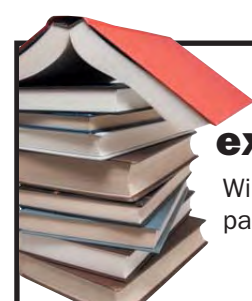

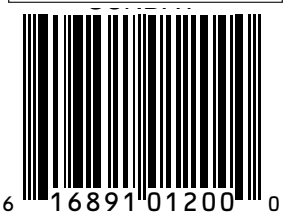

Suspect arrested

Man accused of Oct. shooting at Star City bar

After a six-month manhunt, law enforcement officers apprehended the man they believe to be responsible for a shooting death outside a Star City nightclub.

Jamie Jones, aka "Flame" or "Torch," was taken into custody

by U.S. marshals on the roof of a Fairmont house at about noon Saturday.

Jones, 19, was wanted for first-degree murder for the shooting of Walter-Vincent Samuel Hill Jr., of Southfield, Mich., in October. Hill was shot in the abdomen outside of Zens Bar & Lounge in Star City. He was taken to Ruby Memorial Hospital, where he later died.

U.S. marshals arrested Jones at a residence on Walnut Avenue. Supervisory Deputy U.S. Marshal

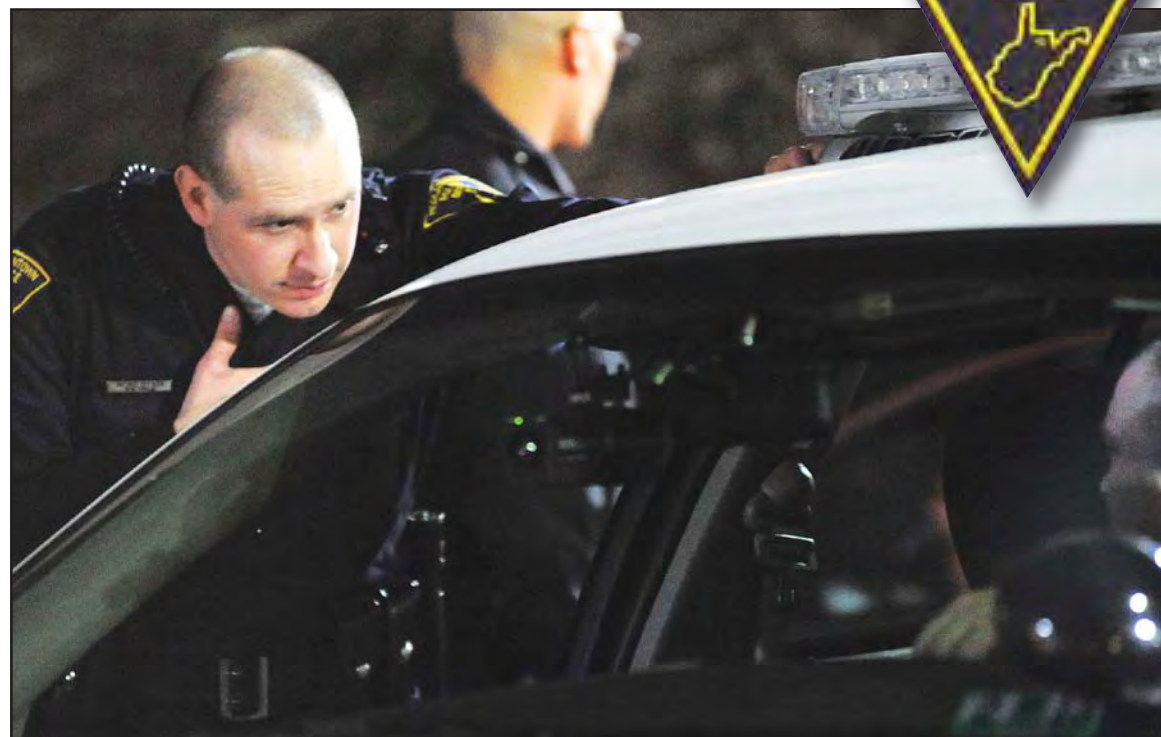
Alex Neville said 12 officers surrounded the house because they were sure Jones would attempt to escape. U.S. marshal deputies, members of the U.S. Marshals Service Task Force, officers from the Fairmont Police Department and a West Virginia State trooper were part of the arrest.

Officers caught up to Jones as he attempted to flee out a second-story window, handcuffing him on the roof of the house. Neville said no weapons were found on Jones or in the residence.

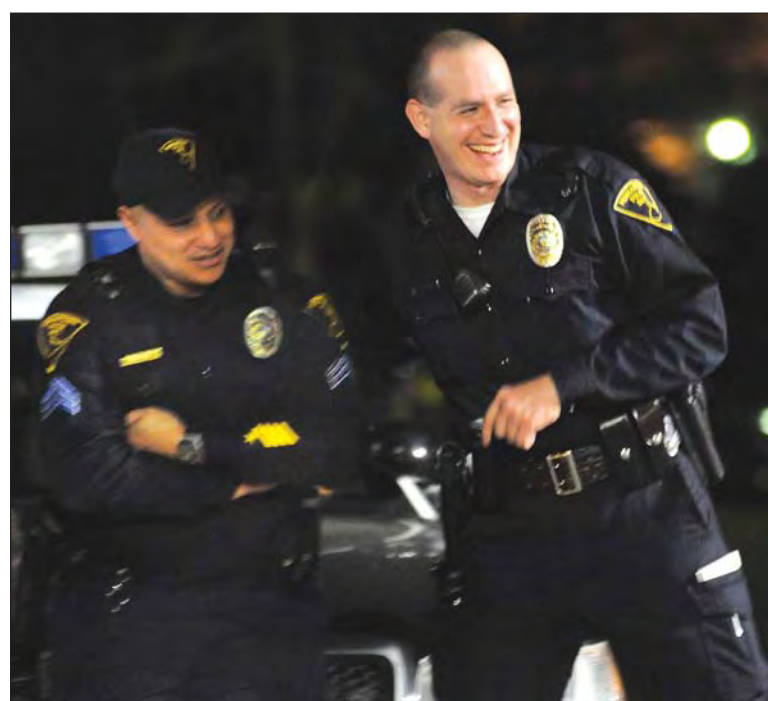

It's 11 p.m.

While most people are hitting the town or settling in for the night, Patrolman Brandon Viola is just beginning his shift at the Morgantown Police Department.

Viola covers zone 20, which includes downtown, 1st Ward, Greenmont, South Park and the Wharf District. About 10 officers work the midnight shift on weekends, but only three are assigned to specific zones — zone 10 includes Sunnyside and Suncrest, while zone 30 spans Sabraton.

Judge: EPA veto of W.Va. mine permit overreached

The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) exceeded its authority last year in revoking water pollution permits that another agency had issued for one of West Virginia's largest mountaintop removal coal mines, a federal judge in Washington, D.C., ruled Friday.

In siding with St. Louis-based Arch Coal, U.S. District Judge Amy Berman Jackson declared the permits were valid. The U.S. Army Corps of Engineers had issued the permits for the 2,300-acre Spruce

No. 1 mine in Logan County.

Arch spokeswoman Kim Link said the company was pleased with the decision. So, too, was the West Virginia Coal Association, which applauded the court "for taking EPA to task for overstepping its authority in order to wage a regulatory war on the West Virginia coal industry."

Vice President Jason Bostic said the EPA "employed magical thinking" to obtain a result the judge declared "illogical and impractical."

"The judge accurately equat-

ed EPA's actions to that of a 'disappointed player's threat to take his ball and go home when he didn't get to pitch,' " he said.

The EPA said the agency and the Department of Justice are reviewing the decision, which "does not affect the EPA's commitment to protect the health of Appalachian communities that depend on clean water."

The EPA in January 2011 used its veto power for only the 13th time since 1972 to overturn a permit the corps had issued under the federal Clean Water Act.

Survey eyes downtown truck traffic

The city's Traffic Commission is hosting an online survey to find out how the public feels about truck traffic in downtown Morgantown.

Andrea Soccorsi, who represents the 6th Ward on the Traffic Commission, said the commission does not intend to ban trucks from the city.

"We want to assess the public perception of the volume of truck traffic in the downtown area," she said.

The Traffic Commission is one of the City Council's advisory boards. The commission can pass resolutions or make recommendations to council, but can't pass laws on its own.

Soccorsi said she prepared the survey at the commission's request.

The survey was posted online Thursday night, she said, and will be available until the end of April.

Statements about truck traffic — such as "The volume of truck traf-

Kazakhstan angry spoof anthem played at event

MOSCOW — Kazakhstan has called the playing of a spoof of its national anthem at an international sporting event "a scandal" and demanded an investigation of the incident.

Maria Dmitrienko won a gold medal for Kazakhstan on Thursday at the Arab Shooting Championships, in Kuwait, but during the award ceremony the public address system broadcast the spoof anthem from the 2006 movie "Borat," which offended many Kazakhs by portraying the country as degenerate.

Foreign Ministry spokesman Ilyas Omarov told the ITAR-Tass news agency the incident "is, of course, a scandal and demands a thorough investigation, which we intend to conduct."

St. Pat's Day fires lead to arrests

The big news this past week was the big party on the fringes of the WVU campus, celebrating sunshine and St. Patrick's Day. People began filtering into town from other areas on March 16, Morgantown Police Chief Ed Preston said, so he beefed up police presence in areas known for partying. Morgantown Fire Chief Mark Caravaso had his equipment on alert, and city street crews stood by in key locations, Preston said. On Monday, police and fire officials said there had been at least 10 arrests, more than 100 citations issued — including four for malicious burning — and 35 fires.

"This was one of those weekends where we had fantastic weather, St. Patrick's Day and a lot of people from out of town who were on spring break," Preston said. On Monday, police were back in the party areas — Sunnyside, North Spruce, North High, Price and Prospect streets — issuing tickets to students who failed to clean up the trash after their parties.

Capt. Ken Tennant, of the Morgantown Fire Department, said one of the 35 fires was outside the party area. It was on Kingwood Street, in a damaged semi trailer parked at Ervin's Towing. Radiant heat from that fire melted siding on an adjacent building. That fire was ruled

an arson.

Ex-WVU student charged with ID theft

A former WVU student is among 19 people in nine states facing federal racketeering charges for his suspected involvement in a Las Vegas-based criminal organization that bought and sold personal and financial information online. Edward Montecalvo, 20, was arrested in Morgantown by U.S. Secret Service agents. Information about his arrest was not provided to *The Dominion Post* until late Monday, though inquiries about the arrest were made the previous Friday.

Federal authorities said he is named in four counts of a 50-page indictment issued in January by a Nevada grand jury. Montecalvo was released to his father's custody Monday and placed on home confinement at his father's Charlottesville, Va., home. He is prohibited from possessing or using a computer or any other device capable of accessing the Internet as a condition of his release.

Special instrument used in search The search for a missing Morgantown man who disappeared while fishing in the Monongahela River at the Star City dock took an underwater turn last weekend.

The Granville Volunteer Fire Department tested a new piece of equipment in the continuing search for Fred McCauley, 62, who went missing recently. Granville VFD Chief Butch Renner said they tested their new VideoRay in the search March 17. The small submersible robotic vehicle is operated from above water and can go as far as 131 feet underwater.

"It's just like a submarine, except it has a camera," Renner said. The unit, bought for about \$10,000 with annual town funding, worked very well, allowing them to see underwater fairly clearly despite murky conditions, he said. Emergency responders are almost certain that McCauley fell into the Monongahela River that afternoon. The intensive search has been reduced to daily walks of the riverbank until McCauley was sighted or they had something else to go on.

Preston officials want new school Preston County school officials want to build a new pre-kindergarten to eighth-grade school in western Preston, and last week they went to the West Virginia School Building Authority (SBA) to ask for help. On Tuesday, School Superintendent Larry Parsons and Board of Education President Kathy McNeill asked the SBA for \$8 million to go with money from a county

school bond to replace four middle schools. The \$13.3 million West Preston school would be in Arthurdale, next to Valley Elementary, and replace both West and Valley. Projects replacing the existing Kingwood, Terra Alta and Tunnelton schools also will receive SBA money. The four schools are all in old high schools. In 2010, Preston County voters approved a \$39.6 million bond to build four new schools and upgrade the rest. The SBA has already approved \$8 million each for new schools in South and Central.

Road crews deal with unused salt All that warm winter weather has been a boon to highway officials, who haven't had to worry about how snow removal costs would affect their budgets and salt/cinder supplies. Morgantown only used about 100 tons of salt to clear city streets and sidewalks this winter, Assistant City Engineer Damien Davis said — there are more than 1,900 tons left for next winter.

Statewide, the Division of Highways used just over \$25 million of its \$57.7 million budget for snow removal, according to Brent Walker, DOH spokesman. In Preston County, a bit less than half of the \$24.4 million budget was used; in Monongalia County, just over \$400,000 of the \$1.4 million budget was used.

Cloudy skies delay launch

ATLANTIC, Va. — The launch of five sub-orbital rockets from Virginia's coast is being rescheduled again. NASA said in a news release Saturday evening that it will attempt the launch between 12 a.m. and 5 a.m. Tuesday. NASA has had to cancel the launch several days in a row due to bad weather. Cloudy skies at three viewing sites in Virginia, New Jersey and North Carolina have forced the agency to postpone the launch. The launch requires clear skies. The rockets are part of a study of the jet stream. They will release a chemical tracer that will form white clouds that allow scientists and the public to visualize the winds.

Suit alleges new abuses at school WICHITA, Kan. — A California boy attends only four days at a Kansas military boarding school where he is tormented by staff and students after breaking both his legs in separate incidents. A Tennessee student's stomach is forcibly branded as a rite of initiation. A Florida cadet breaks his hand fending off a student with a history of sexual abuse who tries to grope him, and school officials refuse to investigate or inform his parents of the attack. These claims are the latest additions to a growing list of former cadets who allege in a federal lawsuit they were abused at St. John's Military School in Salina, Kan. An amended complaint filed Friday in federal court in Kansas City, Kan., now includes six sets of named parents who have filed on behalf of cadets, plus one ex-cadet who is now an adult. The plaintiffs come from California, Florida, Tennessee, Colorado, Texas and Illinois. St. John's has settled nine previous abuse-related lawsuits filed since 2006, court records show.

said he was relieved when he got word that Jones had been arrested. "We worked on that [case] every day," he said.

Officers narrowly missed apprehending Jones in Princeton, Va., about two weeks ago, Propst said. He added they only missed him by about an hour. Neville said that anytime they narrowly miss a suspect, it is a disappointment, especially if the suspect is armed and dangerous. "We didn't stop," Neville said, adding that the narrow miss in Virginia only made the team more determined to track Jones down. In December, the U.S. Marshals received intelligence that Jones fled the Fairmont area and was likely staying in Fayette or Mercer counties. Shortly before the arrest attempt in Virginia, Jones relocated to Weirton, according to the U.S. Marshals. He returned to Fairmont last week and was planning to flee to Milwaukee.

Bond information was not available as of press time. Propst said Jones won't appear before a Monongalia County magistrate until after the weekend. If convicted of first-degree murder, Jones faces life in prison.

Pair planned to copy jail key for escape

NASHVILLE, Tenn. — Two men, including a former correctional officer, planned to make a copy of a prison key in a plot to free Tennessee's only female death row inmate, according to an indictment. Donald Joseph Kohut and Justin Wesley Heflin were arrested this week in what authorities said was a foiled plot to break out Christa Gail Pike, who has been on death row since 1996 for the slaying of a Knoxville Job Corps student.

The unsealed indictment says in January, Kohut and Heflin, who worked as a guard at the Tennessee Prison for Women where the 36-year-old Pike is held, arranged to trace a prison key and have it copied to be used in the escape attempt. The Tennessee Bureau of Investigation (TBI) has said an escape was not imminent and investigators found out about the plot early. Tennessee Department of Correction (TDOC) spokeswoman Cindy Dunning declined to answer questions about whether any keys had been copied. "The details of the investigation, especially those pertaining to internal

processes and security procedures of the prison, are not being disclosed in order to maintain not only the integrity of the investigation but the security of the institution," she said in an email. Kohut, 34, of Flemington, NJ, was arrested on Tuesday at his home and has waived extradition. He is expected to be brought to Tennessee within about 10 days. Pike, originally from West Virginia, was sentenced to death in 1996 for the slaying of a fellow Knoxville Job Corps student. Colleen Slemmer, 18, was stabbed and beaten by Pike and Tadarly Shipp, Pike's boyfriend at the time, on the University of Tennessee's agricultural campus in January 1995. Prosecutors have said the motive for the slaying was a love triangle with the two women and Shipp, who was sentenced to life in prison. The two carved a pentagram into Slemmer's chest, and investigators claimed Pike, who was 18 at the time, took

a piece of the victim's skull for a souvenir. The indictment doesn't reveal much about Kohut, who works as a personal trainer in New Jersey, but he was apparently very close to Pike. According to Dunning, Kohut visited her at the women's prison in Nashville 26 times between July and January. Bill Deni, Kohut's attorney in New Jersey, said Kohut didn't make a statement to police after his arrest on Tuesday, but has been cooperating with authorities. Deni said Kohut will retain a different attorney to represent him in Tennessee, but said Kohut is eager to be sent to Tennessee to address the charges against him. He is being held at the Hunterdon County Jail waiting for Tennessee law enforcement to pick him up. Deni said he did not discuss the merits of the charges against him, which include bribery and conspiracy to commit escape. "He was a gentleman from the time I spoke with him on the phone," Deni said of Kohut. "He's well respected by the personnel at the jail." TBI spokeswoman Kristin Helm said Kohut became acquainted with Heflin during his many visits to the jail and

bribed him with gifts like a Gibson guitar and a canoe, which Heflin sold for cash. Heflin was hired by TDOC in 2009 and terminated early this month. His father, Johnny Heflin, has said he has never gotten in trouble before his arrest. Heflin, who was living in Chattanooga, turned himself in to police on charges of bribery, misconduct, conspiracy to commit escape and facilitation to commit escape. He is being held in prison in Nashville and is being housed alone for his protection. Pike, who could also face charges related to the escape, is currently being held in segregation. While on death row, she has been allowed visitors, but is not allowed physical contact and speaks with her visitors through glass. She is allowed also to receive calls while in jail and her mail is searched for contraband, but TDOC does not track or log inmate mail. This isn't the first time that Pike has gotten into trouble while in prison. In 2001 Pike nearly choked inmate Patricia Jones to death with a shoe string. She was convicted of attempted first-degree murder on Aug. 12, 2004, and received an additional 25-year sentence.

fic presents a danger to pedestrians" or "The volume of truck traffic creates hazardous road conditions in the form of potholes and deterioration of pavement" — are included in the survey.

People are asked to rate the statement, from 1-5 — 1 being "Strongly Agree" and 5 being "Strongly Disagree." People are also asked about how often they walk or bike in Morgantown.

Soccorsi said she wrote the questions based on some concerns she heard from city residents.

When asked if she thought the questions were biased, she said that wasn't the intent but "I suppose with any survey someone could argue there's some level of bias."

She said she hopes people read the questions and answer them honestly. "We may find out people don't perceive there's a problem there."

The Dominion Post

attempted to contact some local trucking companies, concrete haulers and bar and restaurant suppliers for comment late Friday, but was unsuccessful.

Traffic Commission Chairman Roy Nutter said the commission had been discussing a survey since last fall, in hopes of gathering more data about what people who live and work in the area think about the truck traffic in downtown Morgantown.

He said Friday he wasn't aware the survey was posted for the public yet, though commission members had reviewed the questions.

He hoped people didn't think the survey was biased, he said.

Soccorsi said Friday she had only sent links to the survey to neighborhood association presidents and Traffic Commission members, so far.

The survey results will be presented to the Traffic Commission and City Council — possibly in May, she said.

DOH to study I-68, 79 interchange

Expressing a concern over the number of accidents, the state's Division of Highways (DOH) plans on looking at ways to make the Interstate 68 and 79 interchange safer.

The DOH scheduled a road safety audit for the interchange sometime in April, spokeswoman Carrie Bly said.

Engineers will spend two days looking at the grade and speeds along the inter-

change.

She said officials are aware of the number of wrecks on that stretch.

She said it was those concerns that led to the audit.

Earlier this year, *The Dominion Post* reported that there had been 78 accidents in the area from the beginning of 2008 through the end of 2010.

That averages to 26 wrecks a year, or one every other week.

Once the audit is done,

the division will come up with some short- and long-term solutions to address the problems at the interchange, Bly said.

Bly said a majority of the wrecks in that stretch involve tractor-trailers. Another major factor in the wrecks is excessive speed.

Some solutions could focus on ways to slow down traffic, such as more signage or other measures, Bly said.

In a Facebook post, Sen.

Robert Beach, D-Monongalia, said he had the chance to meet with DOH officials to discuss the interchange.

"At my urging, the DOH agreed to conduct a 90 day evaluation of accident data, roadway geometry, traffic conditions and control devices," Beach wrote.

He also wrote the DOH will inform him of their plan once the audit is complete.

Beach did not return phone calls in time for this report.

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6 kids, 2 adults killed in Charleston house fire

CHARLESTON — Eight people, including a woman celebrating her 26th birthday and six young children at a family slumber party, died Saturday when fire tore through a two-story home while they slept, officials and witnesses said.

A seventh child was on life support after the blaze, the deadliest in West Virginia's capital city in more than 60 years, Charleston Mayor Danny Jones said. The dead children ranged from 18 months to 8.

The cause was under investigation. The fire appeared to have started on the first floor of the home, Charleston Assistant Fire Chief Bob Sharp said. Jones said the home had one working smoke detector on the bottom floor, but it was on a

counter and wasn't properly mounted to a ceiling. Another was found in a basement area but didn't work.

Sharp said two of those killed were adults and all of the children who died were younger than 8. Ten people were in the house at the time of the fire — about 3:30 a.m. Jones said Alisha Carter-Camp was among those killed. Neighbors said a family birthday party was held in her honor at the home Friday.

Four of the victims were 3 years old; Jeremiah Camp, Elijah Scott and two children who were only identified by their first name. The others killed included Keahna Camp, 8, Emanuel Jones, 18 months and Alex Seal, an adult whose age wasn't available.

Bryan Timothy Camp, 7, was hospitalized in critical condition. Authorities weren't

sure how the victims were all related and how many lived full-time in the home.

"We have reason to believe that a lot of the people stayed in the house more than one night and maybe on a weekly basis," Jones said. "These people may have had residences in other places, but a lot of people lived in this house. They were not just there for that one night."

Roxie Means and her 14-year-old daughter, Cassie, attended a birthday party Friday for Carter-Camp, a hotel worker whose 26th birthday was Saturday. A manager at the Holiday Inn Express Charleston Civic Center said he was told Saturday that Carter-Camp had been killed.

Carter-Camp and her two children were staying with her sister at the home, Roxie Means said.

Mystery lingers around girl missing 6 months

The mother of a 3-year-old girl who vanished from her West Virginia home six months ago Saturday believes that her daughter is still alive and prays daily for her safe return, her attorney said Friday.

Lena Lunsford doesn't know what happened to daughter Aliyah or where she is, but Mike Woelfel said she refuses to give up hope and continues to cooperate with investigators.

"Lena is convinced that no blood relative of Aliyah knows what has happened to her. Nor was she involved in any way with her disappearance," he told The Associated Press.

Asked whether Lunsford believes a non-blood relative may have been involved, Woelfel said only, "She doesn't know what has happened to Aliyah."

She has, however, recently filed for divorce from her husband, Ralph Keith Lunsford. She's been living with her mother for months under a judge's order and is awaiting sentencing for federal welfare fraud. But the lawyer said Lena's mother died about two weeks ago.

Aliyah vanished from her Lewis County home near Bendale on Sept. 24, and there has been no sign of her since.

Authorities have said they are treating Aliyah's disappearance as a crime, but they've named no suspects, made no arrests and refused to say what they think happened.

FBI spokesman Bill Crowley would not comment on the investigation. He said the FBI will likely hold a press conference this week to bring the public up to date.

Panel faults MSHA for 2010 mine explosion

CHARLESTON — The federal Mine Safety and Health Administration (MSHA) could have prevented or reduced the likelihood of an April 2010 explosion in southern West Virginia that killed 29 miners, according to a report by a team of experts released Friday.

The independent team was appointed by Labor Secretary Hilda Solis and the National Institute for Occupational Safety and Health a month after the explosion to examine MSHA's internal review of its actions at the Upper Big Branch mine. The explosion was the worst U.S. coal mining disaster in 40 years.

The report says if MSHA had done timely enforcement of laws and regulations prior to the explosion, "it would have

lessened the chances of — and possibly could have prevented" the explosion.

Boy Scout compound gets lawmaker help

CHARLESTON — West Virginia's huge new Boy Scouts adventure camp stands to benefit from the recent legislative session. Lawmakers unanimously passed four bills to help the Summit Bechtel Family National Scout Reserve.

But an additional measure, proposed to allow outside groups to lease the tax-exempt Summit, did not emerge before the session ended March 10.

Requiring voters to amend the state constitution, the proposal is slated for additional study by lawmakers.

The 10,600-acre complex in Fayette and Raleigh counties next year will become the permanent home of the national Scout jamboree, a multi-day event that draws about 40,000 scouts from across

the country. It will also host the 2019 World Jamboree, marking that event's first return to the U.S. in more than 50 years.

One bill passed this session will exempt construction materials from sales taxes as contractors develop the Summit's array of venues. Plans call for rock climbing walls, a skateboard park and an arena that can seat up to 80,000 people, among other features.

Ex-Mason deputy claims prejudice

CHARLESTON — A former deputy with the Mason County Sheriff's Department said he was forced to resign because of racial prejudice.

Eric J. Lynch, of Nitro, filed a wrongful termination lawsuit in Kanawha County Circuit Court.

Mason County Commission President Ricky Handley told a newspaper that he found it difficult to understand how some-

one who pleaded guilty to fraudulent use of a county credit card could say his termination was racially motivated.

Court records show Lynch was fined \$2,500 by Circuit Court Judge David Nibert.

Parkersburg mayor: Privatize building

PARKERSBURG — Parkersburg's mayor wants the federal building in his city to be sold to private business owners.

Mayor Bob Newell said that if the property can't be sold, it should be given to the Wood County Development Authority to create a business park.

Newell wants the building to be sold following a declining federal presence in the city. The suggestion was made after the recent announcement that the postal center in the building would be closed and that the city's federal courtroom could also be closed.

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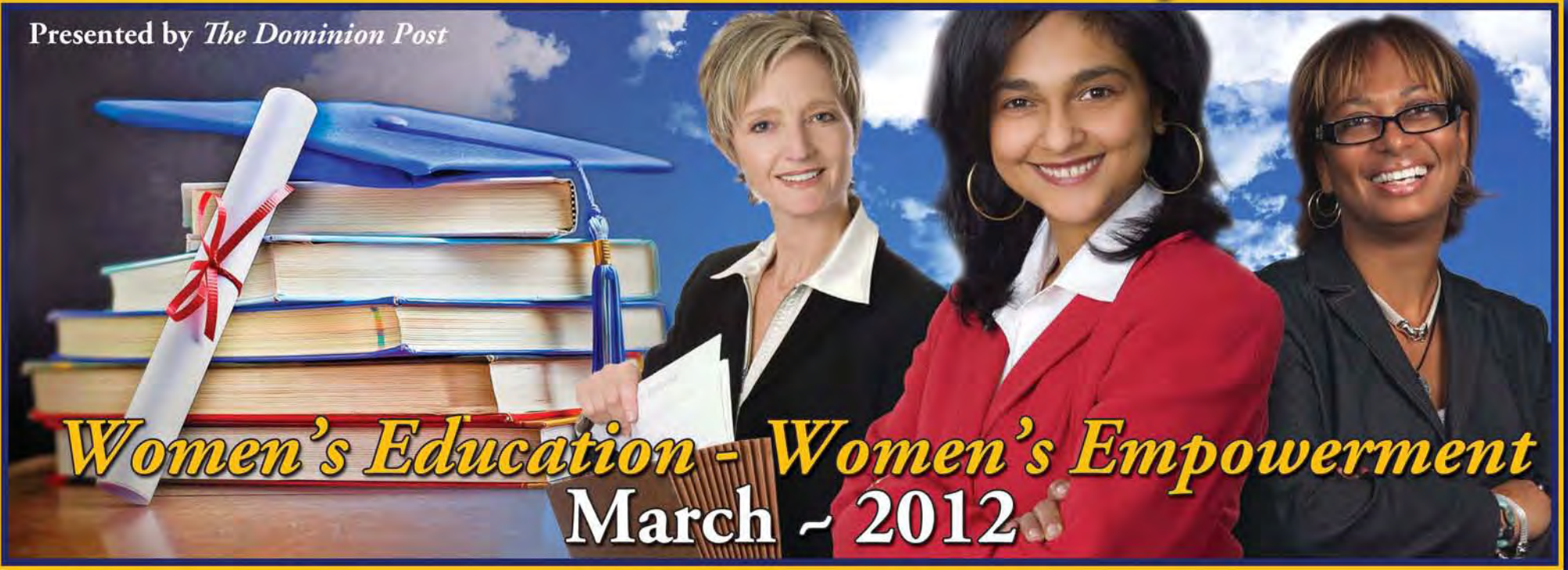

throughout the city as needed, based on seniority. The most junior officers are called out first, unless they're busy with another call.

Viola graduated from the State Police Academy in December 2010 and was the most junior officer on the force until Patrolman John Giblin graduated in December 2011.

He spends most of his time downtown, but his supervisor, 1st Sgt. Matt Solomon, advises him to respond to other areas, if possible, before heading out with *The Dominion Post*.

"Maybe Brandon will get to leave downtown," Officer Molly Linthicum jokes during a pre-shift meeting. Viola's co-workers also tease him about his hair, which was dyed a cartoonish blond shade for Halloween.

Viola, who's calm and easy-going, just smiles. He later adds a cap to his uniform.

The Dominion Post accompanied Viola on patrol Nov. 5-6, the night before the WVU football team's home game against Louisville. It was a quiet night, but Viola kept busy with a variety of calls, including a possible burglary, loud party and stolen credit card.

Viola, 30, has a bachelor's degree in biology and previously worked for an environmental consulting company. He saw Morgantown was testing for new officers at a time when he realized he didn't really enjoy his job and decided to give it a shot.

"It's hard to put my finger on it," he says when asked why he wanted to become a cop. "It's just kind of one of those things I always wanted to do."

11:17 p.m.

Lines are beginning to form at a few bars as Viola leaves the Public Safety Building, cruises up Spruce Street and heads down High Street. "I like to see what the night's looking like," he says. "Sometimes you can get a feel for where your problem spots are going to be."

Temperatures have dipped into the 20s, but Viola keeps his window cracked to hear what's going on outside.

11:34 p.m.

Viola stops on Pleasant Street, near Glow Beauty Lounge, to question five college-aged guys he sees causing a ruckus on the sidewalk. "What's all the yelling for?" he asks.

The men immediately freeze. "Sorry, we were just yelling," one says. "We'll stop."

As Viola heads back up Spruce Street, he slows to watch a car traveling toward Walnut Street with a plastic bag underneath. The driver pulls over next to the law offices of Angotti and Straface to remove it.

"It's amazing the dumb things people do when a cop is watching," Viola says.

11:44 p.m.

Viola whips down Chancery Row when another officer calls for assistance on Grant Avenue. Traffic is backed up, so Viola leaves his cruiser running in the road and jogs toward Summit Hall.

Across the street, Officer Joseph Patterson has detained two men for fighting. Viola takes information from the victim as one of the two men in handcuffs begins talking.

"I don't know why we were jumped, and they were let go," he says, referring to the victim and his friends. "We'll go home and go to sleep. We'll go right to sleep."

"Stop talking," his handcuffed friend says. "The more talking you do, the more trouble you're going to be in."

The crowd begins to disperse a few moments later, as both men are escorted to the prisoner transport van parked ahead of Viola's cruiser in the street.

12:08 a.m.

Viola returns to his cruiser and heads toward Bartlett House, along with Monongalia EMS. The shelter won't let people stay with a blood alcohol content above .30, and someone just blew a .341, more

than four times the legal driving limit.

He's gone by the time Viola arrives, however. EMS workers say he refused transport and left on foot.

