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Drilling into mine set

FODC to study pool chemistry

Friends of Deckers Creek (FODC) is preparing to take a small step in its Richard Mine acid mine drainage cleanup project. The first of a series of bore holes will be drilled into the



mine so the chemistry of the Richard Mine pool can be studied and the best site for a treatment plant determined.

FODC Water Remediation

Project Manager Tim Denicola told members of its restoration team that a contractor is slated to drill the hole July 31. The access will enable a geotechnical study.

Denicola said its contractor, GAI Consultants, secured Uniontown, Pa.-based driller Redstone International to install and monitor the exploratory well. The bore hole will be 4 inches across. FODC previously secured an agreement with a Brookhaven landowner for the well site.

As previously reported, this project will cost about \$30,000.

50,000 to gather for annual bike rally

Ten years of anything is a long time. It's such a long time, in fact, that it's hard to remember what happened when within that time frame, MountainFest Board Member Mike Alexander said.

"It's very challenging to believe that this is our 10th year," he said. "It started as a small bike rally, and I can remember all of it, sort of."

Wednesday, motorcyclists will start rolling in for this year's MountainFest, set for Thursday-Saturday. Various venues throughout Morgantown will host rally activities.

Putting together a motorcycle rally boasting an average attendance upward of 50,000 people is not a cookie-cutter project, Alexander said.

It's laborious fitting all the puzzle pieces together, but it's a labor of love, the longtime board member said.

"The mission statement has always been to create an economic impact for the city, the county and the state," Alexander said. "I believe we've been

HIV diagnosis rate fell in U.S. over decade

NEW YORK — The rate of HIV infections diagnosed in the United States each year fell by one-third during the past decade, a government study finds. Experts celebrated it as hopeful news that the AIDS epidemic may be slowing in the U.S.

The reasons for the drop aren't clear. It might mean fewer new infections are occurring. Or that most infected people already have been diagnosed so more testing won't necessarily find many more cases.

"It could be we are approaching something of a 'ceiling ef-

fect,' " said one study leader, David Holtgrave, of Johns Hopkins University.

The study was released online Saturday by the *Journal of the American Medical Association*. It is part of the journal's special report on HIV research, issued ahead of the International AIDS Conference that starts today, in Melbourne, Australia.

HIV is the virus that causes AIDS, which destroys the immune system. The World Health Organization estimates 35 million people globally have the virus. In the United States, 1.1 million people are thought to be infected,

though many don't know it.

The study is based on HIV diagnoses from all 50 states' health departments, which get test results from doctors' offices, clinics, hospitals and laboratories. The data span a decade, making this a larger and longer look at these trends than any previous study, said another study author, Amy Lansky, of the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention.

The findings: 16 out of every 100,000 people ages 13 and older were newly diagnosed with HIV in 2011, a steady decline from 24 out of 100,000 people in 2002.

If you had told Shaffer, back when he was working security jobs in his hometown of Dayton, Ohio, that he'd someday find himself without a permanent roof over his head in West Virginia, he would have smiled and told you — gently — that you were crazy.

"Well," the 55-year-old said, with another smile, "you really don't know what your circumstances are going to bring."

He came to the Mountain State a few years ago for a fresh start with family here. He ended up homeless, sleeping in the woods and under bridges in and around Morgantown because he didn't have anywhere else to go.

Shaffer was smiling Thursday because it all came back around.

Plane lands on highway for 2nd time

EAST MORICHES, N.Y. — A pilot who landed his disabled plane on a highway for the second time in eight days said Friday he's lucky to have escaped unhurt and thankful he didn't hit anyone.

Frank Fierro, 75, said he was "shaking" as he glided the single-engine Challenger ultralight plane to a landing on the eastbound lanes of Sunrise Highway just before 1 p.m.

Fierro landed the same plane in a nearby median on July 10.

Police said Fierro was flying the plane for the first time since the previous week's incident.

Both times it developed engine trouble, forcing Fierro to find a makeshift runway before he could get back to Spadaro Airport in East Moriches.

successful doing that. It's important for me to give back to the community that has been so good to me and my family."

Cliff Sutherland, music and entertainment coordinator for the event, said he and Alexander have been on the board together since day one, which was really 1 1/2 years before MountainFest first took off in Morgantown. Sutherland said that it's been 11 1/2 years since all of it began, but the first festival was held 10 years ago. For MountainFest's 10th year, Sutherland said the event will be a special one.

Inside the doors of the Hazel and J.W. Ruby Community Center at Mylan Park, a collage of past years' memorabilia will be featured as part of a 10th year anniversary museum.

Sutherland said a commemorative wall will be put up, displaying band T-shirts, posters, photographs, and national and local media cutouts.

He said a 10-year selection of clothing will be available, and he even has signed guitars from a number of the bands that rocked the stage each year at the event.

Sutherland said it's crazy to think how far MountainFest has come in 10 years. The first few years weren't so razzle-dazzle as some would like to believe. But in 2014, festival coordinators are proud of the expected attendance of more than 60,000 people. Sutherland said the rally has begun to develop into an event that people from all over the country mark on their calendars each year.

MountainFest coordinators are not finished with the progress after 10 years, though. In hopes of improving even more, the coordinators are accepting outside input this summer.

Sutherland said they will give surveys to all of the rally's vendors to gauge their opinions. He said vendors go all across the country to different events and rallies each year and can be useful for new ideas.

"It's time to start getting input from [vendors]," he said, "you know — ideas, what works, what doesn't work, what would they do different — that type of thing. You can't do the same thing every year."

Alexander said he's really happy to be able to do this every year, even though it's a constant struggle to see what they can pull out of the hat next.

"You never know what's coming down the road for next year," he said. "But we just anxiously await it."

1. Last book read: I read a lot of books. One of the best ways to hone your storytelling and writing skills is to read what others have written — the good and the bad. The book I'm reading now is "A Discovery of Witches," by Deborah Harkness. It involves all the best of spooky elements — such as old libraries, witches, vampires, and the search for a magical medieval text. Like all good ghost/monster stories, there's an element to it that teaches you something about humanity and how to be a better person.

2. Favorite movie: My favorite movies are the ones that tell a story, and ones that have a little bit of humor and discovery. One of those is "Under the Tuscan Sun," which I've seen hundreds of times.

3. Favorite comfort food: Homemade macaroni and cheese with tomatoes. It's a southern West Virginia dish that I simply love — especially in winter.

4. If I were king/queen for the day, I would: At the risk of sounding philosophical, I'd outlaw inequality. Life is difficult. It's even worse if you're poor, or disabled, or you're hated simply because you're a different race, a different gender, a different religion, or you have a different sexual orientation. Accomplishments, intellect and goals mean so much more to me than any of that — a person's skin color or who they fall in love with does not preclude them from being a loving, honest

and valuable person. Rewarding people for their talents, education and good-hearted nature is important, but there is less value placed on that than being wealthy. I also don't think this equality is a difficult goal to accomplish. The world would be a lot happier place if people took more pride in themselves and cared less about what other people were doing.

5. Striking success: A recent success of mine is the WVU Ghost Tour. Each of the stories I tell is based in folklore or ghostlore about the WVU campus. At first, it was thought that it would only draw a handful of attendees, but the first tour in 2010 drew 109 people. The second year (even though it was during Superstorm Sandy and the stories were performed indoors) drew 52 people. In 2013, the tour reached 258 attendees! I was concerned it would be too large and no one would be able to hear me, but my little headset microphone and I were able to reach everyone. ... It's something that people genuinely enjoy and I'm glad I could bring it to the campus. This year's tour is already being advertised, and the online Facebook group event already has 111 people signed up to attend.

It's also pretty awesome that I can now say that I performed during a hurricane.

6. Striking failure: My first job out of college was at a newspaper in Virginia. I worked there for a solid two months, and then it went out of business. Although it was not my fault (the chief editor/owner wasn't the best with finances, apparently), it still destroyed my confidence in my ability as a writer. I moved back to West Virginia after that and started graduate school at WVU. The last time I did a Google search for my former chief editor, I found out that she is serving a life sentence for murdering her boyfriend. She shot him five times in the back and still claimed self-defense. I'm a storyteller, but even I can't make that up.

7. Major pet peeve: My biggest pet peeve is when I'm interrupted while I'm concentrating on a project. When I'm engrossed in writing a story, or reading, or enjoying a moment and then the phone rings or someone interrupts me. It's worse when I'm working on a story, because I'll lose my train of thought and can never get it back.

8. Favorite childhood memory: Most people who know me wouldn't believe it, but I grew up a country boy near Riverton, on the family homeplace in Pendleton County. For a long time, my family lived on a 500 acre farm in Germany Valley, and my brother and I would run around all day long free as birds — there were tons of animals and the farmhouse was haunted by a Civil War captain with a wooden leg, but I wouldn't trade that experience for anything. A lot of the stories that I perform have their roots in that time period, because that is the point in my life when I was surrounded by parents, grandparents and great-grandparents who were telling the family stories to us. That's the point when I learned the importance of telling stories — it's not simply entertainment. It's a way of keeping our culture and family history alive.

9. Who has had a great influence on me: Definitely my parents, who have been supportive of everything I've ever done. ... I couldn't have done what I've done without them.

10. Favorite junk food: Almost any type of chocolate. When I was a child, I

was allergic to chocolate and blew up like a puffer fish when I ate it, but as I got older I grew out of it. Now I tell everyone that I'm making up for lost time. However, I don't care for chocolate with fruit in it. That is a travesty.

11. Favorite subject in school: I always enjoyed anything where I was writing, drawing, or creating something. So it was always English, art and writing classes that I enjoyed the most. Quite often I would zoom through my math and science so that I could take some time to write or draw in class. I would draw cartoons of my friends and I doing funny things, or write silly stories about us. In fifth grade, I started a fake newspaper about my friends and me living in a fictional version of our hometown, and kept it up until we graduated high school. The stories were fictional, but were usually based on something that actually happened. I still have it, and through the years have made copies of it for all my school friends. It's a good source of memories for all of us.

12. If I could have a meal with one person, living or dead, it would be: Without a doubt, my paternal grandmother. Her name was Virginia, but she was born on Easter in 1937 and was forever after known as "Bunny." I was her first grandson (and her favorite, I'm told). Sadly, she passed away when I was 5 years old. Although it's been many years, I still miss her. Throughout my life, I've often felt she's been there guiding me. I'd really like her to know how I turned out, and how happy I am. I still have many of her things and photos in my home, including her purple irises that are now growing in my yard. Her memory has been a source of powerful comfort to me many times. Simply answering this question has taken me to 5 years old again, remembering.

Elijah said he had the most fun learning to box from Ground Zero Fighting Systems.

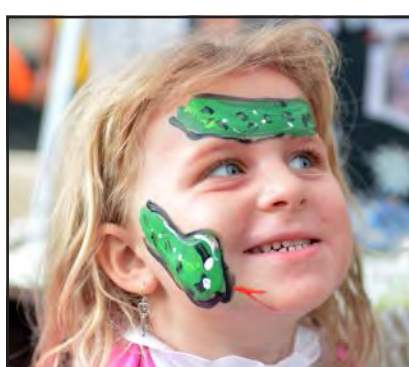
Malachi was a bit more interested in the chicken chucker, a game where he used a mallet to launch rubber chickens to a landing target.

Now is the time to update immunizations

Four more weeks until school resumes and state health officials want students to be ready.

The West Virginia Department of Health and Human Resources Division of Immunization Services urges parents to ensure children have the proper vaccinations before school starts.

Dr. Letitia Tierney, commissioner of the West Virginia Bureau for Public Health and the state health officer, said now is the best time for parents of students entering kindergarten, seventh and 12th grades to make sure their children have the required immunizations.

Children entering a West Virginia school for the first time, from kindergarten

through grade 12, are required to have the DTaP, polio, MMR, chickenpox and hepatitis B vaccines. Children who are not behind schedule can receive school-entry "booster" doses in just two vaccinations (DTaP-Polio and MMR-chickenpox) with combination vaccines.

Seventh-graders must show proof they received a dose of Tdap vaccine, which protects against tetanus, diphtheria, and pertussis (whooping cough); and a dose of the meningitis vaccine.

Twelfth-graders must show proof of a dose of Tdap and a second dose of the meningitis vaccine, if the first dose of the meningitis vaccine was given before the child's 16th birthday. If the first dose was given after the 16th birthday, a second dose

of the meningitis vaccine is not required.

"These immunization requirements will not only lengthen the time for which immunized students are protected from vaccine-preventable diseases, but also will lower their chances of passing diseases to classmates with weakened immune systems, pre-school aged children, infants, the elderly and others," Tierney said.

The Division of Immunization Services encourages parents to schedule vaccinations now. Doctors' offices will be busy with immunizations and sports physicals in the weeks leading up to the start of school.

About 130 of the cameras are a specific type of Sony camera and retail for roughly \$1,750. Companies have until 3 p.m. Aug. 5 to submit their bids, according to the bid documents.

There are security cameras throughout campus in areas around the residence halls and in high-traffic areas, Corey Farris, dean of students and director of housing, said. The students know that there are cameras and many of their locations.

For example, there are cameras in the residence hall elevators and students know they are there. If someone commits an act of vandalism, a residence assistant can identify that student as the perpetrator. The word then spreads among the students.

The new cameras will mainly monitor the entrances and exits of the residence halls, Farris said. WVU has 14 residence halls, not including places such as Vandalia Apartments and College Park Apartments.

WVU Police Chief Bob Roberts said a few of the new cameras will monitor roads, such as University Avenue, but the bulk will be in the residence halls.

If the department receives a call or a complaint, its officers can look up the video in real time as others respond, Roberts said. Investigators can also use them during the course of their work. The video feed comes to the department's command center, but the department won't have personnel sitting, watching the cameras.

Roberts said there hasn't been an uptick of criminal activity around the residence halls. The new cameras are just another layer of security.

WVU also has several security measures in addition to cameras, including email alerts and doors that open by card swipe, Farris said.

According to WVU's annual Clery Report, the number of violent crimes has decreased over the last few years. In 2009, there were 78 violent crimes; the number dropped to 58, in 2013. The number of property crimes has also decreased from 353 to 293 in the same time span.

However, the number of drugs, liquor and weapons arrests increased. In 2009, there were 504 arrests; in 2013 that figure was up to 1,239.

WVU's Office of Information Technology Services has standards for regulation of security cameras, though WVU Police developed formal procedures. The policy went into effect in 2013. The standards have four purposes: To achieve a safe and secure campus and to protect university property; to support the mission of the WVU Police Department, to provide transparency in the use of security cameras and to ensure protection of individual privacy rights.

According to the standards, the security cameras must be integrated into the WVU Police Department's video management system.

Security cameras are not to be placed in areas where there is a reasonable expectation of privacy, such as restrooms or employee lounges, according to the standard. All WVU buildings are subject to security camera coverage.

W.Va. city seeks to sell truck scales, never used

MOUNDSVILLE — A Northern Panhandle city is looking to sell road scales officials purchased in 2010 amid the gold rush for natural gas.

Moundsville purchased the scales to weigh trucks officials believed were carrying too much cargo. The hope was the weight checks would spare unnecessary damage to city streets from overloaded trucks, which has been a problem in some localities where natural gas is drilled in Marcellus Shale.

But Vice Mayor David Wood said he does not believe the scales have ever been used.

Now, Moundsville is looking to sell the scales to Powhatan Point. The village across the Ohio River in Belmont County has to contend with potentially overweight vehicles associated with natural gas drilling and coal mining industries, according to Police Chief Jason West.

Drilling-related trucks driving throughout the

upper Ohio Valley include so-called sand cans, which transport fracking sand to the gas well sites. There are also water trucks, equipment trucks, and tanker trucks that could carry natural gas liquids such as propane.

"We do have a lot of truck traffic. It is always a concern," Wood said. "Certainly, there is wear and tear on the streets from this."

Moundsville Police Chief Thomas Mitchell declined to say why Moundsville never used the scales, other than saying it's "hard to weigh trucks."

Wood said the city paid about \$9,000 for the scales at the time of their purchase.

"We just don't have the manpower in our police department to handle it," Wood said. "There are so many ways in and out of Moundsville that for us to tie up officers' time weighing trucks, it just wouldn't make sense."

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Study: National parks boost economy in West

JACKSON, Wyo. — National parks and monuments boosted the economies of surrounding communities in Wyoming, Montana and Idaho by a combined \$1.15 billion in 2013, according to a study. Wyoming saw \$723.3 million in spending by visitors to parks and monuments run by the National Park Service; Montana, \$397.3 million; and Idaho, \$29.4 million. On Friday, the National Park Service released a report that said spending on hotels, restaurants, gas

and supplies by visitors to U.S. national parks in 2013 contributed \$14.6 billion in economic benefits to communities within 60 miles of the parks nationwide. Wyoming, Idaho and Montana share parts of Yellowstone National Park, where visitors spent almost \$382 million in nearby communities. Yellowstone had 3.18 million visitors in 2013. The study showed that 49 percent of Yellowstone spending benefited Wyoming and 51 percent benefited Montana. Visitors to Grand Teton

National Park and the adjoining John D. Rockefeller Jr. Memorial Parkway spent more than \$502 million in northwest Wyoming and eastern Idaho communities. "We understand the part we play in creating a healthy and sustainable economic base, and we appreciate the support of area businesses, neighbors and park partners for our national parks," Grand Teton National Park Superintendent David Vela said in a statement. More than 2 million vis-

ited Glacier National Park in Montana, spending more than \$178 million. Communities around Craters of the Moon National Monument in southern Idaho saw \$6.6 million in economic benefits from visitors. "This new report confirms that national park tourism is a significant driver in the national economy, returning \$10 for every \$1 invested in the National Park Service," Sue Masica, the National Park Service's Intermountain Region director, said.

Cubs sue over fake mascot that fought

CHICAGO — The Chicago Cubs have filed a lawsuit against several people whom the team accuses of being behind a fake mascot that has been engaging in bad behavior near Wrigley Field, including getting into a bar fight that was captured on video and posted online. The team filed its lawsuit on Friday in federal court in Chicago against John Paul Weier, Patrick Weier and three other unnamed individuals whom the team says dress in the bear costume, the *Chicago Sun-Times* reported. The fake mascot — not to be confused with the team's new official mascot, "Clark the Cub" — wears a Cubs hat and number 78 jersey that has the name "Billy Cub" on the back.

Fugitive found in Nepal back in New Mexico custody

ALBUQUERQUE, N.M. — A New Mexico man who fled sex abuse and kidnapping charges 14 years ago returned to the state Saturday following his capture in Nepal, the FBI said. Neil Stammer, 47, arrived in the afternoon at the Albuquerque International Airport, FBI spokesman Frank Fisher said. Stammer will be booked on outstanding warrants at the Bernalillo County Metropolitan Detention Center, according to Albuquerque police. Stammer was arrested in 1999 on allegations of criminal sexual penetration of a minor, kidnapping, intimidation of a witness, battery and criminal sexual contact of a minor. Stammer was allowed to bond out before his arraignment, authorities said.

Hundreds rally, seek end to Gaza crisis

DENVER — Hundreds gathered for a rally at the State Capitol and a march through downtown Denver to call for an end to what they called a humanitarian crisis brought on by conflict in Gaza. Demonstrators waving red, black, white and green Palestinian flags and signs that read "End Collective Punishment" gathered on the Capitol lawn Saturday. Denver police said the group marched peacefully through Denver. The rally was organized by a coalition of groups supporting a Palestinian homeland.

