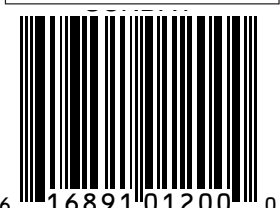

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**Security strategies differ**

**Recent shootings cause some bars to beef up safety**

Multiple bouncers patting down customers and using metal scanners are common sights at

area bars, but some say it's not enough.

MiHaley's Sports Bar and Grill already has 16-20 security cameras, but owner Corey Bronson plans to add more.

"I've thought about it a lot," Bronson said. "I want to do whatever I possibly can. I'm scared for my employees and myself."

Bronson made the decision to increase security after two

recent deadly shooting incidents at area bars.

A former Marine from Morgantown was shot and killed outside Karma, a nightclub on High Street, on Sept. 25, following an argument that began over a spilled drink.

Three others were injured, including the 18-year-old Dunbar man police later arrested for murder — Jeron Hawkins.

A Michigan man was shot and killed last weekend outside Zens Bar & Lounge, in Star City. Police have identified the shooter, but have not yet made an arrest.

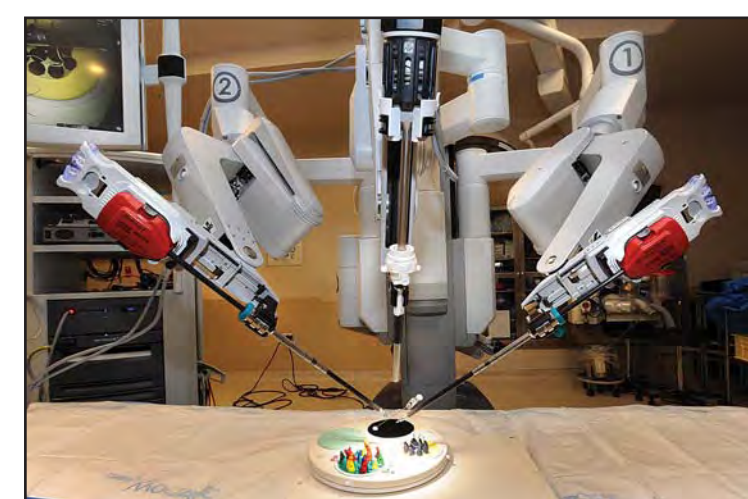
Bronson said he also may add more bouncers, but he is concerned too much security — and pat-downs — may cost him customers. Bouncers are always stationed at the door of the Van

Inside an operating room at Ruby Memorial Hospital, a "patient" — an activity board — lies underneath a machine that looks like it is out of a science-fiction movie.

As the machine begins to move, no doctor is in sight.

Its arms move and eventually go toward the activity board.

Surgeons use this \$2.25 million tool to help lessen pain caused by traditional surgeries and speed up patients' recovery.

The da Vinci Robotic System is used by a handful of surgeons at WVU Hospitals, but that will change with time. The system does the actual cutting, repairing and re-stitching, while a sur-

**Unpaid lunches near \$1M**

**\$223K new charges at Mon schools**

Though the Monongalia County Board of Education (BOE) collected roughly \$131,000 in unpaid school lunches in August before the new school year began, fresh debt is already rolling in.

The outstanding balance continues to creep towards \$1 million and has increased by nearly \$150,000 since August, resting at \$948,898 as of Thursday, according to Karen Ghiardi, director of child nutrition services.

Ghiardi said the figure includes about \$223,000 in recent charges from the current school year and about \$173,000 from inactive accounts. The balance has been accruing for many years.

"It is very doubtful that we will ever collect from the inactive accounts," she added.

Finance Director Terry Hawkins also said the total balance for both employees and students is inflated because lunch bills for September didn't go out until Oct. 10. He anticipates the balance to drop once payments are made.

Of the total amount owed, roughly \$356,000 is being pursued by a collection agency, according to officials.

Staff members still owe around \$7,000, but most of those charges are from this year, Hawkins said. Employees pay \$2.75 per breakfast and \$4 per lunch.

Hawkins claims the employee

**World population to hit 7B on Oct. 31**

She's a 40-year-old mother of eight, with a ninth child due soon. The family homestead in a Burundi village is too small to provide enough food, and three of the children have quit school for lack of money to pay required fees.

"If I were to start over; I would only make two or three," Godelive Ndageramiwe said.

By the time Ndageramiwe's ninth child arrives, and any further members of the Kasadha clan, the world's population will have passed a momentous milestone. As of Oct. 31, according to the U.N. Population Fund, there will be 7 billion people sharing Earth's land and resources.

In Western Europe, Japan and Russia, it will be an ironic milestone amid worries about low birthrates and aging populations. In China and India, the two most

populous nations, it's an occasion to reassess policies that have already slowed once-rapid growth.

But in Burundi, Uganda and the rest of sub-Saharan Africa, the demographic news is mostly sobering as the region staggers under the double burden of the world's highest birthrates and deepest poverty. The regional population of nearly 900 million could reach 2 billion in 40 years at current rates, accounting for about half of the projected global population growth over that span.

"Most of that growth will be in Africa's cities, and in those cities it will almost all be in slums where living conditions are horrible," said John Bongaarts of the Population Council, a New York-based research organization.

Is catastrophe inevitable? Not necessarily. But experts say most of Africa — and other high-growth

developing nations such as Afghanistan and Pakistan — will be hard-pressed to furnish enough food, water and jobs for their people, especially without major new family-planning initiatives.

The International Water Management Institute predicts that by 2025 about 1.8 billion people will live in places suffering from severe water scarcity.

The executive director of the U.N. Population Fund, former Nigerian health minister Babatunde Osotimehin, describes the 7 billion milestone as a call to action — especially in the realm of enabling adolescent girls to stay in school and empowering women to control the number of children they have.

"It's an opportunity to bring the issues of population, women's rights and family planning back to center stage," he said in an interview.

**Animal shelter calls mechanic for cat stuck in van**

HILLIARD, Ohio — A mechanic was the one doing the surgery at an Ohio animal facility when a woman drove in with a cat stuck behind her minivan's dashboard.

The mechanic had to take apart the dash during a three-hour rescue operation Thursday in the Columbus suburb of Hilliard.

Driver Nehal Dhruve said she hit the cat with her van and decided to take it to the local humane society. The brown and black cat wouldn't stay on the van's seat but instead hopped down and climbed up under the dashboard.

Mechanic Daryl McKay cut his hands trying to free the feline, so an animal control staffer with smaller hands took over and pulled it out.

## Sunday Man shot, dies in hospital

One man was shot early Saturday in Star City, and died later. The killer got away. It was the fourth killing incident in Monongalia County in about five weeks. Star City Police Chief Vic Propst said a man was shot in the abdomen outside of Zens Bar & Lounge, on University Avenue. He was taken to Ruby Memorial Hospital, where he died during surgery, Propst said. The victim, whose name isn't being released pending family notification, was shot at about 3 a.m. and was conscious when he was taken to the hospital, Propst said. The case is being treated as a homicide, he said.

## Huskies bow: 2nd-half wow!

Football is a game of momentum and, in the second half against Connecticut on Saturday, WVU had all of it. The Mountaineers piled up 33 points after halftime and the defense extended its streak to seven quarters without giving up a touchdown as No. 16 WVU (5-1, 1-0) rolled to a 43-16 victory against the Huskies (2-4, 0-1). Quarterback Geno Smith passed for 450 yards, coming just 13 yards short of his own program record, and sophomore wide receiver Stedman Bailey caught seven passes for a career-best 178 yards and two touchdowns. On the defensive side, the Mountaineers exploded for a season-best five sacks and redshirt freshman Jewone Snow sparked WVU's second-half surge with an 83-yard fumble recovery in the third quarter.

## Monday Police ID murder victim

Star City police have identified the person shot outside a University Avenue nightclub early Saturday morning. Walter-Vincent Samuel Hill Jr., 25, of Southfield, Mich., was shot outside Zens Bar & Lounge at about 3 a.m. Saturday, Star City Police Chief Vic Propst said. He was taken to Ruby Memorial Hospital, where he later died. The department is still gathering information on the incident, Propst said. They believe there was an argument inside the bar that spilled outside, where Hill was shot, Propst said. He added that the shooter was standing between four to six feet away from Hill, who was shot in the abdomen.

## McKinley: Coal ash vote coming

Rep. David McKinley said his coal ash regulatory bill may see a vote in the full House of Representatives this Friday. Meanwhile, he and his colleagues in the West Virginia delegation are celebrating a court victory for coal.

McKinley, R-W.Va., talked about his bill and the court ruling with *The Dominion Post* on Friday after a classroom visit to WVU. McKinley's bill is HR 2273 — the Coal Residuals Reuse and Management Act. It amends the Solid Waste Disposal Act to enable states to adopt and run permit programs to manage and dispose of fossil fuel combustion products — particularly coal ash, also called fly ash.

## Tuesday Clements outlines state of WVU

WVU President James Clements emphasized his desire to help WVU become even more involved with the community during his State of the University address Monday. "West Virginia University is such an exciting place to be," Clements said. One of the new initiatives Clements announced was the Marcellus Gas Shale Initiative. Marshall S. Miller Energy Professor of Geology Tim Carr was named as the interim director of the organization. The initiative will work to bring all the experts at WVU with information on the industry together, Clements said. He said the purpose isn't for the university to take sides on the issue. "We have many disciplines where our expertise provides objective analysis and science," Clements said. Gov. Earl Ray Tomblin and other state leaders have said shale gas is critical to the economic development of the state, Clements said.

The father of the young woman killed at the All Good Music Festival has filed suit in U.S. District Court in Clarksburg against a dozen defendants. The suit claims it was negligence that caused her death. Nicole F. Miller, 20, of Mount Pleasant, S.C., died at the festival July 17. Police said Clay Harlin Lewin, of Virginia, apparently lost control of his pickup truck and it crashed into several vehicles before coming to rest on Miller's tent. Lewin has not been criminally charged. Two of Miller's friends, Yen Ton and Rosie Doran, also of Mount Pleasant, were with her in the tent. Both were injured. Ton has also filed suit against the 12 defendants.

Bobby King, president of the Morgantown Cab Co., said the area doesn't need a second cab company because there isn't enough business for two.

## Police: Red Cross credit misused

The former executive director of the American Red Cross office in Morgantown was arrested Wednesday for allegedly making about \$1,600 in personal purchases using a company credit card. Jodi Gallo, 46, of Brownsboro, Ala., was charged with obtaining goods by false pretenses, a felony, and released on \$10,000 bond. According to a criminal complaint: Carole Evans, a representative of the American Red Cross, contacted West Virginia State Police Cpl. R.E. Garrison on Sept. 1 and provided documentation that indicated Gallo used a company credit card to make personal purchases.

## Friday All Good might be leaving

KINGWOOD — A Virginia county has been asked to amend a 40-year-old ordinance to allow for longer festivals — including the All Good Music Festival. Mike Finchum, director of planning and community development in Caroline County, Va., said two concert promoters approached the county about extending the parameters of the ordinance, which now limits music events to eight hours. ## Thursday Police: Man admitted killing

A Morgantown man was charged Wednesday with killing a Fairmont woman less than a week after her body was found near University High School. As he was escorted to a jail transport van Wednesday afternoon, Kevin L. Utter, 38, told *The Dominion Post* that he didn't kill 33-year-old Christina Terry. A criminal complaint, however, said an unnamed person told police that Utter admitted he may have killed someone. "Kevin Utter then confessed to this individual that he may have killed a girl near Bakers Ridge that he met at a bar," the complaint reads. Utter is charged with first-degree murder, Sheriff Al Kisner said.

## 'You had to love him'

The Rev. Rodney Torbic smiled at the question posed by a visitor Thursday afternoon at the Morgantown Event Center. "Yes, of course, this is going to be a full service," said Torbic, a Serbian Orthodox priest who was readying to preside over the funeral of Milan "Mike" Puskar, the Morgantown businessman and benefactor who lost his battle with cancer last week. "Normally, we'd like it to be in a church," Torbic said, as three men in suits and ties polished the ornate lid of Puskar's coffin that was off to the side. "But wherever the people gather is where we go."

## Saturday ABCA suspends bar's license

The club where a fatal shooting occurred last week has had its alcohol license suspended for 10 days. West Virginia Alcohol Beverage Control Administration (ABCA) spokesman Gig Robinson said the administration suspended Star City's Zens Bar & Lounge license starting Friday. "We're allowing things to cool off," he said. "We're not seeking revocation." Early on Oct. 8, Walter-Vincent Samuel Hill Jr., 25, was shot outside the University Avenue nightclub following an argument

## Murder suspect on probation at time of killing

The man accused of murdering Christina Terry has been previously convicted of multiple misdemeanor offenses, including two incidents of domestic battery. Kevin Lee Utter, 38, was arrested Wednesday on a charge of first-degree murder for the Oct. 6 death of Terry, whose body was found by gas workers looking for a leak on a road leading back to a well, near University High School. The cause of death was blunt force trauma to the head and torso, Sheriff Al Kisner said. Utter's mother, Barbara Utter, said her son has substance abuse issues, but she doesn't think he killed Terry. Barbara Utter said "never in a million years" would she think her son would murder someone. "We're just devastated," she said, noting that her heart went out to Terry's family. MaLissa Brant, Terry's sister, said in a Facebook message that she's glad an arrest was made quickly.

## Audit: Lottery spends too much on advertising

CHARLESTON — The West Virginia Lottery Commission is spending too much on advertising for its traditional games — about \$4 million more a year than comparable operations — according to a state audit. That was the major criticism in an otherwise positive report presented this week to the Joint Standing Committee on Government Operations by John Sylvia, director of the Legislative Auditor's Performance Evaluation and Research Division. Overall, the Lottery promotes fiscal responsibility, accountability and transparency, Sylvia said. But the Lottery's advertising expenses don't appear to justify the results, he said. The report also suggested the Lottery tweak its instant prize payout rate — the amount of income from a particular game devoted to prizes.

## Chase ends with arrest

KINGWOOD — A Preston County man who was convicted of negligent homicide in 2010 has been charged with grand larceny in Marion County, according to court records. The Marion County Sheriff's Department arrested Gary Ray Casteel, 20, of Bruce-ton Mills, Thursday after a chase, which reached speeds of 95 mph, began on Interstate 79. Casteel admitted to deputies that the vehicle he was driving had been stolen in Preston County, according to the criminal complaint. Casteel is in North Central Regional Jail. Bond is set at \$50,000. Casteel was sentenced to one year in jail in 2010 for his role in the death of Gary Michael Evans, also of Bruce-ton Mills. Police said Evans was crossing Moyers Road on a lawn tractor just before 5 p.m. on Sept. 10, 2009, when he was struck and killed by a pickup truck driven by Casteel.

balance was cut down to nearly \$2,000 just a "few weeks ago."

"The staff issue is pretty much resolved," he explained.

Some employees who had a balance after the last school year opted to have the total amount owed taken out of their paychecks while others simply paid in full, the finance director said.

Staff members with delinquent bills are "cut off" until they settle the debt, according to a new BOE policy. Three employees, who made no payment, have been turned in to a collection agency.

The board also set up an online credit card payment option that is now available at [parentonline.net](http://parentonline.net). It includes a five percent convenience fee.

So far the new credit card system has helped the BOE

collect nearly \$3,700, Ghiardi said.

Attempts to contact an official with the state Department of Education were unsuccessful.

Richard Goff, executive director of the state Child Nutrition office, said in a previous interview that the state Department of Education has had to intervene on multiple occasions over the past 15 years regarding the issue.

Goff also said the problem stems from the BOE's policy of extending credit to children who qualify for free and reduced lunches, meaning they may not be required to pay anything, according to *The Dominion Post* archives.

However, Monongalia County officials continue to insist that they will not punish students for the actions of their parents and will never deny a child a meal.

Mon County students pay \$1.10 for breakfast and \$1.75

for lunch; a rate the BOE decided not to increase for the 2011-'12 school year.

BOE President Barbara Parsons said officials are remaining aggressive about collecting the debt and that the new policies have helped with collection efforts.

"We have limited the amount staff can charge and we will be using magistrate court more frequently," she said. "The balance is over a long period of time and something that isn't going to be resolved overnight."

Individuals with balances greater than \$75 are turned over to a collection agency and those with more than \$1,000 in unpaid meals are taken to magistrate court, according to officials.

Parsons also said the BOE is unable to write off uncollectable debt like most businesses can, causing the unpaid school lunch balance to remain high.

Voorhis Road bar on weekends, but only occasionally on weeknights.

"We've never had a problem, but still, with all the other stuff going on, you never know," Bronson said.

At least three other bars have no plans to make security changes, however.

Rich Viglianco, general manager of Chic-N-Bones, said there's no need to pat people down at the 21-plus bar on Chestnut Street.

Eight to 12 bouncers work on weekends, when the full bar is open. And the staff check IDs.

"If somebody looks like they're inebriated, we don't let them in in the first place," Viglianco said. "We don't ever have fights."

John Williams, manager of Big Times, said he is always concerned about safety and security, but

nothing has changed at his High Street bar.

"We've always had security," Williams said. "Hopefully, it's just one of those rare things."

Two to five bouncers work each night at Big Times. Williams said they check IDs and pat people down as needed, checking backpacks, purses and coats for alcohol and weapons.

Raphael Ayuk-Takem, owner of Zens, said bar employees pat down customers as they enter and use metal scanners to check for weapons.

He doesn't see a need for any changes and noted that the shooting occurred after those involved had left the bar.

"You can never tell what kind of crowd you're going to get," Ayuk-Takem said. "Morgantown is changing from what it used to be a long time

ago. It all depends on how people want to handle it at their establishments."

WVU senior Kelly Niklauski, 22, said she has never felt unsafe at the bars in Morgantown, but it depends on where you go and who you hang out with. She typically goes out with a large group of people.

"I've had a lot more problems at home," said Niklauski, a Philadelphia native.

Darren Bridges, a 19-year-old WVU sophomore from Tennessee, had no safety concerns, either.

"It's never really crossed my mind," Bridges said. "High Street has always seemed pretty safe to me when I go out."

Bridges only goes to 18-and-up clubs, such as Karma. He said he was patted down once at Shooters, but has never seen anyone with a weapon.

# Playing video games pays off for reporter

MY MOM'S not going to be happy.

You see, she's the type of person who doesn't like to be wrong.

But guess what Ma? All those years of playing video games paid off. At least for the short time I was in the seat of WVU's da Vinci Robotic System.

I had a chance to try my hand at the relatively new da Vinci and it wasn't difficult — at least not for this gamer.

Photographer Bob Gay and I arrived at Ruby Memorial Hospital, were escorted to pick up our operating scrubs and taken to the operating area.

We changed into our scrubs, but that wasn't enough.

Hair net? Check. Footy cover things? Check.

Mouth mask? Check. We had to go through the full routine of a surgeon suiting up.

And I'm also pretty sure there was a better chance of Elvis walking the halls than us getting either of our bags of work supplies into the operating area.

In the operating room, Dr. Can Talug greeted us and gave a rundown of the robotic surgery sys-

tem, showing us how it worked.

The set up was fairly simple: The arms hovered above an activity board on a gurney; a few feet away sat a console where the surgeons control the machine. Another person can sit nearby to watch.

I got the details about da Vinci and how it worked, and then I had a chance to actually use it. Talug unlocked the system and I was in control.

Clearly, this man trusted me more than I might have trusted myself in his position.

He allowed me to operate a \$2.25 million machine, with no real training.

I mean I'm the type of person who gets a new gizmo and watch out. I'm not saying I break everything I touch, but the tab button is off its hinges on my laptop.

I can't blame Health Sciences Chancellor Christopher Colenda if he's not a happy camper when he reads this and finds out I

used the machine.

So, I placed my fingers in the mechanical device — located below the monitor — that controls the system's arms. My head rested against a screen that produced a 3-D image of the activity board.

When I initially looked at the screen, I had double vision with images spinning around as my eyes tried to focus.

But my brain figured it out and what I was seeing became clear.

A little hesitant, I moved my arm forward and saw the magnified arm on my screen correspond. For a simple movement, it was quite exhilarating.

This wasn't hard; it was nothing.

It was like having a bird's-eye view of that stupid crane-grab-the-stuffed-animal game.

The feeling of my hands doing one thing while my eyes watched a screen was all too familiar. It was like playing a video game.

Without a problem, I could pick up a minute rubber band and place it on a cone and then take it off and place another. Even Talug commented I was a fast learner at the machine. See, I could be a doctor.

Well, maybe if guts weren't part of the equation or you didn't have to go to school forever, but those are minor details.

Darn it, at least, I could have been a good robotic-assisted surgeon.

Now, I couldn't do everything, but moving forward and backward and grabbing things came pretty easy.

I think I could remove your gallbladder easily, but stitching you back up might be a problem.

I think having had a video game system connected to my television for most of my life developed my surgery skills.

Those years of playing video games allowed me to easily control da Vinci.

My mom tried to limit video game use, but those Saturdays with friends paid off today.

I imagine my mom won't mind too much that I've revealed her parenting habits.

But I already know what happens next. The whole thing will be turned back on me.

"See, you could have been a doctor, instead of a journalist," she'll say through the telephone — as I play "Madden 12."

controls its movements from a console.

Dr. Can Talug, who uses the da Vinci surgery system, recently demonstrated the robotic system at work, using an activity pad instead of a live patient. The pad is used for training surgeons who are new to the system.

Talug said it is a misnomer to refer to a da Vinci operation as "robotic surgery." The machine only responds to the doctor's movement and doesn't do anything on its own.

The da Vinci has four arms. One arm holds a camera that projects the image to the console, Talug said. Two arms can be used for surgery. The fourth does other tasks, such as holds skin back during a procedure.

The tips of the arms are no thicker than a traditional ink pen. The hoops on the activity board look like tiny rubber bands. But looking into the console reveals a much different picture.

The 3-D screen magnifies the image. The rubber bands now look as big as hula-hoops. The points to place the bands over look like mountains.

But the machine is more than just a technical marvel. There are benefits for the surgeons, Talug said. They look at 3-D images of what they are working on, instead of traditional 2-D images.

Sitting at a console also allows the doctors to perform surgery without becoming as fatigued as they would when standing, Talug said.

Surgeons are also limited by their wrists' range of motion when they perform surgery, Talug said. But the da Vinci doesn't have that limitation.

As Talug talks, he demonstrates his point by spinning the arm of the machine and twisting it in different directions.

"We feel it's more precise," Talug said.

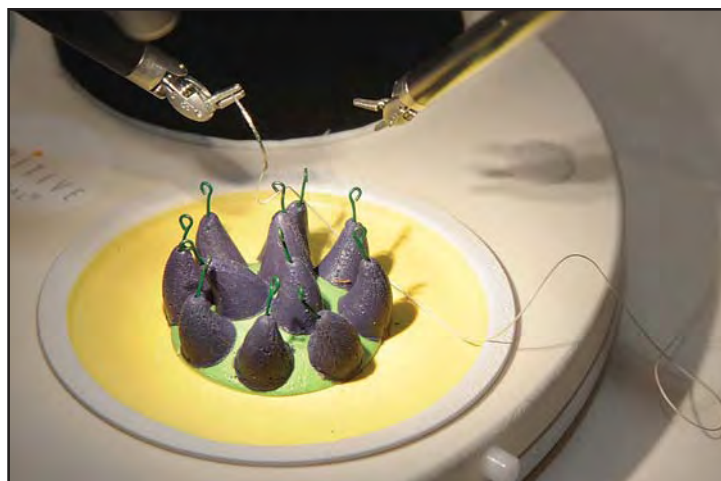
The biggest beneficiary of the machine might be the person lying underneath its arms. For patients, there is less pain following a surgery done by the da Vinci and recovery is faster, Talug said.

For example, a traditional kidney surgery requires one big incision along the length of the rib cage.

But, da Vinci surgeons can make several smaller

opened in the 1990s by NASA and the Department of Defense, Talug said.

Its purpose was to allow surgeons perform remote operations on battlefields.

The machine costs about \$2.25 million, Talug said. WVU has one da Vinci system and is acquiring a second. The devices are mobile, though Talug said ideally they would be left in one operating room.

There are the same number of people in the operating room as there is for traditional surgery — they just have different tasks, Talug said. An assistant helps with some of the surgery tasks at the operating table's side while the surgeon sits at the console controlling the machine.

It can take some time to

master the system, Talug said. He said he had to go through an additional year of training after his residency to learn it.

But that training was worth it, Talug said. He likes mechanical surgery.

"[I] prefer this," he said. "I feel like I can see things better."

As Talug demonstrated how the da Vinci worked, he operated the machine like it was an extension of his own arms.

His arms would move quickly and the arms of the machine would correspond as Talug was able to complete different tasks. He made a suture and moved different pieces around the activity board with ease.

"The Nintendo has paid dividends for me," Talug said.

incisions to complete the task. The small cuts mean the person can get out of the hospital a few days after surgery instead of the traditional weeklong stay.

Because of that benefit, it isn't hard to convince patients to go under the robotic knife, Talug said.

"Most patients come and ask for the technology," he said.

After the surgery, Talug said he routinely hears from patients who say they are happy they opted for the robotic surgery.

Fellow da Vinci Robotic System surgeon Mahreen Hashmi agreed with Talug — it's not difficult to find

patients. She said some patients seek her out because they find on a website that she is trained in the da Vinci surgery system.

The company that builds the system provides a DVD that doctors can give to patients to tell them about the machine, Hashmi said.

"It's really not a hard sell for patients," she said.

Hashmi said she spends one day a week using the machine for surgery. But, that could increase if WVU gets another machine and more doctors are trained in the system.

She said she prefers the da Vinci over traditional surgery because of the

quicker recovery time. Many of her patients are mothers who need to get back to work or return home to care for children.

The da Vinci can also be used to assist the more complicated surgeries, Hashmi said. She expects to see it used more and more on the complicated surgeries.

Currently, the da Vinci system is being used for urological, gynecological, ear, nose and throat, and some chest surgeries, Talug said.

People will continue to push the envelope to find more applications for the da Vinci, Talug said, adding the system is still in its infancy.

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# Tests: Drilling town's water still fouled in Pa.

DIMOCK, Pa. — Three years after residents first noticed something wrong with their drinking-water wells, tanker trucks still rumble daily through this rural northeastern Pennsylvania village where methane gas courses through the aquifer and homeowners can light their water on fire.

One of the trucks stops at Ron and Jean Carter's home and refills a 550-gallon plastic "water buffalo" container that supplies the couple with water for bathing, cleaning clothes and washing dishes. A loud hissing noise emanates from the vent stack that was connected to the Carters' water well to prevent an explosion — an indication, they say, the well is still laced with dangerous levels of methane.

Recent testing confirms that gas continues to lurk in Dimock's aquifer.

"We're very tired of it," said Jean Carter, 72 — Tired of the buffalo in their yard, tired of worrying about the groundwater under their house, and tired of the fight that has consumed Dimock every day since the fall of 2008.

Like everyone else here, the Carters are eager to turn the page on the most highly publicized case of methane contamination to emerge from the early days

of Pennsylvania's natural-gas drilling boom. Cabot Oil & Gas Corp., the Houston-based energy firm held responsible and fined hundreds of thousands of dollars for polluting the groundwater, is just as anxious to resume drilling in a 9-square-mile area of Dimock that has been placed off-limits to the company until it repairs the damage.

State regulators blame faulty gas wells drilled by Cabot for leaking methane into Dimock's groundwater. It was the first serious case of methane migration connected to

Pennsylvania's 3-year-old drilling boom, raising fears of potential environmental harm throughout the giant Marcellus Shale gas field. Drilling critics point to Dimock as a prime example of what can and does go wrong.

Methane from gas-drilling operations has since been reported in the water supplies of several other Pennsylvania communities, forcing residents to stop using their wells and live off water buffaloes and bottled water. Though gas companies often deny responsibility for the pollution, the state has imposed more stringent well-construction standards designed to prevent stray gas from polluting groundwater.

Dimock's long quest for clean water may finally be reaching a critical stage.

After a series of false starts, Cabot, one of the largest drillers in the Marcellus, said it has met the state's Oct. 17 deadline to restore or replace Dimock's water supply, installing treatment systems in some houses that have removed the methane.

Residents who have filed suit against Cabot disagree, saying their water is still tainted and unusable. Another homeowner claims the \$30,000 treatment system that Cabot put in failed to work.

# Water may be Mexico's latest export

SAN DIEGO — Mexico ships televisions, cars, sugar and medical equipment to the United States. Soon, it may be sending water north.

Western states are looking south of the border for water to fill drinking glasses, flush toilets and sprinkle lawns, as four major U.S. water districts help plan one of two huge desalination plant proposals in Playas de Rosarito, about 15 miles south of San Diego. Combined, they would produce 150 million gallons a day, enough to supply more than 300,000 homes on both sides of the border.

The plants are one strategy by both countries to wean themselves from the drought-prone Colorado River, which flows 1,450 miles from the Rocky Mountains to the Sea of Cortez.

Decades of friction over the Colorado, in fact, are said to be a hurdle to current desalination negotiations.

The proposed plants have also sparked concerns that American water interests looking to Mexico are simply trying to dodge U.S. environmental reviews and legal challenges.

Desalination plants can blight coastal landscapes, sucking in and killing fish eggs and larvae. They require massive amounts of electricity and dump millions of gallons of brine back into the ocean that can, if not properly disposed, also be harmful to fish.

But desalination has helped quench demand in Australia, Saudi Arabia and other countries lacking fresh water.

Dozens of proposals are on the drawing board in the

United States to address water scarcity but the only big project to recently win regulators' blessings would produce 50 million gallons a day in Carlsbad, near San Diego. A smaller plant was approved last year in Monterey, some 110 miles south of San Francisco.

Mexico is a relative newcomer to desalination. Its largest plant supplies 5 million gallons a day in the Baja California resort town of Cabo San Lucas, with a smattering of tiny ones on the Baja peninsula. Skeptics already question the two proposed plants in Playas de Rosarito — known as Rosarito Beach to American expatriates and visiting college spring-breakers.

Potential disagreements between the two countries include how the new water stores will be used.

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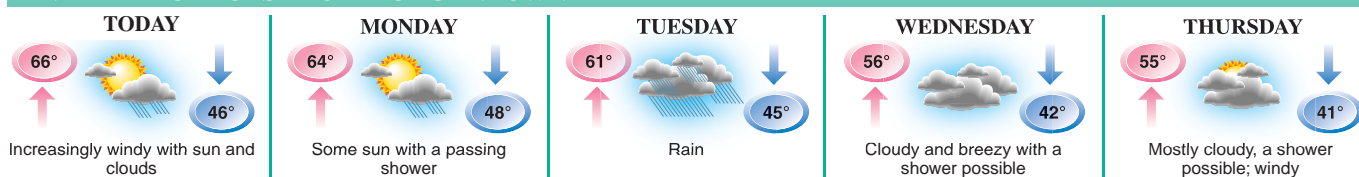


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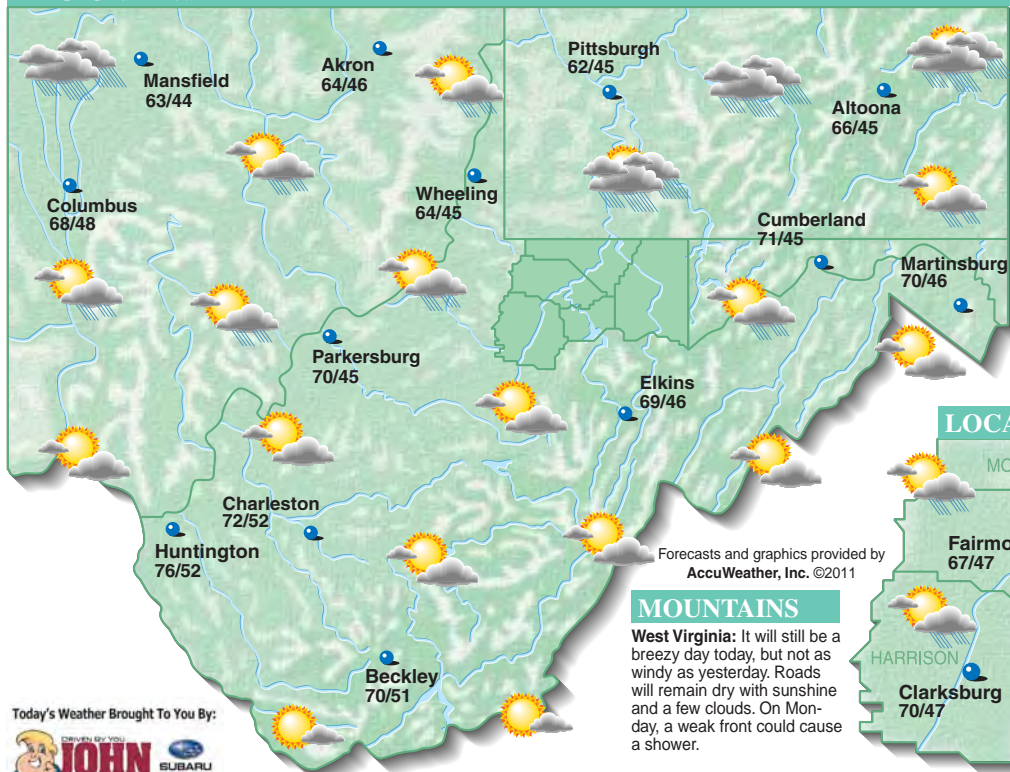

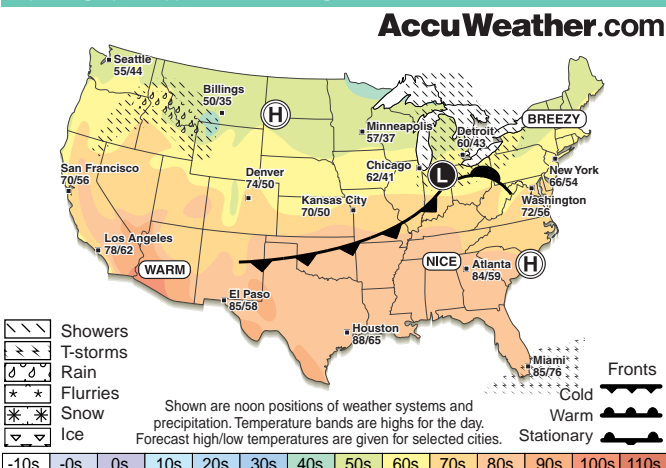

"Occupy Morgantown" joined members of the American Dream Movement and labor unions Saturday to march on the Monongalia County Courthouse on High Street in support of President Obama's jobs bill — shot down by a Democrat controlled Senate.