12:23 a.m.

Viola says it's "unusually quiet" as he circles back through downtown. A few minutes later, he's dispatched to a disturbance on East Brockway Avenue.

A couple have a man cornered in their trailer, according to MECCA 911, but police find nothing when they arrive.

Linthicum and another officer responded to a call at the same trailer earlier in the evening. At that time, the occupants said a man was in the woods outside the house, and they now say the same man is "in their couch," Viola says.

Linthicum plans to contact Child Protective Services with concerns about a child living at the house.

12:41 a.m.

A Dumpster fire is reported on Pennsylvania Avenue as Viola heads back to the station for a runaway juvenile report. A man says his 17-year-old daughter took her grandmother's SUV, but Viola is unable to help him, as the incident occurred in the Chaplin Hill area, outside his jurisdiction. He advises the man to contact the Granville Police Department or Monongalia County Sheriff's Department.

While he's at the station, Viola calls a man who reported a missing vehicle about an hour earlier. Viola expected the vehicle to turn up at one of the towing companies, but it hasn't.

The car, a Nissan Sentra, was parked behind the Shell station on University Avenue. Viola goes there and uses his cruiser's exterior light to check the area, but finds nothing.

"Looks like we're not going to find it tonight," Viola says.

The owner calls dispatch less than 30 minutes later to say a friend borrowed the car without telling him.

1:23 a.m.

As Viola heads back down High Street, a man crossing the street near BB&T hits the back of the cruiser with his hand. Viola immediately shifts the vehicle into park and jumps out. "Someone needs yelled at," he says.

He chases the man across the street and catches him near Casa D'Amici. "That's how people get themselves into trouble," Viola says when he returns.

Viola asks the man to call a friend to come pick him up. He rambles as Viola writes him a ticket for public intoxication, saying he'll be "screwed" if he gets a ticket, he's "100 percent sorry," and "Morgantown cops are awesome," among other things.

"I feel so dumb," he says at one point.

"Well, it was a dumb thing to do," Viola responds.

Viola later says it's sometimes hard not to laugh at people's drunken antics, but he avoids doing so because it tends to make people angry.

1:47 a.m.

Viola circles downtown again on his way to a loud party complaint on Beech Street. He spots people on a back patio and asks a resident to step out front. A friend tries to intervene, saying, "Please don't get him in trouble," but the resident apologizes and promises to stay indoors.

Two fights are reported downtown in the meantime. "That's why everybody wants to move up," Viola says. "You get to go to the more interesting stuff."

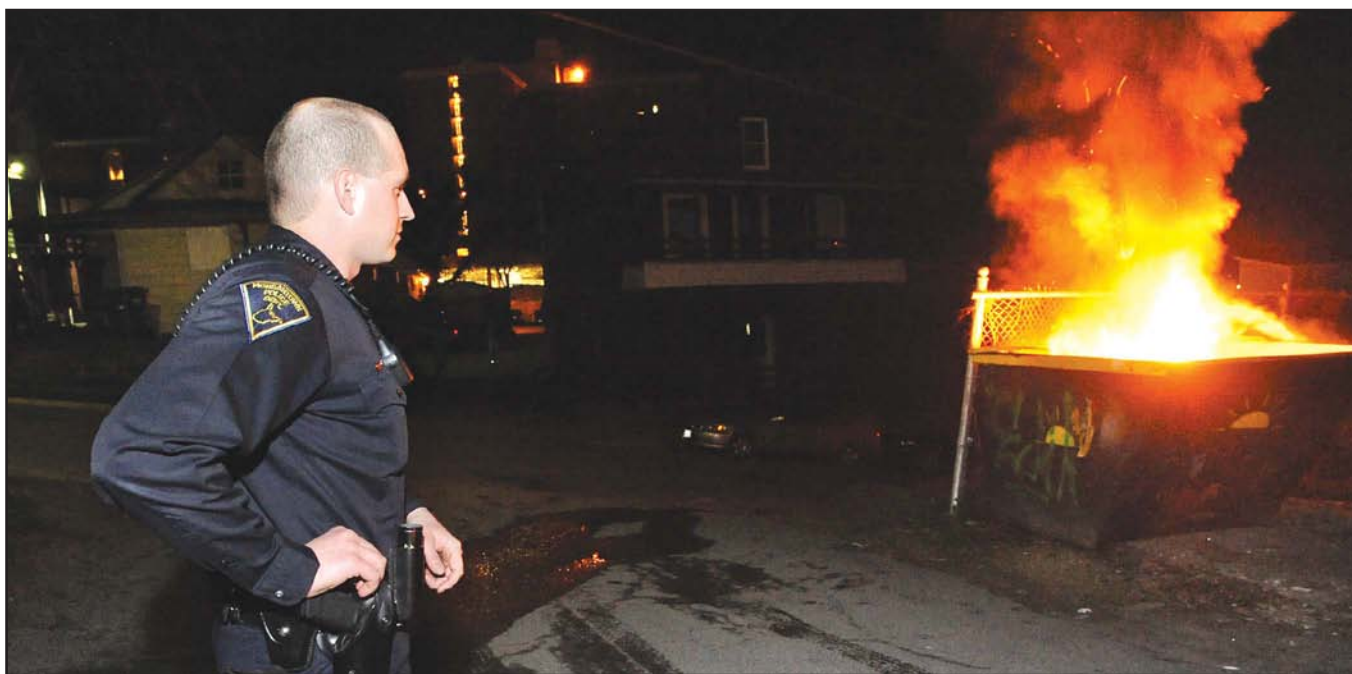
1:58 a.m.

Viola meets Patterson on High Street to get his handcuffs, which Patterson borrowed for the arrests on Grant Avenue. Patterson says the man who wanted to go to sleep was difficult during processing and asks how the night is going.

Viola says it's been slow. "I don't know if it's just too cold or people are waiting for tomorrow's game," he says.

2:40 a.m.

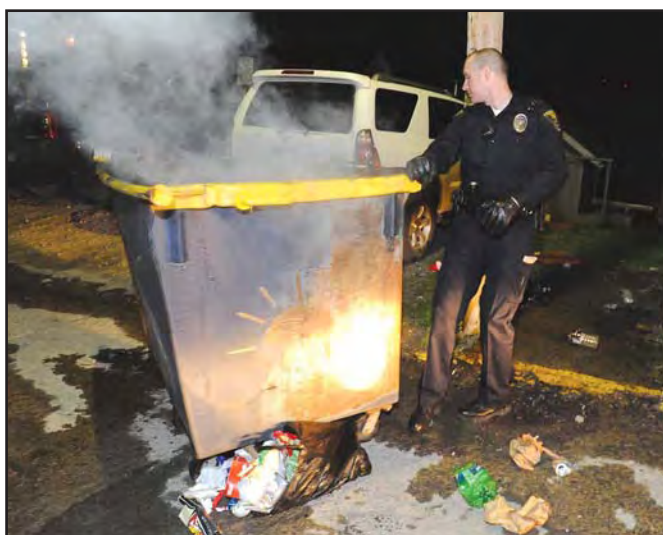
Viola is dispatched to the same loud party on Beech



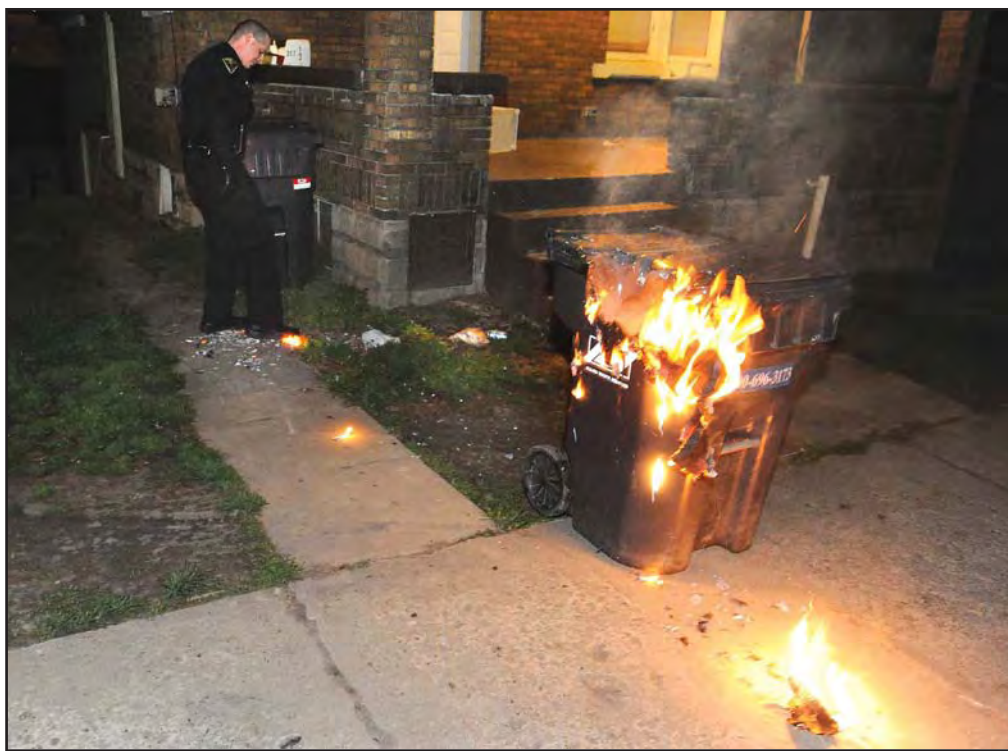

Street, where he issues the resident a ticket for loud noise.

"We can't keep coming out here," Viola says. "You're disturbing your neighbors."

The resident is understanding. "It's definitely time to break up the party," he says. "I promise you this will not happen again."

3:12 a.m.

After Viola circles downtown for a while, Officer Aaron Dull calls for backup at a traffic stop on Monongahela Boulevard. He pulled over a van with four people inside that he said "reeked of marijuana."

Viola saw the same van driving downtown earlier without its headlights on, but he was unable to pull it over because of its direction of travel and the traffic configuration.

All four occupants are removed from the vehicle, searched and questioned, two by Viola. Only the driver is ultimately cited for possession of marijuana.

3:47 a.m.

Viola stops on Prospect Street to chat with Officer Chris Wolfe. He spots what appears to be a man carrying a case of beer to a vehicle behind them and follows the car to Reek Street, where he

pulls the driver over.

The driver is not the same man Viola saw on the street, but he's cited for driving with an expired inspection sticker. He also had a headlight out.

4:19 a.m.

A possible burglary is reported on West Virginia Avenue. According to MECCA 911, a white man wearing a black toboggan tried to open the front door of a home and ran toward Dorsey Avenue.

Viola activates his emergency lights and races down High Street, arriving on scene just two minutes later. He speaks to the homeowner and uses his exterior light to check the nooks and crannies between houses as he creeps his way down the street and around the area.

Neither he nor the other officers who respond spot anyone who matches the man's description.

4:39 a.m.

Viola goes back to the station to call a man who lost his wallet and discovered that a transaction was recently made at McDonald's with his missing credit card.

Viola asks a lot of ques-

tions — What was in the wallet? When did he discover it was missing? How much money was charged? — before heading to the McDonald's on University Avenue to obtain surveillance footage. But the manager, an Occupy Morgantown protester Viola met a few days earlier while on patrol, says the footage has already been sent to the corporate office.

Viola stops to check out a loud-party complaint at the apartments above Ashebrooke Liquor Outlet, on Beechurst Avenue. The call appears to be unfounded. There's no noise and no one in sight.

5:22 a.m.

Another possible burglary is reported. According to MECCA 911, a man is trying to enter the front door of a woman's apartment. He's slumped against the wall on the far side of the porch, opposite the front door, when Viola arrives.

The man says his friend used to live at the same residence. He is intoxicated, but able to provide the correct date and name the president when questioned by police.

"He's not that drunk, yet he puked on himself and knocked on the door of a

random person's house," says 1st Sgt. M.D. Solomon, who also responded.

Solomon agrees to take the man home to Terrace Heights, off University Avenue, and Viola follows him to the man's door. "There's no knowing what might happen," Viola says.

6:09 a.m.

Viola stops at the city garage, off Green Bag Road, to fill his cruiser with gas. He shares the vehicle with a dayshift officer and doesn't typically leave it below a half tank.

6:19 a.m.

Viola joins most of the other midnight shift officers back at the Public Safety Building. They take turns using a few computer stations reserved for incident reports and other necessary paperwork.

They'll be relieved in about 20 minutes, Viola says, as officers are required to report to work about 15 minutes before their shift is scheduled to start.

When he first started, he got tired in the early morning hours, but after nearly a year on the job, he — and his long-time girlfriend — has adjusted to working at night and sleeping until early afternoon.

"It's like anything else, you get used to it," he says.

Aide: Cheney had heart transplant

WASHINGTON — Former Vice President Dick Cheney had a heart transplant Saturday and is recovering at a Virginia hospital, his office said.

An aide to Cheney disclosed that the 71-year-old, who has had a long history of cardiovascular trouble including numerous heart attacks, had been waiting for a transplant for more than 20 months.

"Although the former vice president and his family do not know the identity of the donor, they will be forever grateful for this

lifesaving gift," aide Kara Ahern said in a written statement that was authenticated by several of the Republican politician's close associates.

More than 3,100 Americans currently are on the national waiting list for a heart transplant. Just over 2,300 heart transplants were performed last year, according to the United Network for Organ Sharing. And 330 people died while waiting.

According to UNOS, 332 people over age 65 received a heart transplant last year. The majority of transplants occur in 50- to 64-year-olds.

Oldest U.S. natural history museum offers rare peek

PHILADELPHIA — The Academy of Natural Sciences has never been one to brag.

Its 225,000 annual visitors may associate the nation's oldest natural history museum solely with dioramas and dinosaurs, but behind the scenes there is groundbreaking research conducted by world-renowned scientists and an enviable collection of 18 million specimens representing all manner of animal, vegetable and mineral.

In celebration of its bicentennial this year, the museum has finally decided that it's OK to boast a little. For what's believed to be the first time in 200 years, curators will bring the public into the labyrinthine museum's normally off-limits nooks and crannies for daily tours.

"This is a rare opportunity to get a first-hand look at some of the most stunning, and sometimes bizarre, creatures you've ever seen," Academy president and chief executive officer George Gephart Jr. said. "We can't wait to open our doors and show off nature's, and the Academy's, wondrous bounty."

The Academy will highlight a different part of its collection starting with minerals in April and ending with fossils in February 2013. Other months will focus on birds, fish, insects, mollusks, amphibians and reptiles, plants and mammals.

"We've done behind-the-

scenes tours with school groups, and with donors and members, but not anything like this," said Ned Gilmore, an Academy collections manager.

Depending on the tour, visitors might see drawers filled with exotic colorful birds, cabinets holding polar bear skeletons, jars of preserved snakes, boxes of beautiful shells that when alive can kill a human, a wall of enormous elk skulls, a narwhal tusk and a mounted — and extinct — Caribbean Monk Seal.

An accompanying exhibition, "The Academy at 200: The Nature of Discovery," puts dozens of the academy's show-stopping treasures on public display — many for the first time — and highlights research that museum scientists are conducting worldwide on hot topics of climate change, biodiversity, water quality and invasive species.

The tours, exhibit and other events in the coming year aim to shift some focus from the museum's storied past to its present and future. As in the natural world, the axiom "adapt or die" applies to the Academy, which like many museums has struggled in the past decade with a shrinking endowment and greater competition for philanthropic dollars.

New initiatives include an affiliation forged last year with Drexel University for collaborative education and research efforts and a popular lecture series on environmental issues and policy.



Reunion has unexpected impact on all

As I DROVE TO OHIO to reunite with four women I hadn't seen in more than 30 years, the last thing I expected was a horror story.

For the most part, what I imagined on the four-hour trip was what I found when I arrived. There they were — four who'd been so much a part of my youth. Four who'd weathered the years as well as or better than I. Four very happy to be together again. No missing limbs. No catastrophic illnesses. All were very much happy to still be alive. We echoed the same sentiment, "I don't feel as old as I am."

We swapped "when we were kids" stories and embarrassed the three high school girls a few tables over with our giggles. We didn't care. We were in reminiscing mode and nothing could stop us. Debi was the first to change the tone of that gleeful gathering. "Remember Mr. R. in fifth grade?" she asked.

We all did, and none of us fondly. "Eeeeeewwww," Jeri said. The others agreed. There was a high creepiness factor about our fifth-grade teacher, who must have been in his 60s and had a red nose.

"He always wanted me to sit on his lap," Janet said. "Ewww. Me, too," Mary Beth said. "Perv," Jeri added.

That's when Debi stopped us cold. "I still have nightmares about him."

She told us about a day when she and two other girls had to stay after class. He kept them until the buses had gone, then drove them home. Mind you, these were fifth-graders, circa 1967.

"He was creepy and I didn't want to go with him," Deb said. "I sat in the back. I remember I was shaking the whole way home. I was terrified."

She couldn't recall who the other two were. "I've tried a million times, but I just can't remember," she said. "But I remember this, and this is why I have nightmares. I was the second one he dropped off."

The fate of the third, stuck in the front seat next to this old guy who creeped us all out, is unknown. We don't even know who she was. No wonder Deb doesn't sleep well.

And I haven't since. Now 55, she admitted she was telling the story for the first time. "I never even told my mom," she said. "I didn't know how to explain why I was scared."

We didn't have the vocabulary then, or the insight into the grown-up world fifth-graders have today. We couldn't have imagined using the word "perv" — we didn't know it and wouldn't have used it if we did.

Someone said Mr. R. lost his job the next year. "No one knew why."

All in all, it was a great reunion. We visited our former school, stuck between demolition site and park-to-be.

We talked about the grape arbor at the back of the playground where we used to seek shade during recess and baseball games.

More than one generation sought sanctuary there. I wonder how many were hiding from Mr. R.

Kingwood passes excess levy

Funding continues for parks, library

KINGWOOD — Voters approved an excess levy that supports the Kingwood Public Library, as well as parks and recreation programs.

One-hundred and sixty-three cast ballots between March 1 and Saturday for the continuation of a

five-year levy that begins July 1 and runs to June 30, 2018. The unofficial vote was 128 in favor; 35 against. City Clerk Martha Moore said voting was down 50 to 100 from previous years.

There are 2,062 registered voters in the city, she said.

According to Preston County tax deputy P.J. Crogan, a city resident with a \$101,000 home pays just over \$75 a year in taxes toward the levy.

Kingwood Public Library Director Joel Beane said the levy means

survival for the facility. "We wouldn't have anything but the donations we get," he told *The Dominion Post* last month.

The library gets \$50,875 per year from the levy. It covers maintenance and repairs on the building, books and periodicals, supplies and insurance, Beane said.

Without the levy, the city would not have the funds to match the state library commission grant.

The levy also contributes \$34,000 annually to parks and recreation.

Parks and recreation coordinator Kathy Whetsell said it pays for everything from payroll to maintenance of the city's parks to the Civic Center and municipal pool.

The city contributes to parks and recreation from its budget, but would be hard pressed to offer the same opportunities to the community without the levy funds, Mayor Jim Lobb said.

The results are unofficial until certified by a vote from Kingwood City Council, which meets Tuesday

FAIRMONT — It normally takes Danielle Ervin about 20 seconds to jump into her blue jeans and T-shirt every morning, her preferred wardrobe of choice.

On Saturday morning in the Marion County Courthouse in Fairmont, though, her ensemble was a little more ornate. She was done out in a Civil War-era hoop dress, complete with white gloves and a hat with a plume.

Doing ornate, she said, means carrying out some time.

"It took me 20 minutes just to get into the dress," she said with a laugh. "Good thing I wasn't in a hurry."

That's because the event she dressed for wasn't about rushing headlong ahead of the clock. It was about giving a meandering look to the Civil War past, and other pertinent history, of north-central West Virginia.

Ervin was among a handful of people dressed in period costume to help launch the 2012 Mountaineer State History Expo, which is hosted annually by the Marion County Historical Society and

Old-time fiddle tunes and other Appalachian music performed by the string band Almost a Song echoed through the courthouse on the cloudy morning. "West Virginia, oh, my home," the band harmonized. "West Virginia, where I belong."

West Virginia, as home, was the focal theme of the day for the only state born of the Civil War, in 1863. Its borders were carved in the waning days of that conflict that pitted North

against South.

The tri-fold displays that honored that heritage, plus the region's past days a coal-producing power, gave the proceedings a little bit of the feel of a science or social studies fair, which was right at home for Tyler Lemley.

"It's like school," the 10-year-old Fairmont youngster said, as he browsed the displays with his mother, Tammy Lemley. "Only cooler."

For Fred Fox, there was nothing cooler, historically speaking, than the Division II courtroom on the second floor he occupied for 40 years as a circuit court judge.

Every year, the retired jurist gives a talk and "tour" of the room, which underwent extensive historical renovations in the late 1990s. It boasts detailed murals and stained glass windows, along with an upper gallery for spectators.

"I used to hear cases with lawyers from Pittsburgh and New York, and a lot of times after the case was over, they'd ask, 'Your Honor, is it OK if we take

pictures?' " Fox remembered. "They didn't think there were still courthouses like this in America."

Which is why Dora Grubb first made the case for the expo 10 years ago.

"A bunch of us were sitting around my dining room table," said Grubb, who serves as president of the historical society. "We were talking about how people thought they had to go other places to see historical sites. Well, this is our history, and it's all right here."

Not that the day was all about the past. There was a little bit of what used to be science fiction in there, too.

John Moffatt, a member of the Almost a Song string band that opened the expo, had just finished strumming through a 150-year-old fiddle tune on his 56-year-old guitar.

When it was done, he reached around and snagged an iPad, which he propped on a music stand in front of his microphone.

"I use it for lyrics and chords," he said, a little sheepishly. "We've got about 200 songs in our catalogue."

The city needs to work to make sure people who can't go to the polling places on Election Day can vote, she said, but she wasn't sure vote-by-mail was foolproof. She wondered if a voters' roommates or significant others had access to their ballots since they were mailed to homes.

Councilman Bill Byrne said he supports vote by mail because it increases voter participation. Council will have to consider the cost, he said, but he thinks it would be less next year because voter registration lists have been

cleaned up a little. Morgantown won't be paying to mail ballots to addresses that are no longer current, because those bad addresses were discovered during last year's election.

"I hope we can do it," he said, adding that it will depend on what the majority of council votes to do.

Byrne also said he hoped the city would be able to get the Secretary of State's Office to help cover the cost of the election.

Glance said the Secretary of State's Office wasn't responsible for contributing funds, but had helped with the education campaign and other

areas of Morgantown's 2011 city election.

Councilman Wes Nugent said he's still reviewing the issue — he's interested in finding out if vote by mail brought out any new voters and looking over the costs associated with the election.

"I'm still collecting information and waiting to make a decision," he said.

Voter turnout for the vote-by-mail election was the

highest the city had seen in the past 20 years. According to city data, 3,699 voters — or roughly 22 percents of the city's 16,621 registered voters — cast ballots last year.

Officials have been looking at ways to reduce the costs of the vote-by-mail election, such as using smaller envelopes and reaching out to previously inactive voters before mailing them ballots.

Swetha Doppalapudi caught herself sketching in a notebook one day, and when she was done, she looked down to regard her rendering of a human heart, festooned with wires and microchips.

It was the Morgantown High School senior's visual way of conveying her philosophy of medicine's true mission: Physicians and researchers are healers, she said. Healers who advance the quality of life using medicine, science and technology.

That's what she wants to do. She's planning on studying neuroscience and molecular biology in college, and she's carving her path. The student, who is already doing additional lab work at WVU, has been recognized statewide and nationally for her science projects and other research work in math and science.

She wants to head her own biotechnology company as a physician or medical Ph.D.

Last year, she was one of seven students to take top honors in the National Junior Science and Humanities Symposium, in San Diego.

Her project, "TLR3-mediated Signaling Protects Astrocytes Against Oxidative Stress Through SOD2 Upregulation," won first place in the symposium's life sciences division.

5 ways GOP could settle presidential race

WASHINGTON — Are we there yet? Not quite. Mitt Romney's two steps forward, one derisive flub back campaign continues its tantalizing progress toward a total victory that always seems just ahead.

Still, the Republican presidential race has got to end sometime, whether it's April or August. Here are five ways to settle this thing:

1. The likeliest route: Romney pulls off a clean win by the time the last state votes in June.

Sure, he's cutting it closer than he'd like, but if Romney keeps up his current pace he can win the necessary majority — 1,144 delegates — by June 26, if not sooner.

After Louisiana's primary Saturday, 21 states and the District of Columbia have yet to vote, and Romney's about halfway to the magic number, according to The Associated Press delegate count.

2. Flying to the rescue: Superdelegates can speed up the finish.

Santorum beats Romney in Louisiana

WASHINGTON — Rick Santorum won the Louisiana Republican presidential primary Saturday, beating front-runner Mitt Romney in yet another conservative Southern state.

Although the victory gives Santorum bragging rights, it does not change the overall dynamics of the race; the former Pennsylv-

ania senator still dramatically lags behind Romney in the hunt for delegates to the GOP's summertime nominating convention.

Even so, Santorum's win underscores a pattern in the drawn-out race.

The under-funded under-dog has tended to win in Bible Belt states that include Tennessee, Mississippi and Alabama.

Ford in 1976.

Ford, lifted to the presidency through Richard Nixon's resignation, had accumulated more delegates than the more conservative, charismatic Reagan.

Like Ford, Romney's goal would be to coax more people to his side for that crucial first vote, when most delegates are obligated by state party rules to support the candidate chosen by the voters back home.

4. Winning by losing: Santorum grabs the chance he's been waiting for.

This is the scenario Santorum's campaign is pushing

Romney — a deep-pocketed, highly organized former Massachusetts governor — has persistently struggled in such heavily conservative regions.

Neither candidate was in the state as Louisiana Republicans weighed in. Nor was former House Speaker Newt Gingrich, who was trailing in Louisiana.

to explain how he could still get the nomination after trailing in primary voting.

If no candidate wins a majority in the first round, GOP rules require roll call after roll call until one person emerges with a majority.

5. A brokered convention: The powerbrokers toss out the candidates and draft someone new.

It sounds crazy after decades of hermetically sealed conventions. And it's certainly a long shot. It would mean rejecting everyone who's received actual votes from the Republican faithful.

Lawmakers, U.S. agency favor Hatch Act changes

WASHINGTON — Jon Greiner's election to the Utah Senate caused his firing as Ogden police chief. Philadelphia transit cop Matthew Arlen was barred from a local school board race in Pennsylvania. And New York state port official Terrence Hurley was knocked out of a county race.

All were blindsided by a 1939 law that prohibits federal employees from running in partisan elections but also places the same restriction on state and local government workers whose jobs are connected to federal dollars.

Three committee chairmen in the Senate and one in the House say it's time to update the Hatch Act. Bills in both houses still would prohibit federal employees from participating in partisan political activities, while ending federal prohibitions on state and local government employees seeking elected office.

The changes are enthusiastically supported by the Office of Special Counsel, the federal agency that

enforces the Hatch Act.

"Fixing this broken law will cost taxpayers nothing and will demonstrate respect for the independence of state and local elections," said Carolyn Lerner, who runs the office.

The law is named for its author, the late Sen. Carl Atwood Hatch, a Democrat from New Mexico who served from 1933 to 1949.

It was aimed at ending patronage abuses on Depression-era public works projects — where people were sometimes coerced to work in a campaign as a condition for getting a job, or had to kick back a portion of their pay as a political contribution.

Arlen, the policeman whose partner is an explosives detection dog trained with federal money, said, "How much influence can my dog have over what I could do on the school board?"

Several state and local officials said in interviews they were investigated by the Office of Special Counsel after their opponents filed a complaint.

Obama seeks prevention of nuke terrorism

WASHINGTON — Far from home if not away from election-year politics, President Barack Obama is returning to the threat to American security that he calls the gravest of all: Terrorists getting material for a nuclear bomb.

In South Korea, where Obama is headed, the president will join a massive gathering of world leaders whose united goal is to secure nuclear material and prevent it from being smuggled to states or groups intent on mass destruction.

Obama's mission over three days in the South Korean capital will be to show progress — in pressuring North Korea to change its rogue ways and in approaching a lofty goal of locking down nuclear material around the globe by 2014.

Friends: Fla. teen didn't pick a fight

MIAMI — Wearing a hoodie. Listening to music and talking on his cell-phone. Picking up Skittles for his soon-to-be step-brother. Friends say that's how they would have imagined 17-year-old Trayvon Martin on a Sunday afternoon.

Starting a fight? Possibly high on drugs and up to no good? No, friends say that description of Martin from the neighborhood crime-watch volunteer who shot and killed the unarmed black teenager doesn't match the young man they knew.

"There's no way I can believe that, because he's not a confrontational kid," said Jerome Horton, who was one of Martin's former football coaches and knew him since he was about 5.

Space station safe after debris closes in

WASHINGTON — A discarded chunk of a Russian rocket missed the International Space Station early Saturday. However, it came close enough to force six astronauts to seek shelter in escape capsules.

NASA said the space junk was barely close enough to be a threat.

Pope's arrival in Mexico sparks emotion

LEON, Mexico — It had become tradition in Mexico. Before daybreak, youths would creep as close as security permitted and serenade their beloved Pope John Paul II with a song of greeting and celebration.

Now a new, less familiar pope had come, seeking to strengthen his own ties with the largest Spanish-speaking Catholic nation.

So well before dawn Saturday, two dozen youths from a Guadalajara church group gathered near the school where the Pope Benedict XVI was staying. "We sang with all our heart and all our force," said Maria Fernanda de Luna, a member of the group. "It gave us goosebumps to sing 'Las Mananitas' for him."

Songs, joyful throngs, church bells and confetti welcomed Benedict as he

began his first trip to Mexico, a celebration that seemed to erupt spontaneously out of what had been a thin, sun-dazed crowd.

As Pope Benedict XVI's plane appeared in the shimmering heat of Friday afternoon, people poured from their homes. They packed sidewalks five and six deep, screaming ecstatically as the pope passed, waving slowly. Some burst into tears.

Many had said moments earlier that they could never love a pope as strongly as Benedict's predecessor, John Paul II. But the presence of a pope on Mexican soil touched a chord of overwhelming respect and adoration for the papacy itself, the personification for many of the Catholic Church, and God.

Thousands found themselves taken aback by their own emotions.

As a girl, Celia del Rosario Escobar, 42, saw John Paul II on one of his five trips to Mexico, which brought him near-universal adoration.

"I was 12 and it's an experience that still makes a deep impression on me," she said. "I thought this would be different, but no, the experience is the same."

"I can't speak," she murmured, pressing her hands to her chest and starting to cry.

Merck ponders next step for troubled heart drug

CHICAGO — Officials at drugmaker Merck & Co. said they will take more time to decide what to do about an experimental blood thinner that gave disappointing results in a second big study.

The study was aimed at preventing repeat heart attacks and strokes in people who had already suffered one or were in danger of one because of hardened arteries in their legs.

The drug, vorapaxar, lowered the risk of those problems but also raised the risk of major bleeding, including dangerous bleeding in the head, which largely canceled out the drug's benefit.

Results of the study were discussed Saturday at an American College of Cardiology conference in Chicago and published by the *New England Journal of Medicine*.

Merck had hoped vorapaxar would become a new, first-of-its-kind blood thinner. The company-sponsored study involved more than 26,000 patients in 32 countries. All were given usual heart medicines plus aspirin, and half also received daily vorapaxar pills.

Safety monitors stopped part of the study last year after seeing higher rates of bleeding in the head among people with a his-

tory of stroke who were on the experimental drug. The study continued in the rest of the participants.

After three years, about 9 percent of those given vorapaxar had suffered a heart attack or a stroke or had died from heart-related causes versus more than 10 percent of those not given the drug. Moderate or severe bleeding occurred in about 4 percent of those on vorapaxar versus just more than 2 percent of the others, said the study's leader, Dr. David Morrow of Brigham and Women's Hospital in Boston.

Among those with a history of heart attack — two-thirds of study participants — the drug had a net ben-

efit, though, leaving the possibility that Merck might pursue seeking federal approval to sell it for these patients.

However, several experts not connected with the study said the drug's relatively modest benefit and likely high cost would make it a tough sell even if it were allowed on the market.