Prison roof in Texas collapses, 19 hurt

DIBOLL, Texas — Authorities said the roof of a privately run East Texas prison has collapsed, temporarily trapping dozens of inmates and sending 19 injured inmates to hospitals. One of those inmates was later airlifted to Memorial Hermann Hospital in Houston after the Saturday collapse at Diboll

Police seek driver in deadly bank heist

FRESNO, Calif. — While police in the Northern California city of Stockton searched Saturday for an accomplice in a bank robbery that led to a police chase and deadly shootout, investigators said they suspect the same men carried out other area bank heists, including one at the same branch hit this week. Officer Joe Silva of the Stockton Police Department said there are striking similarities between a late-January robbery at the Bank of the West and one Wednesday that left a hostage and two robbers dead. In both cases, Silva said, armed robbers made their get-away by stealing a bank employee's car.

Sunday marks 2 years since theater massacre

THINGS TO KNOW

DENVER — On July 20, 2012, a man wearing police-style armor killed 12 people and injured 70 during a midnight showing of "The Dark Knight Rises" in the Denver suburb of Aurora. James Holmes, a former neuroscience graduate student, pleaded not guilty by reason of insanity in the shootings. His attorneys say he was gripped by a psychotic episode. Here are things to know on the second anniversary today:

■ **THE TRIAL:** Now scheduled to start Dec. 8, after three postponements. The first was when prosecutors said they would seek the death penalty; the second, when prosecutors asked for a second state sanity evaluation of Holmes; the third, when a doctor doing that exam asked for more time.

■ **JURY SELECTION:** Seating 12 jurors and 12 alternates will take months. Judge Carlos A. Samour Jr. will issue a summons to 6,000 people and expects 3,300 candidates. They'll fill out questionnaires and undergo questioning.

■ **OUTCOMES:** If found guilty, Holmes could face the death penalty. If found not guilty

by reason of insanity, he would be committed indefinitely to the state mental hospital.

■ **HOLMES:** The 26-year-old sits quietly in shackles during hearings and stares straight ahead. He no longer has the vacant, wide-eyed stare of his first hearings. Whether he could tell right from wrong in the shooting — the key finding of the first sanity exam — wasn't released. But the judge agreed with prosecutors that the doctor was biased and ordered a second exam that's due Oct. 15.

■ **SURVIVORS:** Tom Teves, of Phoenix, lost his son, Alex, 24. He's frustrated by the slow progress. "That individual (Holmes) has a multitude more rights than any of the victims," he said. "I think it's (the grief) like carrying around a big weight. You get stronger carrying it around, but it never gets lighter."

■ **THE THEATER:** The former Century 16 was renovated and renamed the Century Aurora. It opened its doors to victims of the attack in January 2013 with a remembrance and a special showing of "The Hobbit." Theater 9 is an XD theater with a wall-to-wall screen.

Emotional rally held for man who died in custody

NEW YORK — The wife of a man who died after a police officer used an apparent chokehold to bring him to the ground during an arrest burst into tears Saturday at a Harlem rally in his honor.

An overcome Esaw Garner was escorted from the Rev. Al Sharpton's National Action Network headquarters in Harlem, which was packed with hundreds of people. Sharpton said Thursday's death of 43-year-old Eric Garner while in custody could strain the black community's relationship with the New York Police Department.

Garner, who was black, was confronted by police trying to arrest him on suspicion of selling untaxed, loose cigarettes on a Staten Island sidewalk, authorities said. The 6-foot-3, 350-pound Garner became irate, denying the charges and refusing to be handcuffed before one of the officers placed him in what Bratton said appeared to be a chokehold, according to partial video of the encounter obtained by the *New York Daily News*.

The tactic, which can be fatal, is prohibited by departmental policy. Prosecutors and internal affairs detectives are investigating the death.

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Monitors try to secure plane crash site

HRABOVE, Ukraine — International monitors moved gingerly Saturday through fields reeking of the decomposing corpses of the victims of a Malaysian airliner shot down over rebel-held eastern Ukraine, trying to secure the sprawling site in hopes that a credible investigation of the disaster can be conducted.

The crash that killed all 298 people aboard the plane two days earlier intensified the already-high animosity on all sides of the conflict.

The Ukrainian government and separatist rebels accuse

each other of shooting down the Boeing 777 with a surface-to-air missile. Many see the hand of Russia, either for its alleged support of the insurgents or perhaps firing the missile itself. The crash site is near the Russian border.

Amid wide calls for an international investigation, doubts arose about whether the evidence was being compromised before inspectors ever reach the scene.

Russian President Vladimir Putin and German Chancellor Angela Merkel agreed in a phone call on Saturday that the sides should enter talks and stop fighting.

DNA collected to ID victims

THE HAGUE, Netherlands — Forensic teams fanned out across the Netherlands on Saturday to collect material that will help positively identify the remains of victims killed in the downing of the Malaysia Airlines plane over Ukraine. Families and friends of the dead huddled to console one another at churches,

schools and sports clubs across the nation.

Police said in a tweet that 40 pairs of detectives from the National Forensic Investigations Team would be visiting victims' relatives over the coming days. Other Dutch forensic experts were en route to the crash scene, Foreign Minister Frans Timmermans said in Ukraine.

Officials: Gunmen kill 15 troops

CAIRO — At least 15 Egyptian border guard troops were killed in an attack Saturday by gunmen using rocket-propelled grenades in the country's western desert, security officials said.

An Interior Ministry official said the gunmen opened fire at a checkpoint in the western desert governorate of Wadi el-Gedid, on the Farafra Oasis Road, about 310 miles from Cairo. Farafra is the country's westernmost oasis, near the border with Libya.

The officials said three attackers were killed in ensuing clashes. A medical official said five troops, including officers, were wounded.

The officials spoke on condition of anonymity because they were not authorized to speak to journalists.

Erdogan: Israel worse than Hitler

ANKARA, Turkey — Turkish Prime Minister Recep Tayyip Erdogan has accused Israel of "barbarism that surpasses Hitler" during its ground invasion of Gaza.

Erdogan accused Israel of using disproportionate force in Gaza and said the operation there has derailed efforts to normalize Turkish-Israeli ties. The ties soured after Israel's 2010 raid on an aid ship which killed eight Turks and a Turkish-American.

Erdogan spoke in a campaign speech Saturday in the Black Sea port

city of Ordu. He is running for the presidency in elections in August.

Multiple-bus crash in Germany kills 10

BERLIN — A crash involving several buses on a highway in eastern Germany killed 10 people and injured 69, police said Saturday.

The crash near Dresden occurred shortly before 2 a.m. when a Polish bus hit the rear of a Ukrainian bus and then broke through the median barrier, slamming into a Polish minibus traveling in the opposite direction, police said. The larger vehicle partly crushed the minibus before rolling down a verge.

Police said nine people died at the scene, and a 10th person succumbed to injuries in a hospital. At least seven of the victims were traveling in the minibus, but it was unclear where the other three had been, police spokeswoman Jana Ulbricht said.

Aid workers freed after 32-day captivity

KHARTOUM, Sudan — Three Sudanese aid workers taken hostage in Sudan's Darfur region were freed Saturday after being held by gunmen for over a month.

The joint U.N. African Union Mission in Darfur said in a statement that the three were released after 32 days in captivity. It said they appear to be unharmed.

The statement identified one of the three Sudanese workers as an employee of UNICEF, the U.N.'s children agency. It said two others work for the Irish humanitarian agency GOAL.

Red Cross: 7 die in militant attack on Kenya coast

NAIROBI, Kenya — Seven people were killed when gunmen attacked a bus at the Kenyan coast, Kenya Red Cross said Saturday.

The attack Friday night occurred in an area called Corner Mbaya, which is 3 miles from the coastal town of Witu in Lamu county, the humanitarian group said. Authorities believe many of the passengers who were on the 52-seat bus traveling from Mombasa to Lamu town, fled into a nearby forest.

Al-Qaida-linked al-Shabab militants from Somalia claimed responsibility for the attack.

Police chief David Kimaiyo issued a dusk to dawn curfew for Lamu County and declared the Boni forests and adjoining forests prohibited. The areas are believed to be the gunmen's hideout. Those found in the forests will be arrested, Kimaiyo said. He ordered buses to travel with armed escorts.

Police officers engaged in a shootout with the gunmen attacking the bus, leading to the deaths of three police officers and four civilians, Kimaiyo said.



Shipwreck work

Huge tanks are along the side of the luxury cruise ship Costa Concordia as operations to refloat it to tow it away got under way on the tiny Tuscan island of Isola del Giglio, Italy, on Friday. The heavily listing ship was dragged upright in a daring maneuver last September, and then crews fastened huge tanks to its flanks to float it. Towing is set to begin Monday.

Israeli troops battle Hamas, uncover tunnels

GAZA CITY, Gaza Strip — Israeli troops uncovered more than a dozen cross-border tunnels and battled Gaza militants on the second day of an open-ended ground operation Saturday, as the Palestinian death toll climbed past 330 and diplomats scrambled to revive cease-fire efforts.

The Israeli military said it had severely diminished the arsenal of Hamas, the Islamic militant group ruling Gaza, but the militants have continued to fire rockets.

In the northern Gaza Strip, Palestinian officials reported intensified Israeli airstrikes, shelling

and numerous civilian casualties. Gaza Health Ministry spokesman Ashraf al-Kidra said the new round of strikes raised the death toll from the 12-day offensive to more than 330 Palestinians, many of them civilians and nearly a fourth of them under the age of 18.

They are part of the process that paints the picture for each individual team's journey.

A team is hot or not, rising or falling, under the bright lights or politely dismissed. At the least, that stuff interests many and, in my opinion, can prove rather meaningful.

Why else would coaches weave what "they say" into their team discussions? And why should an athletic director or university president care? Well, a Saturday night under the ESPN lights may prove a little more lucrative than a noon game on your local affiliate. No school can drum up a catchy public-relations initiative that comes close to matching the goodwill earned from those campus scenery shots we see in and out of commercial breaks. We could bring up ticket sales here, but it's a simple fact: People want to watch entertaining winners.

Now let's go back to how it affects individual teams. In the same week WVU landed one player on the all-Big 12 preseason team and was projected to finish eighth in the 10-team conference, Alabama tied the SEC record with nine first-team selections. OK, OK, so big surprise that Alabama should be good again.

But Tide coach **Nick Saban** repeatedly reminded reporters that, in 22 years, the media have never predicted the Crimson Tide to win the league title in years it did. And when the media picked Alabama to win it, the Crimson Tide didn't.

There are numerous stories about successful programs battling complacency, and Saban's obedience to "The Process" year after year is why he's the best coach in the game today. He must convince his players that the team is at stage one although the program is at elite level. If you don't think he does that — and must do that — you're fooling yourself.

Now fast-forward to Tuesday, inside the Dallas Omni Hotel ballrooms, and you'll hear a group of Mountaineers (head coach **Dana Holgorsen**, cornerback **Daryl Worley**, wide receiver **Kevin White** and punter **Nick O'Toole**) discuss how they're anxious to prove themselves. The comments may be laced with underlying tones of feeling disrespected and underappreciated. That doesn't happen by accident.

Compare that to two years ago, when **Geno Smith**, **Tavon Austin** and Mountaineer mascot **Jonathan Kimble** were the main attractions at the 450-plus media event. Smith was prompted into singing "Country Roads," while Kimble handed out his famous jerky to everyone.

And really, that doesn't matter. Because it's all about who handles their journey the best that matters most.

Schools buy into buyouts

Contract clause is common for many coaches

When college-sports fans think of the term "buyout," images of their favorite school's head football and men's basketball coaches spring to mind.

"Buyout" became a popular term around West Virginia when

then-Mountaineers head football coach Rich Rodriguez bolted for Michigan, in December 2007.

Rodriguez and Michigan ultimately paid his \$4 million buyout to settle a lawsuit

filed by WVU, with Rodriguez forking over \$1.5 million and Michigan \$2.5 million.

For years, these buyout clauses — money a coach must pay the school when he or she leaves for another job — were the exclusive

domain of football and men's basketball coaches.

Not anymore. At WVU, buyout clauses — also refer to as liquidated damages — have become the norm for head coaches in most sports.

Only women's rowing coach Jimmy King did not have one in his latest contract, which expired June 30.

King said he has not signed his new contract. He continues to work under the terms of his previous contract, WVU senior associate athletic director Kelli Cunningham said.

King said the buyout clause

has never come up in discussions about his contract. King works on one-year contracts and said he is happy with that.

Buyouts are "more common across the country," said WVU athletic director Oliver Luck, who does not have a buyout in his contract. "I've talked to A.D.s at various meetings I've had, and it seems to be more commonplace. I think they make some sense."

Jim Marchiony, associate athletics director for external relations at Kansas, said these buyouts are common in head-coach-

\$2.5M payday for WVU vs. Virginia Tech

Teams meet in football at FedExField in 2017

WVU and Virginia Tech will each earn \$2.5 million for appearing in the 2017 football season opener at FedExField, home of the NFL's Washington Redskins.

By comparison, the Mountaineers are guaranteed \$3.2 million for participating in this year's Chick-fil-A Kickoff Game, against Alabama, in Atlanta, on Aug. 30.

According to contracts obtained by *The Dominion Post*, WVU and Virginia Tech have matching incentives for selling tickets to the 2017 game, which will be played Sept. 2.

If the game attendance reaches 62,500, both schools will receive a \$125,000 bonus; that will increase to \$250,000 if the game attendance hits 69,000.

There are a few differences between the contracts, though. WVU will receive six complimentary suites for the game at FedExField, while the Hokies will have three suites. The contract also calls for Virginia Tech to receive 1,050 complimentary tickets and 48 parking passes. WVU's contract guarantees the Mountaineers 900 complimentary tickets but no parking passes.

WVU has been designated as the visiting team for the game, which will re-ignite the rivalry for the Black Diamond Trophy. The two teams haven't played since 2005, two years after the Hokies left the Big East for the ACC.

Mike Montoro, WVU's director of football communications, confirmed that the Black Diamond Trophy will be on the line during the 2017 game, as well as during the teams' home-and-home series

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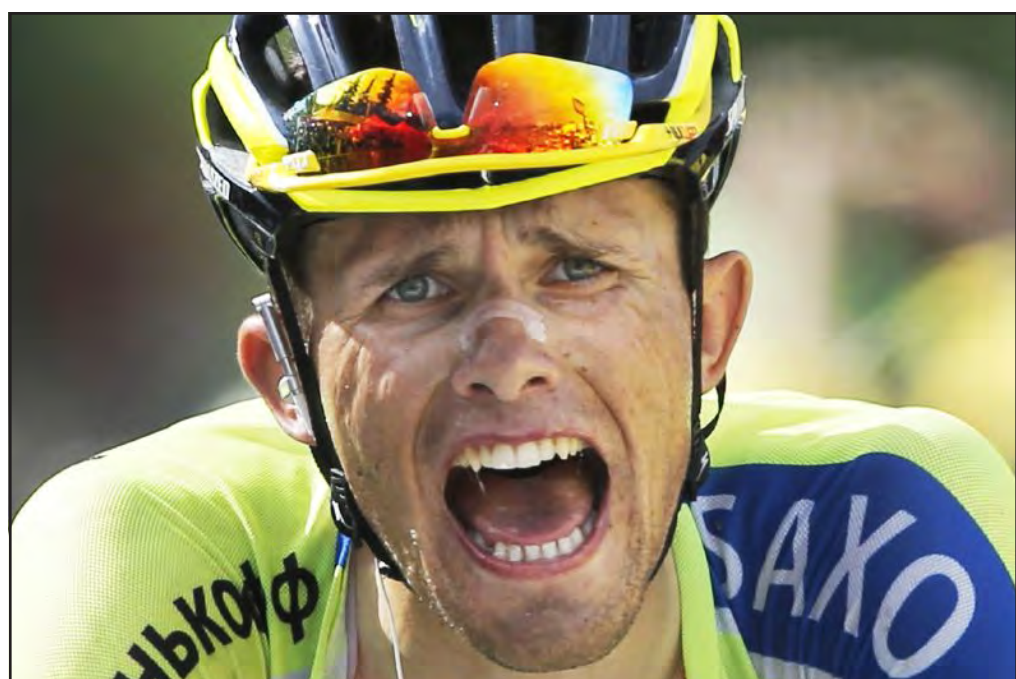
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Majka wins 14th stage; Nibali extends lead

RISOUL, France — Rafal Majka, of Poland, won the 14th stage of the Tour de France — a second day of punishing Alpine climbs and over the highest point on the race — and Vincenzo Nibali again extended his overall lead by finishing second Saturday.

Majka led a breakaway on the final climb in the 110-mile roller-coaster course over two infamous climbs, including the 7,742-foot Izoard pass, and a finish up to Risoul ski station.

The one-two result was the flip of Friday's entree

into the Alps: Nibali won, and Majka was second.

Majka's victory was the first on this Tour by his Tinkoff-Saxo Bank team, which lost main leader Alberto Contador when he crashed out injured on Stage 10.

"I am really very happy," Majka, who was sixth in the Giro d'Italia this year, said of his first Tour stage win. "I am a little tired, but ... I had a calm first week to help Alberto. It broke my heart to see him leave."

Team owner Oleg Tinkov, a Russian businessman, choked up, wiped his nose, and put on sunglasses.

"We lost Alberto, we had to win," he said through a translator on French TV. "Rafal is a marvelous young rider. We will come back to try to win the Tour one day."

The stage didn't shake up the top five standings. Nibali strengthened his hold on the yellow jersey, making the Tour from here to the finish in eight days in Paris looking more and more like a race for podium spots behind him.

Nibali crossed 24 seconds behind Majka, followed by Jean-Christophe Peraud, in third, two seconds slower. Two French riders, Thibaut Pinot and Romain Bardet, conducted a two-man sprint and crossed another 24 seconds back. American Tejay van Garderen was fifth, 54 seconds back of the Polish rider Alejandro Valverde lost a minute to Nibali.

Overall, the Italian leads second-place Valverde by 4:37, and third-place Bardet by 4:50.

ing contracts at his school. "Not all of the coaches have them, but most of them do," he said.

Steve Malchow, senior associate athletic director at Iowa State, said the buyout clauses are also common among the Cyclones' head-coaching contracts.

Baylor and TCU, private institutions, declined to discuss their coaches' contracts. *The Dominion Post* has filed Freedom of Information Act requests for coaches' contracts from Texas, Texas Tech, Oklahoma, Oklahoma State and Kansas State. Those five schools did not respond to questions in time for this report.

As for why buyouts have increasingly shown up in contracts of head coaches of all sports, Luck said he's not sure.

"I just think it's something that folks have on the radar screen more now than they did in the past," he said.

\$4 million to \$10,000

The buyouts at WVU range from \$4 million, for men's basketball coach Bob Huggins, to \$10,000, for rifle coach Jon Hammond. Luck said the buyout number for each head coach is part of the negotiation of the contract.

"I think it all depends on the individual and the coach and the coach's agent, coach's lawyer or whoever it is," Luck said.

WVU women's soccer coach Nikki Izzo-Brown said she has never been a proponent of buyout clauses.

"If anyone wants to better their family, they should have the freedom to do that," said Izzo-Brown, who started the women's soccer program at WVU, in 1996.

"That's just my philosophy on it. I can understand where athletic departments are trying to protect themselves. I'm not a huge fan of it. There are a lot of administrators and people who can move freely, but, again, it's part of the business."

Buyout clauses work both ways. The head-coaching contracts at WVU stipulate that if WVU fires the coach for reasons other than cause, the coach is owed his or her base salary for the remainder of the contract.

Sean Cleary, WVU's women's cross-country and track and field head coach, doesn't have an attorney who reviews his contract, although he said he might in the future.

Iloria Cipolat, Cleary's administrative assistant and a law-school graduate, reviews his contract for him.

Cleary said he is fine with the buyout clause in his deal, which would require him to pay \$25,000 for each remaining year on his contract, which expires June 30, 2016.

