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Felonies up in Mon County

Officials: May be due to rise in drug arrests

BY ALEX LANG The Dominion Post

Monongalia County's violent crimes and misdemeanor numbers surpassed those of October 2009. Now, the number of felony passed those in all of 2009. Some officials said the increase is due to a rise in felony drug-related arrests. David Alexander Shoetz — an

alleged hot spot robber who was thwarted by an employee and two other men Tuesdav night — was the 625th felony charge this year. He was arraigned Wednesday.

In 2009, there were 624 felony charges. In 2008, there were 695.

Felonies include charges such as murder, robbery, possession with intent to deliver a controlled substance, wanton endangerment, grand

charges in the county has also larceny and third-offense DUI.

"A lot of it deals with drug use and abuse," Monongalia County Sheriff Al Kisner said.

The department is finding many of the crimes are tied to drug use, Kisner said. Even crimes such as robberies and breaking and entering are often related to someone who is an drug addict, he said.

Kisner said his staff is taking steps to address the increase in crime. Recently, a meeting was held in which he asked the deputies and other staff for ideas to help decrease the felonies.

They are looking at bringing back the street-crimes unit, which was dissolved as deputies left for military duty. Kisner said he wants to reinstate it, but it will require extra personnel. Kisner said he hopes the County Commission can find money for the unit in its next budget.

Magistrate Sandy Holepit said with the way the year has been going, she isn't surprised to see the number of felonies increase. She said magistrate court has seen

Monongalia County Commissioners Asel Kennedy and Bill Bartolo said Thursday that neither has made up his mind regarding the annexation. That's why the public hearings are so important.

"It would be premature [to decide]," Kennedy said. "We'll have to hear what the people have to say." Bartolo agreed.

"Let's get all the information and then we can consider it and make a decision, after we are fully informed."

Bartolo said the issue could be viewed from the perspective that the mall has received the benefits of being adjacent to the City of Westover for at no cost for years.

"If they get the benefits, should they not have to pay the support to the city like everyone else does?" Bartolo said.

Kennedy thinks differently.

"I'm not really in favor of that, forcing a business that doesn't

Big ideas for cutting deficit, but they'd hurt

WASHINGTON — Voters who demanded Washington rein in the nation's spiraling debt are getting a message from President Barack Obama and leaders of his deficit commission: It'll hurt.

A proposal released Wednesday by the bipartisan leaders of the commission suggested cuts to Social Security benefits, deep reductions in federal spending and higher taxes for millions of Americans to stem the flood of red ink that they say threatens the nation's very future. The popular child tax credit and mortgage interest deduction would be eliminated.

Interest groups on the right and the left squealed, predictably, about the plan, which would cut total deficits by as much as \$4 much of it from programs long considered all but sacred.

The full commission has yet to make its recommendations, and the chairmen acknowledged their plan was so controversial that it's dead on arrival. But they said putting it forth would prompt a more realistic national debate about what it will take to solve the nation's fiscal woes.

Obama, in Seoul, South Korea. declined to discuss the specifics of the chairmen's work but said Thursday, "We're going to have to take actions that are difficult and we're going to have to tell the truth the American people." He said there has been a lot of rhetoric about the nation's debt and annual budget deficits but "a lot of the talk didn't match up with reality."

We need to be straight with the American people," the president said. "We can't just engage in political rhetoric.'

Sen. Kent Conrad, D-N.D.,

chairman of the Budget Committee and a member of the White House commission, said the nation faces the real possibility of becoming a "second-tier economic power" if it fails to address the trillion-dollar-plus deficit. He said simply cutting waste and fraud will not solve the problem, and insisted changes to Medicare and Social Security were needed because both programs are headed toward insolvency.

"People can say we want to keep what is. What is is not affordable," Conrad said Thursday on ABC's "Good Morning America."

Under the chairmen's proposal, Medicare spending would be curtailed. Tax breaks for many health care plans, too. And the Pentagon's budget would suffer as well in a plan that attaches \$3 in spending cuts to every \$1 in tax increases.

or temporary cessation of hostilities — between the Allied nations and Germany went into effect on the 11th hour of the 11th day of the 11th month. When the day was first commemorated in the U.S., it was known as Armistice Day, but was later changed to Veterans Day.

Veteran Eugene Shuttlesworth, 93, said he comes to the VFW's Veterans Day program every year.

"I've stood out here many times," said the World War II veteran. "I keep thinking I'm too old to go this time. Then I go anyway.'

Shuttlesworth said he served in the U.S. Army for 23 months — 16 of those he spent overseas.

"I'm proud to be an American," he said.

Veterans also gathered Thursday at the dedication of the Morgantown Vet Center in Westover.

While there, one veteran of the Vietnam War got a little more decorated during the ceremony when he received several awards he had earned during his service.

Veteran Roy Hiner received about 10 awards, including a Purple Heart with an oak leaf cluster which means he was wounded twice — a Vietnam Service medal and a National Defense service medal.

He was also given a flag that flew over the U.S.

Veteran gets **Purple Heart** nearly seven decades later

PARKERSBURG -Nearly seven decades later, a Parkersburg veteran has received the Purple Heart for injuries suffered during World War II.

Marvin Gainer, 89, received the honor in the mail last week.

Gainer was a private serving on torpedo boats around the Solomon Islands in the South Pacific from 1942-45. A bomb from a Japanese plane hit the water near Gainer's boat in 1943. Shrapnel tore up one of his knees and he suffered a concussion.

Gainer said a clerical error and inaccurate witness testimony caused a mix-up in his records.

more burglaries - both during the day and at night — and she guessed many were related to drugs.

One of the most surprising things she learned when she became a magistrate was the amount of drugs in Mon County, Holepit said, adding that the whole situation is "very sad."

WESTOVER MAYOR'S LETTER ON MORGANTOWN MALL ANNEXATION

To the Editor:

As this newspaper has reported, the City of Westover has applied to the Monongalia County Commission to grant a boundary adjustment that would bring the Morgantown Mall into our City. By allowing this adjustment, the County Commission will promote the best interests of not only Westover, but also the region and the Mall itself.

Westover's goal is to support further development of the Mall and the surrounding area as a reinvigorated economic engine in our County. The Mall's owner, Glimcher Realty Trust, a Columbus, Ohiobased company, has been a great neighbor in our community. Many of us have passed pleasant hours at the Mall shopping, participating in community events, or just enjoying the amenities at this well-run facility. However, the Mall exists as an island in an otherwise underdeveloped

Although almost 20,000 cars daily pass through this area, we continue to suffer underdevelopment around the Mall and across Route 19 along South Dent's Run. Because of disputes among various property owners, and a lack of big-picture planning, infrastructure is lacking to promote further development. For example, the Pleasant Hills subdivision installed a sewer line along Lawless Road. However, it is a pressurized main that prevents the many businesses between the subdivision and the highway from connecting to receive public utility service. There is even an out-parcel retail store that does not have restroom facilities.

Westover, along with our partners in County, State and the Federal government, will work to eliminate the impediments to further development of this area. The City already has plans to provide public sewer to several unserved areas, and will work to A drive around the Mall organize and serve the Mall and neighboring parcels

to realize the economic potential of this important part of our community. Besides improved infrastructure, the City will add additional police to its force and conduct routine patroling of the area to improve public safety and confidence.

Undoubtedly, Glimcher and the Mall tenants will not be pleased to pay taxes to Westover. However, both the new Wal-Mart that was annexed into Morgantown and the University Town Centre in Granville show that a City can deliver value to a retail center that far outweighs the cost of participation in municipal government.

The County Commission will hold public hearings on this proposal at the Courthouse on Nov. 17 at 10:15 a.m. in the Commission hearing room, and 7 p.m. in Courtroom 1. 

Westover would increase its tax base and could then afford to hire additional police officers, pave more roads, increase workers' pay and improve infrastructure to spur development in the area.

The mall, Johnson said, would not have to spend hundreds of thousands of dollars, by his estimates, on private security as city police officers would patrol the area. Also, they'd benefit from quicker response times in the event





of an emergency. Currently, State Police, headquartered near the Coliseum, and Monongalia County Sheriff's Department, on High Street downtown, respond to the mall when officers are needed.

The annexation, which has been attempted in the past, was made possible without the need for an election when Westover recently annexed 115 acres of property near the Morgantown Mall, property which includes Microtel, Bob Evans, Burger King, Lowe's and the Hyundai dealership. Johnson said a majority of those property owners supported the annexation and signed a petition.

That property gave Westover property adjacent to the mall on three of the four sides, Johnson said. This allows the city to seek a minor boundary adjustment from the county commission to complete the annexation.

A letter home

Just wanted to send everybody one last note to close out my year. I made it back to Bamberg (Germany) after about 6 days of travelling through Afghanistan and Kyrgyzstan. and have hit the ground running trying to get everything back to its pre-war state. It's been quite the week putting my apartment back together, get-

(Alex Smith was even able to make it over last week to welcome me back). Now it's time to relax — or kick off the party! – over the 4-day weekend!

I'm also happy to report that, at 11 p.m. last night, the last soldiers from my company arrived home, officially bringing our deployment to an end. With a little luck — and a whole lot of prayer support — we somehow managed to bring back every single Sapper alive and well. Truly a miracle given everything we saw these last 12 months.

It wasn't easy finishing it out though. In our last 72 hours on ground, our Squadron had to MEDEVAC 14 guys who had been hit — guys who were within 4 days of going home. Even on my last night I had a rocket land

I'm certainly looking forward to getting home next month and seeing as many of you as I can. I'll be flying into Morgantown on Dec. 22 and staying through Jan. 4. Get ready for some cookouts and fires at the usual spot!

Once again, I'd like to thank everyone for their amazing amount of support and prayers this year. My platoon and I are blessed to have such a great group of friends and family to keep us afloat. I can't wait to thank you all in person! Love and miss you all!

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AWOL soldier returns home on Veterans Day

NASHVILLE — AWOL soldier Jeff Hanks said he walked away from the Army in the middle of a deployment to Afghanistan because his problems with anxiety and stress from combat have been ignored. On Veterans Day, he returned to face the consequences.

The 30-year-old Army infantryman said he has suffered post-traumatic stress disorder (PTSD) since his 2008 tour in Iraq. He tried to seek treatment at Fort Campbell, Ky, last month during his mid-tour leave from Afghanistan. He said when his commanders failed to help and told him he would have to immediately go back, he instead went home to North Carolina.

The specialist could face less-than-honorable discharge or jail after turning himself in Thursday at Fort Campbell.

"All I wanted was to be treated. Going AWOL is not what I wanted to do," Hanks told reporters outside the gates of the Army post. He choked up as he talked about how his actions might affect his daughters, ages 5 and 3. "I am nervous but I'm ready to accept anything."

Hanks said in an interview before he left his home in White Lake, N.C., that he chose to return on Veterans Day because he didn't want to exceed 30 days of being AWOL and face the more serious charge of desertion. His actions and the timing were supported by Iraq Veterans Against the War, and some members of the group were with him as he surrendered.

Reporters weren't allowed on the post as Hanks turned himself in.

Hanks' unit command has discretion over what happens now, but Hanks could face a court-martial and jail time if convicted, Fort Campbell spokesman Rick Rzepka said.

"AWOL and desertion is a self-centered act," Rzepka said. "It doesn't only affect the soldier, but in a time of war puts other soldiers at risk."

Michelle Obama honors troops in Germany

RAMSTEIN AIR BASE, Germany — First Lady Michelle Obama surprised a group of U.S. servicemen and women based in Germany on Thursday, jumping in to serve them steaks at a special Veterans Day meal.

"Oh, my God! Where's my camera?" gasped Lavondee Stallings, a preschool teacher whose husband serves in the military, as Obama entered the banquet room at Ramstein Air Base's Officers Club.

Stallings was one of some 200 people with whom the first lady spent time during a refueling stopover on the way home from her tour of Asia with President Barack Obama.

"I am missing Sasha and Malia desperately," Obama said of her daughters, as she spoke to the group gathered for the donated steak dinner, grilled by volunteers from the California-based Cooks of the Valley.

"But it is a thrill to be here with you guys, because we are so grateful to all of you," she said. "Not just our servicemen and women, but their kids, wives, husbands and parents."

Mashed potatoes with gravy, peas, corn on the cob, garlic bread and lemon meringue pie rounded out the menu.

After serving, Obama went through the room doling out hugs, handshakes and warm thanks to troops and their families.

She also chatted with their children, asking if they worked hard in school.

Ten-year-old Malaysia Chevere got a special shoutout when she told the first lady about her grades.

"She's a straight-A student!" Obama told the room, as the fifth-grader and her mother beamed.

"It made me feel real proud," said Malaysia's mother, Sgt. Calvernette Chevere of Williamsburg, Virginia. "She [the first lady] made everyone here feel real special."

Before the stop at Ramstein, Obama met with wounded troops recovering at the nearby Landstuhl Regional Medical Center — the largest U.S. military hospital outside the United States.

There, Obama sought to cheer soldiers recovering from injuries sustained in Iraq and Afghanistan. Pvt. Eric Griego, 22, received a hug and a special presidential medallion, known as a commander's coin, from the first lady.

Griego's mother, Brenda, said her son "perked up" after the private meeting

and that it made him feel important, Landstuhl spokesman Charles Roberts said.

Besides meeting with the American troops, Obama met with her German counterpart, Bettina Wulff, before continuing her journey back to Washington.

Elsewhere in Germany, U.S. troops at the Grafenwoehr training range were participating in a Veterans Day competition being carried live on ESPN television.

W.Va. servicewoman statue ready for her post

CHARLESTON — The bronze sculpture of a female war veteran that has been mired in controversy since its inception has been set upon its concrete core at the state Capitol Complex.

She stands about 50 feet from the West Virginia Veterans Memorial on the west lawn, where her four brothers in arms - a Marine representing the Vietnam War, an airman representing the Korean War, a sailor representing World War II and a soldier representing World War I - stand in limestone enclaves.