"This is not a drug that I would put in my personal medicine chest," said Dr. Eduardo Marban of Cedars-Sinai Medical Center in Los Angeles.

Merck officials said they would discuss the results with more scientists before deciding next steps.

U.K. wedding crasher: Queen drops in on event

LONDON — Britain's Queen Elizabeth II has become a wedding crasher.

The monarch dropped in moments after the nuptials of John and Frances Canning at Manchester Town Hall in northern England on Friday.

The newlyweds said Saturday the queen chatted and posed for wedding photographs. The queen and her husband Prince Philip, the Duke of Edinburgh, were visiting the venue for lunch at the same time the wedding took place.

"It was very special — it was so lovely that she took the trouble to speak to us," bride Frances Canning told *The Sun* newspaper.

The 48-year-old groom knew beforehand that the queen would be visiting the town hall, and jokingly wrote to Buckingham Palace to invite the monarch, the tabloid reported. He received a polite reply declining the invitation, but palace officials secretly arranged the meeting, the paper said.

Canning said he spoke with Prince Philip while photos were being taken.

"He was a charming fella — for me it was the icing on the cake," he told *The Sun*.

The 44-year-old bride was impressed the queen addressed them by their first names.

"She said I looked lovely and she wanted to wish us all the best for the future."

"We're going to have to get a bigger wedding album now," she was quoted as saying. "Not many people will have picture like that."

The British monarch was in Manchester to visit a number of sites as part of her Diamond Jubilee tour.

French investigators focus on gunman's brother

PARIS — The brother of an Islamist fanatic behind a deadly shooting rampage in France celebrated his martyr-like death and may have helped him, police and a lawyer said Saturday.

Counterterrorism authorities are expected to decide early Sunday whether to file preliminary charges against 30-year-old Abdelkader Merah, who has been under questioning for four days over killings in southern France that stunned the country and refocused attention on the threat of radical Muslim militants.

His brother, Mohamed Merah, died in a hail of gunfire Thursday after a standoff with police during which he claimed responsibility for attacks that killed three Jewish schoolchildren, a rabbi and three paratroopers. Merah claimed allegiance to al-

Qaida and told police he traveled to Afghanistan and Pakistan for training.

In Pakistan, intelligence officials said Saturday that 85 French Muslims have been training with the Taliban in northwest Pakistan and are examining whether Mohamed Merah was part of this group. Merah traveled to Pakistan in 2011 and said he trained with al-

southern city of Toulouse. "At no time could she have imagined that her son was the one who did it."

Investigators are focused now on older brother Abdelkader Merah, who was flown to Paris for further questioning Saturday along with his girlfriend, Yamina Mesbah.

Police union spokesman Christophe Crepin told reporters that detectives have already gathered evidence to suggest that Abdelkader Merah had "furnished means (and) worked as an accomplice." Crepin refused to comment further.

Abdelkader was already on the police radar. He was questioned several years ago about alleged links to a network sending Toulouse-area youths to Iraq, but no action was brought against him at the time.



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Polls: Americans divided on health care mandate

WASHINGTON — America's national shouting match over health care will only get louder this week as the Supreme Court weighs the fate of President Barack Obama's overhaul.

With formal arguments off-limits to cameras, supporters and detractors have laid elaborate plans to compete for the public's attention outside the Supreme Court building.

At the White House, which on Friday observed a low-key second anniversary of the Affordable Care Act, Obama's advisers are trying to walk a fine line. They want to avoid any appearance of unseemly pressure on the justices while encouraging supporters to speak up. The Obama re-election campaign is also talking up the law's benefits, and there is a steady stream of cheery press releases from the Department of Health and Human Services.

Will any of it make the slightest bit of difference?

Polls show Americans are as divided as ever over the president's signature domestic policy achievement, hard-won legislation that will eventually expand health insurance to more than 90 percent of citizens and legal residents, providing federal subsidies to make premiums more affordable for millions who now struggle to find and keep coverage.

"It's hard to imagine that the various demonstrations for and against the health care law will have much impact," said Peter A. Brown, assistant director of the Quinnipiac University Polling Institute in Connecticut. "Even if public opinion does change, it doesn't matter. The only thing that matters is the nine votes on the court."

That hasn't stopped the activists.

"We want to make sure we are heard," said Tim Phillips, president of Americans for Prosperity, a conservative group founded with the support of billionaires Charles and David Koch which has

spent heavily on anti-Obama campaigns across the country.

The group has been collecting signatures online for a "symbolic amicus brief" calling on the court to strike down the entire law. The signatures will be the centerpiece of a rally near the court on Tuesday, when the justices are scheduled to hear arguments on the constitutionality of the law's individual coverage mandate.

That's the central issue in the case: Whether the federal government can require individuals to obtain health insurance, either through an employer, a government program, or by direct purchase. Opponents say Obama and congressional Democrats stretched the Constitution beyond any reasonable interpretation, essentially ordering citizens to buy a product.

Supporters of the law say health insurance is unlike any other product because everyone needs medical care sooner or later, and society bears the cost of treating the uninsured. For insurance to work well, the pool must include the young and healthy. The Constitution gives Congress the power to regulate interstate commerce, and the health insurance mandate stands in a line of requirements that go back decades and have been upheld by the courts.

Americans for Prosperity has arranged to bus in supporters from Connecticut to North Carolina and as far west as Michigan. Tea party stars including Rep. Michele Bachmann, R-Minn., and Sen. Rand Paul, R-Ky., will address the rally.

Liberal groups, unions and other supporters of the law have been taking a somewhat different approach. Although they plan Washington events, including rallies and a prayer vigil Monday at the court, they have been putting their main emphasis on outreach around the country. That dovetails with a sustained effort by the Obama re-election campaign to tout the benefits of the law.

Q&A: How case will unfold before the court

WASHINGTON — The Supreme Court will begin hearing arguments on Monday over President Barack Obama's health care overhaul, the Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act, labeled "Obamacare" by its opponents. A look at how the case will unfold before the court in question-and-answer form:

Q: When will the court get started?

A: Justices will begin hearing arguments shortly after 10 a.m. Monday. They will hear six hours of arguments on several different issues on Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday.

Q: Which issues on which days?

A: Monday's 90-minute argument is about whether court action is premature because no one yet has paid a fine for not

having health insurance. Tuesday's two-hour argument will cover the central issue of whether Congress overstepped its authority by requiring Americans to purchase health insurance starting in 2014 or pay a penalty. Wednesday's arguments will be split into two parts: Justices will hear 90 minutes of debate in the morning over whether the rest of the law can take effect even if the health insurance mandate is unconstitutional and another hour Wednesday afternoon over whether the law goes too far in coercing states to expand the federal-state Medicaid program for low-income people by threatening to cut off federal aid to states that don't comply.

Q: When will the justices rule?

A: The court could

decide any time, but complex cases argued in the spring normally produce decisions near the end of the court's session, scheduled for late June.

Q: Is it possible that the justices won't decide whether the law is constitutional or not?

A: It is possible. The first issue the court is discussing is whether an obscure tax law makes it too early for the Supreme Court to get involved. If they decide that the issue is premature, then the case will be dismissed without a binding ruling from the justices.

Q: I've heard people say that Justices Elena Kagan and Clarence Thomas should take no part in this case? What's that about?

A: Opponents of the

law wanted Kagan to disqualify herself because she served as solicitor general under Obama when the health care overhaul law was conceived and passed. She has said she did not participate in crafting a legal defense for the law, but her detractors doubt her statement. Thomas' detractors insist that he should have disqualified himself because his wife, Ginni, worked with groups that opposed the new law.

Decisions to stay out of a case are the responsibility of each individual justice, and neither Kagan nor Thomas justice stepped aside.

Roberts said in his 2011 year-end report that he has "complete confidence in the capability of my colleagues to determine when recusal is warranted."

WHAT THE LAW DOES

A brief summary of the 900-page plus Affordable Care Act, unless noted provisions take effect in 2014:

- Provides coverage to more than 30 million uninsured.
- Expands Medicaid to cover more uninsured low-income people.
- Creates exchanges, state-based health insurance markets, for small businesses and people buying private coverage individually.
- Provides government subsidies for many middle-class people buying private health insurance through an exchange.
- Allows young adults to stay on parents' coverage until age 26. Already in effect.

- Requires health plans to cover preventive care without charging co-pays. Already in effect.
- Requires most citizens and legal residents to carry health insurance, either through an employer, a government program or by buying a policy directly. IRS will assess fines for noncompliance.
- Requires companies with 50 or more workers to provide coverage, or pay fines if any of their employees ends up getting a health insurance subsidy.
- Raises taxes on upper-income households; imposes a variety of taxes and fees on the health care industry. Places a 10 percent sales tax on indoor tanning. Some taxes already in effect.

- Cuts Medicare payments to hospitals, insurers and other service providers; improves preventive benefits for Medicare recipients and gradually closes prescription drug coverage gap. Limits future increases in Medicare spending. Some Medicare provisions already in effect.
- Significantly increases federal regulation of the health insurance industry. Already in effect.
- Congressional Budget Office estimates coverage expansion will have a net cost of \$1.1 trillion from 2012-'21. Spending cuts and tax increases are currently projected to offset the cost, for a modest reduction in federal budget deficits.

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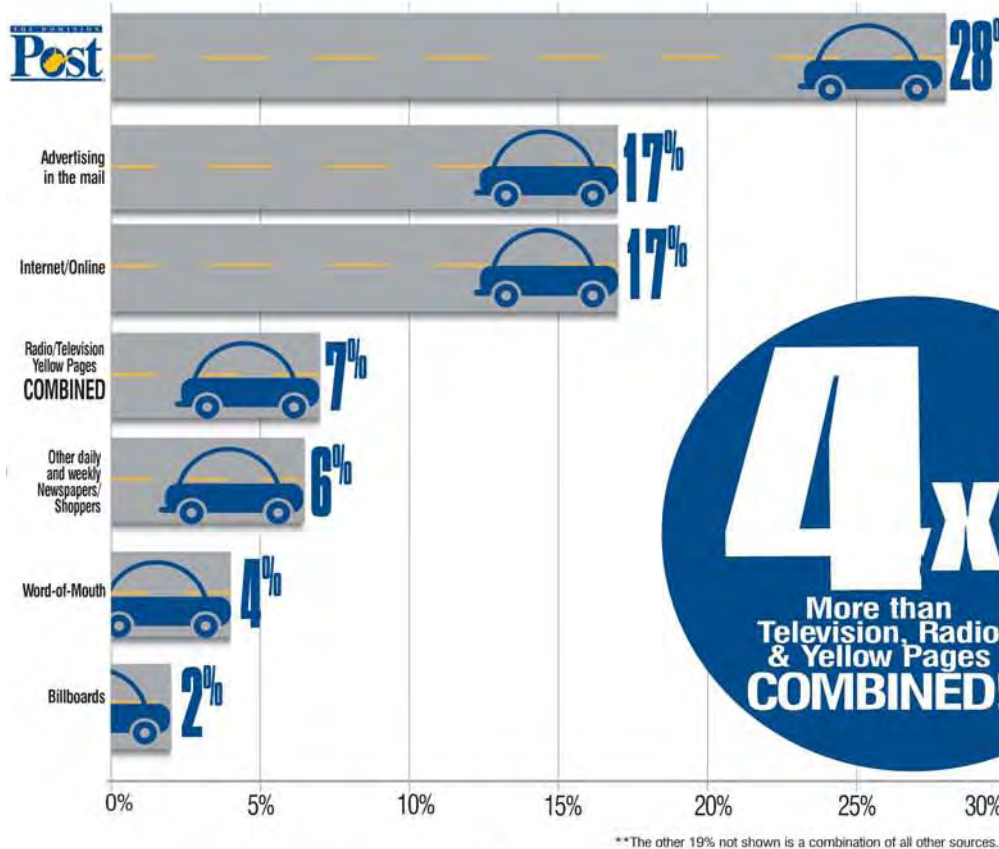
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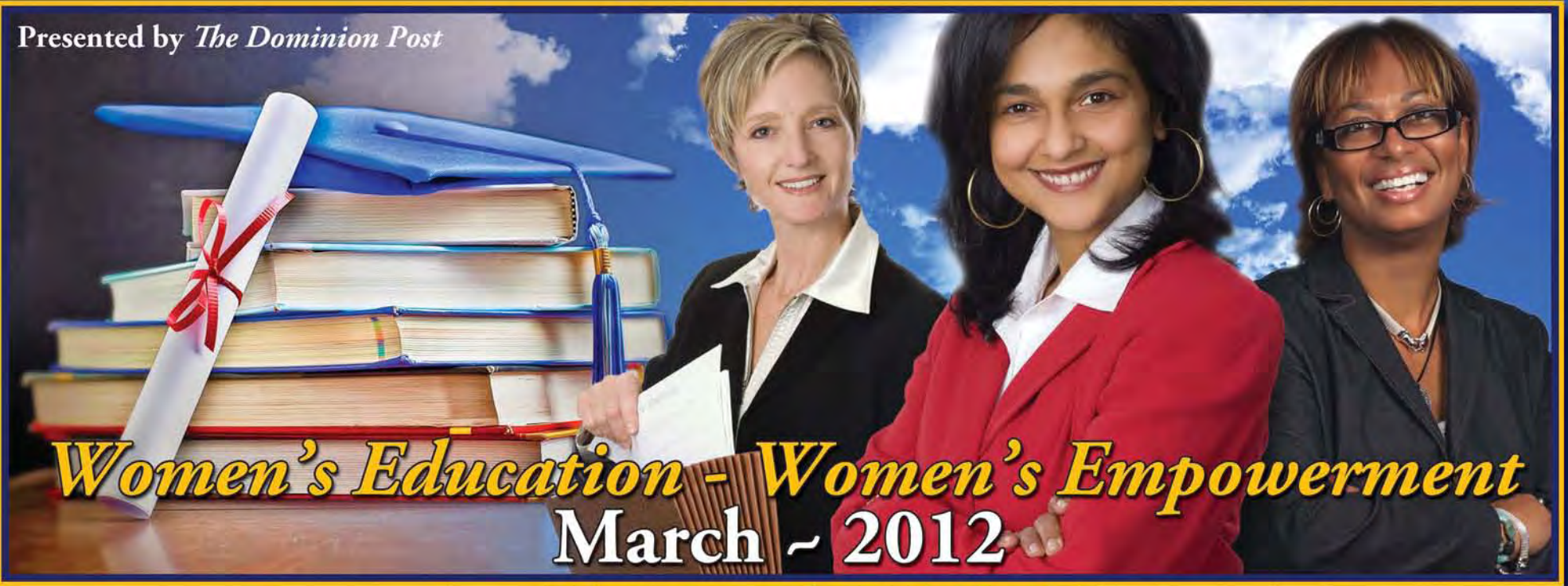

'Eers have elements of Elite Eight, still don't have much shot

TAKE A LOOK AT THE TEAMS that qualified for the Elite Eight of the NCAA men's basketball tournament this season.

What do you see? You see an Ohio State team with a dominant man in the middle (**Jared Sullinger**) and a point guard (**Aaron Craft**) who not only runs the show, but can also defend any other point guard in the college game.

You see a big guy at Kentucky (**Anthony Davis**) who blocks any shot he can get near and a small forward (**Michael Kidd-Gilchrist**) who rebounds more like a power forward or center.

You see depth at every position at Syracuse, a double-double machine at Kansas (power forward **Thomas Robinson**) and athletic wings and forwards at North Carolina.

Now, try to tell me you won't see those same things with WVU next season.

Sure, a lot of ifs and buts have to work out between now and then for the Mountaineers — and there are no guarantees those things will happen — but if you can somehow look through a pair of optimistic glasses, are the possibilities not there?

Couldn't **Aaric Murray** be a shot-blocker like Davis? Is Kentucky's **Terrence Jones** any stronger in the post than WVU's **Deniz Kilicli**? Not really. More talented, maybe, but certainly not stronger.

Couldn't **Juwan Staten** be that point guard who runs the show, scores a little bit and then goes out and actually plays defense, too? Is it not fair to sort of make an early comparison between Staten and Louisville's **Peyton Siva**?

Is it not fair to think WVU's **Keaton Miles** could put on some more weight, gain some strength and confidence and become a small forward who can both defend and put the ball on the floor and make something happen offensively?

Before we go off the deep end with comparisons, there is one stat not discussed yet that sets these eight teams apart from WVU — and every other team in the country, for that matter: Those Elite Eight teams simply made shots.

Think about it for a second. Indiana shot 52 percent as a team and scored 90 points ... and still lost to Kentucky by 12 points. Ohio made 14 3-pointers — 14!!! — and yet North Carolina won in overtime.

If WVU allowed a team to shoot 52 percent from the field or make 14 3-pointers in a game this season, the Mountaineers would have lost big time. Why? Because this WVU team was just not able to consistently make shots.

"We can't spread anybody because we haven't made shots," WVU coach **Bob Huggins** said after WVU's 77-54 loss to Gonzaga in the second round of the NCAA tournament. "We haven't made shots for a month."

Yes, these Elite Eight teams were big and strong and talented. These teams have players who will be on future NBA rosters.

Yet, in the end, it was not having a 7-footer in the middle that mattered most. It was simply a matter of running offense and making some shots.

This is what next year's bunch of Mountaineers have to keep in mind this offseason. Miles can get as big and strong as he wants; so can **Murray** and **Aaron Brown** and everyone else.

If they can't make a shot, they have no shot at being elite next season.

Huskies take a pair from 'Eers

Big innings continued to hurt the WVU baseball team as it fell to Big East opponent Connecticut, 15-4, on Saturday, at Hawley Field.

The Huskies also won the completion of a weather-suspended game, as WVU gave up two four-run innings in losing, 10-7.

The Huskies (9-11, 2-0 Big East) out-hit the Mountaineers (11-14, 0-2) by 16-9 in the second game, getting multi-hit games from five starters. Connecticut starter Anthony Marzi (1-4) pitched six innings, giving up two earned runs on six hits with four strikeouts. Will Jolin earned the save for three innings of relief.

WVU jumped on top during the first two innings on home runs from right fielder Brady Wilson and designated hitter Tyler Steele-Worsham.

Connecticut scored three

runs in the fourth inning on four hits, highlighted by an L.J. Mazzilli double and a triple by Joe Pavone, to take a 3-2 lead.

A UConn error allowed WVU to tie in the fourth.

Connecticut left the bases loaded in the fifth inning, but took the lead on a fielding error by second baseman Billy Fleming that allowed Billy Ferriter to score from second base.

The Huskies added two in the seventh, three in the eighth and six in the ninth to pad the lead to 15-4.

First baseman Ryan McBrook hit a monster shot for his second home run of the season in the eighth inning, for WVU's final run.

Left-hander Marshall Thompson (2-4) took the loss, allowing six runs on nine hits in six innings. Thompson struck out two and walked a season-high six batters.

Wilson and Steele-Worsham each had two hits.

In the game carried over from Friday, WVU trailed,

8-2, when a lightning storm forced suspension of play.

When it resumed, the Huskies immediately scored two runs in the eighth to extend their lead to 10-2.

A five-run bottom of the frame from WVU cut the Connecticut lead to 10-7.

Bobby Boyd registered his fourth hit of the game to lead off, and pinch hitter Jon Roszel beat out a single to the pitcher to put two men on base.

Shortstop John Polonius singled to center field to score Boyd, and second baseman Billy Fleming doubled to score Roszel.

Steele-Worsham hit into a fielder's choice that allowed Polonius to score, as the third baseman missed a throw from the pitcher that went into left field.

WVU scored its final two runs of the inning as third baseman Justin Fox doubled to right center field, driving in Steele-Worsham and Fleming to make it 10-7.

Boyd finished 4-for-5 with

two runs, one double and one stolen base. Matt Frazier and Fleming each added two hits and an RBI for the Mountaineers.

The teams play the series finale at noon today.

Meikle has no doubt there are even greater things to come from her point guard.

"She's already hard at work, I'm sure," Meikle said. "She's probably not put the ball down yet. There's other aspects that she wants to work on, there's other things that she wants to do. We have the mid-range game that she's working on. She has great speed and great athleticism and she's just gonna continue to go to the next level."

Callen also was a first-team all-Two Rivers Athletic Conference (TRAC) selection, and a Class 5A second-team all-Ohio Valley Athletic Conference (OVAC) pick this season.

Morgantown was also represented on the all-state team. Senior center Bri Nuzum was selected to the third team. Nuzum averaged 9.5 points and 9 rebounds, and the MHS offense often revolved around her powerful post play.

"She was our focal point and our main, go-to post player," MHS head coach Adam Henkins said. "Her numbers were down a little bit this year compared to last year, but she drew a lot of double teams this year, especially late in the season. It's an honor whenever the other team has to stick two players on you to take you away."

Nuzum was also a first-team all-TRAC pick and will play in the OVAC all-star game. She was offered a scholarship to play basketball at the University of Pittsburgh-Johnstown next year.

Two Mohigans, one Hawk and three Knights were given all-state honorable mention.

Junior Leah Taylor and senior Olivia Naugle made honorable mention for the Mohigans. Taylor, a second-team all-TRAC selection, made 36 3s and averaged 3 assists, 4 steals and a team-leading 10.5 points a game. Naugle averaged 9.5 points and 4 assists a game.

"Olivia showed everyone how good of a ball player she is down at the state basketball tournament," Henkins said. "She was our leading scorer that game against Wheeling Park and caught everybody's attention. I was very happy for the way she performed on the main stage. Showed lots of leadership, lots of hustle and willingness to take the ball to the basket."

"Leah is very tough. Phys-

ically tough, mentally tough, and provided a spark for us all year long," he added. "We had a rotation going with the starting lineup, and she was more than willing to come off the bench. I liked her coming off the bench because I knew when I made the substitution to bring her into the game, we gained a little bit."

Senior forward Sami Gaspar was the selection for the Hawks. Gaspar averaged 12.1 points, 10.3 rebounds and 1.3 steals.

"She's kind of our silent leader," Meikle said. "She cleaned up the boards. She did all the dirty work that she had to do around the basket and never complained one day about having to do it. She's just a great kid and we're gonna miss her."

Gaspar declined offers to play college hoops, and will attend WVU next year to study nursing.

Rounding out the area representatives were Preston juniors M.J. Braham and Carly Kelley and senior Morgan Radabaugh.

Braham averaged 12.5 points, 10 rebounds and five blocks. The junior forward was a consistent inside presence for the Knights, who finished 10-13.

"Defensively, she could change the way other teams tried to attack us," Preston head coach Brian Miller said. "She had 110 blocks this season, so teams didn't want to go inside against us. That made them very one dimensional. We had the advantage of knowing what they were gonna try to do and we only had to guard certain options."

Radabaugh averaged 11.5 points a game and hit 43 3s. Kelley averaged 10 points a game and hit 39 3s.

"Morgan led the area in 3s, had great range, even hit shots from four or five feet behind the (3-point) line," Miller said. "But the great thing about her is that when she was a freshman on varsity, she couldn't play a lick of defense, but she really worked hard on that over the summer and she was second on the team in steals and played great defense this year."

Miller said Kelley "is one of the hardest workers we've got. She's always putting in the time. She can play multiple positions. She plays defense down low, plays defense up top, just does anything we ask. She could hit 3s, play inside, and she's also starting to get better at scoring off the bounce."

Tiger leads at Bay Hill

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Battered Kilicli finally finds time to heal

WVU men's basketball player Deniz Kilicli welcomed the offseason for one reason.

Of course, mentally, he was disappointed to see the Mountaineers' season end with a lopsided 77-54 loss to Gonzaga in the NCAA tournament, but Kilicli's body needs some time off.

"I am tired," he said after WVU's loss to the Bulldogs. "My legs are done."

Kilicli, who will be WVU's lone senior this fall, revealed that he played a large portion of the season nicked with a variety of injuries.

In "Las Vegas, I got a hip

pointer injury, and I was just stubborn and didn't want to sit down," Kilicli said. "It hurt me more and more."

A hip pointer is a bruise on the pelvis caused by a direct blow to the hip bone. Kilicli suffered the injury during WVU's 70-68 win against Missouri State, on Dec. 22.

It's the same injury Kevin Jones suffered through his entire junior season.

Three months later, Kilicli still feels the pain.

"It never goes away," Kilicli said. "It's still there. Had I gotten hit in the same position again, I would probably [have gotten knocked] out. The trainers did a great job. It doesn't go away all the way."

The pain took its toll on Kilicli's body in other ways. "Then, because of this (hip pointer), I twisted my ankles and ankles were swollen up," he said.

Kilicli missed the Jan. 18 WVU win, against Marshall, but was never out again. Still, Kilicli insists he's not looking for sympathy and has accepted blame for some of WVU's 14 losses this past season. Despite the pain, Kilicli said he played because he felt like the team needed him and that he could tough it out.

"I was fine, (but) after Notre Dame game (on Feb. 8), I got sick for a week and a half, and I lost 12-15 pounds," said Kilicli, who averaged 10.7 points and 5.3 rebounds per game for the Mountaineers (19-14).

"This year has been really crazy for me, and I had to play," Kilicli said.

What did he learn from it all?

"I think I have to take better care of myself," the 6-foot-9, 260-pound forward said.

Help on the way

Kilicli is already looking forward to next season, and he believes WVU has the pieces to succeed.

After sitting out this season as transfers, Juwan Staten (from Dayton) and Aaric Murray (from La Salle) will

be eligible for the Mountaineers.

Staten, a 6-foot-1, 190-pound guard, and Murray, a 6-foot-10, 240-pound center, practiced with the Mountaineers this season. Kilicli was impressed.

"They are going to bring on the talent department, a lot," Kilicli said. "Juwan is just the fastest guy I've ever seen, I've ever played against. He is really smart and he's got a great basketball I.Q. Aaric Murray, he just needs to work and show it next year. I think he's going to be a great help for us."

Valuable lesson

WVU forward Keaton Miles said departing senior Truck Bryant encouraged the younger players at season's end.

Bryant reminded WVU's freshmen that he, Jones and Devin Ebanks were on a WVU team that lost in the NCAA tournament opening round in 2009, to Dayton.

The next year, the Mountaineers won the Big East tournament and made a run to the NCAA tournament Final Four.

He was reminding the younger WVU players to use the sting of an early tournament exit as motivation.

"Hopefully, we can bounce back and do what they did," Miles said. "But I am embarrassed. But that is how it is after any loss — I don't want to show my face at school. It was the same this whole past year and it's been that way my whole career: When I lose, I am embarrassed."

WVU will have to replace forward Kevin Jones, who averaged a double-double (19.9 points, 10.9 rebounds) and was named all-Big East first team.

Truck Bryant averaged nearly 17 points and will also have to be replaced.

Yet, for the first time since 1995, some of the bigger questions surrounding WVU's offseason have nothing to do with who is staying or leaving. Instead, the biggest question is: What will life be like in the Big 12?

Here are the top five questions heading into next season:

1 Where does WVU fit in the Big 12?

The short answer is, to the right of everyone else — about 1,000 miles to the right.

A quick look at the Big 12 teams (remember, Missouri and Texas A&M are leaving and Texas Christian University is also joining) show the conference has several underclassmen who could declare for the 2012 NBA draft.

Among them: Baylor's Perry Jones III and Pierre Jackson, Kansas' Thomas Robinson, Iowa State's Royce White, Kansas State's Rodney McGruder, Texas' J'Covan Brown and Oklahoma State's LeBryan Nash.

The deadline to enter the draft this season is April 10. That deadline was May 8 the past two seasons, meaning draft prospects have even

less time to make a decision.

If White returns to Iowa State, the Cyclones will have a solid front line, and will also benefit from Michigan State transfer Korie Lucious, a point guard who becomes eligible for this season.

Even without Robinson, Kansas will have a nucleus built around four seniors and a solid recruiting class.

If Brown doesn't leave, Texas has everyone coming back. Kansas State will return four starters if McGruder doesn't leave early.

If Baylor loses Jones III, the Bears still will have the

league's top incoming freshman enrolling in power forward Isaiah Austin (7-foot, 220 pounds), who is ranked No. 5 overall in the 2012 recruiting class.

As for where the Mountaineers fit, we'll have to wait to see who leaves and who stays, but the general consensus is, WVU would probably be picked between third and fifth this winter in the Big 12.

2 What will WVU's roster look like next season?

Outside of freshman for-

ward Tommie McCune, whose wish to leave was announced March 12, WVU coach Bob Huggins recently said on a radio show he didn't expect anyone else on the team to transfer.

"The first thing we want to do is end the rumors that this guy's going here, that guy's leaving and this guy is going to do this — none of that is happening," Huggins told the radio audience. "They're all there. They're all excited. They're all on board and they're all looking forward to getting back to work."

WVU will have transfers Aaric Murray and Juwan Staten eligible for next season, and the Mountaineers are bringing in three recruits: Elijah Macon, Eron Harris and Terry Henderson.

At 6-11, Murray should be able to slide into the spot left by Jones, while Staten is projected to play point guard.

Everyone else you already know: Deniz Kilicli at center, Keaton Miles and Aaron Brown at small forward, Jabarie Hinds and Gary Browne at guard and Dominique Rutledge, Pat Forsythe and Kevin Noreen at power forward.

3 Doesn't WVU have a log jam at point guard?

The quick answer is, you can never have too many point guards, especially if a team is hit with injuries the way WVU has the past few seasons.

With Staten now eligible, WVU has three guys listed at

point guard: Staten, Hinds and Browne.

But in Huggins' motion offense, there is no true point guard. Somebody brings it up, makes the first pass and then cuts. No one stays on the perimeter and runs the show, because everyone is either moving, setting screens or posting up.

So, you can have Staten and Hinds playing together, or Hinds and Browne or Staten and Browne. It doesn't really matter.

The bigger problem for WVU is, all three guards are in the same graduating class (2015). Huggins may find it difficult to recruit depth at that position right away, because what 18-year-old kid wants to sit and wait for three guys to leave?

4 What can we expect from Murray?

The expectations for Murray, who transferred from La Salle, are bigger than his 6-11 frame.

One WVU assistant told me during the season that Murray could be a future pro in the NBA. Some WVU players agreed.

"He's extremely talented. It's a shame he never got the chance to play with us this year, because he would have helped us out a lot," Bryant said.

During a brief stint playing in the Pittsburgh summer league last year, Murray showed an ability to dominate in the post, as well as run the floor and block shots.

In two seasons at La Salle, he blocked 143 shots. That would place him sixth all-

time at WVU.

If he continues to get stronger this offseason, there is a good chance Murray could leave early for the NBA draft, but it is really too early to discuss that.

5 Will anyone make an outside shot next season?

This may be the biggest question of them all.

The Mountaineers connected on just 29.8 percent (174-of-583) from 3-point range this season — the lowest shooting percentage in school history.

Staten was not known as a 3-point shooter at Dayton, where he connected on just 15 percent as a freshman.

Here's the thing about it all: If WVU is unable to hit outside shots, it won't matter if the Mountaineers are stronger or bigger or more athletic, because defenses will continue to pack it in down low.

Henderson, from Raleigh, N.C., is expected to be an outside sharpshooter, but he will only be a freshman. Hinds will have to shoot better; so will Browne.

Brown connected on 39 percent from 3-point range, but didn't play defense well enough to stay on the floor.

As WVU's large 2011 freshman class become sophomores, the hope is they become more confident and show more of an ability to score.

If they can, there really is no reason to think WVU's first season in the Big 12 won't be a success.

er. This summer is big for us and next year will be a really big season for us."

WVU heads into the offseason with optimism. The Mountaineers, who begin play in the Big 12 Conference next season, return everybody but senior center Natalie Burton.

WVU coach Mike Carey welcomes a five-player recruiting class he believes is one of his best.

"I'm excited for next year," WVU guard Taylor Palmer said. "This is going to be a big summer for all the returnees on this team. This is the time we have to get better. We're only losing one player. We're bringing basically everyone back. We're going to have a nice core for next year."

Here are the top five questions heading into next season.

1 How will WVU fare in the Big 12?

Any talk of women's basketball in the Big 12 begins with Baylor and its 6-foot-8 center, Brittney Griner, who returns for her senior season next year. Baylor is gunning for an undefeated national championship season in this NCAA tournament.