Cleary said he views WVU's wanting a buyout clause in his deal as a sign of respect for his abilities as a coach.

"It's a 'We trust in you, you trust in us and we go forward' type of thing," he said. "For some, if there's something a little better out there, you break the contract and you pay it."

Up front and honest

Izzo-Brown said she believes multiyear contracts are more critical in recruiting, but she concedes they won't stop every coach from leaving for another job.

"It just boils down to talking to kids and making sure that you are up front and honest," she said. "Anything can happen. You can't make promises about how long you're going to be there."

"That's probably one of the most common questions. With my longevity, I think it's a little bit easier for me to say, 'I started this thing, and I haven't moved yet.'"

WVU volleyball coach Jill Kramer said she sees buyout clauses as a positive in recruiting, especially in her sport, where a majority of the players give verbal commitments early in their high school careers.

"We've got two kids committed who are sophomores who are going to be juniors," Kramer said. "It's important they trust that I am going to be there."

Buyout clauses do not of fend her, Kramer said.

"I think what it means is, 'We care about the investment we are making and we want to make sure you are invested in the program and not just yourself,'" she said.

"When someone makes a strong investment, I don't see anything wrong with it. It has to be reciprocated both ways."

The Big 12 Conference typically ranks among the top volleyball leagues in the country. Kramer contends that much of that is due to the long-tenured coaches in the league.

"Most of the coaches in the Big 12 have been there well over 10 years," said Kramer, who begins her fifth season at WVU, in August.

"It's kind of like most of them are not going anywhere. That's the situation I'd like to be in. That's kind of how the recruiting game works: You have to be able to tell kids you are situated and building a program they can be proud of."

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Using drones would make hunting *too* easy

I GUESS IT HAD TO HAPPEN.

We've been hearing about UAV's (Unmanned Aerial Vehicles) having the potential to deliver UPS packages to our homes, groceries to our homes, scouting opposition football teams, you name it. And, of course, relative to terrorism and our continuing and escalating war on terror (didn't someone say that we'd won that war?), we hear about drones every day.

If these little devices can do reconnaissance for terrorists, survey leaks on pipelines, monitor traffic around major cities, detect weather, then they obviously can be used to scout and find animals for hunters.

Why bother spending days in the woods finding out where the deer are, look-

ing for deer sign, deer trails, etc., when you can just take a small UAV and find that big buck you've been after? It's the first day of gun season. Should I hunt that ridge, or the one over there? Heck, I'll just send up a drone and find that buck.

If you think that is far-fetched, then you haven't been paying attention to the rapid acceleration of technology in the past five years. Within the next two years, drones will become smaller, more advanced, cheaper and more adapt-

able for specific jobs.

I do not have access to a crystal ball, but look at the way things have advanced in this country.

So, the suggestion that drones could not be developed that would be affordable for hunters to use is not reality.

But is that the way hunters want to go? I don't think so.

Yes, things advance in all areas, from microwaves to cruise control. However, except for a very small minority of misguided people, hunters do not want a guaranteed experience.

If, in some way, every hunt was guaranteed success; if every time a deer hunter went afield he or she would get a huge buck, then except for a few warped fringe, hunters

would stop hunting, because hunting is not killing. Ethical hunting is an experience that sometimes ends with a kill, but most times does not.

Think about it in other terms. If every time you went bowling you would get a perfect score of 300 — every time — boredom would eventually take over and you would stop bowling. If every time a Mountaineers running back touched the ball, he scored a touchdown, it would be nice at first.

Might be interesting for a game or two. But eventually, no one would bother watching. In fact, nobody would bother playing.

Same is true for making the predator-prey playing field one-sided in favor of the hunter. Doesn't work for me and wouldn't work for you.

Turns out that hunters won't have to decide whether to use drones or not, because states are rapidly passing regulations. Many states have already made their use illegal for hunting. The Pope and Young Club and Boone and Crockett Club have made it illegal to enter animals in the record book if drones were used. The National Park Service just made it illegal to fly drones in national parks. A

few states have made it illegal for antihunters to use drones to harass hunters.

It's already illegal to use aircraft to hunt in most states. The only exception I can think of is the use of helicopters to kill unwanted hogs in Texas, where the hogs reached levels that were intolerable for landowners. Since drones are aircraft of sorts, existing laws cover their use in hunting in many states.

It appears that hunting has remedied the growing drone phenomenon. Only time will tell how society deals with them in other areas of our lives.

Get used to sharing road

Not bicyclists vs. motorists, it's just common courtesy

"Get a bicycle. You will not regret it if you live."

That's how Mark Twain summed up learning to ride a bicycle in an unpublished essay in the early 1880s.

More than a century later, not much has changed ... if you go bicycling on area roads.

Still, despite the threat to bicyclists on the road today, it's clear their numbers are coasting upward.

That's despite sweating the hills and the danger around almost every bend in the road.

In the past week, we have heard from both sides on the issue of cars sharing the road with bicyclists.

For now, there appears to be a double yellow line separating both sides on this issue.

Some motorists are clamoring for bicyclists to keep up with traffic, while bicyclists insist they have a right to the road, too.

Obviously, many, make that most, roads in our area are not even wide enough for two vehicles to pass safely. Our topography also prevents drivers from knowing what's over the hill or around the curve.

Not to mention, our state and local governments cannot even afford to maintain existing roads, let alone add bike lanes.

Furthermore, bicyclists seem to some to add just one more challenge — hazard — to driving.

Yet, everyone needs to take a deep breath and simply start learning to share the road with bicyclists, for many good reasons.

The most obvious one is common courtesy. Do unto others as you would have them do unto you, you might say.

There's also a host of statutes in the State Code that spell it out for anyone who questions bicyclists' right to the road.

A new one was even added this year that requires motorists to give bicyclists as wide a berth as possible — at least 3 feet — when passing.

And given the overall costs of health care, many of us would be well advised to do some pedaling.

Bicyclists, of course, also need to observe the rules of the road — use signals, stop for signs and lights, don't weave in and out of traffic, and stay off sidewalks.

When possible, make every effort to accommodate passing motorists, too.

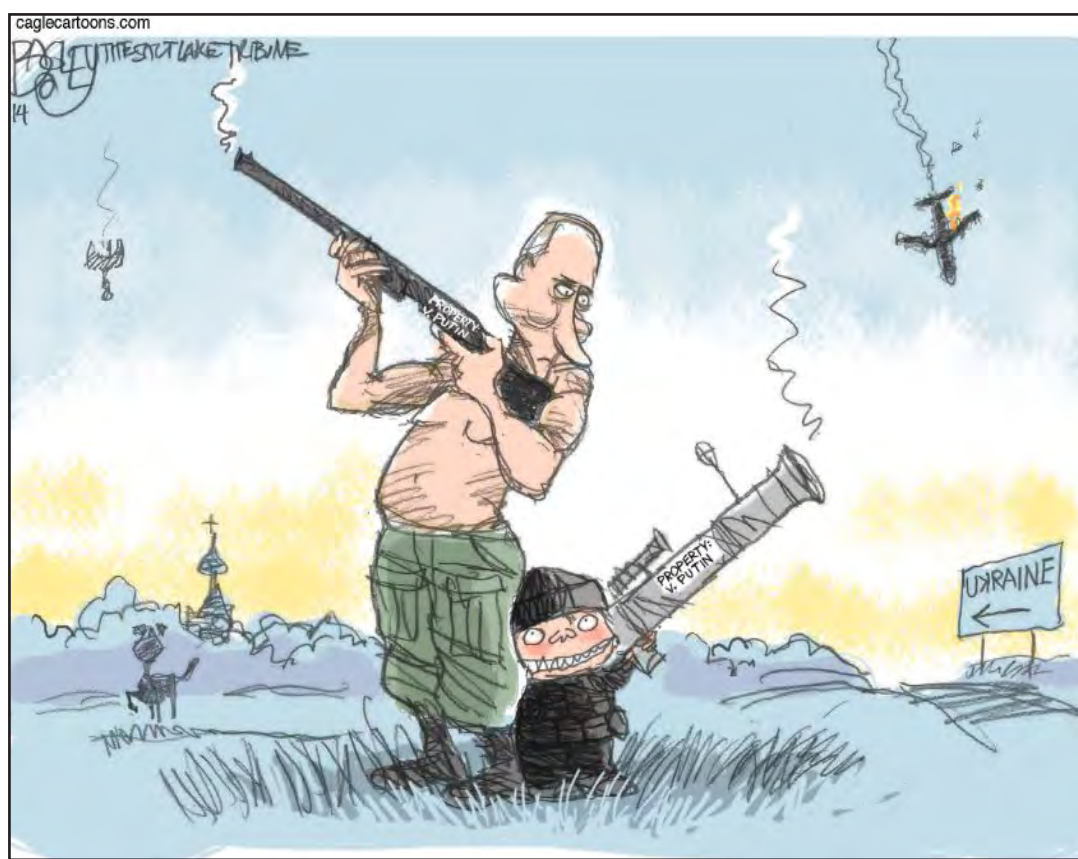
We realize that more education is needed on how motorists and bicyclists need to interact.

New state road projects also need to at least consider bicyclists in the equation, when cost effective.

In Twain's account, he notes the bike he was learning to ride was one of those cumbersome high-wheeled ones of yesteryear.

Undoubtedly, it took a while to learn how to ride, to get used to.

Learning to share the road with bicyclists might too, but no one will regret it.

Supporting EPA plan good for West Virginia

If West Virginia were not a coal state and dependent on it for much of our electricity, how many people here would think limiting carbon emissions was a good idea? Probably most people.

It's like limiting how much industrial waste goes into rivers upstream from drinking water intakes or how much lead goes into gasoline.

Currently, there are no national limits on how much carbon can leave the stacks of a coal-fired power plant, unlike arsenic or mercury. Right now, coal-fired power plants release 40 percent of all carbon emissions in the country.

The Environmental Protection Agency's (EPA) Clean Power Plan proposes to reduce carbon levels leaving these plants by 30 percent by 2030.

This does not mean the end of coal in West Virginia — it is a modest step toward placing a limit on something that is impacting our health and the weather.



The EPA proposal allows states to decide for themselves how best to reach these levels, and the requirements for West Virginia are less stringent than for many other states. The proposal sets out four ways to reduce carbon levels:

- Use more natural gas and other low-carbon emitting fuel sources.
- Increase use of wind, solar and nuclear energy.
- Use electricity more efficiently.

If the West Virginia Public Service Commission, and the state Department of Environmental Protection and our politicians work together, this could be a perfect opportunity to increase jobs and improve our health. If we let fear propaganda influence us, we all lose.

As a coal state, this is a chance for West Virginia to lead the rest of the country and show how limiting carbon emissions can benefit everyone. For once, we could be No. 1 for something positive. Tell our politicians that supporting the EPA is good for West Virginia.

Tree not taking root

We were boys, we were friends, we were enemies then and now

THE LATEST ROUND OF BOMBINGS, rocket attacks, airstrikes — sparked in part by the abductions and killings of three Israeli teenagers and a Palestinian teen — make hope for peace seem as impossible as these outrages against innocents are beyond reprehensible. My nephews and nieces in Israel and their peers in Gaza run for cover and cower in fear. Both sides are killing the future.

Each time we suffer through this, I think even more about a little dialogue I had a long time ago with a Palestinian neighbor.

In the fall of 1961, I was 8 years old and living in the Israeli hamlet of Kfar Saba, where my parents and I were born. We could see the Samaria Mountains from our porch, and the town of Kalkilya, now in the West Bank but then part of Jordan, just a mile or so away. A valley of orchards and wild brush lay between us and was forbidden; the border was more or less defined by an old rail path.

But precisely because that citrus-scented valley was off-limits to me, it was also enticing one Saturday afternoon. I rode my bicycle past the village square, beyond the old bus station

age, as surprised by this encounter as I.

We both froze in fear. But curiosity quickly prevailed and we began to talk. It was a halting mixture of Hebrew and English; I did not know any Arabic. I still remember that he knew words from both of my languages and I did not know any from his. I remember his face very clearly, particularly the way he smiled.

I told him about my village and described my father as a war hero and a mighty man who had once fought in that valley. He told me that his father was very tall and strong and was chieftain of his village. We talked about the orange trees, and we agreed to meet again in a week at the same spot. I told him my name. He told me his: Ahmed. We parted, the sons of fathers who may have once battled each other in that valley.

Our second appointed meeting was washed out by an autumn rain, but we did meet again several days later. I had not told my parents about the first meeting because they

Kalkilya was close by where I walked in the thick groves that divided the two worlds. And then I realized that I was not alone. Standing and staring at me was an Arab boy, about my

A champion of 45 words on freedom

FREEDOM OF SPEECH has lost one of its most eloquent voices.

Freedom of Religion is today without one of its truest believers.

Freedom of the Press has one fewer compelling writer — and one of its most-exceptional editors.

Freedom of Assembly has one fewer person to stand with others — 50 years after he risked his life as a young man in defense of those marching peaceably for justice.

And the Right to Petition peaceably for change has one fewer champion to call out to those in power for positive change.

John Seigenthaler, 86, led *The Tennessean* newspaper in his hometown of Nashville, Tenn., was the first editorial director of *USA Today*, and was the founder of the Newseum Institute's First Amendment Center.

Seigenthaler died July 11, after being hospitalized briefly. More than 4,000 people lined up for the visitation at the First Amendment Center on July 13, and his funeral was conducted Monday.

During his 40-plus year tenure as a journalist, he more than lived up to the old charge of that profession to "comfort the afflicted and afflict the comfortable."

Whether it was lobbying for long-delayed diplomas for now-graduated former students denied graduation because of their civil rights work, or parole and then freedom, rather than the death penalty, for a woman he felt was unjustly sentenced, he worked, advised, strategized and inspired others to demand fairness and action.

He helped integrate Nashville churches by assigning a black reporter for the first time to do *The Tennessean's* weekly report on Sunday sermons — just one of the many ways he took a larger-than-life role as editor in opposing bigotry, and pursuing claims of corruption and back-room dealing in local and state government.

History notes that Seigenthaler was knocked unconscious in Montgomery, Ala., while attempting to rescue two Freedom Riders from a Klan-led mob, while serving as a personal representative of President John F. Kennedy and Attorney General Robert F. Kennedy.

His friendship with the Kennedys led to the only real departure from journalism, in the early 1960s during JFK's campaign and later as a top aide to RFK. For decades, he led the selection committees for the John F. Kennedy Library Foundation's Profile in Courage Award and the RFK Center for Justice and Human Rights' Robert F. Kennedy Book Award.

John Seigenthaler lived a life dedicated to encouraging the greatest possible number of his fellow citizens to participate in that marketplace and to using their First Amendment freedoms to the fullest. Each year, he'd review the results of the annual State of the First Amendment national survey, showing that most Americans can't name all five freedoms in the First Amendment — and redouble his efforts to raise the score.

Just recently, Nashville named a downtown walking bridge across the Cumberland River in Seigenthaler's name — to recognize his work in seeking equality for all, but also to note an incident in which 50 years ago, as a young reporter, he grasped the clothing of a man attempting to jump from the bridge railing — holding him until police rushed up to assist.

No doubt many words will be spoken of his many roles as editor, publisher, founder, author, TV host, lecturer, educator and more. But I think he'd be happy if we remembered him with just five: Religion. Press. Speech. Assembly. Petition.

And while the customary end for a news story was the proofreader's mark "30", I think the more appropriate one for John (based on the number of words in his beloved First Amendment) is this: "45"

Exporting LNG to boost energy footing, growth

Across the country, natural gas development is giving new life to economic recovery and revitalizing entire regions, and West Virginia is no exception.

Our state is fortunate enough to be a part of the two of the richest resource basins in the world, and with an ample supply of natural gas reserves, the current international demand for U.S. natural gas presents an opportunity for West Virginia to obtain increased natural gas investment and stimulate our economy.

The ongoing surge in shale gas production in the United States has turned our nation's long-term energy outlook on its head.

It was only about five years ago when most of the experts were expecting the United States to become one of the largest importers of liquefied natural gas (LNG), the form in which natural gas is shipped overseas.

Now, many of those very same plants that were built to receive LNG are being retrofitted for export and new facilities are on the drawing board.

For energy rich West Virginia, building out of a more expansive natural gas infrastructure would only be a good thing. Energy consultants at IHS estimate that nearly \$3 trillion in capital expenditures will take place between 2012 and 2035 in shale natural gas activity — the vast majority of it private capital.

That is private investment that will flow directly into states involved with natural gas extraction, production and shipment.

For example, Dominion Resources Inc. is considering a \$2 billion investment in a

450-mile-long natural gas transmission pipeline from West Virginia through Virginia to southern North Carolina.

It would go into service by the end of 2018 and carry production from the Marcellus and Utica shale gas

fields to market. The construction of this pipeline will mean valuable job creation and state and local tax revenues that we cannot afford to pass up.

The Mountain State has a long history of supplying energy resources to U.S. markets, including natural gas.

As one of the top 10 producers of natural gas in the U.S., producing about 539.9 trillion cubic feet of gas in 2013, taking advantage of an opportunity to expand our markets and in turn bolster this booming industry should be our No. 1 focus.

Understandably, there is a growing chorus of support in Congress to modernize our antiquated regulatory system for LNG exports to reflect the serious shift in our energy landscape.

Later this month, the House will vote on H.R. 6, a bipartisan-supported bill that would require the U.S. Department of Energy to approve of liquefied natural gas LNG export applications within 90 days.

Congressional representatives from across the country have been lending their support to this LNG export issue. With only seven applications approved to date and 24 still in the queue, it is imperative that our delegation in Congress stand firmly behind this bill.

The United States is just now in the early stages of a historic transformation to natural gas abundance and long-term energy security. This abundance is fueling an energy and manufacturing surge at home, while providing more than enough surplus for LNG exports.

We need Congress and the White House to move expeditiously to streamline and modernize the regulatory process so we can get on with the work of building out this export capability.

Nation cannot afford our corporate tax rate

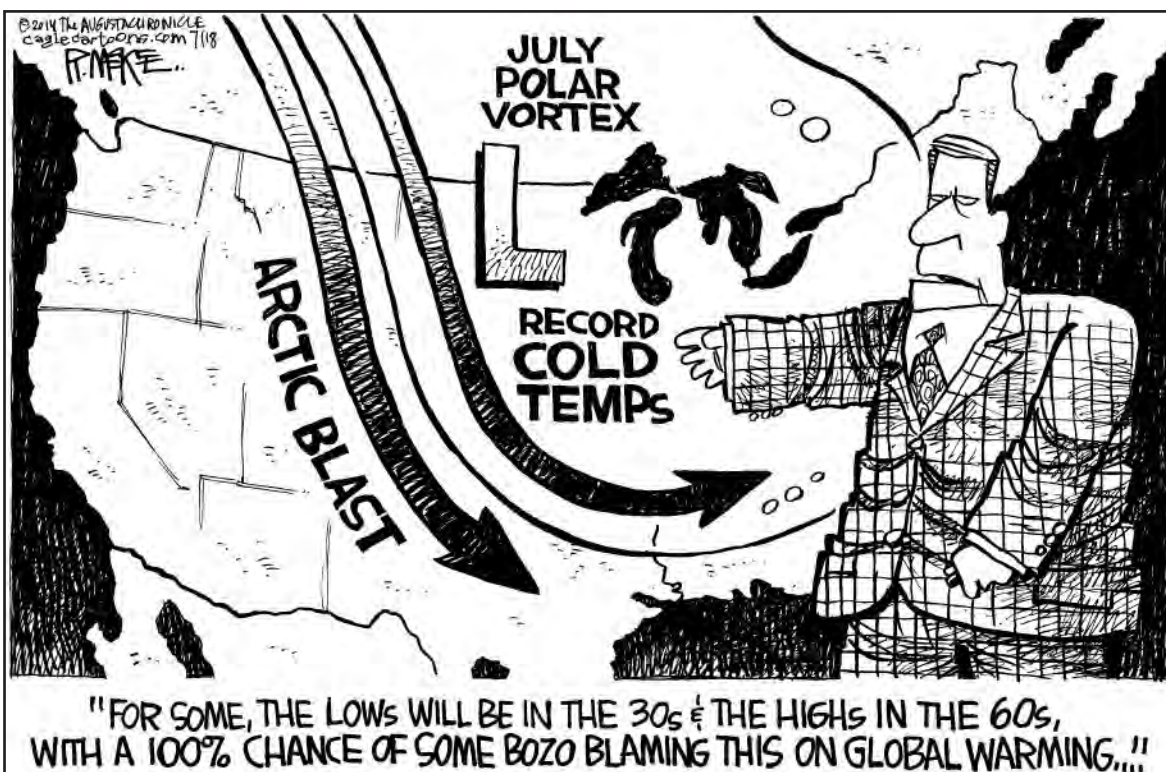
Recently, Heather Bresch, the chief executive of Mylan Pharmaceuticals Inc., announced plans to renounce her company's United States citizenship and instead become a company incorporated in the Netherlands, where the tax rates are lower.