The four statues also are her brothers in another way, because all were sculpted by Charleston artist Joe Mullins, who was on hand Tuesday morning when the 750-pound sculpture was hoisted from the back of a truck to the 9foot-tall concrete core. Workers from A.R.T. Research Enterprises in Lancaster, Pa., manned the crane that lifted the sculpture and set it upon the core. Long bolts were used to secure her to the concrete base. The 69-year-old Mullins. who designed the memorial, said he had been concerned that the statue would never find its home at the Capitol because of the controversy that erupted when the statue's design was unveiled in 2003. The main

The sculpture is undoubtedly female and looks every bit like the thousands of women serving in today's military. Her time period, he said, was to be about 10 years ago, around the time of the beginning of the conflicts in Iraq and Afghanistan. She is the only female statue on the Capitol grounds.

She stands in a relaxed pose holding a flagpole that will eventually bear a flag or pennant, though it hasn't been determined whether that flag will be bronze or fabric. She wears a T-shirt tucked into fatigue pants, which are creased and bloused over her combat boots. She also carries a utility belt strapped with various pouches and her hair, pulled into a bun, is tucked under her field cap.

Her jaw shows off hard lines, giving her a serious edge, but her body carries subtle curves while still showing off an athletic physique. She doesn't represent any particular branch of the military, as her clothes are commonly worn in all branches. "She tells future generations that this is what our generation, the current generation, thought women serving in the military should look like," Mullins said.

when the design was unveiled in his Hansford Street studio in 2003. He said walking up close to the 8-foot-tall statue in a closed setting might result in the appearance that the soldier is less than feminine simply because of its size.

The artist pointed to the sculpture's feet, noting that the toes were slightly angled upward, giving the effect that the soldier is on the move. The feet on the sculptures at the war memorial are the same.

While it took a year to sculpt the statue, with the help of studio assistant Bob Browning, it was not bronzed until several years later.

Mullins, an Army veteran himself who served during the time of the Cuban Missile Crisis, said designing the war memorial and sculpting the statues that pay tribute to those who served and those who died justified his life as an artist.

Ex-president George W. Bush honors vets in Ohio

DAYTON, Ohio — Former president George W. Bush said Thursday he's enjoying being away from politics and won't get involved in current debates about his successor or Washington.

"I will not be criticizing President [Barack] Obama," Bush told a Veterans Day tribute audience. "As a matter of fact, we wish him well. We're all Americans, and we want to succeed."

He said he didn't miss Washington, "all the politics, all the name calling ... the spitballs."

But he told some 1,500 people, many of them veterans, at the National Museum of the U.S. Air Force in southwest Ohio that he does miss serving as commander in chief.

With interviews and speeches, Bush has been vigorously promoting his newly released memoir "Decision Points." He focused his speech Thursday on parts of the book dealing with wars in Iraq and Afghanistan, and the support and inspiration he drew from wounded warriors, families of those killed during his presidency, and the military.

"America is a magnificent country that produces patriots," he said.

He offered thanks to those who have served in the military, "on behalf of a grateful nation," and smiled as he insisted: "I've really come to praise the veterans, not to sell my book. But if I sell a couple of copies, that's OK, too."

Charlie Crall, a mailman from nearby Medway, Ohio, said he mainly just wanted to see Bush and hadn't planned to buy the book. But he said he has decided to buy it after hearing excerpts and seeing some of Bush's interviews.

"From what I'm hearing, he speaks candidly," said Crall, 55. "I think it will be good reading."

Bush was back in a state that was crucial to his presidency. He twice carried Ohio, which clinched his reelection in 2004.

Miami University political scientist Ryan Barilleaux said the book and the Republican rout in Nov. 2 elections should help Bush burnish his image two years after leaving office with low approval ratings.

"I think President Bush is setting out to do as [Jimmy] Carter and [Richard] Nixon and other former presidents have done; trying to redeem themselves a little bit," said Barilleaux, whose books on the presidency include one on the term of Bush's father, George H.W. Bush.

"He can explain, here's the things I did and here's why I did them," he said, adding that Bush would want people to conclude that "even if we disagree with the things he did, we believe that he had the country's best interests at heart."

Emergency Management office lists winter safety advice

While preparing yourself, your family and your home for cold winter weather. it's important to know the risks of alternate heat sources and how to properly use them, said Mike Wolfe, deputy director, Monongalia County Office of Emergency Management. Make sure proper smoke detectors and carbon monoxide monitors are installed. By following guidelines and operating instructions, you can reduce the risk of fire and other health concerns for your loved ones. Some to follow:

Electric heaters

■ Electric space heaters should always be carefully checked before use, and monitored constantly while they are in use. Even if they came with safety features such as automatic shut-offs, monitor the heater yourself to make sure it is operating safely.

■ Use heaters on the floor. Never place them on furniture, since they may fall, dislodging or breaking parts that could result in a fire hazard.

■ Keep heaters away from wet or moist places, such as bathrooms; corrosion or other damage to parts in the heater may lead to a fire or shock hazard. Never use heaters to thaw pipes or dry laundry.

■ Keep cords out from under rugs or carpets. Placing anything on top of the cord could cause the cord to overheat and can cause a fire.

■ Do not use an extension cord unless absolutely necessary. Using a lightduty, household extension cord with high-wattage appliances can start a fire. If you must use an extension cord, it should be a heavy duty core such as those sold as an air conditioner extension cord (marked No. 14 or no. 12 A WG; this tells the thickness or gauge of the wire in the cord. The smaller the number, the greater the thickness of the wire).

Be sure the plug fits snugly in the outlet. Since a loose plug can overheat, have a qualified repairman replace the worn-out plug or outlet. Since heaters draw lots of

power, the cord and plug may feel warm. If the plug feels hot, unplug the heater and have a qualified repairman check for problems. If the heater and its plug are found to be working properly, have the outlet replaced. Using a heater with a hot cord or plug could start a fire.

■ If a heater is used on an outlet protected by a ground fault circuit interrupter (GFCI) and the GFCI trips, stop using the heater and have it checked, even it if seems to be working properly.

Have a broken heater checked and repaired by a qualified service center. This is not a do-it-yourself job.

Wood-burning stoves and heaters

Follow all building codes and manufacturer's instructions during installation. Place all stoves on an

approved floor protector or fire resistant floor.

■ Burn only seasoned hardwood - not trash, cardboard boxes or Christmas trees because these items burn unevenly, may contain toxins and increase the risk of uncontrolled fires.

Have a professional chimney sweep inspect chimneys annually for cracks, blockages and leaks and have them cleaned and repaired as needed. Check chimney and stove pipes frequently during the heating season for creosote build-up, especially if your firewood is at all on the green side.

■ Keep all people, pets and flammable objects, including kindling, bedding and clothing, at least three feet away from fireplaces and wood stoves.

Open flues before fireplaces are used.

■ Use sturdy screens or doors to keep embers inside fireplaces.

■ Install at least one smoke alarm on every level of your home and inside or near sleeping areas.

■ Keep young children away from working wood stoves and heaters to avoid contact burn injuries.

■ Use a metal container for ash removal.

Heroin mill found near **Times Square**

NEW YORK — A newly renovated, nearly \$4,000-amonth apartment two blocks from Times Square was being used as a major heroin-packaging mill, processing millions of dollars' worth of the drug for sale, authorities said Thursday.

Investigators who raided the West 43rd Street apartment Wednesday found 28 pounds of heroin worth about \$6.5 million in 250,000 small envelopes and workers busily packing the drug for sale, said the office of city Special Narcotics Prosecutor Bridget G. Brennan, the Drug Enforcement Administration and other agencies.

"If our investigators were surprised by the location, you can only imagine the shock of neighbors, commuters and theatergoers," Brennan said in a release.

Standoff on Bay Bridge briefly halts traffic

SAN FRANCISCO — A police standoff with an armed man who reported having explosives in his vehicle briefly halted traffic on Northern California's busiest bridge during Thursday's morning commute.

The 51-year-old man. described by authorities as mentally unstable, called 911 at about 7 a.m. after pulling over on the upper deck of the San Francisco-Oakland Bay Bridge and threatened to blow it up, said California Highway Patrol spokesman Sgt. Trent Cross.

Authorities halted all westbound traffic on the upper deck as officers negotiated with the man, who could be seen standing outside his SUV talking on a cell phone.

After convincing the man to surrender. officers passed him a pair of handcuffs and he put them on

SEOUL, South Korea -The world's economies stand on the brink of a trade war as leaders of rich and emerging nations gather in Seoul.

A dispute over whether China and the United States are manipulating their currencies is threatening to resurrect destructive protectionist policies like those that worsened the Great Depression. The biggest fear is that trade barriers will send the global economy back into recession.

Hopes had been high that the Group of 20, which includes wealthy nations like Germany and the U.S. and rising giants like China, could be a forum to forge a lasting global economic recovery. Yet so far, G-20 countries

The delegates have clashed in particular over the value of their currencies. Some countries, like the United States, want China to let the value of its currency, the vuan, rise. That would make Chinese exports costlier abroad and make U.S. imports cheaper for the Chinese to buy. It would shrink the United States' trade deficit with China, which is on track this year to match its 2008 record of \$268 billion.

But other countries are irate over the Federal Reserve's plans to pump \$600 billion into the sluggish American economy.

They see that move as a reckless and selfish scheme to flood markets with dol-

lars, driving down the value of the U.S. currency and giving American exporters an advantage.

Richard Portes, president of the Center for Economic Policy Research in London, said the dim prospect for a substantive agreement "is very dangerous for the world economy."

Portes said he fears "the possibility that currency wars and global imbalances might lead to severe trade protectionism over the next year or so."

For now, the G-20 countries are expected to agree on noncontroversial issues, like an anti-corruption initiative and the need for oversight by the International Monetary Fund.

Travelers disembark 'nightmare' cruise amid cheers

SAN DIEGO — They can call it a nightmare. A cruise from hell. Even a Spamcation.

Whatever they label it, the grueling three-day journey of the crippled Carnival Splendor is over, and the nearly 4,500 passengers and crew members can forget about the backed-up toilets, darkened, stuffy cabins and the canned meat.

"I love being back on land," said passenger Ken King, 42, of Los Angeles.

As the ship docked on Thursday, people who had gathered on the decks and about 100 waiting onshore cheered loudly. Along the harbor, tourists, joggers and fishermen stopped to snap photos.

Passengers snapped up \$20 T-shirts being sold on land with the phrase: "I survived the 2010 Carnival cruise Spamcation."

An engine fire aboard the 952-foot cruise liner on Monday morning knocked out power early in its seven-

day trip to the Mexican Riviera, setting the ship adrift about 200 miles outside San Diego and 44 miles off the coast of Mexico.

No one was hurt, but passengers said they were jolted awake by the fire. Few of them panicked.

Smoke filled hallways toward the back of the ship, and a smoky odor reached the front cabins. Carnival said a crankcase split on one of the ship's six diesel engines, causing the fire. "It felt like an earthquake

and sounded like a jack-

hammer,'' said Amber Haslerud, 27, of Chula Vista.

The captain immediately announced that there would be no need to abandon ship, said Amy Watts, 25, of Seattle. "You think about the Titanic," she said.

The fire left the ship without air conditioning, hot water or hot food. The casino was closed and, for a time, so were the bars. The swimming pool was off-limits because the pumps wouldn't work.

Navy helicopters flew in Spam, Pop Tarts, canned crab meat and other goods.

Passengers on lower decks had to climb as many as nine flights of stairs to get to the cafeteria only to meet long lines that stretched on for hours. By the time those at the end got to the food, they were left with tomatoes and lettuce, Haslerud said.

Some passengers carried food to those who used walkers and canes and couldn't climb stairs to reach the food lines.





Repeal opponents shot back, saying the group leading the study, which has not been released publicly, was biased and that selected details were leaked to the media this week in an effort to drum up public support for repeal.

"It's laughable to argue that people who anonymously leak one-sided information to a reporter are less likely to mischaracterize the findings of a 10month study than are people who wait to read that 370-page study in full," Family Research Council President Tony Perkins said.

Defense Secretary Robert Gates ordered the review in February, calling change inevitable but saying the study was needed to prepare for an orderly transition to open gay service.

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Murkowski camp cries foul in ballot count

JUNEAU, Alaska — U.S. Sen. Lisa Murkowski's campaign on Thursday accused observers for rival Joe Miller of making petty challenges in the counting of voters' write-in ballots in an attempt to tilt the Alaska Senate race in their favor.

Miller's campaign disputed the charge, saying observers are simply challenging votes that don't meet the strict letter of the law — including those with minor misspellings of Murkowski's name or those with legibility or penmanship issues.

Shortly after the second day of write-in ballot counting began in the race, a Miller observer challenged a vote for Murkowski that appeared to have her name spelled and printed correctly, though the "L" in "Lisa" was in cursive handwriting. "They're just absolute-

ly trying to boost their numbers," Murkowski spokesman John Tracy said.

But Chip Gerhardt, a Miller observer and attorney sent to the state by the National Republican Senatorial Committee, said the focus is ensuring a fair, legal count.

"The Murkowski cam-

paign can say whatever it wants," he said. "What's going on here, our focus is on following the law."

Miller has filed a federal lawsuit, seeking to bar the state from counting ballots that do not meet the standards set out in law; briefings on the issue are set for next week.

The law calls for write-in ballots to have the oval filled in and either the candidate's last name or the name as it appears on their declaration of candidacy scrawled in — in this case, either "Murkowski" or "Lisa Murkowski."

Use dummy's trumps to establish a suit

Marcus Aurelius Antoninus, a Roman emperor in the second century A.D., said, "Blot out vain pomp; check impulse; quench appetite; keep reason under its own control." Then the trumps will look after themselves.

In three columns this week, declarer had to retain enough trumps to draw the missing ones after he had all of his side-suit tricks ready to run. In this deal the trump suit is solid. The con-cern is safely establishing your side suit. You reach six hearts, and West leads the diamond king. What would you do?

North's four diamonds was a control-bid (cue-bid) showing the diamond ace and a good raise to four hearts. With a lloonngg diamond suit, North would have rebid five diamonds or three no-trump. You, with a possible two-club opening, stood on ceremony

not a moment longer. With a diamond loser, you must es tablish your spade suit, draw trumps, and run the spades. But the missing spades are more likely to be 4-2 than 3-3 (48.45 percent to 35.53 percent). And if the spades are breaking 4-2, you will have to ruff two spades in the dummy. Also, of course, you mustn't suffer an overruff.