The Big 12 sent six other teams to the NCAAs in Oklahoma, Kansas, Kansas State, Iowa State, Texas and depart-

ing league member Texas A&M. WVU beat Texas, 68-55, in its first-round NCAA game this season.

"They are a very competitive conference on the women's side," Carey said of the Big 12. "They are national contenders year-in and year-out."

The Mountaineers will have to acclimate quickly to their new conference home, but a veteran lineup should

ease that transition.

2 How will WVU handle the expectations?

Carey's most successful WVU teams have tended to be the ones that were overlooked at the beginning of the season. The 2012 team is a prime example, placing in the top part of the Big East after being picked to finish ninth by the league's coaches.

However, the veteran 2011

team seemed to wilt under the pressure in the second half of the season and struggled down the stretch. Talk of a national championship run turned into a second-round ouster in the NCAA tournament.

The 2013 team will have to handle what are sure to be high expectations as the Mountaineers return five starters and embark on play in the Big 12.

The veterans have already talked of taking their summer training seriously in preparation for next season. They don't want to bid farewell to the NCAA tournament in the second round again.

3 Will the high-low game continue to work?

WVU took its game to another level when Carey began playing Bussie and Ya-Ya Dunning together. Their high-low game confounded opponents for much of the season. Dunning became a force from the foul-line area, knocking down shots when defenders backed off.

Bussie aggressively took the ball to the basket after establishing position in the paint. Teams did their best to deny her the ball.

The Bussie-Dunning combination will have to be a major component next season against the tall, physical teams the Mountaineers will encounter in the Big 12.

4 Who will consistently score from the perimeter?

Bussie and Dunning can't do all of the scoring. WVU will need more consistent play from its perimeter players. Teams began sagging off the perimeter shooters late in the season.

Palmer, Christal Caldwell and Brooke Hampton went through stretches where they couldn't miss from the outside and endured other stretches where they couldn't hit shots.

Again, consistency is key.

5 How will newcomers affect team chemistry?

Carey's incoming recruits were ranked in the top 20 by some sources. The class includes Bria Holmes, Darius Faulk and Makenzie White, along with center Lanay Montgomery and forward Jennie Simms.

It's not out of the question that these freshmen will push the veterans for playing time. Carey has demonstrated that he'll play the best player at a certain position, whether that player is a fifth-year senior or a freshman.

Many a team fell apart when new players took playing time away from the veterans. How the veterans handle that situation — if it arises — will be critical for the Mountaineers next season.

Study ties bites from deer ticks to food allergies

ONE OF MY READERS sent me an email that referred to an interesting article on the Internet at foodprocessing.com. What I learned just blew me away. I had no idea there could be a relationship between ticks and severe food allergic reactions, and I'll bet most of you didn't, either.

A research project at the University of Virginia showed deer tick bites may tie into food allergies in a major and serious way. My reader explained that a nephew of hers from Nashville was diagnosed and that is how she learned about the problem.

Without getting overly technical, there are small parts of carbohydrates found in food that can elicit allergic responses. In 2009, UVA researchers determined that antibodies formed in response to these carbohydrates are found in people who developed delayed anaphylactic shock three to six hours after they ate beef, lamb or pork. Twenty-four patients with these antibodies suffered various allergic reactions ranging from itching and swelling to airway constriction and irregular heartbeat and changes in blood pressure after eating beef, lamb or pork. These can be life-threatening reactions. There were no reactions if they didn't eat those meats, but severe reactions if they did.

These patients had eaten these meats for years with no problems.

So what triggered the responses and what caused the antibodies to form that led to their problems? They soon found that this food allergic response was not often found where tick numbers were low, and common where tick numbers were high.

They noted that most cases were relatively recent and stated that "the best explanation for increasing incidence of this syndrome is a major increase in tick bites related to the massive increase in the population of their primary host, the white-tailed deer."

They note that this is "now a common presenting cause of food allergy in Virginia."

The Carey Institute of Ecological Studies is also looking at ticks and Lyme disease. One of the biggest carriers of ticks that cause Lyme disease is deer mice.

Opponents of the deer hunt in Morgantown suggested that lowering deer numbers would not affect tick numbers because we couldn't lower mice numbers. That's partly true, but there is a third component in this tick story: Acorns.

There are lots of older oaks in Morgantown that produce acorns. Some years, the acorn crop is very large, and other years it is almost nonexistent. The Carey study showed that acorns attract deer mice and deer. In years when we have a good acorn crop, we get more deer mice (and more ticks), and more deer (and more ticks) coming into oak areas.

One other question raised relative to this issue was, do we have the black-legged tick (a major player in Lyme disease) in this area? There was a time when we had low numbers of this tick, but the latest research shows it is now quite common in western Virginia and eastern Ohio, and almost assuredly, common here.

What happens when we have a poor acorn year? The larval tick stage, lying around in the forest floor, needs a blood meal, and when acorns are running low, deer mice and deer numbers are lower, so guess where the larval ticks go for a blood meal? Humans.

I'm told acorn numbers were down last fall, and our warm weather means larval ticks will be more active earlier this spring. When out in your yards, cleaning up after winter, spray pants and shoes with Permethrin and be safe out there.

Physical Agility Tests (PAT) have been scheduled for anyone interested in applying for seven Natural Resources Police Officer (NRPO) positions open statewide, according to Lt. Tim Coleman, of the Law Enforcement Section of the West Virginia Division of Natural Resources (WVDNR).

All candidates must pass a PAT. Applicants should report to the lobby of the South Charleston Community Center at 601 Jefferson St. either April 13 or April 14. The tests start at 8 a.m. sharp each day. Walk-ons will be accepted.

NRPOs in the Law Enforcement Section are responsible for the prompt, orderly and effective

enforcement of all laws and rules of the state and have full law enforcement authority statewide. Of primary importance is the protection of West Virginia's wildlife to the degree that they are not endangered by unlawful activities.

To be considered for this position, candidates must be willing to relocate and work in any county in the state; must be willing to work all shifts and be on call; and understand that this is a statewide position, and as such, that the county of assignment may not be guaranteed.

Minimum qualifications include graduation from an accredited four-year college or university with preference given to majors in natural sciences, law enforcement, criminology or criminal justice, or candidates may substitute pre-

vious employment as a law enforcement officer under certain circumstances.

The PAT consists of three parts: a 37 1/2-yard swim; an agility test consisting of completing a minimum of 18 pushups in proper form in one minute and 27 sit-ups in proper form in one minute; and complete a 1 1/2-mile run in 15 minutes, 20 seconds or less. Failure to satisfactorily complete any part of the test is cause for disqualification.

Candidates should bring long pants and a shirt for the fully clothed swimming test (no jeans or sweatpants) and a change of clothing for the running test.

Ohio River creel survey being conducted

The DNR, the Ohio Division of Wildlife, and the Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources are conducting a cooperative survey of Ohio River anglers through Oct. 20.

Anglers fishing along the three states' common borders will be asked questions concerning fishing effort and the types and numbers of fish they have caught and harvested. The survey will also focus on residency and overall angling participation and experiences.

GO FISH! (W.VA. DNR)

Monongahela River

Fish surveys last week continued to find good numbers of large muskies in shallow water along the shore at Morgantown. Muskies can be caught by trolling or casting large crankbaits throughout the river. Hybrid striped bass were also abundant and a large paddlefish was observed. Walleye and sauger are spawning. A good pattern now is to fish for sauger and walleye an hour before and after sunset. Sauger and walleye usually begin feeding at dusk in the tailwater but will be active during the day when the water is turbid. They may also concentrate at the mouths of larger tributaries like Deckers, Buffalo, PawPaw and Pricketts creeks. Jigs with minnows are always good baits but 3-inch plastic grubs will also be productive.

Cheat Lake

Yellow perch are spawning and can be caught using red worm pieces or minnows. Fish the shoreline in the Morgan's Run embayment when the water level is down 5 to 8 feet and you can easily walk the shoreline. Channel catfish can also be caught at Cheat Lake Park. A good walleye stocking in 2010 should be producing 13- to 14-inch fish. Larger walleye should be getting ready to spawn. Try casting large Rapalas along the shoreline about an hour before and after sunset.

Tygart Lake

The lake is about 20 feet below the summer level. Walleye are almost finished spawning and will move into shallow water to feed or spawn at dusk. Try casting large Rapalas along the shoreline about an hour before and after sunset. Some walleye will also move up into river at the head of the lake to spawn. Drive into Cove Run and fish the river from the shore.

Tygart tailwater

Walleye will have been moving through the dam during the recent high water discharges. There are also lots of trout in the tailwater. Walleye fishing is best during higher flows (1,500 to 5,000 cubic feet per second) and trout fishing is best at low flows (less than 1,000 cfs). Call 304-265-5953 for daily lake and tailwater conditions.

Stonecoal Lake

The lake is at summer pool. Fishing is fair. Water temperature is on the rise. Bass are being caught in and around cover. Bluegill and crappie are also hitting live bait and jigs around beaver huts and fish attractors. Trout were stocked in the lake this fall by the Stonecoal Lake Fishing Club. A few perch have been caught in the upper end on minnows.

Stonewall Jackson

The lake is at winter pool and milky. Water temperature is on the rise. Fishing is fair. Bass are being caught in and around cover. Bluegill and crappie are hitting live bait. Channel catfish have been caught. Trout were stocked in the tailwater March 8. Before heading to the lake, call 304-269-7463.

Summersville

The lake is at winter pool and clear. Water temperature is on the rise. It is a great time of year for walleye. Try rocky points, dropoffs and at the mouths of small tributaries entering the lake. Trout were stocked in the tailwaters March 12. Info: 304-872-3412.



170 miles of Lake Erie's shoreline fine for fishing

VERMILION, Ohio — Fish a river enough and you'll learn spots where you can almost guarantee a strike. Steelhead guide Jim Chamberlin had that feeling about a stony point jutting from a black shale cliff that plunged into the Vermilion River a few miles upstream from Lake Erie.

"The dark cliffs absorb whatever heat there is, and that warms up the water next to them," he said. "It may only be a degree, but it makes a difference. And fish like places like those little points where they're out of the current."

"You should get a fish right there," Chamberlin said to Ray LaClair, who was watching his float drift along the rock. On cue, the float dipped under, LaClair raised his 12-foot rod and a 4-pound steelhead began a battle that ended with the fish being admired, photographed and released.

It was the first of 14 steelhead that LaClair would land and release during a float in a 13-foot inflatable raft that was ideal for the shallow streams that make up most of Steelhead Alley, a 170-mile stretch of Lake Erie shoreline that stretches from Vermilion to Erie, Pa.

"I have a 17-foot drift boat, but I borrowed the raft from a friend to try it, and it really seems like the way to go," Chamberlin said as three of us dragged the craft along a woodland trail to the river. "It's roomy and stable, and you can get it in and out of the water in

a lot more places."

Vermilion is about 50 miles west of downtown Cleveland. Yet it has the look and feel of a wilderness stream, with 100-foot cliffs of shale and sandstone covered with sheets of ice in the winter, and waterfalls pouring down the rock like crystal ribbons.

It was a drizzly day and the water was stained but not muddy, perfect for steelheading, yet we saw only eight other fishermen on a five-mile trip.

Much of the Vermilion River runs through linear parks that offer miles of access along undeveloped stretches of riverbank lined by the cliffs or dense woods. Access to the parks is free, but if you park there you need to be aware that overstaying the closing hours will result in a ticket.

Anglers also need to be aware that after a hard rain, Steelhead Alley streams can flash up and down 5 or 6 feet in a few days.

"That's been a problem the last few times I've been here," LaClair said. "Jim and I would schedule a trip, and he'd call and tell me to forget it because the rivers were blown out."

Chamberlin lived in Oakland County, Mich., before moving to Ohio to be near the rivers where he guides.

"One thing I've learned about the Vermilion is that it takes about 24 hours for rain to affect the river," he said. "But once it starts going up, you better pay attention. It can double in volume in a few hours."

LaClair was fishing for the

first time with a center-pin reel, a system developed in England that is well-suited to fishing steelhead and salmon with flies, jigs or natural baits under a float in current.

Center-pin reels look like big fly reels and are so precisely machined and balanced that if you give one a spin it will turn for several minutes. Because of their quality and limited manufacturing, they're expensive, running from \$150 to more than \$700.

When the float is cast into a current with a 10- to 13-foot rod, the pressure of the water will turn the spool, giving drag-free drifts of 30-100 yards.

It's important to weight the float so that only the tip is above the surface and to set the depth so the lures drift along just above the bottom. By using his fingers to briefly stop the spool, the angler can ensure the first thing the fish sees is the lure, a technique the English call "trotting."

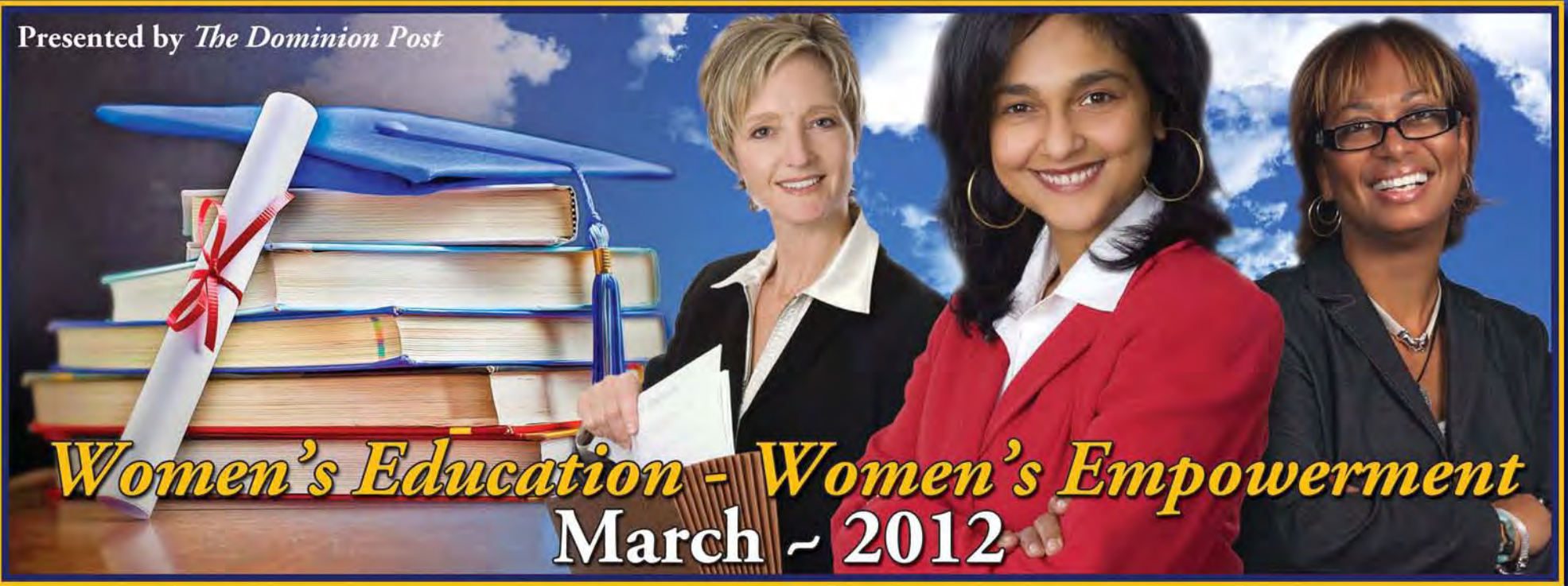
Center-pin fishermen must learn a few specialized casts, and on his first day LaClair had the basic cast down quickly. And because most center pins don't have a drag system, he played the fish by controlling the spool with his fingers at the rod handle or the palm of his free hand.

LaClair's final tally was 14 steelhead landed and released out of 16 hooked, the biggest about 10 pounds.

"Center-pin fishing is really effective," he said. "I got my 18-year-old grandson to try it, and now he doesn't want to use anything else."

Report: Sandusky called 'likely pedophile' in '98

STATE COLLEGE, Pa. — A psychologist who looked into a 1998 allegation against former Penn State assistant football coach Jerry Sandusky told police at the time that his behavior fit the profile of a likely pedophile, NBC News reported Saturday.

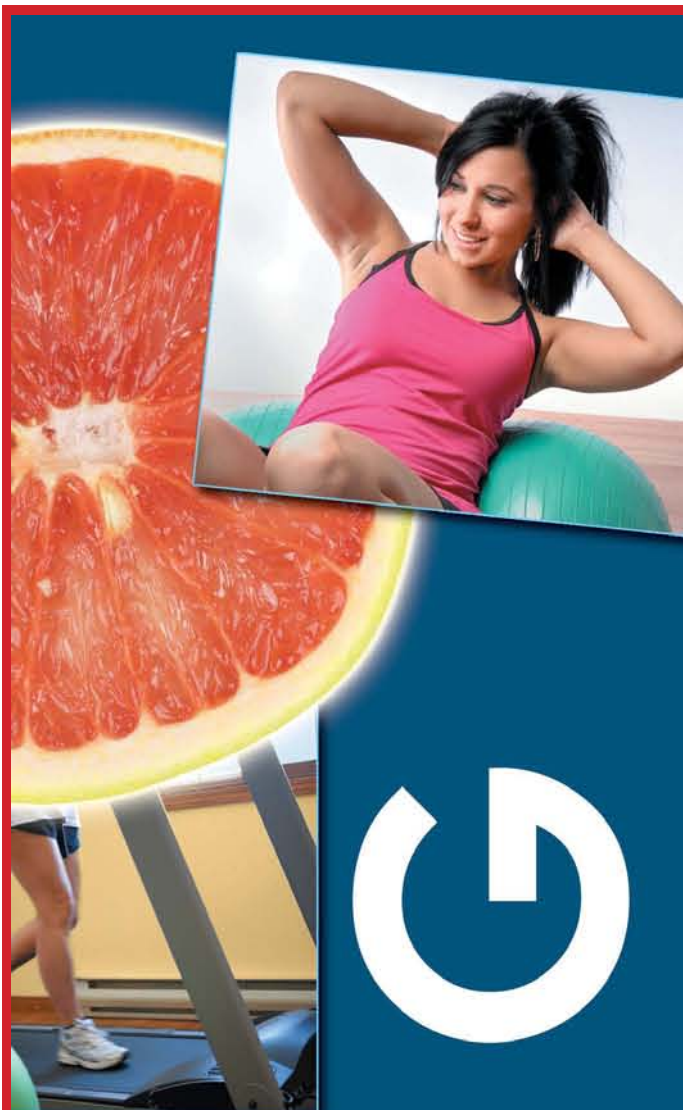
Yet Sandusky was never criminally charged, nor placed on a state registry of suspected child abusers, and prosecutors said he continued assaulting boys for more than a decade until his arrest in November.

NBC obtained a copy of the campus police department's investigatory report on an encounter in which Sandusky was accused of having inappropriate contact with an 11-year-old boy with whom he had showered naked on the Penn State campus. The police file includes the

report of State College psychologist Alycia Chambers, who interviewed and providing counseling to the boy. "My consultants agree that the incidents meet all of our definitions, based on experience and education, of a likely pedophile's pattern of building trust and gradual

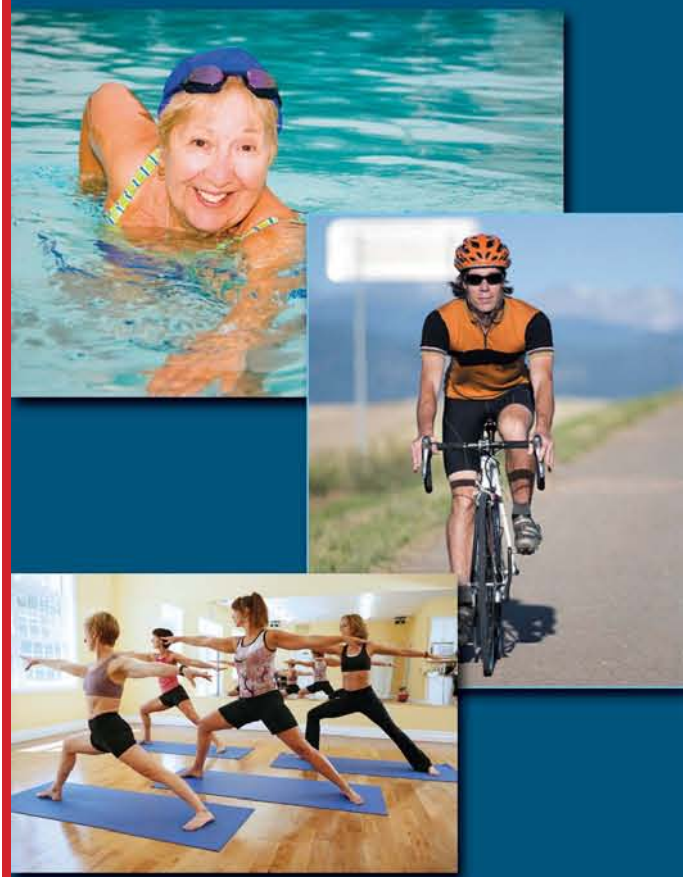
introduction of physical touch, within a context of a 'loving,' 'special' relationship," Chambers wrote. A second psychologist, however, concluded that Sandusky had neither assaulted the boy nor fit the profile of a pedophile. Centre County prosecutors

decided not to charge Sandusky, and the case was closed until a statewide grand jury accused the retired defensive coordinator of abusing the boy and nine others over a 15-year period. Sandusky, who faces more than 50 counts of child sex abuse, has pleaded innocent and awaits trial.

Leone's 3 HRs spark MHS sweep

Two games, two rallies and two wins for the Morgantown High baseball team as it swept a soggy doubleheader from Fairmont Senior on Saturday, at Mylan Park.

The Mohigans (5-0) faced early deficits in both games, but found runs down the stretch and stifled Polar Bears bats with the games on the line, winning, 4-3 and 12-9.

MHS catcher Connor Leone stole the show with three home runs on the day, sparking the Mohigans' comeback in both games. His two-run shot in the fifth inning of the first game tied the score, setting up starting pitcher Nicklas Gallagher to earn the win; his three-run bomb to left center in the fifth inning of the second game was even more clutch.

"You also have to remember, [Leone] caught 14 innings of baseball, which we hardly ever do," MHS head coach Mark McCarty said. "But he came through with flying colors."

Leading, 9-5, in the fifth inning of game two, Fairmont Senior coach Steve Naternicola decided to swap out pitchers with two outs because Jayce Riler showed

tainers, who last captured the crown in 2008, compiled a season-high score of 196.475, 10th-best in program history.

North Carolina State finished second (196.000) and Maryland third (195.950).

"One final time, we're taking the bird back home with us," WVU coach Jason Butts said with a satisfied smile. "I think it will give us a lot of confidence to go compete in the Big 12. We put up a huge score today, and we'll take this confidence into regionals."

As the Mountaineers (21-5, 12-1 EAGL) came forward to accept their EAGL trophy, at Pitt's Fitzgerald Field House, they discovered their former coach, the retired Linda Burdette-Good, beaming like a proud mother as she handed over the precious hardware.

"Oh, my gosh," Deal said, shaking her head after becoming the first WVU freshman since Tina Maloney (vault) in 2009 to capture an EAGL title. "I am just speechless of what just happened. All the pressure was on me to hit my routine, and I did it — not for me. I did it for my team because I know they need me and I stepped up and did what I needed to do."

The intensity level ratcheted up to unprecedented levels after a fall on the Mountaineers' fourth beam routine. WVU's final two beam competitors, Hope Sloanhoffer and Deal, had to stay on the apparatus.

Sloanhoffer came through with a 9.8, setting the stage for Deal's heroics. Her teammates gripped each other's arms in anticipation and cheered wildly with each successful skill. When Deal flawlessly landed her dismount, the Mountaineers erupted with unbridled elation.

"It was incredible," said Sloanhoffer, whose team won the bars (49.175) and beam (48.85) competitions. "I

would be lying if I told you I wasn't nervous because I was a little bit, but in the back of my head I was like, 'She is going to hit.'

"With the confidence she has in the gym and on the floor, I wasn't worried. I was so confident in her and so proud of the way she handled herself and remained calm in an extremely stressful situation. I was so impressed."

Sloanhoffer took to the Fitzgerald Field House floor less than 24 hours after being named the EAGL gymnast of the year. She promptly proved her award was spot-on with a memorable performance.

The sophomore turned in a career-best all-around score of 39.500, claiming titles on vault (9.9) and bars (9.9) while placing second on floor exercise (9.9) and fourth on beam (9.8).

"I could see she was going to hit," Butts said. "For her to come in and do that and win EAGL gymnast of the year and put on that show, I'm very happy for her."

Sloanhoffer was most happy for WVU's two seniors, Maloney and Nicole Roach. Those two did not want to become the first senior class in program history to fail to win an EAGL championship.

"Afterward, when we knew [the title] was ours, they came up to us, and said, 'We did it for you,' " Maloney said. "It was awesome knowing our team is behind us 100 percent. We're all in it to win it, and that's exactly what we did."

The gymnasts will work out in Cary Gym during spring break as they prepare for NCAA regional competition, on April 7, at a yet-to-be-determined site. "We just have to keep the energy we had in here," Sloanhoffer said. "Today was incredible. We were so confident. If we keep that up and bring it to regionals with us, whether it's a small arena or a big arena, if we have that energy we are set up for an awesome showing."

WVU not just to blame

Property owners group has right idea, but also obligated

The street fires last weekend in Morgantown have prompted outrage, and with good reason.

However, it appears to have also ignited some finger pointing.

Last week, the Greater Morgantown Property Owners Association sent a meeting request to WVU President James Clements. The memo also was carbon-copied for the city manager, the city's police and fire chief, and the director of Sunnyside Up.

The association wants to discuss the recent spate of street fires and Dumpster fires.

We think this is a good idea. Period. And we would expect Clements and others to agree.

That said, the responsibility for setting standards and helping defuse some of the out-of-control parties in areas of Morgantown falls just as much at the doorsteps of this association's members as it does the city's and WVU's.

In some regards, these developers, property managers and landlords are more apt to be in control of some of this behavior than the police and WVU.

Whether it's an "Animal House" atmosphere or just a house party should be apparent to owners or managers of off-campus student housing. Enforcing the leases that dictate everything down to the number of visitors allowed is clearly the responsibility of the members of this association.

Is drinking on the rooftop all right? Is setting up beer pong tables in the yard or on the porch OK?

The vast majority of students who participate in these fires are not on campus property and not on university time. Of course, WVU is empowered to suspend or even expel them for their behavior on and off campus. But WVU does not have any further means of identifying suspects than the videos everyone else is privy to — including members of this association.

We applaud the property owners association for stepping up and showing their concern about this unacceptable behavior.

But this group's members are also essential to controlling who inhabits the buildings and neighborhoods where much of this mayhem happens.

Unfortunately, the matter doesn't end there, and it won't end as a result of any number of meetings.

More than anything, this all appears to be fueled by alcohol, which is a subject for another day.

Does Clements have a responsibility to help resolve this problem? Of course, he does. But this association's members are just as obligated to sit down and be held accountable, too.

It takes a village to teach a college student that irresponsible partying isn't even sophomoric — nor freshman — behavior.

Lights. Camera. Justice?

Court should lift blackout on history

Why the U.S. Supreme Court continues to hold its oral arguments away from television cameras remains a mystery and a national shame. On Monday, the court will begin hearing six hours of arguments over three days in a lawsuit brought by more than half of the states in the nation to challenge the constitutionality of the Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act, one of the most important pieces of economic legislation passed by Congress since the New Deal. The stakes of the litigation could not be higher. How the court rules is likely to affect health care in this country for generations and could even affect the outcome of the presidential election.

Who will get to witness this historical event? Only the justices, the lawyers, a few reporters and 250 lucky individuals whose tenacity and financial ability will allow them to camp out in front of the court — perhaps for days — before the hearing begins. The court has said it will provide same-day (not live) audio coverage of the oral arguments. There will be no television at all, not even on

tape. We should be outraged by this decision. Supreme Court proceedings are not simply government events; they are important historic moments and are of major educational, civic and national interest. There is a strong presumption that people should be able to watch government proceedings, and in ones as vitally important as this, the public has an especially great interest in transparency.

Those very few academics and politicians who argue against live television in the court usually raise several arguments, none of them convincing.

First, they suggest that televising the arguments will lead to showboating by lawyers or judges for the cameras. Many state courts, however, at all levels allow televised proceedings, and there have been no problems with improper attorney or judicial behavior.

Second, some have argued that if television cameras were allowed, the media might broadcast excerpts that offer a misleading impression of the arguments or show the proceedings and the participants out of context. But that could just as easily happen with the audio released at the end of the day, or even when journalists report on what they heard in court. A newspaper or television reporter could quote a justice's

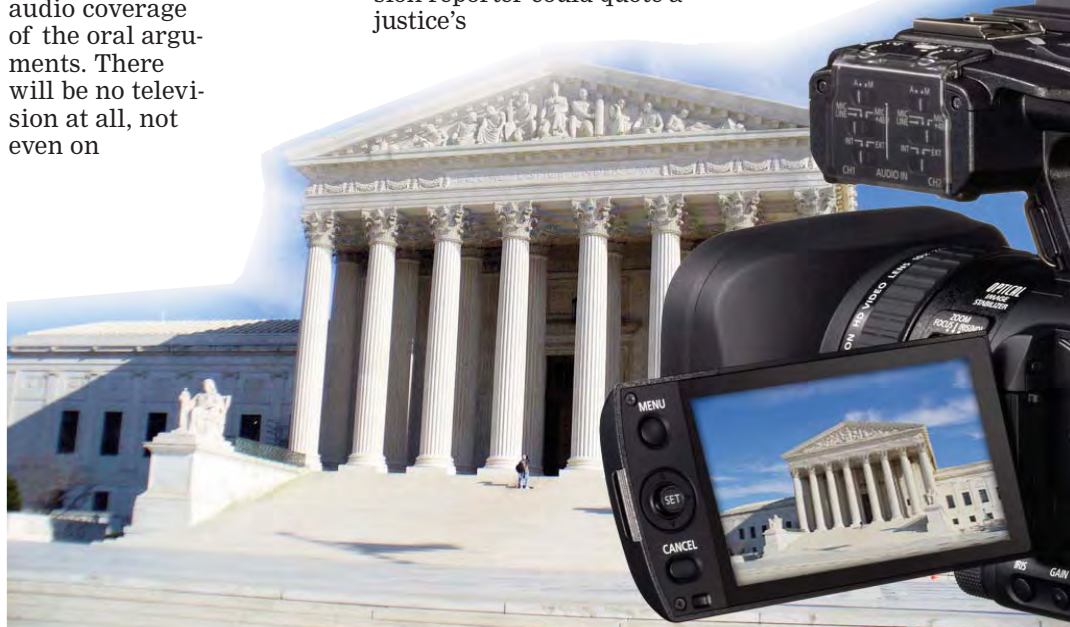
question or a lawyer's answer out of context under the current blackout rule. The Supreme Court should not be able to protect itself from misreporting any more than any other government institution holding a public hearing.

Perhaps the justices are afraid that an excerpt of oral arguments might appear on Jon Stewart's "The Daily Show" or Jay Leno's "The Tonight Show" and be used for entertainment or comedic purposes. That certainly could happen. But in a democracy, even those in prominent positions are fair game for satire. In no other context would Supreme Court justices say that government officials should be allowed to protect themselves from possible criticism by cutting off public access to public proceedings.

The Senate Judiciary Committee has debated bills requiring the Supreme Court to allow cameras. The full Congress should act on these proposed laws as soon as possible.

The United States is the only country in which Supreme Court justices have lifetime appointments. That is all the more reason that

Character, legacy of McDonnell

SANFORD N. McDONNELL died on March 19 at age 89.

Not surprisingly, newspaper obituaries are highlighting his many successful years at the helm of the McDonnell Douglas Corp. But I predict that when the history of our era is written, Sandy (as everyone called him) will be best remembered as America's leading advocate for character education in our schools.

Of course, I'm biased because I got to see this humble, compassionate and visionary man up close for more than 20 years as a fellow board member of the Character Education Partnership — the organization he founded and guided after he retired from the business world (character.org).

Sandy led the way, making a compelling case for taking character seriously with business colleagues, political leaders, educators, parents, students — and anyone else who would listen.