The rally, attended by a few

dozen people, was intended to intensify pressure on politicians to focus on creating jobs, not spending cuts, but the protesters also spoke against corporate greed and the super-rich.

The event began at noon and withstood strong wind gusts, but was nearly dissipated by 2 p.m.

The "Occupy" movement has gone global, sparking demonstrations in countries such as Italy and Spain on Saturday,

according to an Associated Press report. While the protest in Rome, Italy, turned violent, "Occupy Morgantown" didn't.

Most of the "Occupy" protests in the United States have been nonviolent, with few clashes with police.

"Occupy" protesters commonly refer to themselves as the "99 percent," as a way to express their discontent with the nation's most wealthy.

WVU student Jerry Causby founded "Occupy Morgantown" after discovering the movement. He said the group will hold week-

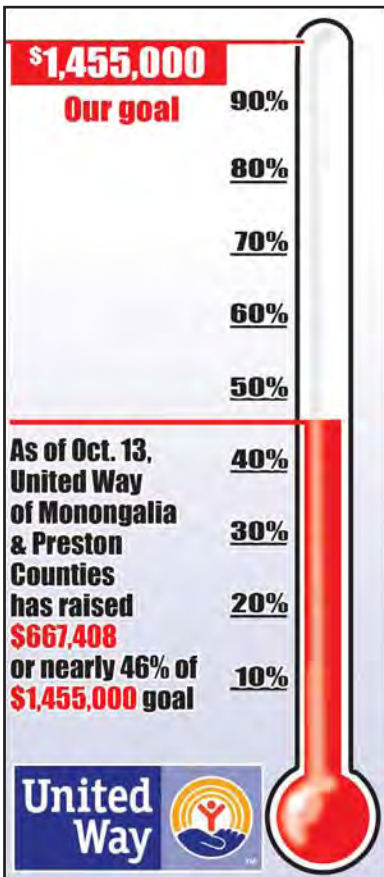

ly rallies at the Courthouse.

“This is only the beginning,” he said. “For now, we have no end time.”

There were chants of “They got bailed out, we got sold out” and “We are the 99 percent” throughout the rally. One protester yelled out that someone should be “hanged,” and a few chanted back.

Causby said the group is still in its infancy stage, therefore has no set goals or aspirations. He hopes to hold general assemblies and establish “target issues” both locally and nationally.

“I found out all the things that are wrong, and I didn't like it,” he said. “We need to figure out how to get the ball rolling.”

Retired systems analyst at WVU Bill Weiss said he attended the rally because he doesn't like the direction that the country is going economically.

“A few, 1 percent they say, control billions and billions of dollars and most people have so little,” he said.

Weiss said he believes

health care is a birthright and universal health care should be offered in the United States.

“We should take care of each other,” he said. “It ought to be more of a shared thing.”

Diane Parker, regional organizer for MoveOn.org, coordinated the event. She is also a member of the American Federation of Labor and Congress of Industrial Organizations (AFL-CIO).

“We have been waiting forever for people to be in the streets, we couldn't understand why they weren't,” Parker said. “We are happy to be here to lend our voices to everything that's wrong with America, specifically corporate greed.”

Parker said the “Occupy” movement shows that people are upset. She also said labor unions, which are lending their support to the movement, want the government to focus on jobs, not spending cuts.

“It's not spending that got us in this,” she said. “It's tax cuts, it's wars.”

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## Grant will allow organ donors to register via text message

The Center for Organ Recovery & Education (CORE), in partnership with the University of Pittsburgh and Donate Life America, has received a federal grant to develop and test the effectiveness of registering potential organ, tissue and cornea donors via text messaging.

**Morgantown inmate pleads guilty in U.S. District Court**

A Federal Corrections Institution (FCI) Morgantown inmate pleaded guilty Oct. 6 in United States District Court in Clarksburg before Judge Irene M. Keeley.

United States Attorney William J. Ihlenfeld, II, said Eric Trigg, 36, pleaded guilty to attempting to obstruct justice on July 23, 2010, at FCI Morgantown, when the staff, suspecting that Trigg possessed a cell-

phone, attempted to search Trigg. He ran and threw the cellphone in an attempt to conceal it. Trigg was sentenced to 12 months imprisonment to be served consecutively with his current 10-year sentence.

The case was prosecuted by Assistant United States Attorney Brandon S. Flower and was investigated by the Federal Bureau of Investigation and the Special Investigative Services at FCI Morgantown.

■ Sixteen-ounce and 4-pound tub containers of "E-Z SHOP KITCHEN SHREDDED PORK WITH BBQ SAUCE" that bear the establishment number "EST.

19665" in the USDA mark of inspection.

■ Sixteen-ounce and 4-pound tub containers of "E-Z SHOP KITCHEN SHREDDED BEEF WITH BBQ SAUCE" that bear the establishment number "P-19665" in the USDA mark of inspection.

All of the products have unknown production dates and were distributed to retail and institutional customers in Illinois, Indiana, Michigan, Ohio and West Virginia between July 1 and Oct. 6.

The problem was discovered by FSIS personnel when following up on a complaint and is the subject of an ongoing investigation. FSIS may take additional regulatory action based on the results of this investigation.

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# Obama says he will travel to push for jobs bill

WASHINGTON — President Barack Obama says he's going to travel the country telling lawmakers to do their jobs and vote in favor of his economic proposals, and he says congressional Republicans should stop picking partisan fights and act.

Coming off a week when his nearly \$450 billion jobs bill died in the Senate,

Obama made no reference to that failure, instead promising to renew efforts to get Republicans to vote on individual components of the legislation.

"Next week, I'm urging members of Congress to vote on putting hundreds of thousands of teachers back in the classroom, cops back on the streets and firefighters back on the job," Obama said in his weekly radio and Internet address Saturday.

"And if they vote 'no' on that, they'll have to tell you why," he said. "They'll have to tell you why teachers in your community don't deserve a paycheck again. They'll have to tell your kids why they don't deserve to have their teacher back. They'll have to tell you why they're against common-sense proposals that would help families and strengthen our communities right now." Obama recorded the week-

ly address from the Detroit area, where he traveled Friday with the president of South Korea to highlight congressional passage of a free-trade agreement with South Korea as well as pacts with Colombia and Panama.

Obama praised Congress' rare bipartisan action on the trade deals but said lawmakers needed to do more. In the Senate earlier in the week, Republicans who object to higher taxes on the wealthy

and spending proposals blocked his jobs bill, but now Obama and Senate Democratic leaders plan to break the measure into pieces and try to pass it that way — or blame the GOP for standing in the way.

The bill includes extension of a payroll tax cut and unemployment benefits as well as spending on public works projects and help for local governments to keep teachers and other public

workers on the job.

"There's still time to create jobs and grow our economy right now. There's still time for Congress to do the right thing," said Obama, who is embarking on a three-day bus tour through North Carolina and Virginia on Monday to promote his jobs plans in two politically important states, keeping up a campaign-style push for the measure as the 2012 presidential election gains steam.

### Police: Salon murder suspect had rough life

SEAL BEACH, Calif. — The bitter father charged with gunning down his ex-wife and eight others at a beauty salon should have had an idyllic Southern California childhood: He spent his formative years just blocks from the beach with his beloved grandpar-

ents, fished from the pier with friends and surfed along the wide, sandy beaches of his hometown.

But poor decisions, bad luck and soured relationships shadowed Scott Dekraai over the years as he transformed into an angry adult whose life spiraled ever more out of control until, police say, a bitter custody battle over his 8-year-old son triggered his spasm of violence Wednesday.

Dekraai, 41, showed no

emotion Friday at his first court appearance hours after prosecutors said they would seek the death penalty. He postponed entering pleas on eight counts of murder and one count of attempted murder in the rampage at Salon Meritage.

### Bishop charged for not giving porn to police

KANSAS CITY, Mo. — The first U.S. bishop criminally charged with sheltering an abusive clergyman

has been accused of failing to protect children after he and his diocese waited five months to tell police about hundreds of images of child pornography discovered on a priest's computer, authorities said.

Bishop Robert Finn and the Kansas City-St. Joseph Catholic Diocese have pleaded not guilty on one count each of failing to

report suspected child abuse, officials said Friday.

### Brothers charged with stealing Pa. bridge

NEW CASTLE, Pa. — Two brothers have been charged with stealing a western Pennsylvania bridge and selling the 15 1/2 tons of scrap metal for more than \$5,000.

Police said 24-year-old Benjamin Arthur Jones and 25-year-old Alexander Williams Jones of New Castle used a blowtorch to break up the bridge in late September or early October.

They face felony charges of criminal mischief, theft, receiving stolen property and conspiracy.

## Do students have a choice to eat healthy?

**FOR MANY WVU STUDENTS**, college is a stressful time in life. The demands of work, studying, lack of sleep and overarching strains from general uncertainty leave many students feeling constantly stressed. Many students undergo the “freshman 15” weight gain. Some of this may be attributed to binge drinking, less sleep, less exercise and stress. But how much of this can be attributed to a low budget?

Morgantown is filled with restaurants for students, open until 4 a.m., marketed to satisfy the cravings of that late night studying or the simple need to sober up. Many of these foods are high in fats and refined sugars, and low in nutritional value — often cheaper than neighboring healthy restaurants. Even when choosing the cheaper option and going to the store, you pay less for fatty and unhealthy foods.

We are living in a country where obesity rates are higher in lower socioeconomic segments of society. Plainly put, you are more likely to be fat if you are poor in America. What does this say about our country? What about the rest of the world where it's generally expensive to be fat?

I've heard students express opposition to the tax on fatty foods Denmark has imposed to encourage its citizens to eat more healthily. Many have said it interferes with freedom, and as we are a country that is the very embodiment of choice, variety and self-interest, this is purely un-American.

In response to this, I argue that our food choices have already been limited. In America, we already have to pay more to eat healthy, fresh foods. This expense already limits options for many low-income earners — such as students. When I go to the grocery store on my tight budget, I have to be especially careful when buying produce and fresh, healthy foods. At the end of the day, it's cheaper to buy less nutritional foods.

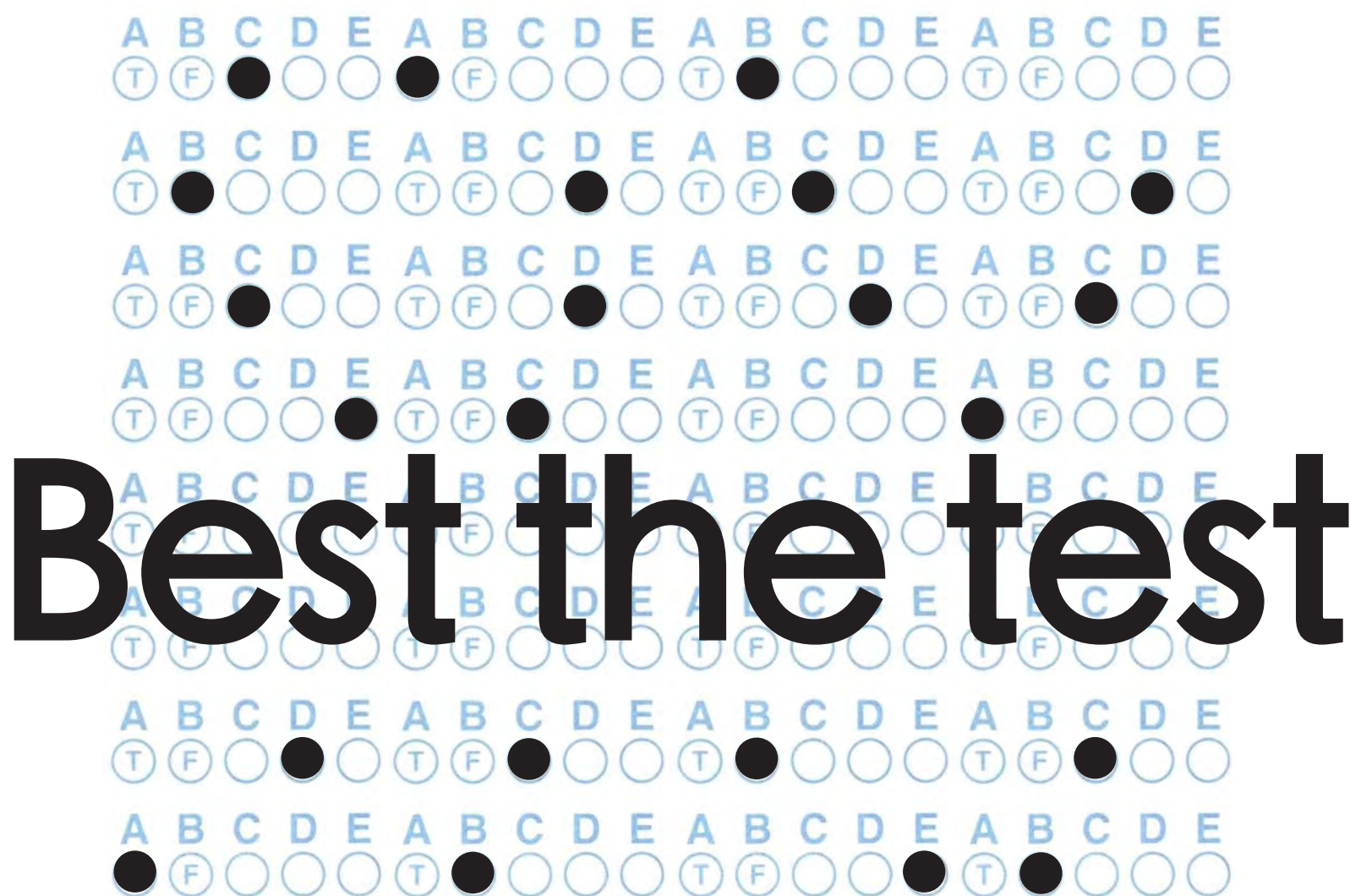
It amazes me that it costs more to eat healthy, fresh foods. The idea that an individual should have to pay more for nutritional food seems fundamentally wrong. More energy, more resources and more time go into the production of highly processed, sugary, fatty, low nutritional value foods. White bread is cheaper than wheat bread. Farmers make up less than 2 percent of the American work force, and often face financial hardships in a country filled with fertile, arable land. This seems like a crisis. Intervention, on some level, seems necessary.

As WVU students, our lifestyle choices and diets are forming patterns that will affect our future and the future of our society. For the first time in American history, younger generations are not expected to outlive their preceding generation. Maybe government intervention isn't a bad idea.

Or maybe we need to more fundamentally change how we think and what we know about food, how we grow it, and how it impacts our health, environment, and the very wellbeing of our country.

The average WVU student struggles with cooking — forget learning or knowing how to grow and preserve food.

## Use these exam tips to maximize success

Pat Haught, a visiting assistant professor of educational psychology at WVU, said the best test-taking tips stem from common sense.

“The tried and true strategies that no one wants to hear are the ones that work,” she said. “The best way to reduce anxiety is to be prepared.”

James Rye, WVU professor of curriculum and instruction literacy, agreed.

“Students should read the material beforehand, listen to the professor, and pay attention to the big picture, not little details,” he said. “They should rehash the material on their own.”

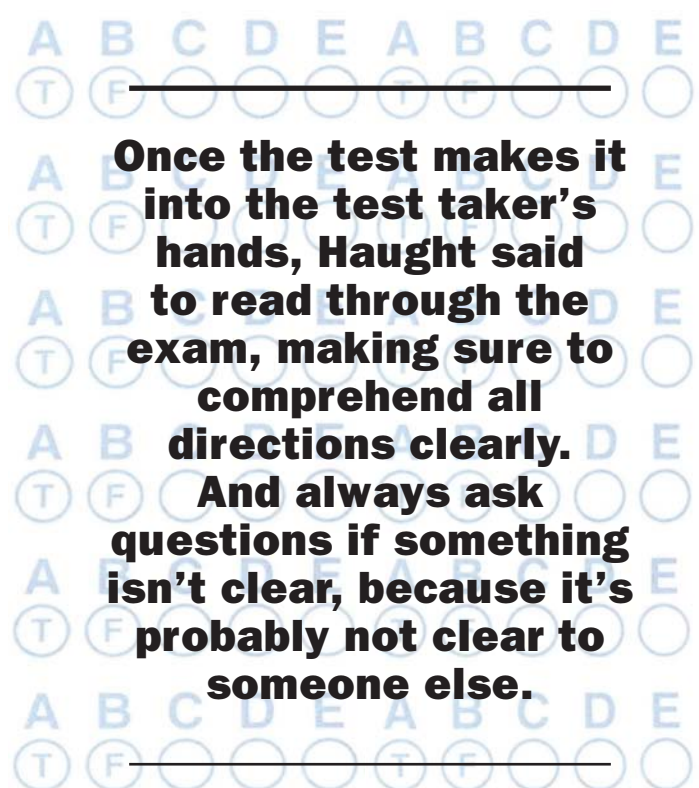
But when test anxiety trumps preparation, Haught did have some suggestions and strategies. And the first way to alleviate it goes against normal thinking about tests: Don't arrive early.

“It almost goes against what we think we should do, but if you arrive and everyone around is talking about how they prepared, talking about what they studied and how, that fuels test anxiety,” Haught said.

If a test-taker does arrive early, she said they should sit outside the classroom or testing room until a few minutes before the exam is scheduled and then go inside. Otherwise, be right on time.

Once the test makes it into the test-taker's hands, Haught said to read through the exam, making sure to comprehend all directions clearly. And always ask questions if something isn't clear, because it's probably not clear to someone else.

Once the student digs into answering questions, Haught said if they don't know the answer to a question on an exam, keep reading questions until they



reach a point where they can answer them.

“Most people don't put the most difficult question first, but some do for whatever reason,” she said. “If you have a high anxiety level and you can't answer that first question, your anxiety level skyrockets. That's why it's better to go on and answer other questions to build confidence.”

Evan Bonnstetter, a senior public relations major, said when taking an exam, if he knows the answer could be “A” or “B,” then he knows the question is inclusive, meaning there is more than one correct answer. He also uses the process of elimination.

If that doesn't work, Haught said students could try a strategy called memory jogs — thinking about where they might have seen the material, such as in the lecture or in their textbook.

They can also think about where they were seated in the lecture, if the professor was animated about the material,

and what the students sitting beside them were doing, trying to recall as many contextual cues as possible.

Haught said the structure of the test also indicates how time should be managed. If a test has multiple-choice questions and two essay questions, then half the time allotted should be devoted to those essay questions. Essays require devoted time to be fully formed with pertinent information, not just anything. Students should think about if they have fully answered the questions.

Haught said studies have shown that students who use all of their time have a better chance than those who rush through. For example, some students face a common problem with math-based tests when they rush through and don't check their work.

“[During a test] I always go with my first instinct and I mark the ones (questions) that I'm unsure about so that I can see what I need

to go back to,” said Chris Carpenter, a graduate business administration major. “I never get nervous during a test.”

Similarly, Haught said she tells students to not change answers on a test unless subsequent information changes their mind.

Haught discounted the old statistical rumor to choose “C,” as it's the most common multiple choice answer. She said standardized test authors know the old rumor, as well, so the answer will not be “C.”

“If there is no penalty for guessing, and you're drawing a blank, then any of the letters are good for every time that happens,” she said. “So if you go with ‘A’ then every wild guess should be ‘A.’ Statistically, this improves your odds more than just jumping all over the place.”

For positively-worded multiple choice questions, Haught said to read the “stem” — the question — and choice A as a true or false statement. Then, repeat the process with choices B, C, D, etc. If it's positively worded, there should only be one “true” statement.

“Some people try to take it to the extreme and reason with it. No, it is what it is, don't reason things out,” she said.

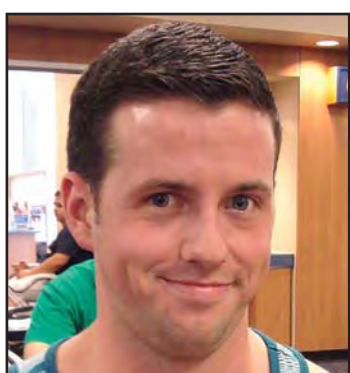
For true and false questions, Haught said it is easier for professors to write true statements than false ones. When questions have an absolute modifier — always, never — the answer is always false.

With matching questions, Haught said students should read the directions carefully on whether one answer matches one question or an answer belongs to several questions.

“For example, with the MCAT, students are given many, many answers they can choose from,” she said.

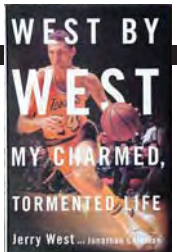

## Any given down has potential for a big play

**THERE'S A REASON** WVU's offensive football coaches say things like the Mountaineers have been nothing but average the first half of this football season and truly mean them.

There's a reason they're saying 450 passing yards in a game is nothing to brag about. But 700? Well, yeah that would cause them to nod their heads with approval.

But that reason is they're not comparing WVU's gaudy offensive stats to the numbers found in the Mountaineers' record book. **Dana Holgorsen's** offenses are designed to do this. Holgorsen and his assistants truly believe that for this team to be special and win championships, it has to reach a more productive level in this offense.

Today, as the No. 13 Mountaineers enter Syracuse game week, we look at the source of this line of thinking. It all begins with philosophy, and make no mistake there's been a major change. We all knew that seed was planted in December when WVU Athletic Director **Oliver Luck** announced Holgorsen's hiring. Now we're getting a glimpse of this creation as it continues to sprout.

Gone are the days of hearing WVU offensive players talk about "knowing the situation," in explaining why avoiding turnovers and running the clock were the goals instead of touchdowns. Gone are the days of hearing WVU defenders say, "You go out there knowing you can't give up one score."

In Morgantown this season, there's a paradigm shift from the "old-school" approach to the game of forcing things to ride on one or two plays, to looking to turn every play into a big play. The last three years WVU had the NFL approach to the game: Don't make mistakes, keep the score close, and trust your team to win it in the end. It can be productive — former WVU coach **Bill Stewart** did go 27-12 in three seasons — but it adds pressure to every snap.

But now? Well, here's what WVU receivers coach **Shannon Dawson** (one of Holgorsen's long-time friends who has run this offense at other smaller schools) had to say about this offense's philosophy. He was given the scenario that the Mountaineers get the ball inside their own 5-yard line, and asked to describe the team's mind set.

"A lot of people are scared to give up a safety or scared to give up a pick-six in that situation. That mentality versus mine is if I get the ball on the one-yard line, I want a 99-yard pass or a 99-yard run. That's what I want," Dawson said. "I want to execute a play that goes as long as the field is. I have that mentality versus 'let's get a couple first downs and punt it and see if we can flip field position.' Who cares about that? People want to buy a ticket and come to a game to see that? No."

WVU's new offensive regime doesn't want a game of chess, but rather a home-run derby. The goal is to be "big-play successful" on every snap. Of course that's never reached, but Dawson is convinced that the "mentality of constantly attacking wears on a defense." Time of possession no longer matters to WVU coaches. It's about maximizing the number of drives, not the number of plays in a drive.

It's a different way of thinking that has proven to lead to an entirely different looking game (WVU surpassed 40 points in a Big East game for the first time in 22 games with its 43-16 win against UConn).

It's a new strategy that, it seems, WVU fans are enjoying. As requested, they're being entertained.

"Would I be happy with [a 10-7 win]? I'd be OK with it because we won the game," Dawson said. "But the bottom line is we want to execute every series. The only series we're not trying to score on is the end of the game in victory, when we're kneeling it."

# WVU football game prices to rise in 2012



## Donation levels in line with other schools

WVU raised prices for football season tickets and parking passes this season. With the minimum gift requirements to the Mountaineer Athletic Club (MAC) scheduled to rise in 2012, some WVU fans may feel a little squeezed.

But WVU's season tickets aren't the most expensive in the Big East: The Mountaineers rank sixth out of eight Big East football schools. Between ticket prices and donation requirements, it costs more to secure 50-yard line seats at Cincinnati, South Florida, Connecticut, Louisville and Syracuse than it does WVU.

"We certainly look at peer institutions and see how other Big East schools or other BCS-conference schools have priced tickets," WVU sports marketing director **Matt Wells** said. "That's

certainly part of it. But another key part is looking at what the needs of our department are. We are charged with generating revenue to fund operations, not just for football and basketball, but for all sports."

Earlier this year, WVU raised its football season ticket prices in the Red, Gold, Orange and Green

seating zones from \$325 to \$365. The \$40 rate-hike was the school's first since 2007. However, to have the right to purchase those seats, season-ticket holders also must make an annual contribution to the Mountaineer Athletic Club (MAC). That concept is wide-

## WVU netters claim victory in the Brawl

Panthers last won battle in 2009

The move to the Atlantic Coast Conference can't come soon enough for Pitt's volleyball team — at least when it comes to getting WVU off the schedule.

After dominating the Backyard Brawl for three decades, Pitt suddenly can't beat WVU.

The Mountaineers defeated their Big East Conference rival for the second straight year Saturday night, 3-2, in front of a boisterous Coliseum crowd of 826. The scores were 19-25, 25-23, 25-21, 21-25 and 15-12.

WVU (5-13, 3-4 Big East), which snapped a 31-match losing streak against the Panthers a year ago, trailed only once, 2-1, in the decisive fifth set.

spread in college football. All eight Big East schools require a donation to purchase certain season tickets.

Distinguishing between ticket prices and gifts allows the MAC to deposit the money into different accounts. The money from season tickets is processed through the WVU athletic department and deposited into a state account while the mandatory donation goes into an account for the WVU Foundation, a non-profit organization that benefits from its tax-exempt status, allowing donors to take an 80 percent deduction according to IRS regulations. The donations help cover the bill for all of WVU's student-athlete scholarships.

"The donations from MAC donors go a long way towards funding the overall operation but, most importantly, they fund the scholarships for our student-athletes," Wells said. "That's a very important thing for the athletic department and it's important and impactful for our student-athletes. Not only does it give our donors the tax benefit, it also allows them to have a positive impact on the life of one of our student-athletes."

The minimum for that mandatory gift is going up at WVU next fall.

**Some fans wary of donation costs**

Tickets for the Green Zone (in the south end zone) do not require a donation but could in the future. The minimum contribution for the Orange Zone (upper- and lower-level seating in the corners of the end zones) will rise from \$100 to \$125 per seat per season. The Gold Zone gift will increase from \$200 to \$250, and the Red Zone donation, currently the highest level, will jump from \$375 to \$425. In addition, plans are in place to create a new Blue Zone, near the 50-yard line next year that will require a minimum MAC donation of \$500 in addition to the cost of season tickets.

The increase in prices has some fans wondering if they can keep up.

"For me, it's a lot of money," said Morgantown's Scott Streisel, a 2004 WVU graduate and football season ticket holder since 2008. "It's getting to be too much to go see a football game. They're going to price out their fan base."

"I understand that they're trying to keep up with other schools and it takes money to do that, but a lot of those other schools are in urban areas, which have more money," he said. "This is West Virginia. They complain about empty seats, but they're pricing out fans who can't afford it."

If ticket prices hold at their current rates, which Wells said is expected, the cost of a Blue Zone season ticket package would begin at \$865 in 2012.

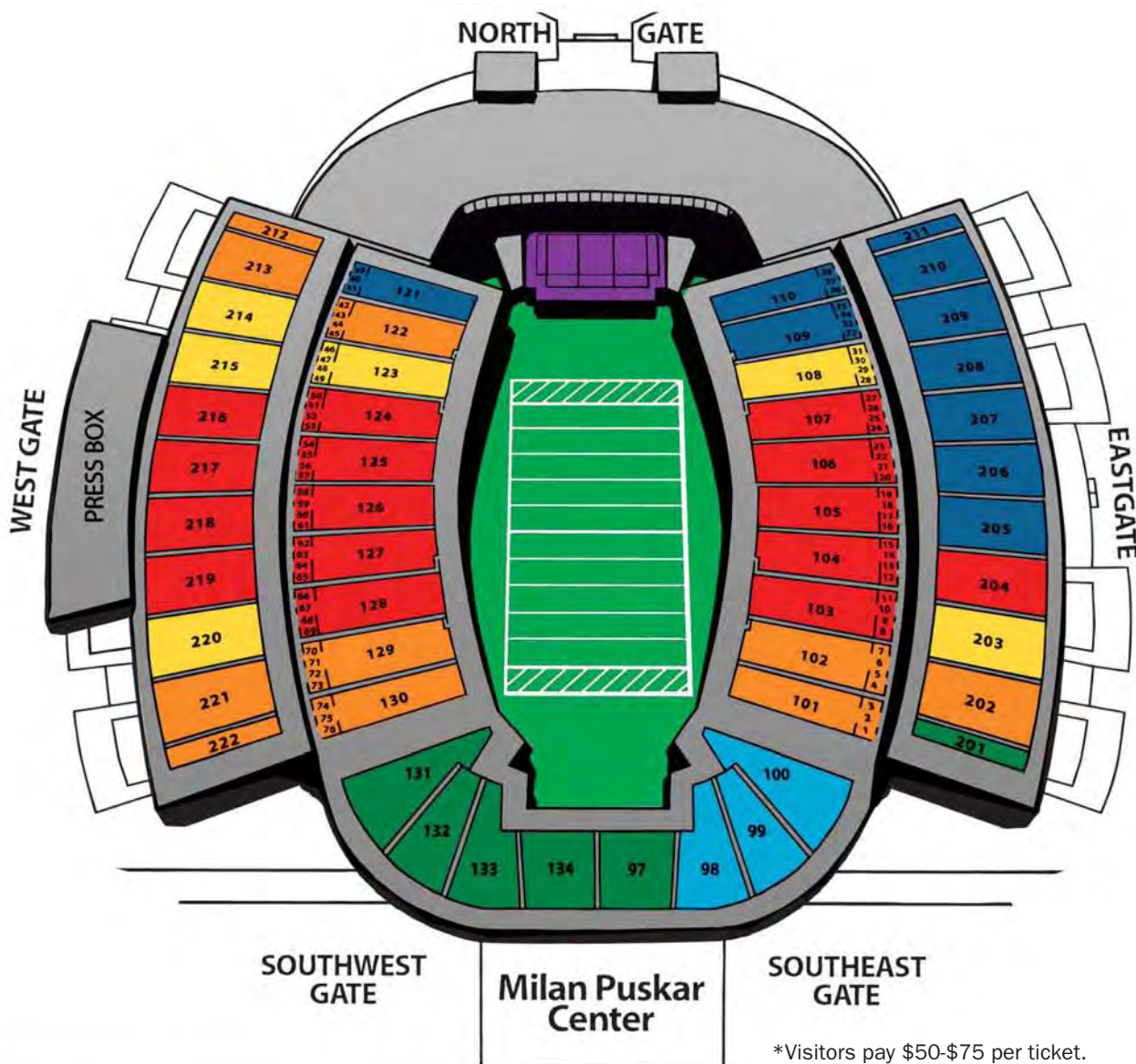
That figure would be lower than three of WVU's Big East brethren in the competition for the conference's most expensive ticket.

