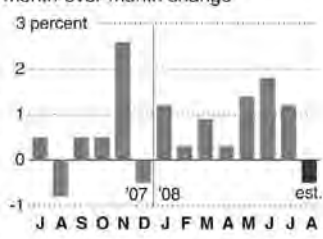
#### Prices seen easing

Economists are expecting some good news on the inflation front Friday when the Labor Department reports the Producer Price Index, a gauge of wholesale inflation, for August.

Sky-high food and energy prices sent the PPI soaring in the past year, but as commodity prices drop from record levels, economists hope to see that reflected in lower wholesale inflation. Oil, for example, has dropped from a record \$147 a barrel in July to roughly \$108. Corn and soybean prices have also declined from record highs.

As a result, economists expect the PPI to drop by 0.5 percent in August, according to a survey by Thomson/IFR, which would be the first drop since last December. That

finished products, while the Consumer Price Index measures how much consumers are paying for a broader range of goods and services.

Zach Pandl, an economist at Lehman Brothers, says a decline in the PPI should lead to a drop in consumer prices as manufacturers eventually pass along some of their savings. That would be "the first really good news in a long time," he adds.

The CPI jumped 5.6 percent in July, the highest increase in 17 years. Such increases have raised concerns among some economists that the Federal Reserve might have to raise interest rates this year to combat higher inflation. A drop in the PPI would help alleviate such worries and could boost the financial markets.

**DESPERATELY SEEKING FINANCIAL STABILITY**  
If you're looking for a well-heeled mate, you need to be extra careful during economic downturns. At least that's the contention of Prestige Speed Dating, a new service catering to "successful" singles, launched by dating firm FastLife.com and Honestly Online Inc., an identity verification service. Speed dating is designed to allow face-to-face meetings with a large number of new people in one shot by imposing time limits on each encounter. FastLife says it has identified an increase in concern among its members about finances, as opposed to appearance, age, weight and height. All Prestige members will meet minimum financial criteria. "Recessions cause people to alter their behaviors, and dating habits are no exception," says FastLife founder Justin Parfitt. He doesn't think the phenomenon is about "meeting wealthy people" per se, but about removing financials from the equation.

**SMALL CAPS STILL LEAD**  
August marked the fourth straight month that small capitalization stocks outperformed large caps, with the year-to-date difference approaching 10 percentage points, according to Russell Investments. The small-cap focused Russell 2000 index fell 2.6 percent, while the large-stock Russell 1000 index had a double-digit decline. Christian Anderson, associate portfolio manager at Russell, points out that even though more large stocks rose than fell, the 50 largest stocks, with average market caps above \$150 billion, skewed the results. They've lost more than 13 percent year-to-date through August.

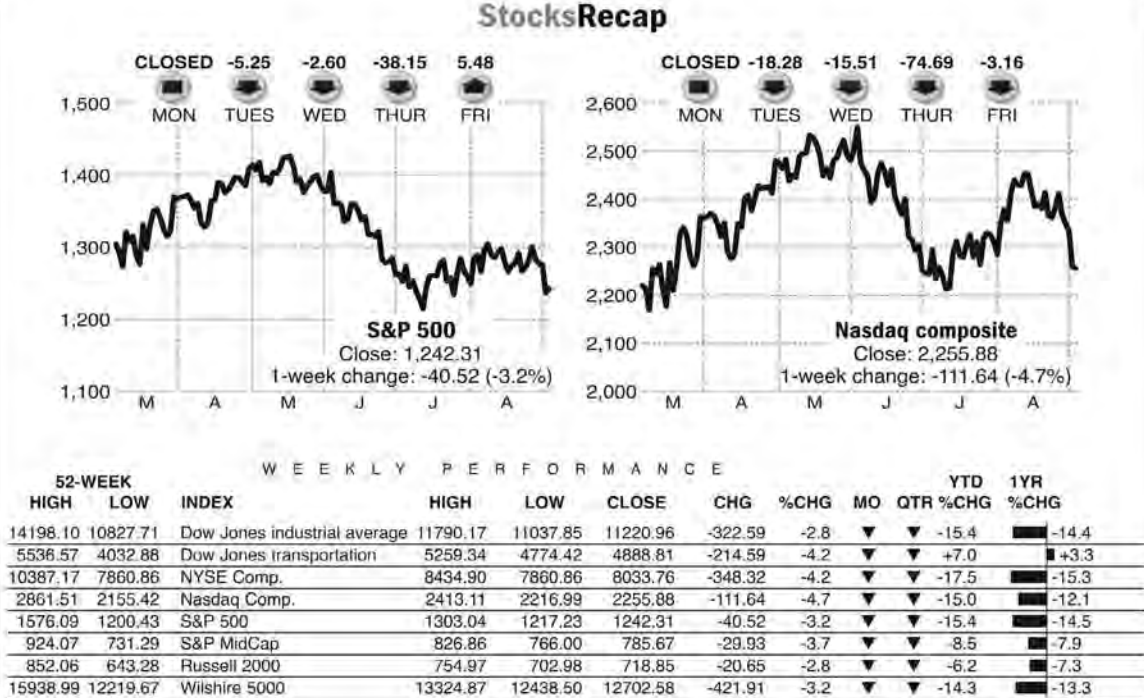

**CRYSTAL BLOGS**  
Bloggers are getting off the fence when it comes to their outlook for the market. Each week, Birming Associates polls about 30 of "the most prominent financial bloggers" to find out where these Web commentators think the Standard & Poor's 500 index will be in 30 days. It's based on a prediction of a 1 percent change, with a call for less than 1 percent considered "neutral." In last week's poll, neutral votes fell 10 percentage points to 45 percent, while bulls accounted for 40 percent of responses, up from 33 percent previously. In the past several polls, bearishness has been rising, suggesting the outlook in cyberspace for a stock recovery is dim.

**SOMETHING SMELLS IN FERTILIZER**  
The agribusiness boom may not be over, analysts say, but prices of fertilizer stocks have been stinking. Potash Corp. of Saskatchewan Inc. (POT) has fallen more than 30 percent, or about \$80 a share, from its high of \$241.62 reached in June. Mosaic Co. has had a similar fate, dropping to around \$90 a share from a June high of \$183.25. "The stocks are getting crushed, but the outlook hasn't changed much," notes Credit Suisse analyst Mark Connelly. He blames fertilizer's correlation with energy prices. Lower oil and natural gas prices mean less demand for ethanol, which comes from grain crops. Also, natural gas is needed to produce nitrogen, a fertilizer component. But Connelly says there's no whiff of waning demand for fertilizer, as there is for energy.

## OneYearAgo

**Sept. 7, 2007 — CHICAGO (AP)** — Motorola Inc. (MOT) executives pledged Friday to break the company out of its deep slump by rolling out a series of innovative new cell phones rather than a "one-hit wonder" like the Razzr. The Razzr actually outsold the pricier Razr2 in the latest quarter and Motorola's handset market share dropped from second to third place last year, according to IDC. Its stock trades under \$10 after hitting a nearly seven-year low of \$6.62 in July. In hopes of reviving the unit, Motorola said it would spin it off as a separate public company by the third quarter of 2009. Motorola has cut costs, slashing 2,600 jobs in April, bringing layoffs to more than 10,000 since last year. It replaced chief executive Ed Zander with former chief operating officer Greg Brown, who took over on Jan. 1. In August, Sanjay Jha, former chief operating officer of Qualcomm Inc., was named chief executive for the handset unit. "He brings strong understanding of smart phones," says Piper Jaffrey analyst Thomas Michael Walkley. "That's where Motorola is trying to get more competitive." In the second quarter, Motorola eked out a profit, and cell phone shipments rose from the prior quarter. But the phone unit posted an operating loss. Still, some are hopeful. "We believe Motorola's Q2 results not only put to rest the plans for the funeral, but more importantly are the early innings of a gradual steady improvement," writes Citigroup analyst Jim Suva, who rates Motorola "buy."

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## Pa. 3rd-party candidates make their cases in court

HARRISBURG, Pa. — It's decision time for several political outsiders who want to take on establishment candidates in the Nov. 4 election.

Challenges filed against and, in one case, by third-party candidates have prompted courtroom debates over the validity of petition signatures, the fairness of filing deadlines and other issues that stand between them and the ballot.

Objections to the Democratic and Republican candidates were settled earlier this year — well in advance of the April primary in which nominations for offices ranging from state representative to president were decided.

Third-party candidates do not run in primaries. Instead, they are required to collect many more voter signatures than major-party candidates and are given months — instead of weeks — to do so. The difficulty of the task is often compounded by the candidates' lack of money and name recognition.

Challenges are not uncommon. And because of the longer signature-gathering period, they are

filed late in the campaign season.

In a case decided this week, a Commonwealth Court judge threw off the ballot an independent candidate for Congress in northwestern Pennsylvania's 3rd District for violating the letter of the state Election Code.

At the same time, the judge beamed the Legislature's failure to make the code more flexible and less onerous to candidates who lack "the resources and advantages of major party affiliation."

Senior Judge James R. Kelley commended candidate Steven Porter for his diligence in ensuring that the more than 3,200 signers of his petition signed their names and understood what they were signing. But because the law requires voters to enter their hometown and the date, Kelley disqualified more than 1,500 entries in which Porter entered some or all of that information — leaving him hundreds of signatures shy of what he needed.

"The court believes that, in this instance, this outcome is unfair and actually prohibits the well established principle that the Election Code is to be liberally construed," Kelley wrote.

## Obama: McCain focused on biography, not economy

DURYEA, Pa. — Democrat Barack Obama called Republican rival John McCain's acceptance speech the final piece of an out-of-touch convention that focused on its nominee's biography instead of the struggles of the middle class.

"If you watched the Republican National Convention over the last three days, you wouldn't know that we have the highest unemployment in five years because they didn't say a thing about what is going on with the middle class," Obama told workers at a specialty glass factory.

"They spent a lot of time talking about John McCain's biography, which we all honor," the Illinois senator said. "They talked about me a lot, in less than respectful terms. What they didn't talk about is you and what you're seeing in your lives and what you're going through, or what your friends or your neighbors are going through."

Obama pointed out that the nation's unemployment rate zoomed to a five-year high of 6.1 percent in August, according to a government jobs report issued Friday.

"We've now lost 605,000 jobs since the beginning of this year," Obama said. "We've had eight consecutive months of job losses."

Obama seized on the new jobs

report as part of his strategy to tie McCain to President Bush's stewardship of the economy and to connect with voters who fear their jobs will disappear. There is no shortage of such voters in Rust Belt Pennsylvania.

In accepting the Republican presidential nomination, McCain spoke at length about his biography, his love of country and his principles for governing.

Obama mocked McCain's campaign manager Rick Davis for saying the election would be decided more by voters' views about the candidates than about issues.

"Personalities? I mean, I've got a pretty good personality. But that's not why I'm running for president," Obama said to laughter.

In two days of campaigning in Pennsylvania, Obama has been reaching out to middle-class and working class voters who preferred Hillary Rodham Clinton to him during the Pennsylvania primary.

"I have to say to you: I'm not perfect, but the one thing people can't deny is that for my entire public life, I've been fighting for folks like you, ordinary, middle-class families and working families, helping them getting ahead," Obama said, borrowing a theme that helped Clinton win in these rural, largely white areas.

## Palin is popular draw as McCain campaigns in Wis.

CEDARBURG, Wis. — If there was any doubt that John McCain's surprise pick of Sarah Palin has grabbed the attention of many Republicans, Barbara Falk, a retiree born and raised in the quaint small town of Cedarburg, Wis., put it to rest Friday: "I came out to see her."

So did Falk's friend Pat Mantel, who said, "I do enjoy that vice president that McCain picked." And so did Mantel's sister Carol Eberhardt, a retired lab worker and single mother of three, who said, "She speaks my language."

A day after McCain gave what many critics panned as a flat acceptance speech, Palin proved to be a popular draw.

She energized a once-sparkless campaign in the McCain-Palin ticket's first two campaign stops after the Republican National Convention.

Crowds of people jammed streets for blocks around the downtown stage set up here for the GOP ticket — the campaign put out a crowd estimate, drawn from the area, of 12,000 (matching Cedarburg's population).

It would be a scene repeated Friday afternoon in Sterling Heights, Mich., a Reagan Democrat stronghold.

Many at the first rally said they wanted to see the mother of five and first female Alaska governor, whom

they referred to simply as "Sarah." Most always vote Republican and likely would vote for McCain anyway.

But Kathi Czarniecki, an investor, said, "I think Sarah has re-energized the party."

Palin has become a new weapon for the strategists running the McCain campaign, plugging into its retooled anti-Washington message of reform. She also serves as an entree into small-town America.

Friday marked the trial run. To the chants of "Sarah, Sarah, Sarah," Palin spoke for about a dozen minutes, debuting her stump speech derived from her well-watched acceptance address at the convention and launching the attack against Democrat Barack Obama.

When McCain took his turn, he praised Palin before calling for reform and describing his fight against corruption among Democrats and Republicans.

But on the bad economic news of the day — another 84,000 jobs lost nationwide last month — McCain offered no rosy picture, though he promised to create millions of jobs, mostly by cutting taxes. "A little straight talk. These are tough times," he said. "You're worried about keeping your job, and struggling to put food on your table."

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## Historic race alters political landscape, breaks the mold

ST. PAUL, Minn. — They embody four uniquely American stories. They offer messages of transformation with two distinct world views. They pursue one goal.

Republican John McCain and Democrat Barack Obama and their respective running mates, Sarah Palin and Joe Biden, begin the final eight weeks of their historic and remarkably close presidential contest ready to rewrite national politics.

Race, gender and age barriers are at stake. A shifting political landscape will take the fight to previously ignored states. Advertising will suffocate the airwaves with intensely negative exchanges.

Debates could be as decisive as the final Carter-Reagan debate of 1980. And more money will be spent by the hour in politics than ever before.

Armed with a bigger bankroll and a partisan Democratic advantage, Obama is competing in more states than John Kerry did in 2004, including typically Republican states like Virginia and North Carolina.

Soon, strategists predict, the number of states in play will narrow to nine or 10, resembling past elections with Virginia the new battleground in the mix.

As election day closes in, they say, McCain needs to shore up his position in previous Republican states and hope the only states left

in play are Ohio, Pennsylvania and Michigan.

"Whoever wins two out of those three will probably win the election," said Scott Reed, a Republican strategist who managed Bob Dole's 1996 campaign and is close to the McCain camp.

Obama and McCain march into the fall campaign with their parties newly unified — tasks they accomplished by each reaching out to a female political figure. Obama joined hands with former rival Hillary Rodham Clinton and sealed the deal with many of her supporters. But McCain's selection of Palin proved most stunning and has the potential to change the game.

Obama sits atop a mountain of

advantages. President Bush and the Republican Party remain highly unpopular, Democrats have displayed greater intensity, Obama has expanded the electorate, and he has set huge records for political money.

McCain, however, has managed to remain far more popular than his party or his president. Independent voters and even some Democrats remain unsure about Obama, either because of his race or his rapid rise from obscurity.

And while Obama's election would represent a monumental milestone for the nation by putting the first black man in the White House, Palin gives voters a chance to make history, too, by electing the first woman as vice president.

**Police: Rock slide in Egyptian village kills 24**

CAIRO, Egypt — Massive boulders crashed down on an Egyptian shantytown Saturday on the outskirts of the capital, killing at least 24 people, authorities said. Rescuers were digging by hand to reach any survivors.

At least eight boulders, some the size of small houses, fell from the towering Muqattam cliffs and buried about 50 homes in the massive Manshiyet Nasr slum, one of many densely populated shantytowns ringing the city of 17 million.

The collapse occurred in the early morning, when most residents were still sleeping after waking earlier to eat ahead of the daytime fast during Islam's holy month of Ramadan.

"My whole family is underneath the rock," sobbed Anwar Ragab by phone to The Associated Press as he watched a body being pulled from under the rock. "I don't know what to do. I can't do anything — I just want my children back."

A security official said 35 people were injured and many more may be buried under the hundreds of tons of rock that fell. He spoke on condition of anonymity because he was not authorized to speak to the press.

**Bhutto widower elected Pakistani president**

ISLAMABAD, Pakistan — Benazir Bhutto's widower swept Pakistan's presidential election on Saturday, offering hope for stability to a nuclear-armed country feeling intense U.S. pressure to crack down on Islamic militants.

In a grim reminder of the problems awaiting Asif Ali Zardari, rescuers in the northwest dug with their hands for survivors after at least 30 people were killed in a massive suicide bombing.

Already head of the main ruling party, Zardari becomes one of the most powerful civilian leaders in Pakistan's turbulent 61-year history. Last month, he marshaled a coalition that forced stalwart U.S. ally Pervez Musharraf to quit as head of state.

However, he begins with limited goodwill among a population who recall his nickname, Mr. Ten Percent, for alleged corruption during Bhutto's two terms in office as prime minister and doubt his political vision and leadership skills.

**Rice presses Congress to OK India nuclear deal**

ALGIERS, Algeria — Secretary of State Condoleezza Rice pressed Congress to approve a nuclear deal with India after the agreement was endorsed Saturday by nations that supply nuclear material and technology.

"I certainly hope we can get it through," the top U.S. diplomat told reporters as she traveled from Tunisia to Algeria during a trip to North Africa. "It'd be a huge step for the U.S.-India relationship."

Rice said she would speak in coming days with the leaders of the appropriate congressional committees to see if the deal can be approved by Congress before it breaks for the rest of the year to campaign for November elections. "We understand that time is very short," she said.

**Rice: 'Time isn't right for the Russia agreement'**

ALGIERS, Algeria — Now is not the right time for the U.S. to move forward on a once-celebrated deal for civilian nuclear cooperation with Russia, Secretary of State Condoleezza Rice said Saturday.

Her comment increased speculation that President Bush is planning to punish Moscow for invading Georgia, a former Soviet republic, by canceling the agreement. Such a move is being planned, according to senior Bush administration officials, but is not yet final.

"The time isn't right for the Russia agreement," Rice told reporters while flying from Tunisia to Algeria during a visit to North Africa. "We'll be making an announcement about that later."

U.S.-Russian relations have cooled considerably since last month's military standoff between Russia and Georgia. On Saturday, Russian President Dmitry Medvedev said the war has shown the world that "Russia is a nation to be reckoned with."

Traveling in Italy, Vice President Dick Cheney pushed back against Moscow, saying: "Russia's actions are an affront to civilized standards and are completely unacceptable."

**Suicide bomber kills 6 at outdoor market in Iraq**

BAGHDAD — A suicide car bomber blasted an outdoor market Saturday in a northern Iraqi city, killing six people and wounding 54, police and hospital authorities said.

The attack in the mainly Turkomen city of Tal Afar took place one day after a suicide car bomber struck a convoy carrying ex-Deputy Prime Minister Ahmad Chalabi in Baghdad. The former Pentagon favorite escaped injury but six people, including five of his bodyguards, were killed.

Saturday's attack occurred in the same Tal Afar market where a suicide truck bomber killed 28 people and injured 72 last month.

That raises questions about whether Iraqi police are capable of maintaining security in the strategic north — where al-Qaida in Iraq remains active — as the Americans hand over more responsibility for security to Iraqi soldiers and police.

Police said the bomber detonated his explosive-laden car near a crowd of people gathered around a

traffic accident in the market, which was crowded with shoppers buying food for the traditional evening meal that breaks the daily fast in the Islamic holy month of Ramadan.

"I was walking through the street toward my work when I felt what seemed like a hurricane," said Asghar Saied, 52, from his hospital bed in Dahok where he was taken with shrapnel wounds and a broken leg.

"People were running in all directions," he said. "A woman was shouting about her missing child who

was blown from her hand by the blast. Despite my injuries, I can't stop thinking about that woman. Is it a humanitarian or Islamic thing to do during the holy month of Ramadan?"

Mohammed Ahmed, 18, said his 4-year-old brother, Muntadhar, was wounded in the blast.