It worked. Despite a misbegotten obsession with high-stakes testing among policy makers, character education is back on the agenda after decades of neglect.

Today, thanks to the efforts of CEP and like-minded organizations, thousands of educators are transforming the culture of their schools by teaching and modeling core ethical values such as honesty, integrity, caring, responsibility and respect.

Although much more needs to be done to reach schools, the character-education movement has made great inroads — and is here to stay.

What Sandy accurately described as a "crisis of character" plagues our country. From corporate scandals to overcrowded prisons, from bullying and cheating in schools to widespread drug abuse, character-related failures threaten the health of American democracy — and the vitality of our freedoms.

Yes, reading and math are important. But what matters most in a democracy is what kinds of human beings are reading the books and doing the math.

Understood properly, comprehensive, effective character education is about giving students meaningful opportunities to practice freedom responsibly in a school culture that encourages, among other things, respect for the rights of others, shared decision-making, civic engagement, peer mediation, and ethical use of the Internet.

In short, a school committed to educating for character is a school that actually practices what it teaches in civics classes about the rights and responsibilities of citizenship.

Every year at the CEP annual meeting, he helped honor "schools of character" from every region of the country. One typical winner, a middle school serving a disadvantaged population in Sandy's own state of Missouri, has many of the "best practices" that define effective character education:

Students hold class meetings and participate in making class rules. Trained peer mediators help fellow students resolve conflicts. Teachers include discussion of ethical issues in classes across the curriculum. In these and other ways, students, teachers, staff and parents work together to create and sustain a caring, ethical community.

Before implementing character education, this middle school was considered a "failing school." Today, grades are up, suspensions and discipline problems are down, and parents are no longer fleeing — they're lining up to get in.

Sandy's message was simple, but profound: The character of a nation is determined by the character of its people.

For your inspiration and leadership — and for reminding us of the inseparable link between character and freedom — thank you, Sandy.

Will Romney be the GOP's Gov. Dukakis?

THERE'S A saying in Republican politics: Massachusetts produces only two exports — lobsters and liberals — and neither one travels well.

That's what GOP strategists said in 1988 when then-Gov. Michael S. Dukakis was the Democratic presidential nominee, and in 2004, when Sen. John F. Kerry ran and lost.

But this year, they're glumly pondering whether that cranky old rule also applies to their own purported front-runner, former Gov. Mitt Romney.

Romney's not really a liberal, despite what his conservative critics say. But he sure hasn't always traveled well. Despite his claim to be the candidate with the broadest national appeal, Romney has failed to win anywhere in the Republican strongholds of the rural Midwest and the Deep South.

It's true that he's won primaries in some of the swing states that will be critical in this fall's general election campaign: Florida, Ohio, Michigan.

But despite those victories, the campaign hasn't been good for Romney. Instead of helping him look more presidential, it's made him look testy and calculating. Instead of building up his numbers in the national polls, it's ground them down.

Last fall, as the campaign was getting under way, 36 percent of the nation's voters had a unfavorable opinion of Romney, according to Fox News polling. Now, after months of nastiness, that number is up to 49 percent.

And with three rival candidates all promising to stay in the race through the last primaries in June, he faces three more months of the same battering.

Romney's beginning to look a bit like a Republican version of Dukakis: A Massachusetts governor who might win the nomination by outlasting weak opponents, but who may never quite win his party's heart — or the nation's.

That's partly because, as Dukakis did, Romney is selling himself as a better manager for the federal government, not as the leader of a grand crusade. It's not a message that gets the blood flowing. Yes, he says his campaign is "a battle for the soul of America," but he doesn't always sound as if he means it.

Besides, his campaign rarely stays on that high plane for long. Instead, Romney's message this month has been technical and tactical: That he's amassing more delegates than anyone else, so it's time for his rivals to get out of the way.

As a practical political forecast, that may be sound thinking. But as the rallying call for a political party, it has all the charm of the warning of the villainous Borg in "Star Trek": "Resistance is futile."

It's not unusual for voters to take time reconciling themselves to their party's choice of a nominee. In 2008, many Hillary Rodham Clinton supporters who voted initially that they would never vote for Obama voted for him in the end.

But here's the real danger sign for Romney in those Gallup results: He's performing significantly worse than the GOP's 2008 nominee, Sen. John McCain, R-Ariz., did four years ago. In early 2008, 47 percent Republican voters said they would vote for McCain with enthusiasm — and back then, hard-core conservatives were condemning McCain as too moderate, much as they criticize Romney today.

That doesn't mean Republican voters won't turn out this fall: An earlier Gallup Poll found that GOP voters are more enthusiastic than Democrats about voting in general this year. But it does suggest that if Romney wins the nomination, he won't be starting his general election campaign with much of a head of steam.

Romney's still likely to grind out a victory in the delegate count and win the nomination. But then again, that's precisely what Dukakis did, prevailing over a field that included Jesse Jackson, Dick Gephardt, Paul Simon, Gary Hart, Joe Biden and Al Gore. That year, 1988, was a low-enthusiasm year for voters in both parties. It's beginning to look as if 2012 will be one, too.

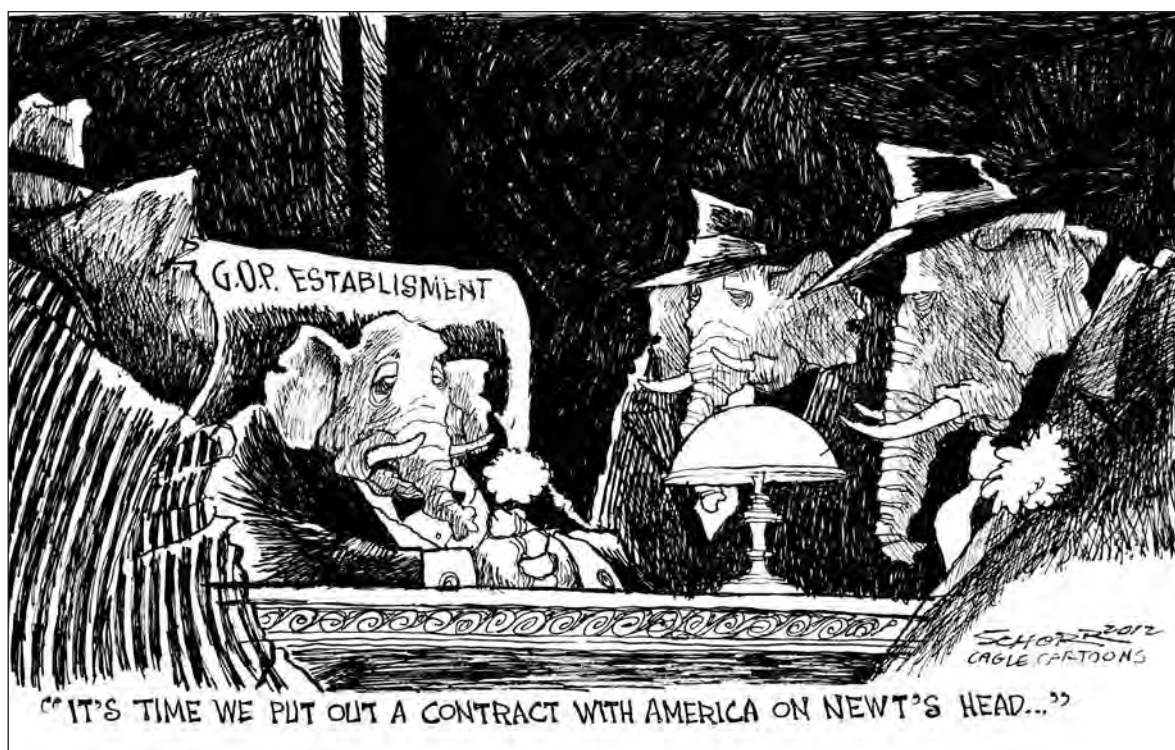

their actions should be transparent and that they should not be allowed to shelter themselves from public scrutiny.

Watching Justice Antonin Scalia ask a biting, sarcastic question, or Justice Anthony M. Kennedy play law professor with a brilliant adversary, or Justice Elena Kagan stare down an attorney who evades a difficult question would give the American people just a little more insight into some of their most important leaders, and into how a critically important branch of government works. We have a right to be included — especially when the court is hearing a case concerning the constitutionality of the Affordable Care Act, which might dramatically alter American life for decades.

The Supreme Court announced Friday that it will allow the broadcasting of the audiotapes of oral arguments immediately after they conclude.

C-SPAN said that it will do this. But if people can hear audiotapes just minutes after the arguments are finished, it is impossible to see the harm in allowing them to see the proceedings live just an hour earlier.

Obviously, there should be television cameras in the Supreme Court, and it should happen by Monday. It is time for the Supreme Court to enter the 21st — or at least the 20th — century.

Early screening for colon cancer best medicine

Our state of West Virginia has one of the highest rates of colon cancer in the country.

Even though death from colorectal cancer is highly preventable, it remains the second-leading cause of cancer-related deaths in our state.

We have been learning considerably more about colon cancer in recent years, in part because of its sheer frequency in the lives of our friends and loved ones. Colon cancer claims 50,000 American lives annually, and 145,000 new cases are diagnosed. How many of these cases could have been prevented?

March is National Colorectal Cancer Awareness Month: This is the perfect time to change the statistics for the better. And the good news is that we're making great strides in beating colon cancer — particularly through early detection.

Those who discover that they have colon cancer are fighting back in ever increasing numbers, but early detection is key in this fight.

New research that tracked patients for more than 20 years shows the death rate from colorectal cancer has cut in half for those who had a colonoscopy and have precancerous growths removed.

Everyone is at risk to develop colorectal cancer; however, age is a main factor: Both men and

women should be tested for colon cancer starting at age 50. Additionally, you should ask your doctor about a colorectal exam even earlier if you have any of the following risk factors: Family history of cancer, obesity, diabetes, current or former smoker,

or heavy drinker. Unfortunately, African Americans have the highest colorectal cancer incidence and mortality rates of all racial groups in the United States, and Jews of Eastern European descent have one of the highest colorectal cancer risks of any ethnic group in the world.

The gold standard of testing for the disease is a colonoscopy, as it is the most effective way to identify the presence of cancer early. Your doctor may also choose to start with a stool test or a less invasive CT scan. The most important tool is awareness on the part of patients and their doctors. Regular screenings are

important, because the earliest stages of colorectal cancer often have no symptoms, and about 75 percent of all new cases of colorectal cancer occur in people with no known risk factors for the disease.

Let's do the things we know we should do: Lead a healthy lifestyle by eating healthy and exercising regularly. Do not smoke, and if you use alcohol, only do so in moderation.

Colorectal cancer is preventable, beatable and treatable when caught early.

This March, West Virginians should commemorate Colorectal Cancer Awareness Month by talking to your health care professionals about screening options and ways to reduce your risk. Encourage those close to you to do the same.

When it comes to your health, you never want to be too late.

5 reasons the dividend boom isn't about to go bust

The news keeps getting better for dividend investors. But can it last?

The latest sign of a dividend renaissance is Apple's decision to begin sharing some of its profits with shareholders for the first time in nearly two decades. The world's most valuable company will start paying a dividend later this year, rather than continue to stockpile cash from iPhone and iPad sales.

That announcement came a week after major banks moved to restore their dividends, after cutting them during the financial crisis to conserve cash. At least nine top banks plan to raise their payouts or are considering doing so after the government conducted stress tests to ensure the banks can survive another crisis.

Payouts by companies in the Standard & Poor's 500 index are expected to climb 15 percent from last year to \$277 billion, according to S&P Indices. That amount

would top the previous record of \$248 billion, set in 2008. Three-quarters of the S&P 500's dividend-paying companies are making higher payouts than they did last year.

Interest is so intense that hedge funds and many other Wall Street pros who normally avoid dividend stocks have been rushing into them lately, and Apple's actions can only add to the frenzy, says analyst Howard Silverblatt of S&P Indices.

In fact, dividend stocks have been among the market's strongest performers the past 12 months, a fact that hasn't been lost on investors. Over that period, they have deposited a net \$25 billion into mutual funds specializing in dividend stocks — usually labeled 'equity income' funds — according to industry consultant Strategic Insight.

That number wouldn't normally be impressive, except that the cash came in as investors pulled out of nearly all other types of stock funds. A net total of \$136 billion was withdrawn from all other stock fund categories, reflecting investors' continuing fear of market volatility.

It's fueling talk that a dividend stock bubble might be developing. In one scenario, the economy hits another

rough patch, companies conserve cash again by cutting dividends, and dividend stock prices tumble.

It's dangerous to invest in a hot segment of the market, expecting the rally will continue — just ask anyone who lost big in the dot-com era. But here are five reasons that dividend stocks are still sound investments.

1. Dividends are a long-term approach, not a trading strategy: The income that dividend stocks generate accounts for more than 40 percent of the total return of the S&P 500 since 1926, according to a study by Ibbotson Associates. The rest of the market's return came from rising stock prices. Companies can cut or eliminate dividends, as many did in 2009. But payouts usually are restored to their old levels in time.

2. Dividend-paying stocks are less volatile: Dividend-payers tend to rise more slowly during market rallies, but suffer smaller losses when stocks decline. So if a market downturn is around the corner, dividends will offer some protection. That's why they're so appealing to retirees, and an investor wanting to limit risk. "In the stock market, dividends are sort of the kids' end of the swimming pool. They're not too volatile for the average investor," says David Kelly, chief markets strategist at JPMorgan Funds.

3. Boomers will remain yield-hungry: Expect demographic trends to continue fueling demand for income-generating investments. Baby boomers are beginning to retire in large numbers. That trend is still young, and those retirees will need regular cash flow. Many will rely on dividends, creating demand that could help drive dividend stock prices higher.

4. Corporate cash is at record levels: Profits have risen so sharply the past couple years that the cash held by S&P 500 companies totaled a record \$1 trillion in the fourth quarter. With such a big stash, the ratio of dividends being paid relative to cash on balance sheets remains historically low, Silverblatt says. That puts companies in good position to increase dividends, or initiate payouts. Last year, a record 22 companies initiated dividends, and Apple became the fourth to do so this year.

5. Dividends can survive possible tax hit: Since 2003, tax rates that investors pay on dividend income have topped out at a historically low 15 percent. President Obama's latest budget proposal would raise the rates on top earners to as high as 39.6 percent. Yet it's hard to say whether Obama's proposal can clear Congress in an election year. Current rates are due to expire at year-end, unless Congress extends them.

The reality of bond investing

Bond investors get their returns from two places: the yield that the bond pays, plus any increase in price for the bond itself. Bond prices rise when interest rates fall, and that's largely been the case for the last 30 years. But rates are now so low that investors may need to limit their return expectations for many bonds to just that first piece, the yield, says Kevin Loome. He specializes in high-yield bonds, which are also known as junk bonds. They are issued by weaker companies but make up for it by paying higher yields.

They're called high-yield bonds, but the yields aren't as high as they've been historically. Depending on what category you're looking at, they're as low as they've ever been. On an absolute yield basis, it's obviously very rich. The difference is the spread (or how much more the bond yields than a Treasury that's maturing at the same time). That's what we look at in fixed income. On a spread basis, I would characterize high yield as fairly valued on a historical basis.

So should investors be expecting to get only the yield from high-yield bonds, with no more potential for rises in price? In the high-yield bonds with higher credit ratings, you pretty much are only going to get the yield. In lower rated ones, in the best case, you might get the yield and a little bit of spread compression. (That's when the difference in rates between a junk bond and Treasury narrows, and it can result in a rise in price for the bond.)

Junk bonds offer higher yields because of the higher default risk. How worried should investors be? The number of actual defaults won't be that big. There are some big 2006, 2007 vintage leveraged buyout deals that make up a whole lot of the high-yield market. A couple of those could default and make the number lumpy. In a lot of those situations, the expectation of a default is largely priced in. Defaults are like inflation. It's the expectation that's more important than the actual number.

What's a fair expectation for returns this year? High yield is a hot topic because people are piling into it, but a decent amount of total return has already happened. At the beginning of the year, it looked fairly cheap. Now it's more fairly valued. It's just kind of average relative value.

So what would you say to an investor considering moving out of low-yielding savings accounts and into high-yield bonds? The two are so different in risk. I'm assuming people are in that to preserve capital. High yield is not the place you want to go if you want to just preserve capital. But if you want to do the best in fixed income over long periods of time, high yield tends to do the best.

What's in your fund?

Stock mutual funds generally come in two flavors: growth or value.

Growth funds look for companies whose revenue and profits are rising quickly. Think Priceline.com. Its net income doubled last year to \$1 billion from a year earlier. Value funds look for stocks that may appear underappreciated or priced too low. Think Hewlett Packard, its stock has moved downward since 2010.

But mutual funds sometimes buy the unexpected. Consider Apple. Although many view it as a quintessential growth stock, it's also in nearly 20 percent of all large-cap value stock funds.

Why growth mutual funds own Apple

Sales of iPhones and iPads more than doubled last quarter, compared with the same period a year earlier. Financial analysts believe Apple's latest models will ensure strong sales

growth and fuel earnings growth of 26 percent this year. Companies in the Standard & Poor's 500 index are only expected to post 9 percent earnings growth. Analysts at William Blair project Apple will enjoy 18 percent annual earnings growth over the long term.

Why value mutual funds own Apple

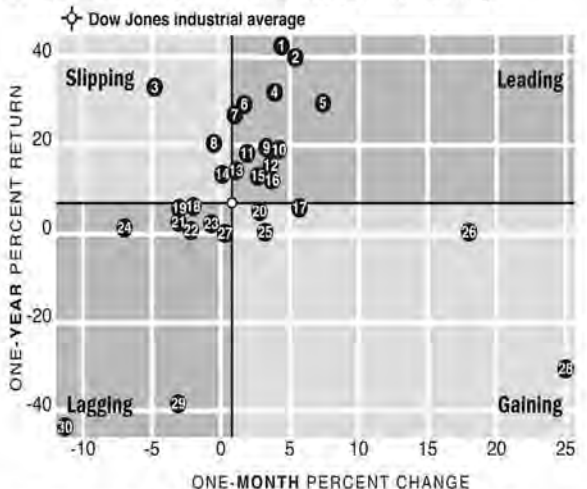
Apple is growing fast, but some value managers say the market doesn't give it enough credit. Apple trades at 11 times its expected earnings per share in 2013, according to Credit Suisse. Other large-cap tech stocks, such as Google and Qualcomm, are trading at an average of 12 times. So Apple has a lower price-earnings ratio than its peers, even though its earnings are growing faster. Apple will also begin paying a \$2.65 quarterly dividend later this year, resulting in a yield of 1.8 percent. Other large-cap tech stocks offer an average yield of 1.5 percent.

Dow30 Stocks

The Dow Jones industrial average fell for the third week in the last four, led by Caterpillar's 5.1 percent drop. Caterpillar has benefited from strong growth in China and other Asian economies, which has meant more demand for the construction and mining equipment that it makes. 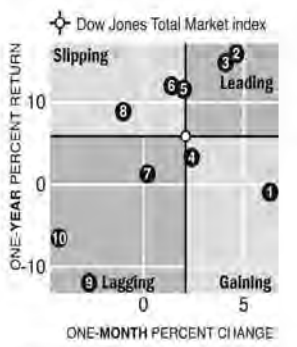

Oil and gas

Shares fell across the oilfield services industry last week after a major company warned of weaker results this quarter. Rigs in the United States are shifting from drilling for natural gas, whose price is weak, to oil, whose price is strong. Baker Hughes said the shift has led to lower prices for its pressure pumping business unit, as well as higher costs for raw materials. Baker Hughes will report its first-quarter results late next month. When it does, the company said it expects to report a drop in pre-tax operating profit from the fourth quarter of 2011. Its stock fell 10.7 percent. Rival Schlumberger fell 4.7 percent, and Halliburton fell 3.2 percent.

Feeling better?

The stock market is rising, but so are gasoline prices. Which affects the mood of consumers more?

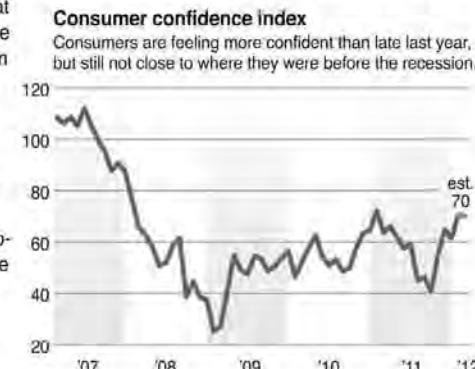
Maybe it's a wash. Economists expect a report on Tuesday to show that consumer confidence dipped in March from February, but only modestly.

Consumer confidence has been steadily rising since hitting a 30-month low in October. Shoppers are feeling more optimistic because layoffs are slowing, corporate hiring is improving and the

stock market is surging. The S&P 500 is already up 11 percent so far this year.

Last month, stronger economic reports sent consumer confidence to its highest level since February 2008, before the financial crisis.

To be sure, consumer confidence is still well below where it was before the recession. And drivers now must contend with higher gasoline bills. A gallon of regular costs \$3.89 across the country, on average, according to AAA. That's up 6 percent from \$3.58 a month ago.

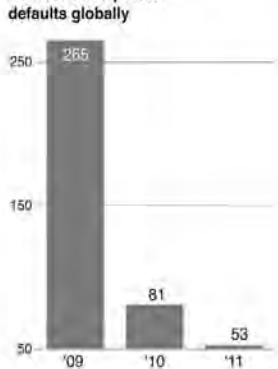

DECLINING DEFAULTS

Good news for bond investors: More companies are making good on their bond payments. Last year, Standard & Poor's counted only 53 corporate defaults worldwide. That's down from 2010, when 81 corporate bond issuers defaulted.

Junk bond mutual funds have been popular because they offer higher yields than other kinds of bonds, but keep in mind that the trade off is higher risk. Among last year's defaulters that started the year with a credit rating, all but one were junk status. In 2011, 2 percent of junk-grade issuers in the U.S. defaulted. In emerging markets, the default rate among junk-rated companies was lower, at 0.6 percent.

BREAKING UP THE CROWD

Last year was tough for stock pickers. Stocks increasingly moved in packs, so the ones that active investors identified as potential winners often behaved the same as everything else. The result was that 2011 was a good year for index mutual funds: 84 percent of actively managed stock mutual funds failed to beat the market, according to S&P Indices.

So far this year, stocks are moving more independently. Citi analysts wrote in a recent report. Stocks in emerging markets are behaving even more independently than those in developed markets. Further separation between winners and losers could mean better returns for stock pickers.

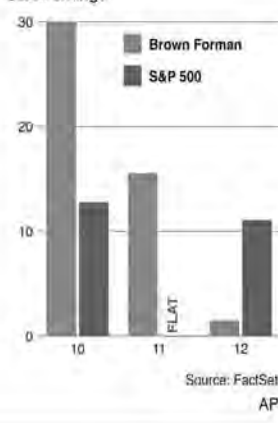


BUBBLING BOURBON

After parting the last two years, Brown Forman stock has a bit of a nangoover. The maker of Jack Daniel's whiskey and Finlandia vodka is up 1.5 percent this year, when the S&P 500 is up 11 percent. Financial analysts worry that higher costs for glass and other products will hurt profits.

Citi analyst Vivien Azer is sticking with the stock, pointing to the resurgence in popularity for bourbon. Brown Forman's bourbon revenue rose 11 percent in the four weeks through March 3 from a year earlier, compared with 5 percent growth for liquor revenue across the industry. The company's flavored bourbons, such as Jack Daniel's Tennessee Honey, are popular.

March 28, 2011 – New York – The New York Times began charging Monday for full access to its website and mobile services. The third-largest U.S. newspaper is charging \$15 every four weeks, or \$195 a year, to read more than 20 articles a month on its website. That fee also covers a subscription on the newspaper's software for smartphones.

One year later, the newspaper showed no signs of tearing down its online paywall. Just the opposite, in fact.

Earlier this month, it announced it would slash the number of articles available for free from 20 per month to 10. The change is to take effect in April.

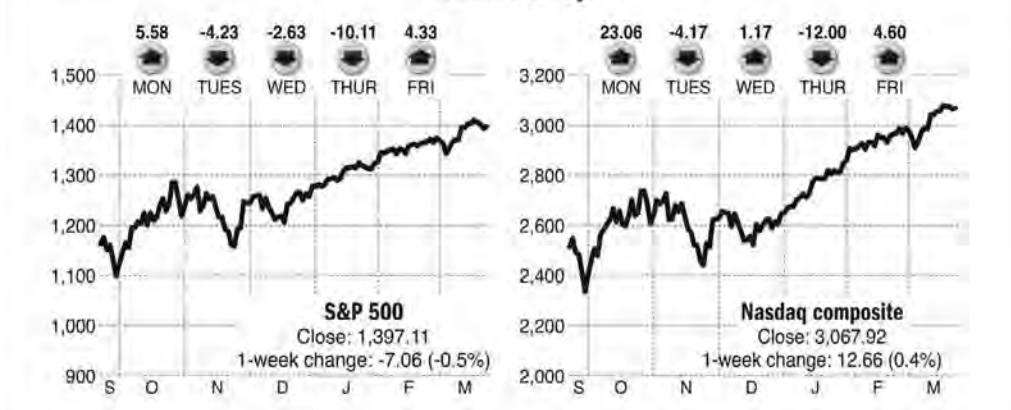
Charging readers for unlimited online access has helped boost the Times' circulation revenue. But the effort hasn't generated enough to offset a decline in advertising revenue.

In the last three months of 2011, digital and print circulation revenue grew 5 percent to \$242 million, while companywide ad revenue fell 7 percent to \$359 million. Overall revenue fell 3 percent.

And in the year since the paywall policy began, The New York Times' stock has lost more than a quarter of its value. It closed at \$6.82 on Wednesday, down from \$9.22 on March 28, 2011.

Still, The Times' strategy has inspired other U.S. newspaper publishers to impose similar restrictions.

No matter the estate, preparation is crucial

FAR TOO MANY people think, "I don't have an estate. I don't need to do any estate planning."

There are more aspects to estate planning than just signing a will. Medical, current financial and other decisions also play an important role.

The differences between the similar sounding living will and living trust are that the first is for medical purposes; the other is financial.

A living will provides authority for certain last medical measures when a person is in a terminal condition. It has nothing to do with transferring assets or property after death.

A living (or revocable) trust is a financial method that provides for the succession of ownership of trust assets much like a will does, as well as allowing control of the trust's assets by a professional manager when appropriate. There are also irrevocable trusts that can provide important benefits in estate planning.

Other important estate planning documents are powers of attorney. These documents deal with the authority given to others to make medical and financial decisions under the limited conditions stated in them.

This will assure that someone will always have the power to act on your behalf, which can prevent going into court to secure such authority.

While you're doing your estate planning, it pays to check on the beneficiary that you have chosen for your life

insurance proceeds and retirement funds. Neither will be controlled by your will unless your estate is the beneficiary, which is not always the most financially appropriate choice to make.

For example, naming your estate as the beneficiary of your retirement funds can lead to more income taxes being owed because of the short pay-out period when an estate receives such funds. Extra taxes may not be what you had in mind.

While you are free to provide nothing from your estate for your children, you cannot "cut out" your spouse. West Virginia law allows a spouse who has received nothing or an inadequate amount, to claim a percentage of the deceased spouse's estate.

The percentage a spouse receives is based on the number of years married. A maximum of 50 percent of the combined estate can be claimed by the surviving spouse who was married 15 years or more to the deceased person.

So, while a will controls major aspects of one's estate, it's not the only document that can protect your property and your well-being.

That's good planning.

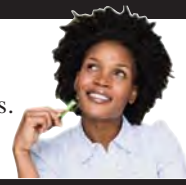

As a mantel is often the centerpiece of a room, and sometimes even a whole floor of your home, dressing it up can be tricky business. There's much to consider, according to interior designer Brenda Beatty — your personal style, the style of your home and how to meld the two together, for instance.

So, *The Dominion Post* sat down with Beatty, who runs her own area interior design business Designs, Etcetera, to get the scoop on some of her style tips and tricks and to discuss a few of the many different adornment options out there. We also spoke with Interior Images designer Helen MacLeod, who opened up about the differences between traditional and contemporary mantel decors and gave a few tips of her own.

Here, we've provided a breakdown of six different mantel decor styles, some ways to achieve the looks and seasonal secrets that will come in handy. And no matter how you decorate your mantel, there are a few rules of thumb to follow.

First, Beatty and MacLeod stress that letting who you are shine through is a great way to make your mantel special, not just to you but those visiting your home. Treasures you've collected through travel as well as family heirlooms and mementos can provide a personal touch and serve as great conversation pieces.

MacLeod suggests looking at the pieces through the eyes of an outsider: Will they be as charming to your guests as they are to you? If not, she said, you may want to consider saving them for another, less obvious spot. Beatty said that while a sharp eye is helpful, whether a keepsake can be incorporated into your mantel's theme also depends on the situation.

"If you do a lot of entertaining, you might be more picky about what's out there and what you're displaying," she said. "I think it's a preference in what you like. You want your home to express who you are as a person and what you do as a family."

Both designers agree that, regardless of what goes on the mantel, the process of editing is important. Not everything you own has to be piled on at once, because the clutter can make it hard for people to see past the mass of objects to enjoy the aesthetic qualities of each piece and the mantel as a whole.

MacLeod said that the golden mean is a good way to figure out the proper placement of accessories. It refers to a mathematical formula for spatial proportion that is considered pleasing to the eye and has been used for centuries by artists and architects.

First, measure the length of your line in inches — for instance, the ceiling height or the height of your mantel. Multiply that number by .618. The answer attained will be the best proportion to use in combination with the whole. So, if you have a 10-foot ceiling, that translates to 120 inches. By doing the math, you will find that you want to place something, such as a piece of art, at roughly the height of 74 inches on your wall.

Balance, in any style, is key. You don't want one side or portion of your mantel to do all the work. The more traditional way of achieving balance is to include two of the same objects on each side of the mantel or the wall behind it, such as two vases or sconces. If you're going for a more contemporary, casual look, consider grouping objects that are similar in style and/or color in odd numbers.

"Your eye follows things a little easier with odd numbers," Beatty said. "Varying height is also helpful."

For instance, if you have a large or tall singular object on one side of the mantel, such as a statue, try a grouping of three things of a similar color or style (in relation to one another)

on the other side.

When searching for objects, photos and frames to include in your design, don't discount what you already have on hand. Sometimes, simply rearranging these items can give the objects a whole new life.

And Beatty said that searching in your own backyard may reveal perfect pieces. For example, her friend lives near a wooded area and collects evergreen boughs in the winter-time to use on her mantel. Fallen branches arranged in a vase are another idea, as are smooth river or creek rocks.

Though Beatty doesn't have a beach in her backyard, she said when she and her family go on vacation she collects seashells to put in clear glass containers during the warm-weather months. She also suggested that cranberries and other fruit from the grocery store are a nice change from normal vessel fillers.

It's also key to work with the style of your home. While there's nothing wrong with mixing styles and textures to achieve a nuanced look, it's essential to recognize your home's feel so that you can do this properly. Beatty, for instance, is a big proponent of mixing and matching—as long as it's done with a judicious eye.

"I like to mix textures, styles even," she said. "Say you have a stone fireplace, that is very traditional, but mixing it with other elements like natural elements or something that looks really formal can be

nice."

Below, we've provided six different looks for your mantel and an explanation of what makes each work that correspond numerically with the images on 1-E. The idea is that knowing some of the basics will give you an idea of what you can do in your own home.

Style breakdown

1. Rustic — If you're a fan of country living, or happen to move into a house that has an unfinished stone and wood-encased fireplace/mantel combination like this one, this is the way to go. Unpolished, simple and filled with natural elements in earth tones, this look is one of lived-in comfort. The wagon wheel here melds together all of those attributes and showcases the stone behind it. The pairs of stars of differing sizes on either side of the wheel provide a little bit of color without being too overwhelming. Along with the barrels on the hearth, they balance out the verticality of the wheel and ground everything. And the flowers in one of the barrels are a natural element that adds some softness to the space.