Cincinnati asks for a \$3,000 donation for its Tier 1 seating (on the 50-yard line) at Nippert Stadium. With an additional cost of \$290 for the season ticket package, the Bearcats' minimum cost of \$3,290 is the league's priciest ticket for non-luxury or club seating. Cincinnati also has the second- and third-highest tickets in the conference. The Bearcats' Tier 2 seats (either side of the 50) start at \$1,790, while Tier 3 (sandwiching Tier 2) begins at \$1,040.

Louisville's Blue seating area, on the 50-yard line at Papa John's Cardinal Stadium, ranks next with a \$964 price (the tickets cost \$264, with a required donation of \$700). WVU's Blue Zone seats will be the next-highest season ticket price starting in 2012, but that distinction now goes to Connecticut, which offers seating along the 50-yard line for \$850 (\$350 ticket, \$500 donation). Syracuse also offers Preferred seating along its 50 for \$815 (\$215 ticket, \$600 donation).

**TICKET CHANGES**

**Changes for 2011 Ticket prices**

- The cost of football season tickets for the 2011 season is \$365.

parking. The required gift for WVU football season tickets counts toward a donor's giving level, which means purchasing four seats in the Red Zone (\$375 gift per seat) automatically elevates a donor to the Captain's level (\$1,500-\$3,499 annual donation). Those donations all go into the MAC's annual fund, which raised roughly \$9 million last year (including football and basketball donations).

**Rising prices, expectations**

Some fans understand raising ticket prices, even if they don't like the impact it has on their wallets. And the fact that the Mountaineers (5-1, 1-0 Big East) are ranked No. 13 in the nation has softened the blow of the latest price hike.

"The last three years weren't too exciting and I didn't like having to pay about \$1,000 (for two tickets) to see that kind of product," said Matt Swartz, a five-year season ticket holder in the Orange Zone. "But I'm happier with the football team this year and, to be honest, tickets would probably have to go up considerably before I thought about not getting them."

Winding up on the wrong end of the latest round of conference realignment could also have a serious impact on WVU's bottom line. Should the Mountaineers find themselves in the Southeastern Conference or the Big 12, Swartz said he could even stomach another price increase. But if WVU is left in a watered-down Big East, or if the conference loses its automatic-qualifying status in the Bowl Championship Series, Swartz said it may be more difficult to convince fans to pay top dollar for season tickets.

"If we were to get into the SEC, I could probably pay a little more," Swartz said. "But if we're still in the Big East and we lose our AQ bid and start losing recruits, I'd still go to the games but I'd really have to think about it before I bought season tickets. This is something I have to save for to make sure I can get them every year."

**Cheap seats start at \$365 at WVU**

Syracuse offers some of the priciest tickets in the Big East but the Orange also

has one of the league's best values with season tickets starting at \$99 in the upper end zones. South Florida has limited seats beginning at \$65 per season, but that price jumps to \$170, while Pitt (\$116) and Louisville (\$126) both offer lower-price ticket packages.

Like WVU's Green Zone, none of those value packages require a minimum donation. However, WVU's Green Zone seats still start at a base season ticket price of \$365, making them the most expensive "cheap" seats in the Big East.

**Different ways of business**

Not all NCAA donor programs follow the same procedure as WVU.

The Ram Club, the University of North Carolina's version of the MAC, weighs its donor priority based on lifetime giving level, not annual giving.

"We do everything by points," UNC associate athletic director Clint Gwaltney said. "And those points are based on lifetime giving, not an annual donation. So, in theory, you could come in tomorrow, write a check and be No. 1 in points. It's all based on lifetime giving. We've been doing this for well over 50 years and that's what we've always based it on."

Gwaltney said he thinks basing overall donor priority on lifetime giving allows UNC, which sold about 32,500 football season tickets last year, to reward its biggest benefactors. This year, for the first time, the Tar Heels allowed donors to pick their own seats based on their priority number.

"We shook it up," Gwaltney said. "There were some people whose seats declined a little bit, but the reason for basing [donor priority] on lifetime giving is that it benefits those who have given as much as they have."

The University of Kentucky sold 43,000 football season tickets last year and recently revamped its "K Fund," the Wildcats' version of the MAC, to give priority to its biggest donors.

The K Fund is run on a points system, like UNC, but it takes multiple factors into consideration, including the number of years as a donor, the total amount contributed and how much a donor has contributed over a certain period of time, to determine that donor's priority. The total number of points then dictates the donor's seat location at Commonwealth Stadium, which has a minimum donation requirement of \$525 for seats on the 50-yard line.

"Prior to [restructuring the K Club], we had some people making donations and others not paying anything, but they were sitting in the same seats," Kentucky associate athletic director of ticket operations Joe Sharpe said. "We wanted to make it fair. So now everyone sitting within a certain section is paying the same amount."

**Cost of keeping with a winning program**

According to Wells, WVU has had some season tickets linked with donations to the athletic department since the 1970s, predating new Mountaineer Field.

Although raising ticket prices and increasing minimum donation levels is commonplace in the business of college football, fans said teams need to continue to elevate their level of play in order to keep them happy. Some fans said they can tolerate paying more to see a winner, but might be less likely to get in line for expensive season tickets for a non-contender.

"My wife had season tickets with me and when we had to drop hers, because it was too expensive, one of our friends bought them," Streisel said. "Anytime there's excitement around a program, it helps bring people in. I think they're going to keep raising [ticket prices] more, but they're pricing out some of the real fans. And if they keep raising prices and they have a losing season, or things don't look good for next year, they're going to start having a lot of empty seats in that stadium."

in any section inside Milan Puskar Stadium. The minimums apply toward existing season ticketholders looking to maintain their current seats. Maintaining giving levels allows MAC donors to retain their seats at Milan Puskar Stadium, even if new donors come in with bigger contributions.

So even though WVU now requires a minimum MAC donation of \$375 for Red Zone seating, that gift is unlikely to get new ticketholders into those seats. The 2011 Mountaineer Football priority seating pamphlet states: "Due to high demand and minimal attrition, it is unlikely that all new donors who give at \$375 minimum per seat giving level will receive Red Zone seating in 2011. Seating will instead be assigned to these

donors based on their MAC donor priority and associated giving level."

Wells said WVU's season-ticket renewal rate was about 90 percent this year. In order for a new season ticketholder to jump to the top of the wait list and get seats near the 50-yard line, they would have to give more than the minimum donation requirement.

"Based on the current demand, a new donor interested in acquiring Red Zone seats would probably need to join at the 'Champion' level (gift of \$6,500-12,899 per year)," Wells said.

Wells said that the MAC doesn't keep figures on how many upgrade requests cannot be processed each year, adding that sometimes fans choose not to upgrade based on not being able to retain

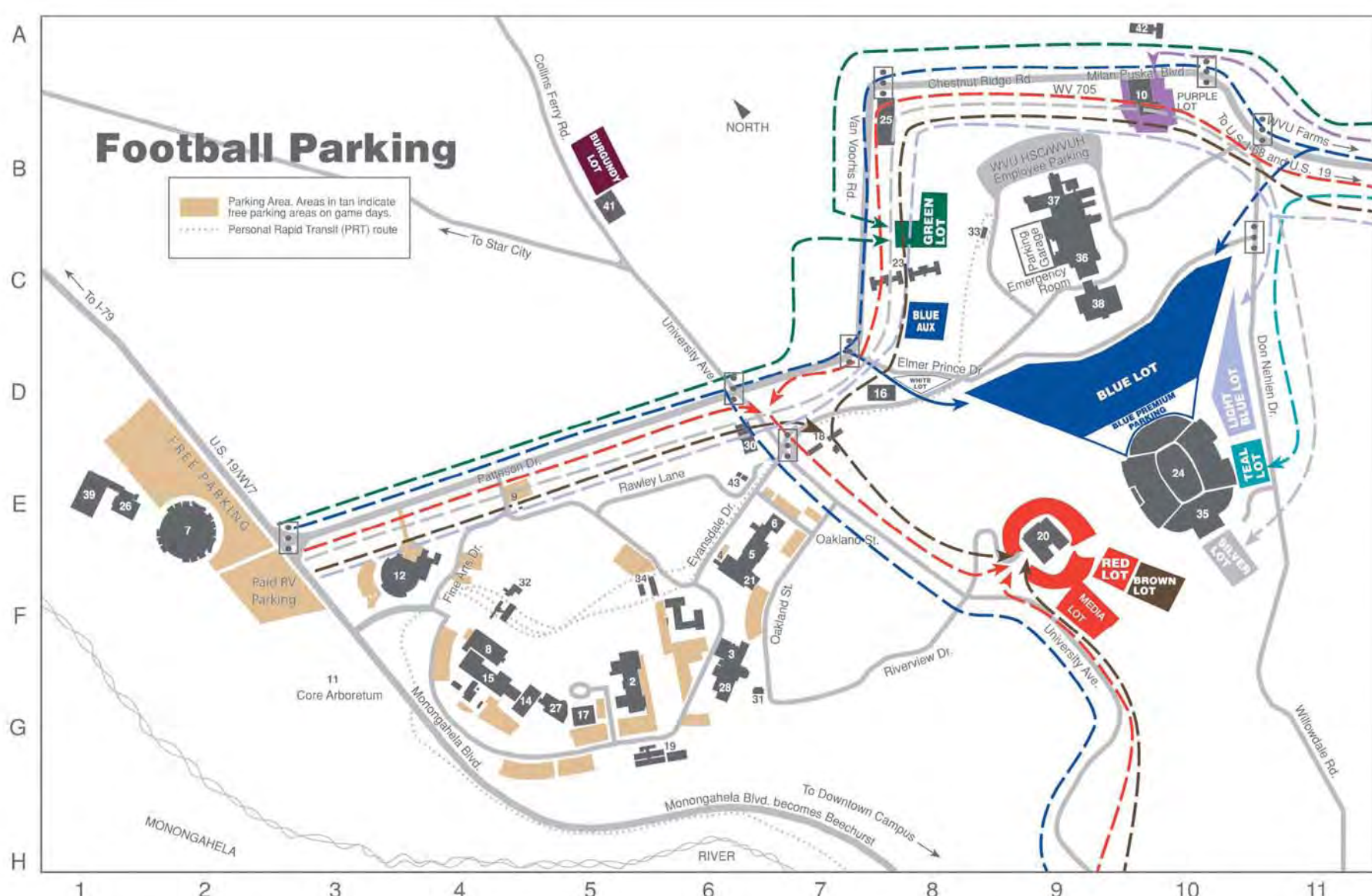
the same number of seats together or add seats to their existing account.

**Seating priority tied to annual giving**

While the minimum MAC contributions and season ticket prices generate considerable revenue for the university (this year's ticket price increase will generate an additional \$1.4 million in profit), a ticketholder's donor level, which decides seat priority, is tied directly to his or her annual giving.

The MAC has eight giving levels, ranging from Buckskin (\$100-\$399 per year) to Mountaineer Scholar (\$23,500 and up). The higher the level, the more benefits provided to the donor, including premium seating and premium

## Athletic Club donation status determines parking pass eligibility

### Blue level gets you 1 placard for your vehicle

To be eligible for a single parking pass, which cost \$200 per car and \$800 for an RV, MAC donors must achieve Blue (annual gift of \$400-\$799) level status.

Donors must reach the Directors level (\$3,500-\$6,499) before they can request two parking passes.

New donors must attain Champion level status (\$6,500-\$12,899) before they can request three parking passes or gain entry into the Blue Lot parking area on the north side of Milan Puskar Stadium.

"You have to be at least at the Blue level to request a parking pass, but we are able to accommodate every eligible donor who requests a parking pass," WVU sports marketing director

Matt Wells said. "It may not necessarily be in the lot they requested, but every eligible donor receives some kind of parking pass. The lot can vary by giving levels though: The giving level determines the quantity (of parking passes) as well as the (lot) quality."

WVU also offers options for patrons requiring handicapped parking, which are priced the same as general parking passes.

Season ticketholders are given the opportunity to purchase handicapped parking passes in the Blue, Silver and Brown Lots regardless of their annual giving level.

This year WVU sold 110 handicapped parking passes in the Blue Lot, 38 in the Brown Lot and 36 in the Silver Lot.

The Silver Lot still has 52 spaces available.

Only season ticket holders can request a season-long handicapped parking pass.

Applicants for a handicapped pass must also submit a copy of a state-issued handicapped parking placard and their parking registration card.

The person named in each of those documents must also be present in the vehicle on game day.

A limited number of single-game, handicapped-parking passes are also sold on a first-come, first-served basis, according to Wells.

Those spaces are made

available in the Brown Lot (near the law school) on game days. WVU also offers handicapped parking at the Coliseum and provides a shuttle to Milan Puskar Stadium from the Coliseum, the Brown Lot and the Blue Lot.

The shuttle, which stops at both the east and west gates of the stadium, is free from both the Brown and Blue lots and costs \$4 round-trip from the Coliseum.

## Wins, WVU football season-ticket sales linked

### Single-ticket purchases have risen this year

The Dominion Post

There's been a direct correlation between WVU football victories and season-ticket sales.

In the past decade, WVU experienced the greatest spike in season-ticket sales (29,579 in 2005 to 35,208 in 2006) following the Mountaineers' first Bowl Championship Series game victory.

WVU capped the 2005 season with an 11-1 record, Sugar Bowl victory over Georgia and top-5 ranking.

WVU's ticket sales increased each of the next two seasons, to a high of 38,191, in 2008, after back-

renewal rate was "roughly 90 percent," which is "strong compared to past years."

The Buckeyes didn't complete a pass until Miller hit Jake Stoneburner for a fourth-quarter touchdown and a 17-0 lead.

## No. 21 Texas A&M 55, No. 20 Baylor 28

COLLEGE STATION, Texas — Ryan Tannehill threw for 415 yards and a career-high six touchdown passes and Ryan Swope caught four scores for Texas A&M.

Baylor's Robert Griffin III threw for a school-record 430 yards and three touchdowns. Griffin is the third quarterback this season to set a school record against the Aggies' worst-in-the-nation pass defense.

Texas A&M (4-2, 2-1 Big 12), has won three in a row over the Bears and the loss leaves Baylor (4-2, 1-2) without a win against its longtime rival at Kyle Field since 1984. The Bears may not get another chance for some time with the Aggies leaving for the Southeastern Conference in July.

## No. 23 Michigan State 28, No. 11 Michigan 14

EAST LANSING, Mich. — Keshawn Martin scored twice in the third quarter on similar lunges to the end zone, and Michigan State beat Michigan for the fourth straight year. The Spartans (5-1, 2-0 Big Ten) equaled their longest winning streak over their in-state rivals. Michigan (6-1, 2-1) lost for the first time under coach Brady Hoke. The Wolverines had a chance to tie it, but Denard Robinson was sacked on fourth-and-1 from the Michigan State 9-yard line with 6:16 to play.

## Big East

### UConn 16, S. Florida 10

EAST HARTFORD, Conn. — South Florida didn't expect to be at the bottom of the Big East standings, not after winning at Notre Dame and going undefeated through its early non-conference schedule. But the Bulls (4-2), who opened conference play with a lopsided loss at Pittsburgh, failed for the third consecutive year to win a close game against Connecticut. USF turned the ball over four times, including a third-quarter fumble that was returned for a touchdown, and lost 16-10, despite holding the Huskies without an offensive touchdown for the second consecutive year.

### Utah 26, Pitt 14

PITTSBURGH — John White ran for 171 yards and Coleman Petersen kicked four field goals in the tricky Heinz Field winds to lead Utah by reeling Pittsburgh 26-14 on Saturday. The Utes (3-3) snapped a two-game losing streak behind the legs of White and Petersen and an impressive defensive effort to improve to 9-0 all-time against current members of the Big East.



# AP Source: Monday vote on slate for Big East leaders

NEW YORK — The Big East knows which schools it wants to add. Now it's just a matter getting those programs to come aboard.

To help convince some of the candidates — such as Boise State — that the Big East will be stable in the long run, the conference has a plan in place to double its exit fee to \$10 million.

An official in the Big East told The Associated Press that conference leaders are slated to vote Monday on raising that fee, which will clear the way to invite six new members.

Along with Boise State, which would be invited only to play football in the Big East, the league also wants to invite Air Force and Navy as football-only members and Conference USA members Central Florida, SMU and Houston to join in all sports. The official, who spoke to the AP on condition of



anonymity because the league wasn't announcing its plans publicly, said he is confident the league's members are ready to move forward with the plan.

The Big East has only six football schools committed to the league beyond this season. The conference would like to get to 12 football members and split into two divisions, East and West, and play a championship game.

"Everybody realizes there is a window of opportunity here to get these six teams," the official said Saturday.

Boise State and Air Force, currently in the Mountain West Conference, and Navy, an independent in football, have concerns about the long-term health of a league that has already had three defections during this latest round

of conference realignment.

"I don't have any idea right now from just reading accounts in the media of who's going to be in, who's going to be out, there's a great deal of uncertainty out there," Boise State President Bob Kustra told the AP before the Broncos played at Colorado State. "And so if anybody asked me today, if anybody invited me today, I wouldn't know what I was getting invited to. And so the first thing is to nail that down and be more certain."

In a short statement given to the AP on Saturday, Big East Commissioner John Marinatto stressed the conference "has not extended membership invitations to any institutions."

Kustra also told the AP: "We've not been extended an invitation."

Pittsburgh and Syracuse announced last month they will move to the Atlantic Coast Conference, though Big East rules require them

to stay in the league for the next two seasons and Marinatto has said he will hold the Panthers and Orange to that. It seems unlikely Pitt and Syracuse will be forced to stay if the Big East can get to 12 football members by 2012.

TCU was slated to join the Big East in 2012, but the Horned Frogs reneged on that commitment and accepted an invitation to the Big 12 last week. TCU is free to go immediately because it was never an official member; but the Big East is expecting to collect a \$5 million exit fee.

Trying to recruit new members has been tricky for the Big East because its remaining members have not committed to stay in the league.

Louisville and West Virginia are possible targets for the Big 12 if it needs to replace Missouri — which is pondering a move to the Southeastern Conference — or if it decides to expand back to 12 teams.

## Boise St. prez: Goal is AQ status

FORT COLLINS, Colo. — Boise State president Robert Kustra said the university's responsibility is to get the Broncos as close as possible to an automatic qualifying status in the BCS.

The Big East is expected to invite Boise State's football program to join a reconfigured conference as soon as next week, but that might not be the best move for the Broncos at this time.

Kustra spoke to the AP prior to the fifth-ranked Broncos' inaugural Mountain West Conference game at Colorado State on Saturday. The Broncos, (5-0), bolted the Western Athletic Conference to join the MWC this year.

"It's really an unsettled time," Kustra said.

"We have a number of options, one of which is staying right where we are, working through this Conference-USA merger of sorts and finding ways of getting better TV coverage and perhaps even working toward an AQ conference status. ... and while we love where we are, we'll keep all the options on the table. I think that's what my responsibility is as president."

"We are not on any kind of urgent timetable," he said. "We really enjoy where we are and it's important for us to take advantage of the rest of this season. I mean, let's face it, if we take care of the rest of this season, we're going to a postseason bowl, a BCS bowl. And that's not exactly too shabby an existence in the year 2011."

## Steelers looking for consistency against Jaguars

PITTSBURGH — Mike Tomlin isn't big on trips down memory lane, particularly painful ones.

The Pittsburgh Steelers coach grew so annoyed by repeated questions about Jacksonville's win at Heinz Field in the NFL Divisional playoffs four seasons ago he hung up on reporters.

"Anybody got any questions relative to this week?" Tomlin asked just before the phone went click.

Forgive Tomlin for his lack of enthusiasm when talking about arguably the lowest point of his highly successful tenure. Besides, as he is quick to point out, the Jaguars' 31-29 upset is ancient history for both franchises.

The Steelers have won a Super Bowl and lost another in the interim while Jacksonville has floundered, going 21-33 since David Garrard's gutsy fourth-down scramble

Pittsburgh (3-2) hosts the rebuilding Jaguars (1-4) on Sunday bear little resemblance to the two that played on that chilly January night.

"I understand that might have been a big game in Jacksonville four years ago but that's old news," Tomlin said. "Many of those guys are no longer here and definitely many of the guys that were in Jacksonville are no longer there."

Jacksonville quarterback Blaine Gabbert wasn't even in college yet. Now the rookie is learning on the job and in the midst of a daunting run

set up Josh Scobee's game-winning field goal.

The teams that face off when

that will have the Jaguars facing the NFL's top three defenses in successive weeks.

The returns have been mixed so far. Gabbert threw for 200 yards against Cincinnati last week, easily the best performance of the 22-year-old's brief career. Yet the numbers haven't translated to joyful jogs off the field. If the Jaguars can't beat the Steelers, they'd match their longest losing streak since 2001.

"We've got to win football games for us to feel good about ourselves and know that we're actually accomplishing something," Gabbert said. "We all get sick and tired of hearing we got better this week, we got better this week, but when you're losing you didn't get better, you lost."

Jacksonville's defense has done its best to give Gabbert a chance. Only New Orleans topped 300 yards of total

offense and the Jaguars have traditionally played the Steelers close. Each of the last seven meetings have been decided by nine points or less.

Not that the Steelers need any reason to be wary. They've failed to string together consecutive solid games during an uneven opening month of the season. Pittsburgh appeared to get back on track with a 38-17 rout of Tennessee last weekend in which quarterback Ben Roethlisberger tied a franchise record with five touchdown passes.

The Steelers know they can't afford to take a misstep.

"Offensively we can't have inconsistency," wide receiver Hines Ward said. "We can't come out and play a great game against Tennessee then come out and lay an egg. We've got to continue to build upon it and build steps in the right direction."

the best numbers in the Big East: Their production stands up against the best in the nation. WVU ranks No. 4 in the country in passing and is the only FBS program to have three players rank among the top 31 in receptions. Bailey, Austin and McCartney also are the only trio in college football to rank among the top 41 in receiving yards. The Mountaineers' offense is also 12th in scoring, averaging 40.8 points per game.

Those kinds of numbers haven't been seen around Morgantown in a long time, if ever. This year's offense is on pace to break the school records for total offense (465.9 ypg in 1988), single-season scoring (515 points in 2007) and shatter just about every passing and receiving record in the book.

And WVU's coaching staff wants to see more.

"The bottom line is that this [production] is not ordinary in our system: We've been doing this everywhere we've been," WVU inside receivers coach Shannon Dawson said. "Maybe it's unordinary around here and maybe its unordinary for our kids, but this is average for [the coaches]. We're having an average production year. There's nothing above average that we're doing."

WVU head coach Dana Holgorsen's offense ranked third nationally in total offense at Oklahoma State in 2010. In the last six years, only one Holgorsen-led offense has finished outside the top five. That was 2006, when Texas Tech finished sixth in the country. Right now the Mountaineers rank 11th in the country in total offense, averaging 503.9 yards per game.

"We're still trying to figure out who we are offensively and what we do best and what

we need to do a little bit better," Holgorsen said. "That's a week-to-week thing, and that's the way it's going to remain."

"I don't think we're very good right now, to be honest with you. We did enough offensively against UConn (to win 43-16), but we weren't very good. You can take it for what it's worth, but that's where we are."

Smith threw for 450 yards and tied a personal-best with four touchdowns against Connecticut. Bailey caught seven passes for a career-high 178 yards and two touchdowns, his fourth consecutive 100-yard game. And with McCartney finishing with 131 yards against the Huskies, it marked the third time this season that WVU had had multiple 100-yard receivers in the same game. That had previously happened only three times in program history before the start of this season.

And WVU's coaching

staff wants to see more.

"You have to keep demanding it," Dawson said. "What the kids think is good and what I think is good are two very different things. I strive for a level of execution that they probably think is unattainable. They might think that they played good but that's because they listen to guys writing articles about how great it is to have four 100-yard receiving games."

"They can't buy into the hype. Everywhere we've been we've had quarterbacks and receivers breaking records. Don't think you're anything special because you caught 100 yards receiving. What it comes down to is that if you look at what our offense has done, there are a lot of things we could be doing better."

Dawson singled out dropped passes (eight against UConn) and fumbles from

his receivers as a top area of concern. And of Smith's three interceptions this season, two came off tipped passes by the Mountaineers' receiving corps. Holgorsen said cleaning up those mistakes is a top priority as the team heads into the second half of the season. WVU's players have gotten that message.

"I feel like we're doing pretty well as a team but we still have some things we can work on to be even better," Bailey said. "Putting up big numbers and getting noticed for the things you do is nice, but the coaches have been around it for so long that nothing really comes as a surprise to them."

"We have to come out, keep our composure and play a full, complete game. We have yet to do that. When we can do that then I'll say that we are where we need to be but we're not there right now."

### OSGOOD-SCHLATTER DISEASE

Osgood-Schlatter disease is a common cause of knee pain in adolescents, affecting boys three times more than girls. With this condition, patients localize their pain to the front of the knee, where the tendon that runs from the base of the kneecap, known as the patellar tendon, attaches to the upper part of the lower leg. Excessive stress over this attachment produced by repeated activation of the large quadriceps muscle on the front of the thigh results in pain, swelling, and tenderness, and can be accompanied by the development of a prominent bump on the upper part of the shin bone just below the kneecap, one of the hallmarks of this disease. Children who are active in sports, particularly those involving forceful, repetitive quadriceps activation, such as with jumping and sprinting, may be at increased risk for developing Osgood-Schlatter disease.

# What are all these coyotes eating?

**MOST PEOPLE ARE AWARE** that coyotes are becoming rather common in West Virginia. They are doing so because there is food here. Just look at our turkey and deer numbers during the past 20 years. With those increases come more coyotes and more predation.

Hunters, and others, have shown concern about coyotes hurting deer numbers. Based on what is happening in the Southeast, that concern may have merit. Studies done in Georgia, Alabama and South Carolina show that coyotes can seriously hurt whitetail numbers by preying on newborn fawns in the spring. In fact, those studies showed that coyotes

can lower deer numbers. The question is, are coyotes preying on fawns and

adult whitetails in large numbers in West Virginia? Probably not, but we're on new ground here.

The first coyote killed in West Virginia in modern times was in 1975. Today, we find good numbers of coyotes in every county. Thus, a study of coyote diets in West Virginia is warranted

and being done by **Geriann Albers**, a graduate student in the WVU wildlife program. That study is not complete, but what follows is a progress report on what they have learned to date.

The approach has been to get stomachs from coyotes taken by trappers and by the federal agency (Wildlife Services) that traps problem and nuisance animals. In addition, the state Division of Natural Resources collected scats from various parts of the state during the breeding (January-April), pupping (May-August) and dispersal (September-December) seasons.

Geriann then determined the percent occurrence of all items in the

diets (percent occurrence is defined as every time that an item is found in a sample). It doesn't account for the amount, just the fact that it was there. If three chipmunk skulls were found, that is recorded as one occurrence in the stomach or scat.

A complete analysis by date has not been finished, but here are the total items found in 969 coyote scats and stomachs:

- Deer, 60.7 percent.
- Plant material, 38.0.
- Small mammals, 19.3.
- Fruits/seeds, 15.6.
- Squirrels, 11.2.
- Livestock, 6.8.
- Invertebrates, 6.5.
- Rabbits, 4.5.
- Birds, 4.5.
- Reptiles and amphib-

ians, 0.4.

As you can see, deer were found in lots of stomachs and scats. But this doesn't tell us whether the coyotes killed the deer and then ate them, or whether the deer were already dead and the coyote scavenged some.

What the data tell us is that coyotes eat a lot of different things, both plant and animal. For example, the fruits/seeds category included apples, grapes, pears, persimmon, cherries, blackberries, raspberries and acorns.

All three species of squirrels (red, gray, fox) were found.

Livestock included cows, sheep and goats, and invertebrates included beetles, flies and grasshoppers.

So the verdict is still out and when this study is completed, I'll give you those final results.

In the past few years I've noticed more "missing cat" posters in various stores, pharmacies, windows, etc. This recent Arizona study may shed light on missing cats. They put radio collars on eight coyotes and noted 36 coyote-cat interactions with 19 resulting in coyotes killing the cat. Most were killed in residential areas, during pupping season (May-August).

Just another reason to keep cats indoors.

## Survey: Turkey, rabbit numbers low

The 16th annual Bowhunters' Survey is now out along with the final report of last year's survey. For those of you that have never participated and would like to, contact Tammie E. Thompson at [vwgov](mailto:vwgov) or give her a call at 304-637-0245. This publication is sponsored with the cooperation of the Department of Natural Resources (DNR) and the West Virginia Bowhunters' Association.

This survey began in 1995 and participation has been on the decline. This past year, the number of participants was the lowest ever at 222 and covered 54 of the 55 counties. In order for this survey to produce meaningful results, more participants are needed. It can't be determined if the hunters' observations are actual changes in the herd or errors due to low sampling numbers. This survey is important to both the DNR and the hunters since it provides much needed information used to set the seasons and bag limits.

A couple of changes are coming with next year's publication. Hunters are invited to send in their stories and photos of successful hunts. It doesn't have to be a huge buck. It could be a first deer ever taken with a bow or anything else that would make a good story. Next year's publication will also include a section on the West Virginia Big Buck Contest.

In this area, we are in Region 4 or Central Region. This area covers 9 counties and had not quite half as

many cooperators as there were just five years ago. Those reporting averaged about 15 hunts each lasting 3.3 hours per hunt.

During these hunts, the hunters averaged seeing 2.8 deer per hour or 9.2 deer per trip. Eight percent of the bucks seen had branched antlers and 0.4 fawns were seen per doe. These hunters reported seeing 2.8 deer per hour or 9.2 deer per trip. A good thing was that the buck observation rate was slightly higher than the year before, but the doe-fawn observation rate was lower and less than the five-year average. The harvest rate in this region was the lowest of any of the six regions in the study. On the plus side, hunters in this region saw more bucks chasing does from week three through week five than any other region.

This survey looks at more than just deer. It covers all types of small game plus observations of house cats and dogs running loose in the wild. Statewide since the inception of the study, squirrel, raccoon, turkey, house cats, and rabbits have not shown any trends. However, in this region, squirrels had the largest increase of any region. This was strange because of the poor most year of 2009. This year's squirrel



observations should increase tremendously with the great most year we had last year.

The number of raccoons seen statewide was very close to their average since the study began. This kind of surprises me since the number of trappers has decreased significantly with the drop in hide prices the last few years.

The number of turkeys and rabbits seen last year was the lowest in the history of the survey. Warm weather in June last year helped the turkeys, but the poor most year the year before likely affected reproduction. Rabbits decreased to modern all-time lows in 2010. West Virginia's aging forests and clean farming practices (resulting in much less habitat) have likely influenced these numbers. Add to this the increasing

number of hawks and owls that prey on our furry little friends and their numbers will go down especially in the fall when the leaves fall off. Imagine if you were a poor little rabbit in the fall. If you go out in the open during the day, a hawk is liable to get you. Go out after dark and you're liable to be dinner for an owl.

Grouse and dogs have shown a linear decrease over the years. An explanation for the decrease in number of dogs seen has no good explanation, but the lack of habitat is responsible for the grouse numbers going down. The downturn in the housing market and the subsequent reduction in the number of trees being cut spells nothing but trouble for grouse habitat. As I've said before, the best friend of the grouse is the chainsaw.

Bears and coyotes have been on the increase over time. However, the number of bears seen went down last year probably due to the early bear seasons implemented to reduce the number of female bears. Another reason for reduced observations last year was the abundance of mast. This will keep the bears spread out just like the deer: Coyote numbers will continue to increase until someone or something kills them or they run out of food, which isn't likely to happen. If food runs low in one area, they just move to where there is some.

### GO FISH! (WEST VIRGINIA DNR)

#### Monongahela River

The water temperatures is 52-56 degrees. Fishing continues to be good during the day for smallmouth bass in the lock and dam tailwaters. The best fishing success for sauger and walleye is during low light conditions at dawn and dusk. Sauger, smallmouth bass, walleye and white bass are always attracted to the currents in the tailwaters. Jigs with minnows are the best baits right now. Channel and flat-head catfish are abundant throughout the river. Troll large crank baits for muskies anywhere on the river.