"He was playing. I hurried to find him after the bombing. But I couldn't find him at first because he was thrown a long way by the blast. He suffered a broken leg and his white shirt was soaked in red" blood, Ahmed said.

Elsewhere in the north, Kurdish security forces raided a house in Irbil province, killed a suspected member of an al-Qaida front group and captured a 17-year-old girl wearing an explosives vest, provincial police said.

Irbil is one of the three provinces in the Kurdish self-ruled region, the most peaceful area of the country, although some bombings have occurred there during the war. The Kurds said the 17-year-old was from a Sunni neighborhood in Baghdad, 220 miles to the south.

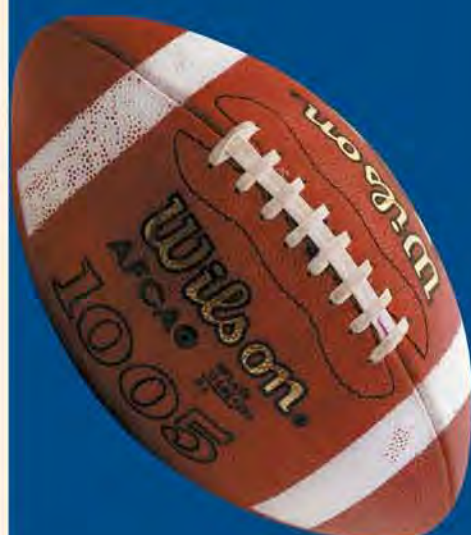

# What to expect from cable, network channels this fall

On a billboard for the upcoming season of the CW's "Gossip Girl," beside a picture of a steamy teenage kiss, is a quote from a critic who declared the show "Every Parent's Nightmare."

It's an attention-getter, an evil grin, a non-traditional appeal to the youth market. But it's wrapped around a fairly traditional message: OK, hip young things. It's time to watch network TV.

Yes, we now have iPod screens and YouTube, niche cable channels and caches of streaming video. But the old-school broadcast networks, the mass-media Big Five, are still banking on the idea that old habits die hard — even for young viewers. Particularly the timeworn couch-potato ritual of September, when America moves indoors and hunkers down in front of the television set.

That's a surprising idea, in a way, in a year when everything was supposed to have changed. For years, network leaders have buzzed about adopting the cable model of shorter TV seasons that premiere year-round. Once last fall's writers' strike stopped production in its tracks, many predicted an end to fall TV as we know it. NBC President Jeff Zucker proclaimed that his network was moving to a "52-week television season."

And this fall's TV lineup reflects some major changes in the industry, some of them permanent. Altogether, the networks have cut in half the number of new shows they're introducing. Cable channels are putting their new series and old hits — such as Showtime's "Dexter," HBO's "Entourage" and "True Blood," and FX's "Sons of Anarchy" — in direct competition with the network series, rather than in the relative safety of summer and spring.

Still, the networks have put significant thought and marketing dollars behind the new fall season. NBC peppered its Olympic coverage with relentless promotions of its lineup, reminding us how long we've waited for "The Office" to return. The CW has sent high school bands sheet music for the resurrected "90210" theme song. ABC has launched a tongue-in-cheek campaign for "National Stay at Home Week," which happens to coincide with the start of

its fall season.

"There's still a rhythm to the television viewing season," says Preston Beckman, executive vice president for strategic planning and research at Fox, which this week starts debuting its new series and airing fresh episodes of returning shows. "I don't think there will be a massive erosion in ratings," Beckman says. "I think things will get back to normal."

It's bound to be a new "normal," as the scale has clearly changed. As recently as last year, networks regularly produced dozens of pilots, those elaborate and costly first episodes of potential new series, only to relegate most of them to the dustbin. Fall lineups were overloaded with new shows, many of them yanked at the first sign of flagging ratings.

This year, networks didn't order pilots at all, opting to pick up series based solely on their scripts. While CBS filmed pilots, executives say the timetable of approving scripts, giving notes, shooting and editing was dramatically condensed. CBS has five new shows, NBC four. ABC has only two new series and is using the fall-season buildup to promote several series that debuted last year but disappeared after the strike.

"That era is over," says Jonathan Taplin, a communications professor at the University of Southern California, referring to the old days of development largesse. "It was financially a joke. They spent so much money, and so little of it actually ended up on the screen, that I think that probably the accountant side of the networks prevailed in terms of rationality."

What few new shows there are reflect some overarching trends. Sitcoms continue to be scarce across the lineup, though Fox will debut "Do Not Disturb," a comedy set in a boutique hotel, and NBC has remade the Australian sitcom "Kath and Kim." Other networks, too, are borrowing concepts from foreign markets: ABC's "Life on Mars" is based on a British series, as are CBS's "Worst Week" and "Eleventh Hour." CBS's "The Ex List" is adapted from an Israeli show. And some other new series are

remakes, from "90210" to NBC's "Knight Rider."

With fewer new series to promote, the networks have been advertising more strategically this fall. At the CW, programmers have focused on the target demographic of women 18 to 34, and the network is putting most of its marketing muscle behind what marketing chief Rick Haskins calls the network's "lead dogs": "Gossip Girl" and the new "90210."

ABC, meanwhile, is taking pains to promote its Wednesday night lineup of "Pushing Daisies," "Private Practice," and "Dirty Sexy Money." All three shows premiered last year and never returned after the strike — and have been tweaked a bit in the off-season, with such changes as the addition of Lucy Liu to the "Dirty Sexy Money" cast and the toughening-up of Addison Montgomery, the "Private Practice" central character.

"We got a little bit of a second chance," says Mike Benson, ABC's executive vice president of marketing. "A show may not be exactly what it's going to be right out of the box of the pilot. A lot of these programs have had an opportunity to find their voice."

ABC was the sole sponsor of this past week's TV Guide, which included a DVD of all the pilot episodes for all three series. The network is also sending affiliates a "Wednesday Night Starter Kit," a half-hour special featuring all three series, Benson says. Last week, ABC also announced that it will premiere five new series later in the season: the hour-long comedy procedurals "Castle," "Cupid," and "The Unusuals"; and the half-hour comedies "Better Off Ted" and "Single With Parents."

NBC is trying to build similar buzz around three returning series that had shortened seasons: "Life," "Lipstick Jungle," and "Chuck." The network is also promoting a three-hour premiere event for "Heroes," the supernatural series that never returned after the strike.

And some new NBC shows, such as the Christian Slater vehicle "My Own Worst Enemy" and the Robinson Crusoe update "Crusoe," will be previewed online, via Yahoo and Hulu.com. The networks' longstanding skittishness

about new technology has all but disappeared. Nielsen has started to measure growing DVR use with its live-plus-same-day ratings. And the battle over whether to make shows available online is largely over.

A short-lived CW experiment last spring — removing episodes of "Gossip Girl" from the network's Web site — ended quickly and quietly, after tech-savvy younger viewers made it clear that they could find ways to download the series illegally.

"You've got to listen to the consumer and understand what their media consumption habits are," the CW's Haskins says, "and I think you have to be in line with them."

The traditional line-up-for-the-starting-gun method of scheduling has shifted, as well. For one, the networks, following cable's lead, have gotten into the habit of premiering some key shows at different times of the year: Fox's "American Idol" juggernaut always starts in January, as does the serial drama "24."

This year, Fox is also trying to differentiate itself by premiering new fall episodes several weeks before the traditional late-September start date, when Nielsen starts recording fall-season measurements.

"It was time to get on with it," Fox vice president Beckman says, "and not wait until traditional premiere week. We wanted to service that need."

Network executives say they're convinced that there's a need — or a demand, at least — for mainstream TV. As evidence, they point to NBC's Olympics coverage from Beijing, a ratings bonanza that has even surprised and impressed the network's competitors.

"It shows you the power of broadcast," says ABC's Mike Benson. "There is something very communal about live events. They give you all something to talk about the next day. The more we can keep that feeling and keep it special, I think, the longer we'll prosper."

And if viewers are cajoled and coddled enough — promised such reforms as longer runs and uninterrupted stretches of new episodes — network leaders believe they can be lured back to the couch this fall.

"We need to win viewers' trust back a little bit," says Kelly Kahl, head of planning and scheduling at CBS. "We just have to work a little harder, that's all."

## Pearl Jam's Jeff Ament preps solo debut 'Tone'

NEW YORK — Pearl Jam bassist Jeff Ament will unveil his first solo album, "Tone," Sept. 16, via the band's Ten Club fan organization and select United States indie retailers. As of now, "Tone" will only be available on CD as part of a one-time-only pressing of 3,000 copies.

The material on "Tone" represents an accumulation of 10 years worth of songs Ament never solicited for potential inclusion on a Pearl Jam album.

"It just got to a point where I had to clean off the shelf a little bit," he says. "I broke this group of 35 songs into three groups and decided to finish one of them."

Richard Stuverud, Ament's collaborator in his prior solo project Three Fish, plays drums on

six tracks, while King's X front-man Doug Pinnick sings lead on "Doubting Thomasina." "Everything else is me," Ament says.

One "Tone" track, "The Forest," was actually put to tape by Pearl Jam "but (singer) Ed (Vedder) never got around to recording vocals for it. So I just wound up using the original version with a drum machine."

Another cut, "Hi-Line," was written for a film based on the short story "Dry Rain." Says Ament, "It takes place up in north-central Montana, pretty close to where I grew up. I didn't end up finishing the song before they put the movie out, but I got two pretty cool songs out of it, inspired by growing up in north-central Montana. It forced me to write from a different perspective."

Ament, who toured with Three Fish, says he "eventual-

ly" may play some solo gigs, and that "me and Richard doing a two-piece thing with loops and a set of both our songs" could be a possibility at some point.

Meanwhile, later this fall, Pearl Jam will reconvene to continue work on its eighth studio album with producer Brendan O'Brien.

"We have five or six almost-finished instrumental beds, and maybe 15 other things from which we could definitely get three or four songs out of," Ament says. "Hopefully sometime this winter we will knock a record out. The goal is to know the songs front to back before we actually record them, which we haven't always done."

Ament is particularly excited to work again with O'Brien, whose last production credit on a Pearl Jam album was 1998's "Yield."

## Akon plans on trial in New York fan-toss case

FISHKILL, N.Y. — Akon is headed to trial on criminal charges he tossed a fan offstage at an upstate concert last summer.

The 35-year-old singer is accused of tossing a teenager off the stage during a June 2007 concert at a minor league baseball stadium near Poughkeepsie. Another concertgoer said she suffered a concussion when the boy landed on her.

Akon, whose real name is Aliu Thiam, asked for the jury trial during a brief appearance with his lawyer in Fishkill Town Court on Wednesday. He's due back in court for trial Dec. 1 unless a deal is negotiated in the meantime.

He pleaded not guilty in December to misdemeanor charges of endangering the welfare of a minor

and second-degree harassment, a violation.

In court recently, Judge Harold Epstein met privately with Akon's lawyer, Andrea Zellan, and Dutchess County Assistant District Attorney Anthony Parisi before announcing the case would go to trial unless a deal is reached.

"We are pleased that Judge Epstein adjourned the case to a date certain for either a trial or a negotiated resolution," Zellan said in a prepared statement. "Akon looks forward to putting this incident behind him, and in the meantime he will continue to meet every requirement set forth by the court."

Akon's hits include "Smack That" with Eminem and "I Wanna Love You" with Snoop Dogg. His most recent album, "Konvicted," was nominated for four Grammy Awards.

## If it can work in the store, why not in the kitchen too?

**IF IT WASN'T** for the fact that I have to eat to survive, I would be tempted never to set foot in a grocery store again.

Wandering the aisles trying to find something easy enough for me to prepare is a daunting task. I have only a few meals I actually create: shepherd's pie, pepper steak and anything I can cook on a cookie pan in the oven (chicken tenders and fries).

Anything besides that and I'm totally lost. I've burned myself and the food too many times to count, and I'm definitely one to follow directions when I cook, which actually makes me a better baker than a chef. Let's face it, people who really know how to cook just throw ingredients together. I like structure. I like to follow the directions to a tee, which slows me down and thus increases my chances of burning something. On another note, I also have trouble just chopping up vegetables and don't even get me started on trying to cook a couple things at one time.

So, considering my bad luck in the kitchen, it's not uncommon for me to for a pill that I could take once a day that would fill my stomach and offer me all the nutritional value needed.

But, obviously, that's not going to happen. Therefore, I usually end up at the grocery store, already in a bad mood, in the middle of the night. (It's most commonly late at night, because I like to avoid peak grocery shopping hours, plus it works better with my husband's schedule.)

On such a night, after rolling my carefully selected items up to the cash register, I look over at the self scanners only to find them closed.

Huh. Now that doesn't make sense because when I move over to a line with a real person, there's already about five people in front of me. Really, what is the point of the self-scanning machines then? (It's bad enough there are some grocery stores that don't even stay open 24 hours in a town the size of Morgantown.)

On another trip to a separate grocery store, I found myself desperately trying to scan items (most of which were apparently too light to be read by weight sensors) and hitting the "Skip Bagging" page that comes up on the screen.

By the time I got everything scanned and carefully stuffed in the bags, not to mention a couple visits from the employee (who just happens to have the magic key that works the scanners) manning about six of the machines, I'd wasted more time at the self scanner than I would have by simply going through the real-person lines.

Which brings me to my plea to local grocery stores: Update the technology. It's called the U-Scan Shopper, and according to several Web sites, it does pretty much everything but slice and dice your meal for you.

The device is made by Fujitsu and debuted at an Australia technology expo in 2005. The U-Scan Shopper is actually connected to your cart and besides scanning items as you load them, it will also remind you of store specials and your shopping list, let you keep an eye on your budget, help you locate certain items in the store, give you recipe ideas that you can print or e-mail to yourself, let you order from the deli from anywhere in the store and even give you weather updates.

And when you're done shopping, simply roll up to the checkout counter, pay an employee who quickly checks the cart and be on your merry way.

It sounds too good to be true, doesn't it? And it might just be. I remember when the self scanners were new and exciting and supposed to make my life so much easier. You see how that ended up.

But I'm willing to give the U-Scan Shopper a try if it will reduce my long wait at the store, not to mention ease the stress of planning a week's worth of meals while staring at endless boxes of pasta and cereal.

Now if it could just come home with me and whip up a nice chicken parmesan.

# The Palin pregnancy

The media has made much of it, but how much does it matter to voters?

Rebecca Horvath was an undecided voter before the news broke about Alaska Gov. Sarah Palin and her 17-year-old unmarried daughter's pregnancy.

The Tennessee mother of two is exactly the kind of voter who will decide this presidential election. And the news has not changed her views one iota.

"This has nothing to do with the campaign," says Horvath, 32, who as a woman and a self-described Reagan Democrat is in two groups being wooed in this fiercely contested race. "That's been my thought from the beginning. Campaign issues are health care, education, the Iraq war — not a candidate's daughter being pregnant."

Just as Sen. John McCain's surprise choice of Palin made headlines a few days earlier, the revelation of her daughter's pregnancy has sent shock waves across the political landscape — and spawned countless Web references to "Juno from Juneau," a play on the name of last year's popular movie about a pregnant teen.

But what do voters really think? Will the pregnancy reflect negatively on Palin or on the man who chose her? Or will Palin's predicament instead humanize her and draw some sympathy votes?

Interviews across the country by The Associated Press found many said it should be a private matter. Yet some of these same people wondered whether Palin could be an effective vice president and deal with the obligations of parenting both her own and her children's children.

But voters of all political stripes expressed the view that parental guidance only goes so far.

"As a parent, you cannot be totally responsible for your child," noted Kurt Farrell, a 71-year-old Atlanta resident. "This is not a crime, and it doesn't mean she did not do her job. You can't guide your child 100 percent."

The story, he said, is simply "not our business."

Farrell, who is originally from Trinidad and is a staunch Barack Obama supporter, added he was certain Obama wouldn't use Palin's personal situation to gain political leverage, and indeed Obama has said forcefully that he believes candidates' children are off limits.

But one supporter of the Illinois senator felt the information was fair game. "It gives you insight about her," said Joanel Williams, a 37-year-old high school teacher from Hahnville, La., who fled Hurricane Gustav and was visiting relatives in Atlanta.

"What I keep asking myself is, if you can't take care of your own household, how can you take care of the nation?" said Williams. "If she

is so strong on conservative values why wasn't she able to get that through at home? My mother raised seven daughters ... None of us came home pregnant."

Others expressed the view that the pregnancy says more about McCain than Palin. Though his campaign says he knew about the pregnancy beforehand, questions persist about how thoroughly McCain vetted the candidate and how much interaction they had before he announced the surprise selection last Friday.

And the question is an important one, says political scholar Steven Cohen, because the choice of a running mate is a candidate's first major presidential decision.

Wendell Eubanks, a 46-year-old pastor from Chicago, had his doubts about Palin. "If I'm running for office, I have to lead by example," said Eubanks, a Democrat who has a Sunday gospel show on the radio. "How can you lead the country, if you can't lead your own family?"

Others argued that while Palin's problems show she's a mother with challenges like anyone else, she still has to answer for her views on sex education. She has said she opposes funding for such programs.

"No sex education in the classroom has brought results in unwanted pregnancies," said Michael Allen, a 54-year-old epidemiologist in Harrisburg, Pa., who supports Obama. As for McCain, Allen said, the episode shows that he "made a political decision without thinking much about the actual consequences."

There was also the question of whether Palin, a mother of five, should consider taking on a job such as vice president given two current demands on her as a mother: A baby with Down syndrome, and a teenage daughter soon to give birth.

One feeling seemed unanimous among voters interviewed: Sympathy for Bristol Palin herself, who surely didn't seek the kind of publicity she's being subjected to.

"If I were her ... I wouldn't want to be used as an example of how people might see my mother," said Leslie Jacobs, 20, a student in the Dayton, Ohio, suburb of Oakwood who is undecided in the race. "She's not the one who is running with John McCain."

Chicagoan Jean Kohn, a self-described "proud black Republican," said that while Bristol Palin's pregnancy should have no place in the election, her mother's honesty was admirable.

"I think just the fact that she's supporting her daughter in her decision is admirable and commendable," said Obama supporter Damita Coats, 39, a mother of two young children in Bowie, Md.

In downtown Los Angeles, accountant Jacqueline Benyamini said she was much more concerned with the problems of unemployment, terrorism and homelessness than a personal issue with a candidate's child.

## Pet owners differ about neutering

**Q: My new boyfriend and I are both crazy about dogs. However, when I met his dog — guess what, the dog was not fixed! I feel very strongly about spay/neuter because we have too many dogs. My boyfriend says he just can't take off his dog's "parts." How can we continue our relationship? — K.C., Cyberspace**

**A:** I should really get political strategists Mary Matalin and James Carville to answer your question. Matalin is a staunch Republican, while Carville's a dyed-in-the-wool Democrat, and they've been married (happily, by all accounts) for 14 years.

Listen, I'm very much a guy, and I believe men who don't neuter their dogs are ignorant and/or squeamish. Having said that, your friend is entitled to his point of view. **A:** I'm very sorry for your loss. Parrot behavior consultant Liz Wilson says, "We don't know what killed the first bird, so don't add another without a visit to the veterinarian. Otherwise, you could kill a third bird."

Sometimes when budgies are kept together, they become incredibly attached to one another. And indeed, it's not unusual for a budgie to mourn the loss of a companion. These birds are social and have a need to bond. Wilson adds that a single budgie is more likely to bond to family members, while two budgies are more likely to bond with each other.

"This may be an opportunity (for family members) to develop a closer relationship with the bird," Wilson notes.

Of course, you may have no interest in developing a closer bond with your bird, or you may already enjoy a close relationship. If either is true, certainly adding another budgie is suggested. Wilson adds, "No one does this — but it's really right to quarantine the new bird in another room for as much as 45 days. Then, take each individually to the veterinarian before actually bringing them closer together."

Introduce the birds to each in their own cages on the opposite sides of a neutral room. After they seem accustomed to one another, instead of immediately squeezing them together into a small cage, let them out.