2. Rental — The key to decorating a mantel in a rented home or apartment is impermanence. This is not to say that you can't hang things, just be sure to check with the landlord and be willing to fill in the holes you created when you leave. In this instance, a collection of four black frames depicting natural elements is set up against the wall directly on top of the mantel instead

IN THE SPIRIT

Always one who loves to dress her home up for the holidays, as it's a tradition the whole family enjoys, Brenda Beatty, owner of Designs, Etcetera, has a few tips and tricks for seasonal decorating.

■ **PLAN AHEAD** — Collecting an assortment of pieces for every holiday can get expensive. Consider purchasing items on clearance in area stores after a holiday has passed and save them for next year.

■ **KEEP IT SIMPLE** — One of Beatty's favorite mantel displays is an array of white candles with an iridescent finish that she purchased at Target. They are inexpensive and the sparkly finish shines beautifully when the candles are lit. While the collection can be used year round, the candles can also be easily dressed up for various holi-

days by buying a few sprigs of faux evergreen, fall leaves or spring flowers and placing the fake foliage strategically in and around the grouping.

■ **LOOK OUTSIDE** — As touched on in the main story, nature can be a great source of inspiration for the holidays. Besides the boughs, cranberries, rocks and branches already mentioned, Beatty loves clustering together gourds of varying sizes for Halloween. You can even scatter some preserved fallen leaves you've collected around them. Also, consider purchasing a few clear glass vessels of varying sizes. These can be filled with any number of natural elements, depending on the holiday, making them a wise investment that will pay off year round.

of being hung. The two identical taller vases of greenery on either side provide a nice contrast in height and keep with the natural theme. The color of the vases and smaller objects beside them also mimic the color of the stone around the fireplace. And the wooden box in the middle of the frames breaks up the symmetry without being too distracting. All of these elements create a cohesive look that can easily be transported. Beatty also points out that the mantel choices in 3 and 4 are great options, as they can also be taken with you wherever you go. And, she said, if you're going for a more traditional look and would like to create a design that uses sconces, consider buying the kind that hold tea lights. They do not need any

permanent wiring and can simply be unscrewed, when the time comes to go.

3. Shabby Chic — To achieve a shabby chic look like this mantel, consider purchasing vintage and antique pieces from consignment stores and estate sales. The latter is a good place to hunt for a mantel such as the one shown in this image. Placing a mantel in a room, even without an existing fireplace, can give the space a sense of coziness. As there is no fireplace, think of unconventional ways to fill the void. In this case, the chair stacked with blankets is functional for, say, a guest bedroom, and the green color of the chair provides a pop of color, along with the flowers on the top of the mantel, in the otherwise neutral space. Shabby chic

style is meant to combine various kinds of objects to create a unified, often feminine, look that seems collected over time. As most of the antique pieces decorating the mantel are white, this helps to create that cohesion. It's also worth mentioning that you can buy new pieces and distress them to make them appear older.

4. TV — Beatty suggests that no matter what style your home is, if you have a television mounted above your mantel, keep it simple. You don't want the area underneath or surrounding your TV to distract from the images on the screen. A grouping or pair of small-scale items on either side of the TV is usually all that's required. In this case, using a non-traditional mantel, such as a piece of unfin-

ished wood hung over the fireplace, makes a statement, so there is no need for any accessories. The natural look of the wood also balances out the polished stone fireplace beneath.

5. Modern — The sleek line of the floating mantel, a key element of modern design, is allowed to shine because of the sparsity of objects on and above it. The use of a singular, simple light fixture to balance out the pottery pieces on the opposite side is also a non-traditional way to achieve balance. The light above is a counter-balance to the fireplace beneath. The earth-tone greens, browns and tans of the pottery and natural wood of the mantel juxtaposed with the white wall also help achieve a modern sensibility.

6. Traditional — Beatty and MacLeod agree that symmetry, like the two sconces and pairs of crystal vases and identical statues on this mantel, is key to achieving a traditional look. The subdued palette of the flowers and the painting is also indicative of this style. Instead of a painting, Beatty said a mirror is a good alternative. It reflects light and opens up a room. She also points out that the low profile of the flowers draws your eye in without detracting from the painting above. It's also important to note the types of materials used. In this case, the gilt frame, crystal vases and brass sconces atop the stone mantel are formal, while the warmth of light from the sconces and the fresh flowers keep things from being too sterile.

Hometown honors Spencer

Smokey Robinson-backed Aussie pop group tours U.S.

DETROIT — An Australian pop quartet's music really got a hold of Smokey Robinson.

Motown Records' signature vocalist loved Human Nature's take on the legendary label's standards so much that he signed on as the group's official presenter and helped facilitate a lengthy run for it at the Imperial Palace hotel in Las Vegas.

Now, the guys are heading out for their first U.S. tour, which kicked off Saturday in — where else — Detroit.

Human Nature (brothers Andrew and Mike Tierney and fellow high school classmates Phil Burton and Toby Allen) have released nine albums, five of which went to No. 1 in their native country.

They've opened for Celine Dion and Michael Jackson in Europe and Australia and

performed the national anthem at the Summer Olympic Games in their home city of Sydney in 2000.

But it was their 2005 Motown tribute, "Reach Out," that attracted the attention of Robinson.

"They came to the studio one night in Los Angeles ... and sang for me a cappella with no music — just them singing — and blew me away, man. Just awesome," the Rock and Roll Hall of Famer told The Associated Press in a phone interview. "I am so enamored with them."

And, thanks in part to Robinson's backing, the group nailed down an exclusive booking at the Imperial Palace, where they have played five and six nights a week to sold-out crowds for the past two-and-a-half years.

The group is moving beyond Nevada with the 10-city tour, which will take them to Washington, New

York, Chicago and Boston through May 6. Add to that a PBS special — featuring Robinson — that began airing in December and a CD of Motown covers that was released earlier this month, and Human Nature is well on its way to expanding its influence beyond its roots in Oceania.

Not only does the group have Robinson to thank for its stateside successes, but also the music of Motown, which enjoyed its heyday nearly a half-century ago but has been embraced by generations of listeners drawn to its timelessness.

So, what could these guys possibly bring to the music that hasn't been done better by Robinson, Marvin Gaye, Stevie Wonder and company?

"They have put their own touch on (the songs)," Robinson said. "They sing the Motown music, but they do it like Human Nature does it."

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R. Kelly brings back 'Trapped' series

NEW YORK — Get ready for more drama from Sylvester, Twan and Pimp Lucius — R. Kelly is delivering more chapters of "Trapped in the Closet."

The outrageous musical series started off as five

videos for the R&B singer's dramatic cliffhanger songs in 2007. It quickly became a cult classic, and he added more chapters, put the accompanying videos on a DVD and also teamed up with IFC to premiere the series. It grew to 22 chapters.

For the next chapters, Kelly is teaming up with IFC again. Ann Carli, the producer of "Trapped," said filming for the new chapters will begin in Chicago in the spring and be out by the fall, along with new characters.

Zuiker debuts 'Cybergeddon' film on Yahoo

LOS ANGELES — "CSI" creator Anthony Zuiker is making a movie destined for the small screen.

The creator of the hit CBS television show plans to debut the as-yet-unfinished feature, "Cybergeddon," on Yahoo in installments this fall. His latest foray into online storytelling follows his partnership on a horror series for YouTube.

It also marks Yahoo's second stab at tapping Hollywood talent to create original online video. In January, Yahoo said a series of 20 animated webisodes developed by Tom Hanks called "Electric City" would debut on the site this spring.

Many Web video companies, including Hulu, YouTube and Netflix, are pushing to put more original video content online as they compete for people's attention with traditional outlets like TV channels.

Zuiker and Yahoo consider the online movie debut to be similar to a release in theaters.

"Instead of 5,000 theater screens, you can wake up to 50 million screens in one day," Zuiker said.

Zuiker is the movie's executive producer, but hasn't found a director or actors yet.

Unlike a movie, viewers won't be charged admission. But the movie will come with ads, including ones from the maker of the Norton Anti-Virus program, Symantec Corp. The movie's episodes may also be sprinkled through different Yahoo properties such as its finance, news and entertainment sites.

The plot revolves around a female government agent who has a falling out with the law and is on the run herself, while pursuing a master hacker who wants to bring the world to its cyber-knees.

Yahoo Inc. has been struggling to boost the revenue it gets from advertising as competitors like Google Inc. and Facebook have cut into its display ad business. It is trying especially to go after video advertisements, because advertisers tend to pay more for them than static display ads.

Erin McPherson, Yahoo's head of video, said Yahoo will create more content such as games and text to go with the videos on its different services, including perhaps its email and messaging programs.

Book falls short on resolution

THE TYPICAL CINDERELLA story was never particularly my cup of tea. I didn't dream of riding around in pumpkin carriages. I never wanted a fairy godmother stylist. Glass slippers seem very uncomfortable.

Sure, I do appreciate that Cinderella was eventually able to overcome her unfair servant life — even if it was thanks to a rich man (but that's a whole separate column).

My main problem with the Cinderella story, at least using the well-known Disney version as my main example, is that the evil stepmother and her daughters were never forced to face the music in the end, aside from simply seeing the prince marry Cinderella.

I always love to see the villains pay for their mistakes more than they usually do. That is my main issue with "Cinder," an audiobook I recently listened to by Marissa Meyer. Even though it's the first in a series of books, I'm disappointed in the severe lack of resolution in this opening story. There is no retribution, and the story stalls out in its final pages with an anticlimactic finale.

Set in the future, this sci-fi twist on the classic story has Cinder herself portrayed as a cyborg mechanic who lives with her evil guardian, has a peppy sidekick android named Iko and is asked to fix an android the prince himself brings to her booth at the market. Thus begins a very loose retelling of the tale.

Aside from the obvious lack of conclusion — which I'm inclined to believe is just a ploy to sell the sequel — the book is a unique take on the story. "Cinder" rounds out the normal character types with a host of new ones, including a whole colony of people living on the Moon who are particularly ruthless.

And the evil guardian, as vicious as she is, does not become the main villain of the story. That title belongs to the Lunar Queen Levana, whom we come to realize fairly quickly is a certifiable looney-toon.

The role of the fairy godmother becomes a doctor who helps Cinder discover her true identity, a "twist" in the story that any normal reader should be able to see coming a mile away.

The author bucks the whole gussied-up-for-the-ball look by putting a rain-soaked Cinder into a wrinkled dress, mismatched feet and grease-stained gloves. And while she does stick up for herself in some circumstances, more than the original Cinderella anyway, I found myself urging her to do more, say more.

While the writing, for the most part, flows well, I was able to pick up on some unfortunate repetition listening to the audiobook. What I mean is if Cinder had "gulped" or "gasp" one more time, I was going to throw my iPod across the room. Well, not quite. I did roll my eyes though.

The failings of this introductory book may be partially due to the fact that most young adult novels nowadays are turning into series. Whereas this story could easily stand alone.

Now though, readers who are captured by "Cinder" will be forced to wait a year for the next installment. I don't think I'll be in that line.

A second chance

Veterans tame wolf-dogs at rescue center

LOS ANGELES — It's been three months since a California animal rescue center retrieved 29 wolf-dogs from an Alaska tourist attraction that had fought the state over owning, breeding and selling the wolf-hybrids. Chains were so deeply embedded in the necks of two of the animals that they had to be surgically removed. Many developed limps because they'd never used the pads of their feet.

Now the task of taming the wolf-dogs has been given to three U.S. military veterans who say they can relate to the stress of trying to transition to a normal life. The program is called "Warriors and Wolves."

"I get along with the wolves," said one of the three, Stanley McDonald, a 10-year Navy vet who has been foreman of the Lockwood Animal Rescue Center in Frazier Park, about 75 miles northwest of Los Angeles, for 4 1/2 years.

McDonald said he knows what it is like to be homeless, alone and lost. "They've been in a bad situation, which I've been in most of my life. Most of them are afraid, taken away from the only thing they knew," he said.

"A great number of people are coming back from a combat environment and that's as stressful as can be. It's difficult to transition from that to civilian life," said William "Buzz" Varley, a Lockwood volunteer and retired Navy man who works

the wolf-dogs," Lindner said.

In Alaska, they had been fed raw moosemeat to keep them looking good so tourists could get close enough to the animals to take their pictures for a \$5 fee.

Before the wolf-dogs arrived, Lindner and Simmons were running the sanctuary on \$10,700 a month. But with the new arrivals, that's jumped to \$15,500 a month, including salaries for the three veterans. To help pay the bills, Lindner and Simmons are inviting supporters of the sanctuary to volunteer, donate or sponsor a veteran or a wolf-dog or plant a fruit tree (it helps feed birds) in honor of a loved one.

for the California Department of Transportation.

The wolf-dogs are now thriving in small packs of two to six animals after joining 12 wolf-dogs already at the shelter, according to Lorin Lindner, who founded Lockwood with her husband, Navy veteran Matthew Simmons, in 2008.

Lindner said the wolf-dogs, who normally travel up to 40 miles a day, had been tethered in Alaska. Once they had room to run at Lockwood, they went lame

because their muscles were not acclimated to the exercise.

"It's taken three months, but we are just now noticing them running without limps," Lindner said.

The animals are fed high-priced, high-quality kibble made of buffalo, venison and game birds, in addition to five to 10 pounds of meat each day. As part of a landfill diversion program, markets in the area give the rescue group their expired meats "so we are not killing any additional animals to feed

Don't give up, cat's kidney problems may well be treatable

Q: My 16-year-old cat has been vomiting off and on for a week. The veterinarian said it's because her kidneys are failing. Should I consider putting her down? — J.S., Cyberspace

A: "There's a difference between kidney insufficiency and kidney failure," notes Dr. Elizabeth Collier, of Chico, Calif. "Kidney insufficiency is very common and occurs in most cats over 12; and it is treatable with diet, nausea medication, fluid intake and supplements."

The prognosis for kidney failure isn't nearly as optimistic. Still, depending on the severity, quality of life might be maintained for some time by treating the symptoms.

Collier, past president of the American Association of Feline Practitioners and spokesperson for Cat Friendly Practices, added, "Your veterinarian will know how to figure out what's going on with your cat. It's pretty straightforward, based on blood work, kidney values, thyroid function and your cat's general condition."

You might consider seeking a second opinion from a feline veterinarian. It sounds like you want to do what's in the best interest of your cat, which is most important. My thoughts are with you.

Q: Our 4-year-old Papillon is scared of the steps I bought for her so she could climb into our bed. We just bought a new mattress and box spring, so the bed is higher than before. The dog can jump up on the bed, but I'm afraid she might get hurt jump-

ing down to the floor. How do I convince her to use the steps? — S.B., Pahrump, Nev.

A: I recall a similar question around the time I began this column nearly 20 years ago, I was disparaged by at least one other pet writer for taking the question seriously. How times have changed! Today, nearly half of all dogs sleep in bed with their people.

As it happens, my wife and I also just purchased a new mattress and box spring, and we practically need a step stool ourselves to get in bed. The salesperson explained that beds are now higher than ever, so your trepidation about your dog jumping off is reasonable, and could be an even greater concern as the pet ages.

Try smearing some peanut butter on the top step. Once your dog makes it that far, place a treat just beyond her reach on the bed. Of course, going up is the easy part. To get your dog in the habit of going down the steps, lead her down them using a leash. Hold a special treat as a lure to direct her down, while you also offer a cue, such as, "Out of bed." Use a weekend to train her.

There are ways to reduce your risk of having a stroke

NEARLY 800,000 AMERICANS will have a stroke this year. Stroke is our nation's third-leading cause of death and a leading cause of severe, long-term disability.

A stroke is cerebrovascular disease that affects the brain by decreasing blood flow through its arterial supply. Blood carries the necessary nutrients and oxygen to brain cells, the same as it does to other cells in the body. Damage is caused when nerve cells in the brain are deprived of oxygen, either by arterial blockage or hemorrhage.

"When brain cells die, the body parts and functions they control become impaired or destroyed," said Dr. Claudette Brooks, a neurologist with the WVU Stroke Center. "This may cause paralysis, speech or sensory problems, memory and reasoning deficits, coma and possibly death."

There are multiple reasons a person may be at increased risk for stroke. Some are based on lifestyle: Smoking, physical inactivity, excessive alcohol use, and the use of illegal intravenous drugs or cocaine.

Modifiable risk factors can be treated or managed medically: High blood pressure, diabetes, artery or heart disease, atrial fibrillation, sickle cell anemia, high blood cholesterol and obesity. People with a family history of stroke, as well as those who are over age 55 or African-American, are also at an increased risk.

"When someone is having a stroke, getting to the hospital in a hurry can



make all of the difference," according to Dr. Brooks. "Treatments are available that can stop a stroke while it's happening or drastically reduce the amount of damage it causes."

Patients who are evaluated within three hours may be candidates for a clot-busting agent (t-PA). Those evaluated within eight hours may be a candidate for mechanical disruption of the clot that is blocking the artery.

Devices approved by the FDA for treatment of ischemic strokes are the Merci Retriever System and the Penumbra. They assist in removing a clot from the blood vessel in the brain. "No matter how good the treatment, the biggest factor in stroke recovery is recognition of symptoms and immediate treatment," said Brooks.

Here are some stroke warning signs: Sudden numbness or weakness of the face, arm or leg, especially on one side of the body; sudden confusion, trouble speaking or understanding; sudden trouble seeing in one or both eyes; sudden trouble walking, dizziness, loss of balance or coordination; and a sudden, severe headache with no known cause.

print, but it's also one of the most heartfelt queries I've ever received. Thank you for sharing your crisis of faith with me.

First off, you're not a bug. You were never a bug and you'll never be a bug. Like every other human being, you are made in the image of God. Your bodily life is surely finite on earth, but your soul's life is infinite with God in heaven. Understand, please, that I don't know this. I believe this as a revealed truth from God through sacred Scriptures. This doesn't mean that my religious belief is false. It simply means that it is trustworthy because of a hopefulness that lives in the deepest part of my being.

Of course, my belief, which is the sure belief of all the Abrahamic faiths, may indeed be false. I don't simply sweep away the nihilism of atheists because of some Scriptural reference. The atheists may be right. We

may be just bugs who are eventually squashed under the cruel fatalities of life. I honor their belief in nothingness, as I ask them to honor my belief in God.

We all make life choices about God and salvation that will inform our every waking moment. I choose to live in hope, and I choose to believe that goodness has an edge over evil and I choose to believe that we are not alone in a cold, unfeeling cosmos. I cannot take my debate with atheists any further. We can settle up this life wager after death at the Pearly Gates, or after death in the grave, while we are processed into worm food. I can wait.

My best advice to you is to try to understand more deeply the meaning of your tears. My suspicion is that your tears and your doubts are the result of a kind of spiritual paralysis in the face of the great contradiction we all face in life: The contradiction between an evil world and a good God. We see war, and we're told to believe in a God of peace. We see people abused and exploited, and we're taught to see each and every person as made in the image of God.

You were brought up in a kind church, and you've spent your life policing mean streets. I understand. Sometimes that contradiction is just too much for you, as it is for all of us at some times, and so we cry out our anger and pain.

Perhaps you might benefit by watching the news less and watching your daughter more. In her smiles and joyful play, you may come to remember that the world is filled with the traces of goodness every bit as much as it is filled with the traces of evil.

The problem is, we receive the bulk of our evidence about life from news organizations, whose sad mantra is, "If it bleeds, it leads." Volunteer to serve lunch at a soup kitchen. Help build a house for the homeless. Teach a child to read, and try to go to church again, even if you sit in the back row for a while. Feel the strength of a faith community lifting you up when you're cast down.

75 percent of youths text daily

Can you believe how much teens are texting? OMG!

More than three-quarters of all U.S. teenagers have cellphones, and of those, a growing number have smartphones — cellphones always online. Today's teens use their cellphones as their mobile soul-bullhorns.

A report published recently by the Pew Center's Internet and American Life Project tells us how much, and exactly how, teens use them. We already know teens text, like, a lot: A now-famous October 2010 survey by the Nielsen Co. showed the average teenager sent 3,339 texts a month.

Teens text way more than they call. The report shows it's getting to be even more like that. The Pew team called 799 people ages 12-17 and a parent or guardian. About 77 percent had cellphones, and about 23 percent had smartphones. Seventy-five percent of teens text, and they're texting more. Calls and texts are up, with the frequency of texts increasing and calls decreasing.

Teens 14-17 went from a median of 60 texts a day in 2009 to 100 a day (pretty near the Nielsen number)

in 2011. Girls are the biggest texters, averaging 100 a day, but all groups, ethnicities and income levels are texting more.

Sixty-three percent affirmed that they exchange texts daily with those who are important to them. Only 39 percent said they call them every day. Land lines? They're for people born in years that start with 19. Only 14 percent said they used land lines daily. Only 35 percent said they even saw their peeps face to face daily. That's so 1990. Hahaha! Only 6 percent emailed daily.

So what is it about texting? This is a media world young people have made in their own image. It domi-

nates their social communications — leaving behind even social-media sites (29 percent). Texting language, long familiar, is supercharged, creative, and everywhere, full of slang, acronyms, abbreviations, pictograms, and a snowstorm of emoticons and!!!!

"All along, this has reflected the desire of teens to create their own group language and use it to stay in contact," said Amanda Lenhart, senior research specialist at Pew and the study's leading researcher. She cites a "network effect": "Once you reach a critical mass in your network of friends, you begin to text them all the time, and they

expect you'll do that, and you expect them to do it." We become nodes in a network and express that network through connectivity.

Texting is short, fast, off-the-cuff and it feels like spontaneous conversation. It's also a sign of belonging: It's in-group talk, much like slang — yet there's also an intimate pleasure involved, with the ability, on the run, to exchange hahaha's and LOLs. "Part of it," said Lenhart, "is that you can choose whom to share with and whom not."

Cellphones are a little cheaper than before, and calling/texting plans are everywhere. There is some class difference in access (there's a link, for example, between the parents' education and whether a teen is likely to have a cellphone or not), but all classes and ethnicities use them much more.

For teens and their families all across the social spectrum, said Lenhart, the mobile phone "allows you to remain in robust, constant contact with the people you care about." And one in four teens now texts assiduously on the smartphone: "It's mine, it's me, I can take it with me all the time, and I don't have to share it with family." The teen life in only a few words.

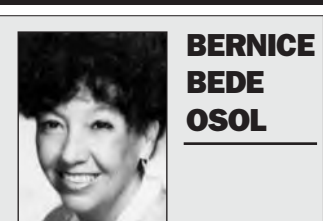

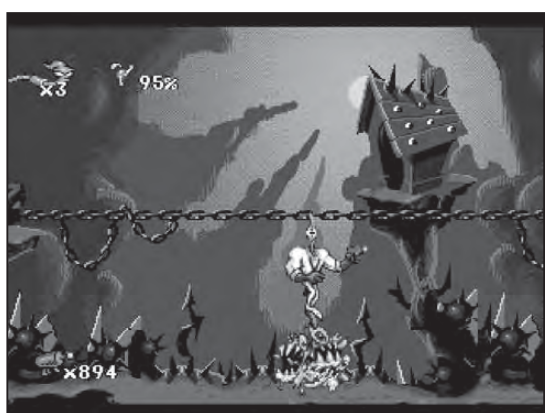
Composing for New Worlds Video Game Music

Did you know that some of the world's best composers create music for video games? Thousands of people attend concerts of video game music. Even people who don't play video games are fans of the music.

The Mini Page talked with a video game composer to learn more. The Mini Page also talked with the curator, or expert in charge, of the Smithsonian American Art Museum exhibit, "The Art of Video Games."



This is a scene from "The Legend of Zelda: Twilight Princess." In the Nintendo Entertainment System, for which the first Zelda game was designed, the early computer chip made a sound like a flute. The composer took advantage of this to create the Zelda theme, which appears in all the Zelda games.



In "Earthworm Jim," sound engineer and composer Tommy Tallarico and his team combined special effects, music and voices. This created a realistic environment of sounds. This was unusual in 1994. In the game, an evil crow, Psy-Crow, drops a spacesuit. A worm crawls into it and is transformed into a superhero.

Musical quest

Composing music for video games offers special challenges. For example, a movie needs about two hours of music. But composers might create 40 to 50 hours of music for one game.

In movies, the music is usually in the background and people are speaking over it. In video games, there is not usually much speech. The music drives the story.

In movies, the story follows in a regular order. The composer knows what will happen from minute to minute. But in video games, the player changes things all the time. Many moods of music need to fit together.

Changing with the action

The music has to work no matter how the player changes the action. For example, if the music is peaceful, happy music, it has to change when a dragon flies over. It has to sound good whether it turns into dragon-fighting music or to running-away music. The composer doesn't know ahead of time what the player will do.

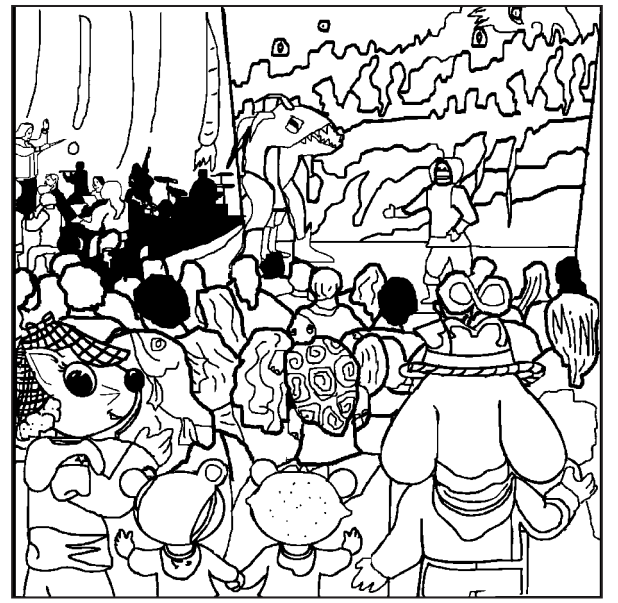
Composer Tommy Tallarico asks, if you were a musician and you wanted to have your music heard, would you compose for video games or for movies?

"I've always said, if Beethoven were alive today, he'd be a video game composer," Tommy said.

Meet Seth and Michelle Sternberger



Seth and Michelle Sternberger are the musicians and composers in "8 Bit Weapon." They use early video game consoles and computers as the instruments to play their "chip music." Seth and Michelle, who are married, also compose music for video games.

When he was in the third grade, Seth's teacher taught him about computers and brought games for kids to play. Seth started taking music classes in junior high. He said: "I was always interested in electronic music way more than conventional instruments. I just like how every sound could be uniquely created with synthesizers."

Michelle took guitar lessons in junior high and was in drum line in high school. She played drums in several garage bands. She said: "Nowadays I program drums on my Game Boy and also on my computer." She also composes electronic music for a solo project called ComputeHer.

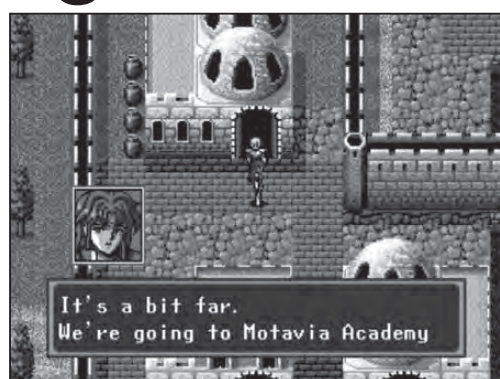
Composing With Few Notes

Bleeps

In the early games of the 1970s, game designers put in special computer chips to make sounds. But early sound chips were very limited, with only one to three sounds. Designers had only a few notes to use for sound effects or music. The first games with any sound at all usually had only chirping, mechanical-sounding bleeps and short melodies.

Electronic sound

In the late 1970s, chips could handle a few more sounds. But all the music sounded electronic. It didn't sound like a piano or a human voice. It did sound something like music. Because the music had to be programmed, the composers were not usually musicians. They were computer programmers. The music was often simple and basic.



In "Phantasy Star IV," the sound effects matched the environment in the game. The music changed when the player changed actions. For example, it sped up during battle scenes. The music was composed by Izuho Takeuchi. The music in this series is performed in many concerts.

Musicians take over

In the late 1970s and early 1980s, true musicians began working with programmers to compose for computers, game consoles and arcade machines. By this time, the technology was giving them many more notes to work with. Music did not often play through the whole game as it does today. It was used mostly at the start of the game and between game levels.

*Arcades are places people go to play video games.

Repeating notes

When music began to be played during the whole game, it was set on a loop. The same few notes of the melody played over and over again. For example, in "Space Invaders," the four-note music looped about every two seconds until you died in the game. For the first time, the music did react to what was going on in the game. It sped up or got louder when there was more action.

Gus Goodsport's Report

Just a few weeks ago, Jeremy Lin was an unknown name to many basketball fans. Now he's one of the best-known names in the game.

Given a chance to start at point guard when injuries hit the New York Knicks, Lin surprisingly soared from sub to star. In one five-game span, the former Harvard standout averaged 26.8 points and 8 assists, creating "Lin-Sanity" in New York. It's a fairy-tale journey for a 23-year-old who didn't receive a college scholarship offer and wasn't drafted by an NBA team.

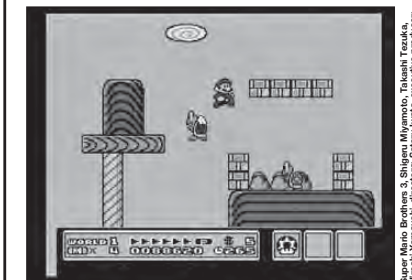
Lin, whose other interests include listening to music and attending church, is prepared for life after hoops with his Harvard degree. But the way it looks now, he might stay in the NBA — perhaps for a long time.

Games Burst Into Song

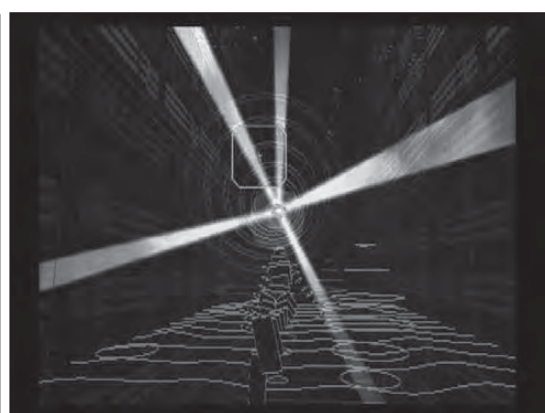
Music choices grow

In the 1990s, CDs came along. Video game composers could use any instruments and compose music that did not sound electronic. They might use symphony orchestras, choirs, or combinations of instruments.

Composers no longer needed to work around the small amount of choices computer chips allowed.



This is a scene from "Super Mario Brothers 3," which is a reactive game. This game, which came out in 1990, broke ground with its music. The music changed to set the tone for different levels. It ranged from music with a full orchestra to 1700s-type dance music.



In "Rez," the player is inside a computer system fighting a virus. "Rez" was the first game that made it possible for the player to interact meaningfully with the music. It made the music part of the gaming experience. The player's actions built the soundtrack. There were no sound effects, just the music that the player made by battling viruses.

Playing to music

In today's video games, music acts in two ways.

The music might be reactive (ree-AK-tive). That means it reacts to the level you are playing in the game. The music is always the same at a certain level, no matter who is playing. The player does not affect the music.

For example, when you are at the dragon level, the dragon music plays. When you are at the dungeon level, the dungeon music plays. Most games have reactive music.

The other type of music is interactive (in-tur-AK-tiv). The players interact with, or change, the music. What the player does affects the music.

For example, in "Flower," when a player adds petals, more instruments join in. The music changes.

Next week, The Mini Page is about kites.

Crossing boundaries

Many musicians compose music for different media, working on movies, TV shows and video games.

Composers are releasing CDs of their video game music. Fans are flocking to concerts of this music. Video game composers Tommy Tallarico and Jack Wall created a tour

of concerts called Video Games Live, where video game scenes run on screens as a symphony plays. Other groups are putting on similar concerts.

Last year, a song from the game "Civilization IV" became the first video game music to win a Grammy Award. This year, for the first time, the Grammys officially added video game music to the awards for "visual media."

The Mini Page thanks video game music composer and "8 Bit Weapon" band musician Seth Sternberger; and Chris Melissinos, curator, "The Art of Video Games," for help with this issue.

"The Art of Video Games" exhibit runs through Sept. 30 at the Smithsonian American Art Museum in Washington, D.C. After that, it will travel to several other places in the United States.