#### Cheat Lake

White bass schools can be seen breaking the surface throughout the lake. Cast crank baits, spoons, or jigs for fast action. The easiest way to fish the lake for all species is drifting along the shoreline with a night crawler or minnow on a hook with a couple of split shot at a depth of 10 to 15 feet. Cast small rooster-tail spinners for large bluegills and pumpkin-seed sunfish in downed trees along the shoreline. Channel catfish can be caught through-

out the lake but are particularly numerous upstream of Mt. Chateau. Cheat Lake has been one of the top lakes for bass fishing tournament success for the past five years. The embayments at the Cheat Lake Park are good areas for bank fisherman to catch sunfish and largemouth bass.

#### Tygart Lake

The lake is 20-25 feet below the summer level. Walleyes can be at any depth but will move into shallow water to feed at dusk. Smallmouth bass can be caught using crank baits or tube jigs along the shoreline. Look for white bass at the head of coves or the upper part of the lake. Fish for many species in the fish shelters between the boat ramps at the marina.

The tailwater temperature is 56 degrees. There are lots of walleye and trout in the tailwater. Walleye fishing is best during higher flows (1,500 to 5,000 cubic feet per second) and trout fishing is best at low flows (less than 1,000 cubic feet per second).

## Preserve owner admits covering up Vt. moose death

**IRASBURG, Vt.**— The owner of the game park where Pete the Moose lived has taken responsibility for covering up the death of Vermont's favorite animal, the state's fish and wildlife commissioner said Saturday.

Pete, whose life in captivity helped prompt the state to pass new wildlife laws and who received a gubernatorial pardon last winter, died in early September at the Big Rack Ridge in Irasburg while being tranquilized during hoof trimming. But state officials insisted he was alive until Friday, even issuing a photo taken Thursday of a moose it identified as Pete.

The moose in the picture turned out to be a different animal, prompting Pete's Facebook fans to start accusing the state of a cover-up. But Commissioner Patrick Berry said park owner Doug Nelson has since admitted that he delayed telling state officials about Pete's death.

"I did talk to the Nelsons yesterday evening and expressed my frustration with

what had happened, and I was happy that they decided to take ownership of the issue," Berry told The Associated Press. "The whole issue of Pete the Moose has been such a lightning rod, my guess is they were just concerned about what would happen (if word got out about the death)."

Doug's son, Richard Nelson, told WCAX-TV that the family misled the state.

"The blame goes to us," he said. "We're the ones that didn't say Pete died."

"We said we would take care of Pete, and then a few weeks later, geez, Pete died," he said. "And so we were mortified, and we said, 'Oh, we'll just sit on this one.'"

Pete, who was adopted as a calf after dogs attacked his mother and a sibling, rose to fame in 2009, when state officials said they didn't want native wild animals mixing with the elk at the game preserve, out of fear that chronic wasting disease could spread to the native animals. Animals other than elk on the preserve were ordered hunted and killed, but after a public outcry, law-

makers crafted a compromise.

In it, the animals at the Big Rack Ridge preserve were designated a "special purpose herd," oversight of which was transferred from Fish and Wildlife to the state Agency of Agriculture. That meant that preserve owner Doug Nelson owned the animals.

But lawmakers reversed themselves earlier this year, saying wild animals in the state can't be privately owned and are legally a public trust, owned by all Vermonters. Under that legislation, the native deer were ordered removed within three years, but Pete was allowed to stay.

Berry said it was "tremendously frustrating" to have been accused by Pete's fans of causing or covering up Pete's death.

"Most of the people who have been fans of Pete the Moose have never fully understood the story," he said. "It's not a good idea to trap wildlife behind a fence and feed them beer and doughnuts. This is a good example of what happens when you don't keep wildlife wild."

## Like good neighbors

School district's offer to city on Woodburn gets top marks

The more some neighborhoods change, the more they stay the same. Some may take issue as to how that applies to the Woodburn neighborhood, but not us.

Last week, the Monongalia County Board of Education (BOE) announced it had met with Morgantown city officials to discuss the future of Woodburn Elementary School.

The school district is offering the city the first option to buy the four-acre site once it's abandoned in late 2012 due to the opening of the new Eastwood Elementary.

We applaud the school district for making this gesture. In the not too recent past, Morgantown's City Council passed a resolution questioning the BOE's decision to close Woodburn and build Eastwood outside the city.

Letting bygones be bygones is wise. The idea of keeping public property in public hands is smart.

That said, whatever deal is reached with the school district on this property should not simply be some kind of "accommodation" with the city.

Though we favor the idea of any public-to-public transfer of property, in this case the sale of Woodburn should benefit the entire school district, not just the city of Morgantown.

Unlike the county's recent purchase of the former Harley O. Stagers Building in downtown Morgantown, the federal General Services Administration gave the county a discounted price. But it did so knowing there would be further costs and that it would benefit everyone.

We are not suggesting a price tag for the BOE and the city on this property. It's currently being appraised.

The price may not even need to meet fair market value, but it should be fair to both sides.

At a minimum, before rushing headlong into this deal the city should do thorough research, develop a strategic plan and list solid reasons for taking this unusual step.

Fortunately, Morgantown's city manager is ahead of the curve on this concept. He plans to appoint a committee to not only establish the best use of this facility, but to determine the costs and commitments required to maintain it in the future.

Whatever may come of the BOE's gracious offer to the city, we are grateful to see our government working closely with others across purviews, boundaries and differences of opinions on the challenges that face our community.

Unlike Congress and the Legislature, the extensions of our local government, by and large, manage a consensus that allows things to get done for the common good.

It may not be a good-neighbor policy per se, but it's a positive step nonetheless. Every time our public sector works together, everyone benefits.

# Trouble in the bat cave

Species' decimation bodes ill for both environment and economy

**I**T'S OCTOBER, which means that bats are once again having their annual star turn, popping up on classroom bulletin boards and store windows across America. But this year, actual living bats in North America aren't so abundant. They are being decimated by a deadly health epidemic.

The disease causing this die-off is called white-nose syndrome, and it is infecting hibernating bat populations across the Eastern states. In the four years since it was first detected, white-nose syndrome has spread quickly from a cave in upstate New York, the epicenter, to 16 states and four Canadian provinces. It has killed more than 1 million bats.

Biologists in New York first started to notice dead and dying bats with unusual symptoms in 2007. Named for a fuzzy white fungus that often grows on the muzzles, wings and tail membranes of infected bats, white-nose syndrome had never been seen in North America. As winter wore on, more and more bats were affected by the disease, and biologists watched helplessly as the bats prematurely left their caves and died in droves in the ice and snow in the Northeast.

Scientists worked quickly to identify the culprit, a newly found fungus associated with the disease, *Geomyces destructans*. European biologists noticed that many of their bats also had a white fungus on them but that they were not dying. Genetic comparison confirmed that the North American and European fungi were a match.

Scientists hypothesize that the fungus was accidentally introduced into the New York cave by a human visitor, and that American bats, unlike their European counterparts, have little or no resistance to white-nose syndrome.

The exact reasons are unknown. Physical differences may play a role (European bats tend to be bigger and may be better able to fight the infection). It's also possible that

European bats co-evolved with the fungus, which allowed them to develop resistance, or that environmental differences cause the fungus to behave differently in North America.

Global travel has made the introduction of foreign plants, animals and pathogens as easy as dropping anchor or hopping on a plane. Importers, anglers, explorers and even gardeners can easily transport invasive pathogens on clothing and footwear, or in shipments of goods.

Many bats are at risk. More than half of the 45 bat species living in the United States rely on hibernation for winter survival. But bats with white-nose syndrome exhibit deadly behavior during cold winter months, waking from hibernation and flying outside during the day in search of food and water.

White-nose syndrome has an extremely high mortality rate — more than 95 percent of the infected bats at some sites in the Northeast have died. Sites where bat populations have been stable or increasing over the last 30 years are devoid of hibernating bats. Unless something changes, several species (including the once-common little brown bat) are facing regional extinction in the next decade.

Bats have never enjoyed a great reputation in American culture. They have been portrayed as human bloodsuckers, even though vampire bats, which don't exist in the United States, don't feed on human blood. And they are blamed for transmitting rabies, although rabies is not more common in bats than in raccoons or skunks.

Worse still, bats are rarely given credit for what they excel at: Insect pest control.

The loss of bat populations in the United States has serious implications for our economy and environment. A recently published study estimates that bats provide an average of

## Assembly, petition at work again

The "OCCUPY WALL STREET" movement and its spreading urban echoes are — like the tea party movement — grand examples of Americans using two of our lesser-known First Amendment freedoms: Assembly and petition.

Regardless of how you feel about either or both movements, they are the latest examples of the role of protest in American politics and society. In the history of protest, there are both lessons to be learned and mistakes to be avoided.

As a nation, we too often forget that along with apple pie, protest is an American tradition. We also need to recall that too often we have trampled on that tradition in the name of order or security.

Americans have taken to the streets to object to all manner of issues, from taxes on whiskey to the proposed Constitution itself. Abolitionists marched against slavery. Thousands protested to gain the vote for women a century ago, and thousands more demonstrated for civil rights in the 1950s and '60s and against the Vietnam War in the '60s and '70s.

But even as today's demonstrators camp outside financial offices in a number of cities, recycling '60s protest music, we hear reverberations of the pro-Vietnam War advocates who proclaimed, "America: Love It or Leave It."

If the "occupy" movement continues to spread, and mass arrests occur, we should recall another time when public protest rooted in deep economic woe and joblessness led to a shameful stain on the First Amendment rights of assembly and petition.

In the spring and summer of 1932, a ragtag assembly of about 15,000 World War I veterans converged on Washington, D.C., to petition Congress for help in the Great Depression toward the end of President Hoover's term. Seeking early payout of a special payment not due to be made till 1945, these veterans occupied public land and empty buildings along Pennsylvania Avenue and across the Anacostia River from the Capitol.

Calling themselves the "Bonus Expeditionary Army" — a play on the name for U.S. military forces that had fought in Europe — they were ordered to disperse after Congress rejected their plea for early payment. When they did not, U.S. Army troops, led by future national heroes Gen. Douglas MacArthur, Dwight Eisenhower and George Patton, and backed by a handful of surplus Army tanks, moved against the veterans.

Scores of veterans were injured and several died after clashes with troops. Their makeshift encampments were destroyed and burned.

Within a few years, claims that the veterans were communists were set aside — and a second "bonus army" was greeted by first lady Eleanor Roosevelt. In 1936, Congress agreed to the early payout to needy vets.

Thankfully, confrontations thus far in the "occupy" movement haven't involved tanks or troops — more like a limited deployment of pepper spray and plastic handcuffs. For the most part the arrests of hundreds in New York, Boston and Washington have occurred because protesters broke laws.

Let's hope everyone keeps in mind the unspoken but eminently valuable safety valve provided by the First Amendment — the right to voice criticisms of those in power, and to assemble peacefully with like-minded people to petition for "a redress of grievances."

Deep-seated public anger over economic disparity or a government seen as out of control is finding a public voice. Tempers are not being further frayed by the frustration of sweeping suppression.

The First Amendment is working — for now.

## Remembering Gandhi for all ages to come

The name Gandhi is synonymous with peace and nonviolence. His epic struggle to bring together the nation of India and other oppressed people around the globe in their search for sovereignty, freedom and social justice is unparalleled.

The 142nd anniversary of Mohandas Karamchand Gandhi's birth, an apostle of peace, fell on Oct. 2. It was celebrated around the globe as an international day of nonviolence in accordance with a United Nations General Assembly resolution passed in 2007. Paying rich tributes to the man of the millennium, the U.N. Secretary General, Ban Ki-Moon, described Gandhi as a symbol of hope for oppressed people of the world who fought for their human rights using nonviolence and peaceful methods.

The members of the Hindu Religious & Cultural Center, an Indian religious and cultural group, organized a peace march in Morgantown on this occasion to keep Gandhi's spirit alive and many people participated in it.

The Rev. Martin Luther King Jr., whose example and words created and inspired the civil rights movement, applied much of the strategy of Gandhi to this struggle.

Describing Gandhi, Dr. King once said, "Christ gave the spirit and Gandhi furnished the method and tools to struggle for social justice against mankind through peaceful and nonviolent means."

Albert Einstein, the celebrated scientist, paying tribute to Gandhi, said "that future generations to come will hardly believe that such a man ever lived and walked in flesh and blood on earth."

Nelson Mandela, who was instrumental in dismantling apartheid in South Africa and helped establish democratic rule, always cherished Gandhi as his mentor and inspiration.

Both King and Mandela, who both considered Gandhi as their mentor, were awarded the Nobel Peace Prize. It is a great irony that Gandhi who reshaped history and the fortunes of millions of oppressed people and later became man of the millennium was not awarded this prize, although he was nominated for the award in 1937, 1938, 1939 and 1947, a few months before his assassination.

This lapse by the Nobel Peace Committee remained unanswered and perhaps later members of the committee publicly regretted the omission when the Dalai Lama was awarded Nobel Peace Prize in 1989. During the ceremony to award the Tibetan spiritual leader, the chairman of the committee said that this was "in part tribute to the memory of Gandhi."

It is interesting to mention that Gandhi started his peaceful and nonviolent struggle against social injustice in South Africa where he lived for 20 years before returning to India to repeat and practice his unique techniques to free India from British colonial rule.

Although he was in the forefront of the Indian independence movement, Gandhi never held any political or government positions, and lived a life as a common man. That is what made him the man of the millennium.

\$22 billion a year in pest control services to the nation's agricultural industry, and this staggering figure does not include the forest products industry. Not only will there be fiscal costs if farmers, loggers and homeowners have to use more pesticides; there is the potential for negative environmental and human health effects.

The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service is leading a cooperative international effort of more than 100 agencies and organizations to address the disease and conserve North American bat species. By year's end, state and federal agencies will have spent more than \$24.5 million on the investigation, but so far a solution eludes us.

As scientists continue their inquiries into what is behind white-nose syndrome, we and the bats need help from the public. First and foremost, it's important not to spread the disease farther. Many caves and mines are closed

Second, spending in each year for FY 2009 and 2010 aver-

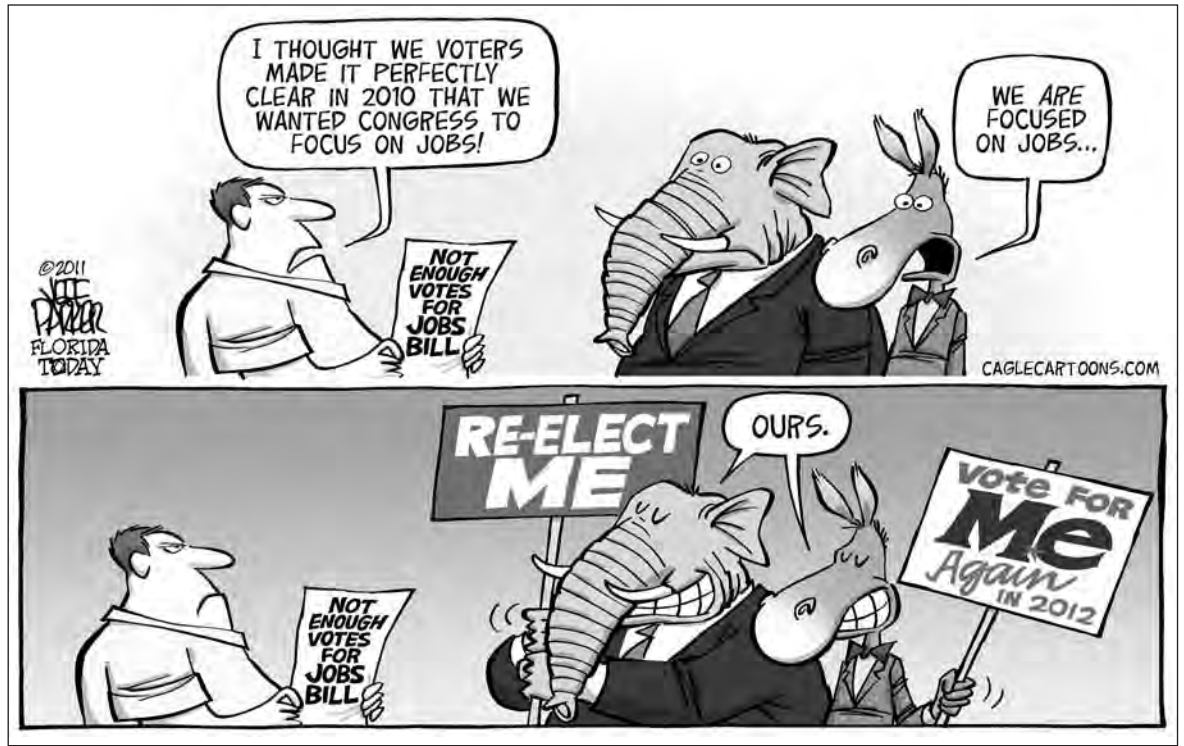
to protect hibernating bats. Cave explorers should check with their state conservation agency before entering any cave or mine, and they should follow the protocols recommended by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service to decontaminate clothing, footwear and equipment used in caves and mines.

People can also help by taking note of bats in their area, and reporting to a wildlife agency any new bat colonies or odd activity — such as bats flying in the day or roosting in sunlight on the outside of structures during the winter.

As you look at all the bat decorations this Halloween, spare a thought for the real bats and the crucial role they play in ecosystems across the country. They need your help.

## On GOP stage, Perry no Reagan

**RICK PERRY** RODE into this presidential race eight weeks ago looking like Ronald Reagan.

Instead, he's turned into Cosmo Kramer. Awkward and often confused, he has become less of a participant in the Republican debates than a comic sidekick doing walk-ons, shouting about how we're "sittin' on a treasure trove of energy!" and then grinning for applause.

Instead of riding the cheers from his early Draft-Rick campaign, he has sunk into an occasional supporting role alongside the leading-man Mitt Romney and good-guy-foil Herman Cain.

Perry tangled his lines again Tuesday night, first missing his chance to upstage Romney on health care, then giving a mush-mouthed answer about his plan.

If I understood Perry, his health-care plan involves — uh, jobs — and energy independence — and, uh, lawsuit reform — and oh, yeah, reducing insurance costs.

After all, that's worked so well in Texas. Not only is Perry no longer the marquee star, he's barely in the scene.

"I didn't see anything that would give voters a compelling reason to re-examine Perry," said Matthew Wilson, a political science professor at Southern Methodist University.

"There were no 'wow' moments. He's just not as polished or as smooth as Romney. Every time they're on stage, that works to Perry's detriment."

After Perry said he has an economic plan coming, "but I'm not gonna lay it out for you tonight," he was drowned out in an echo chamber of talk about "9-9-9." Cain's

tagline for his plan.

"The focus on Cain emphasized his role as the economic conservative," Wilson said. "That's the role Perry wanted."

Yet Perry remains the top challenger, said Richard Murray, professor of political policy at the University of Houston.

"He's the only candidate who has the funding," Murray said.

"Cain has no personal money and shows little ability to raise it. So as we move into the primaries, Perry will remain the only realistic alternative."

A further Perry fade would give Romney the nomination, Murray said. But more debates won't help.

"With Perry, you want to get him in the deep weeds and he kind of disappears," Murray said.

"Cain can say '9-9-9.' Romney is a good debater."

This is no longer Perry's show.

# Generation Y asks 'Why should I invest in stocks?'

Aaron Litter has a clear goal in mind when it comes to investing. He keeps a little more than half of his portfolio in stocks. The rest is slashed in bonds to help smooth his returns.

With about 55 percent in stocks, he's hardly alone. It's a common balance for people approaching retirement who want to protect their savings, without investing so conservatively that they miss out on market rallies.

Yet Litter isn't a 50-something baby boomer. He's 24, and could invest far more aggressively. The University of Miami law school student has decades to make up for losses he might suffer from the market's periodic declines. He built up his savings at an early age by spending two years helping to run the commercial real estate business that his late father founded.

His approach defies conventional wisdom that 20-somethings' should have as much as 90 percent of their

investments in the stock market. That mix reflects the greater long-term returns that stocks historically have delivered compared with bonds, and is how target-date mutual funds try to strike an age-appropriate mix for investors expecting to retire around 2050.

But three years after the market's steep plunge, aversion to stocks is common for investors of every age. What's surprising is that the attitude has become ingrained in Generation Y, generally defined as people born from 1981 through 1995.

Litter, for example, says he's relatively comfortable with risk compared with friends his age who keep as little as 10 percent of their investments in stocks.

A key reason is that they've seen losses as much as they've seen gains in the short span that they've been investing, and watching their parents invest.

"We've had the tech bubble burst and the real estate bubble burst," Litter says.

Their portfolios are frequently so conservative that they resemble those of investors decades older, although Gen Y has far longer to recover.

"Gen Y is investing more like their parents and grandparents, many of whom grew up in the shadow of the Great Depression," says Bill Finnegan, a marketing di-

rector with MFS Investment Management.

The mutual fund company conducted a recent survey to gauge the mood of investors. It found that Gen Y investors, aged 18 to 30, kept an average 30 percent of their portfolios in cash, such as money-market funds and bank accounts. That was nearly as much as the 33 percent they invested in U.S. stocks and stock funds. Among all age groups, cash averaged 26 percent.

The real eye-brow-raiser came from the 40 percent of Gen Y respondents who agreed with the statement, "I will never feel comfortable investing in the stock market."

Gen Y's cautious investing is a hot topic across the industry. They're "incredibly risk-averse," Sanjiv Mirchandani, president of Fidelity Investments subsidiary National Financial, said at a recent conference where he highlighted the trend. "They're putting away their savings in banks."

Many are cautious because they have little or no money to invest, and face bleak job prospects, even if they're well-educated. Nationwide employment among 16- to 29-year-olds last year was at the lowest level since World War II. Just 55 percent had jobs, down from 67 percent a decade earlier.

Those are some of the realities that young protesters

in the ongoing Occupy Wall Street movement are calling attention to.

Finnegan, of MFS, believes Gen Y is becoming a generation of "recession babies" who are conservative about investing, much as people who came of age during the 1930s have been called "depression babies." The stock market volatility and economic hardships that group endured left them more averse to money risks than preceding generations.

For Gen Y, such thinking creates a risk of not fully realizing long-term market gains, and running out of cash in retirement.

It's important to remember that the past decade's decline in stock prices was rare. Over rolling 10-year periods dating to 1926, stocks fell just 5 percent of the time, according to a study by fund company T. Rowe Price. And during the 1980s and 90s, stocks delivered annualized returns averaging 17.8 percent.

But history doesn't necessarily make a big impression on Gen Y investors, who saw stocks lose slightly less than 1 percent a year the last decade.

"If you say to them, 'You might miss a market rally,' their experience tells them, 'I don't seem to have missed out on anything, from what I can tell,'" Finnegan says.

## Spotting the next bubbles

It's easy to find stock bubbles with years of hindsight. But scholars from Columbia and Cornell universities say they have found a way to spot overvalued companies in real time, using complicated mathematical formulas. Columbia professor **Philip Protter** explains why bubbles matter to investors.

**Why should investors care?**

There are two fundamental reasons, and they're kind of different. One is that, when the Federal Reserve, or various government agencies, regulate the economy ... one of the things they do is they insist that banks have a certain amount of capital reserved. ... If one of the assets, or many of the assets they're holding, are undergoing bubble pricing, then the banks and everybody else thinks they have a lot more capital reserves than they actually do because the prices are inflated. ... The other reason is more pedestrian. ... Let's say you're in an investor long-term, and you think that Verizon is a good stock and it's going to be a good stock for the next 20 years, and you want to buy it. If you see that it's currently in a bubble, you may want to wait until that plays itself out before you buy it, and just keep your money in the bank.

Do you find that a lot of long-term investors slip up and buy stocks in bubbles? It depends on who you're talking about. I think a lot of Wall Street types are a bit too savvy to get that burned. They may suspect something's in a bubble. It's kind of like when you're driving, and you see the light is green and you notice it's been green for a long time as you're approaching it. You think it's kind of a stale green and it's going to turn yellow very quickly. And, so, if you're on Wall Street and you've been seeing a run-up of something — something's really been increasing, and you have an intuition that it's in a bubble — and it's been doing this for a while, then you know it's dangerous to get into it. The ordinary, average investor who's just trying to save some money through the stock market wouldn't think like that.

So what looks like a bubble now? Fairly recently, LinkedIn had an IPO. And, so there was a lot of speculation that a bubble was beginning. We got the data right from the first five days it was trading, and ran it through our [research formula], and determined that it was a bubble. Then, I read an article ... on whether gold is in a bubble or not. So, I thought, this is perfect, we'll test gold. So we tested gold, and we discovered it was not a bubble. ... Those are the only two current things we've done so far, because it is a fair amount of work. We don't have it where you just put the data into a black-box software and out pops [the conclusion]. We do it all by hand.

Do you see the day when this is all automated on a computer, so people can just enter a ticker and see if a stock is in a bubble? Yes, I do see that. ... For example, let's suppose you're just an ordinary person and you want to buy a stock and you call up your broker. ... So, before you buy a stock, have it checked to see if it's in a bubble. So you say, "This stock looks almost too good to be true." So you ask your broker, "Could you run it through your software and see if it's in a bubble?"

## Short of confidence

Investors are placing the most bets since 2009 that stocks will fall.

They are discouraged by the volatile stock market, Europe's slow progress in resolving its debt problems and the tepid U.S. economic recovery. So, they are shorting stocks, which means they're betting stocks will fall. To short a stock, an investor borrows a share and sells it. Later, if the price falls as expected, the investor can buy the share again at the lower price and pocket the difference.

Investors had 14.95 billion shares borrowed for short sales on

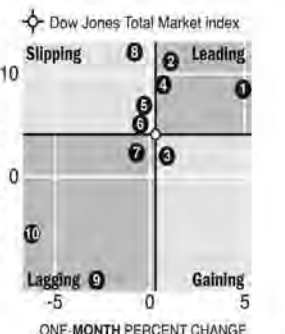
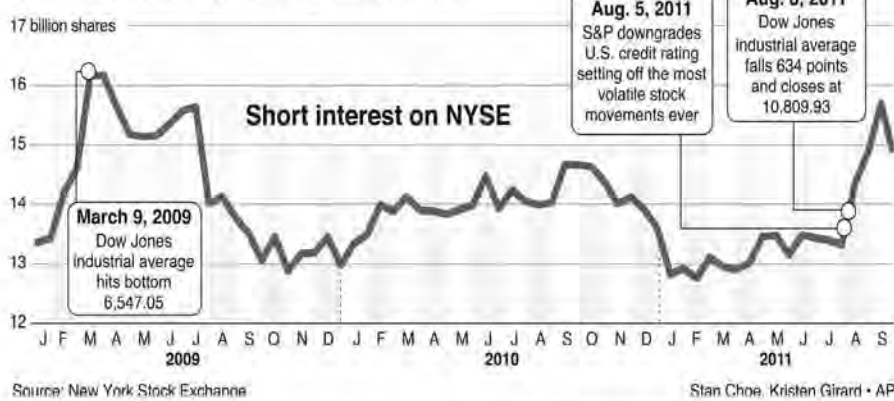
Sept. 30, according to the most recent data available from the New York Stock Exchange. Two weeks earlier, they had 15.67 billion. That was the most since March 2009, when 16.17 billion shares were sold short.

Interest in shorting stocks has been building through the year on growing pessimism about the global economy. Barclays Capital strategists on Tuesday cut their forecast for where the S&P 500 index will end the year to 1,260 from 1,325. They expect earnings growth to slow, and they say Europe's debt

problems have hurt corporate confidence. Morgan Stanley Smith Barney recommended last week that investors shift money to safer investments, such as bonds, and away from stocks.

But some financial analysts see the increased short interest as a contrarian signal for optimism about stocks. If stocks keep rising like they did last week, it could trigger a spurt of buying. J.P. Morgan strategist Thomas Lee wrote in a report. Short sellers would scramble to buy stocks to limit their losses in a move called "short covering."

Investors are selling stocks short at levels not seen since 2009. That means they're betting stocks will fall.



### INDUSTRY FOCUS

#### Technology

A three-day BlackBerry outage wasn't enough to keep technology stocks from continuing their rally last week. Google reported earnings Thursday that soared past analyst expectations. That suggested that a weak economy wasn't keeping consumers from using the Internet giant's services. Yahoo rose toward the end of the week as investors started to speculate that the company might soon be acquired.

Shares of online travel-deal company Travelzoo jumped after an analyst said the company is growing in the local daily deals market and adding subscribers. Even shares of BlackBerry maker Research In Motion were able to end the week with gains. Its brand, however, took a beating.

## Still waiting

Bank of America investors could use some good news on Tuesday, when the nation's largest bank reports its third-quarter earnings. It has been the most disappointing stock in the Dow this year, down 53.6 percent. Last quarter, it reported a loss of \$9.1 billion.

This time, financial analysts expect the bank to report a profit, possibly even growth from a year ago. Bank of America benefited from selling half its stake in China Construction Bank, for which it netted a \$3.3 billion after-tax gain.

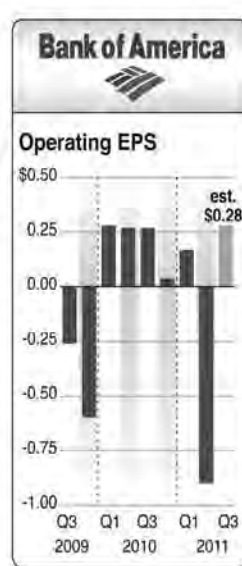
But challenges remain. Investment banking business has been slow across the industry. Trading revenue is weak following big swings in stock and bond markets since August. Fewer compa-

nies are listing their stocks on public exchanges, which means less IPO fees.

Weaker investment banking revenue led JPMorgan Chase to report a 4 percent drop in third-quarter profit last week. It is one of the strongest banks in the industry, and investors worry that its results bode poorly for other big financial companies.

Investors are also still worried about the effect of bad mortgages written by Bank of America's Countrywide unit. Earlier this year, it paid \$12.7 billion to settle mortgage-related claims.

To reassure investors, the bank has sold assets, reshuffled management and said it will cut 30,000 jobs over the next few years as part of a plan to help save \$5 billion per year in costs.



### Dow30 Stocks

The Dow rose for a third straight week and turned positive for the year. Over the past two weeks, the index has had its biggest two-week gain since March 2009. The average's best week in months was fueled by increasing investor confidence that Europe was getting closer to resolving its messy debt crisis. Even if Greece is forced into bankruptcy, investors now believe it's likely the damage to the global economy will be contained.

Investors have bought Treasuries with abandon since August, when the stock market became extraordinarily volatile. When investors don't trust stocks, government debt looks attractive. It's seen as a good place for investors to store money while they wait until it's safe to buy stocks again.

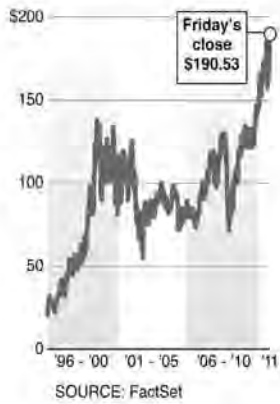

**BIG BLUE**  
Most stocks are struggling, but IBM has never been higher. Its stock climbed to \$190.53 on Friday, a record. It has been the best stock in the Dow Jones industrial average this year, up 29.8 percent. The second-best is McDonald's, which is up 17.2 percent. The overall Dow is up 0.6 percent. One reason why IBM has done so well is that its earnings tend to be steady. Going back to the fourth quarter of 2005, IBM's profit has dropped just once. That time was by only 1 percent. Such resilience is alluring when investors worry the weak economy could drag down corporate earnings.



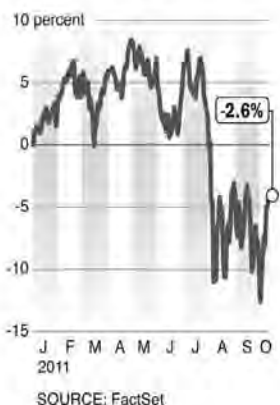
IBM's stock has never been higher.



HIT AGAIN

Already weak corporate pension plans are in even more trouble. The weak stock market has dragged down the value of pension plans' holdings. Those in the S&P 500 are underfunded by about \$477 billion, or 28 percent. Stock investors should care because the underfunding means companies may have to contribute more cash next year to fill their pension plans' coffers. Credit Suisse analyst David Zion estimates it could total \$91 billion for S&P 500 companies. That's cash that could have gone to shareholders through dividends or stock buybacks or been used to develop new products.