## Keep on moving

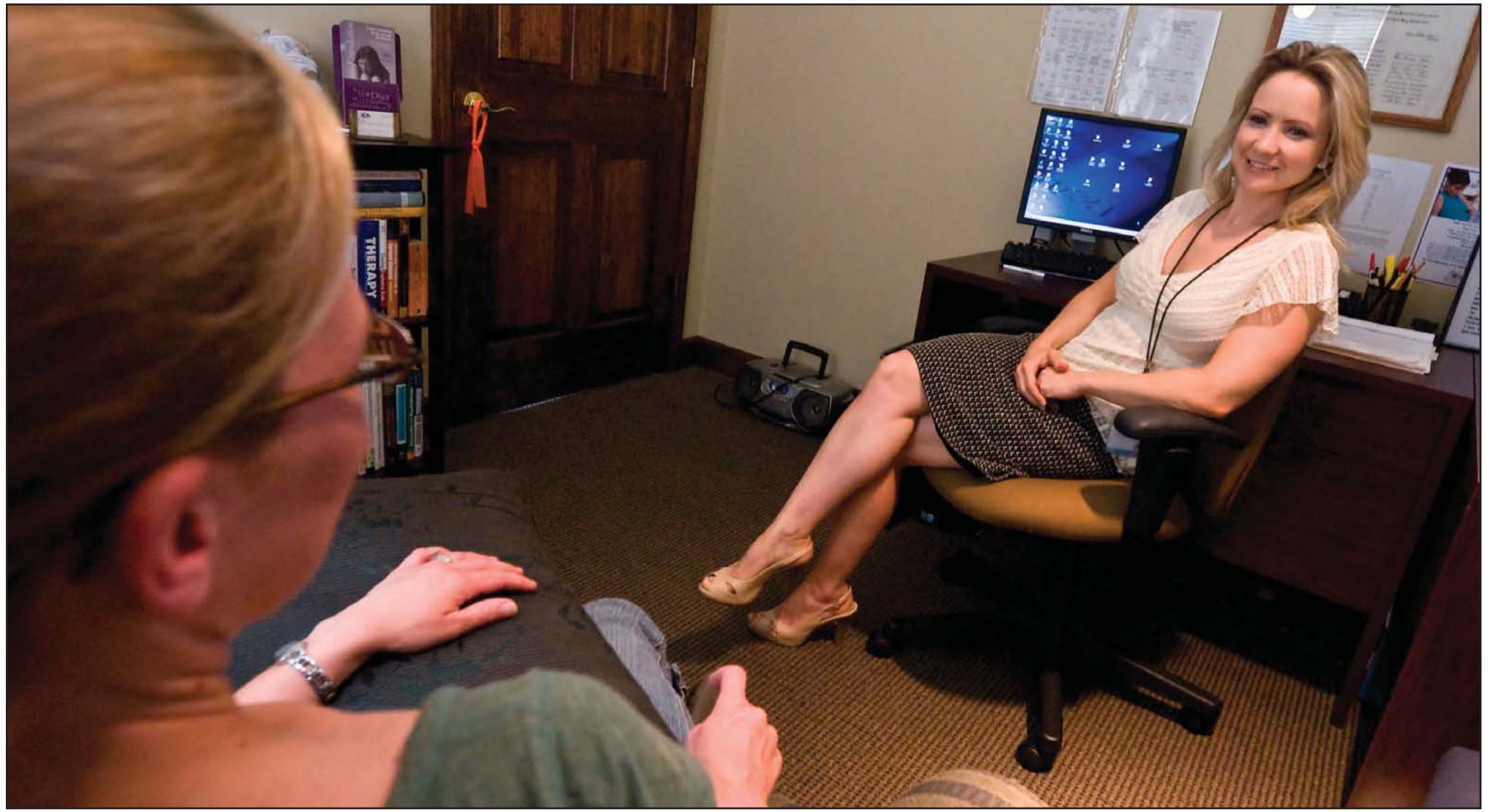

# Compelled to be thin

## More women in their 30s confronting eating disorders

**C**HARLOTTE, N.C. — Kelly had an epiphany in her car two years ago on a lunch break.

She thought about the lifestyles of other people in their early 30s, her age. They went out. They had kids. They led full lives. When she thought about her own life, she burst into tears. Her life revolved around her bingeing schedule.

Kelly's plan that day: Go home after work at 2:30, binge and purge until her husband got home. Dinner with him. Binge and purge again.

Kelly, then 30, reached two conclusions in her car that day: The eating disorder she had since she was 15 years old could kill her.

She was the only one who could stop it.

Eating disorders among women age 30 and older in the United States are increasing. Some women, like Kelly of Charlotte, N.C., have suffered from an eating disorder most of their lives. For others, there's a trigger, such as a divorce, or a parent's death. Many feel overwhelmed by aging and the pressure to look young.

The medical complications of

eating disorders tend to worsen as women age, says Angela Redlak, a clinical psychologist at the Renfrew Center Foundation in Charlotte, where Kelly is treated. They are more prone to develop osteoporosis, dental erosion, heart disease and arthritis.

The chronic pain of these conditions causes many middle-aged women — unlike teenagers and women in their 20s — to acknowledge they have an eating disorder and seek help.

### Tormented Adolescence

Growing up in upstate New York, Kelly says she was always about 40 pounds overweight. Her mom constantly reminded her of it by telling her she would buy her clothes if she lost weight. When Kelly started to like boys, she noticed they weren't attracted to overweight girls.

She was 15 when she read a magazine article about anorexia and bulimia and decided that would be the easiest way to get thin. As soon as school let out for summer break after Kelly's sophomore year, she started dieting. When she went back to school in the fall, she'd lost 35 pounds. She weighed 123 pounds,

a normal weight for her 5-foot, 5-inch, small-boned frame. But she didn't feel thin enough, and six months later, her weight dropped to 95 pounds. She was hospitalized and diagnosed with anorexia.

During her treatment, she met some girls with bulimia, so she started bingeing and purging, too. She later dropped out of the program because she didn't feel she needed help.

When people told her she looked too skinny, she felt emboldened to get even skinnier. Then Kelly's two best girlfriends walked away from her. Boys mocked her by making vomiting noises when she passed by in the school hall.

Once, those boys got to Kelly — or got through to her.

"I had on a bathing suit, and two guys walked by and said, 'Oh my God, look at that girl! She looks like a skeleton,'" she said. "I thought I looked so good. It really struck a nerve. I started eating."

She gained weight. Her life became normal. But two years later, Kelly's longtime boyfriend was killed in an ATV accident.

Kelly turned to drugs, then alcohol. She started eating. By the time she stopped starving herself, she was two months into a new relationship. She tried hiding her disorder, but every once in a while he suspected something. She would tell him to mind his own business. "My personality was nasty,

miserable, very unhappy," Kelly said.

### Making treatment real

Still, they married and moved to Charlotte three years ago. But Kelly's eating disorder moved with her.

A while after Kelly's lunch-break epiphany, she contacted the Renfrew Center in south Charlotte shortly after it opened in June 2007. The brick colonial-style house feels cozy rather than clinical. The rooms for group therapy are named "inspiration" and "serenity."

"Eating disorders are very deceptive by nature," says Redlak, Renfrew's clinical supervisor. To help pull women out of their disorder, Renfrew uses traditional talk therapy, group therapy, couples and family therapy.

When Kelly started going to group therapy, she was with younger girls. It made her feel bad to be reminded of how at that age, she felt invincible to the effects of eating disorders.

When Kelly was in her 20s, she wanted to be a state trooper. But when they called her to take the physical test, she declined. She knew she couldn't do it.

Looking back, she thinks she would have pursued a career had she not suffered from an eating disorder. Now she works at a delivery company.

### ABOUT EATING DISORDERS

■ 79 percent of deaths from anorexia occur in people who are older than 45.

■ 20 percent of adults overcome their eating disorder, compared with an 80 percent recovery rate among adolescents.

■ 80 percent of eating disorders start out as diets.

■ Ten million women in the United States have an eating disorder, according to the National Eating Disorders Association.

### Affecting more women

After a year of therapy, Kelly says she is finally discovering who she is.

"I realize I'm worth more than what I was doing to myself," she said.

She and her husband travel and go out with friends. She cooks dinner for two people instead of 25, which she used to do for her binges.

Kelly says she grew out of her eating disorder. "As I got older," she said, "it became a burden, a bad, dirty habit that needed to be broken."

Between 20 and 30 percent of Redlak's patients are over 30, and the number is growing.

## Shoulder problem left untreated could mean surgery down the road

**Q: I have had pain in my shoulder for 2 months. I thought it would go away on its own like it has in the past. Could I be causing myself more trouble by doing nothing about my problem?**

**A:** The shoulder is the third most common part of the body treated by chiropractors (the lower back and the neck are the first two). Let these problems go untreated? Only if you're up for some surgery down the road. By the way, surgery is followed up by rehab that is similar to the treatment to prevent the surgery in the first place.

Shoulder pain often times begins in the cervical spine, the upper portion of the spine, through which pass the nerves that stimulate the shoulders, arms and hands. This is known as radiating pain. If these nerves are irritated, shoulder

muscles can become weak or tight and throw the joint's function out of sync.

Tennis, golf and any other sport or activity that requires lots of repetitive motion can strain the joint muscles. As the pain worsens, people tend to simply reduce the use of the shoulder and limit movement to ease the pain. This is risky business because the shoulder will simply adjust to the new range of motion. Ultimately, a person won't be able to use the shoulder. This condition is referred to as "frozen shoulder"

and is an extreme case of loss of motion.

I have found manipulation under anesthesia very effective to speed the recovery of this problem.

Chiropractic treatment can correct muscle imbalances and realign any cervical vertebrae that may be irritating nerves and causing the problem. Visit a chiropractor if you're dealing with pain in the shoulder — or anywhere else.

## Red Cross to hold 'Fire Sale'

Proceeds benefit those affected by fire losses

The American Red Cross is having a fire sale—and with good reason. River Valley Chapter, which serves Monongalia, Preston and 10 other counties, expects to respond to 25 percent more house fires than last year.

The fire sale, which will take the form of a live auction Sept. 13 at Mountaineer Mall, will raise money to help ensure that River Valley Chapter is prepared to assist people displaced or otherwise affected by fire, according to Executive Director Judith Ballangee.

“As a result, we must be prepared to respond to as many as 100 home fires before spring,” Ballangee said.

West Virginia ranks second

nationally in the number of house fires that the Red Cross responds to. Each year the organization helps thousands of fire families. In 2007, the River Valley Chapter assisted more than 80 such families and provided more than \$80,000 in direct financial assistance. The River Valley Chapter hopes to raise \$75,000 in preparation for this year's fire season.

The “Fire Sale” will begin with an 8-10 a.m. preview with live auction to follow.

“We are most grateful to auctioneer Tom Wade who is donating his services for the event and will call the auction,” Ballangee said.

Ballangee also emphasized that people can contribute by donating as well as buying items.

“Items already donated include an antique piano and a low-mileage 1978 Mercedes Benz 450 SLE in nearly pristine condition,” she said.

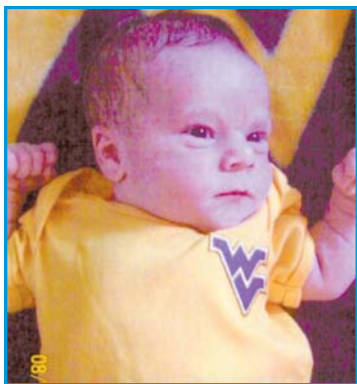

## Classification determines salary increases

**WE HAVE ALL SEEN** how property values have skyrocketed in parts of Preston County. All those increasing values are helping us to move up the ranks of county classifications.

Preston is currently a Class III County. That's on a scale of one to 10, based on the assessed evaluation of property in the county. Other Class III counties as of July 1, according to the State Auditor's Office, include Fayette, Hancock, Jackson, Logan, Mineral, Mingo, Randolph and Wayne.

Around us, Monongalia, Marion and Harrison Counties are Class I; Taylor and Tucker are Class VI; and Barbour County is in Class VIII.

Charles R. "Bud" Whetsell, who served as Preston County's assessor from 1977-2000, recalls that at one time Preston was as low as Class V. Under the classification at the time, that meant we had to have about \$200 million in assessed property evaluations — that's 60 percent of the market value of all real estate in the county — to move up to Class IV.

"When I took office, the assessments were about \$124 million," Bud recalled. "And when I left office, it was about \$650 million."

Compare that with our current assessed evaluation of \$1,499,267,240, according to the state. That puts us at the high end of the rest of Class III. Mineral is at the low end, at \$1,043,313,539, according to the State Auditor.

Part of our assessment increase is due to construction, as we become more and more a suburb of Morgantown. Referring to a property database, Preston Assessor Terri Funk found that 194 new homes were built in Preston in 2005, 221 in 2006 and 157 last year. And while homes built 30 years ago retailed for about \$30,000 or so, today they start closer to \$150,000.

And the upswing in assessments isn't just because of new homes, Terri notes., it's also "the value of the land and the old houses, if they've been maintained."

Periodically, the legislature changes the numbers in classifications to accommodate the reality of the real estate market. Classifications are set by state code 7-7-3.

So, as a former editor used to ask us when he read our masterpieces of journalism, "What's in it for me? Why should I care?"

Well, county officials' salaries, which are paid with our tax dollars, which are collected on those evaluations, are based on the county classification.

Current Class III base salaries for elected officials, according to West Virginia Secretary of State Betty Ireland's office, include \$35,640 for each of our three county commissioners, \$53,460 for the county clerk and circuit clerk, \$92,200 for the prosecuting attorney, and \$43,890 for the sheriff and assessor.

When we go up a class, salaries go up.

"That's basically pretty much it. That determines the salary for all office holders," Bud said.

And an increase could come soon. Kim Osborne, director of communications for the State Department of Revenue, notes that by law class sizes can only change in even years.

"So the classes can change this year," Osborne said.

In order for salaries to change, county commissions have to request the change to the state, and the county has to verify that there's enough money in the budget for the added expense.

Throughout September, many community members will be gathering at friends' houses, donning their hats, sipping tea and tasting cucumber sandwiches and scones, jam and clotted cream.

The purpose for the tea parties — which are known as "Tea for Shelley" — is to raise money for the Shelley A. Marshall Foundation. The foundation, created by Donn Marshall after his wife, Shelley, died in the Sept. 11 terrorist attacks on the Pentagon, aims to promote writing, reading, arts and even tea in nursing homes.

Donn Marshall and his mother, Phyllis, are organizing the event which encourages community members to hold teas in their own homes, invite friends and collect money to donate to the foundation.

Why tea parties? Donn Marshall said Shelley and Phyllis used to host tea parties for their friends while Shelley was in town. It became a sort of tradition for the two, even spawning a famous recipe for cucumber sandwiches.

"Shelley discovered that when people get together over tea there's a difference in how they behave. They're more elegant," Donn Marshall said. "They don't rush things. You make connections with people that you usually don't have time to make."

While tea parties have become common for the foundation, this is the first time it is encouraging community members to have their own teas. Because of the continuing strain and diminishing funds of charities all across the country,

Phyllis and Donn Marshall thought this might be a good way to obtain funds, keep costs minimal and let community members socialize with each other.

The foundation is asking each person who hosts a tea party to suggest a donation amount from each of their guests, Phyllis Marshall said. Plus each person who attends a party and donates money to the foundation will be entered into a drawing to win a set of Vera Bradley luggage, donated by The Elegant Alley Cat.

Jaci Dempsey, who plans to host her own tea party toward the end of September, said the event is a unique way to raise funds and have a good time while doing it. She said the teas can be either formal or casual and are usually held in the afternoon, although some people are planning to have brunch tea parties. She plans to serve tea in an inherited silver tea set originally owned by her great-grandmother.

So far, about 25 tea parties are planned here in Morgantown and also in Virginia, where Shelley Marshall grew up, Dempsey said. Dempsey has known Phyllis Marshall since moving to Morgantown 15 years ago but never got to meet Shelley. But she does share Shelley's love for tea parties.

While many are now remem-

bering those who were lost in the Sept. 11 terrorist attacks, Dempsey said she hopes people will turn to each other and participate in "one of the most civilized things we can do." The tea parties will help people connect while raising money for a good cause, she said.

"I have to give him (Donn Marshall) credit for doing something so positive in the wake of something so horrible," Dempsey said.

After discovering that Shelley was one of the victims in the terrorist attacks, Donn Marshall talked to one of the grief counselors helping the families. The counselor told him he needed to "give sorrow a meaning." It was then he decided to start the foundation that would bear his wife's name.

"The way you banish darkness is to create light," Donn Marshall said.

Because one of the things Shelley enjoyed was writing, the organization encourages people to write short stories and share them with others through readings and creative writing contests. Monthly children's story hours, tea parties at Mapleshire and Sundale, and art workshops are also part of the organization's goals.

Seeing people succeed from this help is rewarding, Donn Marshall said.

"The goal is to encourage humanity," he said. "It's art, it's creativity, it's compassion."

Donn estimates the organization has touched the lives of more than 100,000 people.

And it's also helped him heal, as well as his children, Drake, 10, and Chandler, 8, who were very young when their mother died. "The nice thing is," Donn Marshall said, "through the foundation, the kids get to learn more about their mother."

8 slices of white bread (Pepperidge Farm works best)

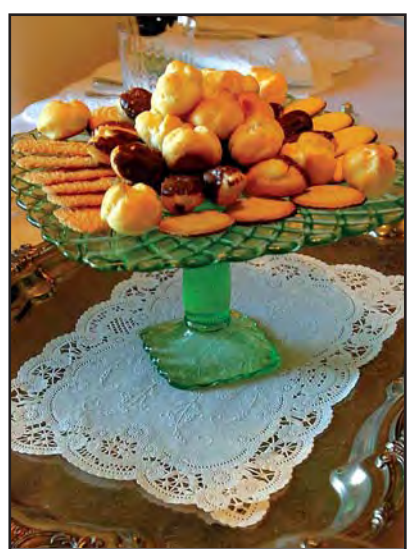
**Fresh dill for garnish**

## Man should not judge woman's faith based on her fashion sense

**Q:** Recently, my father asked me if I'd attend a particular social gathering to talk to a woman who'd be there. She had said she would write up a document for my dad, and when he tried to call her, he got her fax machine instead. I agreed to attend the gathering to speak with her.

The woman was attractive and was wearing a low-cut blouse showing off quite a lot of her chest. Needless to say, as a single man, it was best for me not to interact with her, but I was on an errand for my father.

Perhaps I should have prayed about it first, and the Holy Spirit would have led me to avoid this gathering. If the Holy Spirit was leading me, then I sinned because I failed to hear God accurately. To cut to the chase, I talked to the woman, got the information I needed and left immediately.

I know this woman has

heard the Gospel message. She might even have made a statement of faith, yet she has not applied herself to learn the Word of God so the Holy Spirit might convict her about the way she dresses. I admit that a very spiritual man would transcend sexual desires, but the flesh is strong and subduing it requires constant vigilance. Do you agree? — T., via e-mail.

A: I want to respond to your somewhat troubling but, I believe, deeply sincere question in two ways.

First, let me address you personally. I wish there was a biblical verse I could quote to you that went something like this: "Thus

saith the Lord: Chill out, dude." The closest I can find is Matthew 7:5, in which Jesus says: "Thou hypocrite, first cast out the beam out of thine own eye; and then shalt thou see clearly to cast out the mote out of thy brother's eye." (OK, in this case it was a sister's chest and not her eye, but you get the idea.) I agree with Jesus.

Judge yourself before you judge a woman whose fashion sense you disapprove of but whom your father sought out for legal assistance. You're far too focused on this woman's cleavage and not nearly focused enough on your sexual fantasies and your tendency to judge others superficially and unfairly.