This is the sequence of play: Win with dummy's diamond ace, play a heart to your ace, cash the spade ace and ruff a low spade in the dummy. Do not cash the spade king first. Then, play a trump to your hand and ruff an other low spade with dummy's heart queen. Finally, play a club to your ace, draw the last trump, and claim, conceding one diamond trick.

2 stars. This romantic comedy about a sunny, network morning show feels like ... well, a sunny, network morning show. It's glossy, moves quickly enough and has a few enjoyable personalities. Maybe the intermittent laugh. Rachel McAdams stars as the plucky, driven Becky Fuller, a young producer who has dreamed of working at the "Today" show since she was 8 years old. Instead, Becky is asked to help keep the fourth-place "Daybreak" alive. The network's head of news (Jeff Goldblum) isn't thrilled about hiring her, but no one else has stuck around for more than a year or so, so he decides to give her a shot. Becky soon finds herself navigating her prickly co-hosts (Harrison Ford and Diane Keaton), while trying to maintain a relationship with a fellow producer (Patrick Wilson). 1 hr. 50 min. PG-13 (some sexual content including dialogue, language and

brief drug references). "UNSTOPPABLE" — 3 stars. Finally, we've found the ideal use for Tony Scott's hyperkinetic, headache-inducing filmmaking style: A movie about a runaway train. barreling through small Pennsylvania towns filled with hardworking, unsuspecting people, at 80 mph. And threatening schoolchildren. Oh, and the train is a half-mile long and carrying hazardous material. Sounds insanely implausible, but that's part of the fun. While the premise may sound crazy - or like something out of a starstudded '70s disaster movie — it really happened. Mark Bomback's script is based on a 2001 incident in Ohio in which a train carrying hazardous cargo traveled 66 miles without a crew. But because this is a movie, the speeds are even faster, the danger is even greater, and there's only one man who can stop it and save all those innocent lives: Denzel Washington. With some help from Chris Pine. 1 hr. 38 min. PG-13 (sequences of action and peril, and some language).

"127 HOURS" — 3 1/2 stars. James Franco finds himself trapped beneath a boulder for 127 hours while exploring caves and canyons by himself. And even though the movie is about a man who's stagnant for five days straight, director Danny Boyle makes the story vital and vibrant in his signature kinetic style. 1 hr. 30 min. R (language and some disturbing violent content/bloody images). "DUE DATE" — 2 stars. Robert Downey Jr. is miserable, stuck on a cross-country drive with a creepy Zach Galifianakis. And it's easy to imagine how he feels: It's often torturous just sitting through the movie. Downey plays Peter Highman, an uptight architect whose wife is about to give birth to their first child. Galifianakis plays Ethan Tremblay, a clueless aspiring actor Peter bumps into at the airport in Atlanta.

Postal Service wants to test greeting cards pre-encoded with postage

WASHINGTON - Sticking stamps on all those holiday or birthday cards could become a thing of the past.

The Postal Service wants to test the idea of letting greeting card companies preprint postage on the envelopes they

include with their cards.

Then people could buy the special cards, and just sign and address them and drop them in the mail.

The post office hopes that by making it easier to send cards it will win back some of the business it has lost.

Full details haven't been published, but the test is expected to last up to two years. Card makers presumably would add the cost of the postage to the price of the card.

The company would pay the post office half the cost of the postage when it sold the

the card was mailed.

For example, in the test the post office plans to charge a premium price of 48 cents for the service.

Under the plan the post office would assign a special number to each company that

lope, including that number. When the company sold a card it would pay the post office 24 cents, which the agency would keep whether the card is ever mailed or not. If the card is mailed,

postal scanners would read the special marking as postage and send the card on for delivery. The scanners also would record the number of the company that sold the card and the company would be charged the remaining 24 cents of postage.

Stocks sink as outlook for Cisco disappoints

NEW YORK — Stocks tumbled Thursday after a disappointing outlook from Cisco Systems Inc. rattled a market already on edge as an economic summit of world leaders got under way in South Korea.

Global leaders were sharply divided over currency and trade policies heading in to the Group of 20 summit meeting in Korea, and a sense of pessimism was hanging over the start of the meeting of top officials from rich and emerging economies.

The Dow Jones industrial average fell 73.94, or 0.7 percent, to close at 11,283.10, after trading down as much as 126 earlier in the day. The index fell for three out of the last four sessions.

disappointed Cisco investors when it cut its sales forecast for a second quarter in a row, sending its shares down 16.2 percent to \$20.52. That dragged down shares of other technology stocks and other Dow components. Hewlett-Packard Co. fell 2.4 percent, while IBM Corp. fell 0.8 percent.

"Cisco is clearly a tech benchmark," said Philip Dow, director of equity strategy at **RBC** Wealth Management. "With a second disappointment in a row, people are questioning if their business model is broken."

The computer network equipment maker said its revenue will rise by less than half of what analysts had predicted for its November-

through-January quarter. There are worries that smaller competitors are cutting into Cisco's market share.

Technology shares have been among the best performing in recent months with more companies investing in new technology coming out of the recession. Cisco's cautious forecast puts a damper on expectations for broader growth in the sector in the coming quarters.

The Standard & Poor's 500 index fell 5.17, or 0.4 percent, to 1,213.54. The Nasdaq composite dropped 23.26, or 0.9 percent, to 2,555.52.

Volume was a bit lighter than in recent days because of the Veterans' Day holiday. Bond trading was closed for the holiday.

A State Department aide said money destined for the fund would go toward rubble removal, housing, a partial credit guarantee fund, support for an Inter-American Development Bank education reform plan and budget support for the Haitian government. The fund's projects must be endorsed by the reconstruction commission cochaired by former President **Bill Clinton and Haitian Prime** Minister Jean-Max Bellerive.

LOS ANGELES — After 3,000 comments, customer outrage and threats of boycotts, Amazon.com removed "The Pedophile's Guide to Love and Pleasure" from its Kindle eBook listings Thursday.

But the decision, which came after Amazon defended selling the book Wednesday, affected just the one book. At least one other publication offering guidance on pedophilia, "Understanding Loved Boys and Boylovers," remains for sale on Amazon.

The controversy has raised questions about Amazon's book vetting process and about whether companies such as Amazon, which traditionally have been thought of simply as tech companies, should exclude the sale of such books.

Off the sofa! Britain gets tough on welfare

LONDON — Britain announced the most radical overhaul in decades Thursday to its once-generous welfare system, pledging harsh penalties for those who refuse jobs and community work service for the unemployed in return for benefit checks.

Work and Pensions Secretary Iain Duncan Smith unveiled sharp changes to the country's cradle-to-grave social safety net, which was first introduced after World War II to better protect newborns, families, the jobless and the sick.

Critics have long said the British system offered hefty benefits unavailable to other citizens across Europe, the U.S. and other major economies — encouraging some people to snub modest jobs in favor of an easy life on handouts.

"The message is clear. If you can work, then a life of benefits will no longer be an option," said Prime Minister David Cameron, whose government last month announced it would slash benefits payments by \$29 billion under a four-vear package of spending cuts worth \$128 billion.

Under the new plan, many of the 5 million people who claim jobless benefits in Britain will be ordered to regularly do four weeks of unpaid community work to remain eligible for their \$105 weekly welfare payment.

The stints could include manual labor like removing graffiti or gardening in public parks.

Unemployment claimants routinely also receive other welfare payments to help with housing costs and raising children.

Chinese vase fetches \$69.3M

LONDON — An 18th century Chinese porcelain vase discovered when a house was cleared out was sold Thursday at a London auction for \$69.3 million.

Bainbridges, the auction house, said that the final price for the 16-inch vase - an imperially commissioned piece decorated with a fish motif — far exceeded the pre-auction estimated price, which was about 1.2 million pounds.

The final amount was thought to be among the highest ever paid for any Chinese artwork sold at auction.

After fierce competition among Chinese buyers, the vase was bought by a Chinese bidder who turned up to bid on behalf of an undisclosed buyer.

The auction house — a small, independent company in the London suburb of Ruislip that runs auctions and valuations for people clearing their homes said the vase is of exceptional quality.

Man arrested for shoplifting

Suspect said he was attacked in BFS robbery

A Morgantown man told police he was a victim who was attacked during an attempted shoplifting. But Monongalia County Sheriff's deputies believed Brian C. Holmes, 38, was part of the crime and arrested him for falsely reporting an emergency and conspiracy to commit shoplifting. On Nov. 7, Morgan went back to the store to view surveillance video taken during the incident. Reed told Morgan that the statement

Holmes gave was not true and that he was with the suspect.

The video showed the shoplifting suspect getting out of the vehicle driven by Holmes. The suspect entered the store and shoplifted. He then got back into Holmes' vehicle. The video also showed the sus-

pect leave the vehicle and run.

If convicted of the conspiracy charge, Holmes faces up to a year in jail and/or a fine of \$1,000. If convicted of the false reporting, Holmes faces up to six months in jail and/or a fine of \$500.

"One more shoebox means one more child — one more life that can have hope and know that their life is important," said Linda Rinehart, local coordinator, who witnessed the power of a shoebox gift while on distribution with Operation Christmas Child in the Dominican Republic.

This year, Monongalia, Marion, Preston and Wetzel volunteers hope to collect more than 6,000 shoebox gifts, she said. Last year, 4,300 shoeboxes were collected in the region.

"The power of a simple shoebox gift is incredible," she said. "No matter how many thousands of shoeboxes are collected, there are never enough to go around.

"The project allows me, from right here in Morgantown, to continue to impact the lives of children in countries I may never have the opportunity to visit."

Operation Christmas Child uses whatever means necessary - sea containers, trucks, trains, airplanes, helicopters, boats and elephants — to hand-deliver the gifts to children in more than 100 countries.

Operation Christmas Child, a project of international Christian relief and evangelism organization Samaritan's Purse, is the world's largest Christmas project.

Since 1993, Operation Christmas Child has collected more than 77 million shoebox gifts and delivered them to children in more than 130 countries.

Irrational fears about rationing

Health care reform may be stifled by unjustifiable, unproductive worry

The growing ranks of Americans without health insurance — more than 50 million, according to the Census Bureau's latest estimate — are a clear symptom of a dysfunctional health care system. A more subtle sign of trouble emerged just before last week's elections, when a blue-ribbon panel of doctors canceled a meeting to discuss guidelines for preventive care.

The 15 primary-care physicians who make up the Preventive Services Task Force, an independent group sponsored by the federal Agency for Healthcare Research and Quality, review the evidence about screening and other techniques for detecting and preventing disease, then advise doctors on which ones to use. The panel had been set to meet Nov. 1-2 to discuss, among other things, possible new guidelines for cancer screening. But the meeting was called off, ostensibly because of scheduling conflicts.

One of the task force's staff members, Dr. Kenneth Lin, offered a different explanation on his blog. According to Lin, "the question of why the meeting was canceled is perhaps easily answered by looking at the calendar" — a reference to the meeting's proximity to Election Day. "Politics trumped science this time, as it has in the past," he added, linking "in the past" to a *New York Times* story about the controversy over the task force's recommendation that fewer women receive routine mammograms.

The backlash over the mammogram recommendation was so severe that the Senate amended the health care reform bill to require federal programs to disregard the change in the task force's guidelines.

These episodes illustrate what may be the biggest challenge facing policy makers. Americans have a hard time accepting limits on their access to care, even if the treatment or drug is shown to be ineffective. They're much more willing to put up with rationing by income, which the current system imposes by allowing wealthier people to buy more and better care, than to accept even the whiff of rationing by the government.

Bear in mind that the task force doesn't try to determine whether screening saves money, or even whether a particular test works better. The panel simply tries to judge whether a prevention technique is medically effective. Nevertheless. a common, misguided criticism of the task force in the wake of the mammogram decision was that it was trying to cut costs, not improve medicine.

It's fair to debate how best to achieve health care reform. But it's hard to see how health care costs can be brought under control if attempts to make the system more efficient and effective get waylaid by irrational fears about rationing.

Obama's trip to Indonesia has some potential

BARACK HUSSEIN OBAMA, the mixedrace president born in Hawaii, partly educated in Indonesia defender of a controversial Islamic center near ground zero in Manhattan — is tentatively scheduled to visit Jakarta's Masjid Istiqlal, the largest mosque in Southeast Asia.

Mercifully, the American elections are over.

The timing lets Obama pursue U.S. foreign policy without over-worry that the mosque visit will reignite the fruitcake claims that Obama is really a foreigner and a Muslim.

Obama is Christian. Not that being Muslim should matter.

Such concerns endure, however. Fear of feeding homefront ignorance prompted Obama to steer clear of a visit to the Golden Temple, the most holy Sikh shrine in India. Sikhs are not Muslims. In fact, they often have



bloody conflicts with Muslims. But all male visitors to the temple must wear a traditional headdress. The president's handlers obviously don't want a photo of Obama in a turban.

Before Paul Wolfowitz became an architect of the war in Iraq, he was ambassador to Indonesia. Wolfowitz sees the visit as a potentially good occasion for burnishing America's image in the country with the world's largest Muslim population — assuming Obama doesn't go off on one of his apology jags, as he did in the Cairo speech last year.

"There's no question that Obama will be well-received," Wolfowitz told me. "They obviously like the fact that he has lived there. That's a big deal. They like the fact that he represents American tolerance and diversity, which they admire."

Although Indonesia's leaders have failed to adequately crack down on Muslim terrorists who attack churches, the country is not mired in religious extremism, according to Wolfowitz. Indonesia recognizes six religions. The nearly 250 million people in this country — three times the size of Texas — belong to 300 ethnic groups. The national motto is "Unity in Diversity."

Unlike most Asian countries, Indonesia extols youth, and that also works in Obama's favor. "They have enormous nostalgia for the Kennedys," Wolfowitz said. Working against Obama is continuing unhappiness over the war in Afghanistan, which much of the public sees as a war against Muslims. Indonesians are also troubled by the plummet in Obama's fortunes back home.

Wolfowitz's concern — shared by some of Obama's friends — is that the president might again wax apologetic about America or its values. During his much-criticized Cairo speech calling for "a new beginning" between America and the Islamic world, Obama noted several times that women may wear the hijab (Islamic head covering) in America without defending their right to not wear it in many Muslim countries.