SMALL GLIMMER

Here's maybe a glimmer of hope on jobs: Small businesses felt more optimistic in September. Granted, the rise in the small-business optimism index compiled by the National Federation of Independent Business was small. It rose to 88.9 from 88.1, and IHS Global Insight economist Christ Christopher calls the gain "a measly 0.8." But it was still the first gain in optimism in seven months. Small companies employ more than half of all private-sector workers, according to the Small Business Administration. The unemployment rate has been at or above 9 percent since April.

**Oct. 19, 2010** — SAN FRANCISCO — Yahoo Inc. shuffled through another quarter of sluggish growth, a performance that may further test the patience of the Internet company's already restless shareholders.

It's been another frustrating 12 months for Yahoo shareholders. On Oct. 19, 2010, Yahoo closed at \$15.49 after the Internet company said its third-quarter revenue rose less than 2 percent to \$1.6 billion.

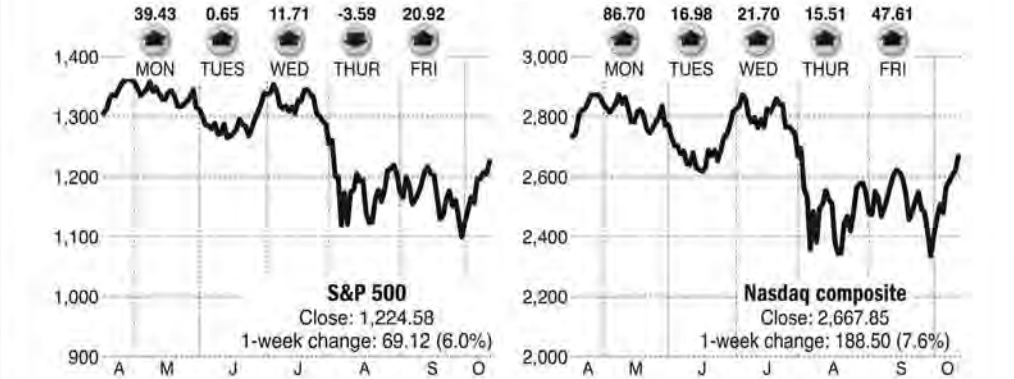
Today, the stock is stuck at nearly the same place. It closed at \$15.93 Thursday. And Yahoo's revenue has dropped for three straight quarters. It fell to \$1.23 billion in the April-through-June quarter. It releases its third-quarter report on Tuesday.

Yahoo is still one of the most popular websites, but Internet users are spending more time with Google and Facebook. That means less demand to advertise on Yahoo. The board fired CEO Carol Bartz in September. She was able to cut Yahoo's costs but couldn't boost its revenue.

Investors are still ruing Yahoo's decision to mix a buyout offer from Microsoft in 2008. The bid was for \$33 per share, or a total of \$47.5 billion. Yahoo said it could be worth even more if it remained solo. Its stock hasn't been above \$33 since 2007.

Now, many Yahoo investors hope that Microsoft or another buyer will rescue the company.

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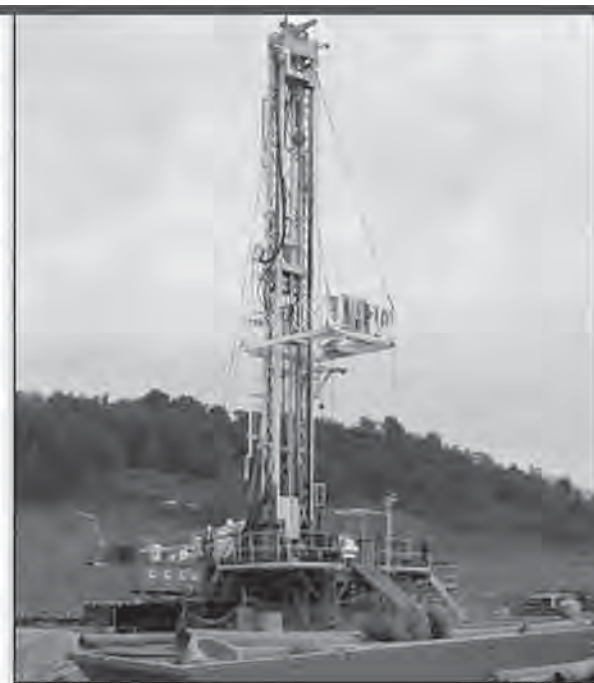

## G-20 considers boosting IMF role in eurozone

PARIS — The finance chiefs of the world's leading economies opened the door Saturday for the International Monetary Fund (IMF) to play a bigger role in fighting the eurozone's escalating debt troubles.

The Group of 20 rich and developing nations asked the IMF to propose ways that it could help stop countries under severe market pressure from toppling into a full-blown crisis with potential global repercussions.

Until now, the IMF has funded about a third of the bailouts of Greece, Ireland and Portugal, but helping the eurozone to stem con-

tagion beyond those countries would require a broader use of resources that would go far beyond the fund's traditional role of providing rescue loans to cash-strapped governments.

But while acknowledging that the IMF has a role to play in containing the continent's debt problems, G-20 ministers made clear Saturday that Europe must first come up with its own solutions.

"Of course, even though the world has a big stake in Europe doing this effectively, Europe itself has the strongest interest," U.S. Treasury Secretary Timothy Geithner told reporters.

## Police fire tear gas on Rome protest

ROME — Italian riot police fired tear gas and water cannons Saturday in Rome as violent protesters hijacked a peaceful demonstration against corporate greed, smashing bank windows, torching cars and hurling bottles.

Elsewhere, hundreds of thousands, nicknamed "the indignant," marched without incident in cities across Europe, as the "Occupy Wall Street" protests linked up with long-running demonstrations against European governments' austerity measures.

Heavy smoke billowed in downtown Rome as a small group broke away and wreaked havoc in streets close to the Colosseum in clashes that left about two

dozen injured.

Clad in black with their faces covered, protesters threw rocks, bottles and incendiary devices at banks and Rome police in riot gear. With clubs and hammers, they destroyed bank ATMs, set trash bins on fire and assaulted at least two news crews from Sky Italia.

Riot police charged the protesters repeatedly, firing water cannons and tear gas. More than 20 people were injured, according to news reports, including one man who tried to stop the protesters from throwing bottles.

TV footage showed one young woman with blood covering her face, while the ANSA news agency said a man had lost two fingers when a firecracker exploded. In the city's St. John in

Lateran square, police vans came under attack, with protesters hurling rocks and cobblestones and smashing the vehicles. Fleeing the violence, peaceful protesters stormed up the steps outside the Basilica, one of the oldest in Rome.

"People of Europe: Rise Up!" read one banner in Rome. Some activists turned against the violent group, trying to stop them and shouting "Enough!" and "Shame!"

Elsewhere, bright autumn sunshine and a social media campaign brought out thousands across Europe.

In Spain, the Indignant Movement that began around-the-clock "occupation" protest camps in May which lasted for weeks, held evening marches Saturday that converged on Madrid's

Puerta del Sol plaza.

Portuguese protesters angry at their government's handling of the economic crisis pushed against police lines in Lisbon, but officers stopped them from storming parliament. Portugal is one of three European nations — along with Greece and Ireland — that has had to accept an international bailout.

In Frankfurt, continental Europe's financial hub, 5,000 people protested at the European Central Bank, with some setting up a tent camp in front of the ECB building.

Wikileaks founder Julian Assange spoke to protesters outside St. Paul's Cathedral in London, calling the international banking system a "recipient of corrupt money."

#### U.S. drops plans to keep troops in Iraq

BAGHDAD — The U.S. is abandoning plans to keep U.S. troops in Iraq past a year-end withdrawal deadline, The Associated Press has learned. The decision to pull out fully by January will effectively end more than eight years of U.S. involvement in the Iraq war, despite ongoing concerns about its security forces and the potential for instability.

The decision ends months of hand-wringing by U.S. officials over whether to stick to a Dec. 31 withdrawal deadline that was set in 2008 or negotiate a new security agreement to ensure that gains made and more than 4,400 American military lives lost since March 2003 do not go to waste.

#### Syrian forces target funeral, kill activist

BEIRUT — Syrian security forces trying to suppress the resilient anti-government uprising killed five people Saturday, including one person who

was attending a funeral procession for a teenager shot dead in protests a day earlier, activists said.

Another of the dead was an activist for the London-based Syrian Observatory for Human Rights, who was assassinated while in hiding in a besieged eastern city, the group said.

The funeral targeted Saturday was for 14-year-old Ibrahim al-Shayban, one of 11 people shot dead by Syrian troops on Friday.

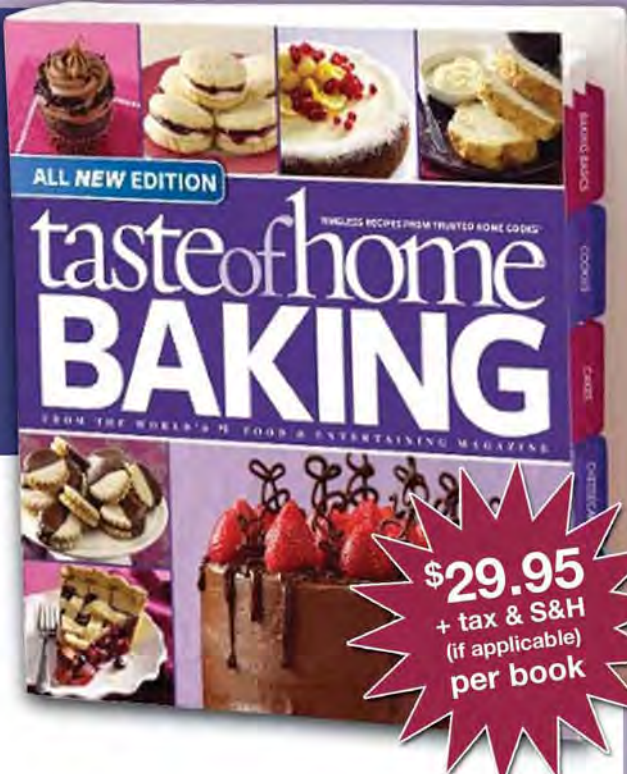
#### U.S. strike kills 9 al-Qaida militants

SANAA, Yemen — The United States has raised the tempo in its war against al-Qaida in Yemen, killing nine of the terror group's militants in the second, high-profile airstrike in as many weeks. The dead in the late Friday night strike included the son of Anwar al-Awlaki, the prominent American-Yemeni militant killed in a Sept. 30 strike.

Yemeni officials on Saturday attributed the recent U.S. successes against al-Qaida to better intelligence from an army of Yemeni informers and cooperation with the Saudis, Washington's longtime Arab allies.

# Deadly Transformation

## Learn how to morph into a creepy creature

**B**efore the workshop last Sunday afternoon even began, a couple of participants eagerly offered themselves up for makeovers. And, as the three-hour-long session progressed, it wasn't hard for the three ringleaders running the show to recruit more. Hand after hand raised, and the smiles on everyone's faces when the makeup artists were finished with their work guaranteed they were happy with their startling transformations.

Some took pictures, others couldn't wait to surprise their families and friends. One couple volunteered together, returning to their seats smiling — the man through a thick layer of dripping blood, his partner grinning back with a bullet hole piercing her temple, its exit wound bulging from her cheek.

With Halloween fast approaching, it's not fresh-scrubbed skin and a wrinkle-free faces potential ghouls and goblins are on the hunt for. It's an unhealthy parlor, deeply creased foreheads and sunken-in skulls — and a little coagulated blood or an oozing sore or two never hurt anyone.

At least that's the mindset of the organizers of The Illusive Skull's zombie workshop. Set up at the Mountaineer Mall, just outside the costume shop's seasonal store, the how-to class was held in preparation for yesterday's *Zombie Walk* down High Street.

*The Dominion Post* checked it out so we can give you some makeup tips for creating your own creepy creations at home and hopefully inspire the procrastinators out there who have yet to settle on a costume. Or, if we've included your pick, perhaps we'll help you make your choice a little more believable.

The scare experts at Rich Farms also let the paper sit in on the makeup preparations for one of its Fright Farm nights and take notes. Makeup

artists at the Smithfield, Pa., property can prep as many as 120-130 cast members there, turning them into everything from coal miners to menacing clowns. We captured one of those lonely clowns, as well as the infamous Nosferatu and the victim of a deranged dentist. Step-by-step instructions for how to replicate the looks at home are listed below. We have also included two spooky specimens from The Illusive Skull's workshop, one zombie who's spent hardly any time in its new state, the other a veteran of the undead experience.

It's important to note a couple of things before we dig in. The first is that when you're trying this at home, be sure to know where you're headed. If it's trick-or-treating or a dimly lit party, use a heavy hand with the makeup. The crowd is not likely to notice nuance. However, if you're headed to a well-lit get together, subtly and blending are key.

Also, there are a variety of options when it comes to types of makeup. The Fright Farm team choose to use water-activated Wolfe Brothers products, which are widely available at big box and specialty stores. The demonstrators at the zombie workshop used oil-based options and alcohol-based makeup applied with an airbrush. Unlike the oil-based products, alcohol-based makeup works over latex without having to alter it in anyway. It also goes on light, applies faster and makes blending easy. However, purchasing an airbrush can be expensive. It's important to tailor your choice to what works for you.

Many of the processes for these different looks are similar; and as Adrian Larry of The Illusive Skull said, "Makeup technique is makeup technique." Once you get the basics down, it's easy to switch up a look by simply choosing a different color palette. If you're not

sure how to get your desired effect, stop by a Halloween store, such as The Illusive Skull, which carries an array of choices and has staff on-hand able to help you sort out what's what. With that in mind, here goes:

**Nosferatu**

1. Apply pointed tips to ears using spirit gum. To blend them in with ear, apply liquid latex to edges with cotton ball. Let dry. Cover with pale base makeup.

2. Apply pale base to face and neck.

3. Pretend there is a light shining down directly above you. Apply dark purple makeup with makeup sponge to areas of face which would naturally shadow, such as beneath cheekbones and eyes, chin, vertical areas between nose and mouth, temples, etc. To find where your cheekbones are, suck in your cheeks.

4. After adding shadows, apply highlights where the light would shine on those same areas to make shadows stand out.

5. Using a flat brush, darken the natural wrinkles in the forehead with black paint to make them stand out.

6. Using a flat brush, darken in eyebrows with black paint. Change the shape of the eyebrows, to make them appear thicker. Use the side of the brush to create wisps of hair.

7. Using flat brush, darken lips with black makeup.

8. Go back and define facial creases with black makeup and flat brush.

9. Insert fangs.  
**You will need:** Spirit gum, ear tips, fangs, liquid latex, cotton ball, pale makeup base, flat brush, makeup sponge, black, red, dark purple and white makeup.

**Dental victim**

1. Apply a pale makeup base to face and neck with a sponge.

2. Pretend there is a light shining down directly above you. Apply dark purple makeup with flat brush or sponge to areas of face which would naturally shadow, such as beneath cheekbones and eyes, chin, vertical areas between nose and mouth, temples, etc. To find where your

cheekbones are, suck in your cheeks.

3. After adding shadows, apply highlights where the light would shine on those same areas to make shadows stand out.

4. Using a flat brush, apply dark red makeup to create the wound on the side of your mouth. Be sure to give wound jagged edges.

5. To give the wound depth, use the flat brush to apply some deep purple makeup.

6. Just outside the wound's outer edge, apply white paint with a flat brush. This will highlight the wound.

7. With the flat brush, apply light red outside the white.

8. With a flip brush\*, flick red paint mixed with a little water on the wound, by running your thumb across the top of the brush. This looks like blood spatter. Repeat until the desired effect is reached.

9. Tilt head back. Pour fake blood over wound. Let set. If fake blood is too bright, mix with little bit of blue food coloring, to deepen the color.

**What you will need:** A makeup sponge, flip brush, flat brush, fake blood, blue food coloring (optional), a cup for mixing blood (optional), pale base makeup, white makeup and a makeup bruise wheel. A bruise wheel will have, deep purple, dark red and light red makeups on it.

\*A flip brush can be made with any medium sized-brush with thick bristles. Cut the bristle close to their base, and voila.

**Fresh zombie**

1. Apply a pale makeup base — color called Death Flesh works well — with sponge, cover face and neck.

2. Pretend there is a light shining down directly above you. Apply dark purple paint with makeup sponge to areas of face which would naturally shadow, such as beneath cheekbones and eyes, chin, vertical areas between nose and mouth, temples, etc. To find where your cheekbones are, suck in your cheeks.

3. After adding shadows, apply highlights where the light would shine on those same areas to make shadows stand out.

4. Darken eyebrows using a color similar to your own.

5. Using a dark red makeup pencil, apply red along lower lash line. This makes eyes appear more sunken in.

6. Darken hairline with dark purple makeup, using sponge. Go in afterward with paintbrush and create blue and red veins along hairline and mouth.

7. Add thick blood to lips and around them with stipple sponge. Let dry.

8. Apply makeup setting powder with powder puff. Pat into makeup. (You can also use powder as you go along, if you prefer.) This helps set the oil-based makeup used by The Illusive Skull demonstrators.

**You will need:** Makeup sponge, angle brush, thick blood, stipple sponge, powder puff, makeup-setting powder, red, dark purple, blue and white makeup, makeup for your eyebrows, and dark red makeup pencil.

**Veteran zombie**

**Note:** While the demonstrator from *The Illusive Skull* used alcohol-based makeup applied with an airbrush to achieve this look, the same application style can be used with oil-based makeup.

1. Pull skin taut on forehead, horizontally — the

■ Noxzema works well to remove oil-based makeup, as does soap and water.

■ For water-activated makeup, remove by putting liquid soap on face first, then splash water on face.

■ If the fake blood you buy is too bright, add blue food coloring.

■ If you are using an oil-based makeup as well as liquid latex, be sure to add castor oil to the makeup, otherwise it will discolor the makeup and make it powdery. Only a few drops are necessary. Otherwise it can dilute the makeup too much.

■ Liquid latex sticks to itself, so be sure to powder it, once it dries.

■ Avoid getting latex in hair or on garments, as it has a tendency to stick. If you do get it in your hair, a liquid dishwashing detergent such as Dawn or something with citrus oil, such as orange GOJO, is helpful in removing it.

■ Do not forget about your appendages. If your hands and/or arms are exposed, be sure to apply makeup to them, using a light base and the same shadowing techniques used on your face. Make a closed fist to locate veins on the hand.

■ If you want to ramp it up and add a wound, The Illusive Skull carries several options, such as bullet holes, which can be applied and painted over. With some creativity, you can also construct your own. One simple technique is to mix oatmeal with liquid latex and apply it to the face. Let

dry, paint over as desired. The colors in a makeup bruise wheel are helpful for this. A water-based lubricant such as K-Y Jelly can be applied over this, it gives the wound a realistic sheen.

■ If you want to make yourself look old, use the same forehead technique as Veteran Zombie, only add tissue. Take a tissue (i.e. Kleenex), these are usually composed of two layers, separate them. Tear the edges of one layer, after you apply the liquid latex, add the tissue. Let dry. Add another layer of liquid latex, a tissue and let dry again. This accentuates the wrinkles in your forehead.

■ Be sure to start out with a clean face when applying makeup.

■ If you are not sure whether you are allergic to latex, check first. Apply a small amount of liquid latex to skin, preferably not on the face, and make sure you have no reaction. If you are applying liquid latex on someone else, be sure to ask.

■ Wearing gloves, such as latex gloves, is often helpful when applying makeup. It keeps things from sticking to your skin and provides a place to put makeup your using. This is especially nice if you are applying makeup for multiple people, so that you don't cross contaminate makeup.

■ Follow the natural contours of the face, when shadowing, highlighting and deepening wrinkles.

same way your natural wrinkles go.

2. Stipple on light layer of liquid latex with stipple sponge, while holding skin taut.

3. Let air dry, or use a hair dryer to dry, while continuing to hold position.

4. Once dry, apply makeup-setting powder. This prevents latex from sticking to itself. This process highlights wrinkles on the forehead.

5. Apply a pale makeup bases — colors such as Old Age or Corpse Flesh work well. If you are substituting oil-based makeup for alcohol-based makeup, mix the oil-based makeup with a few drops of castor oil before applying. This keeps it from becoming discolored and powdery when applied over latex.

6. Pretend there is a light shining down directly above you. Apply dark pur-

ple makeup (use makeup sponge with oil-based makeup) to areas of face which would naturally shadow, such as beneath cheekbones and eyes, chin, vertical areas between nose and mouth, temples, etc. To find where your cheekbones are, suck in your cheeks.

7. After adding shadows, apply highlights where the light would shine on those same areas to make shadows stand out.

8. Using a dark red makeup pencil, apply red along lower lash line. This makes eyes appear more sunken in.

9. Apply purple to the lips, to give an unhealthy appearance.

10. If using oil-based makeup, apply makeup setting powder when done or between sets to lock makeup in place.

**You will need:** Liquid latex, stipple sponge, hair

dryer (optional), airbrush or makeup sponge, dark red pencil, pale base makeup, dark purple and white makeup. If using oil-based makeup, makeup-setting powder and powder puff and castor oil.

**Sad Clown**

1. Apply pale makeup base to face and neck using a sponge.

2. Use a flat brush to create triangles above and below the eyes, one set red the other blue.

3. Use a flat brush to create an exaggerated frown around mouth, using red makeup.

4. Apply black makeup around the outer edges of the triangles and mouth, to define them with flat brush.

5. Add round nose with red makeup.

**You will need:** Pale makeup base, flat brush, black, blue and red paint, makeup sponge.

# Director, star bring 'Footloose' to the South

ORLANDO, Fla. — Is there a more beloved bad movie from the '80s than "Footloose"?

"Oh, it's pretty beloved," chuckled director Craig Brewer. "The bad movie everybody loves!"

"I absolutely love that film," gushed singer, dancer and actress Julianne Hough.

A Reagan Era tale of teens rebelling against the town and pastor who have

banned dancing, "Footloose" became Kevin Bacon's claim to lasting fame and spawned a trio of hit pop songs: "Let's Hear It for the Boy," "Holding Out for a Hero" and, of course, "Footloose."

"Man, critics did NOT like it," Brewer, 40, said of the 1984 film. Back then, Roger Ebert called it "seriously confused."

But Brewer, who was 13 when "Footloose" came out, says the movie "rocked my world and was the most important film of my young adult life. It led me to be the filmmaker I am today."

So Brewer was a bit leery when Paramount, which has been trying to remake the smash for years, gave him a call.

"I told them, 'I don't think it can be done,'" said

Brewer, known for movies with a Southern accent, such as his hip-hop drama "Hustle & Flow" and blues melodrama "Black Snake Moan." "How can it still be relevant?"

"My reaction was the same as a LOT of people when I heard they were thinking about doing a remake," said Hough, 23, a two-time "Dancing With the Stars" winner who is branching out into music and acting. "What? How can they!? It's a classic. Remakes suck! Are you kidding me?"

But Brewer, a Memphis expat who grew up in San Francisco, gave it some thought. And "as soon as I got over two hurdles in my brain, I could see it work. First, set it in the South. I connected the first one to my own Southern experience. My parents moved us around a lot, but whenever

I came back home to the South, I was labeled the 'city boy.' When I saw 'Footloose,' I felt 'That's me!'"

Another hurdle? How to connect this "Footloose" with the original, and yet improve on it.

"As much as I knew I wanted to change it in some areas, I also had this nagging thought: 'Why? Just stand on its shoulders so that the new movie can live alongside it.' I want people — 'Footlooseologists' like me — to go back and watch the original again after seeing this one."

One of those "Footlooseologists" was Hough, who had been attached to the remake through various incarnations. Hough has been outspoken about her desire to move on from "girl who dances" movies (she's starring in a dark comedy from Diabolo

"Juno" Cody in January). But she expected to kick up her heels in "Footloose." Brewer would have to sell her on his concept to keep her on board.

"Once Craig was attached to it, I was like, 'Wow. They're serious,'" Hough recalled. "The fact that the story now takes place in the South makes more sense. Craig gets the South, and that helps the movie. I could understand the parents more, could relate to why they'd banned dances in this town. It wasn't so much about religion and 'You'll be damned if you dance!' It was about a tragedy and the adults protecting the kids from having that ever happen again."

Brewer "Southernized" the story in one major way: He replaced that slow-motion game of tractor chicken in the original

film with figure-eight bus racing.

"I was like, 'Oh, that's pretty far-fetched, isn't it?'"

"Craig was telling us how he'd seen bus races, outside of Memphis. None of the cast realized that really goes on. A pretty cool ingredient for the movie, isn't it?"

Brewer urged Hough to tone down the dancing. "That girl has a different motor working every limb in her body," he marvels. "When she dances, everything's moving."

The remake opened Friday, and director and star hope it will pass muster with the faithful and find new fans.

"A lot of people pooh-pooh remakes, and I understand that," Brewer said. "But we're of a generation that's more about the remix. That's what this is. A remix of a classic."

"Renee's passion, clarity of character and deep emotion for this project immediately transported us to the late '60s/early '70s and created a resonance with us wanting to relive that energy," Lifetime president and GM Nancy Dubuc said.

Zellweger and Gavin O'Connor ("Warrior")

will be executive producers; O'Connor will direct.

The period drama marks Zellweger's second project with Lifetime. In 2008 she was executive producer of "Living Proof," the true story of UCLA's Dr. Dennis Slamon, who helped develop the breast cancer drug Herceptin.

## With time, son may live his way past doubt

**Q: My 12-year-old son has been telling me he's having doubts about the existence of God. He says there's no proof that there is a God. I tell him that when you look around and see the beauty of the world and the wonder of the universe, you have to imagine that God is behind those. Even Einstein believed! I tell him some things are "unknowable" and can never be "proved," and that's where faith comes in. He seems to be struggling with this and has brought it up many times. I really don't know what else to tell him. Can you help?**

**A:** As for your question about your spiritually questioning son, let me suggest several "moves" (that's what I call answers to questions we can't really answer). I've previously offered these moves to others with the same question.

The first move is to answer his questions

with a question. I must give credit to the Buddha for this one, since it was the answer he gave to his disciples when they asked him if the world was created or eternal. He answered, "Of what significance is this question for you?"

I understand that your son is questioning the existence of God, but why is that question important to him? You need to discover the question behind his question. Perhaps his question is about morality. As Dostoevsky supposedly wrote, "If God does not exist, everything is permitted."

I say "supposedly" because Dostoevsky never wrote those words in his novel "The Brother Karamazov." They do however express the view of Ivan in the novel and those words are wrongly quoted by the French existentialist

philosopher Jean-Paul Sartre, which gave rise to this tradition.

In any event, the point is that many people struggling with the constraints of the moral life feel that one reason to do good is that God is watching and taking names. If that's your son's view, remind him that doing the right thing just because it's right is enough of a reason. Leave God's punishments out of the calculus we make about our moral lives.

Perhaps your son's question is about life after death. He may be wondering if death is indeed the end of us. In a choice between heaven/hell on one hand and worms on the other, I choose heaven/hell, but even here I'm open to a world where I'm wrong and the worms are licking their lips waiting for my demise.

I hope for heaven, but I don't live what I hope is a moderately virtuous life just because I want my heavenly ticket punched. I live a decent

life because it's right to be kind, and it's even more right to be kinder than necessary because everyone is struggling with something big.

Your son says there's no proof for the existence of God. Ask him, "What do you think would constitute such a valid proof?" Seeing a watch proves to me that there's a watchmaker and seeing the world and our bodies and the perfection of nature proves to me that there's a world maker in exactly the same way. If that doesn't work for your son, ask him how he explains order and hope and love and self-sacrifice and courage.

There's a tendency among all adolescents and adults who are stuck in adolescent adulthood to become frustrated when the great mysteries of existence are not amenable to instantaneous solutions. The antidote to this intellectual impatience is intellectual patience and the simple wisdom gleaned from a life lived in a noble manner.

To this very point, have him read, or read to him this letter, written by the German poet Rainer Maria Rilke (d.1929) to a young poet, (trans. by Stephen Mitchell, Random House, 1984):

"I would like to beg you to have patience with everything unresolved in your heart and try to love the questions themselves as if they were locked rooms or books written in a very foreign language. Don't search for the answers, which could not be given to you now, because you would not be able to live them. And the point is, to live everything. Live the questions now. Perhaps then, someday far in the future, you will gradually, without even noticing it, live your way into the answer."

Here's hoping that someday all of us, including your son, will be able to live our way into the answer. — God bless, Marc.

"The trauma program, based out of the emergency department is the beneficiary of funds from the Ball of the Year for 2011," he said. "The top two priority purchases will be a bedside ultrasound machine and an advanced airway device.

"The ultrasound will

bring bedside technology to the physician in an acute trauma to determine if the is blood in the abdomen or chest indicating a ruptured organ that will need to be taken to an operating room immediately, likely transferred to a Level I trauma center without delay. Currently, this decision is made based on physical exam and mechanism only or decision is delayed while awaiting CT scanning.

There are also a myriad of other uses of the ultrasound machine in the emergency department and will be a great asset.

"The advance airway device will be a video laryngoscopy unit. This technology uses a microscopic fiberoptic camera attached to the tip of the blade of the equipment use to place a tube into the trachea (lungs) to assure adequate respiration for patients with respiratory compromise. Currently this procedure is done by directly visualizing the vocal cords while looking down the blade of the device. Anatomy, trauma or secretions sometimes prevents this direct visualization and the use of the video laryngoscopy may save a catastrophic outcome or an invasive procedure like a tracheotomy."

## Knee patients keep chiropractors busy

**Q: Can a chiropractor help with my knee pain? I really don't know why it hurts so I would need X-rays probably, right?**

**A:** There are many possible causes of knee pain, so I will try to answer your question from multiple angles. In general, there are a few things that are important to know about chiropractic and knee pain.

First, chiropractic alone (a joint mobilization to the knee) is likely not the only treatment that would need to be applied. Also, physical therapy, or

at least some training on stretch and strengthening to the joint is likely critical. As far as X-rays, most chiropractors can easily take care of that along with properly diagnosing the cause of the pain. Finally, if you are not seeing results, the chiropractor should refer you to an orthopedic doctor. If any of these guidelines are not followed,

you likely need to find a different chiropractor.

Your knees may begin to hurt if you spend too much time on your feet or are suffering from arthritis. You are not alone. Chiropractors see many patients who have knee problems from overuse of the knee joints, traumatic injury from events such as sports and falls and pain due to arthritic changes in the joint.

Often the patella or kneecap does not move smoothly enough when bending, causing abnormal stresses on the tendons, cartilage and ligaments.

Chiropractors are ideally trained to provide the proper diagnosis and management of this problem through re-establishing proper muscle balance, restoring movement to the patella, and working with a trained physical therapist or trainer. Strains and sprains often occur during sports that involve running and jumping. Chiropractic care also successfully treats these conditions.

Knee pain might be the result of poor gait function. If poor mechanics or traumatic injuries are not corrected at an early age, the

knee joint tissues will eventually begin to erode. As a result, the bones rub upon one another and cause bone spurs. This painful condition is known as degenerative joint disease, or osteoarthritis, and is often progressive with age. It is critical to get treated by a chiropractor or therapist when injuries occur, so they do not progress over time.

**I'VE ALWAYS BEEN A READER.** In high school, I treasured the Kurt Vonnegut and Ray Bradbury books that were usually required reading. In fact, thanks to one of my teachers who put it on his reading assignment list, Vonnegut's "Slaughterhouse Five" is probably my favorite book of all time.

But when someone unfreezes her 50 years too early, she finds herself trapped by the ship's walls and in the middle of a murder mystery.

■ **"Waterfall," "Cascade" and "Torrent" by Lisa T. Bergren** — When Gabriella and her sister, Lia, stumble onto a time portal, they are transported to medieval Italy and into the heart of a battle where they find themselves fighting for their lives.

■ **"Eden" by Keary Taylor** — Cybernetic organisms have taken over 98 percent of the world's population. Eighteen-year-old Eve is part of a small group of refugees who have created a constantly moving village to avoid detection by the infected humans. While struggling with her feelings over two men, Eve, who can't remember her life before age 13, discovers there's something different about her.