Mylan will continue to pay taxes in the United States on its domestic profits, but not on its business operations abroad.

The deal is just the latest example of a so-called inversion. Almost 20 large U.S. companies have announced plans to give up their United States citizenship in the past two years.

Many companies are moving to Ireland, which maintains a corporate tax rate of 12.5 percent. This compares to the United States' rate of 35 percent, one of the highest rates in the world.

would certainly have disappointed. Ahmed stood waiting for me. There was a tension we did not understand. But we were driven by something good that we also did not understand.

We both knew that this second meeting would affirm the first one but probably would be the last. It was truly friendly. We taught each other words from the other's languages, simple words such as "goat," "bicycle" and "rain." We compared notes on siblings.

Before leaving, we spontaneously reached for the same large orange hanging from the tree above us. We peeled it and shared the slices. How sticky and sweet it tasted. We buried the peels and the seeds in the ground under the tree. We promised each other that one day, when peace between our people came, we'd return to see if a tree had taken root and grown there.

I live in California now. In the television footage of the rage coming to us again from that valley, I look for Ahmed's face. We are both middle-aged men now. Several years ago, I visited and found that few trees were left in that valley. Palestinian terrorists have several times set fire to the orchards. Israeli tanks have often rolled into Kalkilya. Unforgivable bombings have killed children in both villages.

I wonder where Ahmed is and what we would say to each other if we were to meet again. Might it be possible for us to reach reconciliation now? Would he remember that we once knew more about peace than the grown-ups on either side of our valley?

Nationwide, the National Guard Youth ChalleNGe program transforms the lives of at-risk youth through training and mentoring, empowering cadets with the confidence they need to succeed and the skills to make positive contributions in their communities. Since the program's inception, in 1998, the successes of its graduating cadets are incredibly impressive.

In 2012, 59 percent of ChalleNGe graduates from across the country received their high school diploma or GED, 45 percent joined the workforce, 41 percent continued their education and 7 percent joined the military.

Since 1998, cadets have donated nearly 8 million hours of community service during the program's 16-year duration; state programs have awarded graduates nearly 69,500 academic credentials, and more than 121,000 teens have graduated.

In West Virginia, the Mountaineer ChalleNGe Academy, supported by the West Virginia National Guard, is transforming the lives of our at-risk youth and helping them to become well-educated, confident and disciplined

young men and women.

Located at Camp Dawson, in Kingwood, the Academy leads, trains and mentors our young people as part of a 22-week voluntary residential program and gives them the tools and confidence they need to be successful.

The Mountaineer ChalleNGe Academy program helps cadets develop core life skills including academic excellence, life coping skills, job skills, health and hygiene, responsible citizenship, community service, leadership and physical fitness. Cadets also have access to educational resources to help them get back on track and explore career assessment and interest inventories, participate in job-specific skill orientations and receive training at local vocational centers.

During their time at the Academy, cadets are also paired with a mentor from their community to build an accountability group that will support future plans. Cadets and their mentors share time together off-site — completing community service activities and exploring career and educational opportunities.

These relationships play a critical role in supporting the cadets following graduation and helping them to apply the skills they learned in a real world setting.

Cadets also learn the value and importance of community-needs awareness and giving back, through group and individual service activities including career exploration. This year, the cadets

Through hard work, dedication and perseverance, the cadets of the 42nd graduating class at the Mountaineer ChalleNGe Academy conquered their own personal challenges, worked hard to receive a good education and entered their communities prepared to lead productive and fulfilling lives.

Ninety-six of the cadets passed the high-school equivalency assessment TASC Test, 86 earned a high school diploma and 74 qualified for the Promise scholarship to continue their education.

This year, the state's first lady,

Joanne Jaeger Tomblin, had the privilege to congratulate this year's graduating class of cadets on all of their achievements.

Bigger risk hasn't meant bigger rewards for bond investors this year. Consider junk bonds — those issued by companies at the highest risk of default. They have to offer higher yields than investment-grade bonds to attract investors, but they've nevertheless generated lower returns this year.

To top it off, the Federal Reserve called out junk bonds last week in its monetary policy report to Congress. The central bank said that it sees "signs of excess" after seeing investors pour billions of dollars into junk bonds in search of higher yields.

TIME TO WORRY?

Investors have had a long list of worries in the last few years, but inflation hasn't been on it. For 18 straight months, inflation didn't rise above 2 percent, as measured by the Consumer Price Index. That is, until last month, when it reached 2.1 percent. Now, more than half the investment managers surveyed by Northern Trust expect inflation to rise over the next six months. The 51 percent rate is up from just 33 percent a quarter ago, and it's the highest level since 2011.



THIS AND THAT

Our 401(k) balances have never been higher and the surging stock market is a big reason for it. But it's important to remember that's not the only one. The average 401(k) account held \$91,000 last quarter, up from \$80,600 a year earlier, according to Fidelity. The nearly 25 percent return for the Standard & Poor's 500 index drove much of the gains.

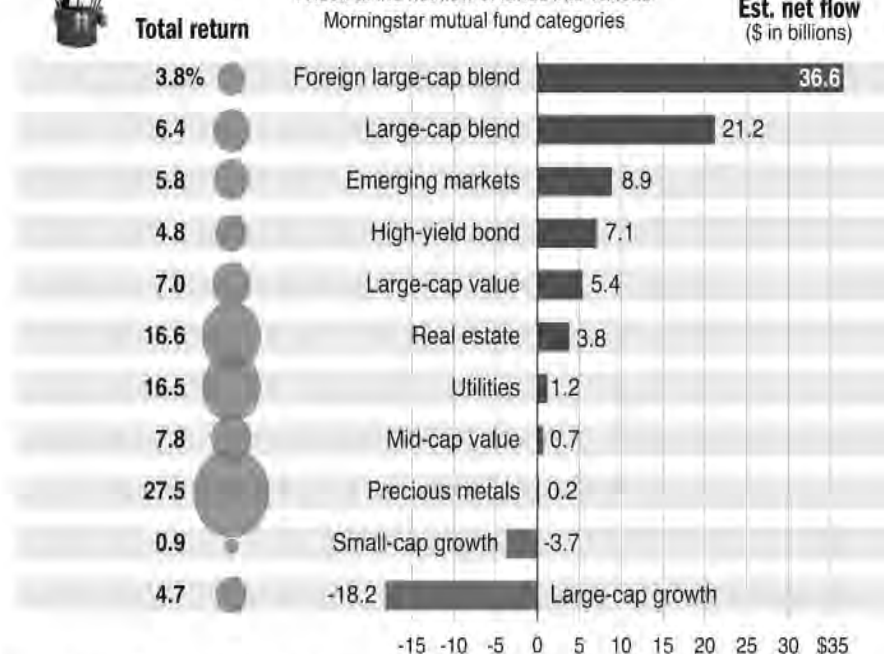
Mid-year fund flows

Honeywell hits all-time high

Shares of Honeywell International hit an all-time high of \$97.28 after the company reported that its profit climbed 7.6 percent in the second quarter.

The industrial conglomerate said profit increased to \$1.1 billion, or \$1.38 per share, from \$1.02 billion, or \$1.28 per share, in the same quarter a year earlier. That was ahead of analysts' expectations of \$1.36, according to Zacks Investment Research.

The company said revenue climbed 5.8 percent to \$10.25 billion from \$9.69 billion in the same quarter a year ago, and beat Wall Street forecasts. Analysts expected \$10.17 billion.

Who he is: President of Discover Student Loans

What he says: The most reliable borrowers have succeeded in the classroom

Student debt, which has soared in recent years and now tops \$1 trillion in the U.S., is also a new and growing profit driver for Discover Financial Services.

What's the appeal of the student lending business? It's an attractive demographic for Discover, a business not a lot of people are in.

Student debt levels are soaring. Should students even be taking out private loans? The first situation, if you're borrowing, say you're a freshman and you're borrowing unsubsidized Stafford loans, your max is going to be \$5,500.

As a result of its strong performance, the company raised the low end of its full-year earnings guidance. Honeywell now expects earnings between \$5.45 per share and \$5.55 per share for the year.

In the last several years, specifically the last two or three, the student lending industry on the private side has introduced fixed-rate products. Last year all of our graduate products had prices that were better than the federal Parent PLUS and Grad PLUS loans, and no origination fees.

I'm not saying that private is right for everyone, but people that have reasonably good credit, they really should put the options side by side. Not just the private competitors, but the federal program, and really look at all the benefits.

What do you encourage borrowers to do? If you can afford to make a payment while in school, do so.

Should parents make kids take on debt, even if they don't have to? There's definitely an argument. You start establishing a credit history. I can see that view. It depends on your personal situation.

What's your advice on refinancing private loans? We launched a pilot program in April in refinancing consolidation.

Program ACTIVE trains 8 new partners

Program ACTIVE (Appalachians Coming Together to Increase Vital Exercise), a research study being conducted by Guy Hornsby, associate professor of exercise physiology at WVU, welcomes eight new community partners.

Program ACTIVE is a National Institutes of Health funded research study looking at the best way to treat depression in people with type 2 diabetes. Using a community based research approach, the study recently trained eight area fitness and talk therapy providers in north central West Virginia to offer the study treatment protocol.

Four fitness providers trained were Madeline Hyllberg, from Harrison County YMCA in Clarksburg; Daniel Thomas, from Pro-Performance Rx at Suncrest Towne Centre; and Stephanie Nale and Brittney Rinker, from

Fairmont General Health-Plus Fitness Center.

Four cognitive behavioral therapist providers were trained in the talk therapy treatment arm of the study. They are Erika Larson and Joann Davis-Frey, from Natural Resilience LLC at Suncrest Towne Centre; Tammy Morgan Hamner, from Hamner Psychological Services in Bridgeport; and Terry Chapman, from Terry L. Chapman LLC of Fairmont.

Program ACTIVE continues partnerships with Tygart Valley Rehabilitation and Fitness Center in Grafton, Rob's Fitness Factory and the WVU Human Performance Lab in Morgantown, and United Summit Center in Fairmont and Grafton.

Program ACTIVE continues to recruit participants into their research study. To qualify, a person must have had type 2 diabetes for at least one year,

have been depressed for two weeks or more and be medically stable.

Anyone interested in seeing if they qualify may call 1-855-DMACTIV (1-855-362-2848) or 304-293-7322 to answer several screening questions. If initial qualifying criteria are met, applicants will visit one of the community fitness facilities partnering with the study to do further assessments. At the fitness facility participants do a six minute walk test and have blood drawn to measure A1c, fasting blood glucose and lipids.

At home, participants are asked to answer questionnaires and complete a phone interview about their mood and feelings. The data collected is reviewed by the research team to determine if a person meets criteria to enroll in the study.

The hospitals selected are recognized as true leaders in meaningful use of technology — as information systems improve, so do patient outcomes.

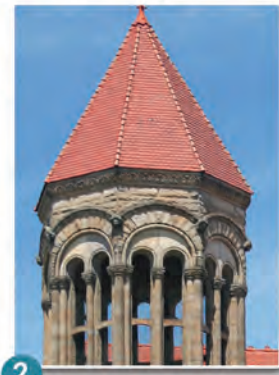

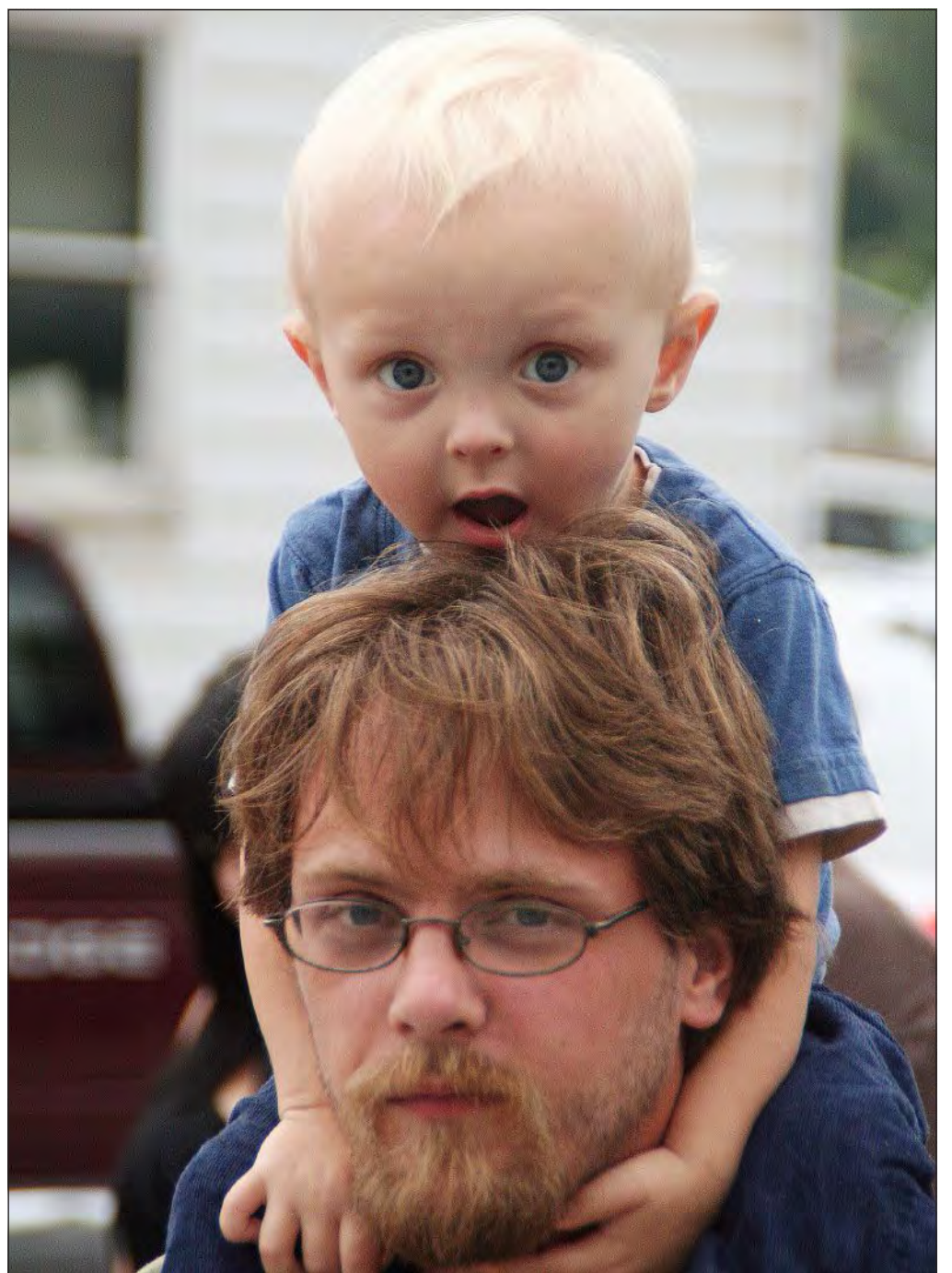

Sweet dog suites

Adding pet amenities a rising trend

LOS ANGELES — These homes are set apart by their amenities — for dogs.

Standard Pacific Homes is building and selling homes in 190 developments from Florida to California and is believed to be the first to offer a pet suite as an option in every one.

The most lavish suite is a 170-square-foot pet paradise with a step-in wash station, handheld sprayer and leash lead; tile walls and floors; a designated drying area with a commercial sized pet dryer; a water station; automated feeders; a large bunk-style bed; cabinets for toys, treats and food; a stackable washer and dryer; a French door that opens to a puppy run; and a flat-screen television set.

Standard Pacific, based in Irvine, decided to offer pet suites after conducting livability studies with homeowners. Pets were a constant theme, said Jeffrey Lake, vice president

and national director of architecture for Standard Pacific.

"Devotion to pets is second-to-none," he added. "They are family."

The American Pet Products Association reports that 68 percent of Americans own pets and contribute to an industry worth more than \$55 billion annually.

Real estate officials say building homes designed to cater to pets is a new concept, but that remodels for pet owners have been available for some time.

Adam Cowherd Construction in Ozark, Missouri, installs pet-friendly additions to homes. Cowherd said he recently finished a job where there was an open shelf on the end of a kitchen island to hold pet bowls.

"Owners want it uniquely functional, very contemporary and something that catches the eye," Cowherd said.

However, only once in the last 10 years has he been asked to build a whole room for a pet, he added.

Melanie Dean lives with her family near Dallas in a Standard Pacific home with a pet package for their dog, Lola.

Lola's room "makes life much easier," Dean said. "We don't have to use the kitchen sink to wash yucky stuff anymore."

Standard Pacific Homes' newest community, called Avignon at Blackstone in Brea, about 25 miles south of Los Angeles, features homes that start at \$1.3 million. The pet spa option adds \$35,000 to the price, Lake said.

Nordstrom ads feature models with disabilities

NEW YORK — It's not easy to find models with disabilities in ads for the fashion and beauty industry — unless you look in the Nordstrom catalog.

The company has been using models with disabilities since 1997 and continues the tradition in its annual July catalog, which kicks off the upscale retailer's largest event of the year with preview discounts of new fashions for fall.

This summer's Nordstrom Inc. catalog includes among others a woman in

a wheelchair modeling boots and a man with a prosthetic leg modeling Nike running shoes.

Hiring professional models with disabilities has become so much a part of the Seattle-based company's DNA that its regular customers may not even realize how unusual it is.

"Identifying companies that utilize models or actresses with disabilities has been like finding a needle in a haystack," said Meg O'Connell, a partner at the consulting firm Global Disability Inclusion.

Nordstrom, she added,

"is a leader in this space and has been a long-standing supporter of disability inclusion not only in their advertising but also in employment and accessibility in their stores."

The clothing that Nordstrom models wear is not adapted in any way. The model wearing Nikes has one on his foot and the other on his prosthetic device. The model in the wheelchair has short spiky hair as part of the punk look of her outfit, which includes a dark leather jacket along with the featured sale item, short boots with a buckled strap.

Preventatives would slash the incidence of heartworm

PETS CAN RUN, but they can't hide from heartworm disease, which occurs in all 50 states. Without heartworm protection, even indoor cats hiding under the bed or dogs in states where heartworm isn't especially common (like California or Nebraska) aren't safe from this potentially fatal disease.

Heartworm's increasing prevalence is complicated to trace. The fact that 1) heartworm is spread by several mosquito species and 2) mosquitoes seem to be increasing in numbers tells only a part of the story. Dr. Stephen Jones, Moncks Corner, S.C.-based president of the American Heartworm Society, explains that coyotes are carriers for heartworm, and their numbers are climbing in many areas.