Because of Obama's youth and multicultural background, he should be able to bond with these mostly Muslim audiences while recognizing certain realities. "When he speaks out in defense of religious freedom and against burning churches," Wolfowitz said, "people won't hear that as some right-wing evangelical thing."

Some Indonesian students are already protesting Obama's scheduled visit for the usual anti-American reasons. And recent natural disasters, volcanic eruptions and another tsunami, are bound to dampen Indonesians' enthusiasm. But Obama's reception should be generally positive.

And wouldn't a grownup conversation between the Indonesian people and the American president who once lived among them be a good thing for foreign policy?

Now that the United States is off campaign mode, however briefly, Obama is free to be both friendly and frank. Let's hope it comes off as planned.



De Laurentiis, last of the movie moguls, dies

Grandfather of Food Network star

NEW YORK — He was a small man who dreamed big, hit the highest heights and failed like few others.

Dino De Laurentiis was born to be a movie producer. The Academy Award-

winning legend of the Italian New Wave and producer of "Serpico" and "Barbarella" who helped revolutionize the way movies are bankrolled and helped personify the no-limits life of a cinematic king, died Wednesday night at the age of 91 in Beverly Hills.

His dozens of credits included the art-house classics "La Strada" and "Nights of Cabiria," the cult favorite "Blue Velvet," the Hollywood epics "War and Peace" and "The Bible," and such mainstream hits as "Three Days of the Condor." He backed hor-

ror films ("Halloween 2"), police drama ("Serpico") and the most far-out science fiction fused with sex and sexuality ("Barbarella").

And when he bombed, he really bombed: "Dune," about which director David Lynch complained he was denied creative control; the Madonna vehicle "Body of Evidence"; the 1976 remake of "King, Kong," which nearly finished off the career of Jessica Lange before it really started.

Not all his movies had big budgets, but De Laurentiis didn't think a film was real without real money. "Night of Earth" director Jim Jarmusch has spoken of meeting with the producer at his office, where De Laurentiis' desk was big as Jarmusch's apartment. He spoke to Jarmusch about the director's low-cost productions.

De Laurentiis was one of the first producers to understand the box-office potential of foreign audiences, and helped invent international co-productions, raising money by pre-selling distribution rights outside North America.

He was tiny, but tough, a veritable Napoleon on the set and utterly tireless.

"He was my biggest champion in life and a constant source for wisdom and advice. I will miss him dearly," granddaughter Giada De Laurentiis, a star chef and host on Food Network, said.

Garfield creator apologizes for strip

INDIANAPOLIS - Cartoonist Jim Davis apologized Thursday for a Garfield strip that some veterans may have found offensive.

The strip ran on Veterans Day in newspapers across the country. It shows a spider daring the pudgy orange cat to squash it. The spider tells Garfield that if he is killed, "they will hold an annual day of remembrance in my honor."

The final panel shows a spider-teacher asking its students if they know why spiders celebrate "Nation-

al Stupid Day." Davis, of Muncie, Ind., said in a statement posted on his website that he didn't know the strip would appear on Veterans Day. He said it was written nearly a year ago and called the publication Thursday "the worst timing ever."

"It absolutely, positively has nothing to do with this important day of remembrance," Davis said.

John Raughter, а spokesman for the American Legion, looked at the strip and Davis' statement and said an apology wasn't necessary.





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

Morehead State's Parsons weaned on soccer at WVU

To this day, the image remains vivid in WVU women's soccer coach Nikki Izzo-Brown's mind.

She often encountered a young girl dribbling a basketball around the Coliseum when she arrived at WVU to launch the women's soccer program, in the fall of 1995.

"Some day, you're really going to play soccer," Izzo-Brown would say, smiling.

Kaitlin Parsons, that young girl and the daughter of WVU deputy director of athletics Mike Parsons, usually giggled and shook her head no. Of course, Izzo-Brown's prediction came true.

Parsons played on an Izzo-Brown-coached under-12 club soccer team, served as a ball girl at Mountaineers games, worked WVU's camps and is finishing her collegiate career at Morehead State.

Obviously, they helped form me into the soccer player I am today because of the opportunities they've given me and everything they've taught me."

College football

The Western Athletic Conference is turning to Texas to deal with life after Boise State. The WAC said it was adding

the University of Texas-San Antonio and Texas State to a football lineup that will lose the BCS-busting Broncos next year and key members Fresno State and Nevada in 2012. The Texas schools and the University of Denver, which doesn't have football, will join the WAC in 2012. The current expansion plan gives the WAC eight football members.

The University of Montana Grizzlies will stay in the Big Sky Conference and not move up to the Football Bowl Subdivision, school President Royce Engstrom said. Montana will compete in an expanded Big Sky Conference in 2012, as the league recently added Cal Poly, UC Davis, North Dakota and Southern Utah.

■ A new study finds major gains in the number of minority head coaches at college football's highest level but less progress in other leadership positions. The report by The Institute for Diversity and Ethics in Sport at the University of Central Florida examined the 120 schools in the Football Bowl Subdivision. A record 15 coaches of color led FBS teams at the start of the 2010 season. But 100 percent of conference commissioners, 93 percent of school presidents and 88 percent of athletic directors at these colleges were white. Six new African-American coaches were hired at FBS schools this past offseason, while Turner Gill moved up from Buffalo to BCS conference member Kansas.

Golf

Tiger Woods hit the ball as well as he has all year, except on the greens. In his final title defense of a forgettable year, Woods opened the Australian Masters, at Melbourne, with a 2-under 69 and was four shots behind the early leaders at Victoria Golf Club. Woods missed only two greens in regulation, both times saving par from a bunker. But he took 19 putts on his outward nine, and had to hole a 7-foot par putt on the final hole to avoid his second threeputt bogey. Alistair Presnell and Adam Bland each shot 6-under 65, while Daniel Gaunt matched them in the afternoon. They were one shot clear of a group that included PGA Tour winner Andre Stolz.

■ Chris Stroud is doing his best to make sure Rickie Fowler's memorable rookie season doesn't have a fairy-tale ending at Disney World. Stroud shot a 10under 62 in the opening round of the Children's Miracle Network Classic, edging Fowler by four strokes. Roland Thatcher was three shots off the pace, and four others were tied with Fowler in third. Fowler has two second-place finishes this year along with a strong showing at the Ryder Cup — but hasn't won on the PGA Tour.

College basketball

Seventh-ranked Ohio State's star junior point guard, Samantha Prahalis, will miss the first three games of the season for a secondary NCAA rules violation. Prahalis was first-team all-Big

Ten this past season, averaging 16.3 points and 8.0 assists while setting a school record with 289 assists.

Pro basketball

San Antonio Spurs rookie James Anderson has a stress fracture in his right foot that is expected to keep him out for two months. Anderson has averaged 7.0 points while developing into a 3point shooter off the bench.

Auto racing

Travis Pastrana signed a deal with Michael Waltrip Racing that could put him in NASCAR's second-tier Nationwide series as early as next year. The action-sports star has formed a team called Pastrana-Waltrip Racing. Pending NASCAR approval, he will run seven Nationwide races next season and 20 in 2012. Pastrana is a star in Moto X, X Games and American rally racing.

Hockey

The Montreal Canadiens traded defenseman Ryan O'Byrne to the Colorado Avalanche for forward Michael Bournival. O'Byrne becomes a restricted free agent this summer and the deal trims \$1.4 million from Montreal's payroll.

T.J. Oshie, one of the St. Louis Blues' top forwards, will be out indefinitely with a fractured left ankle. Oshie leads the Blues with 10 points, scoring one goal.

Herd crash victims to be honored

40 years since football team was devastated

HUNTINGTON - The 75 victims of the 1970 Marshall University plane crash will be honored at the annual memorial service conducted by M.U.'s Student Government Association at 1 p.m. Sunday, on the Huntington campus.

The service will take place on the Memorial Student Center plaza on the 40year anniversary of the crash, which occurred at about 7:47 p.m. Nov. 14, 1970. A DC-9 jetliner returning Marshall home from its football game at East Carolina University, in Greenville, N.C., clipped some treetops just short of Tri-State Airport and went down. Victims included Marshall football players, coaches, staff and supporters, along with the crew of five.

Patrick Murphy, a New York native and president of Marshall's student body, said he knows how important the annual memorial service is to the surviving family members and the entire M.U. community.

"I have tried to plan the ceremony with the utmost sincerity and empathy for what I hope will be a memorial service that properly honors the victims and their families," Murphy said. "I have met so many people that have been affected by the events of November 14th and feel extremely honored to be given the opportunity and privilege to be a part of something that means so much to so many people."

Mickey Jackson, president of the Marshall University Alumni Association and a former running back and assistant coach for the Thundering Herd, will be the keynote speaker at the service. He was an assistant coach for the 1970 Thundering Herd and missed the flight because he, along with

assistant coach Carl Kokor, was scouting future Marshall opponent Ohio University in its game with Penn State.

"I am very proud and honored to have been asked to deliver the message — a very important message that needs to be repeated every year," Jackson said. "And that message is that we

those who lost their lives while contributing to the Marshall University football program."

Jackson said he always has mixed emotions when attending the memorial service.

"It is very inspirational to remember those folks and the relationships," he said. "But, it is very, very sad at the same time. When they place the wreath at the fountain and the water stops, my heart just stops beating.'

Jackson, a 1968 Marshall graduate, played football for the Thundering Herd from 1964-66. He gained 1,231 yards rushing for his career and scored 24 touchdowns. He lives in Columbus, Ohio, and formerly was backfield coach for legendary coach Woody Hayes at Ohio State.

Joining Murphy and Jackson as speakers will be Marshall President Stephen J. Kopp, Director of Athletics Mike Hamrick, and head football coach Doc Holliday. The service will conclude

Coach Jack Lengyel and much of the 1971 "Young Thundering Herd" team will be in attendance.

Impressive. But what raises an eyebrow about Wagner's achievements and makes them potentially even more impressive is, he's deaf.

His accomplishments while overcoming adversity make for one of the best feel-good stories in the state.

"He doesn't let it hinder him and we all have a tremendous amount of admiration for someone that has overcome and succeeded the way he has," UHS head coach John Kelley said. "It's a great story and shows the kind of character the young man has."

Even with his success, Wagner remains level-headed, deflecting praise to his teammates.

"I don't like to brag. I just like showing people I can do it," he said through an interpreter. "I would prefer [people] focus on the team. I like being a leader, but focus on the team."

His interpreter, Joyce Stire, who has been with him for 10 years, helps Wagner communicate with teammates and coaches during practices and games.

"They have a special relationship and already had things worked out between them as far as getting playcalling and instruction from the coaches," Bridgeport head coach Josh Nicewarner said. "But to be honest, he's like working with any other kid. He's a hard worker and he's going to do everything you tell him to do. The only difference between him and the

other kids is, he can't hear it coming from my mouth, but he can definitely tell when we're mad or when he does something good."

Stire relays plays to Wagner during games using sign language. But while on the field, he's forced to rely solely on his vision, whether he's navigating through downfield blocks, breaking on his teammates' movement during snap counts and audibles, or playing all the way through the whistle at the end of plays.

Still, coping in this manner is anything but a perfect science.

"There are challenges," Wagner said. "I have to watch to get the play call and what number play is called, and sometimes it's hard to see if the hand is

put in a wrong position to see the number.' Wagner is the focal point of the Indians' run-heavy

offense. "Corey's been our workhorse all year and that's not going to change now," Nicewarner said. "He's going to get his carries and he'll do his job. I expect him to carry the ball 30-35 times a game.'

And why not give him the ball? Wagner has been especially effective during the second half of the season, surpassing 200 yards on more than one occasion.

"You are not going to stop this guy," Kellev said. "You could find me the best defense in the state, they are not going to stop this guy. He's going to get his yards."

Kelley described Wagn-

er's bruising run style.

"[Bridgeport] runs it down your throat," he said. "It doesn't look like [Wagner] is getting a lot of yards, but the chains keep moving. He gets 3, 4, 5 yards, 3, 4, 5 yards, 3, 4, 5 yards and then boom, he busts one for 30, 40 or 50, and it starts all over again."

Containing the 215pounder will be a key if University hopes to pull off a first-round upset today.

"They control the clock," Kelley said. "So, if [Wagner] is up around 200 yards and they are controlling the clock, that does not bode well for us. I'd like to hold him to the mid-100s and [BHS senior running back Garrett] Parker to under 100, and I think we have a chance."

Steelers' QB admires Patriots counterpart

PITTSBURGH — Tom Brady's statistics didn't wow Ben Roethlisberger as much as his winning did.

When Roethlisberger joined the Steelers, in 2004, he considered the Patriots' Brady to be the NFL's preeminent quarterback. Certainly, Brady's numbers were good enough, but it was his determination to win that most impressed the evercompetitive Roethlisberger.

Six years later, Roethlisberger has won two Super Bowls himself, putting him only one behind Brady. Still, his opinion hasn't changed

— to Roethlisberger, the quarterback he'll oppose Sunday night, in Heinz Field, is the NFL's gold standard. The record's the reason.

Despite his own successful career to date, Roethlisberger is 2-3 against New England, with one win coming when Brady was injured in 2008. Brady, by contrast, is 5-1 against Pittsburgh, completing 143 of 212 passes for 1,658 yards, 11 touchdowns and three interceptions.

Roethlisberger's first NFL loss came in the final game of his rookie season - New England's 41-27 rout of Pittsburgh in the AFC championship game, in January 2005. Roethlisberger's first regular-season loss came eight months later, to Bradyled New England, at Heinz Field, but the Steelers rebounded that season to win the Super Bowl.

Going against Brady and the Patriots (6-2) gives him such a kick, Roethlisberger said, "We'll play on Wednesday at 2 o'clock if we have to." How about Sunday at 8:20

p.m.?



"You just sit there and watch him, I love watching whether it's on TV or live," Roethlisberger said. "Hopefully, he doesn't get to do too much this week, because that means our defense is doing great things.'

And what does Roethlisberger admire most in Brady?

"He's a good passer, a good leader, he seems to do a little bit of everything," said Roethlisberger, who is 80-of-141 for 1,004 yards, nine touchdowns and four interceptions in his five starts against New England.

season could have been her last in a WVU uniform.