I hope you can find a way to love a woman for what she is on the inside, and I hope and pray that seeing a voluptuous woman will not send you running from the room in fear of sin. Living a non-judgmental life is not right, but condemning people who've

done nothing profoundly wrong is simply not using sound spiritual judgment. Frankly, your stance is more than a little unsettling. Remember the old adage about not judging a book by its cover? You also can't tell a sinner by her tank top!

The larger social issue raised by your question concerns the spiritual value of modesty. Modesty of dress is a valid issue to consider, but even more important is modesty of speech. For adults, there's also much leeway with regard to what constitutes a breach of modesty.

This woman who sent you into a spiritual crisis is an adult, and although I don't want to fuel your obsessions further, I do feel that in today's culture how we dress our daughters — or allow them to dress — raises serious spiritual and moral questions.

As school begins again, I hope parents will recover the courage to face down their daughters who

dress in a sexually provocative, immodest manner, engage them lovingly and explain that their bodies are not their finest public assets, nor their only path to popularity.

Parents should explain thoughtfully that the way we dress speaks volumes about how we wish to be viewed by others. This is not about how all the other kids dress or how the popular kids dress, or if they have the freedom to make their own sartorial choices. This is about reclaiming a level of modesty in our personal and public life. Remember that the first gifts of God to Adam and Eve were fig leaves to cover their nakedness.

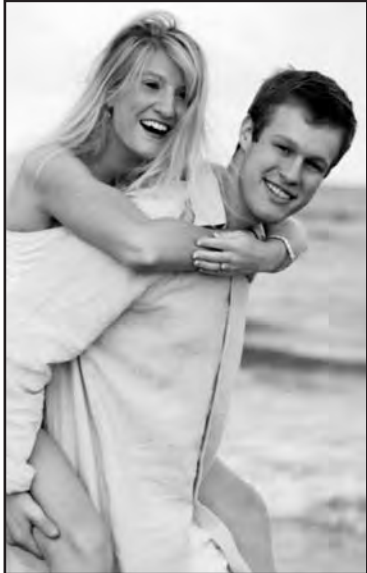
Then, if that loving conversation does not go well, there's always the tried and trusted backup: "You are NOT going out of this house dressed like that!"

**An ad for a husband brought her dream**

ALISO VIEJO, Calif. — The letters arrived by the handful at her cramped apartment in Ukraine. All written by men from around the world answering an ad she placed to find a husband.

Finally, one caught her attention. It contained a picture of a man with a dark mustache.

I live in California, he wrote. Not far from Disneyland.

What is this Disneyland, she wondered?

But she liked his mustache. And his sense of humor. So she wrote him back.

What happened over the next nine years still seems unreal.

"Every morning I am pinching myself to find out if I am dreaming or not," she says. "If someone told me in high school that I will move to United States, I will marry capitalist, I will write my own book, I would never believe it. Never. Never."

Alyona Nickelsen was born in 1971 in Ukraine when you could still get thrown into jail for listening to the BBC.

The day after her 8th birthday, her mother called her in from playing hopscotch to say, with eyes red, that her father, standing there next to his suitcase, was leaving the family; and so tell him goodbye. Alyona cried so hard as he walked away that she couldn't catch her breath. They never saw him again. The only legacy he left his daughter was her appearance. Her dad was from Middle Asia, so she didn't look like all the other Slavic girls. And in a small village in a communist country where looking and acting alike is expected, this was a problem.

"I was a skinny little girl, and they hated me," she says. On top of that, "I was very stubborn and, how to say, I like to be an individual."

In fifth grade, she got an assignment to sketch a portrait of someone. Drawing leaders of the communist party was forbidden.

"Guess what?" she says. "I drew Lenin."

She got an A, but only because it was a good depiction of the dictator. Art was her talent and her escape. In Ukraine the sky was often gray. The clothes, worn and washed so many times, were faded. The streets dirty. Putting color on paper was her sunshine.

In seventh grade, she and her mom and grandma left their village for city life in Kiev, moving into a collective apartment. Four families shared one bathroom and one phone. Curtains divided the bedrooms. "You didn't have any place to cry," she says.

After high school, she told her mom she wanted to be an artist. You will starve to death, came the response. Be an accountant. So she went to the university. "I hate accounting... But oh, well, now I know something about account-

ing," she says.

One day in college she met a guy walking down the street. Two months later they married. Then came a child, Roman. But her husband turned cruel. She divorced him and moved back in with her mother. She was 27.

"Wait a minute," she thought one day. "Why I stick with this country?"

She bought an English book and began to memorize words and phrases like "How do you do?" Then she mailed her bio and picture to an agency "to meet and make happy marriage with some kind of foreign man."

The letters poured in. "Oh, gosh, hundreds of letters, from all over the world." A banker from Luxembourg, a real estate agent from Canada, a financier from Italy. "I'm telling you, it was something crazy."

She nearly went broke buying postage to mail them all back polite "Thank you, but no thank you," letters. All except Tom Nickelsen,

a database designer who had married and divorced in his younger days and now lived in a place called Aliso Viejo, Calif. After exchanging several letters she gave him her friend's e-mail address so they could communicate by computer.

Two months later Tom visited Kiev. Before the end of the week, he dropped down on one knee in her apartment while her mom was in the kitchen and asked her to marry him. In August, 1999, on her 28th birthday, Tom escorted Alyona and her son on a plane to Orange County, Calif. She arrived with a single suitcase.

The next day he took her to Ralphs. She needed deodorant, she told him. He steered her to the right aisle. After 15 minutes, Tom went back to the aisle to find her standing there in tears. In Ukraine, she had stood in lines two blocks long for a lousy bar of soap. Here were shelves of deodorant. "I cried so much," she says. She went home

Now Random House is publishing her book, "Colored Pencil Painting Bible," due in book stores in March. And next week the 37-year-old launches her own online colored pencil painting school to teach her technique in which she blends up to 30 layers of colored pencil, using mineral spirits to toy with the pigment. Artists from the Netherlands to India quickly filled the first course.

She finds it all a bit surreal, nearly as unbelievable as the fact that she has a typical American high school boy who plays basketball and bags groceries at the very Ralphs where she once cried in the deodorant aisle; a Republican husband who calls her darling; and a 28-pound cat.

"I chased my dream and I got it," she says. "It's here." Believe it.

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**Don't keep plans for kids a secret**

EX-ETIQUETTE

**Q:** My ex asked my son to be available today to help him finish painting a house that he's trying to "flip." We have had plans for months for that day — we were trying to surprise my son and so he didn't know. My 14-year-old son had to call his father to tell him. (I was fully prepared to call his dad myself.) My ex obligates my son to do things when my son is with me without discussing it directly with me first, putting my son in the middle. What's good ex-etiquette in this case?

**A:** Obligating a child to do anything on a day he's designated to be with the other parent without talking to the other parent first is very bad ex-etiquette. But planning something for your son without letting his other parent in on the plans may have contributed to the difficulty. You may have been afraid that Dad would spill the beans — and it wasn't a day designated for him, so it is understandable that it was not mentioned. If Dad had known, however, he may not have asked for the visitation change on that particular day. Many times we think, "It's all their fault," but we may have contributed to the problem without even knowing it. Want to undermine that ex who

drives you crazy? Make cool plans for the kids on a day when they're supposed to be with their other parent — and then act as if it was all a big mistake. Your ex looks like the bad guy when the kids can't go and you can plead complete innocence. Meanwhile, who is in the middle and suffering? Say it with us, everyone: the kids. Not only are they disappointed that they can't do whatever really cool thing was planned, but they also feel pressure from their battling parents. It's no longer about spending quality time with the kids, it's about who can one-up the other to lure the kids to their front. Bad, bad, bad ex-etiquette.

If either parent has special plans for your child, alert and swear to secrecy the other parent. If either parent wants time with the child on a day not designated for visitation, the parents plan it, then tell the child.

# The heroes of Flight 93

National Park Service brochure

On the morning of Sept. 11, 2001, four commercial airliners were hijacked shortly after takeoff in a planned attack against the United States.

Two of the flights were deliberately flown into the twin towers of the World Trade Center in New York City, resulting in the loss of 2,792 lives, including plane crews and passengers, building occupants, and rescue workers. A third plane was flown into the Pentagon in Arlington, Va., taking the lives of 125 in that building, and all 64 on board the plane.

A fourth plane, Flight 93, did not leave the airport on schedule. After a 41-minute delay on the runway, the flight left Newark (N.J.) Airport at 8:42 a.m. and began its journey to San Francisco. But at 9:36 a.m., as the Boeing 757 was nearing Cleveland, Ohio, it abruptly changed course, turning southeast toward the nation's capital.

Shortly before 10 a.m., it was observed flying low and erratically over southwestern Pennsylvania. Just after 10 a.m. the plane crashed, at an estimated speed of more than 500 miles per hour, into a reclaimed strip mine at the edge of the woods in Somerset County, Pa.

Emergency responders arriving at the scene minutes after the crash found no survivors. All 33 passengers, seven crew members, and the four hijackers were killed.

### While visiting

The temporary memorial is located on a very windy hilltop. Most visitors find the site much colder than the place from which they came. The memorial is not lighted at night.

Somerset County has adopted the following policies regarding the site:

(1) no solicitation, concessions, brochures, signs or advertisements are permitted; (2) overnight parking or loitering at the site are prohibited; (3) planting of trees, flowers or shrubs will not be allowed; and (4) no structures are to be installed at the site.

The Flight 93 Temporary Memorial is a place for quiet reflection and expressions of respect. Help maintain the dignity of the site by not smoking or bringing pets, food or drink into the memorial area.

Visitors may write their thoughts or simply record their visit in bound books or on comment cards provided at the temporary memorial. These

books and comment cards will be archived as part of the Flight 93 permanent collection. Please do not write on memorial tributes left by others.

Groups planning to place large tributes at the site or organizing programs to be held there are asked to contact the Chairperson of the Temporary Memorial Committee of the Flight 93 Memorial Task Force (814) 443-4557.

The Temporary Memorial is located on private property. Please respect the owner's rights by not trespassing beyond the shale area of the memorial and the paved parking areas.

The crash site itself, located about 500 yards south of the temporary memorial, is accessible only to family members of those killed on Flight 93. Somerset County Sheriff's deputies are on duty at the site 24 hours a day.

Finding decor for the home in Morgantown can be made possible through the assistance of area artists, curators and interior decorators.

At Appalachian Gallery, Laurie Nugent and Penelyn Peterson serve as curators and business partners and are available to guide citizens in their search.

For example, Peterson said the color block collages of Nell Milne would enhance and highlight heirloom family quilts. "Nell's work is very whimsical and would work well with fabric. Her collages are fun and amusing," she said.

Milne, who is 90 years old, offers her collages as contrasts of movement, color, and layer and in price ranges from \$136 and up to \$334.

For the outdoorsmen and for wildlife enthusiasts, there are the wildlife scenes of Glenn Barnes and Don Whitlatch. Whitlatch's work has

appeared on the cover of magazines such as Wonderful West Virginia. Between the two artists, there are prints depicting howling wolves, screech owls, white tail deer, turkeys, ring neck pheasants, mourning doves and more. The price of the prints begins at \$40 and goes up to \$297.

In addition to the wildlife prints, Appalachian Gallery sells the wood-carvings of Randy Williams. Williams carves and then paints depictions of fish.

"I use American Chestnut wood. Some of the trees I have used were 300 years old. I find the right wood out in the forest, rough cut the patterns, and paint them," Williams said.

For those who are passionate about dance, the photography of Sue Amos offered at Appalachian Gallery would be a find. Amos captures the beauty of motion with film. Her work reflects the spins and sweeping motion of her sub-

jects: ballerinas. The matted, framed art would be ideal for a family drawing room and range in price from \$136 and go up to \$334.

Appalachian Gallery also carries the drawings of Ken Bauer. Bauer's drawings — many of birds — show an attention to detail. Among the selections are geese nesting, swans under moonlight, a crow with a cornstalk, blue jays with balloons, and a hummingbird in search of nectar.

paint colorings, room layout, and specialty area rugs. I use local suppliers. I have the store on Brockway that has accessories, fabrics, and drapery treatment. I will special order to custom design for personal space," Lingle said.

The fee Lingle charges depends on the time, scope and sequence of the work.

"People actually can save money with an interior designer because they are not making costly mistakes such as buying furniture that doesn't fit," Lingle said.

Lee Mullet, another Morgantown based interior designer and WVU interior design instructor, said — in the end — decorating the home depends on whose home it is.

"My motto is 'obsessing for you,'" he said. "I help people figure out how they want to live and how to achieve it. I bring an elegance that is very livable, a comfortable elegance."

## City gardeners prefer the backyard to the grocery store

DETROIT — Most evenings, usually before the family sits down for dinner, you'll find Francine Creer and four of her children in the backyard of their home on Detroit's northwest side.

They're either removing weeds or gathering lettuce and peppers for the dinner salad from a plot they call "Matthew's Garden," so named because it was 13-year-old Matthew's idea to start it.

Matthew, you see, got a little tired of his mom telling him she didn't have money to buy one thing or another that he wanted.

A vegetable garden could help reduce the food bill and leave more money for other things, he decided.

This year marks the Creers' second and bigger garden.

They're among an increasing number of city gardeners, including metro Detroiters, growing vegetables for reasons ranging from reducing food costs and increasing food safety to the simple joy of watching something grow and go from the garden to the food table.

Gardens appear to be popping up all over.

No one keeps track of the number or kinds of gardens. But statistics from the Detroit Garden Resource Program Collaborative, an information and support network, give an indication based on those signed up with the program. It reports that from 2005 to 2008 the number of family gardens grew from 79 to 220, and

the number of community gardens grew from 80 in 2005 to 115 this year.

But untold numbers of gardens have no connection to the resource program.

Ruth Gretzinger of Ann Arbor, Mich., calls hers a "victory garden," a tribute to home gardens that were popular during World Wars I and II.

"The idea was we're at war and everything costs too much to buy, so why not grow your own," said Gretzinger, a University of Michigan

writer and Web project manager.

She planted less than she'd initially planned, but still her tomatoes, peppers, parsley, oregano and lettuce have put a small dent in her grocery bill.

"Normally, I would have bought tomatoes at least once a week and I haven't had to buy any," said Gretzinger, a single mom with a 17-year-old daughter, Elizabeth, who's bound for Central Michigan University this fall. "Every little bit helps. The other

night, I made myself a BLT with my own lettuce and tomatoes and that was pretty nice."

James Smith, 82, turned the land where three houses once stood near his Detroit home into a home for collards, string beans, lima beans, Crowder peas, squash, peppers and more. There's enough to feed the retired Ford worker's 11 adult children, his grandchildren — he says he has about 30 — and "I don't know how many great-grandkids." And he still has enough to share with neighbors and friends.

"I was raised on a farm and I've always liked it," said Smith, who was born near Selma, Ala., but has lived in Detroit most of his adult life. "Where I came from, if you didn't grow food, you didn't eat."

Robin and Steve Reisig have had a garden at their Sylvan Lake home for several years, primarily to eat healthier.

This year they decided to try something different — edible landscaping. Where grass once grew, there's now an assortment of fancily arranged vegetables and herbs, including beets, tomatoes and peppers.

"It wasn't about the cost; it was mainly the quality of the food and the fun of doing it," Steve Reisig, 59, said. "But eventually, we will probably save money. Some of the tomatoes we're growing cost \$3 to \$5 each at Whole Foods."

Matthew Creer, 13, said there wasn't one incident that led him to think of the garden, just what sounded to him

like too many "no" or "maybe later" answers. His mom, Francine, has been on disability since she suffered a back injury in 2000 while working as an EMS technician.

After seeing a big cabbage his sister Suyvann, 11, grew, Matthew got the idea that maybe he could grow vegetables, too. She won second place in a contest for the biggest cabbage at Gesu School about three years ago.

He learned about gardening by helping out fellow church members at a community garden at Gesu, the nearby parish his family attends.

The garden has become a family project.

They have string beans, radishes, carrots, beets, broccoli, eggplant, varieties of lettuce and tomatoes and more.

"I hardly have to go to the vegetable aisle of the grocery store anymore," said Francine Creer, 50, who has three adult children in addition to the four at home. "There's a lot we don't have to buy because we grow it in our garden."

The savings have enabled the children to go to the movies and a carnival, they say.

And the benefits have grown beyond money, Creer said.

She's found working in the garden together a good way for them to enjoy one another's company.

"There's no TV or video games or computers on when we're in the garden," Creer said. "They get to talking and I get to listen to what's going on in their lives."

# Stove ranges come in a variety of energy-efficient options

Dear Jim: I am remodeling my kitchen and need a new range hood which is quieter and provides more light than my old one. Are there efficiency differences among them? Does just opening a window work as well?

and heat and provide pleasant fresh air.

For other times of the year or when you are cooking greasy foods or foods with a strong odor, running the range hood is much more energy efficient and effective. Just opening a window requires much more air flow than a range hood directly over the range for effective ventilation. Also, greasy droplets tend to settle out of the air before they ever reach the window.

Energy Star ([www.energy.gov](http://www.energy.gov)) has a list of range hoods which meet its energy efficiency requirements. The efficiency of

range hoods can be compared by dividing the cfm (cubic feet per minute) of air flow by the

amount of electricity (watts) each uses. Most of the Energy Star ones produce about 2.5 to 3.0

cfm of air flow per watt consumed. The type of lighting is important to reduce energy consumption. Range hoods with compact fluorescent bulbs are the most efficient and the light quality is reasonably good. Many range hoods still use halogen lighting. This is not as energy efficient, but halogen bulbs produce a very white light which is easy to work under.

It is important to properly locate and size a range hood for maximum effectiveness using the least amount of electricity. As a rule of thumb, a maximum air flow capacity of 50 to 75 cfm per foot width of the range should be adequate. Locating the range hood about 30 inches above the range is ideal, but the height is sometimes limited by cabinets over the range.

If you select an efficient, quiet range hood, only two or three speeds is adequate. Models with

totally variable speed are available for people who are particularly sensitive to the noise level and indoor air quality. A high-heat safety sensor to automatically switch it up to high speed is good.

For island-style range hoods which draw a lot of air, Broan Best models can now communicate with fresh air ventilation controls. When the hood is on, a remote damper opens to allow a controlled amount of fresh air into the home.

**IS ALL ART POTTERY ROOKWOOD?** Is all Rookwood art pottery? Does this sound like an exercise in a college logic class? The answers to the Rookwood questions are "No" and "No." Art pottery in the United States was first made in Cincinnati in the 1870s. The pottery was hand-thrown and hand-decorated, so each piece was unique. The successful American potteries became larger and hired specialists to shape, design and decorate art wares. Experts say the art pottery movement ended by the 1930s, when studio potters began working alone or in small groups to make unusual pieces, and larger pottery companies turned to mass production. Rookwood was one of the first, and probably the most famous of the U.S. art potteries. It was open from 1880 to 1967, then closed and reopened in 2006. Rookwood made art pottery and what is now called "production wares" during its first life. Production pieces were mass-produced commercial wares that were less expensive because they required less labor. Pieces included small molded bookends, ashtrays, fig-

urines, candlesticks and vases. A single-color matte glaze was usually used, and there was no hand-painting. Because the shape was formed in a mold and an overall glaze was used, the pieces were not unique. Collectors today pay high prices for many pieces of early Rookwood. The best of the art pottery sells for tens of thousands of dollars; production pieces sell for much less, often less than a few hundred dollars.

**Q: I have a patchwork quilt that has some squares that seem to be painted. They all have exactly the same design of flowers. Could it be old? I have seen quilts with embroidered designs but not painted ones.**

A. Painted and stenciled patches for quilts have been used since the early 1800s. They are rare, though. Embroidered designs took a long time to create, and painting looked very much the

same but took less effort. You could even get pre-cut stencils and stencil the designs on plain fabric.

