**Feds recognize same-sex marriage in W.Va.**

Spouses will now be able to receive federal benefits

WASHINGTON — The federal government recognizes gay marriage in six states and extends federal benefits to those couples, Attorney General Eric Holder announced Saturday.

Gay marriage became legal in Alaska, Arizona, Idaho, North Carolina, West Virginia and Wyoming.

The government's announcement follows the

U.S. Supreme Court's decision this month to decline to hear appeals from five states that sought to keep their marriage bans in place. It brings the total number of states with federal recognition of gay marriage to 32, plus the District of Columbia.

Couples married in these states will qualify for a range of federal benefits, including Social Security and veterans' benefits.

"With each new state where same-sex marriages are legally recognized, our nation moves closer to achieving full equality for all Americans," Holder said.

The attorney general said the government is working "as quickly as possible" to make sure same-sex married couples in these states receive the "fullest array of benefits" that federal law allows.

The Justice Department also has determined that it can legally recognize gay marriages performed during the summer in Indiana and Wisconsin after federal courts declared marriage bans in the states unconstitutional. Subsequent developments created confusion about the status of those unions, but Holder said the U.S. government will recognize the marriages.

**VFD chief: Closures imminent**

Rising costs making it harder to operate

As a volunteer firefighter with more than 40 years experience, Blacksville Fire Chief Bob Brookover has seen his share of tough situations.

As the president of the Monongalia County Volunteer Fire Companies' Association (VFCA), he fears what the future holds for the 12 unpaid volunteer fire departments that respond to every call outside Morgantown's city limits.

"Up to this point, the people in this county have had really excellent fire protection and for a very low price. But I really, honestly believe that in two to three years, if things do not change for the fire departments, you're going to see a few of them closing their doors," Brookover said.

The concern stems from the rising cost of keeping those doors open.

Mandatory training, protective equipment — \$10,000 to \$12,000 per person — utilities, insurance, worker's compensation coverage, fuel and obtaining and maintaining vehicles.

Rising costs are not the only issue.

The ever increasing number of classroom hours required to volunteer makes it difficult for the

**Dems face test in state House races**

CHARLESTON — Law-suits, big spending and disgust with President Barack Obama all factor into Democrats' toughest election in 85 straight years of running the West Virginia House of Delegates.

All 100 seats on the ballot and House Democrats have a six-seat edge over Republicans. With a GOP candidate for almost every slot, the party hopes voter disapproval of the president trickles down the entire ballot.

In 2012, all 55 counties voted against Obama, whose push to cut carbon emissions from coal-fired power plants is highly unpopular in the major coal-producing state.

House Democrats' "record is one that very much reflects the same misjudgments and values that the Obama administration has tried to put in place across the country," said House Minority Leader Tim Armstead, R-Kanawha.

Democrats contend their party doesn't align with Obama. They point to making recent cuts in grocery and corporate taxes, and tax breaks on alternative fuel cars. They say they're fighting Washington on Appalachian coal, a struggling industry also facing serious market and geological limitations.

Democrats have a 24-10 edge in the Senate, but Republicans look to cut the lead in a few races.

So far, statehouse candidates have spent more than \$4 million in the 2014 election cycle, according to the secretary of state's website. Outside groups have spent \$1.7 million on state-house election messaging.

Honest West Virginians, using about \$900,000 from unions, spent more than \$606,000 protecting Democrats. The PAC ads tie state GOP candidates to the billionaire businessmen Koch brothers, whose affiliates have spent millions in West Virginia attacking Democratic U.S. Rep. Nick Rahall.

firefighters, most of who, also have jobs and families.

For example, the entry-level class needed to volunteer — Section 1 or Fire-fighter 1 — has jumped in recent years from a 36-hour commitment to 120 hours.

Section 1 is the first of several classes, all paid for by the department, that volunteers either must have or need in order to advance.

"I personally just had to attend a 40-hour class. I'm 62 years old and have been on the fire department for over 40 years," Brookover said. "I got this little certificate that more or less says that you, Bob Brookover, can

do what you've been doing for 44 years."

Some costs are covered by funding from the state (\$40,000) and county (\$20,000). The rest falls to the volunteers to raise. Brookover said it costs about \$90,000 to \$100,000 a year to keep Blacksville open as one of the county's smaller departments.

"I really don't know the layman's concept. If he thinks the fire department has everything given to them," Brookover said. "Please don't get me wrong, the money we get from the state and the county is very much appreciated, and it does help, but the time has come that somebody has got to step up and say 'we've got to help these folks.' 'We've got to help them or we're going to lose them.'"

In May, the VFCA presented a proposal to the Monongalia County Commission requesting an increase in funding that

would have generated an additional \$80,000 annually for each department and the VFCA and equated to roughly 38 cents on every \$1,000 of a county resident's total tax bill.

Assistant Prosecutor Phil Magro initially told the commission that the proposal would need to go before the voters. When a second opinion was requested, the proposal went to Prosecutor Marcia Ashdown in May.

This month, Ashdown returned an opinion explaining that the creation of a separate fire fee would have to follow the creation of a county fire board to direct the funds.

Ashdown's response prompted the scheduling of a work session between VFCA members and the commission slated for Nov. 5.