"I think about that all the time," Ali said. "Sometimes, Vanessa and I talk about it like, 'Yo, we didn't get these injuries, we wouldn't be a part of this right now.' Not that I'm happy that we were injured, but I'm happy they were able to give us that year back and allow us to play another year and be a part of something good this year. I'm excited."

Ali shone in the Mountaineers' 99-42 rout of Fairmont State University on Saturday, at the Coliseum. She was one of five doublefigure scorers, with 18 points.

She sank 9 of 11 shots, most of which came as she finished off a Brooke Hampton-led fast break. The break is an aspect of the Mountaineers' game Carey hopes to use to exploit foes this season.

WVU averaged 62.9 points per game a year ago. Carey wants that number in the 70s this season.

"Our new fast break allows us to run straight down the court," Ali said. "With Brooke looking up and me beating the other girls down the court, that allowed [the 18 points] to happen."

Ali frustrated Carey at times this past season with her penchant for running down the middle of the court on the fast break. That made it difficult for point guard Sarah Miles to throw the ball over a defender in the middle.

This year, Carey has altered the break, and Ali should be more comfortable in it.

"I just told her, 'Do what you did last year,' " he said, chuckling. "She was always in the middle anyway last year. She does a good job running down the middle. That's a tough pass over the top like that, but Brooke Hampton did a great job making the pass."

they come to almost every game," Lewis said. "It's like a warm feeling knowing they are up there. If something happens or I'm upset after a game, I can go to them.

"It really helps, and it's also motivation to play for them and work hard for them because they've done so much for me. That does help me get through some games when I'm tired."

Lewis has been plagued by a sore ankle for most of her collegiate career, and she endured a frightening collision with a South Florida player's head, splitting open part of her upper lip. She required three stitches at halftime but returned in the second half and registered the game-winning goal.

Lewis wasn't about to miss the second half and let her team down.

"I've always said Meghan is that lunch bucket type of player," Scott Lewis said. "She brings it every game. She cares more about the team than she does herself. She's always been that way. I've always told her if I were picking a team, she'd be my first pick because it's always about the team with her."

That's one of the traits WVU coach Nikki Izzo-Brown has cherished in Lewis since Lewis arrived on campus, in the fall of 2008.

"She's never apprehensive about anything if it means we're going to have more success for this program," Izzo-Brown said. "She's probably one of the most unselfish players I've ever coached. It's been an absolute pleasure to coach her because of the team mentality and her ability to build team chemistry."

Lewis never, ever backs down from a challenge. Kate Lewis recalls when her daughter was 11 and her girls' team which included current WVU teammate Bri Rodriguez — played in a boys' league. Lewis' team

won a division title that year.

"It was hysterical to see them win and beat the boys' teams," Kate Lewis said. "They were the first all-girls team in Illinois to do that playing all boys."

Lewis was also a talented point guard in basketball. Scott Lewis recalls that her high school coach believed she had the ability to play at the Division I level, but soccer remained her first love.

Lewis played defensive center mid through most of her career in the high school and club ranks. She began starting on the back line this past season. She played every minute of every game a year ago. "I never thought I

would be on the back line here at WVU," she said. "As long as I'm playing, I'm happy, so I can't complain."

Winning helps, too, and the Mountaineers have been doing a lot of that lately. They tote a school-record 12-match winning streak into today's game, against

Morehead State. The players have pushed memories of their Big East title to the back of their minds.

"Monday and Sunday on the bus was the time to celebrate our win," Lewis said. "We know our focus is NCAA. It's awesome we won the Big East but trying to get far in the NCAA tournament is our main priority."

Scott and Kate Lewis plan to be there for every match, with or without a Springsteen song being played before kickoff. They love watching the 2010 Mountaineers play.

"It's just been amazing," Scott Lewis said. "Different people are stepping up at different times. We've won ugly. We've won lucky. We've won dominating. We've won every way you can possibly win. It's been a lot of fun to watch. A lot of these teams in the tournament have to be looking at us like, 'These guys are playing pretty good soccer right now,' and can't seem to understand why."

point guard Larry Wright (a transfer from St. John's) and center Keith Benson.

Benson, who is 6-foot-11 and 230 pounds, is the focal point after averaging 17.3 points and 10.5 rebounds per game this past season.

"We can't let him shove us around," Flowers said. "We watched how Pitt played against him last year and they were physical with him. We've got to be able to do the same."

As physically as the Panthers might have played Benson, he still scored 28 points and grabbed nine rebounds.

As for the Mountaineers' focal point, the team is banking on its experience. Despite the fact that Butler, Ebanks and Smith have moved on, it's the one asset the Mountaineers have.

"I think people are underestimating our experience," WVU point guard Joe Mazzulla said. "We've got two guys who will be starting for their third straight year. We've got three five-year guys and we've got guys who played some as freshman. "So, I think we have more experience than people think. It's just a matter of us putting it together." Just how experienced is this bunch of Mountaineers? Obviously, there are the Final Four and Big East tourna-

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Cal, Georgia try to take down top 2

If you can't be a contender, you might as well be a spoiler.

California and Georgia, winding their ways through mediocre seasons, can jolt the national title chase and give fans of No. 3 TCU and No. 4 Boise State a huge gift Saturday.

The Golden Bears (5-4) host No. 1 Oregon. The Bulldogs (5-5) are at No. 2 Auburn.

Cam Newton and Auburn could be distracted by reports that the star quarterback's recruitment has drawn at least some attention from the NCAA.

The Ducks will be playing in a stadium where they have lost three straight games.

Oregon and Auburn also hold the top two spots in the BCS standings. It's become apparent that no matter how much winning TCU and Boise State do, they need the Ducks or Tigers to lose to have a shot at playing for the national championship.

No. 1 in the AP poll has been beaten twice this season - South Carolina knocked off Alabama and Wisconsin beat Ohio State. Oklahoma was in first place in the BCS when it lost to Missouri.

Yes, they were all upsets, but all those top-ranked teams lost on the road to ranked opponents. The last time the No. 1 team in the AP poll lost to an unranked team was Sept. 25, 2008, when Oregon State upset Southern California.

You'd have to go back to 2007 to find the last time an unranked team beat No. 1 in November. That wild season it happened twice, when Illinois beat top-ranked Ohio State, on Nov. 11, and Arkansas beat LSU, on Nov. 23.

Illinois and Arkansas each had seven victories at the time of their big wins. The Illini ended up in the Rose Bowl that season and Arkansas went to the Cotton Bowl.

To find an upset that would be more akin to California knocking off Oregon, turn back to 2002. Oklahoma was No. 1 on Nov. 9 when it went to

College Station, Texas, and lost, 30-26, to a Texas A&M team that was 5-5.

As for No. 2 losing to an unranked team, the last time was in 2007, when it happened on five separate occasions. The picks:

Despite missing the Bearcats' most recent game, Collaros maintained the Big East lead in both total passing yardage (1,918) and passing touchdowns (20). WVU quarterback Geno Smith ranks second in both categories (15 TDs, 1,696 yards).

Junior Chazz Anderson, Collaros' backup, made his first start in more than a year in Cincinnati's most recent game, against Syracuse. He was a modest 18-for-31 passing for 148 yards with a touchdown and an interception, but he also led the team with 66 rushing yards.

Anderson provides the Bearcats with a little more of a running threat under center and, if Collaros isn't able to play, would present a slightly different set of challenges for the Mountaineers' defense. "I don't think that there's a great deal of difference in what they want to do with both quarterbacks in there," WVU defensive coordinator Jeff Casteel said. "But Chazz can run. He got loose against Syracuse a few times and they execute draws with him. He doesn't have the game experience that Zach has, but he's an athletic kid and a very capable quarterback." That's not to say that Collaros is an immobile pocket-the Bearcats have allowed 24 — Collaros has racked up 276 yards and two touchdowns on 54 carries. Only running back John Goebel has more rushing touchdowns (three) for Cincinnati. Collaros and Anderson "can both run, so we have to prepare for that either way." WVU cornerback Keith Tandy said. "But we don't



know how well Zach can run coming off the injury. Zach can throw the deep ball a little bit better than Chazz, but Chazz is a little bit faster. We're really just watching what they've been doing on film and trying to learn from that."

Cincinnati head coach Butch Jones was unsure of Collaros' status earlier this week. Jones said Collaros showed significant improvement during the bye week but was still slowed by the injury during the team's recent practices.

Mountaineers: Not checking out of the final four games

There are TV sets all around the WVU football complex at the Puskar Center. Typically, the screens show the team's daily sched-

ule, letting players, coaches and staff members know where to be and when. One night this week, the

TV screens displayed a different message. Two words were showcased above the list of normal activities.

"Gut check." "Right now, people have to anyone on this team. That doesn't bother anyone."

Instead, WVU's players said, the past two weeks have been about taking responsibility and trying to correct the mistakes before Saturday's game, against Cincinnati (3-5, 1-2). That process started in the film room. One day, WVU offensive coordinator Jeff Mullen gathered the entire offense together to rewatch each and every offensive snap from the Connecticut game. Typically, it's not done that way: The individual position groups (running backs, wide receivers, quarterbacks, offensive linemen) will rewatch

the film privately. It was done out of neces uation. WVU likely has to win its last four games and have other conference teams lose specific games to have a chance at winning a piece of the Big East championship.

The Mountaineers maintain that goal is still there for the taking and remains their top priority.

"People think the season is over. The season is not over, I am telling you that right now," Barclay said. "We've just got to take it one game at a time, but there's a lot of football left. They're going to remember November."

"Oh no, this season is far from over. If you hear anyone saying that, you should let me know," senior defensive

find themselves," WVU offensive lineman Don Barclay said. "You have to see where you want to be. If we want to be winners, we can be winners. If we want to curl up in a ball, we can curl up in a ball and pack it in for the season. But no one on this team wants to do that, and I can just tell in practice because everyone is out there working so hard." "I don't know how injured Zach is, but I know what kind of competitor he is," Stewart said. "They had to take his helmet and hide it from him [to keep him from playing while injured] on the last drive a couple of weeks ago. Good gracious. That's a real tribute to him."

Native American tribes seek trade ties with Turkey

ANKARA, Turkey - Native American tribal leaders and businessmen seeking trade ties with Turkish companies have offered them tax incentives to operate in their territories in the United States, the organizer of the trip said Thursday.

Native American businessmen are increasingly seeking global business partnerships to create jobs and new

businesses in their territories. They have held talks with Chinese, Spanish and Australian companies, but their tribal leaders' trip to Turkey was the first large-scale overseas exploration of new trade ties, they said.

Lincoln McCurdy, president of the Turkish Coalition of America, which organized the trip, said Thursday that the Native American tribes belong to sovereign nations that can strike their own trade deals and offer special tax incentives.

"Native Americans are becoming global-minded," said McCurdy, adding that they already have held talks with





Iceland launches probe into U.S. surveillance

REYKJAVIK, Iceland — Iceland has joined other Nordic countries in launching an investigation into a controversial U.S. Embassy surveillance program.

Iceland's Ministry of Justice and Human Rights will try to determine whether the U.S. embassy's program of monitoring some citizens violates the civil rights of residents living near the embassy, which sits in a residential area in Reykjavik's old city center.

Nigeria links Iran to arms shipment

ABUJA, Nigeria - Nigerian intelligence officials and diplomats have concluded that the Iranian government was behind a secret shipment of weapons discovered last month in shipping containers, according to internal documents seen Thursday by The Associated Press.

Immediately after the arms seizure, Israeli officials accused Iran of trying to sneak the shipment into the Gaza Strip, but Nigeria's security service now believes the arms were imported by some local politicians to destabilize Nigeria if they lose in the coming general elections.

The cargo that was shipped from an Iranian port was listed as building materials, but when the 13 containers were opened at Nigeria's main port in Lagos, inspectors found 107mm artillery rockets, rifle rounds and arms.





Sunni walkout mars Iraq parliament session

BAGHDAD — Iraq's president gave Shiite Prime Minister Nouri al-Maliki the nod to form the next government Thursday after an eightmonth deadlock, keeping him in his post despite a dramatic Sunni walkout from parliament that demonstrated the deep distrust between the two sides.

The walkout and the fact that it came just one day after an accord was forged to work together dealt a blow to hopes leave by the end of next year. for a unified government especially one that ensures continued Shiite domination while giving Sunnis a role far short of the greater political power they seek.

Sunni support is crucial. The Americans had been pushing for them to have a significant role, fearing that otherwise, disillusioned Sunnis could turn to the insurgency, fueling new violence as the last of U.S. troops prepare to

The power-sharing deal reached Wednesday night was heralded by some politicians as a breakthrough, ending the months of wrangling since the inconclusive March 7 parliament elections. But Sunnis were already accusing al-Maliki of not fulfilling promises and have warned they could pull out if they are not met.

At a press conference after the walkout, a lawmaker from the Sunni-backed Iraqiya bloc, Haider al-Mulla, did not answer when asked whether the bloc would participate in the government. Instead, he said Iraqiya would seek "explanations from al-Maliki and State of Law over their broken commitments."

The session was called so lawmakers could take the first formal steps toward forming the new government by naming senior leadership positions. It began with a show of unity, as al-Maliki

and his top rival, Iraqiya's leader Ayad Allawi, sat next to each other in the chamber, smiling and chatting.

The first vote went smoothly, with a Sunni from Allawi's Iraqiva block. Osama al-Nujaifi, elected parliament speaker. But before the vote to elect a president, about 57 Iraqiya lawmakers walked out. They had demanded that lawmakers first vote to reverse a ban on three of the blocs' members by a committee charged with rooting out members of Saddam Hussein's regime from government posts. Their demand was rejected.

Iraqiya lawmakers have said that as part of the power-sharing deal, the other factions agreed to get rid of the controversial De-Baathification law entirely within two years. Sunnis view the De-Baathification process as a thinly veiled Shiite attempt to bar Sunnis from returning to power.

American on trial in Yemen probed about al-Qaida

SAN'A, Yemen — A 26vear-old American imprisoned in Yemen for 10 months and accused of ties to al-Qaida had multiple contacts with a radical U.S.born cleric who is a key figure in the terror group's Yemeni offshoot, his lawyer said Thursday.