Dogs stricken with heartworm can also serve as carriers. Animal shelters and rescue organizations increasingly re-locate dogs to facilities several states away, where adoption possibilities are greater. Alas, "these dogs aren't always tested first for heartworm. Even if they are tested, sometimes

it takes several tests to rule out heartworm, and there are cost limitations (to consider)," explained Dr. Robert Stannard, a board member of the American Heartworm Society. "So, heartworm is spread."

To be clear, heartworm is in not contagious from animal to animal. Mosquitoes bite an infected wild canine species (such as coyotes), infected dogs or infected raccoons and then pass the "baby larvae" to other animals, including unprotected dogs, cats or ferrets not on a heartworm preventative.

"In dogs, heartworms can be up to about a foot-long and live in the pulmonary arteries and heart for over five years," Jones noted.

While heartworm disease in dogs can be treated, such care is expensive. "Certainly, treatment is no fun," Jones said. Recent

work by Jones reveals that even if the heartworm treatment appears successful, the disease can leave permanent damage in dogs.

"Because the damage is inside the dog, we don't see it. Some dogs (are) never the same again," Stannard said.

A part of the problem is that if pet owners and even veterinarians aren't seeing mosquitoes where they live, and there aren't many reports of heartworm, dog and cat owners become careless. The problem "may be human nature, but pets pay the price," Jones said.

Stannard said he's been guilty himself, as his practice is in Livermore, Calif., an arid area where mosquitoes aren't a big issue. Ten years ago, he began testing cats for heartworm disease. Much to his surprise, that first year 16 cats tested positive, and a total of 39 cats since 2004. The majority that tested positive were indoor cats.

"There's no treatment for heartworm disease in cats," Stannard noted.

It was only recently discovered that heartworm disease occurs about as often

in cats as in dogs. The good news is, cats are sometimes able to fight off the disease with no apparent symptoms. Some cats do suffer from heartworm-associated respiratory disease (which mimics asthma), which can be treated, but respiratory disease in cats can impact their quality of life. In still other cats, the only symptom is sudden death.

"Whether we're talking dogs or cats, there is a solution: Prevention," Jones said.

The American Heartworm Society estimates that 100,000 dogs are infected with heartworm annually. The number of cats infected is unknown. While no one knows how many dogs and cats die of heartworm, Stannard says that if 90 percent of dogs and cats were on a preventative, heartworm deaths would be rare. It's that simple.

How prepared are you for storms?

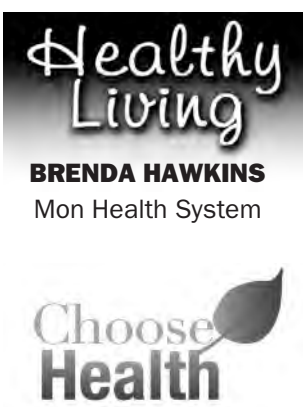
THE TORNADO THAT recently hit near Morgantown and knowing the winters we can have in West Virginia left me asking, 'Am I prepared for a major storm?' If you're asking yourself the same question, there are some things we can do to help keep ourselves and family safe when the weather takes an unexpected turn.

First, create a basic emergency kit for your home. Some basic items to include are: Nonperishable food and water (one gallon per person) for up to three days, a can opener, moist towelettes, battery-powered or hand-crank radio, batteries, duct tape, flashlights, blankets or sleeping bag, cell phone, whistle and first-aid kit. If you have pets, make sure you have enough food, water and supplies for them. Most importantly, if you take medication on a regular basis, make sure you have a supply on hand. At least every six months go through your emergency kit and replace any items that may have expired.

Some items that you may want to keep in your car include: Blankets, flashlight and batteries (or a hand crank flashlight), food containing protein (nuts and energy bars) and water, a shovel, cat litter for traction in the winter and extra warm clothes, hats, gloves and more. Include food and water for pets also.

In addition to the basic necessities mentioned above keep copies of important documents in your basic emergency kit. Such documents include: Driver's license or identification card, Social Security card, a will, insurance policies, birth and marriage certificates, banking information and more.

The next step is to

make a family emergency plan. This will ensure that your family knows what to do in case of an emergency. Things to include in the plan are: How you will contact one another, where to meet if you're not together and what you will do in different situations. Update contact information as things change and notify others, babysitters or caregivers, about your plan. It would be a good idea to practice your plan periodically so everyone is clear and remembers what to do.

It's important to stay informed about possible weather or disaster situations. Even more importantly, follow the instructions of local emergency officials. If you need to evacuate the area for your safety, do so. Remember to take any medications and simple necessities.

It is also a good idea to check on and help your friends and neighbors who may need some help to be safe or evacuate.

For more information and a complete list of items for your emergency supply kit, check out ready.gov.

Being informed, prepared and ready for action can make the difference in any emergency situation.

I know I don't fully understand God's plan for me and can't always see the big picture, but why would He want me to go through life alone? -- An Old Maid (please do not use my name or initials)

A: I'm deeply saddened but not surprised by your painful but spiritually insightful agony. You're absolutely right that organized religion and its institutions are primarily constructed to care for the spiritual needs of married couples and their children. Single people are often overlooked.

The historical reason for this spiritual lacuna is obvious. Religions were formed long before adolescence became a large social force. By adolescence, I don't mean the teenage years, although quite often a person's drift away from organized religion begins then. I mean the period of time between puberty and marriage.

Until the modern era, that period of time in a

person's life was brief or non-existent. People began learning a trade and working, and were often married off in their early teenage years. Most died before reaching what we now call middle age. The major faiths developed rituals and institutions to meet the needs of the only people they knew—adults and children.

Look at all the holiday celebrations and you'll see they have rich and varied roles for married adults and children but little or nothing for single adults.

Easter and Passover come to mind. Family dinners and children's activities festoon these holidays and give both parents and children much to do and much to anticipate. Alas, Easter egg hunts and searching for the hidden matzah are not big draws for people who don't have families of their own and don't want to elbow out the kids on their way to finding the chocolate eggs.

With the advent of extended training for adult work and romantic love as the reason for marriage, it's not unusual today for people to still be completing their education well into their 30s. These days, the period between puberty and marriage can last

two decades or more.

Of course, churches, synagogues and other religious institutions have tried to create new ways to cover the adolescence gap. Singles services and social events help, but they can seem artificial and contrived to many people seeking to connect to each other and to God. Religious-based on line dating sites work for some.

The Jewish community has had success sending Jewish adolescents on group trips to Israel through the Birthright program. I would also mention for praise the Mormon year of service, which provides both spiritual connection and service uniquely suited to those who are not children and not married.

As to your frustration at not finding a soul mate, let me urge you to have patience and devote your free time to social service. The best way to find a mate with good values and spiritual roots is to go to places where people like that are doing good things. They find each other by finding God in the eyes of a hungry child or a homeless veteran. You are surely one of them.

High heels can lead to serious problems down the road

Q: I have had it with my chiropractor badgering me about high heels. I like to wear them. Do you agree that they are causing my back pain?

out of line. Wearing high heels for any length of time also accentuates the normal forward curve of the back and makes the pelvis tip forward. This alters the normal configuration of the pelvis and spine necessary for the body to maintain a center of gravity.

If the habit of wearing high heels exists for many years, the body becomes shaped to accommodate these unnatural postural changes, and permanent and damaging biomechanical changes occur and become early onset of degenerative changes (arthritis). This leads to chronically painful joints of the legs

and spine, and it is very difficult or impossible to reverse if left too long.

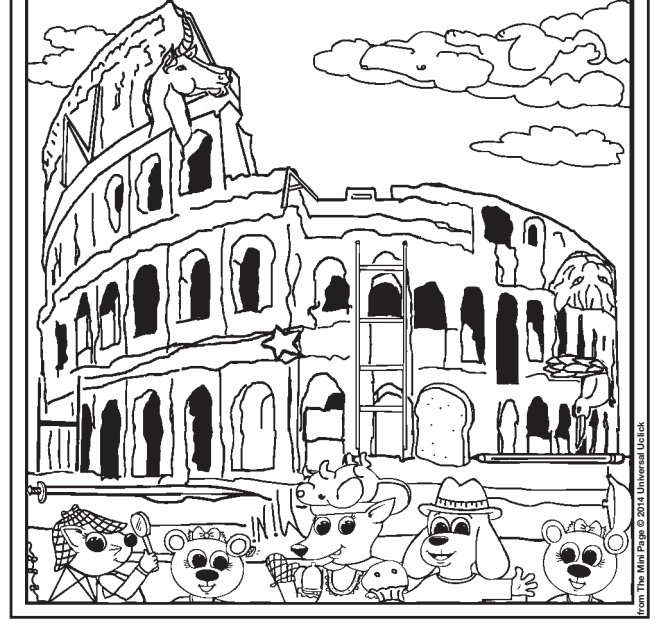

- Cook 20 minutes on medium heat, turning after 10 minutes. Do not press on the burgers with a spatula — it will dry them out.
- Burgers will be white inside when done.
- Serve with lettuce, tomatoes, ketchup, mustard and any other condiments of your choice on whole-wheat buns. Makes 4 to 6 burgers.

You will need an adult's help with this recipe.

Building Beauty

Styles of Architecture

As you walk through a city, you might notice that every block has a different feel. The types of buildings can make each part of a city feel like a separate world. Different building designs, or **architecture** (AR-ki-tek-chur), create a different mood.

The Mini Page talked with an architectural historian from the Savannah College of Art and Design to learn more about some of the main architectural styles.

Classical

Thousands of years ago, ancient Greeks designed buildings so beautiful that people are still modeling buildings after them today. Ancient Romans based their own architecture on ideas they learned from the Greeks.

The architecture style of ancient Greece and Rome is known as **classical**. Greek and Roman architecture had clean, simple lines.

The design elements, or features, in their buildings have become a kind of architectural alphabet. Architects through time have built their own designs using this classical alphabet.

Some of the most admired elements are the massive stone columns that help support Greek buildings.



The Parthenon (PAR-tuh-non) is a temple built in Athens, Greece, to honor the goddess Athena. This example of classic architecture was built around 2,500 years ago.

Column sculpture

Each column is a piece of sculpture. Grooves often run up and down the columns. The grooves thicken or thin in special patterns. Decorating with grooves is called **fluting**.

The columns themselves were spaced in a strict pattern. The Greeks had rules for the column design and spacing. For example, the space between each column was slightly wider than the column itself.

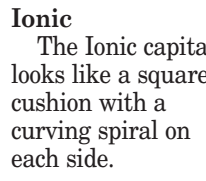
Three patterns

The Greeks created three different styles of columns: the **Doric** (DOR-ic), **Ionic** (eye-AHN-ik) and **Corinthian** (kuh-RIN-thee-uhn). Each style was decorated differently at the top, or **capital**, of the column. "Capital" comes from the Latin word for "head."

Column styles



Doric
The Doric is the simplest capital style. It looks like a square cushion sitting on top of a round cushion.



Ionic
The Ionic capital looks like a square cushion with a curving spiral on each side.



Corinthian
Corinthian is the fanciest style. Its capital has sides that flare out. Sculptured leaves decorate it.

Meet Brady Rymer

Growing From the Classical

Ancient Rome

Ancient Romans added arches and domes to buildings. They played with shapes, creating circular and oval buildings as well as rectangles.

Romans were more interested in what buildings looked like from the inside than from the outside. Ceilings were high and vaulted, or formed with arches.

They decorated floors and walls with mosaics (mo-ZAY-iks). Mosaics are pictures and designs made of small pieces of colored stone, tiles or glass.



Oval buildings such as the Roman Colosseum (kal-uh-SEE-uhm) allowed people to see and hear no matter where their seats were. Many modern sports stadiums use the same design.

Eastern styles

The Byzantine (BIZ-uhn-teen) Empire covered much of what is now Eastern Europe and Turkey for about 1,000 years, until 1450 A.D. For a long time, it was part of the Roman Empire. Its architectural style was influenced by the Romans.

Byzantine architecture is known for its huge circular domes. Buildings were decorated with mosaics.

Arab and Islamic buildings were influenced by Byzantine style. They are known for their **minarets** (min-uh-RETS), or tall, thin towers reaching into the sky.

Into the Middle Ages

In the late 300s and 400s, northern tribes called Goths invaded the Roman Empire. These raiders destroyed much of the art, buildings and literature in their path. The centuries after the invasions were known as the **Dark Ages**. Little art or architecture was created then.

After several hundred years, around 1000, people began to rebuild. Longing for a return to the past glories of the Roman Empire, they brought back classic styles. This return to classical is called **Romanesque**.



Romanesque looked like super-powered classical Roman architecture. Buildings such as Vézelay Abbey in France had higher ceilings with taller vaulted arches. Arches were more complicated.

Maria Sharapova

It's shaping up to be an eventful 2014 for tennis player Maria Sharapova. In February, she participated as a torchbearer in the opening ceremonies of the Winter Olympics held in Sochi, Russia. It was a homecoming for Maria, since she and her family had lived in Sochi when she was a child, before moving to the United States.

Another thrill came on the tennis court in June, when she captured the women's singles title of the 2014 French Open, one of the sport's four Grand Slam events, along with the Australian Open, Wimbledon and the U.S. Open. In her career, Maria has won each Grand Slam tournament at least once, along with an Olympic silver medal in London in 2012.

It was Maria's third straight appearance in the finals of the French Open, and her second title there in three years. It's a remarkable accomplishment for this former No. 1 player in the world, who has enjoyed success on and off the court for the past decade.

Designing With Light

Gothic

Decorative Romanesque styles grew even more focused on splendor, growing into what is now known as Gothic architecture. It is known for its height, light and color.

Around the 1100s, architects discovered they could make even taller arches by making them pointed at the top. Ceilings were built higher than ever.

Using pointed arches allowed architects to reduce the amount of wall space and fill it with glass, especially colorful stained glass. Some churches were basically made with walls of glass. Stained glass often pictured religious stories.

Support from the outside

In order to help support the mostly glass walls of Gothic cathedrals, architects built arches on the outside of the buildings. These supporting arches are known as **flying buttresses** (BUH-tris-ehz).



Flying buttresses add support to the walls of the Washington (D.C.) National Cathedral.



Rose windows

A special kind of stained glass window, the **rose window**, was shaped like a rose, a symbol of the Virgin Mary. Rose windows are often a centerpiece of Gothic cathedrals.



This rose window is in Sainte Chapelle in Paris.

Gargoyles

Today, when we think of Gothic cathedrals, we often think of the weird, spooky sculptures, or **gargoyles** (GAR-goils), that loom over buildings. Gargoyles acted as rain spouts, carrying water away from the building.

Gothic architecture did not get its name until after the 1300s. As an insult, a group of Italian artists labeled this architecture after the invading Goths of centuries before. The Gothic revival in the 1800s was sometimes a rebellion against the rules of society. Today "gothic" often means something creepy.

The two of them live with me in my house, and marriage has been discussed in depth. The problem lies in her boundaries. Although her ex has had drug issues and has

made some very bad choices and she tells me he's not marriage material, she attempts to remain friendly with him for the benefit of their daughter. He occasionally joins her on play dates to the park, things like that.

Here's the problem: Several months ago I discovered that he was tex-

ting her details about his day. Her responses were cordial, but also included the words, "hon" or "honey." I asked her about it, and at first she tried to explain it away, but after I pointed out various things, she acknowledged that she was in the wrong and knew that it hurt me, but she would be unable to say it wouldn't happen again. She claims to want to marry me and says

she'll always put me first in her life. What's good ex-etiquette?

A: It appears your girlfriend chooses to use, these terms of endearment and she has made it very clear that she intends to continue — so the ball is actually in your court.

You have to decide if her behavior is a deal breaker. I refer you to Good Ex-Etiquette for Dating rule No. 4, "Establish clear boundaries. (Know

your deal breakers.)" In other words, it's not her boundaries that are in question, it's yours.

Do I think her behavior is inappropriate? Personally, I do — and it could be regarded as her playing games, which breaks another ex-etiquette rule, No. 8, "Be honest and straightforward."

Technically, she's not being dishonest with you, but it certainly sounds as if she's being dishonest

with her ex. Calling her child's father "honey" or "hon" implies familiarity and may give the father false hope of a reconciliation — and if the child overhears it, may also give her false hope. Good ex-etiquette dictates, "cordial, not cuddly."

Your girlfriend may have a motive in all this. It's not uncommon for people in her position to think that if they make the father or mother of their child feel special that it will prevent any problems when exchanging the child or requesting extra time. But it still remains that after you discredited her excuses as to why she was doing it, she finally owned up, said it was wrong, but couldn't guarantee she wouldn't do it again. That's concerning and indicates it's a choice, and that she's fully aware of what's she's doing.

I suggest she take a good look at her motives, and out of respect for you, her ex, and her child, stop the terms of endearment because they are misleading — unless that's the feeling she wants to convey. If that's the case, then both of you must examine why.

Sounds like she's making a conscious choice: Intellectually she knows he's no good, but she can't quite get him out of her system. Those feelings could severely affect your marriage if you do actually marry. Both of you have some soul searching to do before the "I do's."

Unraveling the lexicon of Realtors

EVERY INDUSTRY has their own terminology or lingo. Often the people in that industry speak it as if it is second nature. We sometimes fail to realize that our customer or client may not understand what we are talking about. I personally thought about this as I read a blog this week from "The Front Porch." I wanted to educate readers about some of the verbiage Realtors use every day.

- **Addendum** — These are the additional documents that go into a real estate contract.
- **Appraisal** — This is how a loan officer determines if the property is worth as much (or as little) as the buyer is willing to pay for it.
- **Closing** — This is the date that the buyer's purchase will be recorded at the County Courthouse and become their property.
- **Closing costs** — All of the expenses paid by the buyer and the seller when the real estate deal closes. These can include the brokerage commission, mortgage-related fees, escrow or attorney's settlement charges, transfer taxes, recording fees, title insurance and so on.
- **Commission** — This is the amount the real estate agent makes from the sale. It is usually a percentage.
- **Contingency** — This is a condition that has to be fulfilled in order for another event to happen. Example: The purchase of the home is contingent upon the buyer obtaining a loan or getting a home inspection.
- **Earnest money** — This is deposit put down by the buyer to legitimize the contract that will be held in a trust account by the seller's real estate brokerage until closing. Then it will be disbursed to the seller and credited toward the buyer's purchase price.
- **Escrow** — This is the financial instrument held by a third party on behalf of the other two parties in a transaction. The funds are held by the escrow service until it receives the appropriate written or oral instructions or until obligations have been fulfilled. Example: If the home being sold is vacant and it has a septic system that cannot be tested, a third party will hold a specific amount of money in escrow until it is ensured the septic system works properly.
- **Foreclosure** — The process of taking possession of a mortgaged property as a result of someone's failure to keep up mortgage payments.
- **MLS** — this stands for Multiple Listing Service and serves as the central information source for brokers to share their real estate listings with cooperating brokers.
- **Wipe-out contingency** — This refers to a contingency where the buyer must sell their current residence prior to closing on the home they have made an offer upon.
- **Zero down** — This means there is no out-of-pocket expense for the borrower (buyer).

Patios extend living space

Accessories such as cushions, fire places add to outdoor area

Decks and patios are no longer just a place with a few chairs and a middle table to relax outside with — rather, they're becoming an outdoor living luxury area with a multitude of accessories to be added to the concrete or wood based spaces for many West Virginia homes.

The variety of patio options, according to Jason Rissle, owner of Riffle Contracting, LLC, in Morgantown, is tremendous — but a few types have really been the big sellers of late, and are much different than some past varieties.