■ **"Unwind" by Neal Shusterman** — In a world where abortion has been outlawed, parents may choose to have their children (ages 13-17) "unwound," harvesting and donating their organs to others. The book follows Connor, Lev and Risa as they escape their impending unwinding and go on the run. While this is a young adult book, there are a few chapters that are pretty disturbing, so beware of that when reading.

■ **"Heist Society" by Ally Carter** — At just 15 years old, Kat is a master thief. With some help from her friends, she must orchestrate the largest heist of her life.

## Shy dog may need socialization

**CERTIFIED APPLIED** animal behaviorist Patricia McConnell answers selected reader questions this week. McConnell has written some of my favorite books about dogs, including "The Other End of the Leash" and "For the Love of a Dog: Understanding Emotion in You and Your Best Friend." Her most recent effort (with Karen London) is "Love Has No Age Limit: Welcoming An Adopted Dog Into Your Home" (learn more at [patriciamcconnell.com](http://patriciamcconnell.com)).

**Q: We recently adopted the most precious little dog, some sort of terrier mix. But she was obviously abused because the poor thing is shy of strangers who want to pet her. Any advice? — B.H., Orlando, Fla.**

**A:** "Good for you and congratulations on your new family member," said McConnell. "Lots of dogs from a variety of backgrounds are afraid of strangers. This doesn't necessarily mean the dog was abused; more likely, it means the dog wasn't appropriately socialized."

Get some really tasty treats, and when strangers come to the house, their job will be to ignore the dog — except to toss treats in her direction. In time, they can just drop the treats near where they're sitting, so your dog comes closer. Still, they shouldn't force themselves on the pup, but wait until they're approached.

"Soon, take the treats outside on walks, and ask people to offer your dog some," said McConnell. "It's

best if people can squat down to the dog's level, which isn't as intimidating as standing over the dog."

**Q: I have two male Yorkshire Terriers, father and son. In the past, they've gotten into arguments and scrapped, but we were able to break them up fairly easily. Now, the fights are more frequent and serious. Both dogs were injured in the last go-around. I'm afraid one of them may be seriously injured or killed. Any advice? — E.P., Cyberspace.**

**A:** "The problem between a father and son ... and the fact that they're both terriers — yes, this is potentially very serious," said McConnell. "Your first job is to keep both dogs safe — and that means separating them. The second job is to bring in a qualified dog trainer (who uses positive methods, and understands operant and classical conditioning), or a veterinary behaviorist. You really do need someone to personally assess what's going on."

## Stolen camera points the way back home

LOS ANGELES — It was something of a Kodak moment for Dr. Jeffrey Plotkin when his stolen camera suddenly began transmitting pictures to his computer again.

Except that the \$700 camera was a digital 3-D device produced by Fujifilm Corp. — not by the Eastman Kodak Co.

Apparently unbeknownst to the thief who swiped it from Plotkin's Canoga Park, Calif., chiropractic office in March, the camera was equipped with an Eye-Fi memory card. The device downloads photos directly into Plotkin's computer without a connecting cord.

Two months after the thief struck, the camera suddenly began sending photos. After 11 pictures popped up on his screen — of the thief's friends,

it appeared — Plotkin sent copies to Los Angeles police in hopes that detectives could identify anyone. But suddenly, the photo stream died.

Plotkin deduced that the camera's proprietary lithi-

um-ion battery had died and the thief had no way of recharging it. But just in case the battery came back to life on its own, he activated a geo-tracking feature on its memory card.

Days after *The Times* published an Aug. 15 story about the theft and the mystery pictures, a new batch of photos appeared on Plotkin's screen. The tags showed that pictures had been taken at a Van Nuys, Calif., house. The location was marked on a Google Earth satellite photo.

When Los Angeles Police Det. Foster Rains knocked on the home's door, its occupants denied knowledge of the camera. After Rains showed them the three latest photos, they acknowledged they had it — but claimed they had obtained it from a person at a barbershop.

No arrests were made. But Plotkin has his camera back.

And how did the dead battery come back to life? "It turned out they had bought a new battery charger for it online," Plotkin said.

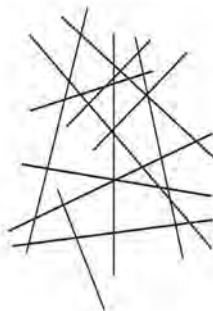

# Zoo Veterinarians

Have you ever wondered who takes care of all the animals in the zoo? Veterinarians (VET-ur-uh-NARE-ee-uhns) have a wild variety of creatures to treat there.

One minute, a vet might be taking care of a newborn baby panda. Then there might be a frog with a fungus disease. A vet might switch from treating a prairie dog with a broken leg to treating a rhinoceros with a broken foot. How do they figure out how to take care of each one?

The Mini Page talked with a veterinarian at San Diego Zoo Global to find out more about a zoo vet's wild job.



Veterinarians and zookeepers from the San Diego Zoo Safari Park treat an injured giraffe.

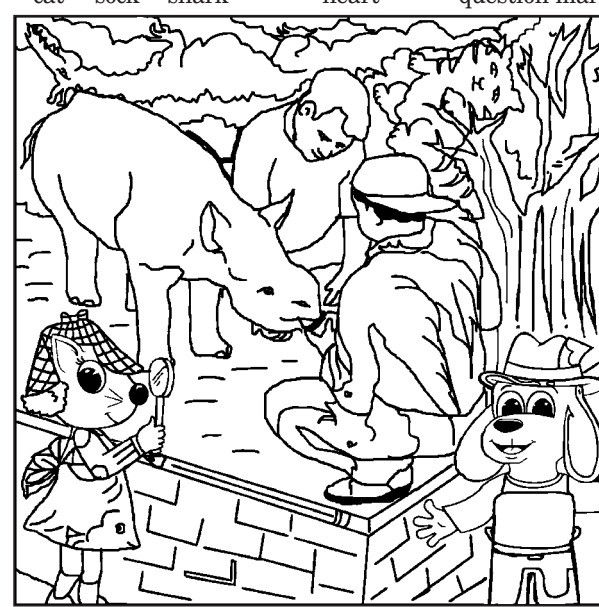
Zookeepers have learned different ways to care for giraffes. For example, they put water buckets up high so the giraffes don't have to bend down to drink.

One time, a mother giraffe was not nursing her calf. Zookeepers fed the calf bottles five times a day, wrapping a cloth with a giraffe pattern around the bottles so the calf would come to them.

### Helping endangered species

One of the most important things zoos do is help save animals that are endangered. They work with creatures at risk, helping to increase the number of these animals. Zoos help them breed and survive. Once the young can manage on their own, zoos sometimes return them to their natural homes.

The San Diego Zoo, for example, works on breeding programs for birds ranging from the condor to the tiny shrike, and for animals ranging from the panda to the yellow-legged frog.

### Saving the condor

Many zoos and other groups banded together to help the endangered California condor. When this breeding program began about 30 years ago, the condor was almost extinct.

There were only 22 condors left. Today, there are more than 400.

## Rookie Cookie's Recipe Strawberry Mini Muffins

You'll need:

- 1 1/2 cups all-purpose flour
- 1 1/2 cups whole-wheat flour
- 3/4 cup sugar
- 4 1/2 teaspoons baking powder
- 2 teaspoons cinnamon
- 3/4 teaspoon salt
- 2 eggs
- 1 egg white
- 1 cup apple cider
- 1/2 cup vegetable oil
- 2 cups strawberries, cut into small pieces

What to do:

1. Combine both flours, sugar, baking powder, cinnamon and salt in a large bowl.
2. In a medium bowl, whisk eggs and egg white. Add cider and oil and mix well.
3. Add the egg mixture to the flour mixture, and stir until moist and all the flour is absorbed.
4. Reserve 1/3 cup strawberries. Gently stir in the remaining strawberries.
5. Place liners in mini-muffin tins. Coat bottoms with cooking spray.
6. Divide batter between 48 mini muffin cups. Top with reserved strawberries.
7. Bake at 400 degrees for 20 minutes until done. Makes 4 dozen mini muffins.

You will need an adult's help with this recipe.

After grinding it out for more than 11 years on the pro tennis tour, Mardy Fish isn't fading. He's flourishing.

He entered last month's U.S. Open as the No. 1-ranked American men's player and No. 8 worldwide.

## Figuring It Out

### Learning what is best

Zoo veterinarians and keepers might need to care for an animal they know little about. People have not had a chance to study how some animals behave in the wild. Zoo workers have to learn on the job.

In the California condor program, wildlife officials decided to take the only 22 condors alive in the wild and bring them all to zoos. They figured that was the best way to give them a chance at survival.

When the captive condors laid eggs, zoo workers took the first eggs away from the nest and raised them without the parents. That way, the parents would lay more eggs.

Zoo workers made puppets that looked like the parent condors' heads. They used the puppets to feed the baby condors so the babies didn't attach themselves to humans. Real condors raised the babies from other eggs they were able to hatch on their own.

Cheetahs are endangered. Zoos are helping them survive by breeding them in captivity. Zoo researchers have learned that it is better if they keep the females and males separate until they are ready to mate. Cheetahs usually like to be alone in the wild. Copying conditions in the wild keeps cheetahs healthier.

### Caring for the young

It is always better if a mother can care for her young. But sometimes, the mother may not be able to. Then zoo workers take over.

For example, a mother gorilla wasn't able to care for her baby, Frank.

San Diego Zoo workers helped raise Frank. They took him away to feed him, but gave him back to the gorilla band after feeding time. They wanted him to learn how to get along with other gorillas. Sometimes they had to coax the gorillas to give Frank back to the humans.

## Finding Solutions

### Gaining trust

Zookeepers have to gain the trust of great big zoo animals. Then the animals allow workers to get blood samples or give them shots. The animals enjoy the extra attention.

Zoo vets have to invent clever ways to treat these wild animals. For example, it is hard to get a blood sample from a rhinoceros. Regular needles can't get through the rhino's thick skin. Vets take blood samples from the thin skin over its ears.

When vets have to anesthetize (an-ES-the-tize), or put to sleep, big animals such as rhinos or elephants, they may not be able to get close enough in animal parks. Veterinarians inject them with darts with extra-long needles to go into the thick skin.

Whenever they can, vets treat the animals in their wild settings. This is easier on animals and people.

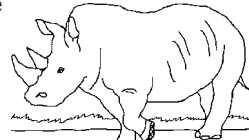
### Finding a way

Treating wild animals can be a challenge. For example, how do zoo vets make casts for animals with differently shaped legs?

At the San Diego Zoo Safari Park, there was a rhinoceros with a broken foot. Vets were able to get an X-ray of the foot, then anesthetized the rhino.

Regular cast material wasn't strong enough, though. The rhino was so big and strong that the cast kept wearing down when the rhino walked on it.

Vets reinforced the cast with steel. They put a tire tread on the outside to give the rhino traction. That way, the rhino could walk on the cast.



### Keeping animals healthy

Zoo vets work hard to keep animals healthy and happy. They train animals with treats and fun. Food treats work well, and some animals enjoy puzzles and toys too. Zookeepers might get animals to exercise by offering treats.

Sometimes, zoo workers have to figure out clever ways to treat animals living together. They might put out feeders that only smaller animals can get to, so big animals don't grab all the food.

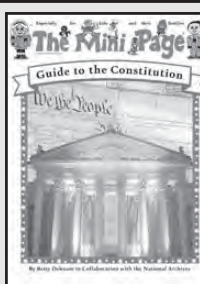

Man taking responsibility for ex-step is a good thing

How do I tell my husband I don't want to pay for this little boy as if he was his real son? We can't afford it, and I simply don't want to do it. What should I do?**

A: If you're looking for sympathy, you've come to the wrong place. We like it when men choose to be positive role models for children. The fact that your husband raised both children before meeting you — even after a breakup — and does not distinguish one child from the other, means he's a stand-up guy and takes his role as parent very seriously. Add to that our visceral response to your use of the term "real" to distinguish a child's value, and you'll understand why we say, "Very bad ex-etiquette!"

What should you do? Change your attitude. Your husband made his commitment to this child before meeting you — and we don't believe your husband's attitude has changed in the past few years. He loved and supported this child when you met him,

so to expect that sense of responsibility to change based on the fact that you don't want to do it now, is a low blow indeed both to your husband and to the child.

Also, here's something to know about child support — it's complicated. If your husband met the mother when she was pregnant and assumed the responsibility knowing full well the child wasn't biologically his, it's possible he still signed the birth certificate — some men do. Ready, set, hang on a minute

**Dear Mr. Dad:** My husband and I have only been married for about eight months. He's 45 and I'm 36. Before we got married, we talked about starting a family — and we're both aware of the small window of opportunity to get pregnant. But since the marriage he constantly tells me we aren't ready, that we need more money. I see how great he is with my niece and nephews — he enjoys playing with them and they just love him to death — and I know he'll be a wonderful father. What can I do to bring him along?

A: Your situation reminds me of a discussion I had with my parents when I was an expectant father for the first time. I was in a bit of a panic about money and worried about how my wife and I could possibly afford to have a baby. When I mentioned this to my parents, they told me that just about everyone has worries about whether they're "ready." The reality, though, is that just about no one actually is — and if you wait until all the pieces are in place, you might end up not ever having kids at all.

Then, as if to reinforce their no-one-is-ever-ready argument, they told me that when I was born they were both starving students at the University of Illinois — so broke that they couldn't even afford a crib, so I had to spend my first few months in a sock drawer. (I'm sure that explains all sorts of things about how I turned out, but that's a topic for another day.)

That said, I have a feeling that what's troubling your husband has less to do with money and more to do with his fears about repeating his parents' mistakes with his own kids. The good news on that front is that the whole acorn-doesn't-fall-from-the-tree thing is garbage; what his parents did is almost completely irrelevant. It'll take some work on his part and plenty of support from you, but he really can be the father he wants to be.

A lot of men worry about whether they'll be able to actually care for a child. Given that most guys have a lot less baby-handling experience than their partners, that's a reasonable concern. But it's one that can be easily resolved by simply closing his eyes and jumping in.

As far as what you can do? Be patient. As a lot of questions, point out all the great parenting traits he has and make sure your sock drawer is ready.

## Go green and save the green

**A FEW MONTHS AGO**, I wrote an article about what it meant to go green. Every year our average annual energy costs go up 2.3 percent, according to the United States Energy Information Administration. That's one reason why we are seeing a green movement. This month I will give you some housing updates that will save you some green-backs in the long run.

The first and easiest improvement that you can do is to replace your thermostat. If you get a programmable thermostat, it will set you back about \$40-\$200, depending on all the bells and whistles. If you program the thermostat properly, you can save quite a bit over time, especially if energy costs are going up every year.

This type of thermostat lets you set the air conditioning or heat at a certain level for different times of the day, so that you are not running them when no one is home.

**The first and easiest improvement that you can do is to replace your thermostat. If you get a programmable thermostat, it will set you back about \$40-\$200, depending on all the bells and whistles.**

Now that you have a smart furnace, make sure it is heating your house, not the outdoors. Insulate your attic. This may be the biggest culprit of heat loss in your house. Heat rises, and if there is nothing keeping the heat inside the house, it will just go through the ceiling and out the roof. If rolled insulation is not an option, you may want to try blow-in insulation. It has become very popular in recent years.

The other big energy thieves are hiding all over your home — the cracks and air leaks. Check the caulking around your doors and windows. Make sure any seals on your doors and garages are flush. Also, make sure that any plumbing running outside — i.e. A/C or water faucets — is properly sealed. Not only will this help with energy leaks, you may also help with pests.

Finally, try insulating your ductwork, water tank and hot water pipes in unheated areas. These vessels contain something you spend a lot of money to heat. Why waste your money overheating the water or air just to get it to where you need it? You may see a 20 percent increase in the efficiency of your system by simply putting some insulation over it. With these few small improvements, you can save a bit of cash on your energy bills. I hope you try them out, and let me know if they work.

## An unfavorable measurement

## Buyers, sellers chafe at low home appraisals that hurt sales

**FORT LAUDERDALE, Fla.** — Low appraisals continue to block people from selling homes or refinancing mortgages, leaving sellers and real estate agents unhappy.

"We really feel we're at the mercy of appraisers," said Randy Lane, a Broward County homeowner whose sale fell through recently when two value estimates came in well below the negotiated price.

When a sale collapses because of a low appraisal, the buyer is angry for having agreed to pay more than the home is thought to be worth. Meanwhile, the seller puts the home back on the market and considers adjusting the price — all the while not knowing whether another potential sale will suffer the same fate.

A May 2009 law required that appraisers work independently and without undue influence from mortgage brokers, lenders and real estate agents. Mortgage fraud prosecutors say the overhaul was necessary to curtail conflicts of interest and bloated estimates that contributed to the housing debacle.

More than two years later, real estate professionals say the change has inadvertently led to inaccurate appraisals, which is delaying a housing recovery.

"This requirement is costing everybody, including the consumer, because we're not getting quality appraisals," said Tim Singer of Coldwell Banker in Fort Lauderdale.

Appraisers bristle at the criticism. While some concede that concerns about the law are valid, they also say real estate agents and sellers have vested interests that blind them to the reality of falling home values.

"Don't shoot the messenger," said Ken Chitester, spokesman for the Appraisal Institute, a Chicago-based association with 24,000 members nationwide. "It's very easy to point fingers, especially in a depressed market."

The abundance of foreclosures

in recent years has dramatically reduced values, and appraisers say they can't help but factor in those comparable homes when they're preparing estimates.

But many of those homes are in disrepair, and real estate agents point out that appraisers often don't consider the condition of the properties, leading to unnecessarily low appraisals.

In home sales, buyers who need mortgages pay for the appraisals, which cost about \$350 in South Florida. Banks require them to make sure they don't lend more money than the homes are worth. Cash buyers typically don't request appraisals, real estate agents say.

For years, an appraisal was considered a formality. A mortgage broker would commonly suggest a business acquaintance to do the work, virtually assuring the appraisal, an opinion of value, matched the sale price.

The 2009 law put a stop to that by insisting on appraiser independence. It also discouraged prolonged

communication between an appraiser and the real estate agent, who used to work more in tandem.

Many lenders now hire appraisal management companies, which randomly select appraisers. Real estate agents and others complain that the companies assign appraisers from out of the area who aren't familiar with specific neighborhoods.

Another complaint is that the management companies don't pay a fair wage, which deters experienced appraisers from accepting assignments.

The result: Low valuations, real estate professionals say.

Charles Ware, president of Elite Appraisal Management Inc. in Michigan, said it's up to the appraisers to reject assignments if they aren't familiar with certain areas. His management company lets appraisers set their own fees. "We're not gouging," he said.

Nine percent of real estate agents reported delayed sales contracts in recent months because of low

appraisals, according to the National Association of Realtors. In addition, 13 percent said a contract was renegotiated to a lower price because an appraisal came in below the agreed-upon price.

The Realtors' trade group didn't say how many sales were canceled by low appraisals.

Appraisals are especially troublesome on short sales, when a lender agrees to let the homeowner unload the property for less than the mortgage amount, said Judy Trudel, an agent for Balistreri Realty in Lighthouse Point, Fla.

The seller's lender wants the home to appraise as high as possible to reduce the financial hit, but the buyer's lender hopes the appraisal comes in low, Trudel said.

Scott Dooley, a Fort Lauderdale appraiser, shrugs off the criticism, saying appraisal complaints come with the job and tend to increase in a down market.

"But once it stabilizes," he said, "things will improve and our jobs will be a little easier."

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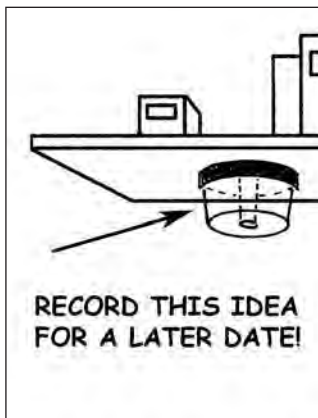
**ARE THE SHELVES** in your workshop full? Shelf space usually is limited in most shops, and they get filled up quickly. But you can **DOUBLE** your shelf space by using the underside of these shelves. Sounds crazy, but it can be done. You'll need an old CD spindle-storage package — you know, the plastic packaging that holds the 50-plus blank CDs that you buy for your computer? You can glue or use screws to attach the base of the spindle pack to the bottom of a shelf. Now you can fill the top part of the case with hardware or other items and screw it onto the spindle base. Your items will be easy to spot, as most cases are some-



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what clear, and handy. Plus, you won't have to use any valuable shelf space.

**DEAR CARRELLS:** I've cleaned out my garage, and underneath it all, I found a very large oil stain on the garage floor. I tried to get it up with soap and water. That got some of it, but it wasn't until I tried paint thinner that it started to dissolve. The paint thinner worked wonders, and I have been able to get almost all of it up. The rest is some-

thing I will have to live with. I applied a water sealer to the surface to protect it from further stains and spots. It actually looks pretty clean. Hopefully this will last a few years. — J.M.

## Super hint

A nail apron or tool belt can hold a lot of tools and hardware. Why not hang it up, fully loaded, on your garage wall or pegboard storage panel? It's a great place to keep your tools, and your belt will be ready to use when you need it.

**DEAR AL:** Before we got our delivery of firewood, I got the old wood off the rack and started to clean it. I found a snake skin and some litter, which I assume was from a raccoon or some other critter. I moved the rack out by the fence. I can't stop them from living in or near the wood pile, but I can move their "shelter" away from my home. — L.K.

**Q:** We have a clog in our main household drain. Unfortunately, we couldn't get the main drain plug off. It's metal and rusted closed. I can't get it to budge. Now what? — N.A.

**A:** You should have another access point that you can work the clog from, but let's try to get the main drain open first. Put some penetrating oil onto the drain threads and give it time to soak into the joint and start to work. You also can try applying some heat to the joint with a propane torch. Just make sure to be extra careful around the oil, and make sure no gas is present in the area.

# A valuable political antique might be gathering dust in your home

**POLITICS IS IN THE NEWS** every day, and we're reminding collectors that buttons, signs, medallions, bandanas and even canes were made for past election campaigns. They are a collector's challenge. Prices for some old and rare political collectibles are high at auctions, but many items can be found for less at house sales or hidden in your own drawers or attic. Some old political collectibles have slogans or pictures from long-forgotten campaigns. A recent catalog for a campaign-button auction pictured these examples: A button with the words, "If we ever needed him, we need him now" (Dwight Eisenhower, 1952, \$18); an 1896 bug-shaped pin that represented the Gold Bug for William McKinley (\$720) and the Silver Bug for William Jennings Bryan (\$48); and a round button with a yellow felt border shaped like petals that was the sunflower emblem used by Alf Landon in 1936 (\$10). Figural buttons

often tell a hidden political story. A bar pin shaped like a broom with a small donkey hanging from the handle was auctioned by Hake's Americana and Collectibles of York, Pa., for \$113. The broom symbolized the Democrats' promise to sweep Republicans out of power in the 1932 election. The donkey was and still is the symbol of the Democrats. There may be unrecognized treasures in your house. Prices for political memorabilia usually go up during a presidential election year.

**Q:** Several years ago, I bought some dishes in a thrift store when I needed extra plates and platters for a themed dinner party. I noticed that all 51 pieces were signed "M.A. Hadley." I discovered that this pattern is called "Hot Brown Fleck" and that Mary Alice Hadley won

**a good-design award for it from the Museum of Modern Art in 1952. Can you tell me more about Ms. Hadley and my dishes?**

**A:** Mary Alice Hadley (1911-'65) decorated a set of dishes for use on her family's boat in 1939. Her friends liked the dishes so much that they asked her to make for them. She bought the dishes, hand-decorated them and had it glazed and fired at Louisville Pottery Co. of Louisville, Ky. In 1940, Mary and her husband, George, rented space at Louisville Pottery and

hired a few decorators to hand-paint china. Hadley Pottery Co., which the venture had been named, moved to a building the Hadleys bought in Louisville in 1944. They built their first kiln later that year and began firing their own pottery. "Hot Brown Fleck," introduced in 1952, is no longer being made because the brown clay it was made from is no longer available. After Mary Alice died, George continued in the business until it was sold in 1979. The company is still in business.

## Taking rock art to the wild side

MINNEAPOLIS — Stone artist Shane Schaaf doesn't only take on avant-garde, artsy projects. His company, Earthscape Stoneworks, designs and installs some fairly traditional patios, fireplaces and retaining walls.

But he's become a go-to guy for those who want something unique for their landscape: A mosaic wall, dog caves, courtyards studded with stained glass or semiprecious gems, gravity-defying stone columns that appear to bend like overcooked spaghetti.

His slogan is: "Teaching old stones new tricks."

"My goal is to create a sense of joy and wonder for people within their home and landscape," he said. "Everyone can have a wonder-filled space."

Stone isn't his only medium. He also works with metal and "wood-graph," a term he coined to describe the art of stacking reclaimed wood. "But I enjoy the freedom that stone offers," he said. "Stone is a very versatile material. Anything you want to build with stone, you pretty much can."

Many of his designs look fanciful but they're always designed to address a client's practical need. "Someone needs something for a reason," he said. "It can't just be cool. Otherwise, I'd just build in the studio."

In one client's front yard, for example, Schaaf designed an elaborate, walled courtyard with a water feature and amethyst geode sensor lights, because the client was seeking "a private, intimate space in a very suburban cul-de-sac," he said.

"The Cocoon" — arches of curved metal rebar that run along one side of the house — was designed to create a zone of privacy between the house and the one next door.

There wasn't room for a garden in the narrow corridor, Schaaf said, but eventually, ivy will cover the rebar and form a leafy green tunnel.

"The people and the property drive the ideas," he said. "I wouldn't come up with any of these ideas if it wasn't for them. The truth is, anytime I build something cool it's not because I had a grand idea, but my relationship with the client takes it to the next level."

Schaaf, a native of Willmar, Minn., became interested in outdoor fireplaces while working at a resort in Arizona. "Every restaurant and house had one, but I had hardly seen them here. I thought, 'If people in the middle of the desert enjoy outdoor fireplaces, so should Minnesota.'"

He started studying Old World masonry techniques, working both with mortar and the dry-stack method of fitting stones together without mortar. Often he combines the two methods, such as dry-stack stonework embedded in mortared stonework "to give textural contrast," he said. "I like the combination of organic and formal, natural and controlled."

## Energy from sun can pay for solar panels in about 10 years

NEWPORT NEWS, Va. — Ben Cuker lives what he teaches as a professor of marine and environmental science at Hampton University in Hampton, Va.

Max Buzard lives what he sells and installs through Royer Technical Services, also in Hampton.

Both are solar power enthusiasts, living in houses that make the energy they use. Instead of just paying electric bills, they can get checks back from clean-energy brokers and the power company.

"Photovoltaic solar panels actually start paying for themselves right after installation," said Buzard. He estimates 10 solar panels in 235-watt sizes cost about \$14,000 installed; add in a 30 percent federal credit, register for renewable energy credits and you pay for the system in less than 10 years.

"Our home has 25 solar panels of various sizes. We went from \$225 per month on the budget plan to \$70 a month — a savings of \$155. In addition, we receive solar payments of \$200 per megawatt generated. Last quarter, we received \$400."

For the Cukers, the savings

and payback are just as great.

"Dominion (Dominion Power Co. in Virginia) charges us about \$8.25 a month for staying tied to the electrical grid, so we spend just under \$100 per year on our electric bill," said Cuker, who shares the house with wife, Dawn.

"However, even though we use almost all the energy we make, we sell the credits for the renewable energy on the SREC (Solar Renewable Energy

Credit) market. Since installing the first systems in 2009, we have made \$1,940, which leaves us about \$800 to the good each year, after subtracting what we pay Dominion."

SRECS are a way for utilities to buy the clean energy produced by anybody who makes solar energy and is tied to the grid, according to Cuker.

"Even though the homeowner uses most of the energy produced,

the fact that it was done without burning dirty fuels is what is traded," he said.

"Current rates for SRECs are about \$200 per megawatt."

Buzard's solar lifestyle includes a 33-foot-tall wind turbine that spins with the breezes at his waterfront home. But, he's not sold on wind turbines for individual homeowners.

"The bang for the buck just isn't there," said Buzard, 54. "I only get wind from 180 degrees because homes in the neighborhood block it at this height."

"For homeowners, solar panels are the way to go."

Buzard's solar panels are small, attractive units he installed on short poles camouflaged by shrubbery. Some are located on the roof of his boat-house. Microinverters attached to the panels convert the solar energy to power the house can use. The number of solar panels a house needs is based on its energy use, so cost varies from house to house. Typically, a turnkey installation with ten 235-watt solar panels runs about \$14,000; add in a 30 percent federal tax credit and your cost is about \$10,500, said Buzard.

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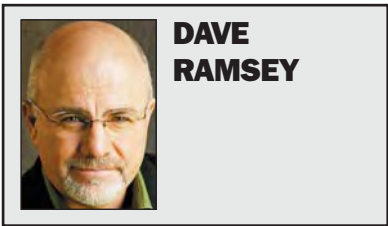

## Out-of-state house flipping not a good idea

**Q:** I live in New York, and even though I follow your advice and live on a budget, it's really hard to save up for a down payment on a house. My family in South Carolina advised me to buy cheaper property down there, fix it up and flip it to get the money I need. Does this sound like a good plan to you?

**A:** I wouldn't do it. Fixing and flipping properties is a very hands-on business, and trying to do it from another state could be a nightmare — especially with the weirdness in today's economy.

When you take on this kind of work you need to oversee what's happening every step of the way. You're also working out the details, and keeping an eye on the crew to make sure they're doing things right. Besides, you can't just walk up to a house, buy it, and expect to get a great deal.

Professionals who flip houses for a living often look at 100 or more properties to buy just one. It's not an easy way to make money, and it's definitely not something to consider doing from a distance.

Just keep on working the budget and save as much as you can. You might even consider getting a part-time job for a while to bring in some extra cash. But waiting and saving up is a lot smarter plan than fixing and flipping houses 900 miles away!

**Q:** My girlfriend and I recently got engaged, and our parents are contributing financially to the wedding. We've noticed that both sets of parents are pressing their ideas of what they'd like the wedding to be like, who to invite and who to include in the wedding party. I know in the end it's our call, but traditionally do parents have some kind of say if they contribute money to help pay for the wedding?

**A:** No. Traditionally, they take a say. And traditionally they're a pain in the behind! But they only interfere because they're so excited and love you so much. They want to be part of the happiness and for everything to be perfect.

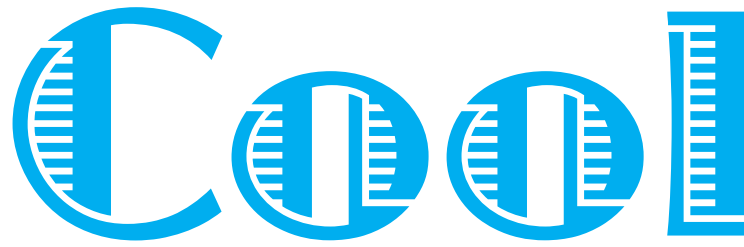

## Behind the scenes at hip and hard-charging YouTube, Google

SAN BRUNO, Calif. — Clearly, this isn't the typical American workplace.

Just inside the sleek glass doors of YouTube's corporate headquarters is a rock climbing wall — "for Googlers only." Straight ahead, five guys in T-shirts and jeans cluster around a foosball table, engrossed in a lunch hour game. Nearby, a Russian film crew jabbars away, shooting footage for a documentary on the global company. Over at the reception desk, the candy jar is a big, red, furry head of Sesame Street's Elmo, watched over by the receptionist's tiny, quivering Chihuahua, who's definitely not stuffed.

And that's just the lobby.

From the standard company attire — jeans and T-shirts, mostly — to the indoor putting green, the outdoor Frisbee golf course and the gourmet cafe dishing up free fare all day, YouTube is a work environment that's more akin to summer camp for adults.

YouTube and Google, its parent company in nearby Mountain View, are two of Silicon Valley's hotbeds of hiring. Jobs here are some of the most coveted around.

"Google has an incredible amount of cachet. They offer benefits that blow away the competition," said Dawn Block, a veteran Silicon Valley technology jobs headhunter.

Behind all the perks and quirks, there's a serious business. Google is a \$170 billion global empire spanning more than 40 countries, with offices from Madrid to Mumbai. Having morphed far beyond its Internet search engine roots, Google's business brawn has attracted antitrust scrutiny in this country and abroad.

But the atmosphere inside its smaller YouTube subsidiary more closely resembles that of a young startup.

To find out what it's like to land a job and work at one of the hippest and most hard-charging companies in California, we recently spent an afternoon on YouTube's campus. Our hosts: Christopher Dale and Josh Sassoon, two 30-somethings from Sacramento, who agree they took "meandering paths" to their Google jobs.