Sharif Mobley came to


Yemen in 2008 to study religion and Arabic, but was arrested in January for suspected links to al-Qaida. Last month, he was charged with killing one of his guards and wounding another while attempting to escape in March from a hospital where he was receiving treatment. His U.S. lawyer, Cori

Crider, said Thursday that

Mobley had been in touch with Anwar al-Awlaki, the radical cleric, seeking advice about daily life in Yemen.

U.S. intelligence has linked the 39-year-old al-Awlaki, who was born in New Mexico, to the Sept. 11, 2001, hijackers and to last year's failed Christmas Day bombing of a jetliner over Detroit. He also has ties to Maj. Nidal Malik Hasan, the Army psychiatrist accused of killing 13 people in November at the Fort Hood, Texas, military base.

The United States has already authorized the CIA to capture or kill al-Awlaki, and Yemen has brought charges against him last month for his alleged role in the killing of foreigners.



Regulator: Oil fire may have caused A380 problem

SYDNEY — Leaking oil may have caught fire in the engine of a Qantas superjumbo and set off a violent disintegration that sent pieces of machinery slicing through vital control systems in the wing of the world's largest jetliner, Europe's air safety regulator said.

The agency issued an emergency order requiring airlines to re-examine Rolls-Royce engines on Airbus A380s and ground any planes with suspicious leaks. The order by the European

Aviation Safety Authority echoed earlier indications from investigators that a turbine disc — a heavy metal plate that holds the blades of the turbine that powers the jet was the first piece to come apart as the Qantas jet climbed over Indonesia. It was the first official mention, however, that an oil fire could have preceded the disintegration.

The A380 engine failure shortly after takeoff from Singapore on Nov. 4 has raised concerns over the safety of the world's biggest passenger airplane three years after its debut.

Screening colon is protocol

DEAR DR. GOTT: I just turned 50, and my doctor keeps talking about ordering a colonoscopy for me. I'm not sure I want to undergo one and haven't even asked what one entails. Can you enlighten me?

DEAR READER: This is a simple same-day procedure, meaning that you will enter the hospital in the morning, have the procedure performed, and be discharged a short time after the sedative wears off.

Colonoscopy is preceded by a preparation that will be explained by someone from your doctor's office. You will be given a solution to drink that will remove all solids from your digestive tract. Following that, you will be restricted to drinking liquids such as clear soup broth. fruit juice, ginger ale or tea the day before.

Once in the operating room, your doctor will insert a flexible tube with a camera known as a colonoscope into your rectum. Air will inflate the colon as the colonoscope advances. Images from the camera will be sent to a computer monitor that he



or she watches throughout the procedure. If polyps or unusual tissue are noted, small tools can pass through the scope to remove the questionable material so the tissue can be biopsied.

The whole process usually takes an hour or less. You will then be taken to the recovery room, and once the sedative wears off, will likely be free to go home. Because of the sedative, it will be necessary to have a ride home. Some patients experience temporary gas and bloating following colonoscopy because of the air introduced into the rectum, but this is normal.

Your physician will advise you to report to him or her if pain, bleeding, fever or other symptoms occur. At your next appointment or through a telephone conversation from your physician, you will be advised of the results. If all is well, you will likely be cleared from further testing for five to 10 years.





The Dominion Post Want to know how tough it was on Bob Huggins to see his team's postseason run end one game short of the national championship game? Ask him how long it took to cope with the WVŪ men's basketball team's 78-57 Final Four loss to Duke, and his short answer reveals a lot. "I've never

watched the game," he savs matter-of-factly. Huggins typically rewatches all his team's games once a season ends. But he has not relived that April 3 night in Indianapolis. He has no desire to ever do SO.

'People [ask me why I did that] all the time, but it never even crossed my mind. You've got a guy out there hurt, I mean that's what I do in practice, and that's what I would do if we were playing Mountain State in an exhibition game," Huggins said. "At that time it was all about Da'Sean.'

Coaching the rest of that game was no easy chore. In fact, the action on the floor became of second importance to Huggins, although Duke led by dou-

"It's hard to coach guys when you've got timeout and they all have tears running down their faces because they feel so bad for Da'Sean. I'll be honest with you - it's hard,' Huggins said. "It's hard to think about anything other than him. It was more about Da'Sean than it was the rest of the game.

How the run ended is a moment no one on the WVU basketball team will ever forget. And the Mountaineers want to keep it that way.

You still think about it, but it probably took a month or so to the point where in off-season lifting, we kind of had to put that behind us to work to [this] season," WVU point guard Joe Mazzulla said. "You never forget something like that, and you always want to keep it in the back of your head as you compete."

Despite that gutwrenching end to a recordsetting year, the Mountaineers enter the 2010-'11 season in hopes of surpassing the success they had last year.

It will be no easy task. Not only has Butler, the school's third all-time leading scorer, graduated, but fellow starters Devin Ebanks and Wellington Smith are gone from a WVU team that won a school-record 31 games.

In March, the Mountaineers won nine straight to claim the school's first Big East championship, earn a twoseed in the NCAA tournament and advance to the Final Four for the first time since 1959.

"I had a lot of people tell me they didn't make any money because they

were too busy going to tournament games, Huggins said. "There weren't a lot of billable hours [in March]."

Huggins would be just fine making the state of West Virginia a little less productive each March during tournament time.

'I am anxious to get back every year because that's how it is this time of year," Huggins said.

The journey begins today, as WVU opens the season 9 p.m., against Oakland. But this year's Mountaineers team will likely look significantly different than the 2009-'10 version. WVU returns starters Truck Bryant and

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WVU Women's team sets lofty goals

The WVU women's basketball players gather in a tight circle after each practice on the Coliseum floor, as sweat drips off their faces they muster the strength to join hands and shout out: "National cham-pionship!"

With the bulk of their roster returning from a record 29-6 campaign, the Mountaineers will settle for nothing less than cutting down the nets at Lucas Oil Stadium, in Indianapolis, in April.

WVU has been knocked out of the NCAA tournament in the second round in its last three appearances. San Diego State ousted the Mountaineers this past March in Austin, Texas, 64-55.

The defeat stung the Mountaineers' players and strengthened their resolve to make a Final Four run this spring.

'We want to win a national championship, and that's our goal," senior shooting guard Liz Repella said. "We realize we have the talent to do so. This is going to be our year to do it if we want to do it.'

Defending national champion and Big East rival Connecticut likely will have something to say about that. WVU coach Mike Carey is doing little to stem his players' enthusiasm for what he believes can be a special season in Morgantown.

"Naturally, we want to make the NCAA, and we want to advance past the second round," he said. "Anything can happen once you get to that point. Am I going to say we want to go Final Four and win the national championship? Absolutely. We want to do that. "To do that, a lot of

things have to take place before that, including winning a lot of games in the regular season just to get into the NCAA and then doing well in the NCAA."

Senior forward Korinne Campbell is confident the Mountaineers can do just that.

"I definitely feel like this is the best team I've been on," she said. "We have a lot of new players, and they contribute a lot to the offense, defense, leadership-wise and everything. All the people who came back have improved in certain ways. That just makes us a better team.'

WVU enters the season, which begins with today's home game against Loyola, Md., ranked 11th in the Associated Press and coaches' polls.

The Mountaineers were picked second – behind Connecticut – in the Big East preseason coaches' poll.

"We definitely earned the respect of coaches in the Big East," Campbell said. "A lot of people consider the Big East to be the toughest conference in the country, so to be No. 2 in the polls is a lot of respect. Now, I feel like we have to live up to No. 2, but we still feel like we're No. 1."

It's a vastly different scenario than the one a young WVU stared down a year ago, when little was expected from a Mountaineers team picked to finish ninth in the preseason coaches' poll.

underdogs," senior point guard Sarah Miles said. "This year, we have to have that same mindset, even though we have the bull's-eye on our backs this year. We're going to continue to keep the same mindset as last year."

The Mountaineers have already faced some adversity. Miles underwent surgery on her right wrist after injuring it in a box-out drill on the first day of preseason practice and isn't expected to play in tonight's opener. Her spot has



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
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

Kevin Jones, as well as key contributors Mazzulla and John Flowers. Huggins expects more out of sophomores Dalton Pepper, Danny Jennings and Deniz Kilicli, as well as seniors Casey Mitchell and Cam Thoroughman. Fellow senior Jonnie West has rejoined the team, and two freshmen, Noah Cottrill and Kevin Noreen, arrived in Morgantown this summer.

The Mountaineers thrived a season ago with a certain grit and determination, owning one of the nation's top defenses and having the uncanny ability to overcome first-half deficits and win close games.

In all, Butler had six game-winning shots last season.

Huggins expects this year's team to run more – the Mountaineers will likely play point guards Bryant and Mazzulla a lot together – use a full-court press and average more points per game. WVU, which played either a man or 1-3-1 defense almost all of last season, could operate out of the 2-3 zone defense when Jennings (6-foot-8, 260 pounds) and Kilicli (6-9, 270) are in the game at the same time.

Each of Huggins' previous three teams have had a slighlty different playing style, and this year won't be an exception. The players credit that ability to

true freshman Brooke Hampton, and junior college transfer Bianca Jarrett has also seem time at the point. The Mountaineers struggled to get the ball up and down the court in a preseason scrimmage, against Penn State. That's one facet of the game Carey has emphasized with his team.

The Mountaineers had trouble reaching the 60-point plateau toward the end of this past season.

"We have to score," Carey said. "We have to be able to score in the 70s this year, so we're trying to push it up a little bit quicker and maybe get some easy shots and quicker shots than we have in the past. We didn't run the floor like we're capable of running [against Penn State]."

WVU has all four of its double-digit scorers returning. Repella averaged 13.9 points, Campbell 10.5, Miles 10.1 and center Asya Bussie 10.1. The Mountaineers expect to get more scoring from the center position change successfully to their coach, and his understanding of how to best utilize his players' strengths.

"I think at some other universities, coaches aren't willing to change or aren't willing to flex their coaching philosophies, where as [during] Huggs' first year here, that's all he did - adapt to us," said Mazzulla, a fifth-year senior. "I think that's why we were so successful [advancing to the Sweet 16 of the NCAA tournament, in 2008]. I think the fact that we can change is what makes us successful, especially when you go up against teams that do so many different things [in the Big East]."

Huggins isn't alone in feeling a bit unsatisfied entering this season. Although WVU begins the season off the national radar (the Mountaineers aren't ranked in any preseason polls), the goal is to recapture a top 10 ranking, make the NCAA tournament and finish business.

"We've been to the Final Four. We know what it takes, we know how to get back there, and we know what we have to do," Mazzulla said. "I think with that approach we can work that much harder and play with that much more confidence. I just hope we can translate it from practice into games."

this year.

Natalie Burton returns for her junior year after averaging 2.7 points and 2.2 rebounds per game. WVU is adding Ayana Dunning, who sat out this past season after transferring from LSU.

"We're in a great position this year at the [center] position, the best we've been in since I've been here," Carey said. "When one of them gets tired, we have two others sitting on the bench. If we want to go big, we can go big and still have somebody resting on the bench."

Like her coach, Campbell is encouraged about the Mountaineers' offense.

"I definitely think scoring points this year will be easier because we have more scoring options, more people on our team who can score in many different ways," she said. "Even with our new people, they bring a different feel to the offensive end. People don't know exactly what they are going to do – if they're going to shoot it, drive it, post up. I think we're going to have more scoring this year."



Dunning ready to make her mark with WVU

The Dominion Post Ayana Dunning won't ever forget her first meeting with WVU women's basketball

coach Mike Carey. "It's an interesting story,"

she said, smiling.

Dunning, a highly touted 6foot-3 center from Columbus, Ohio, was playing in a game at the Nike Nationals as Carey watched from the sideline.

"I tried to steal the ball, and I knocked it out of bounds and hit him right in the chest," she said.

Dunning ran over to Carey and apologized.

Carey's response?

"OK, you owe me a visit for that," he said.

He didn't get it, as Dunning committed to Southeastern Conference power LSU. Two years later, after Dunning decided LSU wasn't the school for her, she visited Morgantown at Carey's request.

"I just fell in love," she said. After sitting out this past season, Dunning is ready to return to the court, as the Mountaineers take on Loyola, Md., at 7 p.m. today in their season opener, at the Coliseum.

"Just being a competitive person, it's hard to sit there from the sideline and just watch," she said. "I learned a lot from the coaching perspective. I was able to see stuff from their point of view. I think it helped me in the long run. I'm definitely excited about being able to play."

She averaged 5.1 points and 4.2 rebounds during her lone season at LSU, scoring a season-high 20 points and pulling down five rebounds in a game against Vanderbilt.

Dunning is part of a strong trio of post players at WVU. Asya Bussie returns for her second season as a starter. The

Mountaineers also have Natalie Burton, who was a key reserve for WVU a year ago after starting for most of her freshman season.

"Dunning is probably the most physical of all the posts, and she has great hands and can score in the paint," said Carey, who hopes to go with a two-center lineup at times this season. "She also can step out and shoot the jumper, which makes her a little bit more effective. They have to come out and guard her. She's a hard matchup."

Dunning's father, Alfred, who played college and semipro basketball, encouraged her to develop her jumper.

"He was 6-foot-5, and for a guy, that's a guard," she said. "So he played guard in college and in semipro. I shot a lot with him. I also developed my game with my back to the basket. My strength is my inside game, but he focused on me being able to shoot, which would help extend the defense and help my team out and open up things for them also."

Dunning has already warmed to the idea of teaming with Bussie or Burton in the post this season.

"I think we'll have a lot of mismatches being able to play together, both of us being 6-4, strong with our backs to the basket and being able to face up," she said. "I think it puts a lot of teams at a disadvantage playing us."

The Mountaineers are expected to put most of the teams on their schedule at a disadvantage. WVU has been picked to finish second in the Big East Conference and is ranked 11th in the preseason Associated Press and coaches' polls.

"The actual ranking itself, we

try not to focus on," he said. "It's a great ranking, but at the end of the day we don't want to finish 11th. We're not practicing to be 11th. Everyone on this team wants to win. The number right now is not big to us. We're just focusing on winning games and hopefully surpassing that 11th [ranking]."

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WVU's Jones ready to take charge

Joe Mazzulla was asked, which WVU men's basketball player would be given the ball this season to take a game-winning shot?

He looked back, then to his left, and then finally to his right. Da'Sean Butler was nowhere in sight.