**Q: Up in the rafters of our house, we found a washboard that says "Mother Hubbard Roller Washboard." It has to be an antique. Is it?**

A: Mother Hubbard Roller Washboards were made from the turn of the century until 1935. Four brothers named Hubbard founded the Hubbard Mill in Dover, Ill., to make the washboards. As production increased,

the factory moved to larger facilities in nearby towns and the washboards were shipped across the country. They were sold door-to-door for years. The popular washboard had threaded maple rollers that rolled in opposite directions. The screw threads did most of the work, making washing easier for the user. Production ceased when the electric washing machine took over in American households. Old washboards sell for \$5 up to \$400, depending on make and condition. Mother Hubbard boards tend to sell for higher-than-average prices.

**Q: I was given four unlabeled amber glass violin-shaped bottles many years ago. They range from 4 3/4 to 11 inches in height. The three largest are embossed "Federal law forbids sale or re-use of this bottle." All four are embossed "Des. Pat. 107353." There's another mark, "OI" in a square. What can you tell us?**

A: Some people specialize in collecting bottles shaped like fiddles. The first violin bottles apparently were made in France in the middle of the 19th century. But most fiddle bottles found by U.S. collectors were made in this coun-

try between 1900 and 1940. Any bottle marked with the "Federal law" phrase on yours was produced between 1933 and 1964 (collectors say these bottles are from the "nasty words era"). But your bottle also can be identified by its design patent number, granted on Dec. 7, 1937, and assigned to the Bardstown Distillery of Bardstown, Ky. "Bardstown bottles" were made by Owens-Illinois and Anchor-Hocking, two Ohio glass companies that are still in business. Yours, with the "OI" mark, were made by Owens-Illinois. The bottles originally held bourbon and had paper labels. They are well-known among fiddle-bottle collectors, who prefer bottles with their original paper labels. With the labels, the bottles sell for \$15 up to about \$50, depending on size and condition.

# Don't wait for thirst: choose water first to avoid problems

**Feeling a little cranky?** Perhaps you're thirsty. But don't reach for iced coffee or pop. Go get a drink ... of water. Water is what you need to douse the potential source of the problem: mild dehydration.

According to health specialists with the West Virginia University Extension Service, being cranky is just one of the symptoms of mild dehydration. By the time you actually feel thirsty, they caution, your body already needs two cups of water.

Keeping your body hydrated is vital to your health. Did you know that you can survive up to a month without food, but you will survive less than a week without water?

WVU Extension educators remind you that water brings nutrients to all parts of your body, helps with your body's chemical reactions, regulates your body temperature, rids your body of wastes and lubricates your joints.

Protect your body. Don't wait to be thirsty. WVU Extension educators suggest that you:

- Drink 6 or more cups (8 ounces each) of water a day.
  - Choose drinks that don't have caffeine. Sodas, tea and coffee with caffeine may cause your body to lose—not gain—water.
  - Keep water bottles in the refrigerator or freezer, and grab one each time you begin a physical activity, such as riding a bike, going for a walk, playing basketball or working in the garden.
  - Track your water intake.
- Often times, people believe they are drinking more water than they actually are. Keep count of

how water you drink and adjust accordingly.

These are among the many health tips 4-H members and their families are learning through the 4-H Health Initiative. Besides following suggestions in their personal monthly planners, 4-H members are taking family activity pages home and inviting everyone to get involved in the fun and learning.

Elaine Bowen, WVU Extension health promotion specialist who is leading the initiative, said that 4-H's sustained focus on improving daily nutrition, exercise and safety habits is in response to young people's increasing health problems, including obesity and diabetes.

In Monongalia County, 4-H campers this summer were encouraged to drink plenty of water and remain physically active. Each 4-H member was issued a water bottle at the beginning of the week and were encour-

aged to refill the bottle as needed. Campers took part in recreational activities, such as games, sports, and swimming each day.

In addition, 4-H club members take part in the 4-H health initiative at every club meeting. A health officer is elected at the first club meeting and leads the 4-H members in a health lesson each meeting, which includes educational information, a physical activity, and a healthy snack.

# Homeowner groups start to feel the pinch

MILWAUKEE — "Lucky me," said Barb Privat.

She's the new president of the homeowners association for the Meadow Creek Crossing subdivision in Germantown, Wis., and the board

might have to slap a lien on three of her neighbors.

This year, Meadow Creek's annual fee rose \$50 to \$350, angering many of the owners of their houses. Now, 2 months after the payment deadline, three homeowners still haven't paid.

"We're trying to take a neighborly approach, but as it carries into next year, we'll have to put liens on their houses," Privat said. Two of the houses are for sale; if they do sell, the owners will have to clear the debt to the association before they can transfer title.

"We'll get it sooner or later," she said.

Homeowners associations aren't immune from rising costs of homeownership, from foreclosure fallout to energy prices. Representing the owners of condos in a building or single-family homes in a development, the associations typically control

budgets for routine landscaping and maintenance of common areas, plus have fiduciary responsibility for building reserves for capital improvements and repairs.

Nationally, associations are facing rising delinquency rates, says Frank Rathbun, vice president of communications for the Community Associations Institute, a Washington-area trade group for associations.

In the past, associations could assume that 3 percent to 7 percent of homeowners would be late with their fees. "Now, it's up to 10 percent to 30 percent," Rathbun said.

"Especially condo associations, where a lot of investors bought during the good times and now have taken a beating, because they paid more than the homes are worth."

Some subdivisions have little to do but mow their

patch of common area, cover liability insurance, plant some flowers and sometimes pay for snowplowing, keeping the annual fee as low as \$100.

That's what residents of Germantown's Lone Oaks pay, says association president Mary Cooper.

The fee has been the same for more than 12 years, and its built-up financial cushion is likely to cover the fuel surcharge added this year by the association's long-time landscaper. The association decided long ago to require its 115 homeowners to maintain their own lamp posts and mailboxes, adds Cooper, tamping down costs even more.

Residents of the Kettlefield subdivision in Genesee, Wis., aren't as lucky.

Back in 2005, those homeowners paid about \$130 a year, say residents. But this year, the annual fee zoomed to \$685. Waukesha, Wis., developer

Harmony Realty Inc. runs the association's board, but company officials would not comment on the increase.

Harmony lists unpaid dues from at least one homeowner as a line item in its 2008 budget. Kettlefield residents aren't the only ones stuck making up the difference when some neighbors blow off their fees, says Ed Corcoran, an attorney with Madison, Wis., law firm Murphy Desmond.

Most associations aren't having trouble meeting their budgets, despite increasing delinquencies, because they simply raise the fees to cover the shortfall. Then the association boards have to decide whether they will put liens on the houses to collect the fees, Corcoran said. He usually advises them to do it, because at the very least, the lien ensures repayment when the property changes hands.

**Q: We were house-hunting with our real estate agent recently, and she pointed out a house that had solar panels on the roof and told us that meant to her we should make a lower bid if we liked the home because the solar lowered its value. Does this make any sense to you?**

**A:** I just wish it was the first time I'd ever heard this question, but unfortunately some old misconceptions about solar energy still linger in some people's minds. I just couldn't disagree more with your agent's statement.

I've seen a number of articles over the years that prove just the opposite is true, including a story back in 1998 in which the *Appraisal Journal* reported that a home's market value went up \$20 for every dollar that the utility costs can be lowered, showing how energy-saving features and equipment make homes more valuable. I've talked to hundreds of real estate professionals in recent years who feel strongly that energy-efficient homes — those with solar water heating or solar electric systems as well as those with a variety of energy-saving features — clearly have higher resale values than homes without these features.

Funny in “reel” life? Sure. But bunk bed safety is no laughing matter in our real lives.

Despite mandatory safety standards the U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission enacted in 2000, children and young adults continue to be injured or die in bunk bed-related incidents. Falls were the most-common injury. Others included cuts, bruises and fractures.

Since then, bunk beds — metal and wooden — continue to be recalled from lesser-known brands as well as some well-respected companies, such as Lexington, Ethan Allen, Hooker and Ashley Furniture Industries. (For a list of recalls, see cpsc.gov.)

No one we interviewed rec-

ommends eliminating bunk beds from your child’s room, but they emphasize the importance of buying those that meet the latest standards, following safety guidelines in their use and educating your kids of potential hazards.

Each year, 36,000 injuries and an untabulated number of deaths result from bunk bed accidents. Here is a sampling of Florida cases from National Injury Information Clearinghouse records.

A 14-year-old Miami boy was lying in the lower half of a bunk bed when the bottom portion of the bed fell about 6 inches to the floor and caught his arm between the frame and the mattress in July 2005. The retail store repaired the bed, but three months later, the bed fell again and caught his leg between the mattress and frame. Unlike younger victims, he escaped injury both times.

Others weren’t as lucky. A 9-year-old Miami boy’s mother became concerned when her son, who was playing alone in his bedroom, was too quiet. She found him dead, hanging from the bunk bed with an elastic band around his neck in August 2004. The boy and his brother had been using the band to play with their toys.

The same month, a 19-month-old Pensacola, Fla., girl was found dead, entangled in the ladder of the bunk bed with her head and neck caught between the rungs of the ladder.

The safety issue recently was brought into the spotlight in a study conducted by The Research Institute at Nationwide Children’s Hospital in Columbus, Ohio. It was published in the June issue of *Pediatrics*, the official journal of the American Academy of Pediatrics.

Lara B. McKenzie, co-author of the study and assistant professor

at the Center of Injury Research and Policy at the hospital, said no specific event was the catalyst for the study.

“Bunk beds continue to be a common source of injury for children and adolescents,” McKenzie said in a telephone interview. “There are a lot of bunk beds that people are still using that were manufactured prior to 2000. People may have old bunk beds or self-made beds that don’t conform to the standards.”

The researchers looked at 16 years of data (1990-2005) from the National Electronic Surveillance System, which included 572,580 cases treated in U.S. hospital emergency departments.

Although some fatalities are included in the data, McKenzie said they were not included in the report because this reporting system is not a good tool for measuring fatalities. Severe cases are

often dead on the scene or are brought to trauma centers, not emergency rooms.

“What was interesting was we found 18- to 21-year-olds had more than double the number of injuries of the 14- to 17-year-olds,” she said. “Many of the older group probably sleep in bunks in college dorms or are in the military or in prisons.”

But the main concern is pediatric injuries, which can be severe and require hospital admission. Particularly at risk are children younger than 3, who are 40 percent more likely to sustain head injuries because they are top heavy and likely to land on their heads.

Dr. Deanna Soloway-Simon, medical director of pediatric emergency at Joe DiMaggio Children’s Hospital in Hollywood, Fla., does not recommend putting children younger than 6 in bunk beds.



# Cordylines’ dagger-like look soars in popularity

Daggers have become extremely popular in the garden in recent years. I’m not talking about knives, but the kind of leaves found on plants like the new Electric Pink, Purple Sensation and Cardinal.

You may be wondering what kind of plants these are, and after I tell, you still may be a little confused. These plants are all varieties of cordyline. The cordyline you are most familiar with is the Hawaiian Ti plant.

Cordylines like Electric Pink are much different. They have common names like New Zealand cabbage tree, cabbage palm and Giant Dracaena. They are even called Ti plants, although they are much easier to grow and much more cold hardy.

A few years ago, there were only a handful of varieties, with Red Sensation and Red Star being the most popular. Now producers are growing dozens with a wide range of colors and variegation.

Though I refer to them as dagger-like, landscape designers call them architectural plants. Place them in large mixed containers or in the flower border, and suddenly you have that look others hire a professional

to achieve.

Every year I go to California to see plant trials. While there, I take the opportunity to see what is in western landscapes and mixed containers at shopping malls. Invariably I get

jealous of the way they are able to use phormiums, or New Zealand flax. The bold, sword-like leaves are colorfully variegated and just scream, ‘Look at me!’ But the heat and humidity of most of the country is just too much for the phormium.

Well, guess what? The cordylines give the same look and are much better suited to summer extremes. Electric Pink stands out from a great distance with its maroon leaves edged in a shocking hot pink. It is clump-forming and reaches 2 to 4 feet tall and wide.

One of the most beautiful plantings I have seen had it as the thriller plant in a large mixed container. It was combined with the Sweet Caroline Sweetheart ornamental sweet potato that had equally colorful lime-green foliage cascading over the rim.

Cardinal also is clump-forming and should reach 4 feet tall, although its habit will be a little more upright before arching. These leaves are a variegated red-purple.

Purple Sensation is almost the reverse of Electric Pink. It has purple-maroon on the outside with reddish-pink in the middle.

Terrazzo expert restores his grandfather's handiwork

MIAMI—Strolling down Miami's Ocean Drive, Steve Toffoli's eyes dart toward the eye candy. "Check out this one," he said, pausing by an Art Deco hotel. "These two on the side are repairs; you can see the difference in the color. That one has three colors of chips in it. Sizes one and two."  
 Toffoli is spotting terrazzo, the colorful, geometric flooring found in much of South Florida's man-made landscape.  
 In 20 years as a terrazzo installer, he has made hundreds of trips to South Beach and places beyond to work on everything from grocery stores to police stations, mansions to clothing stores.  
 Since terrazzo—a mix of dyed cement and varied colors and sizes of marble chips that is poured and polished on-site—was the South Florida flooring of choice in the early and mid-20th century, Toffoli often is in charge of restorations. Yet, on his latest job, he has taken a step back into his own history.  
 A fourth-generation terrazzo man, he is restoring the floor of the Betsy Ross Hotel at 14th Street and Ocean Drive in Miami. It's a 1942 Art Deco gem designed by Lawrence Murray Dixon, who also created The Raleigh, The Marlin and The Victor. While he has no relation to Dixon, the original floor in the Betsy Ross was created

hotels, offices and public buildings. They were durable, unique and good for hot weather because they did not become as warm as other floorings.  
 Yet, from the late '60s through the early '90s, other types of flooring, especially carpet, became more popular.  
 "In the '70s and '80s, people went carpet happy. They put carpet on everything," Toffoli says. "Now, people are pulling back those carpets to find beautiful terrazzo floors."  
 Yet as terrazzo has experienced a resurgence in the last two decades, the number of dedicated terrazzo installers has dropped and new technologies have changed the ways tiles are created.  
 According to the National Tile and Terrazzo Association, there are about 3,000 dedicated terrazzo installers in the country.  
 "There used to be just one type of terrazzo," Toffoli says. Now, there are a few, including epoxy, a thin terrazzo—one inch thick compared to half-inch traditional terrazzo—that uses synthetic materials and comes pre-dyed.  
 At 3,500 square feet, it will take Toffoli six weeks to complete the pink, maroon and white Betsy Ross floor, which he began in late July. There are circles, half circles, triangles and squares to shape with brass strips.

Todd Oldham rocks his own house

NEW YORK — Half the fun of meeting Todd Oldham is getting to hang out in his Tribeca apartment, a quirky funhouse of bright colors, high-end artwork and kitschy knickknacks.  
 If you want a window into the psyche of Oldham, the multi-tasking designer known for his modern and playful style, you'd need only to scan the living room: The walls are coated in a pattern of yellow and orange vertical stripes, which clash harmoniously with the pink and green oversized rugs, and an ottoman upholstered in lady bug fabric. Artfully arranged stacks of books coexist with stuffed animals, including a sock puppet.  
 There's a blue bowl formed by melted plastic soldiers and a framed Playboy photograph of a topless Bettie Page hanging a Christmas ornament, signed by Hef himself.  
 The space is a little bit flea market, a little bit Pee-wee Herman—and all Oldham, who rose to fame in the '90s as a high-fashion designer before expanding his business into interior design and other endeavors.  
 "I don't try to describe it," he said of his personal taste. "I guess if I put words to it, I don't know, it's maybe eclectic and comfortable. ... I have more of a psychological and emotional approach toward design, just trying to make a place where people can feel fantastic or exude

some part of their personality."  
 The 46-year-old is the feel-good mentor to 13 contestants on the Bravo reality series "Top Design," which tosses aspiring interior designers into a series of rigorous challenges aimed at whittling down the competition to one winning designer. The show began its second season this week.  
 Oldham—whose resume includes designing hotels, restaurants and a line of dorm room furniture for Target—said he wouldn't have the guts to compete in the series, which follows the structure of Bravo's "Project Runway" and "Top Chef."  
 "I would not want to be a contestant on this show at all," he says. "It's just too brutal. I said it before, but this is the only show I know on TV that is a thousand times harder than what it looks. It was way, way harder than what it looked like."  
 Could he hack it?  
 "Oh, I could totally hack it! I'm just not up for it," said Oldham, whose favorite challenge was one in which his mentees were assigned to make over bomb shelters.  
 The season brings back judges Jonathan Adler, Margaret Russell and Kelly Wearstler. New to the series is leggy fashionista India Hicks, who replaces Oldham in the role as host (and utterer of the elimination catch phrase: "We can't live with your design.").

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**Q: We just had a beautiful backsplash of 2-by-6-inch white iridescent glass tile installed. Our contractor began using white grout, which really takes away from the beauty of the glass tiles, so we have postponed completion. Do you know if or where we can purchase clear grout or substitute with another material that is clear?**  
**A:** At a mosaic-tile Web site, www.mosaicartsupply.com, the clear-grout question also was asked. The answer: "Obviously, you saw some other product, probably silicon sealant. Grout is concrete."  
 In situations similar to yours, I've seen recommendations for clear silicone glue, used in the manufacture of aquariums, or clear epoxy. A clear silicone glue, Permatex Clear Silicone Adhesive Sealant, is available in auto-parts stores. It's designed to seal seams, and expands and contracts.

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Tips for getting the right shovel

 Early fall is tree- and shrub-planting time, which makes this a good time to shop for a shovel. There's no single perfect shovel for the garden; the blade and handle style you choose will depend on the task, your body, your strength and your taste. "When you go to buy a shovel, practice using it in the store," says Colleen Lockovitch, horticulturist for the Lurie Garden in Chicago's Millennium Park.  
 1. Digging: For tree planting and other hole-digging, look for a round-point shovel with a shield-shaped dish blade about 9 inches wide. A long handle, up to 48 inches, can reach down into a big hole and provide leverage. But a shorter handle with a D-shaped grip may be easier to lift with and provide more control

when tossing the dirt, according to Jeff Koenig, senior product manager for Ames TrueTemp in Camp Hill, Pa.  
 2. Edging: To make a crisp edge on turf, look for a garden or border spade, which has a rectangular, relatively flat blade with a straight bottom edge. It's also useful for dividing tough-rooted perennials such as hostas. There are long- and short-handled spades, but for edging, a D-handle style gives the best control, Koenig says.  
 3. Transplanting: To avoid damaging too many roots when digging among established perennials, use a narrow shovel. Many gardeners use a transplant spade or drain spade—actually a D-handled shovel with a narrow, round-tipped blade that is 14 or 16 inches long.

## Life goes on after success

**Q: I'm a well-educated, professional woman who has achieved a certain amount of success and financial security, but I find myself looking for more out of my life. I'd like to get new perspectives on what's working in my life, what isn't and how to move forward. Can you help?**

**A:** When you're on a search for more meaning, there's no substitute for going deep and then acting on those insights.

### The inner game

Start with understanding who you are — from the inside. Look at who you are apart from all your roles in life. Set aside business and personal roles, such as businesswoman, daughter, mother, partner or friend. What's left?

Move to how you'd like to be in the world. If you tend to use your analytical side, would you like more creative outlets? Are you showing your inner values as much as you'd like?

Look at what you do. Include professional roles, as well as other activities and interactions. Think about what's energizing and meaningful to you. Explore the gap between who you are and what you do; this will provide insight into why you don't feel fully satisfied.

These are simple questions, but they may not be easy to answer. Try these tools to help you think them through.

■ **Keep a journal.** Using the topics above, write for a set amount of time, say, 10 minutes. Don't stop until the time is up; then observe what came out.

■ **Use pictures.** This is helpful if you tend to get caught up in your head. Page through a variety of magazines, tearing out images that catch your attention. Don't think about why they interest you; just respond to the images. After you have enough, sort them into themes and see what the themes tell you.

■ **Talk.** Explore these topics with someone you trust — a partner, friend or family member. Coaches are a good resource, too. Choose people who can set aside any agenda for what they think you "should" do, and be completely open with them.