"I'm going to have to lean more towards stamp-textured concrete and stenciled concrete — we do a huge variety of that," Rissle said. "The paver patios used to be in, but now, the stamping techniques have come along and has pretty much wiped the pavers out."

As for the types of decks currently in style, Rissle said, the variety is wide with the price range being varied, as well.

"Anything from your basic treated wood structured deck to your higher-end composite and vinyl decking with all the accessories that go along with that — including electrical lighting, plumbing and outdoor kitchens," he said.

Accessories — the variety is something that has become much larger recently, with the numerous additions of sophisticated accessories to put on patios or decks. Janet Merschat, owner of Rustic by Design Fireplace & Patio, explained — even kitchens are becoming commonly added to outdoor areas.

"The fun part is all the accessories — that is probably the most fun part of patios," Merschat said. "Everyone is moving outside, trying to stay outside as long as they can. Another cool thing is wood fire ovens — anything you make in your oven, you can make in those and it's all wood-fired."

Merschat said pillows are an easy, but effective accessory to the overall look of an outdoor area, especially if the fabric of a couch isn't too exciting. However, the fabric used has to be Sunbrella fabric in order to withstand the various outside conditions.

"Pillows are beautiful, they add a lot of pop and color to blah

looking fabric," she said. "Sunbrella is a key — that fabric is fade resistant, mildew resistant, and stain resistant. Clean it with water and dawn or bleach and water — It's a very easy cleanup, but Sunbrella fabric is a must."

As for the types of couches to be purchased to add colorful pillows to, Merschat said, without hesitation, grouping furniture sets are the way to go — they offer much more than just a couple seats to relax in.

"Grouping are big sellers — circular crescent sofas are very popular, especially because people are liking the idea of staying outside more, entertaining more and being able to sit in a group setting," she said. "They're always centralized around a chap-sized table, which is where you can put all of your food and everything out."

Tying into the couch features, which are most suitable for all outdoor conditions, are also the bundle of cushion options — something that adds a lot of comfort and something that requires little to no maintenance.

"The cool thing is, the big heavy cushions will get wet, but it takes it about an hour, two hours, at the most, to dry out," she said. "So, it's still useable, a lot of people are terrified to buy

cushions, but if you just pop your cushions up, the water drains right down."

If space is limited to accessorize with, then a solution could be bistro tables — a simple and low-priced fixture, according to Merschat.

"Bistros are inexpensive and they're just fun. It's just a high top table, two bar stools, but you don't even need the bar stools," she said. "People just like to stand around the little bistro table — it's simple and nice for sitting out for coffee, but it's not really all that expensive and it doesn't take up much room."

In terms of price ranges involving decks, Rissle said on the lower end — treated wood structures are probably going to be the most effective on the efficiency and on the cost side. As for patios — the cheapest is going to be more of the grey, broom-finished concrete, which also involves the lowest maintenance.

"The lowest maintenance is going to be the broom-finished concrete because the stamped concrete product is more of a decorative concrete product and with decorative and higher-end concretes also comes higher maintenance, to a degree," he said.

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Use a PVC pipe to add storage to wet/dry shop vacuum

Q: I have a clogged vacuum hose line on my shop vacuum. Now what? How can I get the clog out? I can't even feel where it is. I don't want to have to cut into it or replace it just yet. What can I do? — T.H.

A: Take the hose off the vacuum cleaner and stretch it out. Now you can use a broom handle, long scrap of pipe or even a plumbing snake and work the clog to the end.

I found out you can use fabric dye on furniture and rugs. It takes a lot of guts to do it the first time, but once you do, you'll love the results. Kirkpatrick/Anna pottery features practical and strange containers

ARTISTS OFTEN express political ideas in their work, and many years later, collectors have trouble understanding the politics. Kirkpatrick/Anna pottery worked from 1839-'96 in Illinois and made pottery jugs and other useful containers.

But they also created some very strange jugs. Pottery pigs marked with railroad routes were made in the 1870s and 1880s to give to politicians, important owners or employees of the railroads. Those pigs sell today for about \$12,000 up to a record price of \$35,000.

But mysterious "Temperance" jugs were decorated with three-dimensional figures that can be confusing to someone from the 21st century. One spectacular salt-glazed jug, 10 1/4 inches high, was made with more than 18 applied designs representing the Civil War, slavery and the drinking of alcohol.

There is a bust of a Union soldier with a goatee being bitten by a snapping turtle. The rear end

of a man in red pants "going in" probably is a reference to the evils of alcohol that "trap" him in the whiskey jug.

One of the many snakes on the jug is eating a thin, bearded man. The head of a man, perhaps Abraham Lincoln, is shown near an eagle. The head of a black man and loose pottery chains represent slavery.

A man smoking a pipe and drinking from a mug, and a classical figure of a woman holding a lyre still are unidentified. The jug is well-marked, with the words "from Kirkpatrick Anna Pottery, Anna Union Co, Ills." It may be the most amazing of all of the Anna Pottery message pieces, and it sold at a Crocker Farm auction in Sparks, Md., for \$69,000 in March.

Q: I have a glass compote with a frosted stem and foot. The stem has three female faces in relief. The clear-glass bowl has a piecrust edge. It has been in my family for a long time. Can you give me any information about it?

A: Three Face is a pressed glass pattern made by George A. Duncan & Sons, which later became Duncan and Miller Glass Co. It was designed

by John Ernest Miller in 1878, and the designer's wife supposedly was the model for the face. Three Face pattern glass was made until 1892. However, it has been reproduced. Original, early pieces sell for high prices, but reproductions sell for about \$100.

Q: I bought a "Vibro-Shaver" at a garage sale and would like some information about it. I have the original box and the instructions, but it doesn't say who made it or the year it was made. It runs and is in excellent condition. It still has the original price tag of \$5. What is it worth today?

A: Vibro was advertised in a 1937 issue of Popular Mechanics magazine as the only non-electric, automatic shaver made. The razor blade is held in the detachable head, which vibrates when the "key" on the front is wound. Shavers are not a popular collectible. Vibro-Shavers with original box sell online for \$15 to \$20 today.

Q: I have a silver-plated demitasse spoon by Crown Silver Plate Co. The engraving in the bowl of the spoon is of an old battleship. The letters on top read "Battleship Maine," and underneath the ship it reads "Captain Sigbee." The ship sunk in Havana Harbor on Feb. 15, 1898. I'd like to know if this spoon has any value.

A: The battleship Maine was sent to Cuba in January 1898 to protect American interests during Cuba's fight for independence from Spain. On Feb. 15, an explosion onboard sank the ship. The cause was never definitely determined. The sinking inspired the slogan "Remember the Maine, to Hell with Spain" and spurred America's entrance into the Spanish-American War. To commemorate the sinking, several silver companies made souvenir spoons picturing the battleship in the bowl and the head of Captain Sigbee on the final at the end of the handle. The name "Crown Silver Plate Co." was used on silver flatware made by J.W. Johnson

of New York City in 1898. Souvenir spoons like yours sell for about \$5.

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Is mold testing necessary?

Joe Ponessa, who spent 25 years as a housing, indoor environment and health specialist at Rutgers Cooperative Extension, responded to a recent column about mold testing. He said much of what he knows about mold remediation comes from associating with some of the top mold people in the country.

Concerning testing, he said the sentiment is generally against it: "If you can see and/or smell mold, it's there."

Testing provides little practical information, although there are some occasions when it is justified: Lawsuit evidence, doctor's request, validation of the effectiveness of a large, expensive cleanup, etc.

The most meaningful testing, air sampling, is expensive.

"Generally, it's better to spend the money on finding and fixing the source of the moisture problem," Ponessa said.

On the other hand, if there is a big problem, "a testing company that is not involved in cleanup may be able to write up detailed specifications for cleanup, to be used as a bidding document when interviewing remediation

contractors." The world of cleanup firms ranges from highly qualified to not very, Ponessa said.

Here's another sort of test that is definitely advisable: Energy audit. Bobby DiFulgentiz, energy expert for Lennox Industries, offers four quick ways to make your house more efficient:

Examine outside-facing walls, windows and doors to identify cracks or holes where air escapes. Seal leaks with caulk or weather-stripping.

When a heating and cooling system's air filter becomes clogged by dirt and other particles, the unit can't produce enough airflow to function properly. Check and clean filters monthly to reduce operating costs and save energy.

Check to see whether your home has at least five inches of insulation where needed. Add more, if necessary.

Evaluate your home's lighting needs and determine any areas in which natural light is sufficient. Also, replace short-lived, incandescent lightbulbs with compact fluorescent bulbs. These bulbs use less energy, last up to 10 times longer, and can save you \$65 each year.

DiFulgentiz says this energy audit can take an hour of your time. The potential savings are worth it.

Rain barrels fill needs for home, garden

Gardens are typically blessed with spring rains that bring summer flowers — and then the hot, dry months of July and August take their toll.

Often, thoughts turn to, "How do I water without running my water bill sky high?"

A rain barrel could be part of the solution.

It's hard to justify rain barrels for major landscapes, but they are quite practical for small vegetable and flower gardens, especially plants grown in containers, according to gardeners.

More importantly, rain barrels benefit the environment.

"Installing a rain barrel is one of the easiest things a homeowner can do to protect water resources," said Julia Hillegrass, team leader with askHRgreen.org, an environmental public awareness program for the 16 counties and cities in Hampton Roads, Va.

"Rain barrels pull double duty by providing a free source of water for outdoor uses while preventing water pollution. When you catch rainwater instead of sending it down the storm drain, it prevents pollutants like fertilizer, pet waste and road-

way grime from dumping into local waterways.

"Plus with your free source of water, you'll be conserving water and the energy used to treat and deliver tap water to your home. It's an all-around great addition to any home."

"Watering plants, washing your car, even giving your dog a bath — all great ways to use the rainwater you collect."

While you can purchase a pricey rain barrel from a retail source, you can make your own for about \$50, proof "going green"

ther — decorating their rain barrels in fanciful or practical ways.

"One of our members painted her rain barrel to blend into the brickwork and siding of her home — pretty clever," Wool said.

If you want to paint your rain barrel, first prime it and use acrylic paint. Once your design is done and painting is finished, clear coat it to preserve its beauty.

Some barrel-decorating tips from Newport News, Va., master gardeners, www.mastergardeners.org, include:

- Use stencils for decorative designs.

- Use branches, leaves or any materials or shapes to spray on silhouettes.

- Paint your barrel the same color as your home.

- Use it as a fun project for kids.

Installing it: Rain barrels should be placed immediately adjacent to down spouts, according to Wool.

Maintaining it: If you use water in the rain barrel regularly, mosquito breeding is not a problem, according to Wool. Otherwise, cover your opening with window screening material to keep mosquitoes out.

"One creative person put gold fish in their barrel to take care of the bugs, and it was a real eye-catcher," he said.

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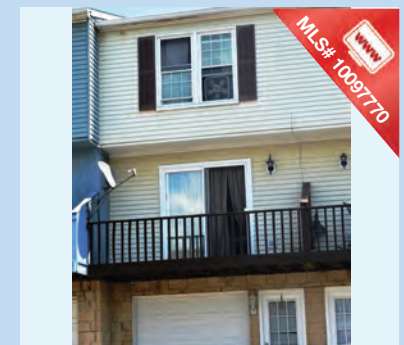
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Hop to it: Plant what you need to brew beer

You don't need a garden to succeed as a home brewer, but growing your own ingredients is a flavorful step up.

Much of the creativity involved in crafting a custom-made beer starts with the plants you select.

"The modern palate pretty much demands some hops in beer, but beyond that, there's a lot of choices available," said Dennis Fisher, an organic farmer from Winterport, Maine.

Fisher, who with his brother Joe wrote a popular reference book for beginners, "The Homebrewer's Garden" (Storey Publishing, 1998), says one of the most satisfying aspects of home brewing is producing some or all of your own ingredients from scratch. "Scratch brewing," the brothers wrote, "refers to the cultivation, preparation and use of hops, barley, malts and other non-barley grains, and adjuncts ranging from fruits to herbs to vegetables."

Growing your own ingredients ensures that the products are as organic, fresh and unique as pos-



sible. Homegrown also is cheaper than store-bought, the Fishers say.

The four basic ingredients needed for brewing are malt (malting provides the fermented sugar that yeast feeds on to produce alcohol), hops (reduces spoilage and balances the sugar's sweetness with a bitter fla-

vor), brewer's yeast and water (about 90 percent of beer's content).

"Hops are a particularly good (garden) choice because they thrive almost anywhere," Dennis Fisher said. "They are also a great addition to a landscape — big, attractive columns of greenery."

If the water from your tap tastes good, then it also should taste good in the beer you make, Fisher said. "But if it's chlorinated, then you need to let it stand overnight to allow the chemicals to outgas before brewing with it."

Adjuncts, in homebrew speak, are plants used to

replace or complement hops to give beers distinctive flavors, odors and colors.

"Just about any flower you can eat can be made into a beer," said Rebecca Kneen, an organic farmer and writer from Sorrento, British Columbia, who wrote about backyard brewing in the new

"Groundbreaking Food Gardens," By Niki Jabbour (Storey Publishing).

"It's useful to experiment with them all though to determine how much should be used and when they should be added," Kneen said.

Some common and not so common home brewer's garden adjuncts include:

- Herbs: (Bittering) Sage, horehound, gentian, yarrow. (Flavoring) Juniper, rosemary, ginger, oregano, mint, thyme. (Aromatic) Lavender, lemon balm, chamomile.

- Flowers: Nasturtiums, wild roses, scented geranium leaves, daylilies and marigolds.

- Vegetables and fruits: Rhubarb, blackberries and elderberries, pumpkin, chili peppers, sorghum, apples. "We like to add spruce tips to some beers," Fisher says. "It's more of a wild-gathered than home-grown adjunct that in Colonial times was a hops substitute."

For even "greener" beer, recycle the brewing ingredients and their byproducts, Kneen said. "You can compost them, feed them to pigs and sheep, put some into your chicken feed."

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Study: Millennials buying homes later

WASHINGTON — Don't blame the millennial generation for lackluster home sales.

They are increasingly ethnically diverse, more educated and less likely to be married — all factors that make them less likely to own a home, said a new report released Wednesday by Trulia, an online real estate firm. After adjusting for these population changes, younger Americans are actually buying homes at the same rate as they did during the late-1990s.

"For at least the past 20 years, there have been significant demographic headwinds for homeownership for young people," said Jed Kolko, chief economist at Trulia.

The analysis suggests that the recession — for all its damage to the economy — did little to turn off millennials from the idea of owning a home compared to previous generations. In fact, the report shows that the major group whose ownership rates suffered because of the downturn is middle-aged Americans.

The easy credit offered during the housing bubble caused more young people to buy than they otherwise would and masked the impact of the demographic changes, according to Trulia. The bursting of that bubble and the resulting recession that began in 2007 then caused ownership to fall where it should be given the demographic shifts. Because a greater percentage of younger Americans are attending college and graduate school, they are settling down a few years later — which causes them to delay buying a home.

Census figures show that the share of 18-34 year-olds who are married is 30 percent, down from 47 percent in 1983. Just 29 percent of them live with children, compared to 39 percent three decades ago. Since more people in the age range are single and childless, Trulia looked at the number of homeowners who are also identified as the head of their households. After adjusting for these population shifts, the share of people under 35-years old who own homes is the same as it was for 1997.

Standard Census data, which aren't adjusted for these factors, show that the ownership rate among those younger than 35 has declined to 36.2 percent from 38.6 percent in 1997. Slightly less than 65 percent of the country owns a home, down from a peak of 69 percent in the middle of 2006.

While the weak economic rebound has affected home buying, Trulia's analysis puts more of an emphasis on demographics than much of the real estate industry has to explain poor sales.

Lawrence Yun, chief economist at the National Association of Realtors, blames the lack of buying among younger people on the sluggish recovery, now entering its sixth year.

"It's principally the economic factors: Jobs and student debt," said Yun, noting the difficulty of saving for a down payment when earning modest wages and repaying college loans.

The number of first-time homebuyers in May was near record lows at 27 percent, versus a historic average of 40 percent, the Realtors said last month. Yun says that as the economy continues to bounce back, so, too, will sales to first-time buyers.

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Couple builds tiny house

LAWTON, Okla. — Thinking small — when it comes to living space.

A Lawton couple recently completed a project to build a compact and “portable” house they will be transporting to its future site in Colorado. Their small house is based on the model of space and energy efficiency.

Cody Greene and his fiancée, Kelly Bentley, built the small house that is 20 feet in length and 8 1/2 in width. The house contains only 200 square-feet of space but that space is very efficient as it includes shelves and cabinets in areas that would normally serve as dead space such as the stairwell to the upper loft that will serve as sleeping quarters.

“We built the whole thing ourselves,” Greene said.

Greene said the couple was not the first to undertake such a project. He said the idea of building small and efficient homes was started by a California developer in the 1990s who sells his home plans.

“We took ideas from many small house plans to fit our needs,” he said.

The small house, built with an all-wood exterior, is heated by a wood stove that has a metal barrier to keep the heat from touching the wood. Bentley said that piece of steel dropped the cost of equipping the

house with the stove to only \$50. Air conditioning is provided by a ceiling-mounted fan unit.

The living space is a small area with a couch, two closets, two cabinets and a shelf above them. The kitchen includes a 10-cubic-foot refrigerator, sink and storage space for cooking supplies. At the bottom on the floor is a dog area for the couple’s two Boston Terriers. The bathroom includes a shower and tub, along with a compost toilet and mural on the ceiling made by Greene, who is an artist and muralist.

Upstairs is a loft, or sleeping hollow, that includes additional storage space in the bed’s headboard. The sleeping hollow is reached via a staircase in which the stairs themselves serve as openable storage spaces.

Although the couple built the house themselves, the electrical project was done by a contractor.

“I’m glad we chose a professional for that,” Greene said.

Also to be contracted out is the transportation of the home to its new destination, Colorado Springs, Colo. That will be done by a professional driver via a truck pulling the house on a new and heavy-duty trailer that will also serve as the future foundation of the home.

“The test drive will be the [first] drive,” Greene said. “It will reduce some stress on us.”

Best to watch long-term trends in real-estate market

When I started writing about real estate full time, the experts cautioned me not to chase month-to-month data, and to focus instead on quarterly and yearly figures.

I’ve tried to toe that line. As agents, builders and economists would be quick to tell you, real estate is cyclical — “a roller-coaster ride,” as someone once told me — and it’s best to look at the market over time to determine long-term trends.

These days, few will argue that the housing market is still seeing low mortgage-ap-

plication rates, housing starts and home sales, and that many potential homeowners remain cautious.

Month-to-month numbers are likely to be especially bumpy, said Don Frommeyer, of the National Association of Mortgage Brokers.

“In real estate, it’s important to focus on the year-to-year outlook,” Frommeyer said. “A lot of outside factors can have an impact on monthly numbers, including harsh weather or emergencies.”

Last winter in Mount Airy, Pa., was a good illustration of the effect of weather on the numbers.

Ruth Feldman, of Weichert Realtors McCarthy As-

sociates, said days on market there increased this year to 119 days, from 75.

Pending and sold units also were down in the first couple months of the year, and Feldman blamed the weather for both.

In Washington Township, said Mike Lentz of Keller Williams Realty, the reluctance of sellers to put their houses on the market in cold and snowy weather contributed to the number of multiple bids in his and other markets.

Lack of inventory makes what is on the market a valuable commodity, though the perceived value may bring offers only at or near asking price.