Dale, 36, is a corporate communications manager who toggles his time between the Google and YouTube campuses.

Growing up in Davis, Dale expected to become a lawyer, but an unin-

spiring summer job at a New York law firm stamped out that desire. Instead, armed with an English lit degree from Colgate University and a master's from Cambridge, Dale landed in San Francisco at a high-tech PR firm where he merged his two passions: Writing and technology.

He arrived in 2000, just in time for the dot-com debacle. His employer went bankrupt; Dale survived by starting his own marketing firm and then joining a tech-focused PR agency. All the while, he kept hearing "all these cool things this company called Google was doing."

In 2007, Dale got an unsolicited email from a Google recruiter on LinkedIn. The interview process was "rigorous" and stretched over several months. Hired to handle global crisis communications and public affairs, Dale has been at Google for three years, and is known for his "anti-uniform" of hipster eyeglasses, white shirt and, yes, a tie.

Sassoon, 30, is a "user-experience designer," which means he works with YouTube's engineering team, helping design new features like Cosmic Panda, where users gather and "curate" favorite videos, channels and play lists.

After graduating from Rio Americano High School, in Sacramento, Sassoon majored in art history at the University of California-Los Angeles. He interned at a local architecture firm, where he developed a passion for visual design, and at Intel, where he taught himself technical coding.

By the end of college, he was creating websites for small companies, which eventually led to jobs in New York at MySpace and at Sony Music, where he designed more than 200 websites for performers from J. Lo to "American Idol's" Adam Lambert. Last year, Sassoon was wooed back to California by Apple, which hired him as a visual designer.

It wasn't a good fit. Despite being a huge fan of Apple's user-friendly technology and sleek product lines, he found its corporate culture too stuffy. "It's a very top-down company with a singular vision. That's just the way it's structured."

He stayed less than a year before "finding my fit" at YouTube. Hired just six months ago, Sassoon is a "NuTuber," the YouTube vernacular for new employees. (At Google, they're called "Nooglers.")

While job growth in Sacramento and elsewhere in California remains anemic, here in the tech-dotted valley, Google, YouTube and others like LinkedIn, Facebook, Salesforce and Zynga are "hiring furiously," their websites littered with job openings, recruiters say.

"They may only be hiring five, 10 or 15 people," Block said, "but in the aggregate it adds up."

All that competition has taken a bit of the luster off Google's workplace dominance, longtime Silicon Valley recruiters like Block say.

"It's waning a bit," said Block, who has had clients pass up Google offers to work instead for smaller startups.

## Self-awareness sets the stage for solutions

**WHAT DO YOU DO** when you're faced with a challenge at work? This column generally recommends that you take a look inside and understand your own inner dynamics before taking outer action. But what if you really don't know how to go about that? Today's column focuses on reflection, self-awareness and taking responsibility for your own reactions.

Start with the basics. If you want to understand yourself, you need to create some internal space for understanding by quieting some of the chatter in your mind. It's easier to do if you find a setting where you can feel more peaceful. For some, it's a quiet room; for others, it's during a bike ride. It might even be in the shower. Identify for yourself where you do your best thinking and have the most clarity.

Once you're in that setting, take some time to settle in, breathing calmly and noticing your breath, watching your thoughts and feelings, preparing yourself to explore the issue that's on your mind.

Let's say that you're concerned about how angry a client makes you. Often we ruminate on such things, going over and over an unpleasant interaction in our heads. Instead, think about your reaction rather than what your client said or did. If your emotions seem out of proportion, consider reasons you may react so strongly. Fear is often a driver of anger — in this case, what, if anything, are you afraid of? Also think about other situations or people who trigger anger in you. You may have insights about underlying inner dynamics that will help you deal with this client.

Look at where you place responsibility for your feelings. Have you ever used the phrase, "It makes me so mad when ..."? This common statement shifts ownership for emotions away from their true owner — you — and onto someone else. You then lose your power to manage a difficult situation.

Using this understanding, next consider what you think would be a more appropriate response. Rather than being angry, would you prefer to be able to think about the situation from your client's point of view? Or just have some detachment so that you can manage the situation with more inner calm? Then, if you find yourself saying, "I get so angry when ..." you can decide if anger is the response that serves you, and you can use the alternatives you've considered.

Finally, look at your own part in your relationship with this client. Have you done all you can to create positive, or at least low-stress, interactions?

You may find that you feel some inner resistance to looking at the situation in this new way. It may be uncomfortable to own that you have responsibility for your reactions and an ability to modulate them, rather than just pointing fingers at others when situations become difficult. But once you learn this skill, you'll be able to use it whenever you're in a challenging situation, in and out of work, and it will eventually become second nature. Your clients and co-workers will benefit, and so will you.

# Hallmark adds job loss cards

DALLAS — Greeting card companies have taken a cue from the nation's 9 percent unemployment rate.

In a 6-by-4 inch envelope, someone can send a friend who lost his or her job a pre-printed message of encouragement and sympathy.

Though not available at every corner store, layoff greeting cards are being manufactured by Hallmark and sold at its stores and online — and selling well, said Frank Fernandez, owner of two Hallmark stores in North Texas.

"We're in the emotional business," Fernandez said. "You want to say something emotionally correct and give [your friends] a card that you've chosen to express your own thoughts."

One Hallmark card with a photo of a cat reads: "Is there anywhere I could hack up a hairball, like say, on a former employer's head?" Another card says: "Losing a job is just plain painful. So I want you to remember I'm in your cheering section ..."

Online companies such as Zazzle and Greeting Card Universe have also begun selling layoff cards. The second largest greeting card

company, Ohio-based American Greetings, has not produced greeting cards with specific captions about job loss. Spokesman Frank Cirillo said consumers can write their own messages to make the cards more personal.

David Smason, 25, moved to Dallas from New Orleans and was laid off from his last job, in the hospitality industry. While standing in line at a downtown job fair earlier this month, he said he was unsure if getting a layoff card would have been all that encouraging for him.

"I do think it's thoughtful," he said. "But I think

you have to have a healthy sense of humor to appreciate that kind of thing."

Stanford University professor Bob Sutton said layoff cards might be a good way to show compassion to someone who needs support during a tough time.

"Treating them as if they are invisible is often the worst thing," said Sutton, who has written several books on management and the workplace. "It is a very small thing, but may matter to some people."

Still, he said, not everyone would appreciate it, especially those who consider losing one's job a private or

embarrassing issue.

That's the reason pre-printed cards are sold, said Emily West, a communications professor at the University of Massachusetts who has studied the greeting card culture. Hallmark and similar companies are taking some of the difficulty out of sending concern and support to a friend who might have lost his or her job, she said.

"The production of the cards can help legitimize a sentiment," West said. "It can be comforting. It says that it's OK to send a card or to have this sentiment or say these things."

## Social media fuel small businesses

MIAMI — Laid off after 23 years in the mortgage lending business, Dede Parise couldn't find a job. So she took a marketing class to reinvent her career, and before long she turned an assignment into a company.

Parise invented "The Bandee," a headband women wear while playing golf and other sports. She sells her product mostly on the Internet, working from home.

Her audience is vast, and growing. In a year, using Facebook, she has parlayed her reach into 15,000 fans.

For small businesses like Parise's, social media have become a portal to success.

"It's really important," said Parise, 49, of Weston. "It's just the way the market has gone."

No question, the use of social media by businesses is booming.

According to a recent study by EMarketers, 80 percent of leading companies will participate in social-media marketing in 2011, nearly double the number from just three years ago.

And a 2011 Social Media Marketing industry report by SocialMediaExam.com found that 90 percent of marketers said social media are important for their business. Eighty-eight percent said they generate more business exposure, and 72 percent said they bring increased traffic to their site.

The most commonly used social media tools, the 2011 report found, are Facebook, Twitter, LinkedIn and blogs, in that order.

Parise didn't have — or even want — a personal Facebook page a little over a year ago. But she knew she needed one for business.

Now, she says, Facebook is the main contributor to the worldwide reach of her sales.

"Sometimes they say, 'I saw you on Facebook,'" she said.

When Kelly Lyles launched a website in July to begin selling her inven-

tion, "Tip Top Shoe Savers," she went immediately to social media to get the word out, garner feedback and drive people/customers to the website.

She posted on Twitter and Facebook to pique interest in her product — small shoe forms that women can place inside their pointy shoes to avoid creases and preserve the tips.

"One person putting a 'like' on your product or your page reaches hundreds of people because someone will see it on their page and say, 'I like that,'" said Lyles, 34, of Aventura.

What's more, Facebook gives her a weekly update of how many people visited her site and how many people "liked" her product.

And she can link Facebook and Twitter, so that her postings go out on both.

"So, if I say, 'Come visit Tip Top Shoe Saver at the Summer Sale,' it goes out to Twitter," Lyles said. "It's cross-promoting."

Even more-established companies that sell to other businesses can get a boost from social media.

"It is a way to keep people engaged with the website and engaged with us," said Valerie Holstein, chief executive of CableOrga-

nizer.com, a 9-year-old Fort

Lauderdale-based cable management products company with 45 employees and \$16 million in revenue.

"Customers use it to get tips and use it to tell their other friends if they are happy with the product," said Holstein, 36.

One woman recently shared a story about how her cat was always getting tangled in cables. She had no idea such products existed, and she was thrilled that she could now keep her cat safe.

"We use it for promotions we are running, but it is really more conversations of how to help people if they have an issue with a product, or they are looking for solutions and don't know how to go about it," Holstein said. "They ask us for advice."

Social media users say it's amazing how fast businesses can gather followers.

Holstein said that when CableOrganizer.com redesigned its 2-year-old Facebook page this summer and launched it recently with a giveaway, it got 250 "friends" in two days.

Businesses have to do some planning before they jump into social media, said Jillian Tobias, a senior account executive with Plantation, based Board-

room Communications who specializes in social media.

"The first thing I always advise my clients is to outline goals: Are you looking to reach customers? Are you looking to have more exposure? Are you looking to sell a product? What is the purpose of your social media campaign?" Tobias said. "I always recommend you choose sites wisely. You can't be on everything, so choose one or two sites and do it well."

She also advises businesses using Twitter to carefully choose hashtags that connect their conversation to their audience. They should remember to consistently update Facebook or a blog, and if they use an outside resource, to maintain the same tone or voice.

"Social media are becoming increasingly important in the success of businesses today, but I do think it needs to be strategic in the way companies decide what to do about it. It doesn't make sense for every business to be on Twitter," Tobias said. "Social media are not going to save your business if you don't have a good product or a good business plan. But it can supplement, in a good way, what you are doing."

## Preventing the push from the top

**GOOD EMPLOYERS** should worry about why employees choose to leave.

Sometimes better job offers arrive unsolicited, and workers leave for logical, personal betterment.

When the reasons aren't so obvious, Leigh Branham tries to help organizations figure out why workers jump ship.

After years of research, he knows two things:

■ Two-thirds of the time there's a turning point, a last straw that pushes people out the door.

■ Those "push factors" outnumber "pull factors" — such as better job offers — by 2 to 1.

Trouble with immediate bosses ranks high among the pushes. A public reprimand, unfair treatment or lack of understanding about a family situation falls in that category.

But the pushes aren't always directly personal. Surveys show that some workers leave because they don't think slackers are being held to task for the group good or because the boss has an ill-advised romance with an employee.

It's that top-down push that Branham finds intriguing. You might not think that senior leaders "play slightly more heavily than direct managers in the employee engagement equation," he said.

But top-down culture does matter, and some workers will leave if they're upset or displeased. Or they'll disengage — they'll show up but not give a hoot about their job.

Turnover costs employers. Organizations need to dig to find out why they lose good people. Unfortunately, it's never easy for top managers to recognize that they may be the push factor for turnover or poor morale.

## When 'helicopter parent' causes friction in the office, be direct

**Q: The mother of one of my employees recently called my boss to complain that her daughter, "Angie," was being over-worked. Angie was upset because some required training made it difficult for her to complete her regular duties, so I quickly resolved the problem by changing her training schedule.**

**However, I was completely shocked that Angie had been afraid to talk to me directly and that her mother felt a need to contact my manager. With Angie's permission, I called her mother, who said she was just worried about her daughter's health.**

**Apparently, the suggestion to call my boss came from our recep-**

**tionist, who is a personal friend of Angie's mother. I don't understand why the receptionist never told me about this, because we have always had a great relationship. The fact that all these people have been talking behind my back has me very upset. As Angie's supervisor, I feel I should have been given more respect. What should I do?**

**A:** You need to take a deep breath, calm down and recognize that this is not some sort of subversive plot. You have simply

gotten caught up in a convoluted communication chain. So instead of continuing to fret about recent events, focus on the future and take steps to prevent a recurrence.

Regrettably, Angie's mother appears to be a "helicopter parent" who doesn't understand that anyone old enough to have finished high school is also old enough to handle her own work issues. To help Angie break the habit of making Mom her mouthpiece, gently explain what she needs to do instead.

For example: "Angie, I'm glad we were able to resolve your concerns about the training schedule. However, I hope that in the future you'll come to me directly if you are worried about anything. As your supervisor,

my goal is to help you be successful, so we need to discuss any problems you may have."

As for the receptionist, just cut her a little slack. She may have inadvertently stepped on your toes while trying to help a friend, but that's no reason to ruin a previously great relationship.

**Q: My co-worker eats soup in his cubicle three times a day, despite the fact that office policy prohibits eating at your desk. This soup has a very strong, unpleasant odor, and on top of that, he repeatedly clanks his bowl to get every single drop.**

**Our manager has sent everyone reminder**

**emails about the policy, but this guy is still eating his soup. How do we get him to stop?**

**A:** Like many managers, your boss has not yet learned that group warnings never solve individual performance problems. General admonitions are almost always ignored by the actual offenders.

To actually enforce the policy, your manager must stop hiding behind "reminder emails" and tell this soup-slurping employee to take his bowl to the break room. Otherwise, you'll be hearing that clanking spoon for a long, long time.

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# New pest threatens berry production nearby

**Dr. RAKESH CHANDRAN**, WVU Extension Specialist in Integrated Pest Management, wants to make cane producers aware of a new fruit pest that has been found in seven southern and central Pennsylvania counties, as well as here in Monongalia County. Maggot-infested fruit are also being reported, threatening grapes, berries and tree fruit crops. Spotted wing drosophila are attacking fruit crops in Pennsylvania and surrounding states.

A spotted wing drosophila (SWD) is a small vinegar fly that is damaging tree fruit and berry crops in the eastern United States, and can potentially attack many fruit species, such as cherries, plums, peaches, some apple varieties and Asian pears, says **Dr. David Biddinger**, entomologist at the Pennsylvania State University Fruit Research and Extension Center. The greatest potential for damage, however, is probably to the many types of berry crops, especially strawberries, cranberries and grapes.

Native to Southeast Asia, the fly was first detected in the western United States in 2008. Recently, Biddinger was scouting in a five-acre site of late-season yellow and red raspberries in southern Pennsylvania and discovered that between 30 and 50 percent of the fruit was infested with SWD larvae.

"Unlike other vinegar flies that target damaged or overripe fruit, SWD females

will attack any soft-skinned healthy fruit to lay its eggs," Biddinger explains. He reported that it appeared the fruit was being infested with larvae just before they ripened.

A grower from Berks County reports significant losses in blackberries, raspberries and white peaches, but the damage has not been confirmed as coming entirely from SWD since damage from stink bugs looks similar. Entomologists in Connecticut, North Carolina, Virginia, West Virginia and New Jersey also are reporting SWD in vinegar traps, and some report significant fruit loss. The sustained, cool, wet weather in the eastern part of the country this season has delayed the harvest of many late-season crops, leading to more over-ripe fruit than usual and, consequently, more fruit flies of all types. "With over 180 species of vinegar flies in the US, it is difficult to determine if the larvae are from SWD unless they are reared to adults or traps are used to monitor SWD populations," says Biddinger.

Biddinger explains it is important for growers to be able to identify the pest and to learn about monitoring

and management of SWD. "Identification is key, but because of its small size and because several similar fruit flies in our region look very similar, it can be difficult. Over a thousand fruit flies may come to a single vinegar trap with only a small percentage being SWD since many types of flies are attracted to vinegar."

SWD are approximately two to three millimeters long with yellow-brown bodies and red eyes. Adult males have two distinctive dots on the wings and brown bands on the abdomen. The females look similar, but do not have the wing dots or bands and have large, saw-like ovipositor for inserting eggs into fruit.

SWD adults thrive at cool temperatures in the spring and fall, but growth and reproduction are greatly slowed during hot summer weather. Females live two to nine weeks, lay two to three eggs per fruit and can lay more than 300 eggs total, showing high potential for large-spread fruit infestation if not controlled. Egg-laying, rot and fungal diseases can also affect the fruit, further contaminating the fruit at harvest. Infected fruit are difficult for growers to detect, since the only symptoms at first seem to be a small pin-prick from egg-laying. These turn into small scars and indented soft spots and bruises before the fruit eventually collapses from the internal feeding of the lar-

vae or disease. SWD larvae are white, without a distinctive head and are easier to detect against darker fruit, such as cherries or red raspberries. Up to 13 generations have been found in parts of Japan, but detections were not found in Pennsylvania this year until after cherry harvest, so we may have fewer generations. Trap captures have continued to build since then, with flies moving to new crops as the fruit began to ripen.

Biddinger suggests growers use integrated pest management (IPM) methods of monitoring, using apple cider vinegar traps suggested at [extension.psu.edu/ipm/agriculture/fruits/spotted-wing-drosophila](http://extension.psu.edu/ipm/agriculture/fruits/spotted-wing-drosophila) or on the Michigan State University website at [ipm.msu.edu/SWD/SWD-monitor.htm](http://ipm.msu.edu/SWD/SWD-monitor.htm). Biddinger has noted the yellow sticky cards recommended to be placed in some of the trap designs to be worth the cost and effort. They often just gum up the flies making identification more difficult. Flies in the traps will drown in the vinegar bait and can be sieved out with a tea bag strainer or cheese cloth and then stored in alcohol for identification.

Regardless of the crop, Biddinger says control of this pest depends on controlling the flies before they lay eggs, and sanitation of infested or left-over fruit on the crop. Selection of varieties or management prac-

tices, such as mowing of raspberries that could give earlier harvest dates, might avoid the rapid increases of SWD that comes with cool fall weather. "The biggest difference between SWD and other vinegar flies is that they can attack the crop much earlier with their impressive switch-blade of an ovipositor, but like other flies they can continue to develop on rotting fruit on the ground for months after harvest. Wild raspberries, blackberries, cherries and grapes are likely to be reservoirs of SWD populations that will move into crops from the edges in the future."

SWD trap catch thresholds for spraying and management plans for this new pest have not been established anywhere yet. Insecticides labeled for use on specific crops may list fruit flies as pests they control, but generally these will mean fruit flies of another family, such as apple maggot, cherry fruit flies and blueberry maggot. Many of the currently registered insecticides labeled for these other fruit flies should also control SWD, but care must be taken to stay within the pre-harvest limitations of the pesticide used. Check with a product representative or your local horticultural extension agent or entomologist for further information.

# Rayburn offers guide to forage sampling process

**LIVESTOCK PRODUCERS** in north central West Virginia have most of their hay and wrapped hay in the barn. A few bales of third cutting will likely be made after the killing frost occurs, but the lion's share of stored forage is complete. Now that producers know what was baled and when, it is necessary to determine the nutritional value of the harvested forage. This is normally done by obtaining a laboratory analysis to measure the forage quality.

**Dr. Ed Rayburn**, WVU Extension Forage Specialist, has prepared a very useful fact sheet to guide producers through the forage sampling processes. A laboratory analysis is good only if the sample submitted is representative of the forage the animal will eat. Proper collection and preparation of the sample are important.

When taking samples from hay bales, you need to have the right tools. Purchase or borrow a forage sampler. A forage sampler is a sharpened tube that is drilled into a hay bale to cut out a small subsample. Compared to the cost of feeding supplements, forage samplers are inexpensive and should be part of the livestock producer's management kit.

Divide the hay crop into lots based on management,

such as date of cut, forage maturity, forage species or rain-damaged hay. For each hay lot, randomly select 12 to 20 bales. Using the forage sampler, take a cored subsample from each bale. When sampling large round bales stored outdoors, take the sample from below the weather-damaged "cap". Combine these 12 to 20 cores in a plastic bag to make the sample to send to the lab. Hay samples can be mailed to the laboratory in the plastic bag since they should already be dry.

Baled haylage should be sampled at the same time as dry hay bales. However, because wet samples can spoil rapidly at room temperature, proper care needs to be taken when preparing and mailing the sample if you are to obtain a meaningful report. Put the wet forage sample into a plastic bag, press the bagged sample to remove all the air, and then seal the bag. The acid in the silage should continue to preserve it as long as there is insufficient oxygen in the bag to cause secondary fer-

mentation. Do not wet forage samples because the organic acids that preserve these feeds evaporate during drying.

Fill out the information sheet provided by the forage testing laboratory. Some laboratories will send copies of the report to other people, such as extension agents or nutrition consultants. If you want others to receive a copy, make sure their names and addresses are in the appropriate places on the form. Next, select the analysis to be conducted. Most forage testing laboratories can measure many nutritional components. Since not everyone wants the same information, the labs offer different testing packages.

A beef operator may want only an estimate of digestible or net energy, protein, and major minerals which can be conducted at a low cost using near infrared (NIR) analysis. However, a dairy operator may need components such as protein fractions or trace minerals, which will require a more expensive wet chemistry procedure. After completing the submission sheet and properly preparing the sample, you can send them to the laboratory. Results are normally available within 1 to 2 weeks, depending on the analysis requested.

**Pumpkin picking tips**  
It's almost time to start carving those pumpkins. Before heading to the pumpkin patch or farmers' market, take a minute to read these helpful hints on picking the perfect pumpkin.

■ The first step to finding the right pumpkin is deciding on the design you want to carve. Depending on the size and shape of your design, you may need a tall, narrow pumpkin or a short, round one.

■ Smaller pumpkins are suitable for carving simple traditional Jack o'lantern faces.

■ Medium-sized pumpkins are good selections for most stencil patterns.

■ For more intricate and elaborate designs, you may want to choose a larger pumpkin so it will be easier to carve.

■ A pumpkin with a smooth surface will give you the best working canvas.

■ The pumpkin should be flat on the bottom so it will not roll.

■ Avoid pumpkins with scratches, nicks, cuts, and

dents unless they will enhance your design.

■ Pass up pumpkins with bruises since these will decay faster.

■ Lighter colored pumpkins are normally softer, making carving easier.

■ Look for a ripe pumpkin with a sturdy stem. Do not carry the pumpkin by its stem to avoid breaking it. If the stem does break off, it can be patched back on using toothpicks. If your perfect pumpkin is missing its stem, instead of carving out a lid on top, simply carve out the bottom. Place a candle on the carved out section, and then set the pumpkin over it.

Now you're ready to find that perfect pumpkin and start carving. Have fun and enjoy a Happy Halloween!

Make certain that climbing roses are securely attached to their supports. Cover strawberries two inches deep with hay or straw. 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## VW takes on big American car with Passat

VW's all-new 2012 Passat is the car they've never built for a segment they've never appreciated.

Until now. The midsize class now holds Volkswagen's attention because it wants to be the world's No. 1 automaker by 2018. Because Americans buy piles of midsize cars, at the rate of about 250,000 a month, VW sees gold in them thar hills.

But to be successful, the 2012 Passat has to stand out among such sales-chart luminaries as the Toyota Camry, Nissan Altima, Honda Accord, Hyundai Sonata, Ford Fusion and Chevrolet Malibu.

Its base price of \$19,995 is a good starting point, especially since the Passat you get for this price is well-constructed and nicely masks the fact that VW had to cut costs judiciously to hit that target.

It would seem that VW wised up to the fact that we Americans like our cars like we like our buckets of chicken or pallets of toilet paper: Big and cheap. And this Passat is red, white and blue to its core.

The 2012 car's length and wheelbase are each four inches longer than the outgoing model. This growth means the Passat's rear legroom, trunk space and interior

space rival or beat its peers.

Not only does the Passat have the space to take a family of five eating-contest enthusiasts home from the state fair, but it also offers them an appreciable amount of comfort when doing so. Occupants of the Passat will be impressed by the quality they are getting for their dollars.

The seats are wide and yielding, and surfaces like the dashboard and armrests are reassur-

ingly pliable. Road, wind and tire noise are all but banished from the interior. As with the rest of the car, the construction of the cabin is first-rate.

Volkswagen doesn't yet have the EPA fuel economy figures for the Passat 2.5, but in more than 440 miles of testing a preproduction 2.5 SEL, I averaged 25.2 miles per gallon.

If you're looking for more power or efficiency, VW has you covered. A

3.6-liter V-6 will be available, and it puts out 200 horsepower and 253 pound-feet of torque. Figure on an additional \$3,000 to \$3,300 for this engine.

Also available when the Passat goes on sale this month will be a 2-liter turbo diesel, good for 140 horsepower and 236 pound-feet of torque. Volkswagen estimates that this engine will get 43 mpg on the highway. This engine will add about \$2,300 to the 2.5 pricing.

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# Broken dipstick may not hurt engine

**DEAR TOM AND RAY:** I have a 1993 Subaru Loyale 4-wheel-drive wagon. The transmission-fluid dipstick has broken off the cap. The stem is down the fill tube beyond where I can reach it with a telescoping magnet. I tried to grasp it with a long pair of hemostats, but was unable to grasp far enough down to get it. Tape back-wrapped on a piece of wire was not sticky enough to get it out that way, either. Is the car safe to drive? I purchased a replacement cap/dipstick and can check the level, which is fine. I'm worried that driving it will end up pushing the broken piece into the transmission. Any idea how to remove it, or how much money it will take to have a shop do it? — Ken

**RAY:** You're worried about a broken dipstick on a '93 Loyale, Ken? Isn't that like worrying about the barnacles on the Andrea Doria?

**TOM:** Actually, if you have an automatic transmission, you have nothing to worry about, Ken. Since the dipstick's lateral movement is confined by the tube, the end of the stick is just going to sit there on the bottom of the transmission pan, where it won't bother anything. There are no gears or anything in that part of the automatic transmission, and the

stick can't go anywhere. **RAY:** So if it's an automatic, just use your new stick to keep an eye on the fluid level, and otherwise forget about it.

**TOM:** On the other hand, if you have a manual transmission, then you need to remove that thing. There's nothing BUT gears in a manual transmission, so the stick could get chewed up by the gears and ruin your transmission AND your differential.

**RAY:** The first thing to try is a more powerful magnet. If you can still see the top of the dipstick, and it's not wedged in there somehow, a more powerful magnet ought to be able to grab it for you.

**TOM:** If not, the next step is to have a mechanic remove the tube itself.

The dipstick tube usually is just force-fit into the transmission housing, or maybe held in place by a single bolt and a bracket. So if you're still on speaking terms with any local mechanics, have one of them pull out the tube for you, and then remove the broken piece of dipstick.

**RAY:** And if worse comes to worst, and the tube gets damaged during removal, you can buy a new tube for very little money. Altogether, including labor, this is probably a \$50 repair if you get to it soon. Or a \$2,000 repair if you dawdle.

Like other New Yorkers, they've had to give up things like Broadway plays and authentic New York pizza, but now they are wondering if there is something else they should give up: Their long-standing love affair with all-wheel-drive cars.

The family's two primary vehicles are a 1998 Subaru Legacy wagon and a 2003 Subaru Outback. "For the last 15 years, we have been driving cars with all-wheel-drive," Joseph said. "I swore to myself when the need arose to replace these cars. I was

now not limited to Subaru's AWD since we have left the snow far behind us."

But then a funny thing happened: The Josephs say they felt safer in the AWD vehicles when driving in Florida's wet, rainy weather. "Are we crazy?" he said. "Have we brainwashed ourselves into thinking we now need AWD even in sunny Florida?"

Technically, no, you don't really need AWD in southern climes. Ten years ago, the answer might have been different. But now that almost every new vehicle sold has electronic stability control and antilock brakes, a front-wheel-drive car and most rear-wheel-drive cars will behave pretty much like an all-wheel-drive vehicle on wet roads.

# More auto shoppers turn to Internet for research

LOS ANGELES — Jane Wolff used to spend days visiting car dealers and reading auto magazines to figure out which car to buy. Even then, the retired school-teacher said she wasn't sure she was getting the best deal.

The Internet has changed all that. Wolff went digital with her research this time, collecting price and trade-in data from auto information websites operated by Edmunds.com, Kelley Blue Book and TrueCar Inc. The bottom line: Wolff last month negotiated a Subaru Outback Limited

for near the invoice price. "I went to the dealers better prepared," the Chino, Calif., resident said.

Shoppers such as Wolff are driving more traffic to such websites, many of which are based in Southern California, and turning the region into a Silicon Valley south for online auto information companies.

The three websites combined have hired more than 200 workers this year as consumers increasingly rely on the Web to figure out which vehicle they want to buy and how to negotiate the lowest price. All three are said to be profitable and

project revenue growth despite an overall economy that continues to be sluggish.

Such companies, including car sales referral sites Autobytel.com and CarsDirect.com, are attracting tens of millions of visitors a month because they enable shoppers to gather information without having to journey to car dealers and face down the sales staff.

"That whole concept of working out a deal and coming out with a final price is the area of car buying where customers are the most dissatisfied," said Jim Gaz, senior director of automotive retail research at J.D. Power & Associates.

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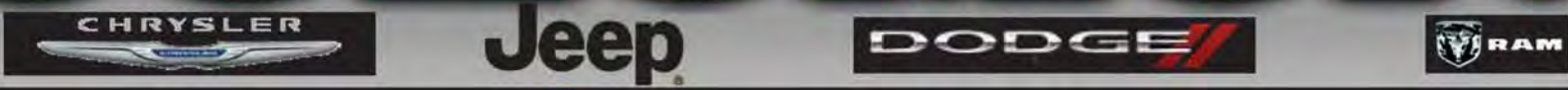

## Dead is alive

### New shows focus on dark fantasies

It's not a new idea to feature the paranormal on TV, as indicated with hit series such as "Buffy the Vampire Slayer" or "The X-Files," but the fad started to die off when audiences became more interested in real cases like those in reality series "Paranormal State" and "Ghost Hunters". But now zombies, vampires, ghosts and other supernatural creatures are experiencing a revival.

One of the most hotly anticipated series of the fall season features the often-underestimated denizens of the undead: zombies. Season 2 of "The Walking Dead" follows a group of survivors trying to eke out an existence in the wake of a zombie apocalypse. As leader Rick tries to take the group out of Atlanta, they encounter trouble on the highway in the 90-minute season premiere of the drama, airing Sunday, Oct. 16, on AMC.

The second coming is good news for fans, who quickly made the show a cult hit for the cable giant

when it premiered last Halloween. They stuck by the show's gruesome week after week and are likely chomping at the bit to find out what happens next.

"When we last left the cast of 'The Walking Dead,' they were in the midst of a high-intensity struggle to survive," said AMC executive Charlie Collier. "In Season 2, they are on the move

and, suffice it to say, things have not gotten any

easier. We're ecstatic to have more than twice the number of episodes for the fans as we did in Season 1."

That means fans will have 13 episodes of the show, which was based on the phenomenally successful comic book series of the same name by Robert Kirkman. Oscar nominee Frank Darabont (1994's "The Shawshank Redemption") developed the series for television and also serves as executive producer.

"The Walking Dead" stars Andrew Lincoln as Rick Grimes, a police officer who leads a group of survivors. In Season 1, the former sheriff's deputy awoke from a coma to find his small Georgia town overrun with zombies. In search of his wife Lori (Sarah Wayne Callies) and son Carl (Chandler Riggs), he headed for Atlanta where he found his loved ones with a group of survivors led by his former partner, Shane Walsh (Jon Bernthal).

If you can't wait for the season premiere on Oct. 16, AMC is offering a special six-part web series that explains Hannah's back story. Visit amctv.com for these special episodes.

As "The Walking Dead" starts its second season, several other networks are launching their own new supernatural series. Perhaps AMC's success has inspired the big networks to have high hopes for their less gruesome fare.

New this fall, NBC brings viewers the story of a modern-day detective who discovers he's a descendent of agents responsible for keeping mythological crea-

tures in check in "Grimm," premiering Friday, Oct. 28. David Giuntoli stars as Nick Burkhardt, the detective in question, who is suddenly thrust into a world of ancient rivalries and alliances.