Use your inner-outer gaps to identify alternatives. Consider whether you want to do different things or simply bring a different approach to your current roles and activities.

Make an imaginative list of changes that could lead to greater richness in your life. Visualize the effects of each, trimming your list to a smaller set of changes that are ripe for exploration and action.

### The outer game

Gather information about your alternatives, make choices based on that information and begin taking action.

Explore the requirements and consequences for each choice that you're considering. If you're thinking about a career change, talk to people in the roles you're considering. If the changes are more inward, such as slowing down your pace, look for books or mentors to guide you.

Once you've made your choices, plan steps to move you toward your vision. Consider the milestones you want to achieve, the barriers you could face and the resources and support you can draw on.

### The last word

There's no recipe for ongoing growth; however, looking inside yourself can help you envision what will lead to a more fulfilling life.

One day, Dina Mutillo and Jo Watson were on the playground at Suncrest Elementary School longing for a craft center to share with their children.

Their angst grew, until they decided to start one of their own — The Wow! Factory.

Pottery, mosaics, glass fusing, scrap booking and hand building clay are among the projects geared toward individualistic expression for folks of all ages at the craft center, located at 3453 University Ave. in Star City.

Both mothers had been exposed to similar centers in other communities where they had lived prior to residing in Morgantown.

"We decided to open The Wow! Factory in September 2007, and we started putting the wheels in motion to make our dream a reality," Mutillo said.

Both Watson and Mutillo attended a pottery boot camp in Columbus, Ohio, to learn about the process of glazing pottery and firing a kiln.

"The boot camp was pretty intense, and we learned a lot," Mutillo said.

Additionally, the ladies educated themselves in the particulars of glass fusing by attending training in Texas.

"Glass fusing is melting different colors of glass together, and we wanted to be able to offer glass fusing here," Mutillo said.

At The Wow! Factory, patrons can choose to invest an hour or more in painting a piece of pottery, creating a mosaic tile, fusing glass or hand building with clay.

Patrons select an item to decorate, then the fee is determined by the chosen piece. The Wow! Factory offers all the tools for creating with its various mediums. Paints, paintbrushes, decorating tools, stamps, sponges, stencils, and glass are all included.

For pottery, customers can decorate coffee mugs, cereal bowls, pasta bowls, platters, vases, masks, banks, trophies, mermaid boxes, frogs, dragonflies, appetizer plates, wine trivets, cake plates on pedestals, salt and pepper shakers, toothbrush holders and more. Prices range from \$5 to \$25.

"We do not charge any

fees for the studio time or for the kiln firing," Watson said.

Patrons simply choose a piece, paint and decorate the pottery, leave the piece with The Wow! Factory employees for glazing, drying, and firing, before returning to pick back up.

"The process generally takes a week from start to finish for the pottery," Mutillo said.

For mosaics, The Wow!

Factory has an assortment of forms to work with. There are trivets, picture frames, mirrors, a lazy susan table and larger items. Prices for the mosaics range from \$10 to \$20. Glass and ceramic tiles in various colors are provided for gluing and grouting.

The glass fusing offers an opportunity for those who want to experiment with this art form. The Wow! Factory provides all



the materials for making items such as earrings, sun catchers, pendants, bowls and vases. The glass fuses or melts together to showcase the different colors of glass in the item created. Prices for glass fusing range from \$15 to \$35 depending on the project selected.

"We even offer glass classes where individuals can learn how to cut the glass themselves, and we

provide the cutting tools and instruments also. This may seem challenging, but most parents know what their children are capable of handling," Mutillo said.

Handling clay in the practice of hand building is another specialty that The Wow! Factory offers. The clay is provided and can be shaped into any design, pattern or shape desired. Paints and decorative materials are then provided

for the next creative phase. Ten dollars per pound of clay is the charge.

The Wow! Factory also has an inspiration lounge with two large comfortable chairs and a bookshelf filled with idea books. The idea books provide patterns, samples, pictures, and instructions for helping imaginations take flight. Mutillo and Watson also keep on hand photo albums filled with the work of happy previous patrons.

Natalie Weisse, of Morgantown, who attends college in Dallas, Texas, is among The Wow! Factory's happy patrons. Weisse, who baby-sits four children daily throughout the summer, brings her charges along to The Wow! Factory.

"This is our second trip here. It is fun to come and get out of the house. It is something to do. We have been here for three hours, and everybody has made two things," Weisse said.

Weisse painted a coffee mug with a West Virginia mountain scene in brown, blue, and green, and she wrote the words, Country Roads, West Virginia, inside the top of the mug.

Abby Royston from Trussville, Alabama, visited The Wow! Factory as part of a group who was having a party there.

"This is a great way to express yourself with paints," Royston said.

Royston was working on a pottery piece. Bailey Fordyce, of Morgantown, also praised The Wow! Factory.

"This is a cool way to be creative," Fordyce said.

The Wow! Factory also caters to groups with reservations available for a two-hour private party room.

"We have had people hold bridal showers, bachelorette parties, birthday parties and ladies-night-out parties," Mutillo said.

## When times are tough, planning for the future adds to the frustration

**SINCE THE 2001 RECESSION**, the American workforce has contributed to a robust 20 percent growth in productivity, as measured by the gross national product.

Yet seven years into this economic cycle, most middle-class American households have less inflation-adjusted income than they had when it started.

The 140-million-strong workforce has engaged in efficient, profitable production, "but when it comes to being rewarded for the work they do, that's a different story," said Jared Bernstein, co-author of "The State of Working America 2008-2009," released in part online on Aug. 26.

"Paychecks are frozen, pensions are in trouble, jobs are outsourced ... and there was uniquely weak job creation," he said.

Speaking to reporters in a conference call, Bernstein and his co-authors emphasized that it took an unprecedented four years after 2001 to regain the number of jobs lost.

The protracted "jobless recovery" saw corporate profits and executive pay rise, but sluggish job growth — at an average annual rate of just 0.6 percent from 2000 to 2007 — helped dampen wages and salaries and upward mobility for most working folk.

Particularly notable about the stagnant pay is that it affected not just the lowest-paid or least-skilled, but college-degreed, professional workers as well.

The exception in compensation gains was for the top 1 percent of earners, who have considerably widened the pay gap between themselves and other workers.

In 2004, the most recent data available, "average wealth held by

the top 1 percent was close to \$15 million, while it was \$81,000 for households in the middle fifth of the wealth distribution," the report says.

"Approximately 30 percent of U.S. households have a net worth of less than \$10,000, and approximately one in six households have zero or negative net wealth."

Stock ownership is particularly unequal, "with most Americans having no meaningful stake in the stock market," the report says.

This is bad news, given that the prospect of an economically comfortable retirement for most working Americans lies in their ability to contribute to defined-contribution pension plans or individual retirement savings accounts — most of which count on good stock market returns.

The 11th edition of the "Working America" report is a product of the Economic Policy Institute, an independent policy research organization that advocates "shared prosperity."

Allow me to diverge from the report's content for a moment to address those who dismiss EPI as a mouthpiece for unions.

Independent foundations and grants provide more than half of EPI's income, with gifts from individuals, corporations, labor unions, and other organizations making up the balance.

Founders of EPI included economists and professors from Northeastern University; the LBJ School of Public Affairs at the University of Texas-Austin; Brandeis University; and the MIT Sloan School of Management.

Yes, EPI would like to see workers of all types share in the rewards that have accrued to the topmost tier of business owners and executives, but that goal doesn't negate the veracity of the data collected by the Ph.D. economists on its current staff.

Back to the report, which zeroes in on another aspect of job deterioration (besides stagnant pay and job growth): erosion of employer-

subsidized health insurance and employer-provided pensions from 2000 to 2006.

Many workers have lost coverage or have been asked to contribute more out-of-pocket dollars to those plans.

Bernstein and colleagues Lawrence Mishel, Heidi Shierholz and Ross Eisenbrey, said data analysis led them to conclude that "You're-on-Your-Own" economic policies produced unequivocal results in the 2000-07 period.

"Families are ill-served," the report says. "For the first time in the history of data going back to 1947, middle-income families were left no better off at the end of this business cycle in 2007 than they were in 2000."

## Create a bulletproof job shield

**LET YOUR BOSS KNOW** if your spouse is seriously ill. Don't ratchet up the amount of time you spend on the job surfing the Web. And always leave work five minutes after your boss, so it looks like you're always staying late.

These are simple ways for riding out these tough times, according to Stephen Viscusi, career coach and author of the recently published book "Bulletproof Your Job."

"This is a jobs depression, and it's not the time to take really long vacations or be on Match.com," said Viscusi, who also hosts a syndicated radio show. "It's time to perfect the art of looking busy and making sure the bosses like you. Nobody's gonna fire someone they really know or like."

If you find yourself about to get a pink slip, consider negotiating your salary, Viscusi said.

"If it's really about the money or the bottom line, take a smaller salary," he said. "It will still be better than finding another job, losing your benefits and having to sit through humiliating interviews, and you can use it as an opportunity to look for something better. If they reject that idea, then you know it's not really about the money — they just want to get rid of you."

And keep tabs on your company: Set up alerts on Google and Technorati with your company's and bosses' names so you can monitor the news and online chatter they generate, Viscusi advises.

**Don't break your back**

Preparing for the new school year doesn't have to be a pain in the ... back.

Dr. Jay Triano, a chiropractor with the Canadian Memorial Chiropractic College and contributor to spine health.com, said finding a good back pack that's snug and comfortable to wear saves back-to-school back aches and pains.

"Wearing both straps is usually considered totally uncool, but it's probably the most important thing to avoid pain in your back and shoulders," Triano said. "Book bags should also be packed like groceries: heavy at the bottom, lighter stuff up at the top."

Vinyl or canvas bags are best, and padded shoulder straps and a waist strap add extra support.

Sitting in class with good posture will also reduce the strain on your neck, shoulders and lower back, Triano said. Sit with your shoulders back, chin tucked in and a gentle curve in your back; don't arch or slump forward. Twisting slightly in your seat can also reduce pressure in your spine.

"The best guideline for how long you sit without moving is 20 minutes," he said. "We usually put kids in classrooms for at least 50 minutes without giving them a break."

**Avoid office rage**

Gas prices are still high, spending is tight and economic forecasts are grim. Combine that with an annoying co-worker in the next cubicle, and you've got a recipe for some serious office rage.

Tom Musbach, managing editor for Yahoo! HotJobs, gives these suggestions to prevent an angry or off-color comment from escalating into a workplace brawl:

■ Don't take it personally. Often times, a co-worker's irritability is not related to the job but instead something that happened at home.

■ Let people vent. It's better that they voice their grievances than stew on them.

■ Walk away. Use the restroom, get a cup of coffee or use any other excuse to get yourself out of the situation.

■ If the incident is severe or repeated, you may want to document it and consult with the company's human resources department.

"Make sure you focus on specifics and particular behaviors," Musbach said. "But if it's a one-time thing, or just that they're rude or annoying, you've got to give them a little space."

## Coaches help workers stay focused

Ever sit through a meeting and have no idea what happened? With increasing distractions, most of us struggle throughout the day to stay in the present.

Now, in a budding trend, business coaches want to teach us how to have a conversation with a colleague or client without allowing our minds to drift. In *The Moment Coaching* challenges workers at all levels to stay focused at work or home.

Experts say it is the key to better relationships. Our inability to be in the present and really listen when a customer, co-worker, spouse or friend talks to us can cause us to miss crucial information.

Business coach Anese Cavanaugh, owner of Dare to Engage, said although we get stuff done, "we miss out on huge opportunities to engage and connect with other humans."

Cavanaugh's Illinois business is

designed to help managers work better with their teams. She starts by telling a manager to turn his back to his computer when someone is talking to him. "When you are in the present and pay attention to what's going on, you learn not just what's being spoken, but also the underlying emotion of a team, and that's when things open to you as leader."

Indeed, some experts say workers are discovering the greatest casualty of our mobile, high-tech age is attention. Most of us have become masters of multitasking, adept at responding to e-mail messages during meetings or while on the phone. We manage to make time for multiple distractions when we're actually trying to get work done. Yet, we feel inundated and overwhelmed.

"It's a real problem," said Harvey Sepler, a Miami appellate lawyer, who also teaches at University of Miami law school. "Often, I'm talking to someone and I'm thinking

about something I've got to do."

Sepler says when he becomes distracted at the office, he's begun to do the same thing he teaches students — get up, stretch, walk away and then come back and focus.

Workplace expert Gloria Mark discovered the average worker switches tasks every three minutes, and, once distracted, takes nearly a half-hour to resume the original task. We take our distractions home, too, spending time with our family, only to think about everything that happened at work today and what's about to happen tomorrow.

Because everyone's brain is wired a little differently, solutions vary. Miami business coach Roberto Suarez of Biz Champions says attention can be bolstered through training. He teaches office workers to use the same technique for staying in the moment as golfers — the standing meditation. In a standing position, he has them focus on body

position and silence.

Two weeks ago, Suarez held a workshop at Terrabank in Miami as part of employee appreciation week.

Terrabank's human resources chief, Adriana Nino, said she had attended a previous coaching session with Suarez. "People need to forget about the distractions and stop worrying about problems in the future," says Nino, who meditates twice a day. "I'm not at work thinking whether my daughter is doing her homework. The only way to stay focused is to practice at it."

Sue Bethanis, an executive/leadership coach, said in meetings where everyone is checking e-mail, or thinking about the next meeting, opportunities for staff engagement are lost. Her San Francisco firm, Mariposa Leadership, teaches people to make the most of the moment. "It's relationship building," she said.

To calm a racing mind, she coun-

sels workers to concentrate on breathing, and then bring the spotlight of their attention back again and again to the work at hand or the person talking to them. "You might even need to write something down which is better than continuing to think about it."

Sometimes, it takes eliminating distractions. The most common suggestion idea is to try to pull the plug on electronic devices. A typical office worker turns to e-mail more than 50 times a day and uses instant messaging 77 times, according to Seattle-based computer productivity consultant RescueTime.

In her new book, "Distracted: The Erosion of Attention and the Coming Dark Age," author Maggie Jackson wrote, "If we jump on every e-mail message or ping, we'll have trouble pursuing our long-term goals. To make inroads on the deep, messy work of life, we need to stay focused."

## Economy, work ethic stall retirement

**MENOMONEE FALLS, Wis.** — Ruby S. Johnson's co-workers presented her with a chair for her birthday this month. It's cushioned. It swivels. And it should help make her comfortable for the rest of her working days — which could be a long time yet.

"My grandmother was 114 when she died," Johnson said. At 93, Johnson is an extreme example of a maturing trend: working older.

She's not delaying retirement. She's forgoing it.

"I always want to work," Johnson said as she deftly tears off lengths of heat-resistant tape to insulate coils of copper wire that will be used in power equipment. For 57 years, Johnson has worked full time at MTE Corp., in Menomonee Falls. She says it's not only a living but a place to go every morning, with people to see.

"I just like to keep going," Johnson said. "I don't want to stop."

Because they can, because they want to — and increasingly, because they need to — Americans are reversing a decades-long trend of retiring earlier. Consider these statistics from the Bureau of Labor Statistics:

■ Data released this month show consistent year-to-year employment increases for Americans 65 and older while employment for those under 65 has dropped in each of the last three months.

■ 15.5 percent of Americans 65 and older were in the labor force last year, the highest rate since 1971 and part of an upward trend from a low of 10.4 percent in 1985.

■ 56.3 percent of workers 65 and older were working full-time last year, a new high. Until 2002, part-timers always outnumbered full-timers among older workers.

■ In the last 30 years, the number of American workers 65 and older grew by 101 percent, compared with a 59 percent increase in all workers. Those 75 and older increased by 172 percent.

Experts blame the rough economy for the recent surge in working past 65.

"It's a reflection of people's desperation more than it is a reflection of just positive things about people working longer and being happy to work longer," said Monique Morrissey, an economist with the Economic Policy Institute, in Washington, D.C.

Lately, financial insecurity has become the leading reason for workers to put off retirement.

"That's just going to be exacerbated by the current economy," said Dennis Winters, chief labor market

economist for the Wisconsin Department of Workforce Development.

Not only have financial markets battered retirement plans, but housing equity has eroded. Add to that the continued escalation of health costs and everything related to sky-high fuel prices, and it's easy to understand why more people see early retirement getting out of reach.

"I'm getting a lot of phone calls by people who are trying to come up with alternatives. They're really starting to worry," said F. Michael Arnow, director of financial planning for Sattell, Johnson, Appel, & Co., in Menomonee Falls.

Arnow has been counseling retirees scrambling to find work to help buoy their sinking retirement plans.

"The rough part in what we're seeing with a couple of these folks is that they had planned on doing some consulting if they needed the extra income," Arnow said. "Now, they're panicked and wanting the extra income, and they can't get the consulting because everybody's cutting back, and the consulting jobs are drying up."

Of all the forces pushing and pulling workers to forestall retire-

ment, the economy is a ramrod, at least for now.

"Certainly, episodic changes in the economy change short-term behaviors," said Marcie Pitt-Catsoupes, director of the Sloan Center on Aging & Work at Boston College. "The good news/bad news story is that we are living longer, so you actually need to have more money."

Pitt-Catsoupes said she suspects that even beyond current economic conditions, financial considerations will continue to press more people into working longer, especially as fewer workers get traditional defined-benefit pensions and retirement healthcare coverage.

"Certainly there are pension reasons for people wanting to stay in," said Keith Bender, an economist at the University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee who researches retirement issues.

Only 20 percent of workers have defined-benefit retirement plans, down from 39 percent in 1980, according to the Bureau of Labor Statistics. That takes more employers off the hook of funding retirements but has shifted workers' reliance to 401(k) accounts and the financial markets.

"Defined benefits and Social

Security tend to let people retire when the economy is worse; 401(k)s and housing, to the extent that those values shrink when the economy is doing badly, have the opposite effect," Morrissey said. "It's a negative macro-economic trend. And it definitely has been worrisome."

Morrissey also worries that older workers could be clogging the pipeline for younger job seekers and that many people have trouble working older because of bad health or job loss.

"Before there was Social Security, people worked until they died, or they lived with their kids," Morrissey said. "There really has never been a generation where people have been expected to fund years of retirement out of savings. It's kind of heroic what we're asking people to do now."

Bender reasons that extending work lives might allay fears that the baby boom retirees will leave employers in the lurch.

"Overall, there may be a silver lining in all of this," Bender said. "That information transfer and big shock of losing so many workers in such a short amount of time may be lessened if these 65- to 70-year-olds stay in the labor force a little bit longer."

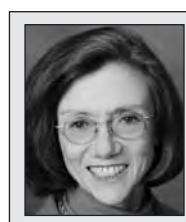
## Quiet worker should speak up to avoid being passed over for recognition

**Q: I am a professional, focused, detail-oriented employee who is often described as a "quiet person." Instead of seeing my calm reserve as an asset, my colleagues tend to criticize me for it.**

**One of my coworkers, who is also a good friend, is very outgoing and frequently outspoken. Management recently named her the "point person" while our boss is out on medical leave, which means she will be supervising me.**

**In my work, I am much more precise than she is. Also, I have worked here for 11 years, while she has been here only six.**

**This betrayal has made me incredibly angry. I may not be as outgoing, but I am a better**

**worker and have been here longer. What should I do about this?**

— **Betrayed & Bitter**

**A:** You haven't been betrayed. Management simply chose someone else to fill in for your boss. And that decision should have been based on leadership ability, not seniority or work precision.

Because managing requires a specific set of skills, the best worker does not necessarily make the best manager. Or even the best temporary supervisor.

For one thing, all managers must be able to interact effectively with others. Because you communicate infrequently, the higher-ups may question your interpersonal skills.

They also may not know you very well.

There's absolutely nothing wrong with being quiet. As you point out, quiet people often focus on details more intently and provide a calming presence in the workplace.

But if you want to get ahead, being an office wallflower may hold you back. Because familiarity reduces risk, decision-makers tend to promote people whom they know and trust.