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For many people, gathering possessions is just the stuff of life

LOS ANGELES — We cherish things and accumulate them. We move them from shelf to shelf, and from home to home. The federal government estimates that a quarter of Americans with two-car garages don't use them for automobiles. Even those without a permanent home carry their stuff around with them. We like to shop, own, trade or give away. Things matter to us, for reasons practical and emotional. "Our possessions all have magical qualities. Many, if not most, of the

things we keep have an essence that goes beyond the physical character of the object," said Randy Frost, a professor at Smith College, in Northampton, Mass., who has studied and written about hoarding and is the author of "Stuff." A stroll through the Sunday flea market outside Fairfax High School provides a catalog of some of those magical objects: Varsity letter jackets, rotary phones, typewriters, fur blankets, old ties and cowboy boots. Butterflies pinned to cardboard and framed. A crystal Eiffel Tower. A blue guitar.

Vendors collect stuff to sell to people, who often resell the stuff all over again. "This market has the best eclectic stuff — a collection of people's things that are old," said LaNell Petersen, shopping on a recent weekend with her sisters. She likes the hunt for something she believes is more valuable than its price. Consider these statistics cited by professional organizer Regina Lark: The average U.S. household has 300,000 things, from paper clips to ironing boards. U.S. children make up 3.7 percent of children on the planet but have 47 percent of all

toys and children's books. So why can't we let go? And what are the implications of our reluctance to pare down, our inability to get organized? The notion that things don't matter is rubbish, the experts say. They matter for many reasons: Keeping up with the Joneses, recalling departed loved ones, even objective value — like the 17th century Dutch painting that is among many objects of desire in Donna Tartt's "The Goldfinch." Here are a few tips on how to figure out what to save and what to toss among your possessions.

1. Is it truly meaningful? Just because you picked up a seashell in France doesn't necessarily mean it reminds you of the trip there, Rubin said. 2. Is it containable? Consider a thimble to remind you of a grandparent rather than, say, a table. 3. Is it part of a collection? When people amass a bunch of something, such as coins or Disney figurines, they start to seem more valuable. Don't be fooled. That still may not make them worth keeping. 4. "Why not surround yourself with just that which gives you pleasure?"

With love and beauty and things that fill your heart and mind," said professional organizer Regina Lark. "Like clothing. Keep what makes you look hot. But if it's only OK, why keep it?" 5. When an object appeals to you, said "Unstuff Your Life" author Andrew Mellen, ask yourself what you'll do with it, where it will live, whether it will replace something else. And sometimes you might conclude that you needn't own it. 6. Was it a gift? A freebie? Just because someone gave it to you doesn't mean you have to keep it, Rubin said.

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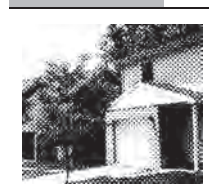

Mom shouldn't use insurance policy as estate

DEAR DAVE: My mom is 71 and debt-free. She's investing \$600 a month in a universal life insurance policy worth \$250,000 because she wants to leave something behind when she dies. What could she invest this money in, other than the life insurance policy, in order to leave an estate? — Steve

Dear Steve: This is a good question. You don't use life insurance to leave an estate. It's a bad idea. You leave an estate by saving and investing. The only people who will tell you to use a life insurance policy to leave an estate are life insurance salesmen.

Unless she's ill, I wouldn't keep the policy. Instead, I'd do some long-term investing. It won't take long to get to \$250,000 with \$7,200 a year.

It's the kind of thing that sounds like it'll take forever, but you've got to remember you've

Whatever you do, Jade, don't treat this student loan debt as if it were a mortgage. In other words, don't let it hang around for years and years.

got growth and interest in the equation. I wouldn't put money into a life insurance policy at age 71, unless there's someone being left behind who really needs the money — and it doesn't

sound like there is in this case.

It would probably take about 13 years for the money to turn into \$250,000. Assuming she's healthy, I'd rather do that and bet on her living. That way, she can leave an estate and avoid the expense and rip-off part of the universal life policy.

DEAR DAVE: I have a very large amount of student loan debt. Where would that go in your Baby Steps plan? — Jade

Dear Jade: Baby Step 2 is where you pay off all debt except for your house. The fact that it's a large amount of student loan debt doesn't change anything.

Hopefully, with your very large amount of student loan debt, you also have a very large income.

Believe it or not, there are some really sad situations out there where people have gone \$200,000 into debt for a four-year degree in a field where they make \$50,000 a year. That kind of thinking and behavior is ridiculous, but it's out there.

You've got to get focused and intense about paying off this mess and getting on with your life.

Remember, your income is your largest wealth-building tool. You can't save and plan for the future when all your money is flying out the door to pay back debt.

Co-op sells merchandise not at grocer

Mountain People's Co-op wants to thank its customers as the business approaches its 40th anniversary, in 2015.



"We decided to launch new member benefits for our 2014-'15 fiscal year to offer better incentives, also to offer more growth to the business," General Manager Ashley Keane said.

Top-tier membership costs \$150 a year, with discounts every day. Prices go down from there, including a \$20 student membership. Mountain People's Co-op also reinstated members-only sales, saving members up to an additional 15 percent on certain items.

Mountain People's Co-op is at the corner of University Avenue and Fayette Street. The store primarily specializes in helping customers with bulk ordering.

"It's the only place around where you can get some of the things that the co-op has," customer Llew Williams said. "Their trail mix is really good. I mean, if you're going hiking, they have got the industrial-strength trail mix with the chocolate and raisins. It's really good."

Keane said people are drawn to the co-op for its locally grown organic produce and items that are not available in chain grocery stores. Several varieties of organic butters, jams, and jellies are available.

"Probably our biggest selling product is local eggs," Keane said. "We have probably over 15 local farms that supply to us and deliver, usually about six days a week. Some eggs are even laid that morning and delivered to us."

Keane continued by saying, "Our [second biggest] seller is probably Kombucha, which is a fermented tea drink. It has a ton of health benefits and everything. Most of our members order that by the case."

In addition to groceries, the co-op has organic vitamins, shampoos and soaps. It also has a selection of jewelry and a wide variety of fragrance oils available for purchase.

Many workers put off retirement, take 'encore' jobs

After Fred Wallace was laid off from a high-paying job in 2011, the 56-year-old knew the odds of landing a comparable position were slim.

He polished his LinkedIn profile and networked like crazy. But his yearlong job search yielded only a handful of interviews and no offers.

So he shifted gears, embarking on an "encore" career by working part time at a child and family services organization in San Bernardino.

Wallace is among millions of older Americans launching professional second acts revolving around some form of public service. In the aftermath of the recession, encore careers have caught on among baby boomers, some of whom recoil at the notion of conventional retirement, or aren't financially prepared.

Wallace uses the marketing skills he honed during 28 years at HBO to raise funds for a program helping young people smooth the transition out of foster care. It's high-level work that brings per-

sonal fulfillment and a paycheck — albeit a significantly smaller one.

"It's terrific to know you can help an organization be better at what they do, you can give back, and you can earn a modest stipend," Wallace said.

Roughly 9 million Americans ages 44 to 70, or 9 percent of the

100 million people in that age range, work in encore jobs, according to a 2011 survey by Encore.org, a nonprofit organization, and the MetLife foundation. An additional 31 million would like to.

"People are going to live longer, and people of modest means are going to work much

longer," said Marc Freedman, the group's founder. "How do we make that something people genuinely look forward to, and that could be important to society?"

The share of older Americans in the workforce has risen sharply since the mid-1990s, and polls show millions of people plan to work in years that once were classified as retirement.

Among those 55 and older, 40 percent have jobs or are looking for work, according to the Labor Department. That's hovering around the highest level since the early 1960s.

In June, a survey by Merrill Lynch and research firm Age Wave found that 72 percent of people 50 and older plan to work in their "retirement" years.

The encore dynamic is far from a cure-all for the professional and financial challenges facing older workers.

Many jobs in encore fields such as education and social services are relatively low-paying. That limits their viability for people with pressing financial needs, such as insufficient retirement savings or children's college bills.

Busy boss plus crisis is stressful

Q: I work full time managing a busy team, and also have a family medical issue that will require attention for some time. What can I do to successfully keep all of this going?

You may want to sit quietly or go for a walk — whichever is most grounding for you. Now focus on your breathing, noticing the air flowing in through your nostrils and out through your mouth, letting tension and anxiety ease with each breath. Repeat this now and then throughout your day. Just the few minutes invested will have great returns in helping you maintain balance.

What are your expectations for yourself? Superwoman? Realistically, when you add a new layer of effort to your life, something else will have to shift. Don't let it be your self-care, because then it'll all fall apart and nothing will be done well. You need to be clear about what needs to get done, what's nice to have and what can get delegated.

Get a handle on the to-do list, being very concrete and specific. "Take care of Aunt Annie" is much harder to plan for than "Take Uncle Fred to the doctor on Tuesday." If cataloging your responsibilities starts to overwhelm you, return to your breathing for a moment. And be sure to include both work and home on your list.

Consider the resources available to help. Who are your partners on the home front; for example, your spouse or siblings? Who are the rocks on your team? Where does your boss fit in terms of providing help as needed?

The outer game

Realistically, you're going to need extra help. Turning to your team can also yield returns in terms of staff development but also cohesion as a group. Have a meeting with them and let them know what's going on for you, with an appropriate level of detail. Talk about aspects your need to delegate more, and don't worry if you don't have a specific plan; this provides an opportunity to see who steps up for a larger role.

Then work with your team and your boss on exactly who will do what so that expectations are clear and your team is set up for success.

Very importantly, also be clear about the parts of your role that you can't or won't delegate — being there to support each of your team members. If they know that your heart and mind are still with them, the work will get done.

Take care of yourself, keeping the basics of nutrition, rest, exercise and fun all in place. The little things — a good laugh, for example — will help you keep it together.

The last word

Asking for and accepting help will make it possible for you to keep everything going during a busy and high-stress time.

A checklist for keeping you focused at work

A quick check of Facebook and next thing you know, a half-hour's passed. Start chatting with a co-worker and suddenly 20 minutes is gone and the report you were supposed to finish by lunch is late.

Workplace distractions are everywhere, especially in an age of social media and open-plan offices. In the face of so much temptation, accomplishing what you're paid to do can be tough.

Tough, but not impossible. To find out more, I asked successful professionals from various walks of life for their secrets to staying productive and getting things done at work. Here's what they said:

■ **Make a list.** To-do lists may be basic, but there's a reason so many people use them: They work.

Christopher Kim, an earth and environmental sciences professor at Chapman University, prioritizes his to-do list using efficien-

cy expert Stephen Covey's time-management system. Kim assigns tasks to one of four quadrants based on how urgent and important they are, from "Urgent and Important" to "Not Urgent and Not Important." He keeps his quadrant to-do list on a piece of paper in front of his laptop stand at all times.

Vanessa Scarbo, human resources and operations director at Irvine, Calif.-based Burnham Benefits Insurance Services, likes

to get a head start on hers. "Before I leave the office for the day, I have started the to-do list for the next, rolling over items that didn't get completed or require follow-up," she says.

■ **Use your phone.** Kim takes a picture of his to-do list with his iPhone and stores it in a separate photo album on the phone "so I can access it if I lose the sheet of paper." Mary Ann Poladian, an independent college admissions consultant in San Clemente, re-

lies on her iPhone's calendar to track client appointments and deadlines. "It helps," she says.

■ **Block out time for uninterrupted work.** Nina Ries, principal of a Santa Monica business law practice, schedules work in one- to two-hour chunks. "My assistant helps keep me focused and on track by serving as gatekeeper," Ries says. "During those focused times, I only respond to urgent calls or emails."

Tesla wants to hire veterans

FREMONT, Calif. — Tesla Motors, which is on a mission to bring electric cars to the masses, now has another goal: To become a leading employer of America's military veterans.

"We want to be known throughout the veteran community as a great place to work," Arnon Geshuri, Tesla's vice president of human resources, said in an interview. "Veterans are a great source of talent for Tesla, and we're going after it."

Tesla's workforce is exploding as it expands production of its Model S, prepares to launch the Model X crossover SUV and enters new markets overseas. The company has more than 6,000 employees, and of those, 300 — or roughly 5 percent — are veterans, including its logistics director, former Navy officer Adam Plumpton. Another 600 veteran candidates are in the hiring pipeline, according to Geshuri.

"Tesla has risen to the top" among companies known for creating veteran-friendly workplaces, said Ted Daywalt, the president and chief executive of VetJobs, the nation's leading military job board. "They have a good reputation. They hire veterans who can talk to other veterans. There is a language in the military, and having someone who can speak the lingo is important."

Veterans are a good fit for Tesla because many gained advanced technical, electrical and me-

chanical skills while serving in the military-skills applicable to making electric cars. They are also used to working as part of tightly-knit groups.

Greg Reichow, Tesla's vice president of production, says the company is eager to hire veterans because it has found them to be excellent employees who share the company's sense of mission.

"At Tesla, we're not just building cars. We're trying to transform transportation," Reichow said. "They also know how to lead teams, focus teams and function on teams, and they have incredible integrity and discipline."

Tesla is aggressively recruiting veterans while trying to create a culture

where veterans feel supported and appreciated once they are on board.

Jason Noma, a former Army sergeant and intelligence analyst, focuses specifically on military recruiting as a member of Tesla's burgeoning HR team, and has helped increase efforts to hire veterans through word-of-mouth, partnerships with veterans groups and recent events such as the Oakland Veteran Job Fair.

In the third-floor cafeteria of the Tesla factory in Fremont, a vintage "Uncle Sam" poster invites veterans to connect with other veterans via a series of casual monthly gatherings held at the factory. All vets, regardless of military branch or length

of service, are welcome to attend and share ideas on how to improve internal programs. Many vets wear exclusive T-shirts emblazoned with the Tesla logo and the American flag, and Veterans Day is a company-wide paid holiday. But the company's support for former and current military personnel does not end there.

"HR was phenomenal with my deployment," said Jason Deming, a 35-year-old vehicle test technician who is also a member of the Air National Guard and was deployed in 2013 to Afghanistan with the Moffett Field-based 129th Rescue Wing. "I can serve my country and save lives but also work on the forefront of technology."

Employers spy to check job performance

IF IT SEEMS like employers don't trust employees — well, they don't.

Bad apples in the workplace bunch — or simply fear of bad apples — have pushed many employers to use an array of employee tracking devices.

GPS equipment on delivery vehicles tells where people are at any given moment. Computer software tracks every website visited, and blocks some of them. Video cameras watch comings and goings. Supervisors listen in on customer phone calls.

The workplace today is something of a Big Brother world. Workers shouldn't assume a right to privacy. On company computers, phones or vehicles, there is no right to do what you want when you want.

And that makes perfect sense, said Ivory Thompson, operations manager of Retina-X, the parent company of MobileSpy. Aply named, that. It's a software brand used by employers to monitor employees' online activity.

"Employers want to make sure their employees are doing what they're supposed to do, that they're not giving away trade secrets," Thompson said in an interview. "It's also for productivity purposes."

No surprise there. With staffing cut to the bones in many organizations, employers want to make sure that everyone on payroll pulls the intended weight.

Product vendors like Thompson, human resource experts and employment law attorneys all recommend that employees be clearly informed about whatever monitoring is used.

"Employees should sign off on it when they're hired," Thompson said, and employee manuals should explain the monitoring and use policies.

For the record, here's MobileSpy's list of the top five industries for employee monitoring:

- Banking and finance.
- Software development.
- Information technology.
- Education.
- Logistics and call centers.

Don't back down when co-workers drive dangerously

When Brad started typing a reply, I told him that this made me uncomfortable. He indignantly

replied that he is a good driver who has never had an accident. Ever since that incident, Brad has made mocking comments to others about my "texting paranoia." How

should I handle this?

ANSWER: Your reckless colleague is acting like an idiot. If Brad is too stupid to comprehend that one cannot simultaneously type, steer, and watch the road, then someone should show him the statistics on people who have been killed or injured due to texting behind the wheel. As long as he continues this practice, you should avoid riding with him.

However, you may find

that Brad's contemptuous account of your "texting paranoia" actually turns out to be helpful. A reputation for being concerned about distracted driving might cause others to curb their bad habits whenever you're a passenger. But if they don't, you should continue to speak up, for their sake as well as your own.

Because distracted driving is a serious and widespread problem, ev-

WVU continues search for fast radio bursts

If you closely follow scientific discoveries about the universe, you'll have read that across the sky as many as 10,000 celestial radio signals a day are emitting a bright pulse which lasts for only a few milliseconds.

And then, as far as scientists can tell, each pulse isn't seen again.

You can't see them with the naked eye, and scientists don't know their origins or what they mean. And up until 2007, no one officially knew they existed.

Scientists at the Arecibo telescope, in Puerto Rico, have published findings recently that confirm the existence of these radio pulses that a WVU undergraduate student first discovered.

David Narkevic, then a physics and political science student from Philippi, looked through data from the Parkes radio telescope in Australia and found a single pulse shorter than five milliseconds that didn't seem to repeat.

"They are fairly easy to detect," said Duncan Lorimer, astrophysics professor at WVU. "But what we can't do easily is pinpoint their position."

Lorimer remembers when Narkevic showed him the original burst. It was clearly from far beyond the Milky Way galaxy.

Until now, scientists only found other examples of the phenomenon at different locations in the sky fewer than 10 more times and only from data collected at Parkes. Lorimer said this led some researchers to suspect that the data could be reflecting the telescope's activity and not the universe's.

"It's very significant," he says of the most recent discovery, "because it's the first example of one of these fast radio bursts found by a different telescope. We can be very, very confident now that it's a celestial phenomenon. That's the biggest take away result from this paper."

With the recent news from Arecibo, the hunt is on to find out what's really going on in each fraction of a degree of the sky where the bursts appear. And WVU researchers are very much a part of that.

The big question, Lorimer said, is whether the signals are coming from the neighborhood of our galaxy or whether they're much further away in the cosmos.

"If you asked me to make a bet, I would say it's more likely to be cosmological, but I can't prove that at the moment," he said.

That would tell us where they are. But what are they? They're not pulsars, the spinning neutron stars that send beams of radio waves with more regularity than a military clock.

If they're far away, Lorimer said, that probably puts them in the realm of the exotic. Stars colliding. The explosion of black holes — first proposed by Stephen Hawking in 1974.

He said this quest is reminiscent of the long road to discover the origin of gamma ray bursts, first noticed by military satellites in the 1960s. It took 30 years for scientists to prove that, yes, these bursts came from beyond our galaxy.

"So hopefully it won't take us another 30 years to find the answer," Lorimer said of these newly discovered bursts. "And it could actually be that these radio bursts are related to gamma ray bursts."

"I think within the next year or two we'll know the answer to this basic question of whether they're extragalactic or not."

And it will be an exciting one or two years, he thinks.

WVU researchers are also at Arecibo and elsewhere gathering data in the field of radio astronomy, which in a matter of a few years has become a top specialty for the University.

Lorimer said right now the WVU Department of Physics and Astronomy is installing high-performance computing facilities at Arecibo to analyze data being collected for sightings of these bursts.

At the National Radio Astronomy Observatory in Green Bank, WVU researchers are involved in projects which are collecting data from the smaller telescopes on site as part of the search.

He and fellow professor Maura McLaughlin, among others at WVU, are well equipped to study these short radio bursts because they're already looking for the radio waves that pulsars are sending in short, regular bursts.

Engineering student awarded STEM Mountains of Excellence Scholarship

Ross Ryskamp, a mechanical and aerospace engineering doctoral student from Woodbridge, Va., received a STEM Mountains of Excellence Scholarship from the Office of Graduate Education and Life at WVU.

The scholarships, valued at \$5,000, are awarded to incoming doctoral students planning to engage in research in one of the following Mountains of Excellence areas: Achieving international leadership in radio astronomy, utilizing shale gas, promoting stewardship of water resources, improving science, technology, engineering and math education and scientific literacy, and eliminating health disparities in Appalachia.