"I think Kevin Jones will see the ball in his hands a lot more,"Mazzulla finally said. "I think we have a number of different guys who can step up in that situation, but I think KJ will probably have the ball a lot in those situations."

Is Jones ready to become the next in line after Butler? It's something he worked hard toward in the offseason.


"We;re going to be a young team," Jones said. "We lost a lot of leadership, and I'm going to try and provide as much leadership as I can.

"That's not usually my role. I look around now, and I see I'm one of the older guys, so I have to provide leadership along with Truck [Bryant], Joe, Cam [Thoroughman] and the other upperclassmen."

WVU coach Bob Huggins said that on-court leadership Jones is hoping to provide showed up the first day of practice.

"We weren't very good the first day," Huggins said. "I looked over at Kevin Jones, and KJ went about a year and a half, I think, without speaking, but he called everybody in. Basically what he said was, 'Don't just come in here to get through things. Come in here every day with the idea of getting better.'"

This past season, Jones was the quiet kid with the big smile and big game in a system that counted primarily on WVU's top



three forwards – Butler, Jones and Devin Ebanks.

Butler provided the scoring and leadership. Ebanks provided the defense and rebounding, while Jones thrived in the role of being able to play knowing opposing teams focused more on Butler and Ebanks.

Along the way, Jones set a school record with 135 offensive rebounds and averaged 13.5 points per game, while shooting 52.1 percent from the floor.


Jones will not have that freedom this season with Ebanks now playing for the Los Angeles Lakers and Butler is in Miami rehabbing his injured left knee with hopes of making it in the NBA.

Still, Jones is not expecting to go out and pick up the slack by himself. He looks at his teammates and points out the experience of Mazzulla and Bryant at point guard. He sees better seasons coming from Casey Mitchell and Dalton Pepper after getting a year of experience under their collective belts, and he sees major improvement from 6-foot-9 post player Deniz Kilicli.

"This is not going to be a oneman team or a two-man team," Jones said.

And, as far as Jones' game goes, while he worked in the offseason to improve his ball-handling skills, he knows he's at his best by continuing to do what he does best. If he is to become the Mountaineers' go-to guy this season, he'll do it in his comfortable fashion.

"I have to stay in my comfort zone," he said. "I can't go out and try to become a completely different kind of player. That's not going to help this team. The best thing we can do is play together as a team. We need for everyone to be active."

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The Big East could be guard-heavy this year

NEW YORK – A season after sending eight teams to the NCAA tournament and West Virginia to the Final Four, the Big East is undergoing some change.

Lots of it.

Consider this:

■ Only one of the league's top 10 scorers (Seton Hall's Jeremy Hazell) returns this season.

■ Only three of the league's top 10 rebounders (Seton Hall's Herb Pope, South Florida's Jarid Famous and WVU's Kevin Jones) returns.

■ Traditional powers Louisville and Connecticut were picked eight and 10th in the preseason poll, repsectively.

"That's crap," WVU coach Bob Huggins said during Big East media day. "When is Connecticut going to finish that low? That's not going to happen. People want to talk about how the league could be down this year. When was the last time Rick Pitino didn't win 20 games. People say Louisville is down, but they don't have to play them."

■ Of the six players selected to the league's preseason first team, five of them were guards, including Georgetown's Austin Freeman, who was the Big East's preseason Player of the Year.

"It's unconventional to think of this league as being guard-dominated, because it's never been like that before," UConn coach Jim Calhoun said. "We've had very good guards come through this league, but the Big East has always had the bigs to go with them."

"If this is the year for guards, then we're very glad to have the two we have," added Georgetown coach John Thompson III. "Austin Freeman and Chris Wright have both shown the ability to lead this team. This could be a different year for the league, though, because there may not be any established low-post players early on in the season."

Among the first questions to be answered for the league: Who will be its top players?

Hazell is an established scorer (1,789 points in 96 career games),

but the Pirates have never finished higher than 10th or won more than nine league games in any of his three previous seasons.

This past season, it was Syracuse's Wes Johnson coming out of nowwhere to take the league by storm. After sitting out a season after transferring from Iowa State, Johnson was named the league's player of the year by averaging 16.5 points and 8.5 rebounds.

"I think what you have is a lot of unproven guys in the league this year who need to step up and make a name for themselves," Cincinnati coach Mick Cronin said. "There is talent in this league, but maybe they haven't had the chance to shine, or maybe they weren't ready for their chance to shine. They need to be ready now."

The next question: Can this league still be as dominant?

Pitt was the overwhelming preseason favorite to win the league and the Panthers return four starters, but Pitt was beaten by Xavier in the second round of the 2010 NCAA tournament and has never been to a Final Four.

"I really think the league is wide open this year, maybe more than its ever been," Pitt coach Jamie Dixon said. "I don't think you have those one or two power teams in the conference. When you look at it, I don't think anyone would be all that surprised if teams who were picked 8,9, or 10 finish much higher than that."

In 2009, the league qualified seven team to the NCAA, including Pitt, Connecticut and Louisville as No.1 seeds. This past season, eight qualified, and the Big East has had at least one team in the Elite Eight since 2002 – the only league that can make that claim.

"It's going to be a work in progress," Cronin said. "If you simply look right now, no, it probably doesn't look like we'll get seven or eight in. I think you have to wait and see how things develop.

"By the time everything settles out, we may end up getting nine or 10 in. You never know until you start playing the games."

Men's Basketball Head Coach

Biography: A proven success as a program builder, recruiter and game strategist who has won 670 games as a collegiate head coach, Bob Huggins has directed his alma mater to 80 victories, the 2010 NCAA Final Four, the 2010 BIG EAST championship and backto-back-to-back appearances in the NCAA tournament during his first three seasons in Morgantown.

Huggins, a 1977 graduate of West Virginia University, was introduced as WVU's 21st men's basketball coach on Good Friday, April 6, 2007.

Huggins, 57, has compiled a 670-241 (.736) record entering his 29th season as a head coach, which includes stints at Walsh College (1980-83), Akron (1984-1989), Cincinnati (1989-2005), Kansas State (2006-07) and West Virginia (2007-present). He ranks fourth in total victories and 10th in winning properties and the Division L hand ecoefficient of the seasons. percentage among active Division I head coaches.

Huggins' teams have participated in postseason play in 25 of his 28 seasons, including 18 NCAA tournaments. His squads have won 20 or more games in all but four of his 28 campaigns, including 30 or more twice, and he has averaged 23.7 victories a season.

Last year, Huggins guided West Virginia to one of the most memorable seasons in school history. The Mountaineers reached the NCAA Final Four for the first time since 1959 and won their first BIG EAST championship. WVU recorded a school record 31 victories and also posted a school-best 13 BIG EAST victories, finishing the season ranked No. 3 in the final ESPN/USA Today Coaches' Poll. For the third year in a row, Huggins was named state coach of the year by the West Virginia State Sports Writers Association.

Off the court, the WVU men's basketball team ranked in the top 10 percent of all squads in the 2010 NCAA Division I Academic Progress Rate (APR). In addition, the BIG EAST awarded WVU the team excellence award for the highest grade point average among BIG EAST men's basketball teams.

In 2008-09, Huggins led the Mountaineers to 23 victories in his second season at WVU, advancing to the NCAA tournament for the second year in a row. Huggins became the second Mountaineers coach to win 20 games in his first two seasons in Morgantown. The Mountaineers reached the semifinals of the BIG EAST championship for the ear in a row. After the season, Huggins was named state coach of the year by the West Virginia State Sports Writers Association, his second consecutive honor.

In his first season at WVU, Huggins took the Mountaineers to the NCAA Sweet 16, becoming the first Mountaineer coach to take a team that far in NCAA tournament play in his first season. With 26 victories, he won more games in his first year than any other coach in WVU history. West Virginia tied the school record for BIG EAST victories with 11. After finishing the season with a No. 17 ranking, Huggins was named state coach of the year by the W.Va. State Sportswriters Association.

Huggins has coached 17 NBA draft selections as well as 10 All-Americans. He has also guided 53 all-conference selections in Division I, with Da'Sean Butler earning first team all-BIG EAST honors in 2010, Joe Alexander (first team, 2008), Butler (second team, 2009), Devin Ebanks (third team, 2010) and Alex Ruoff (honorable mention, 2009).

A two-time Academic All-American, Huggins graduated from West Virginia magna cum laude in 1977 and received his master's in health administration from WVU in 1978.

Huggins was born in Morgantown on Sept. 21, 1953. He and his wife, June, have two daughters, Jenna Leigh and Jacqueline.

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Could UConn's run of dominance come to an end?

NEW YORK – It seems the more Geno Auriemma talks about the shortcomings of his Connecticut women's basketball team this season, the less people listen.

It's become the ultimate grudge match to see who is right.

On the one side is Auriemma, the director of seven national titles as the Huskies head coach and the man in charge of a program that enters this season on a 78-game winning streak.

UConn is 11 wins shy of surpassing UCLA's men's basketball team's 88-game winning streak for the longest run in college basketball history.

Auriemma spent almost the entire Big East media day telling to whoever would listen that his Huskies lost 3,000 career points with the graduations of Tina Charles and Kalana Greene.

"It's like taking three guys out of someone's lineup that all hit 40 homers the year before," Auriemma said. "And what you don't know is how the people asked to fill those roles are going to react."

He spoke at length at how other teams in the league and the country, for that matter, have closed the gap. "Just take a look at West Virginia," Auriemma said. "They have a very talented senior class, and most of them are redshirt seniors. They're a very athletic team that can run up and down the floor with anyone."

Auriemma even went as far as to predict – gasp! – a loss this season. That hasn't happened since the Huskies fell to Stanford in the 2008 Final Four.

The last Big East team to beat UConn was Rutgers, which defeated the Huskies, 73-71, on Feb. 5, 2008.

"Listen, I know that I'm a lot of things to a lot of people, but more than anything else, I am a realist," Auriemma said. "People that have been around our program for a long time will tell you that when we have a good team coming into a season I will say so. I'll say, 'We're better than everyone else and we're not going to lose.'

"But, I've been watching practice and other than Bria Hartley and Stefanie Dolson, I'd be really surprised if any of the other freshmen has a real impact on our team this season."

On the other side of the equation are the other Big East coaches, who were not buying what Aureimma was trying to sell.

"When a coach can go into a season and say his biggest problem is

not going undefeated, I think things are OK on the farm," WVU coach Mike Carey said. "I think that just goes to show how advanced his program is. When you look at what they've accomplished – and not just in the last two seasons, but probably for the last 17 or 18 years – it's pretty impressive."

DePaul coach Doug Bruno said Auriemma's knack for finding the smallest detail and using it as motivation that makes him a great coach. That's why he's not believing UConn is an underdog this season.

"I saw it when we coached together this summer for USA basketball," Bruno began his story. "He kept telling me they were going to lose and how good other teams in the league are. He kept talking about West Virginia.

"I was going to pick West Virginia, but I overheard him – and he didn't know this – but he started talking to his assistants about how I was going to go out and pick West Virginia and how he would tell his team about it when they played us."

So, is it absolutely impossible to think the top dog could ever become the underdog?

UConn certainly isn't ducking anyone this season. The Huskies will host second-ranked Baylor on Nov. 16, and will play No. 7 Ohio State, No. 18 Florida State and No. 3 Stanford before getting into the heart of their league schedule.

"This could be an interesting year for them," Carey said. "You look at their schedule, it's just absolutely brutal. Geno has stacked it with so many good teams. If he goes through it like he has the last couple of years, I'm not sure there is anything that could compete with that."

LARRY HARRISON



Men's Associate Head Coach

Biography: Larry Harrison, who spent the last three seasons as an assistant coach under Bob Huggins, was promoted to associate head coach in July 2010 at West Virginia University. Harrison will be entering his 12th season overall on Bob Huggins' coaching staff after spending eight seasons with him at Cincinnati.

Harrison came to West Virginia from the Washington Wizards, where he served as a scout in 2006-07. He has more than 30 years of coaching experience.

Harrison served as head coach at Hartford from 2000-06, earning America East Coach of the Year honors in 2006. He led Hartford to a third-place conference finish in 2002, 2003 and 2006 and semifinals of the conference tournament in 2002, 2003 and 2004. Hartford had the nation's second-best total win increase from 2001 to 2002 with four wins in 2001 to 14 wins in 2002.

Prior to Hartford, Harrison was an assistant under head coach Pat Kennedy at DePaul for three seasons (1997-2000). He previously served as an assistant coach at Cincinnati (1989-97) under Huggins, as well as the last four as associate head coach and recruiting coordinator.

Known as one of the top recruiters in the nation, Harrison's recruiting classes have been ranked among the best in the nation on a regular basis. His 1998 recruiting class at DePaul was ranked as the No. 1 class in the nation by The Sporting News.

Prior to his stint at Cincinnati, Harrison was an assistant at American University in Washington, D.C., from 1986-89. He was also an assistant coach at Hillsborough Community College in Tampa, Fla., from 1984-86. He spent one season as an assistant coach at Henry Abbott Tech High (1978-79) in Danbury, Conn., and two seasons as an assistant at Jefferson High (1982-84) in Tampa.

Harrison earned all-state honors at Henry Abbott Tech (Danbury, Conn.) as a senior before enrolling at Muskingum College, where he earned all-Ohio conference honors as a freshman. After graduating from Pitt in 1978 with a degree in urban studies, he went on to earn a master's degree from University of South Florida in education in 1982.

A native of Greenville, N.C., who grew up in Danbury, Conn., Harrison has two daughters, Nyree and Tiffany.

Hahn spent the majority of his coaching career at Maryland, where he was an assistant to Gary Williams for 12 seasons from 1989-2001. While at Maryland, the Terps went to the NCAA tournament a schoolrecord eight straight years, including the 2001 Final Four. In 2002, the season after Hahn left for a head coaching job at La Salle, the Terps won the national championship with many of Hahn's recruits. For his work, Williams and the Maryland basketball program presented Hahn with a championship ring.

Hahn began his coaching career in 1975 in West Virginia as an assistant coach to Rich Meckfessel at Morris Harvey College. He then served as an assistant coach to Dave Pritchett at Davidson for one year before moving on to serve as an assistant coach at Rhode Island for Jack Kraft from 1977-80. During his time at URI, the Rams went to the NCAA tournament in 1978 and NIT in 1979.