Instead of stewing in your resentment, take the initiative to discuss your career goals with someone in management or

human resources. Preparing for the next opportunity is more important than complaining about the loss of this one.

**Q: One of my colleagues constantly monitors my comings and goings. Lately, she has started reporting my activities to our boss.**

**Sometimes she tells him I'm gone when I'm actually here. This woman and I are both department heads who have worked here for more than eight years.**

**The whole thing seems rather silly, but I feel a need to protect myself.**

**A:** If all your departures are job-related, and if your manager is pleased with your performance, then you shouldn't be harmed by

this amateur surveillance operation.

In fact, if your boss is like most managers, he may be annoyed by this woman's trivial tattling. But if you fear that he's taking it seriously, just ask him.

For example: "I've noticed that Mary seems to be keeping track of my activities. I don't know why she's doing this, but I'm afraid she may be giving you inaccurate information. Is this something we need to discuss?"

As long as your boss is OK, don't worry about your nosy colleague. She obviously doesn't have quite enough to do.

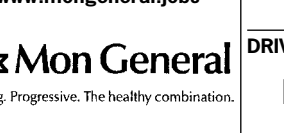

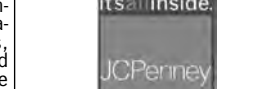

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## Tiguan fills SUV needs without guzzling the gas

Now that drivers of large SUVs have discovered that — gasp! — they use a lot of fuel, consumers are flocking to small SUVs that, predictably, need less liquid gold. So that makes Volkswagen's first small, car-based SUV, the 2009 Tiguan, perfectly timed.

Um, the Ti-what? That's Ti-guan (pronounced Teeg-whon). It's not a pretty name, but it's a pretty terrific small SUV.

Looking much like the Touareg SUV's kid brother, the Tiguan wears crisp, European lines that work well despite its short length. Its look stands apart from its key competitors, the Honda CR-V, Toyota RAV4, Nissan Rogue, Ford Escape and Saturn Vue.

Of course, the first two vehicles established the template that these car-based SUVs follow, and VW is no exception.

The Tiguan comes with standard front-wheel drive in base S, mid-level SE and top-of-the-line SEL trim. VW's all-wheel-drive system, called 4Motion, is available on mid-level SE and SEL models.

But under the hood, this German machine deviates from its American

and Asian rivals. While it still uses a four-cylinder engine, the Tiguan's powerplant is turbocharged, deploying 200 horsepower joined to either a six-speed manual or automatic transmission.

While the turbo gives the Tiguan a performance advantage, there's a

price to pay at the pump. Mileage isn't bad, at 18 mpg in the city and 24 mpg on the highway, but it does lag the leaders in this class. In addition, VW recommends premium unleaded fuel.

But the Tiguan tugs at your heart once behind the wheel. The handling

is everything one expects of a VW. Its precise steering and nimble handling makes it the perfect trucklet for zipping about town. It's fun to drive — something that can't be said of all small SUVs. And the peppy powerplant adds to the fun.

Perched in one of the Tiguan's

front bucket seats, you'll find plenty of headroom and legroom. Backseat space is decent. Cargo room is OK, but you'll find other small SUVs are more generous.

Interior trim, long a VW strength, is marred by typical dour European styling. The black interior with charcoal cloth seats is brightened by the \$1,300 panoramic sunroof option. A mesh-like fabric blocks most sunlight, while allowing some to come through.

The instrument panel is highly functional and blessedly free of buttons, thanks to a 6.5-inch screen, part of the \$1,950 DVD Navigation option. A rear back-up camera, which shows the view behind the vehicle when in reverse, is part of the package.

There are a few miscues. The dashboard features a couple of open bins below the audio and climate controls, yet a six-CD changer resides in the center console bin, eating space.

While I thoroughly enjoyed my time with the Tiguan — and wouldn't hesitate to recommend it — some might find that number too high.

On the other hand, if you can afford it, you'll find the Tiguan's unique character and spry performance worth the extra scratch.

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# Cayenne is worthy of Porsche badge

Like a lot of car enthusiasts, I've always been ambivalent about the Porsche Cayenne. Sure, it's powerful and luxurious, but Porsche built its reputation with light little sports cars. I doubted a five-passenger SUV that weighs 5,000 pounds could be nimble and exciting enough to deserve to wear the revered Porsche badge.

I began to change my mind driving a Cayenne to the children's hospital last summer. My nephew Cormac had been bitten by a dog, and I had my full Tony Stewart NASCAR mind-set in gear: Get out of the way or I'll knock you out of the way.

Traffic parted before the oncoming Porsche badge, and I gained a new appreciation for the German sport SUV. Porsche gave the Cayenne a number of upgrades for the 2008 model year, and the SUV now ranks among the top competitors for luxury SUVs ranging from the V6-powered Acura MDX to the Mercedes-Benz ML550 AMG.

The 2008 Cayenne model line starts with a modestly priced \$43,400 base model with a 290-horsepower 3.6-liter V6 and six-speed manual transmission. Adding a six-speed automatic transmission raises the ante to \$46,400.

Porsche also offers the Cayenne with a 4.8-liter V8 that produces 385, 405 and 500 horsepower in S, GTS and Turbo models, respectively. The S comes only with an automatic trans-

mission and prices start at \$57,900. A GTS with manual gearbox goes for \$69,300, while the GTS automatic starts at \$72,300. The Turbo comes only with an automatic and costs \$93,700.

All Cayennes feature seating for five and a sport-tuned all-wheel drive system.

I tested a base Cayenne with a \$49,590 sticker price and a loaded GTS Tiptronic that cost \$88,785. All prices exclude destination charges.

The base Cayenne V6 competes with SUVs like the \$40,195 Acura MDX, \$46,200 BMW X5 3.0si and \$39,300 Volkswagen Touareg 2.

The GTS features a suspension tuned for maximum on-road performance. It faces off against less-expensive V8 luxury SUVs like the \$54,800 BMW X5 4.8i, \$58,225 Range Rover Sport HSE and \$52,750 Mercedes-Benz ML550.

Changes for 2008 included the addition of the GTS model and direct-injection to improve power and fuel economy. The Cayenne's EPA ratings remain among the lowest in its class, however.

The headlights were reshaped to give the Cayenne a sporty new face.

The Cayenne has the distinction of being the only one of the SUVs to offer a manual transmission. The manual in the V6 Cayenne I tested encouraged eager driving, providing a full quotient of fun in the countryside and good zip around town.

Both Cayennes I tested had responsive steering, excellent brakes, good

performance, smooth rides and comfortable interiors. The adjustable suspension holds the vehicle flat and stable through curves, making the Porsche an exceptionally stable and sporty SUV when driven fast.

Backseat accommodations are evidence that rear seats have not traditionally been an area of expertise for the sports car specialist, however. Legroom is tight, and the claim that it has room for three adults is just another reminder that Germans shouldn't do comedy.

In addition, the mechanism to fold the rear seats forward to increase cargo space requires an awkward two-step process that exposes the seats' mounting hardware to view.

The 19.1 cubic feet of cargo space behind the rear seats is among the smaller load capacities in the segment.

While the rear seat needs work, the interior is otherwise good. Road and wind noise are minimal, and the materials look and feel fine. The GTS wraps its occupants in soft leather at nearly every touch point, with matte silver accents tastefully deployed on the controls and trim.

The GTS' V8 engine provides head-snapping acceleration and the automatic transmission shifts fast and smoothly.

Fuel economy for both V6 and V8 models could be better. The EPA rated the V6 Cayenne at 14 mpg in the city and 20 on the highway, about 1 mpg worse than the MDX and X5

3.0si and the same as the V6 Touareg. The 405-horsepower V8 GTS scored 13 mpg city and 18 mpg on the highway in EPA tests.

That's better than the 300-horsepower Range Rover Sport, equal to the 382-horsepower ML550 and 1 mpg worse than the 350-horsepower X5 4.8i. All the SUVs require premium fuel.

# GM, Chrysler seen posting 30%-plus sales declines

SAN FRANCISCO — It's almost time for another monthly U.S. sales update from the automotive industry, and clearly not enough has changed to portend anything other than more double-digit declines for Detroit manufacturers.

In fact, if it wasn't for General Motors Corp.'s return to its popular employee pricing sales promotion, the struggling auto giant was tracking toward a whopping 50 percent year-over-year plunge in August car sales, according to Deutsche Bank analyst Rod Lache.

He forecast earlier this week that the revived incentives plan will pull some sales forward from upcoming months and buoy the total somewhat, but he's still looking for GM to post a 30 percent drop from a "very difficult" comparison in the summer of last year.

All the major automakers are slated to hand in their August U.S. sales results next Wednesday, and while the numbers are expected to reflect an improvement from the prior month's abysmal showing, they will likely, once again, reflect an industry in turmoil.

Lache said the same conditions that led to last month's plunge still exist, including "low customer traffic driven by very poor durable goods buying conditions, difficult credit conditions driven by tight-

ening standards and negative equity in trades, low availability of small cars, and a pullback in leasing."

He projected that Ford Motor Co. sales fell 22 percent while Chrysler, which relies more on big trucks and SUVs than any other manufacturer, could report a 35 percent sales drop.

Toyota Motor Corp., which has shown uncharacteristic weakness in recent months, has been feeling the pressure of a beaten-down U.S. consumer as well, with Lache targeting a 12 percent fall-off for the Japanese giant.

Blaming weak demand in the key U.S. market, Toyota on Thursday reportedly cut its 2009 sales target to 9.7 million cars and trucks worldwide from 10.4 million. The company also said it expects to sell 2.7 million vehicles in North America next year, a level that represents no growth from its fiscal 2008 sales target for the region.

Nissan Motors is seen as the only major automaker posting better numbers, up about 1 percent. Lache is looking for an 8 percent slide for Honda Motor Co., which has often managed to buck industry declines during the prolonged slump due to its smaller-car heavy lineup.

Edmunds.com was more sanguine about the upcoming results for the Japanese, pegging Toyota's numbers to fall by only 7.2 percent.

# Toyota Prius, Honda Civic hybrid both do-gooders in mpg

Unplug me, please. After a week in an '08 Toyota Prius and an '08 Honda Civic Hybrid, I'm zapped. Don't get me wrong: These cars practically lumber down the road from the weight of their vast technologies. As you know, both can smoothly blend dinky 4-cylinder gas engines with electric motors for decent propulsion — no small feat.

The chiseled Prius — which I'm pretty sure is the official drive-by car for the Green Mafia — is the real California star of the two, widely loved by eco-celebrities like Big Al Gore and some of his enviro movie-star buddies.

Pardon the little geezer attack, but I want to drive a car I can hear, a car that doesn't turn itself off at every red light. (My '56 Chevy often did that — usually with a shudder or a loud pop or two — but it would never restart.) I also prefer a car with a real transmission and something with a little mischief in it.

But that's just me. And I fully understand that most people are mesmerized by hybrids — maybe rightly so.

In my black '08 Toyota Prius Touring Edition — I had requested the Street Savage Edition, but it wasn't

available — the gas-electric combo was supposed to be good for 48 miles per gallon city, 45 highway. (The Prius does better in city driving because the electric motor provides most of its push at lower speeds.)

Under the hood, somewhere in there, you find a 1.5-liter, four-cylinder engine with 110 net horsepower that includes the juice from an AC motor generating a maximum of 500 volts of power. All of that ener-

gy flows through a continuously variable transmission — one of those strange transmissions that keeps the engine at peak operating rpm but doesn't really shift.

Up to about 25 or 30 mph, the electric motor does most of the work while the four-banger sleeps. Above 30, it awakens with a slight tremor and takes over in a mostly seamless process.

Toyota also gets points for mak-

ing the exterior of my \$29,614 Prius distinctive. From behind, the car looks a little like a slightly bizarre shoe that Zippy the Pinhead might wear on a Saturday night at the shot bars — very modern. I especially liked the steeply raked windshield and short, sloping hood.

However, the car's 195/55 tires and skinny 16-inch steel wheels (covered by plastic hubcaps) looked to me as if they belonged on a wheelbarrow. And those clear-lensed boy-racer tail lamps seem downright silly on a car as PC-stuffy as the Prius.

## STARSHIP TOYOTA

Just overlook the oddball plastic gear lever mounted rally-style on the dash. Every time I had to use it, I wanted to mutter "Starship Toyota, forward."

But I did like the thin, gray leather seats. Also impressive was the expansive legroom in back and the highly functional center screen with seven logical buttons that control audio and climate, as well as display power and miles per gallon. (It's tough, but ignore the screen while you're driving because if you get too involved in watching the power interplay, you can easily drive under an Escalade or something.)

**Q. I just learned the windows and locks, as well as the mirrors and lights, on my new car are all controlled by computers. Is this a good thing, should they ever break? I'm concerned the car will be difficult and expensive to repair. Did I have a choice, if I'd wished to go old school on this stuff?**

A. Your new car apparently uses a B-CAN or body controller area network system to operate many of its features. With some earlier vehicles containing up to three miles of wire in heavy, complex wiring harnesses, this is a great way to simplify the electrical system and provide more reliable operation. Take your driver's-side door controls for example.

An old-school vehicle might have as many as 60 wires connecting the switches for the windows, mirrors, and door locks to their destinations in other doors. A B-CAN vehicle typically contains a processing module in the door, and communicates with other modules in the vehicle using high speed signals carried on only one or two wires. Basically, a module on one side

of the car calls up another on the other side and asks it to perform the needed operation.

B-CAN systems improve reliability because low-current communication signals are much less troublesome than the much higher current needed to roll a window up or down. Previously this larger current was routed many feet from a mechanical switch in one door across the vehicle through another switch, and on to the window motor — a recipe for voltage drop and poor performance. With B-CAN, a nearby control module's solid state switch (transistor) controls the window, via a simplified path.

Diagnosing a balky power window, mirror, light or lock controlled by a B-CAN system can be much easier than in the past. A scan tool, typically the same one used for engine diagnostics, is used to verify the communication circuits and switch command, and request operation of the desired component. If an up-command for the window isn't seen on the scan tool as the switch is depressed, and the communication circuit is good, the switch is likely bad.

# Storm fallout for cars equals some water damage

Fay, Gustav, Hanna and any subsequent member of the tropical-storm family guarantee an unfortunate supply of something we could do without: Storm-damaged vehicles.

There's flood damage, sure, and I can tell you firsthand about wind damage, thanks to the huge tree branch that fell onto my wife's Mini Cooper — which is now, as our cheerful insurance agent suggested — "more Mini than ever, huh?"

Well, nothing that a good body shop and \$3,000 can't fix.

Fortunately, it has the sort of damage from which a car can recover and be restored to as-new condition without spending more than the car is worth.

With water damage, that often isn't true. And as news coverage of the recent storms suggest, we are likely to see some flooded cars on the market soon.

Cosmetically, it is labor-intensive but not that difficult to restore a flooded car, most of it involving cleaning and drying the interior, and replacing what can't be suitably restored. Everything that could hold water must be removed — side sill plates under the doors, the seats, the carpet and spare tire in the trunk, even — and can't be replaced until everything's completely dry.

Under the hood, a good power washing can remove any visible evidence of flood damage.

But it's the hidden damage you have to worry about. It takes a good soaking outside the car to cause substantial damage — after all, the engine, transmission and other external parts are designed to withstand splashing through thousands of miles of puddles — but inside, it doesn't take much water to ruin a vehicle. Wiring, electrical connections and instruments are especially susceptible. Fresh water is bad, salt water — well, just go ahead and total out the car.

CarFax, the leading title-search company, offers some helpful hints to help spot a damaged car, but first, a note about the effectiveness of CarFax and similar services: They can only report to you what has been reported to them. If, for example, no claim was filed with an insurance company, or no incident report filed with the local government or police department, there's no way for CarFax to pick that up.

Same thing with flood damage: If you can dry the car out, clean it up and sell it before the electrical parts corrode and fail, maybe you can get away with it. CarFax reports do, however, alert you that a car might have been registered

in a county that suffered a lot of flooding, but it can't tell you if the car was flooded unless it's on record somewhere.

Anyway, the CarFax suggestions:

- Check the trunk, glove compartment, the dashboard and below the seats for signs of water damage such as silt, mud or rust.

- Examine upholstery and carpeting closely; if it doesn't match the interior or fits loosely, it may have been replaced. Discolored, faded or stained materials could indicate water damage.

- Turn the ignition key and make sure that accessory and warning lights and gauges come on and work properly. Make sure the airbag and ABS lights come on.

- Test lights (interior and exterior), windshield wipers, turn signals, cigarette lighter, radio, heater and air conditioner several times to make sure they work.

- Flex some of the wires beneath the dashboard. Wet wires will become brittle upon drying and may crack.

- Take a deep breath and smell for musty odors from mildew.

- And finally, good advice before you buy any used vehicle: Go to a trusted mechanic for a pre-purchase inspection. Always get vehicles checked before handing over any money.

## Students to compete in vehicle competition

WVU engineering students are doing their part to help design cars of the future as they gear up for the next big collegiate competition in alternative vehicle design.

EcoCAR: The NeXt Challenge is a national three-year collegiate competition sponsored by the U.S. Department of Energy, Argon National Labs and General Motors. Its purpose is to give students hands-on experience designing vehicles to be more fuel-efficient, with reduced greenhouse-gas emissions, while maintaining performance and reliability.

This spring, the competition's judges accepted proposals from universities around the nation. Of the 65 proposals submitted, WVU's proposal was among 17 accepted and was ranked fourth in the group, said Scott Wayne, professor of mechanical engineering and team adviser.

WVU has a long history of doing well in national alternative vehicle competitions, Wayne said. That includes placing in the top 10 for three years running in the Department of Energy's previous competition, Challenge X, which ended this year.

"Competitions like Challenge X and EcoCAR provide unique opportunities for our students to get involved in a complex, hands-on project and to gain valuable experience outside of the classroom," he said. "They also allow students to make valuable industry contacts. Several of our graduates who were involved in these competitions have gone on to excellent positions with GM and other manufacturers."

WVU's EcoCAR team is composed mainly of mechanical and aerospace engineering majors, along with students from computer science and electrical engineering. Over the next three years, the team will convert a stock 2009 Saturn Vue crossover sport utility vehicle into an advanced-technology hybrid vehicle that is more economical to operate and more environ-

mentally friendly.

In the first year of the competition, students will explore different design options with the use of special software. In the second year, the team will receive a vehicle from GM and begin integrating new parts, testing emissions and fuel efficiency, and making structural changes.

The third and final year will be devoted to making additional improvements, working on appeal and marketability, and getting the vehicle ready for production. Each year, EcoCAR

officials will judge the team on its progress and how well it has met its goals for that year.

## Press makes alternative plans at Chrysler

SAN JOSE, Calif. — Jim Press, a Toyota lifer and one of the people most responsible for that brand's U.S. success, stunned the auto industry by joining Chrysler in 2007. The smallest of the Big Three, Chrysler had just become an independent company after Cerberus Capital Management bought 80 percent of it, ending the unsuccessful German-American hybrid known as DaimlerChrysler.

Press' arrival coincided with the worst sales period for General Motors, Ford and Chrysler in a decade and a half. All three U.S. automakers relied heavily on the profits from big pickups and SUVs, segments deserted by buyers when gas prices reached \$4 a gallon. Overall, U.S. car and truck sales are down 11 percent this year. At Chrysler, which also includes the Dodge and Jeep brands, sales are down 24 percent for the year.

Press talked to *San Jose Mercury News* reporter Matt Nauman about Chrysler's alternative-fuel plans, why the Big Three need government loans and the state of the company. Here is an edited transcript of that conversation.

**Q. The Prius is one of the most popular vehicles ... and GM continues to spend millions to advertise its forthcoming Volt, a plug-in hybrid due in 2010. What are Chrysler's plans for alternative-fuel vehicles?**

A. We've chosen to enter the hybrid market with a more effective product, the (Dodge) Durango and (Chrysler) Aspen SUVs. If you look at the footprint of a conventionally powered Corolla vs. a conventionally powered Aspen, obviously the Aspen has a much greater carbon footprint so the advantages of savings of oil, savings of cost and global-warming issues are captured to a greater degree with the Aspen than with the Prius.