Over on ABC, a magical fairy tale comes to life through the eyes of a little boy and his biological mother in "Once Upon a Time," which is a new twist on the "Snow White" story, premiering Sunday, Oct. 23. Jennifer Morrison, best known for her role as Dr. Cameron on Fox's "House," leads the cast as a tough bail bondsman who discovers the son she gave up for adoption years ago believes she's Snow White and Prince Charming's missing daughter.

This season's newbies may be promising, but they'll have a lot of catching up to do to slay "The Walking Dead," which was a hit right from the start. When the series premiered last fall, it set a record as the most-watched drama series in basic cable history among the coveted adults 18-49 demographic. It also earned a Golden Globe nomination for Best Television Series.

The show may deliver that "thrill factor" television-viewing audiences have been craving, but writer and director Darabont explained that it isn't all about the zombies.

"We're digging a lot deeper than that," said Darabont, "and striving to keep the characters and their experiences at the forefront because I think that makes for the best television."

There's no question the zombies are a big draw for many, but the relationships between the survivors, and the wisdom that comes with living in the moment has also earned the show much critical praise. Fans are hoping they can continue that kind of television in Season 2, which reportedly changes setting to the countryside as the survivors seek refuge outside Atlanta.

That isn't the only thing changing in "The Walking Dead's"

sophomore season.

After win-

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ning an Emmy for Best Prosthetic Make-up for the show, Greg Nicotero signed on as co-executive producer and has also been selected to direct an episode this season.

Fearfest programming event. Featuring 14 days of thriller and horror films and TV programs, this year's Fearfest kicks off Sunday, Oct. 16, and features a marathon of "The Walking Dead" leading up to the season premiere.

# A &E goes whole hog

## Experts track wild boars in 'Hoggers'

Times have changed in Texas. Gone are the days of masked gunslingers and Old West saloons. The newest threat to ranchers, farmers and the like aren't dangerous banditos. These days, feral boars are terrorizing landowners all over the state, destroying crops, ripping up valuable land and even killing livestock.

But there's a Big Bad Wolf in town, and he's ready to huff and puff those piggies right out of Texas. Cowboy Jerry Campbell rides to the rescue of harried landowners in "American Hoggers," premiering Wednesday, Oct. 19, on A&E.

Cameras follow the legendary hog hunter and his crew, which includes Campbell's 28-year-old son Robert and 23-year-old daughter Krystal. Together, they square off against the highly intelligent animals, which cause over \$50 million in damage every year in Texas alone. The series was slated to premiere back in August, but A&E moved the air date in order to allow the cast, crew and animals involved to relax during the extreme heat during the summer.

Wild boars are the ancestors of the common domesticated pig, but they aren't much like their docile cousins. Native to Northern and Central Europe, the Mediterranean, Asia and Indonesia, wild boar were reportedly introduced to the U.S. for hunting purposes.

The population explosion in recent years has researchers and scientists worried as the invasive species has been taking over habitats and destroying the terrain beneath their hooves. Natural predators can't seem to keep the population in check, so in many cases humans are stepping in.

The resourceful Campbells have developed a unique system that makes use of both traditional and high-tech methods to

track the boars. They don their cowboy boots and ride horseback when necessary and also use a custom-designed jeep to help them on the job. Specially-trained dogs and GPS tracking systems aid the "hoggers" as well.

Facing off against the animals proves to be a dangerous prospect at the best of times. With their populations growing, especially in Texas where it's estimated half the country's wild boar population lives, they have insatiable appetites. They can weigh more than 400 pounds, and are known to become violent when challenged. Whole farms have shut down in their wake, and some families have been afraid to leave their homes.

The Campbells try to help such people as they saddle up the horses and take jobs all over central Texas. They're prepared for just about anything, from a farmer determined to save his crops to a scrap yard owner who's dealing with an extremely aggressive boar. The A&E media release also mentions a beleaguered airport official seeking help for hogs gathered on a

runway.

"American Hoggers" will, of course, draw comparisons to Discovery's "Hogs Gone Wild," another show about the feral hog epidemic in the U.S.

In Discovery's offering, three teams of pest-control experts from Florida, Texas and Hawaii attempt to track and capture the destructive animals with the help of dogs, infrared night vision and state-of-the-art trapping devices.

"Hogs Gone Wild" immediately captivated viewers when it premiered in January, earning the No. 2 spot among non-fiction prime-time programming for the night. Attracting an audience of 1.77 million, it improved ratings for its time-slot compared to the previous year. However, fascination with the series seemed to wane and Discovery pulled it for a while before bringing it back this spring.

A&E execs are likely hoping their series will rope in its share of viewers thanks to a team that's gaining quite a reputation for real-life television. Thom Beers' Original Productions, the maker of "American Hoggers," is also responsible for A&E's "Storage Wars" and "Ice Road Truckers," which airs on History Channel. "Storage Wars" follows modern-day treasure hunters looking to strike it rich at storage auctions, while "Ice Road Truckers" tags along with big-rig truck drivers in the frozen north.

Both series have been big hits for their respective networks, especially "Storage Wars," which set network records with its season premiere in July. Attracting a total of 5.1 million viewers, the back-to-back new episodes marked A&E's best ever season opening for any series.

## Hollywood Q&A

**Q: I was watching a rerun of the old cop show "Barney Miller" the other day and the guy who played Fish looked familiar to me. What else was he in?**

**A:** There's definitely irony in the career of longtime supporting actor Abe Vigoda, but it's kind of hard to say where.

He was either a TV cop who was ironically cast in mob movies, or a mob-movie man who got to play at being one of the good guys on TV.

If you recognize the gaunt and lanky star, it's likely from his turns at playing the loyal mafia killer in the first two "Godfather" films from 1972 and 1974.

The films, considered undisputed classics today, were sensations even at the time, and so it's likely that he was already inextricably associated with his mobster persona when "Barney Miller" premiered in 1974. The series featured Vigoda as the aging and crotchety Det. Phil Fish, and he stuck with the show for the first three seasons, doing the third season part-time while also starring in his very own spinoff, aptly named "Fish." The spinoff itself lasted for two seasons, and the first season will be included with the "Barney Miller" DVD set that comes out on Oct. 25.

It wasn't just Francis Ford Coppola's legendary "Godfather" pictures that made Vigoda's bones in the mob business. Between them he also starred in the largely forgotten "The Don Is Dead" (1973), and he returned to the business after his jaunt on television. In 1994, he starred in a modern sort of mobster movie, playing a crime boss in the Wesley Snipes action flick "Sugar Hill," set in New York City's troubled Harlem neighborhood.

He doesn't seem to mind being typecast, though. At 90 years old, long after many might have retired from the biz and enjoyed the fruits of their "Godfather" royalty checks, he's still at it. He has three different mobster movies in various stages of completion — "The Driver" opposite fellow gangster-film regular Vincent Pastore, "Mafioso II" and, showing a willingness to make fun of the whole thing, the indie-made genre spoof "Mobster Movie."

**Q: Is it true that "Good Times" was a spinoff? From what?**

**A:** Perhaps having aged a little more gracefully, and picked up a bit of a cult following (and certainly a better syndication deal), "Good Times" is probably more fondly remembered than its parent series "Maude."

The matriarch of the "Good Times" family, Florida Evans (played by Esther Rolle), first appeared on "Maude" as the housekeeper of the titular Maude Findlay (played by Bea Arthur).

But actually, "Good Times's" lineage goes even further back. The series was created by actor-turned-writer Mike Evans, who played Lionel on the classic sitcom "All In the Family," from which "Maude" itself was a spinoff.

Actually, quite a bit of the Evans family's back story was changed for "Good Times." On "Maude," which was set in New York, Florida's husband was a fire-fighter named Henry, whose lucrative promotion allowed her to quit her housekeeping job. However, on "Good Times," the family lived in Chicago, her husband was named James, and he was unemployed and had been for some time. John Amos played the variously named husband on both series.

**Q: What happened to "Burn Notice"? It's not on Thursday nights anymore, but I don't think I saw a season finale.**

**A:** You didn't, though it's sometimes hard to tell with these suspenseful serial shows.

Every episode of "Burn Notice" ends with a sort of a cliffhanger as ex-spy Michael Westen finds another clue leading to the truth of why he was black-listed. Without giving away too much, the most recent episode, which aired back in September, ended a bit more suspensefully than usual, but not enough to make for a decent season finale. That's because it was a semi-season finale.

The series is taking a mid-season break and will return in November. USA's splashy promo ad for the upcoming semi-season says that he'll learn that "there's something much worse than being a burned spy."

USA has promised six more episodes before the proper season finale in the winter, but fans can go into the off-season with the knowledge that USA has already bought a sixth season.

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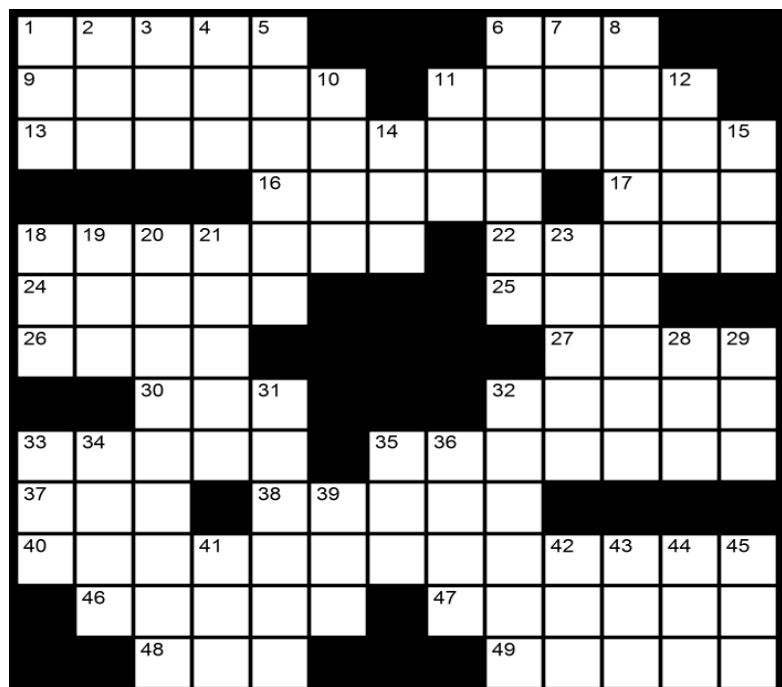

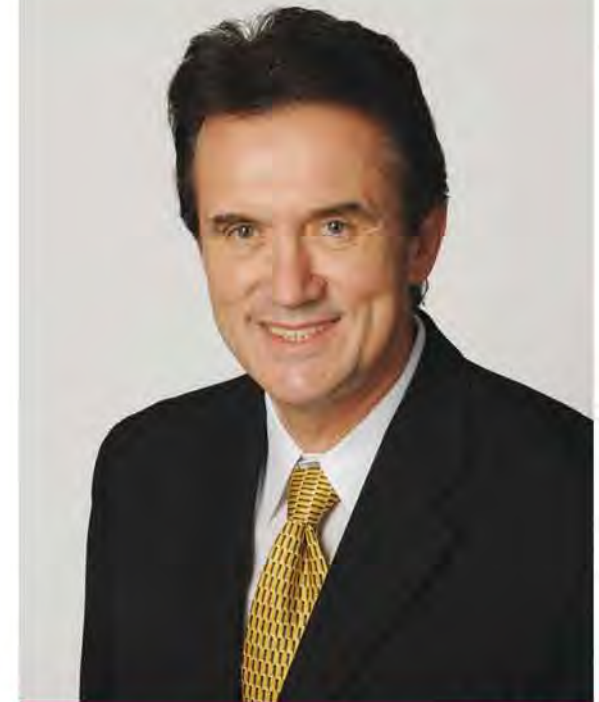
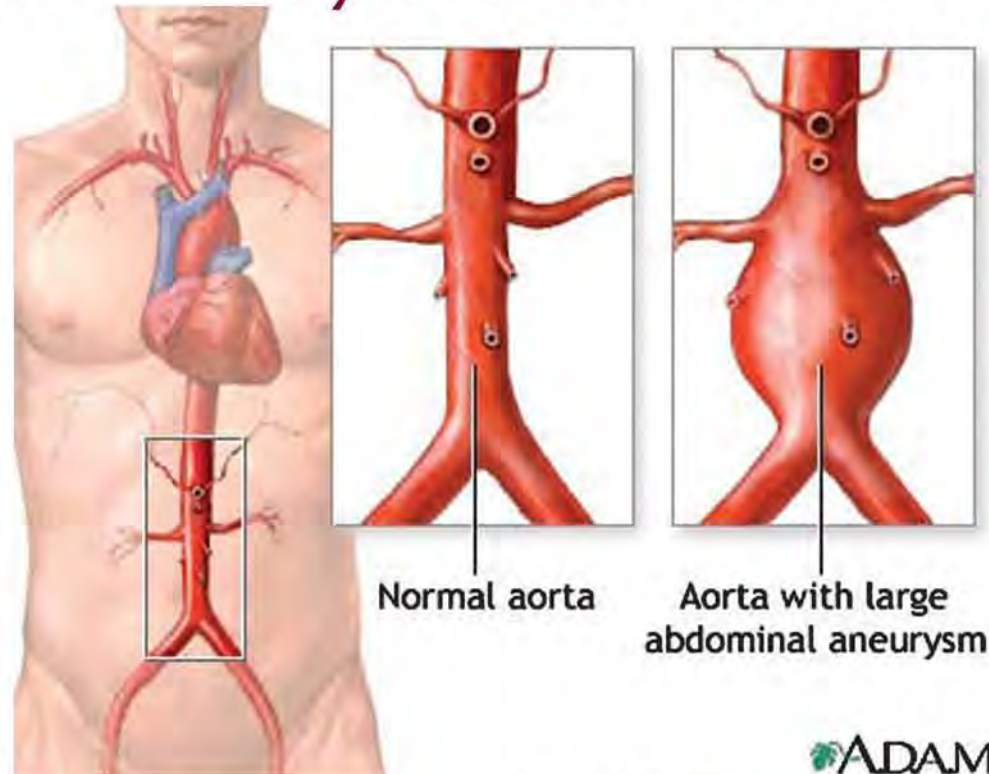

## Aortic Aneurysms: The Silent Killer

An abdominal aortic aneurysm (AAA) is a bulge in the largest artery of the body. AAA is a blood filled bulge of the abdominal aorta, the artery that carries blood away from the heart to the lower part of the body.

The bulge (known as an aneurysm) can become weak and the force of normal blood pressure can cause the aorta to rupture, often resulting in sudden death.

You may have AAA even if you are not experiencing symptoms. Risk factors include: high blood pressure, smoking, high cholesterol and obesity, family history, a “poor leg circulation” diagnosis, heart disease, and if you’ve had heart bypass surgery. AAA occurs in those (most often men) aged 55 and older.

Only 10% to 25% of people will survive a ruptured AAA. That is why it is important to be screened. Treatment options depend on the size of the aneurysm. Small aneurysms are monitored every 6-12 months for changes. Larger aneurysms may require immediate repair.

Fortunately, at least 95% of these AAAs can be successfully treated if detected prior to rupture. Mon General specialists can perform a simple and painless ultrasound screening to determine if AAA is present. The majority of repairs could be performed today using a minimally invasive technique, with a stent graft. 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# IRA gift opportunity for 2011

**AUTUMN IS OFTEN A TIME** for year-end tax planning.

Many who have planned wisely for retirement by putting money into IRA accounts now find that the required annual distributions are funds they do not really need after all. However, they must withdraw a certain amount or face a 50 percent federal tax penalty.

An alternative to paying the income taxes is available. Federal law currently permits anyone age 70 1/2 or older to make tax-free gifts from IRAs to their favorite charitable organizations during 2011.

Gifts up to \$100,000 can be made by having the IRA manager transfer the funds directly to the nonprofit organization. Private foundations, supporting organizations and donor advised accounts are excluded.

No personal benefit from the transferred gift amount is permitted.

An IRA gift counts toward the required minimum distribution for the year and doesn't impact or lessen the deductibility of any other charitable

gifts made in 2011.

While regular IRA distributions are subject to federal and state income taxes, the charitable amounts escape federal taxes and most states, including West Virginia, also exempt the gift from taxes.

If you do not have an IRA, it may be worthwhile to roll-over other tax-deferred retirement account funds into a newly established IRA to make such charitable gifts.

Your hard-earned IRA funds can be a tax-saving way to help your community and favorite nonprofits.

That's good planning.

## Making choices on financial accounts can help the estate planning process

What does "POD" mean? Or "TOD"?

While they are not acronyms used every day by most of us, they are important ones for financial purposes. They stand for "payable on death" and "transfer on death" and refer to the process of transferring the balances of certain types of accounts to a new owner when the original owner passes away. This may be a worthwhile way to ensure certain funds go where you want them even though you've already had your will prepared.

This type of designation can be added to a checking, savings or stock account by the financial institution holding the account, at your request. Doing that does not give the future recipient any control over the account now. The individual will receive the funds in them only when you have passed away. Certificates of deposit can also have the POD designation added to them.

If you add, for example, "POD Mary Smith" to your checking account, then the remaining funds will be transferred to Mary only when you pass away. Mary will have no ability to use

the funds until that time.

This can also speed up the administration of the estate and lower the administrative costs. Consult your financial adviser to make sure that these changes will not hurt your overall estate plan.

It is easy to do and does not require the assistance of an attorney.

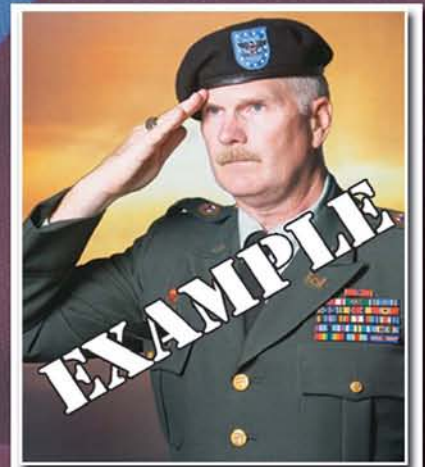

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# Why some people don't have wills

People come up with all sorts of reasons for not having a will. Do any of these sound familiar to you?

■ I don't want to think about death.

■ Only rich people need wills.

■ I can't afford a will.

■ I don't have time now.

■ My family will divide things when I'm gone.

■ I will do it just before I die.

You may be able to think of other reasons as well. The point is that these are only excuses. None of them are really valid for putting off one of the most important financial plans anyone ever makes.

Every adult needs a will, if for no other reason than to officially close out your affairs and to make sure that whatever assets you have go where you want them to go. Perhaps

an even greater reason is to make life easier on the grieving loved ones you leave behind.

For those who ignore this crucial type of financial plan, West Virginia law will control and distribute the estate's assets in this way:

■ If you have had one or more children with your current spouse only, then your spouse will inherit 100 percent of your estate.

■ If you have had no children or none survive you, then 100 percent goes to your spouse.

■ If you have had children with your spouse and your spouse also has children from a previous marriage, then your children will inherit 40 percent of your estate and your spouse will receive 60 percent.

■ If you have had children in your current marriage and during previous marriages, 50 percent will be inherited by all of your children and 50 percent by your current spouse.

■ If you have no living spouse or living children, then your estate will be inherited by, in order of priority: Your

parents, your brothers and sisters, nephews and nieces, grandparents or their descendants, or the state of West Virginia. The first group in which there are living individuals will receive the estate's assets, and no one in later groups will receive anything.

In many respects, having a will prepared simplifies what happens to your estate.

Also completing medical and financial agreements to cover situations when you are unable to handle your own affairs is essential. Having that back-up authority permitting others to act in support of your needs is another vital step in providing the best results for all.

Think about it — planning takes very little time in relation to the opportunity to assure the outcome you feel is most important.

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# Choices to improve our communities

Many people appreciate the many ways charitable gift support benefits our communities and our quality of life. Whether a nonprofit organization is large, medium or small, it can grow and expand its programs and operations through charitable support.

But often the choice of ways to make a helpful gift can be confusing. Of course, the gift can be given directly to the nonprofit organization. Also, when a community foundation is available, is that a better alternative?

One of the major considerations is the purpose of the gift. If it will benefit one organization and carry out something specific to that organization, the organization itself is generally the best recipient. It can provide the most efficient handling of the gift and related services needed.

The exception would be when the nonprofit does not have a staff that can handle the gift administration needs well because of other program commitments. If so, then the community foun-

dation may be a better alternative. Especially when the gift you are considering is for a very small organization, such as a cemetery association, sending the funds to the community foundation generally permits more professional

investing and handling efforts. It makes sense to check with the nonprofit you want to benefit to see what their preference would be.

Also, when a gift can be used in a way that changes year to year or the

fund's terms allow the award recipient to select the nonprofit — such as a scholarship that allows the student to attend any college — a community foundation is a useful choice for handling that gift fund.

Whether the gift will be made directly to the nonprofit or to the community foundation, always check to be sure that the gift amount is appropriate for what you want to accomplish. The fund can be set up to be spent on a short-term basis or can be established to operate on a permanent basis — an endowment fund. A written agreement should be drawn up to assure that your choices will be fulfilled.

Community foundations have aided many in West Virginia. In this area, Your Community Foundation continues to grow and help residents support area nonprofits striving to carry out their vital programs.

Whether made directly to a nonprofit or to a community foundation, a supportive charitable gift can help improve our everyday world in truly important ways.

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# Former faculty members ensure their legacy at WVU

A solemn setting with lawyers and legal documents is probably what most people envision when thinking about a will. But for some, knowing their desires will be executed after they're gone is comforting.

That is how Robert Stitzel and Judith Gold-Stitzel approached creating their wills. For the former WVU professors, ensuring their loved ones would receive exactly what was intended for them was their first priority. However, they also wanted the guarantee that a part of their estate would go to the advancement and sustainment of specific WVU endeavors.

"We were looking at what we wanted to happen after we died, but the emphasis was really on life and how to make things happen for others," Gold-Stitzel said. "You do not have to think about dying or leaving something behind as an immediate thing—but you can look at what you want left behind in the future."

Stitzel, who passed away on Sept. 2,

2007, was an administrator, professor and scientist who serve the WVU community for 42 years. Toward the end of his career, he was the director of graduate education for WVU.

"He got to see there were some units at the university that did not receive the kind of external funds that are necessary for certain kinds of research," Gold-Stitzel said.

Robert's desire in life to assist doctoral students was the impetus behind his estate gift, which benefits doctoral students in the WVU School of Pharmacy, Eberly College of Arts and Sciences, Davis College of Agriculture, Natural Resources and Design and the College of Human Resources & Education. His gift financially assists doctoral students with travel, research and professional development outside of the classroom in hopes that it will benefit their growth educationally and professionally.

Michael Seminerio, a doctoral student at the WVU School of Pharmacy received \$1,000 from Robert Stitzel's award in 2010, which he used to travel to the International Drug Abuse Research Society conference in Istanbul.

"I was invited to give a podium speech and poster presentation on the pharmacological evaluation of an optimized sigma receptor ligand," he said. "The funds allowed me to travel and stay for ten days, during which time I met several scientists I had studied and read about, and I also received career advice and feedback on my research."

Gold-Stitzel, who retired from WVU in 1998, wanted to leave a legacy as well. As the first director of the WVU Center for Women's Studies, she wanted to connect her retirement with the center and the work they do.

"I was going to retire so I knew I would not be there on a day to day basis, so it made me think—that I don't know what could come [of the

center] in the future," she said. "My program, at that time was new enough that I wanted to do what I could to strengthen it beyond any one person's individual connection to it."

The Judith Gold-Stitzel Excellence in Women's Studies teaching fund provides support for WVU professors seeking to enhance their teaching skills and expertise in the women's studies area.

"Ideally, one way to do what I wanted to do for a program is to set up an endowment, so when you give a gift, whoever you give it to can use it immediately, but the goal is to build up funds," she said.

A larger amount will go into the endowment annually when her will goes into effect.

"Each year there is enough money to reward the work of a professor who is working toward long term goals in Women Studies," Gold-Stitzel said. "Right now, a person might get \$3,000 or \$4,000 in a given year that might send them to a conference, or to a special library; it supports them for what they have done, but it also allows them to do more."

She said she and her late husband felt it important to give to WVU, but Gold-Stitzel wants younger people to realize you do not have to be a millionaire or near death to leave a gift to the university, or anywhere.

"Our gifts are not the huge multimillion dollar gifts, I think sometimes people think they have to have huge amounts of money to start thinking about leaving a gift in their will," she said.

The WVU Foundation is in place to enrich the lives of those touched by WVU by maximizing private charitable support and providing services to the university and its affiliated organizations, according to Bill Nevin, the foundation's director of communications.

Whether you are a freshman or a wealthy alumnus, the foundation has various giving levels and there is no minimum requirement to make a gift to WVU, Nevin said.

"The people who helped us, the WVU foundation, do it with a great deal of understanding regarding your needs and the needs of the institution," Gold-Stitzel said. "They may have their own goals, but they know they need to help with yours— It is a good feeling to know that you can have your desires for the university heard."



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# Going beyond your will

As part of your overall estate plan, evaluating the accounts and assets that will benefit others through the contractual beneficiary on the account is important.

Consulting with your financial advisor about the use of such funds can lead to less income taxes being owed by your estate. Even though the majority of estates currently will not have an estate tax liability, most will have to pay income taxes. Minimizing them through better control of the transfer process and its timing is a worthwhile effort.

Retirement fund accounts, including IRAs, and life insurance and annuity policies have beneficiaries listed to show who will receive the funds after the owner's death. Often the beneficiary will be the person's estate as a default,

but anyone can be listed, including a favorite nonprofit organization.

To update the beneficiary on such accounts or policies at any time, the company's change of beneficiary form is all that is needed. Changing the beneficiary does not affect current use of the account or policy.

When a nonprofit is listed as the beneficiary, no income or estate taxes will be owed by the estate, allowing more funds to be available for other uses. That makes using retirement fund accounts the smartest choice for charitable gifts made through

your estate.

Having the transfer of these types of assets controlled by the beneficiary form can also lower estate administration costs. In West Virginia, the executor must charge a lower fee on this type of account if a specific recipient — a person or a nonprofit — is named than on the assets and accounts controlled by the terms of the will. Also, using the beneficiary form to handle the transfer of those assets generally means they will be transferred more quickly to the recipient because a simpler process is involved.

U.S. savings bonds are also assets that can benefit others through an estate gift. A family member or friend can be made the surviving beneficiary of one or more bonds with a form available on the Department of the Treasury internet site and at financial institutions where savings bonds are sold. The future beneficiary does not become a co-owner of the bond or have any control over it during the owner's lifetime. While Treasury Department regulations do not permit nonprofit organizations to be named as the surviving beneficiary on savings bonds, a gift provision included in a will — or a codicil to a will — can make a gift of the bonds work that way instead.

Understanding how different assets are controlled also can help you complete your estate plans more efficiently.

# The basics of making your will

A properly drawn will assures that a person's plans for the assets they have accumulated during their lifetime will be carried out and should simplify the administration of a deceased person's estate.

Many people avoid making a will because they are unwilling to face the question of death.

When a person dies without leaving a will, there is a chance of turmoil and conflict erupting among the deceased's loved ones. The family's grief is often made worse by disagreements among the heirs over the division of the estate.

A will is simply a legal document which sets forth clearly and legally the manner in which you want your property to be distributed following your death.

Since estate taxes are not a concern for most Americans currently, many think they will not need a will. But they are ignoring the important aspect of making sure that their hard-earned assets help those who deserve and need them most.

During 2011 and 2012, estates of less than \$5 million will not face federal estate taxes. Also, West Virginia does not have an estate tax. For married couples, if both spouses pass away during those two years, any of the \$5 million tax-free amount not used by the first spouse's estate can be applied to the other's.

## Who may make a will?

The maker of a will must be at least 18 years old, of sound mind, and free from improper influence.

## How should a will be made?

The will should be written, witnessed and signed strictly in accordance with West Virginia law. No beneficiary under the will or the beneficiary's spouse should act as a witness. It is important to have the testator's and witnesses' signatures attested by a notary public. Handwritten wills are recognized in many states, including West Virginia, if certain statutory requirements are strictly fulfilled.

## May a will be changed?

People may change their wills as often as they desire. Changes can be simply and easily made by drafting a new will or by the addition of an amendment called a "codicil." However, any change or codicil must comply with the same laws that pertain to the making of a will.

### How long is a will valid?

A properly drawn and executed will remains valid until it is changed or revoked. However, changes in circumstances after a will has been made, such as new tax laws, marriage, divorce, birth of children or grandchildren, or even a substantial change in the nature or amount of a person's estate, can affect the adequacy of the will or change the manner in which the estate will be distributed.

All changes in circumstances require a careful analysis and reconsideration of all the provisions in a will and may make it advisable to change the will or conform to the new situation.

It is a good idea to review your will at least every four or five years to be sure it is still appropriate.

### Does a will increase expenses at death?

No. It usually costs less to administer an estate when a person leaves a will than when the person does not.

A properly drafted will may reduce the expense of administration in a number of ways. For example, posting bond by the executor can be avoided and provisions can be placed in wills which take full advantage of the "marital deduction" allowed under the federal and state tax laws.

### How large an estate is necessary to justify a will?

Everyone who owns any real or personal property should have a will, regardless of the present amount of the estate. Your estate grows daily in value through the repayment of mortgages, appreciation of real estate, stocks and other securities, inheritances from relatives and other factors.

### May a person dispose of property in any way?

Almost, but not quite. For example, a married person cannot completely exclude a spouse. Also, insurance proceeds, retirement funds, and jointly owned property are examples of assets that usually are controlled independently of a will.

### What happens when you don't make a will?

When a person dies without a will, or dies "intestate" as the law calls it, the property of the deceased is distributed according to a formula fixed by law. In other words, if you don't make a will, you don't have any say as to how your property will be distributed.

For example, if a person dies without a will, West Virginia's intestacy statute, like those of other states, first looks to a surviving spouse as a recipient. The share to the surviving spouse will be 50 percent, 60 percent, or 100 percent of the deceased person's estate, depending upon whether the decedent and/or the surviving spouse have children by that or a prior marriage. Any portion of the estate not passing on to a surviving spouse goes to the decedent's surviving children. If no such descendants exist, the property will pass to the first of the following groups in which living individuals exist: The deceased person's parents, brothers and sisters, nieces and nephews, grandparents, aunts and uncles or cousins.

Also, no specific gifts to individuals and others, including your favorite charitable organizations, can be made without a will.

Most importantly, relatives do not automatically receive custody of children who do not have a surviving parent. Your will should specify the individuals you would like to designate as guardians of your children.

### Who will manage your estate?

If you make a Will, you may name the person you want to manage the administration of your estate. If you do not make a will, then the court will appoint someone, whom you may or may not know, to handle the affairs of your estate.

### Does a will avoid estate taxes?

A properly drafted will may reduce the amount of taxes that have to be paid. Many wills written without consideration of recent federal and state tax laws should be re-examined with reference to tax problems.

### What happens to property held in the names of both spouses?

Joint bank accounts and real property held in the names of both husband and wife with rights of survivorship usually pass to the survivor by law and not by the terms of the deceased's will. If the property is owned as tenants in common, one-half of it will be transferred by will at the owner's death.

There are many cases, however, in which it is not to your advantage to hold property as joint owners.

### Is a life insurance program a substitute for a will?

No. Life insurance is only one kind of property a person may own. If a life insurance policy is payable to an individual or nonprofit organization, the will of the insured has no effect on the proceeds. If the policy is payable to the estate of the insured, the payment of the proceeds may be directed by a will. The careful person will have a lawyer and a life insurance counselor work together on a life insurance program, particularly in the area of estate planning.

### Who should draft a will?

The drafting and signing of a will is a delicate operation and must be done in accordance with the requirements of state law where you reside — your "legal domicile." It requires professional judgment which can only be developed through years of legal training and study of your particular situation. It is a crucial way to protect all that you've worked so hard to earn. Therefore, it is highly recommended that you have an experienced attorney draft your will.

### Can I prepare my own will?

While a person is free to prepare his or her own will by consulting free or purchased resources about wills or using pre-printed forms, this is a complex area of the law. Without a legal background, it is difficult to determine whether the information or forms will adequately meet your needs and provide the least administrative costs and taxes overall. You may not follow the directions appropriately, and the will could fail to qualify as a valid legal document. By choosing a "free" option now, your family may be forced to spend a great deal of money later to clear things up that would have been handled appropriately in the will prepared by a competent lawyer.



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