Ryskamp will research how shale gas can be utilized in internal combustion engines efficiently and in an environmentally responsible manner. He received both his bachelor's and master's degrees from WVU,

where he focused on facets of engine performance and exhaust emissions. Now, he is researching an advanced combustion mode called reactivity controlled compression ignition, which substitutes natural gas for a portion of diesel fuel while limiting harmful exhaust emissions.

His recent research projects include developing and calibrating a dual fuel natural gas/diesel retrofit system for heavy duty diesel engines, developing a modern spark-ignited natural gas fuel injection system and performing Environmental Protection Agency certification of light-duty bi-fuel (natural gas and gasoline) vehicles.

Gregory Thompson, associate professor in the Department of Mechanical and Aerospace Engineering, nominated Ryskamp. Thompson, who researches fuel additives to reduce the environmental impact of fossil fuel, is Ryskamp's research supervisor.

WVU professor named Fellow of chem society

A WVU professor of chemical engineering has been the first at the university to be named a Fellow of the American Chemical Society, which recognizes members for outstanding achievements in and contributions to science, the profession and the society.

Dadyburjor was recognized for his research in catalysis and fuel production including fuels and chemicals from coal and natural gas, as well as his leadership service to the organization's Division of Petroleum Chemistry, the Division of Energy and Fuels, and the Council for Chemical Research.

"I am humbled to be joining such an elite group and to be recognized by my colleagues across the breadth of chemistry," Dadyburjor said.

Dadyburjor is one of 99 scientists to earn the designation in 2014. He will be honored at a special ceremony at the American Chemical Society National Meeting in San Francisco on Aug. 11.

A member of the WVU faculty since 1983, Dadyburjor has taught virtually every undergraduate course in chemical engineering and many of its graduate courses during his tenure. He also served as department chair from 1999-2009. A Fellow of the American Institute of Chemical Engineers, Dadyburjor joins only 17 other scientists worldwide who are Fellows of both the American Chemical Society and the American Institute of Chemical Engineers.

He has served as a councilor of the Pittsburgh Local Section of the Institute, and will serve as its student liaison in 2015. Additionally, he is an editor of the journal, "Energy and Fuels," and is a member of the editorial board of the "Journal of Fuel Chemistry and Technology."

Dadyburjor received his master's and doctoral degree in chemical engineering from the University of Delaware. He was awarded a bachelor's degree in the discipline from the Indian Institute of Technology in Bombay.



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Mercedes-Benz B-Class electric doesn't skimp on luxury

The second automaker from the land of wienerschnitzel and doppelbock will soon offer an EV for the kale-and-kombucha crowd. Mercedes-Benz, which began selling its B-Class Electric Drive in July, was priming the pump recently with media test drives at its North American Research and Development campus in Silicon Valley — hoping, perhaps, to skim a few sales from the BMW i3, which arrived at dealers in June.

While it's somewhat ironic that the company credited with inventing the very object now blamed for an impending climate crisis is now pioneering technologies for a zero-emissions future, one thing is for sure: The German car company makes a compelling case for EVs with a luxury vehicle that retains many Mercedes hallmarks and does so at a competitive starting price of \$42,375.

Costing less than half as much as a Model S, the B-Class Electric Drive could very well be the poor man's Tesla. Indeed, Mercedes has partnered with the critics' darling on its powertrain. The Electric Drive's 28-kilowatt-hour lithium-ion battery pack and 177-horsepower electric motor are both assembled at Elon Musk's Fremont, Calif., factory,

after which they are constructed into complete cars in Germany. Mercedes warranties the battery against defects and capacity declines for eight years or 100,000 miles, whichever comes first.

The manner in which the batteries are laid out in the car is Tesla-esque. They are spread in a thin layer at the base of the B-Class EV, allowing the rear cargo hold to remain flat and the second seat to accommodate three passengers.

Long available in Europe, the B-Class has only been offered for lease in the U.S. as a hydrogen fuel cell electric vehicle, and only in the L.A. area. The B-Class Electric Drive is an updated second generation, optimized for electrification with a taller, battery-accommodating floor. That's most noticeable from the seats, which

feel tall for a compact.

Mercedes claims a range of 85 miles per charge. In the morning I drove the car, it had a projected range of 80 miles, fully charged, and it used that range at a rate of 1.1 miles for every true mile driven.

Anyone who's spent any time driving an EV understands how non-linear its range prediction can be. Like any car, how far it travels on a given amount of fuel depends on how it is driven, but EVs are sensitive to speed and hills. With the Mercedes Electric Drive, drivers have more options for control.

In addition to a button that toggles between full-torque sport mode and range-extending eco, there are steering-wheel paddles. Instead of the paddles controlling up and down shifts, however, they let drivers manually adjust the amount of re-

generative braking, and thus the kinetic energy that's captured from slowing and returned to the battery to propel the car. The Cadillac ELR uses a similar system.

What's most impressive about the B-Class, however, is how much it retains the feel of a real Mercedes.

The ride quality is solid, its steering firm, the cabin so quiet I couldn't even hear the whir of the electric motor. A leather interior is standard, as are safety features such as active parking assist and forward collision avoidance. Then there are the Mercedesisms, such as the Harman/Kardon stereo; the seat-shaped seat adjustment on each front door; the knurled knobs for the audio, climate and screen controls; and the soft-release doors on the center console cubbies.

I've driven every pure electric car on the market, from the Tesla Model S and Roadster to the now-defunct Coda, the Chevy Spark EV, the Fiat 500e, the BMW i3, the Nissan Leaf and now the Mercedes-Benz B-Class Electric Drive. I'm a single mom and a journalist, so my aspirations are more modest. I can say that the Mercedes offers the most luxurious EV experience one can buy without getting a Tesla.

That said, there is a down side to the Mercedes: It lacks a fast-charging port. With the built-in level 2, at least it fully recharges in just 3.5 hours.

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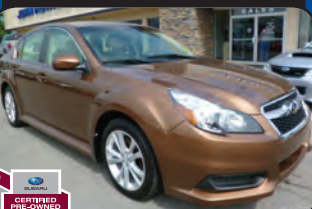
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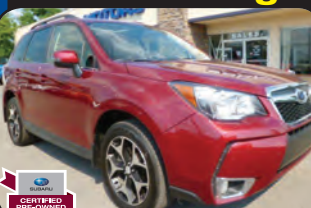

One season, one crime

TNT keeps audiences guessing with 'Murder in the First'

Crime intrigues audiences like nothing else on television. The wildly successful "CSI: Crime Scene Investigation" and its various spinoffs catapulted the genre into a new era of popularity that has yet to subside.

The police procedural has seen some evolution since it appeared, and each new series tries to put a spin on the basic format. Typically, each season is broken down into more or less self-contained episodes that follow one crime and its resolution before the next episode.

TNT is trying out something unorthodox with its original series "Murder in the First," which follows the investigation of one crime for an entire season, reflecting a more realistic time frame. Catch a new episode Monday, July 21, on TNT.

It's a bold move, and it seems to be paying off for the network. The premiere episode of "Murder in the First" drew in an impressive 4.9 million viewers over the course of two airings, making it the network's

most successful series premiere in two years. With a score of 68 out of 100 based on critic reviews on metacritic.com, it seems that the professional audience is digging the format.

(On the other hand, the website had two incredibly different viewer reviews as of press time with one user giving the show a 10/10 and the other rating it a big fat zero with the main complaint seeming to be prevalent nudity.)

"Murder in the First" stars Taye Diggs ("Private Practice") and Kathleen Robertson ("Beverly Hills, 90210") as San Francisco homicide detectives Terry English and Hildy

Mulligan. As the series opens, it is revealed that Det.

English's wife has been suffering from pancreatic cancer and is on death's doorstep. Diggs gives life to English's

struggle to keep his emotions under wraps in a high stress environment as the most precious thing in his life slips slowly away.

English's partner, Det. Mulligan, is a divorced, single mother trying to balance the challenges of her demanding career as well as the challenges of having a preteen daughter. When Mulligan sees English struggling with personal problems, she steps in and sends him home to his wife.

"Murder in the First" begins as English and Mulligan head out to investigate a shooting in a drug den in San Francisco's Tenderloin District. They eventually discover that their victim, Kevin Nyers, is the biological father of tech prodigy Erich Blunt, portrayed by the Harry Potter franchise's Tom Felton. Blunt is the CEO of APPLSN, a Silicon Valley startup dedicated to bringing immersive apps to the masses. The show gives Blunt a Mark Zuckerberg vibe, and it is quickly revealed that he is being sued for allegedly stealing a former employee's work.

After a meeting with the plaintiff in question, a visibly agitated Blunt returns to his private jet. When his young flight attendant (with whom he may or may not be having an affair) spills wine on his shirt, Blunt fires her in a less-than-kind manner. Although he apparently had a change of heart and hired her back, Blunt's recently fired flight attendant is found dead in her home, turning the detectives' sights on the young CEO.

As the investigation continues, it seems that Blunt is the obvious suspect. Keep in mind, however, that the entire 10-episode season focuses on the original murder. Many police procedurals have proven successful in

setting up one plot line at the start of the

show, only to reveal the conclusion by the end of the episode. "Murder in the First" will have more room to set up and flesh out false leads than its predecessors. Throughout production, in fact, the actors were kept in the dark about the eventual resolution.

Speaking with "Paste Magazine," Tom Felton said: "I'm pleased to say that, even as the character, I didn't know until the very last minute. They were very keen not to share the information with us, and it's definitely a ... roller-coaster of a ride."

Bean there, done that

Sean Bean's 'legend' lives on in a new drama from TNT

Bean there, done that: It looks like Sean Bean is alive and well once again.

The actor — who is perhaps infamously known for playing characters who die frequently — has made a bit of a legendary comeback in a new drama series entitled "Legends," premiering Wednesday, Aug. 13, on TNT.

The show stars Bean ("Game of Thrones") as an undercover FBI agent named Martin Odum, who works for the Deep Cover Operations (DCO) division. He has an uncanny ability to transform himself into different personas — which become his "legends" when he's done with them — for different jobs, but he meets a mysterious stranger who simply asks him, "Who are you?"

As Martin struggles with questions about his own identity, he still needs to continue working in his primary job, and he takes on legends such as a Scottish soccer club executive, a legendary computer hacker and a corrupt Chicago police officer.

"This is certainly something I'm looking forward to sinking my teeth into, the different personas," Bean told reporters at WonderCon back in April. "It's every actor's dream to play different characters. It's a bit weird, really ... Like, last week, I played three characters in one day. But it's OK, because you have time to adjust."

Based on the novel of the same name by award-winning author Robert Littell, the show also stars Ali Larter ("Heroes") as another FBI agent who has a history with Martin and Amber Valletta ("Revenge") as Martin's ex-wife. It still

remains to be seen if Bean's character, Martin, will reach an untimely end or not. You can check it out for yourself when "Legends" premieres Wednesday, Aug. 13, on TNT, but when he spoke at WonderCon and was finally asked the question on everyone's minds, he responded with a laugh, "I'm alive so far!"

Sparking revenge: He may be most well known for his best-selling romance novels, but now Nicholas Sparks is taking his talents to the small screen.

The acclaimed author of "A Walk to Remember," "Nights in Rodanthe" and "The Notebook"

(all of which were turned into hit big screen-movies) has a new project that doesn't involve books or feature films. "Deliverance Creek" is a

made-for-TV movie that marks Sparks' television debut as an executive producer, and the two-hour programming event will premiere Saturday, Sept. 13, on Lifetime.

It's an exciting treat for fans of Sparks' work, and while I'm sure there will be at least one scene in the rain, "Deliverance Creek" is being chalked up as a revenge drama more so than a romance.

The story focuses on Belle Gatlin Barlowe (Lauren Ambrose, "Six Feet Under"), a widow and mother of three struggling to defend her land during the Civil War. She's up against the corrupt bank that runs her town, and they're forcing her to become an outlaw. But as the stakes get higher and more personal, Belle starts to question whether it's better to be good or to survive.

Even though Sparks' name is attached to the project as a producer, it'll be Melissa Carter — writer of the Brit-tany Murphy/Ron Livingston romcom "Little Black Book" (2004) — penning the script and Jon Amiel of "The Borgias" sitting in the director's chair.

Lifetime is currently coining "Deliverance Creek" as a two-hour special event, however many publications — including "Deadline" and "The Hollywood Reporter" — are referring to this TV movie as a backdoor pilot. If it does well enough with audiences, it may very well be turned into a full TV series with Sparks at the helm as executive producer.

Though it'll lack many of the romantic nuances people are used to from Sparks, the revenge drama "Deliverance Creek" could prove to be a good change of pace for the acclaimed author. Catch the premiere of the two-hour TV movie airing Saturday, Sept. 13, on Lifetime.

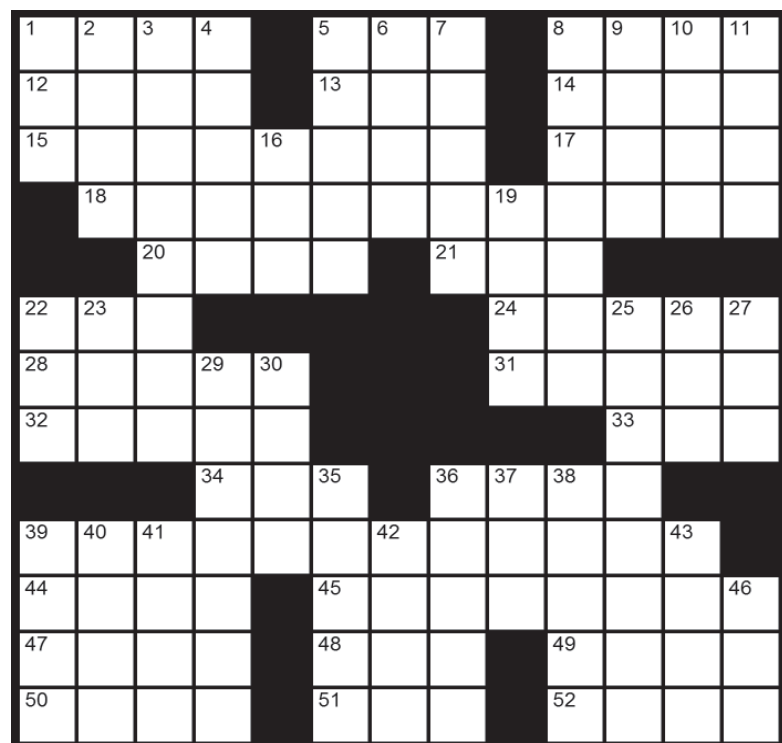

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Organizers mark 10 years of MountainFest

Commemorative wall among special features

Bikers across the state are gearing up for the MountainFest motorcycle rally.

The festival is scheduled for Wednesday-July 27, and for most people, it may seem like any other year. But for MountainFest coordinator Cliff Sutherland, it's a special event.

This July will mark the 10th year of the MountainFest rally. Sutherland said the team is pulling out all the stops, including something special to commemorate the date.

MountainFest will feature its regular fun-filled festivities and host a variety of vivacious vendors outside, but just inside the doors of the Hazel and J.W. Ruby Community Center at Mylan Park, a collage of all things years past is sure to attract rally regulars.

Sutherland said a commemorative

wall will be put up, displaying band T-shirts, posters, photographs, national and local media cutouts and other MountainFest memorabilia.

He said he even has signed guitars from a number of the bands that rocked the stage each year at the annual event.

Sutherland said the display will help paint a picture for people, illustrating just how far MountainFest has come in 10 years.

For the most part, everything people have come to know and love at MountainFest will still be available.

Vendors from motorcycle painters to stereo system experts to custom parts dealers will be in attendance. Sutherland said the vendor booths will be set up a bit differently this year for better crowd access.

Funnel cakes, hot dogs, pizzas, burgers and cotton candy are just some of the delectable foods attendees can chow down on in the hours leading up to the mul-

titude of stunt shows or band performances.

Sutherland said MountainFest gets better every year, and this year is no different. He explained that there will be a few new additions sprinkled in among the same good-old-fashioned fun that crowds have come to expect from the annual bike rally.

The aerial stunt show will be a nix this year due to a scheduling conflict, according to MountainFest Board Member Mike Alexander.

Instead, a sport-bike stunt show will be put on by the

Swoop Production Stunt Team. Alexander said the crew is a surface-based stunt team that does trick motorcycle riding in enclosed, paved areas of 250 feet by 50 feet.

A fan favorite will be back again this year at MountainFest: The Ives Brothers' Wall of Death.

A new addition to the MountainFest rally will be waiting inside, according to

Board Member Bruce Martin.

Martin said the custom bike builders asked to move outside this year, making room indoors for a special event.

He said MountainFest will hold a vintage car show consisting of up to 80 local old-fashioned cars.

Drivers were asked to submit photos and applications by July 11 in order to be invited to the show. Martin said the invitation-only process was adopted for space reasons.

"We didn't want to have 150 sign up and not be able to take them," he explained.

Participants donated \$35 and in return they will receive a plaque, a reception thrown by the Convention of Visitors Bureau and two passes to MountainFest, including parking.

Morgan of Morgantown is sponsoring the car show, and while no cars will be judged by officials, there will be cash prizes given for peoples' choice awards.

Martin said the number of peoples' choice awards depends on the number of cars that take part in the show. There will be at least one prize and possibly up to three.

[Martin] said MountainFest will hold a vintage car show consisting of up to 80 local old-fashioned cars.

Organizers spend a lot of time lining up bands for rally

It takes a lot of work to book a big-name musical act for a motorcycle rally, according to MountainFest coordinator Cliff Sutherland.

In order to get any idea of who you are going to have come show time, you have to let bands know you're interested well in advance, he said.

Sutherland, who is gearing up for this week's MountainFest, is already working on booking entertainment for the 2015 festival.

He said there are two ways to book big-name entertainment for rallies like MountainFest: Pay the price — the big price — or wait it out and negotiate until the band has events booked in close proximity to yours around the same time as yours, and then the price goes down.

Sutherland said MountainFest has made some serious progress through 10 years, but it isn't at the point where they can afford to wait it out too long.

He explained that MountainFest has to be able to have some reasonable time to market their big-name acts, and in order to do that, they have to book them ahead of time.

"Your best price is if you wait, but we can't wait," he said. "We're not the Ozzy Osbourne festival in Florida that he has every year, where if you're a fan of hard rock, you're going.

You know [big name bands] are going to be there. We're not there yet."

MountainFest books bands ahead of time so they can let potential rally-goers and rock enthusiasts know who's going to be there.

This year, the lineup at MountainFest

has bands that each have a solid, loyal following.

"We have a few big bands," Sutherland said. "It all depends who you are, which one's the bigger one because all three of them are pretty big draws to their own audience."

Between the main stage and the feature stage, several bands and talented acts are ready to entertain fans this week:

■ On Thursday, Jackal with Jesse James Dupree will take the stage. Sutherland said Jackal is a hard-working band that leaves everything on the stage. He said MountainFest beer sales may be the highest on Thursday night simply be-

cause of Jackal's performance, and one-day ticket sales may be high, as well, due to the band's loyal following.

■ Friday, the legendary Ted Nugent will headline on the main stage, while Jamiah on Fire & the Red Machine will play on the feature stage. Jamiah on Fire & the Red Machine is a Jimi Hen-

drix tribute band that is a must-see, Sutherland said.

■ One of the biggest names MountainFest has to offer this year will take the main stage Saturday night: Big and Rich with special guest Cowboy Troy.

Many other acts are set to play on one of two stages this weekend, including: the Hillbilly Gypsies, Kashmir, Chris Janson, Geneva, Marshall Lowry and Nick Sturms.

MountainFest Board Member Mike Alexander said he is pretty happy how the lineup turned out.