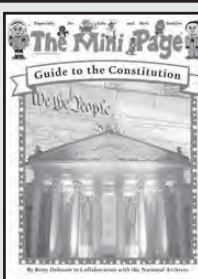

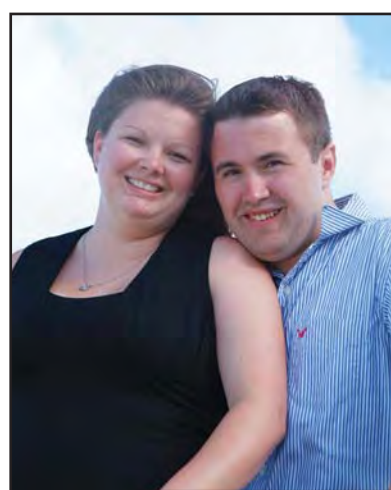

The Army? You want to join the Army?

ASK MR. DAD

Dear Mr. Dad: My 18-year-old son wants to join the Army, but neither my wife nor I want him to enlist.

How do we communicate that without sounding like we want to control his life? Is it wrong to tell him we think he's making a big mistake?

A: First, my congratulations to your son: Wanting to join the military shows courage, responsibility, and a desire to do good and protect others (although, as someone who enlisted in the Marine Corps at 17, I'd have to question his choice of the Army).

Second, understand that at 18, your son is a legal adult. If he'd have wanted to, he could have signed on the dotted line, packed his bags and asked you for a ride to the airport. The fact that he raised the issue at all is huge. It means he's really thinking things through and that he respects your opinion.

Before you say anything to your son one way or the other, consider these two things: 1) Why he wants to join in the first place, and 2) Why you're against it.

People join the military for a variety of reasons, including the enlistment and reenlistment bonuses (which can be in the 10s of thousands), getting a job, getting an education, having a chance to travel the world and the amazing benefits available to veterans. You can familiarize yourself with some of these benefits at military.com/benefits.

The best way to find out your son's motivations is to ask. So sit down with him and talk about the issues. And by "talk," I really mean "listen." Don't hog the conversation and don't try to force your viewpoint on him. If you come across as judgmental, you'll be giving him yet another reason to enlist: To get away from his controlling parents.

Since your son hasn't made his final decision, I suggest

that you, your wife, and your son go visit a local recruiter. They're generally very open to including parents in the process.

At the very least, this will show your son that you respect his decisions and that you're concerned that he make the best choices.

If he hasn't already seen a recruiter, this meeting will give all of you a chance to find out what positions (called MOS — military occupation specialty) your son is qualified for. Not everyone has to be a grunt (an infantryman). Speaking with a recruiter can also help your son clarify his goals and give you some insight into what's driving his desires.

Now, to your issues. As parents, we all want to protect our children from danger, and there aren't many jobs in the world where your son could be more in harm's way than the service, particularly these days.

In addition, you may have some strong issues with the military. But your natural instinct to protect your son (or to express your political views) isn't a good enough reason to try to change his mind. Again, he's an adult and harsh criticism could very well drive him even further away than boot camp.

If at all possible, find some support for yourself. Talk with family members or friends whose children have served. Try to get both sides of the story — some parents who were unhappy about the decision and some who supported their child's choice.

But at the end of the day, the most important thing you can do is support your son. Sure, tell him you're afraid for his safety — he is too. But also tell him how proud you are.

WVU Extension offers food safety course for the spring-break bound

When traveling abroad, something as simple as a sip of tap water or a swim in an untreated pool can put you at risk for diseases and infections. WVU Extension experts warn spring breakers to use caution before eating and drinking when traveling.

"Nobody wants to spend a vacation sick with a stomach bug or stuck in a hospital," Litha Sivanandan, WVU Extension food safety specialist, said. "Education, prevention and preparation are the best ways to ensure a safe vacation."

The WVU Extension Service website features information on eating, drinking and medical considerations to limit your risk of illness when traveling abroad. Visit

fh.ext.wvu.edu, for more information on spring break safety.

Tips range from tap water safety to eating fresh fruits and vegetables when traveling. According to Sivanandan, the biggest mistake most travelers make is falling into habits from home instead of using caution.

"We take for granted that water from a faucet is safe to drink, but when you're in unfamiliar territory that isn't always the case," she said. "Something as simple as brushing your teeth can put you at risk for illness if the water is contaminated."

Your home can help out come tax time

BEING A HOMEOWNER is a big out-of-pocket expense. But the more you know, owning a home can also be a big tax deduction. Here are a few tips when preparing your tax return this year.

The interest you pay on your home is an important tax deduction. You are allowed to deduct interest on multiple homes — a limited amount — as long as the money borrowed was used to build, purchase, or improve your home. As a homeowner, you should receive form "1098" from your lender, which details how much mortgage interest you paid. In order to claim this deduction, a homeowner must complete "schedule A" under "itemized deductions."

Real estate taxes are also tax deductible. The interest paid report you receive from your lender should also show any property taxes paid. Of course, these taxes will need to be itemized on your return. If you purchased a home with less than 20 percent down, you are likely paying private mortgage insurance (PMI). This also can be itemized on schedule A and deducted in most instances. According to the Tax Relief Act of 2006, homeowners can deduct PMI if their adjusted gross income if the home closed after December 31, 2006 and the homeowners adjusted gross income do not exceed \$100,000 — or \$50,000 if filing single.

You can also deduct mortgage points, as well as any mortgage points a seller may have paid on your behalf. In order to qualify for this deduction for the purchasing year, you must use your home as your primary residence and "paying points" must be common within your geographical area. In addition, points also must be calculated as part of your principal payment, the points must be clearly outlined on your settlement statement, and the amount of cash — down payment, closing costs, etc. — you used to purchase your home is at least equal to the cost of points paid on your mortgage.

Homeowners should also make use of energy tax credits. The federal government offers tax incentives to homeowners who make their homes more energy efficient. For example, according to Energystar.gov, homeowners can get a tax credit up to 10 percent of the cost to install Energy Star appliances. You can also receive tax credits for new efficiency windows or for installing solar panels in your home. It's a long, specific list and homeowners can learn more about the energy tax credit by going to the Energy Star website.

As a homeowner, it is always wise to contact your tax advisor for ways to maximize your tax deductions. Tax returns, especially for homeowners, can be complicated and confusing. It's probably worth a few extra dollars to hire an expert and trust them to get the most of your return.

Summerfield has options within options for homeowners

Dan Ryan Builders has another development popping up in the Morgantown area, and Judi Dubois, sales manager, said she knows why.

"They offer what people here in Morgantown are looking for," she said.

Located on Tibbs Road, off Tyrone Avery Road in Cheat Lake, Summerfield combines townhome and carriage-style duplex homes in one community. Dubois said the property butts up against Cheat Lake Elementary, so students can walk to school.

"The nice thing about the development is that it's already close to well-established homes," she said.

Prospective townhome buyers will need to familiarize themselves with the York II, Summerfield's designated floor plan. The York II, starting at \$150,999, measures 1,340 square feet. It includes three bedrooms, two and 1/2 bathrooms, a one-car garage and a finished basement. York also has four different levels of expansion, increasing the size to more than 2,300 square feet, affecting all three floors and extending the back of the house.

Prospective duplex buyers have two floor plans to choose from: The Cambridge and the Montclair.

"They're more like single-family homes that happen to be

stuck together at the garage," Dubois said.

The Cambridge, starting at \$215,999, measures 1,858 square feet and features the master bedroom on the main level. Everything, with the exception

of two upstairs bedrooms and a bathroom, is located downstairs for one-level living: A family room, living room, dining room and kitchen. Options for add-ons abound, and the plan includes a two-car garage

and basement space.

Dubois said the plan is ideal for empty-nesters and snowbirds — especially snowbirds, because the homeowners' association takes care of all landscaping, exterior maintenance and snow removal. The one-level living also has appeal for prospective owners with limited mobility.

The Montclair, starting at \$220,999, measures at 1,968 square feet, and includes a larger plan with three bedrooms, plus a loft that can be the fourth bedroom. All bedrooms, as well as the laundry room, lie upstairs, while downstairs includes an open kitchen and formal living room — which Dubois said could serve as a dining room. The plan also calls for a two-car garage and an unfinished basement.

And the Montclair, like all the other Dan Ryan Builders' homes, has its share of options.

Customers can choose designed packages for faster move-in times, or start from scratch and pick every detail themselves. When they choose to customize, they can pick from three pages of options, including countertop material, flooring, cabinets, etc.

Dubois said the options gives homeowners the hassle if they want it.

"Our little motto is better value, better living," she said.

can cause rust stains on siding and concrete. Clean the rust off these surfaces and seal them with a water seal once a year to prevent future stains.

DEAR AL: Finally we are getting to replace our old and ugly vinyl tiles in the kitchen. We peeled most of them up easily, but there were a few that were stuck down really well. I got them off the floor with ice. I know it sounds crazy, but I put a bag of ice on the tiles that were stuck in order to make the adhesive brittle. It worked, and the tiles were easier to chip up with the chisel I was using. The ice worked so well that I am now looking forward to doing the bathroom. I believe I can do it too, now. — J.S.

Q: We have a kitchen table that has been in the family for years. It's old and rather beaten up, but

I would never get rid of it. I would like to know how to resurface it. Should I use a stripper or sander, or both? — L.K.

A: Before you do anything, try cleaning it with mineral spirits paint thinner. This will remove quite a bit of grease and some stains so you can see what you are dealing with. If it's stained rather than painted, sanding it will bring the original finish back up to the surface. If it is painted, then use a stripper. Sand it smooth either way, and clean up all the dust. Then you can apply a stain or primer and paint. Make sure to use a clear polyurethane over your topcoat of stain or paint to protect it.

Historic Dan Patch is still remembered in the antique markets

HISTORY BECOMES more interesting if you learn about it through objects and stories. It's the "rest of the story" that adds to the fun. A large pail that once held Dan Patch Roasted Coffee auctioned recently for \$2,035. The bright-red can features a horse and rider in a harness race. The can is colorful, 11 1/2 inches tall and very decorative, but the price was boosted by the history it represents. Dan Patch was a brown horse, a pacer, born in Indiana in 1896. He broke the world's record for a harness race in 1906, and it took 32 years for another horse to go faster. He never lost a race. He was a celebrity, and coffee wasn't the only product named for him. Cars and washing machines and cigars bore his name, and so did popular toys. Crowds followed his appearances and as many as 100,000 people went to see the horse, which, according to reports, "radiated charisma." Dan Patch received fan mail and gifts while making as much as \$1

million in a year. He retired from racing in 1909 and died in 1916. He remained a star for many years after his death, partly because his world record was not broken until 1938. Streets named Dan Patch still exist. Dan Patch Stadium is at a high school in Savage, Minn., where the horse lived after he was purchased by a Minnesotan in 1902. An annual Dan Patch Day festival is celebrated in his hometown of Oxford, Ind., and another annual Dan Patch Day is held in Savage. Books have been written about him, a movie was made about his life in 1949 and he's mentioned in a song from the 1957 Broadway musical, "The Music Man." But Dan Patch Ground Coffee was named for the horse well before the days of movies and television. You can still find Dan Patch memorabilia in Savage, Minn., today. Go to the Savage Depot Coffee Shop, the Razors Edge Barber Shop or the local library.

Q: I inherited two antique Mettlach steins that were appraised six years ago for \$1,700 each. I have been trying to sell them online and locally for less than

that, but I have gotten no takers. Some dealers have made insulting remarks about my pricing. What's going on?

A: Some Mettlach steins in mint condition can sell for \$1,700 or even more, but many sell for a lot less. Price depends on the rarity of a particular stein. In addition, you're dealing with a niche market and may not be reaching interested buyers. Try contacting a national auction house that focuses on steins. You will find several online.

Q: My grandmother, who was born in 1886, left her favorite rocking chair to me. She lived in Chippewa Falls, Wis., and the chair is labeled "Webster Mfg. Co., Superior, Wis." The chair is oak and has a pressed design in the back's crest above six turned spindles. What can you tell me?

A: Webster Manufacturing Co. of Superior, Wis., was making chairs by the 1890s. In its early years, it

was called the Webster Chair Co. By 1915 it was a major American chair manufacturer and had opened a factory in at least one other city. It appears to have gone out of business during the Depression. Pressed oak chairs like yours were especially popular in the late 19th century, so it is likely your chair dates from that period. Depending on its condition, it would sell for \$100 or more.

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Going in-depth with the nutrition facts panel

March is National Nutrition Month. In my last column, "Demystifying the Nutrition Facts Panel," I discussed how to read a food label using serving size, calories, percentage of daily value and nutrients.

As stated, nutrients need to be balanced to maintain a healthy diet. We should aim low on fat, cholesterol and sodium, while looking for foods that are high in fiber, Vitamin A, Vitamin C, calcium and iron.

Fat

On the nutrition facts panel, total fat, saturated fat and trans fat will always be listed. They are required. You may also see unsaturated fat, polyunsaturated fat and monounsaturated fat.

Although total fat is the total amount of all fats in one serving of the food product, the fats listed under it may not equal the total number. This is because not all fats must be reported on the label. In general, based on a 2,000 calorie diet, a person should consume less than 65 grams of total fat per day.

Saturated fat is fat that is solid at room temperature. These fats come from animals. A person should consume less than 10 percent of calories from saturated fat each day. In general, this is less than 20 grams of saturated fat per day.

Trans fats are synthetic, solid fats. Scientific research shows that consumption of trans fat raises LDL "bad" cho-

lesterol levels and increases risk for developing heart disease. You may notice that there is no percentage of daily value beside trans fat on the nutrition facts panel. This is because there is no recommended amount of trans fat. Keep trans fat consumption as low as possible by limiting foods that contain hydrogenated oils.

Unsaturated fats are liquid at room temperature. These fats mainly come from plants and are known as "healthy" fats. Although unsaturated fats are better than saturated or trans fats, we cannot eat an endless supply. In general, a person should limit oils to six teaspoons per day.

Cholesterol

Cholesterol itself is not bad. In fact, cholesterol is created and needed by our bodies to keep us healthy. Some cholesterol is produced naturally — this is the type that can be affected by heredity — while some comes from the food we eat.

There are two types of cholesterol: "Good" and "bad." Too much of one type, or not enough of another, can put you at risk for coronary heart disease, heart attack or stroke.

Cholesterol is only found in

animal products. In general, a person should consume less than 300 milligrams of cholesterol from food per day.

Sodium

Sodium is a part of table salt and is found in many processed and canned foods and in commercially prepared condiments. A high-sodium diet can lead to high blood pressure. High blood pressure is a risk factor for stroke, heart disease, heart failure and kidney disease.

The "Dietary Guidelines for Americans, 2010" state that the average person should intake less than 2,300 milligrams of sodium per day — That is one teaspoon of salt per day. Persons who are 51 or older and those of any age who are African American or have hypertension, diabetes, or chronic kidney disease should further reduce sodium intake to 1,500 milligrams per day.

Fiber

Dietary fiber is a non-digestible form of carbohydrates. Dietary fiber naturally occurs in plants, helps provide a feeling of fullness and helps promote normal gastrointestinal function.

Dietary fiber that occurs naturally in foods may help reduce the risk of cardiovascular dis-

ease, obesity, and type 2 diabetes. The general recommended amount of dietary fiber is 25 grams per day for women and 38 grams per day for men. Most Americans consume only about half the recommended amount.

To increase dietary fiber intake, choose beans, peas and other vegetables, fruits, whole grains and nuts.

Calcium

Calcium is vital for optimal bone health. Lifelong adequate calcium intake helps maintain bone health by increasing the amount of bone formed in the teen and early adult life and by helping to slow the rate of bone loss that occurs later in life. Low calcium intake is one risk factor for osteoporosis, which is a condition of low bone density that places a person at risk of bone fractures.

Milk and milk products are a main source of calcium for most Americans. Removing milk and milk products from the diet requires careful replacement with other food sources of calcium, including fortified foods. In general, consuming three servings of food from the dairy food group, such as one cup milk or soymilk, eight ounces of yogurt and two ounces cheese will provide us with an adequate amount of calcium per day.

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Vine sizzles with blossoms all season long

When you hear names like Mexican Flame or Orange Glow this does a good job telling you this is a flower bold and riveting in color. Considering it is a vine that attracts hummingbirds and butterflies and pack a fiery orange then you have an award winning plant.

To be honest I think everyone should grow it if for no other reason than its botanical name *Pseudogynoxys chenopodioides*. Can you imagine what your neighbors would think, when they ask what's that gorgeous vine you are growing? Then you tell them the botanical name.

The Mexican Flame vine is a woody tropical vine most references say is cold hardy in zones 9 and higher, however I have seen many doing just fine in zone 8. Almost everyone can enjoy it as an annual, and a lot more gardening centers in colder zones need to give you the opportunity.

Like the name suggests the Mexican Flame vine is native to Mexico and is not that picky on soil. I've grown it in acid soil conditions more fit for azaleas and now I am growing it in alkaline soils more reminiscent of the desert. It is in the aster or daisy family in which you will quickly notice the similarities.

No matter where you live you will love the ease of propagation. This is where the colder zones and always make sure they have fresh spring transplants. The vine can be layered by sticking a branch or runner if you please in moist soil. It will root easily and can be separated from the parent plant. It is also easy to propagate by seed that dry on the plant reminding you of dandelions, or by taking cuttings. I like to use a little rooting powder for this method.

Chef's idea of home kitchen evolves

LOS ANGELES — Chef Eric Greenspan and his fiancée, Jamie Molever, share the kitchen of the future.

More accurately, the kitchen of their future. In the present, it gets used just about never.

"This was the first apartment that I even looked at the kitchen," said Greenspan, the chef at the Foundry on Melrose and the Roof on Wilshire, in the boutique Hotel Wilshire. In previous places, his feeling toward the kitchen was: "Who cares?"

This time, he cares. He and Molever are getting married this spring in Palm Springs, Calif., and they plan to have children. When they do, they plan for the kitchen to be a center of their home.

So two years ago, when they moved into the apartment just south of Melrose, they made sure the kitchen would suit. What Greenspan likes is the plentiful granite counter space, including a bar that looks into the dining area, counters on both sides of the stove and the double stainless steel sink.

"One thing we loved is the great mix of old and new — the curves, archways," Molever said. At the same time, all the appliances are new. There's a gas stove, a key requirement for Greenspan.

"I also liked the look of the — I think it's called the hood? Over the stove," said Molever, laughing at how little she knows about cooking. Of course, she's fallen for a guy who makes that knowledge something she won't much need.

"When I have kids, I want to cook for them," said Greenspan, who has plans to open two more restaurants.

Greenspan, 36, began cooking to pay his way

through University of California-Berkeley, where he studied business. After graduation, he figured the best way to keep from upsetting his parents about his plans to be a cook was to go to France. So he did.

As for Molever, salad is her signature dish, and Greenspan put it on the Roof menu — as the Wilshire salad. It's one of the most popular dishes, he said.

"When we had parties and potlucks, it was all I could do. It took off," she said.

The salad is one food that does get prepared in the kitchen; there's a deep wooden bowl sitting on the microwave, and Greenspan has brought home ingredients and prepares it: chopped romaine and radicchio, candied nuts, crumbled goat cheese, avocado, tomatoes, corn and seasonal fruit —

in this case, persimmon and pear.

"I don't think my salad has ever seen a persimmon," said Molever, who is studying for her MBA and works in marketing for Evite.

"The salad is the only thing I can think of being made in the kitchen," Greenspan said. But he amends that to include the kugel and cookies Molever makes and a Seder they prepared for 11 people. "We eat," Greenspan said, patting his not insubstantial belly. "Obviously I do." But, he said, "We're that model of a young couple on the rise that has no time."

Their cupboards reflect busy lives: Greenspan opens one near the sink, revealing crammed in papers, Twizzlers and other assorted things on three shelves before Molever asks him to close it.

In another cupboard,

there are neat stacks of plates in a matte gray-green and white bowls — with store stickers still attached.

"We registered well," said Greenspan, the sort of guy for whom the word "quip" is just right.

The silverware drawer holds — of all things — silverware, plus restaurant chopsticks in paper wrappers and plastic utensils. The refrigerator has juice, chocolate frosting, baby carrots, some dip, Beaver and Gulden's mustards and five bottles of champagne.

"We like to bathe in champagne. We like to live like rock stars," Greenspan jokes.

The cherry-colored cupboard next to the oven holds olive oil, "good" balsamic vinegar, vanilla bean burnt-sugar syrup made by a friend and a box of salted caramel cookies. Two shelves are empty.

There are some of Molever's baking supplies, a toaster oven, a microwave and an espresso maker. A few items hint at Greenspan's professional life, like the whipped cream maker and pasta machine.

But to find another clue that this is a kitchen of the future, just look at the refrigerator.

The few items posted on it look toward the days ahead: Adam Sevell and Rikki Bass' marriage announcement; a new baby card; and a running list of songs for their own wedding reception, including "Crazy Love," "I Got You Babe," "Light My Fire," "We Are Family" and "All Night Long."

No other weddings? Births? Graduations? "Yeah, but after they happen," Greenspan said with a dismissive jerk of his hand, "off they go. They're over."

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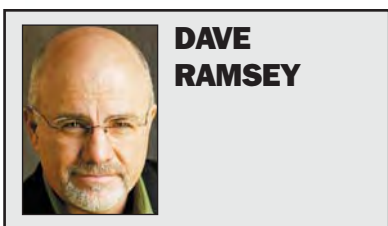

If this car is truly on its last legs, I'd say save up for a few months, then upgrade to a good, reasonably-priced, used car.

Q: I'm 24, and I don't have any debt except for a small student loan. I'm going to law school to study international law, and I have a scholarship that pays 25 percent. However, I won't really be able to work much while I'm studying. How can I do this without taking on more debt? — Amy

A: If I were you, I'd do some online research on all the governmental agencies out there. I'll bet there's one that's willing to pay for your law school if you would agree to work for them for a few years after you get out. It's kind of an indentured servitude deal, but that's a lot better than taking on \$150,000 or more in debt.

The scholarship is a good thing, but we both know it will only scratch the surface when you're talking about law school.

S. Dakota wants workers, not jobs

WASHINGTON — Job seekers who walk into one of the 700 recruitment centers run by the Manpower company around the United States soon may be asked a question that has nothing to do with their professional qualifications: "How do you feel about moving to South Dakota?"

The reason is a partnership that South Dakota's governor, Dennis Daugaard, is pursuing with the global recruitment firm. While governors in almost every other state are focused on bringing businesses to their states to help put millions of unemployed residents back to work, Daugaard faces the opposite problem: Not enough workers for the jobs that already exist.

The first-term Republican gov-

ernor wants to pay Manpower \$5 million to use its broad national network to find 1,000 skilled workers willing to move to South Dakota and fill a surplus of private-sector jobs, with positions for accountants, engineers, IT specialists and welders especially in demand. Daugaard approved a contract with the firm on a conditional basis in January, but lawmakers still must appropriate the money for the deal to move forward.

The initiative, known as "1,000 New South Dakotans," is believed to be the first of its kind in the nation. South Dakotans would get first crack at vacant jobs because they would be advertised locally for 30 days before Manpower could begin to fill them. If they are not filled in 30 days, the state would enlist the company's help to find

workers willing to relocate on a long-term basis, with new hires asked to commit to a minimum stay of 120 days. Kim Olson, a policy analyst for Daugaard, said the state is looking for workers who will become "long-term residents of South Dakota."

The proposal is not intended to create a permanent relationship between the state and Manpower. Instead, it is a placeholder plan for use while the state ramps up longer-term job-training efforts to better match its own workforce with the needs of employers. South Dakota has an unemployment rate of just 4.2 percent, the third-lowest in the nation, leaving many employers struggling to find the technically trained workers they need.

So far, the idea has won praise in the Republican-led legislature,

where many lawmakers have credited Daugaard with out-of-the-box thinking on the question of how to grow a state that has roughly the same population (820,000) as the city of Indianapolis. The governor says the \$5 million up-front investment will quickly pay for itself, estimating that the arrival of 1,000 new workers and their families would boost gross state product by \$120 million and fatten state and local tax revenues by more than \$5 million in the first year alone.

"As skilled workers in other states face high unemployment and an uncertain future, South Dakota offers them better," Daugaard told lawmakers in his state of the state speech Jan. 11, when he unveiled the plan. "We can be their land of opportunity."

Returning vets face tough job market

On any given day, you will find Brian Reynolds recruiting new hires at a job fair, military base or an employment-services office. In his industry, where turnover is high, tapping the abundant talent pool of returning veterans has been a bonanza for his company, G4S Secure Solutions, a security services provider.

Unfortunately, Reynolds finds most businesses aren't as enthusiastic: "There are some excellent companies out there recruiting, but it's always the same companies. With the huge amount of returning veterans and the huge amount of unemployment, we need to see more."

After 10 years at war, U.S. soldiers are returning from the front line to fight another battle: Unemployment. It's a tragic dose of reality for the men and women who went from leading troops and saving lives to finding themselves without income and desperate to help support their families. They face

fierce competition in a labor force where demand still outweighs job openings. A recent report issued by the U.S. Army shows that the impact of high unemployment on returning soldiers has been devastating, particularly for the 18- to 24-year-olds.

Across the country, outreach has been significant. Communities and employers publicly express their desire to help military members reenter the civilian workforce. But as I discovered in the past few weeks, there's a dreadful gap between intent and reality.

When I probed some employers who said they hired veterans, few were able to provide numbers, names or even prove the soldiers they hired are still employed. "I'll get back to you" became the commonplace answer. A Miami-area Residence Inn that received an award for supporting veterans told me its former military member no longer works there. The Continental Group, a Florida property manager, told me it

is committed to hiring returning veterans, but said it hasn't put its plan together yet to do that.

Clearly, frustration on both sides is high.

"We have commitments from 15 South Florida companies to hire. The next step is monitoring whether they do it," said Diana Gonzalez, a coordinator with the Miami-Dade Defense Alliance, a program of the Beacon Council.

Gonzalez and others say the country appears to still be in the first phase — getting post-9/11 veterans ready for the civilian labor force. Some are suffering post-traumatic stress disorder or physical wounds. Others need more training or education, or haven't come to grips with a disparity between their expectations and available positions. Employers give examples of veterans who will come for the first interview but not the second or are hired but quit soon after because they can't take the stress or monotony of the job.

When Google and your name don't get along

A READER RECENTLY emailed because the results are less than flattering when she Googles her name. There are two people of the same name who come up high in the results, one a potty-mouthed blogger and the other a person who has been accused of wrongdoing in a field of work similar to the reader's.

"What to do?" she wrote. Dan Bauer is managing director and founder of The MBA Exchange, an admissions and career consulting company that provides, among other things, "social media audits." He said about one-fourth of his company's clients wind up having something on the Internet that raises a red flag.

He said cases in which a person shares a name with someone who has been up to no good are less common, but do occur.

More broadly, there are a number of ways to remedy online problems and prevent future issues.

Bauer's first suggestion is to set up a Google alert for your name (just type "Google alert" into Google to find out how to do this). You'll get an email any time your name comes up online — this allows you to stay on top of anything being said or written about you, or anyone with your name.

The next step is to make a habit of using a middle initial or a location in your online profiles. To provide further evidence of your identity, Bauer said it's good to have a photo on your social media profiles, preferably something professional.

If you've written anything inflammatory or posted dodgy photos on your sites, scrub those clean. That doesn't mean it's gone for good, as someone else might have shared it, but it's an important step.

Make decisions in workplace with a method

Q: I have a hard time making decisions, and it's even more difficult now that I have a team to lead. How can I overcome my fear of making the wrong choice?

A: Recognize that the risks of not making decisions are generally higher than the risks of making the wrong one, and then learn to move forward.

Start by analyzing your experiences with decision-making. Set aside the emotion that has gone into your past experiences and take a detached look. If anxiety or stress creep in, take some deep breaths to settle into the present, and then continue. Consider what holds you back from making decisions, whether it's fear of conflict, making a mistake, or disappointing someone, so that you can get these factors out of your way.

Now focus in on decisions that you've made that have worked out well for you. Recall the steps you took, or the feelings that guided you. Knowing your own process will help you move past this static state that is holding you back.

Just as importantly, review situations that you'd have done differently. Be sure not to beat yourself up; just use it as a learning opportunity. For example, you may have asked one too many persons for input or rushed too hastily to a conclusion. Whatever you'd like to change, use these examples as ways to improve your future decision-making. Get feedback from others, too.

Consider your values around decision-making and team involvement. Do you prefer a consensus model vs. solo decision-making, or something in between? Think about successful decision-makers you know, and envision ways that you could emulate the approaches they use, but in ways that are authentic for you.

Finally, map out a decision-making model. For example, you may have steps that you follow, such as: Understand goals, assess risks and benefits of each possible approach, assess the risks of not taking action, make a plan to move forward, and reflect on results afterward.

Make a list of the decisions that you'll be facing in the next day or so, and mark the ones that might pose challenges. Pick one for action planning, and detail the situation:

- What needs to be decided?
- Who else is involved?
- What is the timeline?
- What could hold you back from making a timely decision?
- Who could support you in making this decision?

When the time comes to act, take a couple of deep breaths and use your planning to help you. If there are unexpected changes, then take time, if needed, but with a defined timeframe: "I'll get back to you this afternoon."

Start with small, safe decisions. But this is an essential leadership skill, so don't hold back too much. Keep track of your performance, and reward yourself when you show decisiveness. Analyze the circumstances if you fall short, but again, without blaming yourself.

Good decision-making can be learned, and the combination of skills and courage will help you succeed in your role.

Full-timers boost 2011 volunteerism

KANSAS CITY, Mo. — Something about the recovery is prodding more full-time workers to volunteer their time outside of work.

Data released last week chart a significant uptick in the number of American adults who volunteered last year for a religious, educational or other nonprofit organization.

And the biggest increase came from those who theoretically had the least free time to give.

According to the recent report from the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics, more than 64 million Americans volunteered time to an

organization last year. It was a sharp increase from the prerecession number of 60.8 million.

The unusual aspect of the 2011 report was that biggest gain in volunteers in 2011 was among the full-time employed. That was a change from the previous three years when volunteer numbers had risen markedly among part-timers and the jobless.

Christopher Wray is one of them. When he's not working on Wednesday afternoons at Trader Joe's in Leawood, Kan., he volunteers three hours a week at Children's Mercy Hospital in Kansas City, helping new patients and families get familiar with the place.

"We're a very people-oriented company at Trader Joe's, and this goes hand-in-hand," Wray said of his volunteer time. "Plus, I've worked with children in the past. I taught English in China. ... This is a good way to help."

Sylvia Hernandez, assistant director of volunteer and guest services at the hospital, said the institution "actually is seeing a steady across-the-board increase in folks who are applying to volunteer. We're getting five to eight volunteer applications a night."

Applications from full-time workers are appreciated, especially those who will fill needed evening and weekend spots, she said.

According to the annual "Volunteering in the United States" report, the overall percentage of adults who volunteered time to churches, schools and nonprofits edged only slightly higher, from 26.2 percent to 26.8 percent over the last five years.

The percentage of full-time workers who volunteered last year, 29.6 percent, exceeded the overall volunteer rate. Part-time workers still boasted the highest volunteer participation rate, though, at 33.3 percent.

In raw numbers, there were 3.4 million more volunteers in 2011 than 2007. The number grew by nearly 1.5 million between 2010 and 2011, mostly because of time

given by full-time workers.

Some of that growth may be due to the rise of corporate-sponsored employee volunteer programs. Sometimes, that kind of "volunteering" is paid.

At Ad Astra Information Systems in Overland Park, Kan., the company sponsored a week-long employee mission trip to Guatemala in connection with Heart to Heart International. The company paid some of the expenses as well as giving 10 employees paid time off to go.

"I'm glad to be able to work at a company that takes philanthropy as seriously as we do," one worker wrote on a confidential Ad Astra employee survey.

Manufacturers want skilled workers

PEKIN, Ill. — Doug Parsons needs to hire more than two dozen skilled workers at his manufacturing plant here, but he can't find them.

Parsons' problem was heightened last year when company sales grew 60 percent. To try to keep up, he hired about 30 to 40 machinists but needs more.

"We've come to the conclusion that the pool of qualified, trained, experienced workers is not sufficient to meet demand," said Parsons, president and chief executive of Excel Foundry & Machine, which makes parts for machines used in the mining industry.