After serving as an assistant at Maryland for 12 years, Hahn served as head men's basketball coach at La Salle for three years from 2001-04. In recent years, Hahn has been a director of the Hoop Group, a New Jersey-based recruiting and camp service, and also has served as a college basketball television analyst.

Hahn earned his bachelor's degree in distributive education with a minor in business administration from Maryland in 1975. While there, he was a three-year varsity letter-winner under Lefty Driesell on three of the best basketball teams Maryland has fielded. He was a freshman in 1971-72 when the Terps won the National Invitation Tournament; he was a key reserve on the team that lost what is considered to be the greatest game in ACC history (Maryland's 103-100 overtime setback against NC State in 1974). He captained the team his senior year.

A native of Mishawaka, Ind., who attended Penn High, Hahn and his wife, Kathi, have been married since 1976. They have two children, a son, Matthew, an assistant basketball coach at Robert Morris, and a daughter, Ashley, a kindergarten teacher in Maryland.

Following his playing career at Cincinnati, Martin spent nine years playing professional basketball around the world, including a four-year stint with various franchises in the Continental Basketball Association and five years overseas.

In addition to his professional experience, Martin has also spent time with the U.S. National team, helping the squad to a silver medal at the 1995 Pan American Games in Argentina. The team leader in blocked shots with 10 in seven games, he averaged 7.7 points on 75.8 percent shooting with 3.9 rebounds for USA. Martin also assisted USA in winning the gold medal at the 1997 Tournament of the Americas.

Martin earned his associate of arts degree from Santa Ana Community College in 1990 and a bachelor's degree in criminal justice from Cincinnati in 1993.

Women's Basketball Head Coach

Biography: With a penchant for continuing to set new standards and taking Mountaineer women's basketball to heights previously not thought of, Mike Carey enters his 10th season as head coach of the West Virginia University women's basketball team.

His achievements speak volumes: A school-record 29 wins in 2009-10; the high-est national rankings in program history; the most Big East wins in school history; five 21-win seasons in seven years (a school record); four consecutive postseason appearances (a school record); 12 career victories over ranked opponents, includ-ing the highest-ranked team in school history and the highest ranked road team in school history; victories over two eventual national runner-ups; two Big East champi-onship game appearances; consecutive NCAA tournament appearances (2007, 2008) and four trips in seven years (2004, 2007, 2008, 2010).

In nine seasons at WVU, the two-time Big East Coach of the Year has posted a 179-107 (.626) record. Under his direction, WVU is 90-25 (.783) against non-conference opponents including an impressive 52-3 mark at the WVU Coliseum.

He was named Big East Coach of the Year, with Connecticut's Geno Auriemma, and guided four players to all-Big East hon-ors: Sarah Miles (Defensive Player of the Year and second team), Liz Repella (first team), Asya Bussie (unanimous all-freshman team) and Korinne Campbell (honorable mention).

In 2008-09, Carey engineered perhaps his best coaching performance as he guided the Mountaineers to an 18-15 record and a WNIT second round appearance with just eight healthy players. Along the way, the Mountaineers defeated eventual national runner-up and No. 5 Louisville, the highest-ranked road team WVU had ever defeated. WVU also defeated eventual WNIT champion USF at home.

In 2007-08, the Mountaineers reached new heights under the Clarksburg native. WVU recorded a 25-8 record, the second-most wins in school history, and advanced to the NCAA second round for the second-consecutive season.

In 2006-07, Carey led WVU to a 21-11 record and advanced to the NCAA tournament's second round. Equally impressive, WVU finished with an 11-5 mark in the Big East.

In 2004-05, WVU posted a 21-13 campaign and reached the postseason WNIT championship game. In 2003-04 the Mountaineers notched a 21-11 season, the third-most wins in school history, and reached the NCAA tournament for the first time in 12 seasons

In 2005-06, Carey guided Meg Bulger to Associated Press honorable mention All-America accolades and all-Big East second team recognition.

Carey was named 2003-04 Big East Coach of the Year, as voted by the league's coaches, in just his third season.

He took the program one step further the next season, in 2002-03, as he guided WVU to its first winning season since 1996-97 with a 15-13 mark and back to the Big East tournament for a second consecutive season.

In 13 seasons, Carey's Salem teams made seven postseason appearances (two NAIA and five NCAA Division II) and won five WVIAC championships (1993, 1994, 1997, 1998, 1999).

Carey was a four-year basketball letterman at Salem, earning WVIAC Freshman of the Year (1977), WVIAC scoring champion (1978) and Salem MVP and WVIAC all-tournament team (1979) honors while scoring more than 2,000 career points. He was a 1993 inductee into the Salem Athletic Hall of Fame

A native of Clarksburg, W.Va., Carey is a 1980 Salem graduate with a bachelor's degree in physical education. He received his master's degree from Salem in 1988. Carey and his wife, the former Cheryl Minnix, have four children -- Chris, Chelsy, Craig and Chelby.

Last season, Porcha played a vital role in helping the Mountaineers to a school-record 29 wins, 13 Big East victories,

runners-up at the Big East Championship, the highest national rankings in program history and the NCAA tournament's second round. He was crucial in the development of center Asya Bussie, who gamered unanimous all-Big East freshman team honors. Three other Mountaineers earned all-league honors last season under his tutelage, including all-Big East first team recipient Liz Repella, Big East Defensive Player of the Year Sarah Miles and all-Big East honorable mention Korinne Campbell.

Two years ago, Porcha played an integral role in WVU's WNIT second round appearance and was instrumental in the day-to-day coaching of the team, including the post players. He helped Repella and Takisha Granberry earn all-BIG EAST second team honors and assisted in Miles obtaining the BIG EAST Most Improved Player Award.

Porcha was hired at WVU in September 2008 and came to WVU from Virginia Tech where he spent one season with the Hokies in 2007-08.

Prior to his stint at Tech, Porcha, a Spring Valley, N.Y., native, spent 2004-07 at T.C. Williams High in Alexandria, Va., where he served as head varsity girls' basketball coach. While at T.C. Williams, Porcha led the team in 2006 to a second-place finish in the Northern Region and to the Virginia State Elite Eight tournament.

He guided the squad to an undefeated Patriot District Championship and was named the District Coach of the Year for his efforts.

Prior to T.C. Williams, he was the head varsity girls coach at Washington-Lee High in Arlington, Va., for five years, leading his team to the regional playoffs each year while compiling a 62-43 record.

Porcha also has a wealth of AAU coaching experience where he has coached 20 players who received Division I scholarships.

Porcha earned his bachelor's degree in business administration from New Haven. While at New Haven, he played safety on the football team. He garnered his master's degree in education from George Mason in 2006.

Porcha, and his wife Robyn, have three sons: George Jr., Jalen and Quincy.

Willis also had assistant coaching positions at the University of Illinois-Chicago (2000-02), Chicago State (2002-03) and Cheyney University (2003-04).

A native of Queens, N.Y., Willis played at Christ the King High, where she was a teammate of San Antonio Silver Star and Tennessee All-American Chamique Holdsclaw. At the end of her prep career, Willis was named a first team Parade All-American and Christ the King was ranked No. 1 in the country in 1993, winning the national title. Willis was a part of Hall of Fame coach C. Vivian Stringer's 1994 recruiting class at Iowa that was ranked No. 1 in the country, also referred to as "The Sensational Seven."

The Hawkeyes captured consecutive Big Ten tournament championships in 1995 and 1996 and a regularseason championship in 1995. A four-year letterwinner for Iowa, Willis earned bachelor's degrees in media studies and African-American studies in 1998. She also played professionally for Color Cap Tybnik of Poland and Tapiola Honka of Finland in 1999 and Brazil's Santa Maria Club in 2000.

Willis is a lifetime member of Delta Sigma Theta sorority, and also holds memberships with the Women's Basketball Coaches Association and the Black Coaches Association. In May 2010, Willis attended the inaugural Assistant Coaches' Symposium for Women's Basketball, in Atlanta, which recognized the top assistant coaches in the country where she gained valuable experience on effectively coaching on and off the court.

Women's Assistant Head Coach Biography: With nearly two decades of experience in collegiate women's basketball, Jill Pizzotti enters her first year as an assistant coach and recruiting coordinator with the Mountaineers.

Pizzotti, a native of Lombard, III., comes to WVU after serving as Nike's manager of women's college basketball and Girl's Elite Youth basketball, in Beaverton, Ore., where she

Prior to her tenure at Nike, Pizzotti served as the head women's basketball coach at St. Louis where she was the second-winningest coach in Billikens history and guided the program to its first-ever postseason tournament appearance with the 2003 WNIT. In the 2002-03 season, Pizzotti guided the Billikens to their highest Conference USA finish, most Conference USA wins and best Conference USA winning percentage.

Her squads won five conference academic achievement awards for highest team GPA and more than 50 of her players were named to the Conference Commissioner's Academic Honor Roll.

From 1992-95, Pizzotti served as assistant coach and recruiting coordinator at Indiana where she helped the Hoosiers to the NCAA tournament in 1994 and 1995. She was also responsible for the signing of future WNBA player Quacy Barnes.

From 1991-92, Pizzotti was an assistant basketball coach at Northern Kentucky, where she handled all assistant coaching responsibilities and helped the team to the 1992 NCAA Division II Tournament.

Prior to her tenure at Northern Kentucky, she was an assistant coach at Southeast Missouri State from 1989-91, where she helped the squad to two MIAA Conference Championships in 1990 and 1991, the 1990 NCAA Division II tournament and a spot in the 1991 NCAA Division II Championship game.

She has served on numerous committees during her career including: the iHoops Advisory Committee (2010); the Women's Basketball Hall of Fame Board of Directors (2009); secretary of the Executive Committee of the Kay Yow Foundation (2009) and many more.

Pizzotti played collegiately at Southeast Missouri State where she was a guard on four conference championship teams and four NCAA Division II Tournament teams (1986-89). Southeast Missouri State was 117-31 during her playing career.

Pizzotti graduated from Southeast Missouri State with a double major in math and physical education in 1989. She earned her master's degree, from Southeast Missouri State in secondary education administration/supervision in 1991.








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Duke looks to repeat

It can't be seven months ago that Gordon Hayward's shot fromhalfcourt came so close to providing one of the greatest endings insports history.

It can't be eight months ago that a lot of people learned in a hurry to correctly pronounce Ali Farokhmanesh, after the Northern Iowa guard hit the 3-pointer that everybody has imitated whenever they get on a court.

Time to file away those memories of Butler and Duke's epic title game, of the Panthers beating topranked Kansas on a jaw-dropping 3. A new season gets under way Monday and the biggest change will come in March when, for the first time, people fill out NCAA tournament brackets that have three more teams and three more games.

But first comes four months of the regular season.

It starts with Duke a solid preseason No. 1 in most polls, and Blue Devils coach Mike Krzyzewski's title collection now includes a gold medal from the World Championships. His roster includes seniors Kyle Singler and Nolan Smith back to defend their national championship.

"I've been fortunate. I had to close last season right away to coach the U.S. team, so last season seems to me like a lot of years ago," said Krzyzewski, whose four national titles are tied with Adolph Rupp and behind only John Wooden (10). "I just jumped right into that. It's probably the easiest for me to put last season behind."

Singler and Smith have a chance to join the Duke elite with a second title.

"You're going to hear this a lot from us: We're not defending last year and not trying to repeat," said Singler, a preseason All-American for the second straight season. "We know for the freshmen coming in, they're hungry to win the national championship. At the same time, we're trying to win another one. That's our main focus. We're just trying to stay motivated and Coach is also helping us in doing that."

This season's versions of Duke and No. 17 Butler meet Dec. 4 at the Meadowlands, one of two games the Blue Devils play against last season's Final Four. They meet No. 2 Michigan State on Dec. 1 and, eight days earlier, will have faced No. 12 Gonzaga or No. 3 Kansas State in the CBE Classic.

"Someone asked me if we don't win a national championship, will it ruin the year?" Singler said. "You just never know what to expect in the year and toward the end of the year, we're not worried about that right now. There's so much we can accomplish, especially at the beginning of the year and the middle of the year. There's so much to learn and experience.

"We definitely have the caliber of talent to accomplish what we did last year."

Lady Vols have experience

KNOXVILLE, Tenn. — With her entire team back from last season, Tennessee coach Pat Summitt feels she has a good shot at reaching another NCAA championship.

To most schools, a two-year drought wouldn't seem long, but to the Lady Vols, who have won eight national championships, it's been an eternity.

"We've had a hard time getting there. Now I think (the Lady Vols) really feel like it's our turn," Summitt said. "If we don't get to Indianapolis, then we're not going to be happy at all. Do we have the size? Yes. Do we have the experience? Yes."

What's made it worse is that Connecticut has won the last two national championships, going undefeated in the process. The two powerhouses haven't met since Summitt canceled the regular series with the Huskies three seasons ago.

The Hall of Fame coach stirred the rivalry between her and Connecticut coach Geno Auriemma by finally offering some insight into why she canceled the series with some recent comments.

When asked at the Southeastern Conference media day in Birmingham, Ala., about recruiting violations committed by Tennessee men's coach Bruce Pearl, Summitt responded that she's never committed recruiting violations.

"I've never compromised at all, and I wouldn't, and if I did, they should fire me," she said.

She wasn't referring to Pearl,

though, as she clarified later that day.

"I was talking about the women's game," she told WNML in Knoxville. "I didn't have Bruce Pearl on my mind. I probably had Connecticut on my mind. There's a reason we don't play them."

Summitt has refused to talk about her comments since making them. Before making the comments, she would always just say "Geno knows" the reason for the cancellation of the series.

According to a letter released by Tennessee in 2008, Lady Vols officials notified the Southeastern Conference of potential recruiting violations committed by UConn, including a tour of ESPN headquarters for then-recruit, now Huskies senior Maya Moore. The NCAA determined the ESPN tour was a secondary violation but has never alleged any other violations by UConn.

Auriemma declined to address Summitt's recent comments as well.

"We don't have any problems getting games and we don't have any problems getting players," Auriemma said. "From the time that series ended, we've done OK."

For the 2010-11 seasons, she returns every player from a squad that lost in the NCAA regional semifinals and has her deepest roster since her 2008 national championship team.