We've applied a two-mode hybrid system combined with a Hemi engine that has the multiple-displacement system (which cuts off unneeded cylinders). So you end up with a four-cylinder drive system in a seven-passenger SUV. You get a 40 percent savings in gas overall, and 20 percent on the highway. A car like the Prius doesn't help you much on the highway. We have a different approach that is more reflective of the typical American driving pattern. The Prius is more reflective of the typical Tokyo driving pattern, which is stop-and-go traffic.

We will have a hybrid version of the pickup truck in 2010 as well as a diesel in 2009. Diesel is part of our strategy for CO2 issues as well as mileage. The other thing we're doing is to pull the maximum mileage out of existing power trains. That means going to the drawing board on drag, on rolling resistance and on improving fuel economy and output from

smaller displacement engines. We have about nine models in '09 where we'll be increasing our gas mileage by one or two miles per gallon.

Those are all steps today that will build the bridge until we start electrifying vehicles. We have a long-term electrification of vehicles program called ENVI. At the Detroit auto show we showed some of the concepts — a fuel-cell hybrid, a diesel hybrid and a pure electric. We've taken those and refined them now. We're developing pre-production type vehicles. We're further along than most people think. We don't have a lot of resources so we're not building a PR stunt, we're producing cars.

**Q. The Big Three are pursuing eight loan guarantees totaling \$50 billion to retool plants to build more fuel-efficient cars. Both presidential candidates, perhaps to win Michigan, have approved of the notion. Why are they so important?**

A. It's not for GM, Ford and Chrysler. It's in the interest of advancing and accelerating the delivery of technology into the customer's hands at an affordable level so that we can tackle the issues of dependence on foreign oil and CO2 emissions. It's also about doing it in the United States instead of importing it. There's no question that other countries have a head start on advanced power train systems and, in particular, batteries.

## Criminals want your auto parts

FORT LAUDERDALE, Fla. — The explosive roar was undeniable when Michael Pethybridge turned the key in his 1997 Toyota 4Runner. The SUV revved like thunder.

Gone was his catalytic converter, neatly cut out by a determined thief. Damage to the exhaust system was surgically precise.

The emissions control devices contain small amounts of the precious metals platinum, rhodium and palladium, which are trading at record high levels.

"It sounded like a NASCAR racer," fumed Pethybridge, 58, of Weston, Fla., whose vehicle was vandalized a few months ago while he was working. "I knew as soon as the engine kicked over, I no longer had an exhaust system. The most surprising thing was that there were no shavings, no sign someone had been underneath the vehicle. Someone had thrown down a towel or tarp."

Theft of the pricey emissions control devices has reached epidemic proportions nationwide, mostly because soaring scrap value for the precious metals contained in them can reach as high as \$200, according to police and insurance experts. And with platinum selling for about \$1,500 an ounce on the commodities market, they expect the trend to continue.

"It's a problem throughout the

country," said Broward (Fla.) Sheriff's Office Sgt. Rich Rossman, who has investigated several cases. "It just takes seconds with the proper tool. If you know what you are doing, you can do it fast."

It's a pricey loss for vehicle owners. Pethybridge paid about \$600 to have his SUV repaired.

According to law enforcement agencies, SUVs are primary targets because the vehicles are higher and easier to get underneath. The catalytic converter also is bigger, yielding a higher price.

Victims discover they've been hit because of the noise. Lots of it.

"It will sound like a freight train," Rossman said.

A Palm Beach (Fla.) Sheriff's Office employee was charged this month with stealing 37 catalytic converters from defunct vehicles that were set to be auctioned. According to the Palm Beach Sheriff's Office, a scrap yard paid him \$2,280 for the items, investigators said.

Not all scrap dealers will accept catalytic converters, but if they do, it can pay off, said Alan Anderson, who manages Pompano Scrap Metal in Fort Lauderdale and requires sellers to provide identification to deter the sale of stolen goods.

"If it takes five of them to get an ounce [of platinum], hey, nice day's work," Anderson said.

"It's a major, major inconvenience and hassle for anyone who is a victim of this crime," said Frank Scaffidi, a spokesman for the National Insurance Crime Bureau. "We've seen a dramatic increase in the past year not only in the numbers but in the regions where [thefts] are occurring."

A trio of thieves also swept through a Ford dealership in Belle Glade, Fla., nabbing catalytic converters from 11 Ford F-150 pickup trucks. Surveillance video of the April incident showed the thieves unbolting the devices from the trucks with battery-powered wrenches and throwing them over a fence into a nearby lot, said sales manager Steve Woodard. The devices cost about \$480 each to replace, Woodard said.

Since that incident, the dealership has tack-welded all the catalytic converters onto its trucks, Woodard said.

"It wouldn't surprise me if it took off," said Palm Beach County Sheriff's Office Sgt. Trevor Cayson, who investigated the Belle Glade thefts. "It's so easy to make money. And it doesn't take them any time to get them."

For \$225, vehicle owners can buy an anti-theft system from Toledo, Ohio-based American Welding Inc. that creates a cage around the catalytic converter, locking it to the car frame.

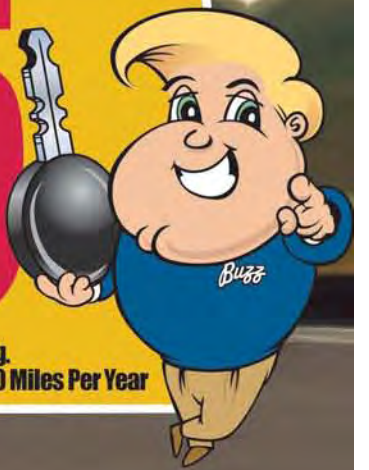

# Lady and the vamp

**H**is last TV series may have been set in a funeral home, but there's very little that's grave about Alan Ball.

The man who won an Oscar for writing "American Beauty" is justifiably proud of that earlier show, "Six Feet Under," but these days he's clearly delighted to be working on "True Blood," his quirky new series about vampires in the Deep South that premieres Sunday, Sept. 7, on HBO.

This particular story started a couple of years ago, when Ball was killing time before a dentist appointment and picked up a paperback copy of Charlaine Harris' novel "Dead Until Dark," the first in a series set in a world where vampires have "come out of the coffin" and begun to mingle openly with humans after a new synthetic blood product has given them an alternative to killing for survival.

The book was purely an impulse buy, Ball says, but he quickly was drawn into the story of telepathic Louisiana barmaid Sookie Stackhouse, who falls in love with Bill Compton, a 173-year-old vampire.

"I found myself looking forward to my reading time before I went to bed," Ball recalls. "I'd say, 'I have an early day tomorrow, so I'll just read one chapter,' and I would read five. When it was over, I said, 'Where's the next one?' ... I realized that this world and these characters totally sustained the big-time investment. I thought, 'There's a TV series in here.'"

When Oscar winner Anna Paquin ("The Piano") read the script, she fell in love with the role of Sookie, even though she looked nothing like the blond, suntanned woman Harris described in her books.

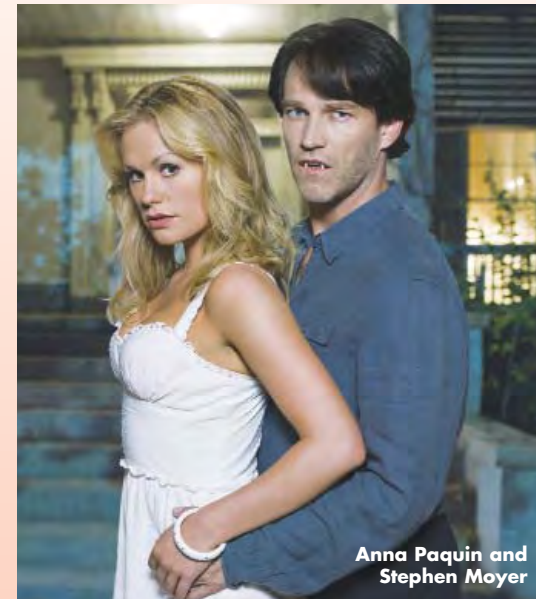
"At the time, I was extraordinarily pale and brunette and kind of looked more like a vampire than a perky waitress girl," Paquin says. "Honestly, I thought they would cast someone who already was blonde, but thankfully Alan has a lot of imagination and is able to see something in someone beyond just the outside packaging."

"This script was unlike anything I had ever seen: quirky and funny and dark and sexy and violent, just all kinds of things all in one. This character was also very different from anything else I had ever done. I wanted this role very badly."

For the role, Ball chose Stephen Moyer, a British actor best known to American audiences for his work in the miniseries "The Starter Wife."

"I've discovered that if you give an actor fangs, they go insane," Ball says, laughing. "They tend to dig into this bag of tricks that we've all gotten used to from other vampire movies and TV shows. Stephen Moyer had a sort of stillness, and he didn't go mad. He's incredibly handsome, he's a really fine actor, and he really seems like he could be a man from another era. He made me feel sympathetic and attracted and scared, all the things that character really needed."

"I decided early on to make him as still as possible," Moyer explains. "No heartbeat. No superfluous movement. He has no nervous tics at all."

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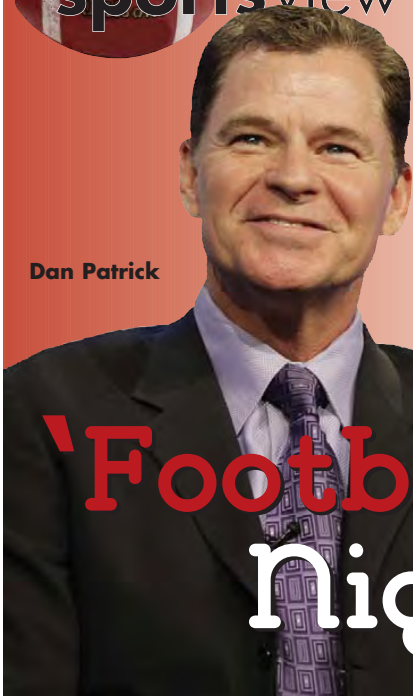

The 2008 NFL season's first weekend also marks the reteaming of one of the best-loved duos from ESPN's heyday.

On Sunday, Sept. 7, Dan Patrick joins former "SportsCenter" partner in crime Keith Olbermann in the studio for NBC's "Football Night in America" pregame show.

The pair will do highlights for "Football Night" all season long on Sundays, alongside hosts Bob Costas and Cris Collinsworth and analysts Tiki Barber and Jerome Bettis.

Those who remember the pair's 1992-97 stint on the late edition of "SportsCenter" were privy to some pretty entertaining television: Olbermann with his catchphrases ("That's a 1-3 putout if you're scoring at home ... or even if you're alone") and Patrick with his reaction shots and snark.

But unlike their days in Connecticut, Patrick says that they're just a piece of the puzzle at NBC now.

"I think our role is just to complement everybody else," he says, "not to have a palace coup and take over the show. At least I don't see it that way. And this is something that was met with open arms by Bob Costas and Cris Collinsworth, that Bob is the one who spearheaded it. He's like, 'Hey, I'd love for you guys to do the highlights.' Collinsworth and Tiki and Jerome said, 'We don't want to do the highlights. We just want to talk football.'"

"So it just sort of played out in a way that seemed natural, that working with Bob and reuniting with Keith and just going in there having fun, being true to the sport, and I think that's sort of how I'm wading into this process, just to be part of the formula, not remix it."

Still, when talk gets to working again with Olbermann, Patrick can't help but laugh and think back.

"We had so much freedom" he says. "When you look at what we were given on 'SportsCenter,' we didn't know who was watching. We thought it was a 'Wayne's World' of sports highlights, and we're in the basement just having fun. We had no idea that it would turn out to be what it was."

"At the time, we were never told what the ratings were. We just did it. And all of a sudden, we woke up one day, and people said, 'Hey, you guys have sort of redefined sports broadcasting.' And our reaction was, 'Hey, don't blame us!' And that's all it was. It was a chance to have fun with great freedom."

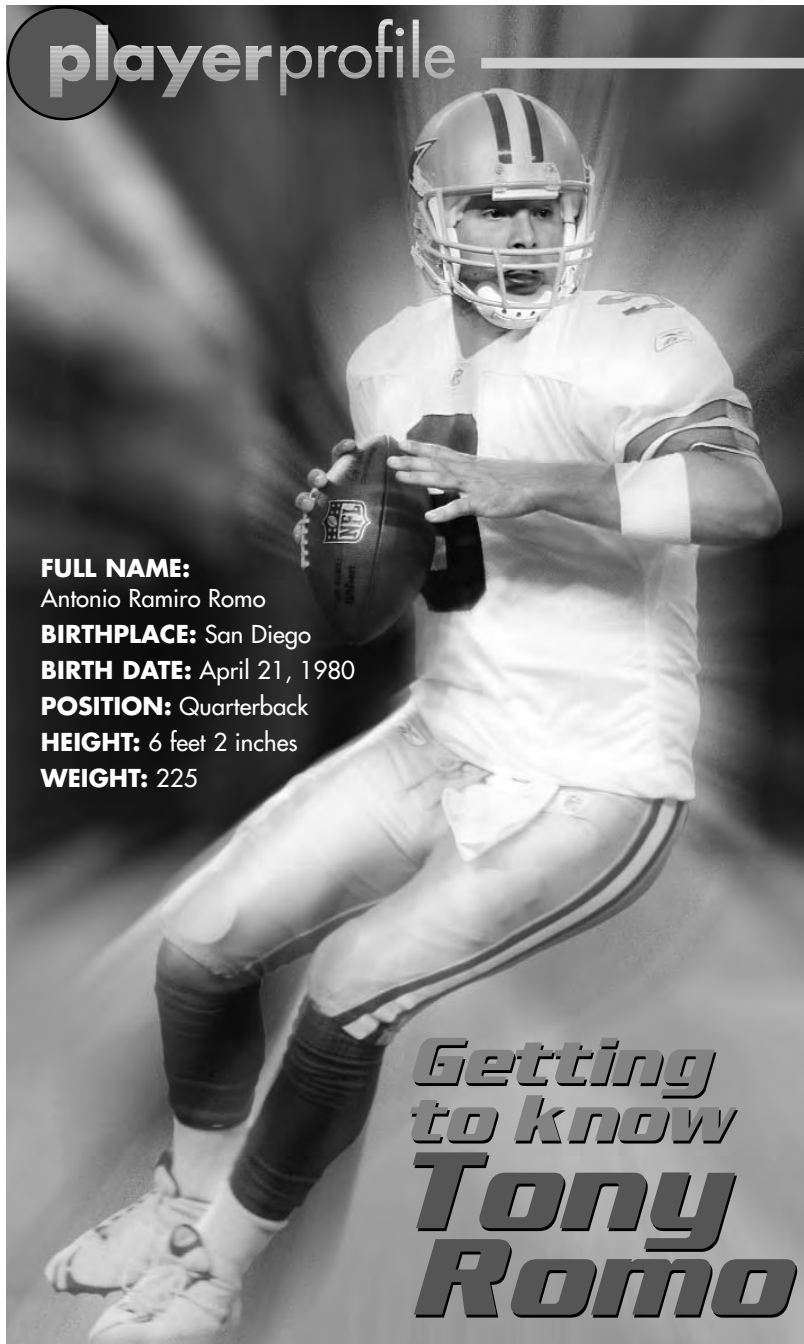

**T**ony Romo has won the heart of starlet Jessica Simpson. Now if he could only get those stubborn football critics to make googly eyes at him, life would be super.

Actually, it's not too bad as is, what with the lovely Ms. Simpson at your side and all that comes with being the quarterback of the Dallas Cowboys. But super? Before the Cowboys can fulfill those Super Bowl expectations that many have bestowed upon them this season, it would be nice, at least in the critics' eyes, if Romo could lead his team to just one playoff win.

That's been the rub in Romo's short pro career so far: success in the regular season, dud in the playoffs. After a club-record 13 wins last season, Romo's first as a full-time starter, Dallas lost at home in the divisional playoff round to the eventual Super Bowl champion New York Giants, and who can forget Romo's fumbled snap of a potential game-winning field goal try in a wild-card loss to Seattle, ending the 2006 season?

Postseason failures aside, the 28-year-old Romo is the reason Dallas is the popular pick to defend its NFC East title, despite the presence of the Giants in the division. He earned his second straight Pro Bowl berth (first as a starter) after the 2007 season, when he was the NFC's top-rated passer and set Cowboys single-season records for TD passes (36), passing yards (4,211) and completions (335).

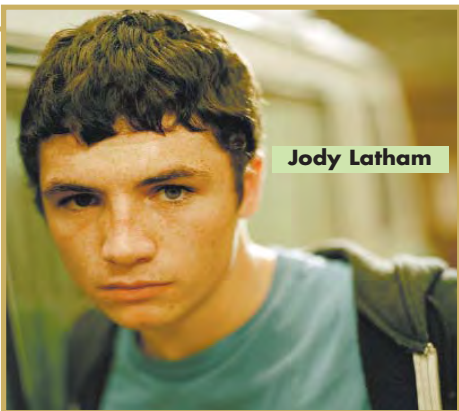

## we'd liketosee

On Sunday, Sept. 7, HBO premieres "True Blood," the latest entry in the vampire-drama sweepstakes.

The stakes are high for this show. HBO has a lot at stake here. The pay cablenet may be staking its reputation on the show's success.

OK, I'll stop now.

But television is a relative latecomer to bloodsuckers – and I'm not talking about agent Ari Gold on "Entourage." Movies have long explored the vampire legend, all the way back to the B&W silent "Nosferatu" in 1922.

He was a creepy-looking vampire, more rodent than romantic. In 1931's "Dracula," Bela Lugosi introduced the classic whiteface

makeup, slicked-back hair and opera cape. Frank Langella made the Count positively edible in his "Dracula" in 1979, all liquid eyes and pillow lips hiding his fangs.

By the time we hit "Kindred: The Embraced" on Fox in 1996 and "Buffy the Vampire Slayer" on The WB in 1997, we'd had female vampires ("Countess Dracula," 1971), black vampires ("Blacula," 1972), funny vampires ("Love at First Bite," 1979, and "Once Bitten," 1985), space vampires ("Lifeforce," 1985), teen vampires ("The Lost Boys," 1987) and literary vampires ("Bram Stoker's Dracula," 1992, and "Interview With the Vampire," 1994).

"Kindred" faded fast, but "Buffy" stayed alive until 2003, even spinning off "Angel" in 1999, featuring a heroic vampire with a soul. Last season, CBS had "Moonlight,"

about a vampire working as a Los Angeles private eye who drank bottled blood.

Now in "True Blood," based on Charlaine Harris' "Southern Vampire Mysteries" book series, we have ordinary, everyday vampires.

The Japanese have developed synthetic blood, called TruBlood, so now vampires no longer have to kill people. They can come out of the shadows (but still not out in the noonday sun) and take their place among America's oppressed minorities.

They have lobbyists, apologists, fans and detractors. No doubt they will pay taxes, vote in elections, get parking tickets, shop in convenience stores (one actually does this in the show) and rush to Barney's warehouse sales – just like regular folks.

I don't recall asking to see ordinary, everyday vampires. Vampires should be mysterious, enigmatic and dangerous. I haven't read Harris' books or seen more than a couple of episodes of "True Blood," so I don't know where this story is going in the long term, but the idea of vampires lobbying for their civil rights is momentarily funny but misses the point of the fascination of the forbidden.

Time will tell, but I have a sneaking suspicion that the vampires of "True Blood," while they may seem tame, are not truly domesticated. When the right moment comes, they'll probably shed their veneer of happy sociability and revert to their predatory selves.

After all, who wants a toothless vampire?

"They formulated something that felt like a good fit for me. I wasn't interested in doing a straight cook-to-camera cooking show, because I'm a little more hyperactive than that, I guess you'd say."