Younger workers lack the skills to tap into a job that at Parsons' plant could pay up to \$23 per hour. Part of the problem is that after decades of layoffs and outsourcing, young workers see manufacturing as dead,

dying or offering jobs that are too dirty to bother with.

The lack of skilled workers is not new. In Parsons' case, he created his own training program in 2004 and started reaching out to local high schools and colleges to educate young workers about careers in manufacturing.

Other companies are taking a similar tack. They also are partnering with state agencies and manufacturing associations to improve education in science, technology, engineering and mathematics, which are key to landing jobs in today's manufacturing sector.

Nationwide, an estimated 600,000 manufacturing jobs are going unfilled, according to a survey by Deloitte and The Manufacturing Institute published last year. Manufacturers expect the shortage to worsen in the next three to five years as older

workers retire.

"Exacerbating the issue is the stubbornly poor perception of manufacturing jobs among younger workers," the report says, adding that manufacturing ranks at the bottom of industries in which young workers would choose to start their careers.

Even the White House is trying to change the image of manufacturing. In his State of the Union address in January, President Barack Obama said American manufacturers were key to rebuilding the U.S. economy. "We have a huge opportunity, at this moment, to bring manufacturing back. But we have to seize it."

Manufacturers complain it takes up to 18 months to find skilled machinists, welders, operators and engineers.

"It's not unusual to hear how manufacturers are interviewing 60 to 100 appli-

cants to find one skilled worker," said Jim Nelson, vice president of external affairs at the Illinois Manufacturers' Association.

Earlier this month Quinn announced a \$3.2 million public-private initiative to increase student enrollment in science, technology, engineering and math programs in high schools and colleges.

Among the schools tapped to help with the initiative is the Richard J. Daley College in Chicago, which offers an associate's degree in manufacturing. This semester enrollment in the manufacturing classes jumped 23 percent to 54 students.

"The economy is a big part of that and a growing realization that there are good jobs and good careers in manufacturing," said Ray Prendergast, the director of the college's Manufacturing Technology Institute.

Managers must address employee who is a danger to the workplace

Q: I work in a county government agency with a co-worker, "Pam," who is crazy. Pam's mental state is so deteriorated that she has been placed in an empty office where she cries and screams all day. She keeps yelling things like "I am not a murderer" and "I never killed anyone."

Recently, Pam has become very suspicious. She has accused several co-workers of talking about her and calling her a killer. She believes that her home and computer are bugged and that county employees are following her. I have tried to be understanding and caring, but now Pam accuses me of watching her.

The human resources manager says there's nothing management can do about this. Our boss sometimes sends Pam home, but he can't do that every day. The rest of us are sick of the drama and concerned for our safety. We've shared our fears with management, but nothing changes. Is there anything we can do?

A: This is ridiculous. No employer is required to tolerate an employee who is both highly disruptive and quite possibly psychotic. If your managers

are worried about legal liability, their real concern should be what happens if they fail to act and someone is harmed as a result.

Since your HR manager appears to be totally useless, you and your colleagues should contact the county's legal department. An attorney with experience in employment law can advise your agency head about the proper way to handle this situation. Before taking any action with Pam, management should also consult with security and mental health experts to insure that no one gets hurt.

For your own safety, you must minimize contact with this deranged woman. Remain pleasant and friendly, but keep your distance. As you have

already seen, people with paranoid tendencies frequently incorporate those around them into their sinister fantasies, so you want to avoid becoming part of Pam's delusional system.

Q: Are applicants required to tell a potential future employer that they were terminated from their previous job? If so, how should this be done?

A: In an interview, you are under no obligation to reveal the fact that you were fired. At the same time, however, you never want to lie during a job search. To walk this fine line, you need to realize that there are honest answers to the same question.

One way to avoid this dilemma altogether is to

reach agreement with your former employer on what reference checkers will be told. Despite your termination, management may have no desire to interfere with your reemployment. They might therefore be willing to describe your departure as a resignation.

If this option is not realistic, then you will need to devise a suitable explanation along the lines of, "We agreed to part ways because it wasn't a good fit." Your objective is to avoid giving the interviewer a reason to worry, so you must craft a response that doesn't raise any red flags.

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Physician publishes infection research

Each year, 75,000 to 125,000 infants are hospitalized for respiratory syncytial virus (RSV), a respiratory virus that infects the lungs and breathing passages, according to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention. A WVU School of Medicine physician and his research team have discovered that a class of natural regulatory molecules present in human cells, called microRNAs, may help fight RSV, which has no vaccine.

"RSV is the first infection that babies get that can land them in the hospital. Every year around winter is when RSV infections are at their peak. By the age of two, RSV affects nearly every child. The discovery that one of these microRNAs can inhibit the ability of the virus to multiply and spread in the windpipe of children is very important for us because there is no vaccine for RSV," said Giovanni Piedimonte, chairman of the WVU Department of Pedi-

atrics and physician-in-chief at WVU Children's Hospital. "Now that we know that specific microRNAs have the ability to fight this kind of virus, we will try to translate our findings into a new treatment for this very common infection that attacks the youngest and most vulnerable babies."

Piedimonte's research has been published in *PLoS ONE*, the world's largest open-access scientific journal published by the Public Library of Science. It can

be found on the Public Library of Science website www.plosone.org. PLoS ONE features original research from all disciplines within science and medicine, and its free, open access makes content available to everyone.

Piedimonte said he hopes his research will reach a wide audience through the journal, and he and his research team will continue to research the role of microRNAs in treating RSV patients.

WVU alum creates nature apps

While traditional nature guides may never go out of style, tech savvy nature lovers can now use their iPhones to discover the world around them.

Thanks to WVU alumnus Jason Siniscalchi, there's an app for that.

Three apps, actually, that give users access to extensive databases for identifying flora and fauna around them — all with the swipe of a finger.

Siniscalchi, who earned a doctorate in forest resources sciences from the WVU Davis College of Agriculture, Natural Resources and Design, said Fish ID, Garden ID and Tree ID were born from his love of nature and technology.

"In 2003 and 2004, while working on my doctorate, I would often go to the arboretum to walk around and collect my thoughts," he said. "Though the trees are labeled for you, I thought it would be helpful to have a tree guide to carry with me, except I wanted to use technology."

During a time when the Pocket PC was the "in" handheld device, Siniscalchi, a research social scientist at the U.S. Coast Guard Academy Leadership Development Center, began building the Tree ID database, collecting information on North American trees and their characteristics. Although he enjoyed doing the research and seeing the database grow, the project hit a snag.

"Not being much of a programmer, I was only able to develop a very rudimentary application to identify the trees," he said. "Unfortunately, due to my lack of knowledge in writing programs, the project died."

Fast forward three years. Say hello to the first generation iPhone, and to MEDL Mobile's application incubator.

The company, Siniscalchi said, was soliciting ideas for apps they would develop, market and sell with the inventor's input.

Would this be the avenue to finally develop Tree ID?

"I submitted my idea through the incubator and didn't think much of it," he said. "Three months later I received a rejection email

including reasons why they couldn't make the app — one of which was not having access to a database of trees."

Siniscalchi was quick to let the company know such a database did indeed exist.

"I think they were intrigued because a month later I received another e-mail saying Tree ID and six others were selected to be the first generation of user invented apps," he said.

The free program first became available in the iTunes store in September 2010 and was one of the top 100 reference apps for several months. The success of Tree ID paved the way for two additional apps — Garden ID and Fish ID.

Tree ID and Fish ID allow

users to search by characteristics and habitat. Garden ID, however, focuses on historical freeze dates. Users are asked to provide their location and a list of garden vegetables is returned based on the available information.

Like with all technology, apps can become outdated quickly and Siniscalchi notes it's important to stay ahead of the game.

"We're always improving the apps to answer suggestions of users," he said. "In fact, TreeID is due for a major overhaul. I've added over 300 trees, a new binomial key, and the ability to search by specific location. I'm looking forward to working with the company, finishing the update and seeing user reviews."

Students compete, present ideas on mission to Mars

A team of undergraduate students from the Benjamin M. Statler College of Engineering and Mineral Resources has earned entry into the 2012 Revolutionary Aerospace Systems Concepts-Academic Linkage or RASC-AL competition. RASC-AL is a prestigious student design competition in which competing teams submit abstract proposals that describe solutions to one of four challenge themes.

"Our abstract proposes a plan for a manned mission to Mars," said Jonathan Yancey, a junior chemical engineering student who serves as team leader. "The abstract details several solutions to problems hindering a Mars mission, including radiation, mission logistics, food storage, astronaut health and artificial gravity."

In addition to the abstract, the teams are required to prepare a poster and oral presentation for the RASC-AL Forum, to be held June 11-13, in Cocoa Beach, Fla. This is the first time a WVU team has submitted an abstract for this competition.

"We organized our team over winter break and began working on our proposal when spring semester began," Yancey said. "We each researched topics for two weeks and wrote and revised the abstract over the course of one week."

Scoring is based on the project evaluation criteria established by the RASC-AL steering committee and includes a section for education and public outreach activity.

"We intend to build awareness and interest within the organization and we hope to make the submission to RASC-AL an annual project," Yancey said.

During the forum, qualifying teams will have the opportunity to interact with industry experts from the NASA, tour the Kennedy Space Center and build relationships that may lead to internships, jobs or NASA student-research programs.

The WVU RASC-AL team is comprised of students from the Student Partnership for the Advancement of Cosmic Exploration. SPACE was established to provide students an emphasis toward developing and furthering space exploration.

WVU's efforts are support by the NASA West Virginia Space Grant Consortium, which is dedicated to building research infrastructure and promoting science, technology, engineering and math education in the state.

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Professor selected for education partnership

Mike Mays, WVU professor of mathematics, has been selected as a partner in the Mathematics Teacher Education-Partnership, a collaboration begun by the Science and Mathematics Teacher Imperative of the Association of Public and Land-grant Universities.

The Mathematics Teacher Education Partnership is a partnership of institutions of higher education and K-12 schools, districts and other organizations working collaboratively to redesign secondary mathematics teacher preparation programs. The partnership will provide a coordinated research and development effort for secondary mathematics teacher preparation programs in order to meet the challenges of the Common Core State

Standards for Mathematics and to embody research and best practices in the field.

"This is an exciting project. The Common Core State Standards are of national scope and importance, and West Virginia has been a leader in adopting these standards to guide its Next Generation K-12 mathematics content," Mays said. "The Mathematics Teacher Education Partnership will make sure that the new secondary mathematics teachers that we prepare around the state have opportunities to engage with the Standards, especially the eight Standards for Mathematical Practice, throughout their programs, by seeing the Standards in use throughout their mathematics and mathematics education courses."

Mays had worked with Gary Martin, Auburn Uni-

versity professor of secondary mathematics education, who was one of the original proponents of the idea, last year on another project connected with the Common Core State Standards (corestandards.org/the-standards/mathematics). Mays eventually joined the planning committee.

"I view this as a critical step needed to solve significant challenges facing our state and nation in the teaching and learning of mathematics," said Robert Jones, dean of the Eberly College of Arts and Sciences. "In my opinion, the faculty participants have the experience and credentials to build a functional partnership and the university and state partners have sufficient commitment to provide a path to success. The Math Education Faculty in

WVU's Department of Mathematics can provide capable guidance and leadership. Over the past decade, this group has grown in numbers, impact and has been productive in scholarship and teacher preparation. The math education group has examined a variety of models for teacher preparation and math learning; the MTE-partnership will provide a venue for expanding their best practices and testing them across a diverse set of educational environments."

As a partner, Mays will participate in the cooperative redesign of secondary mathematics teacher preparation programs to ensure knowledgeable beginning mathematics teachers who can effectively teach the Common Core State Standards for Mathematics.



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2012 Mazda5 gives minivans a right size

When Chrysler created the market for minivans back in 1983, the Dodge Caravan, Plymouth Voyager and Chrysler Town and Country were 175.9 inches long and powered by either a 90-horsepower four-cylinder engine or a 136-hp V-6.

By contrast, today's minivans are corpulent. The current Honda Odyssey is more than two feet longer and has an engine with almost double the horsepower. So it's little wonder that current minivan buyers perceive the Mazda5 as a bit too mini and not enough van. But that's only due to its frame of reference: Other new minivans. Compared to the original, the Mazda5 is a keeper of flame.

The Mazda5 has received a freshening for 2012 using what Mazda calls its "Nagare" design language. This seeks to incorporate the sense of wind and water to lend the Mazda5 a sense of motion. Couple that with its friendly face, which looks as if it was lifted from Japanese anime, and most casual observers think it's just a funky wagon or hatchback. This is a minivan that — and I apologize for this horrid cliché — thinks outside the box.

But it's the size of the vehicle that will put off most buyers, and

it shouldn't. Given that most households are shrinking, one would think that this vehicle would be sufficient for towing kids and their gear.

So, to accommodate people and stuff, Mazda got crafty. There are three rows of bucket seats, so the van seats a total of six. Doing that leaves just enough room for a bachelor's trip to the supermarket.

The Mazda5 weighs more than

1,000 pounds less than the Odyssey. Less weight means less horsepower is needed to move it around. It also means less weight while driving, making the Mazda5 one of the only minivans that's actually fun to drive.

This year, Mazda did fit the 5 with a larger four-cylinder engine. Power is rated at 157 ponies. Most will be fitted with five-speed automatic transmission, which can be

shifted manually. But unlike every other minivan on the market, a six-speed manual transmission is available, although fuel economy is identical to the automatic.

The cabin itself was fairly quiet, and the test car came furnished with some niceties, like heated front seats, Bluetooth audio and telephone, satellite radio, automatic climate control and two front-seat powerpoints.

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Car-charger maker aims to cut the cord

MORRISVILLE, N.C. — Will the electric car recharger be the next technology to go wireless?

That's the question posed by Evatran, a Morrisville startup that has created a "plugless" charging station to juice up plug-in electric cars. The company's founders — and funders — are betting that cutting the cord will be the next advance for electric cars, building on the same concept that has untethered telephones and computers from the tyranny of wall jacks.

Evatran represents one of several efforts in academia and industry to develop wireless recharging on the theory that handling dust-caked, mud-stained, rain-soaked cables will prove to be a major impediment to mass adoption of the electric car. Evatran's approach allows an electric vehicle equipped with its device to recharge by parking over a recharging pad mounted on the ground.

The concept is intriguing enough to encourage Duke Energy, Google, Clemson Uni-

versity, Hertz Rent-A-Car and others to test Evatran's product this spring in anticipation of 2,000 Evatran units being sold this year.

Sears, the tool and appliance chain, has signed on to be an authorized nationwide installer of the garage-based mechanisms needed to make Evatran's system work at home. The car-mounted adapters would have to be installed by auto dealers.

Raleigh, N.C., officials, meanwhile, are in talks with Evatran to test the outdoor version of the company's Plugless Power technology at select locations around town.

"Fundamentally, what we're selling here is convenience," said Evatran cofounder Rebecca Hough. "The cord gets really dirty. People run over the cord. And nobody wants to be using a cord in a rainstorm."

Three-year-old Evatran is a spinoff from MTC Transformers, an electronics manufacturer since renamed Schaffner MTC and based in Wytheville, Va.

Duke Energy, based in Charlotte, N.C., will install a Plug-

less Power unit next month at the South Carolina home of an employee who drives a Chevrolet Volt to see how the charging unit performs.

"We don't want to sit back and be surprised by new technologies that are coming down the pike," said Duke spokeswoman Paige Layne. "The more we are prepared for new equipment that comes into use, the more we'll be prepared to keep the

lights on."

Jim Poch, executive director of Plug-In Hybrid Coalition of the Carolinas, said that as a longtime electric car buff, he's not fazed by handling charging cables. Poch, a Volt driver in Charleston, S.C., acknowledged some customers might be willing to pay a premium for the convenience of wireless recharging, but he rejects Evatran's general premise.

"I think it's self-serving and incorrect to talk about the huge need for this," Poch said. "I don't see it as being a barrier to someone purchasing an electric car."

Raleigh officials foresee another impediment: Plugless Power currently works only with the Volt and Nissan Leaf, and the city doesn't own any of those models yet. The city uses converted plug-in Prius hybrids instead. Hough said Evatran's technology will be adopted for other auto models soon.

"We're interested in exploring the technology," said Julian Prosser, Raleigh's assistant city manager and an owner of a Nissan Leaf. "Even if the city didn't host one on city property, we could work with them to identify interested parties in the private sector that might want to host these."

Evatran has already logged 180 online reservations for Plugless Power. The unit is expected to retail for less than \$3,000, not including the cost of installation. The price would be twice as much as some conventional rechargers.

Customers would have to retrofit their cars at the dealership for now, but in the future Evatran is counting on the units being factory-installed.

Because Plugless Power drains energy, it would raise the cost of recharging a car to about \$1.45, as opposed to \$1.35 for a plug-in charger, said Steve Raedy, Evatran's R&D director.

Plugless Power uses induction technology that's more than a century old and is common today in cell phone cradles, electric toothbrushes, microphones and generators. Induction is based on creating magnetic fields, but in most applications the gap is infinitesimal.

In Evatran's wireless recharger, however, the gap is 6 inches, representing the distance between the ground pad and the adapter mounted under the car.

The ground pad in the outdoor and indoor units can be embedded in asphalt or concrete so that it's not visible and does not tempt thieves or vandals.

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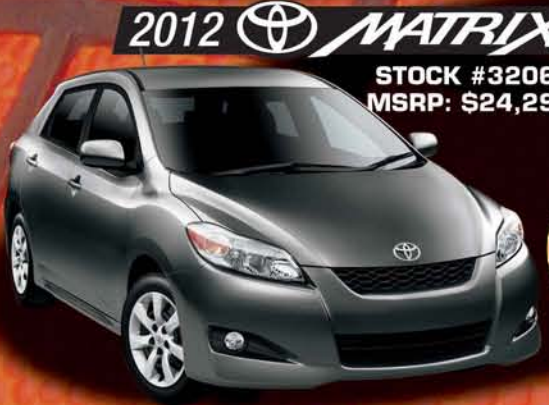
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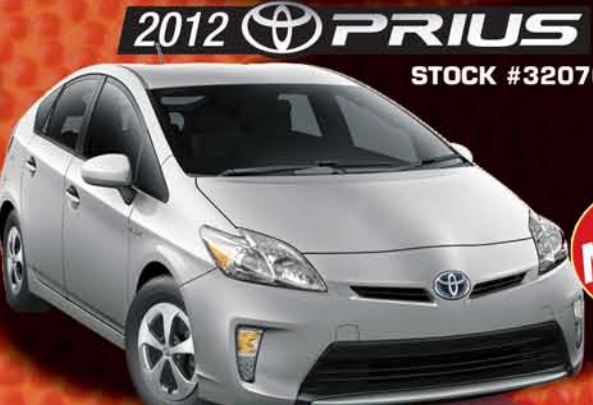

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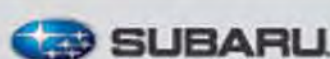

Going 'Mad'

AMC series finally returns after lengthy hiatus

After nearly a year and a half, fans of Don Draper finally get to tune back into the advertising antics on AMC's "Mad Men," when the series hits the air for its fifth season on Sunday, March 25.

The cable network's first original series was on hiatus following its fourth season while showrunner Matthew Weiner went up against network and studio executives to fight a tough contract renegotiation battle — a battle, Weiner told the New York Times, he feared the show might not win.

"I quit," Weiner told Times reporter David Izkoff. "I had come to terms with the fact that it was over. And then they compromised, and I compromised. A little."

At issue during the renegotiation standoff that had fans holding their breath all this time was mainly the show's cast size and running time, both of which execs wanted to reduce in order to cut costs.

"We got this far this way," Weiner said. "Why would you change the brand? It reeked of New Coke to me."

Speaking of brands, the polished "Mad Men" aesthetic that has become so admired by fans has not been lost on a few major brands that have decided to capitalize on it (a move that would almost certainly be praised by the ardent capitalists who fill the Madison Avenue offices on the show). In the summer of 2010, Mattel released a line of collectible "Mad Men" Barbie dolls, featuring Don, Betty, Joan and agency partner Roger Sterling (played on the show by war-movie veteran John Slattery).

Banana Republic has teamed up with the show's Emmy Award-winning costume designer

Janie Bryant again to produce a second line of "Mad Men"-inspired work wear that was just released with the brand's spring collection. The first line was released for Banana Republic's 2011 fall collection. And what would a fashionable woman of the times wear with her floral house dress — besides the faux-pearl necklace of

course — but lipstick and rouge from the Estée Lauder limited edition "Mad Men" collection?

It isn't only big business that has recognized the series' strengths, however.

"Mad Men" is historically significant for not only being the first cable series to win an Emmy for outstanding drama, but it's also the only cable series to win that title and the Golden Globe for best dramatic television series for three consecutive years.

In a two-hour season premiere, viewers will at last be able to sit down with their Rob Roys or highball glasses of Canadian Club and catch up on the '60s-set world of advertising, the social change that came with the times and the personal changes that each of the characters were going through when the series left off in October 2010.

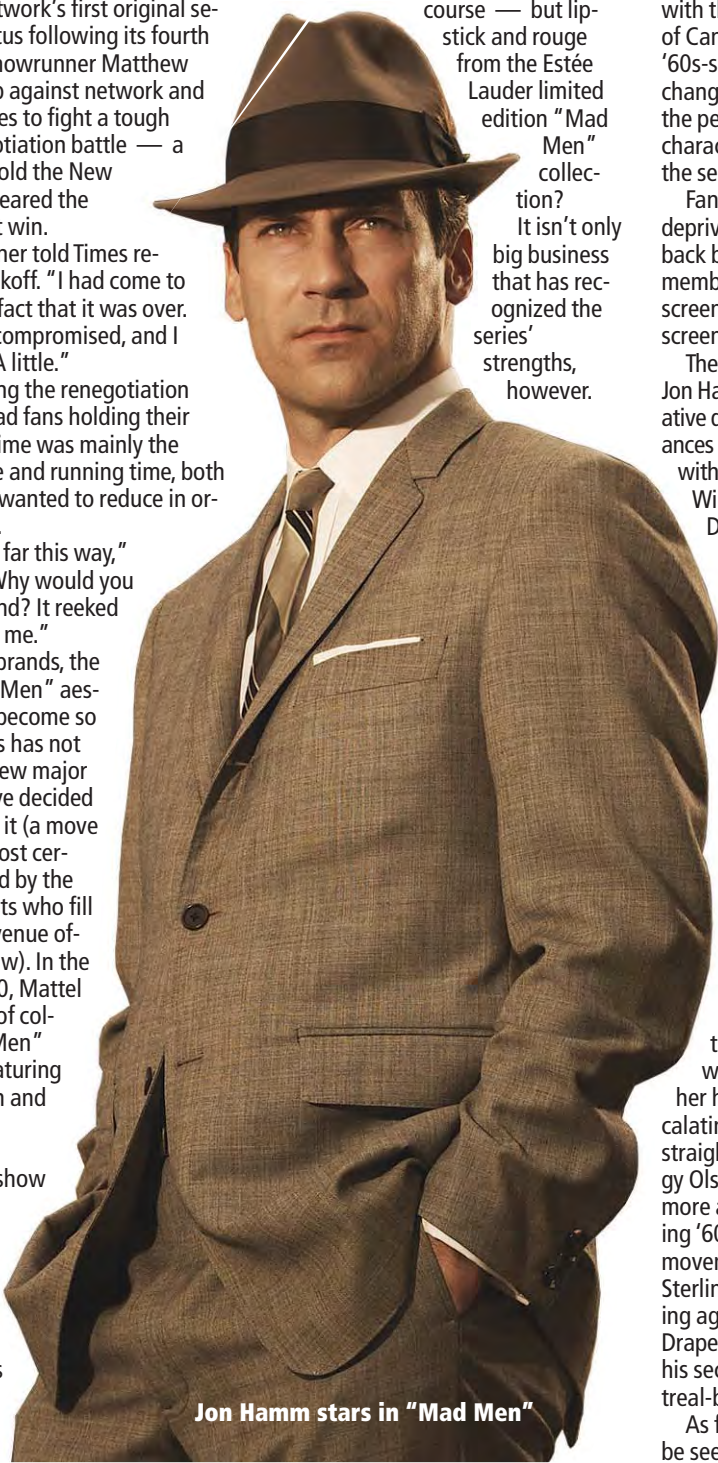
Fans of the cast weren't completely deprived while the show was on the back burner, however. Many of the cast members could be found on the big screen in 2011 while their main small-screen stint was on hold.

The series' main man, the smoldering Jon Hamm, who plays advertising creative director Don Draper, made appearances in "Bridesmaids," and teamed up with much of the same crew (Kristen Wiig, Maya Rudolph and Chris O'Dowd) in "Friends With Kids," also released last year and directed, written and produced by Hamm's romantic partner of 14 years, Jennifer Westfeldt.

January Jones, who plays Betty Draper — Don's now ex-wife — on the series, landed a role in "X-Men: First Class" as telepathic mutant Emma Frost, and red-headed bombshell Christina Hendricks, who takes on the role of office manager Joan Harris on "Mad Men," appeared in "Drive" alongside Ryan Gosling and in "I Don't Know How She Does It," starring Sarah Jessica Parker.

At the end of Season 4, set in the fall of 1964, Joan is pregnant with Roger Sterling's child while her husband has been sent to the escalating war in Vietnam, the fairly straight-laced upstart copywriter Peggy Olson (Elisabeth Moss) is gaining more and more exposure to the emerging '60s counter-culture and civil rights movements, the future success of the Sterling Cooper Draper Pryce advertising agency is still in question, and Draper has proposed out of the blue to his secretary, Megan (played by Montreal-born actress Jessica Paré).

As for wedding bells, they remain to be seen in Season 5. The cast and crew

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are remaining tight-lipped as usual about specific plot-lines. Hamm told the Times "We don't know if, in fact, they are married. A lot can happen between here and there."

A Mayan mystery

Researchers discover new evidence of ancient disappearance

The ruins of the Mayan civilization have become one of the most popular tourist attractions in Mexico. The former city-states boast hidden chambers, cryptic carvings and sky-high staircases that lead to simplistic homes.

The remains of these cities have been combed over for hundreds of years, as researchers and archeologists try to piece together the lives of the civilization. Whenever an answer was found, however, more questions arose.

On Wednesday, March 28, PBS follows a group of students and their professor as they investigate their newest discovery.

Though Mayan tribes still live along the coasts of Mexico and parts of Central America, there have been many legends of the "Mayan collapse" that took place around 800 BC. Archeologists have found proof of several cities that had been abandoned, and they struggled to find any explanation for it. Homes were left standing, crops were left half-harvested, and all progress seemed to have ceased. There was no evidence of war or invasion, no indication of illness and little information on why they left.

The PBS documentary follows George Bey and his students from Millsaps College in Jackson, Miss., as they discuss their newest research about the mystery.

In an interview with USA Today, Bey revealed that the Mayans fled their Kiuc (pronounced kee-week) city quite quickly.

"Things were going full bore, construction was underway. And things stopped," he said.

Bey and his colleagues have found evidence that there was little planning involved in the Mayans abandoning their homes. As described in the USA Today

article, there were "walls perfectly laid out with corner and vault stones, lying flat on the ground and waiting to be erected atop the second floor of a palace." Bey's team also discovered pottery half-molded and tools left as if they were only laid down for a moment.

"Rapid abandonments are rare for the archeologists. The new information at Kiuc offers another take on the Maya collapse," said anthropologist Rani Alexander of New Mexico State University in Las Curces.

There are, of course, several theories regarding the mysterious disappearance. Mayan sites in Guatemala were abandoned because of impending invasion, but Kiuc had no evidence of war or signs of struggle.

There had also been a severe drought that had crippled the area, suggesting the populous had moved on in search of water. However, many researchers have dismissed the idea because after leaving the town, no one returned after almost

2,000 years.

Bey and his students, along with a National Geographic film crew, filmed the documentary in Mexico last summer. Bey has been studying the past two decades digging around Mexico, and he is thrilled to have been part of such a big discovery.

"People have kind of ignored the dry tropical forest because it's not as sexy as the rainforest," he said in an article with the Chronicle of Higher Education.

Bey himself is not only the leader of the program and the head professor of anthropology at Millsaps, but he is also the driving force behind the international program entirely. As the Dean of International Education, it was his idea to go to the Yucatan in the first place.

He had been researching and digging at the Kiuc site for decades before he decided to bring in students to help them gain field experience. The site also employs local residents and provides resources that would otherwise be difficult to obtain.

Millsaps College is a small institution in Mississippi that only has about 1,200 students and less than 100 staff members. Though it has fewer students than Harvard Law School, Millsaps offers programs that are not found at other institutions. The college actually owns a 4,000-acre site near the Mayan town of Oxkutzkab. The reserve was bought in the 1990s, and through it, the college created a nonprofit organization that maintains the reserve and its workers.

Hollywood Q&A

Q: I was looking at some old-school R&B music videos, and I saw one particular video by a female artist whose name I forget. Did my eyes deceive me when I thought I saw famous actor Don Cheadle as a dancer?

A: No, your eyes were showing you "the Real Thing." The video you saw was for Angela Winbush's 1989 hit "It's the Real Thing," in which Cheadle appears as one of a team of orange jumpsuit-clad backup dancers who are washing Winbush's sports-car.

The great irony is that, of the many dancers in her troupe, Cheadle is given the least amount of acting work. A few others get to ham it up while wiping down the car while one even gets a line, saying, "Hot wax?"

Cheadle does, however, get the most dancing work. He's at the front of the group for all of the dance sequences, and his high-kicking moves, while they may seem a little dated now, are unarguably impressive.

Bear in mind, this was in the early stages of Cheadle's slow rise to fame. It was, for example, two years before he got fourth billing in the short-lived "Golden Girls" spinoff "The Golden Palace," and six years before he first made waves in the movie biz with his award-winning role in the 1995 Denzel Washington picture "Devil in a Blue Dress."

Cheadle turned up in a number of surprising bit parts in this period, including a role as Will's friend Ice Tray in a 1990 episode of "The Fresh Prince of Bel-Air" and a role as a 16-year-old offender in a 1988 episode of "Night Court" (when he was, in fact, 23).

Q: Will "Curb Your Enthusiasm" return for another season?

A: Apparently, that depends entirely on Larry David.

The frequently tight-lipped creator-writer-producer-star of the series hasn't made a decision yet, but quite a few people are waiting for it, and they're speculating while they do so.

The most recent guess was not optimistic. When asked by the Orlando Sentinel just a few weeks ago whether the show would return for a ninth season, Cheryl Hines, who plays Larry's wife, said, "If I was a gambling woman — and I am, I love to gamble — I would probably say not." She added, however, that, "Larry is full of surprises. You never know."

However another series star, JB Smoove, told the Huffington Post back in September, after the show aired its 80th episode, that he was sure it would be returning.

"He's going to make it an even hundred episodes. A hundred always looks good in a box," he said.

Indicating how much power they've given to David, HBO has publicly stated it wanted another season, but it is basically powerless to make it happen. HBO programming president Michael Lombardo told Deadline.com that he's "cautiously optimistic," since "for the first time ever after this season, Larry didn't say 'I never want to do this again.'"

As for the man himself, he hasn't said much, though he seemed upbeat in an interview with ESPN Radio New York last August, two weeks before the eighth season ended.

Q: Does Jeff Dunham ever explain what kind of creature Peanut is?

A: Perhaps because of his burgeoning fame, or perhaps because he's done hundreds of shows and needs to switch things up for his own sanity, ventriloquist comedian Jeff Dunham has dropped the part of his act in which he explains what Peanut is.

But in previous routines, Peanut is described as a "Woozle," and he hails from a small island in Micronesia (a grouping of thousands of islands in the western Pacific Ocean).

Of course, he looks like nothing naturally occurring in Micronesia — or anywhere else for that matter — with his purple skin, white fur and small tuft of green hair. Peanut himself tells Dunham on stage that he must have been on drugs to come up with a puppet like Peanut.

Peanut is one of Dunham's oldest characters, along with cantankerous retiree Walter, and José the jalapeno ("on a steak"). Dunham only later came up with the others who now appear in his act, including arguably his most famous creation, Achmed the Dead Terrorist.