"I'm looking forward to the meeting," Brookover said. "I really think we can sit down and

get some things straightened out. If there's one sentence, one word (of the proposal) that is hurting this whole thing, we can change it. We'll change it and we won't be long doing it because we need to get this thing in effect."

Commissioner Tom Bloom said that Ashdown's opinion presented a number of questions that need to be answered. He also said that the commission is ultimately accountable for the county's funds.

"I think the fire departments assumed we could do an immediate levy. It took a while, but [Ashdown] listed a number of different issues that would need to be addressed," Bloom said.

"The main thing is, once you're talking about county funds, there is going to be accountability. We're not just going to hand county funds over to anyone without a full financial accounting."

areas, he said.

Like FallFest, he said: WVU's traditional welcome-back concert in the fall, as opposed to the partying on Grant Avenue that used to herald the start of the semester.

Charity, not chaos, would rule, he said.

A donation to a worthy cause, for example, could get your match that you would put to a couch for a very controlled burn, he said.

Same for a sledgehammer and a car snagged from a junkyard for the occasion.

He was thinking about it Saturday afternoon, as he and others in town got ready to watch No. 22 WVU line up against Oklahoma State, on the road.

The Mountaineers corralled the Cowboys 34-10 in that contest, spoiling OSU's Homecoming in Stillwater.

WVU's win the week before — a surprise 41-27 upset against then-No. 4 Baylor at home, was spoiled, Rockwell said, when post-game partying in Sunnyside spilled over to downtown Morgantown in the hours after that final musket shot at Milan Puskar Stadium.

Dumpsters and couches were set on fire. Lampposts were toppled. And police cars were pelted with rocks and bottles.

Morgantown officials set the tab for the cleanup and equipment repairs at \$45,000. This past week, WVU expelled three students for their actions after the game — with more likely to follow.

Accountability is one thing, Rockwell said, but a speeding locomotive can't stop on a dime.

That's why he proposed what he proposed Saturday. Taking WVU's for-bet-

ter-or-worse post-game traditions and roping them off is better than students just taking to the streets after the game, he said.

"You're never gonna shake the 'party school' image," he said, "but you might keep the arrests down."

**Couching the debate**

Arrests are what Sameera Abu-Ghannam, a WVU graduate student from northern Virginia, was thinking about Saturday.

She didn't appreciate the mob mentality that ensued after the game, she said.

"I agree that something has to be done," said the student, who also earned her undergraduate degree from the university.

Abu-Ghannam couldn't help wonder, though, if students — because of the mob mentality — weren't baited a bit by the martial presence that mobilized into the evening.

She wondered, even though officers and other responders had to protect themselves, as well as property, if a more-tempered response could have quelled the crowd a little better.

"You had officers showing up in SWAT gear," she said.

Justin Carpenter, though, said he knows how to bench the SWAT team on any given Saturday.

You do that, the political science major from Canton, Ohio, said, by behaving after the game.

Which is what the majority of fans, students and others, generally do, he said.

That's why he's in favor of expelling any student caught in engaging in criminal behavior after the Baylor game.

"I support what the university is doing," he said.

"I don't think a small minority should dictate the proceedings at my school."

# How to pick a college? Data crunchers hope to help

WASHINGTON — For many high school seniors, fall means deciding where to apply for college and maybe visiting a guidance counselor. Data crunchers hope to help.

The popularity of social media sites and advancements in the ability to analyze the vast amounts of data we put online give members of the class of 2015 more tools than ever to help chart their next step, even if finding the right college is an inexact science.

The professional networking site LinkedIn has come out with its "University Finder," which identifies which colleges are popular with which companies. Parchment.com pools student data to predict an individual's college admission prospects. There's even a dating ser-

vice-like site for higher education: Admitted.ly pairs students with colleges based on such factors as body piercings and whether applicants go to church.

These sites are joining the game of college rankings, which has some education experts excited and other rolling their eyes.

"For many families and students, the admissions process is very opaque," said Matthew Pittinsky, co-founder of the education technology giant Blackboard and chief executive officer of Parchment. "And what's happening now is that they (students) are beginning to share data with each other ... to bring transparency" to the process.

Lloyd Thacker, head of the Education Conservancy and a critic of college rankings, has another take: These sites

are one more way to profit from senior-year angst and encourage group-think.

"Technology has no inner logic," he said. "Just because it's there, doesn't mean we should use it."

Picking a college is nothing like it once was. In 1980, there were 3,150 colleges and universities, according to the Department of Education, and a primary factor for many students was location.

Now, there are close to 4,700 schools. Many schools might seem more selective than they really are, and students worried about getting turned down apply to lots of schools as a way to hedge their bets.

Halle Lukasiewicz, 18, said she remembers the day Northwestern University, a private research university in Illinois and her top choice, began emailing ac-

ceptance letters. A chat-room devoted to Northwestern hopefuls on a site called "College Confidential" was buzzing. Kids were posting their grades and test scores and whether they had gotten in.

Lukasiewicz, an occasional lurker on the site, found she could not look away even though her mom begged her to stop.

"My heart was racing," she said.


Finally, an email slid

across her phone: Accepted. Now a Northwestern freshman studying radio, television and film, Lukasiewicz said she's not sure the site added much value other than to stress her out.

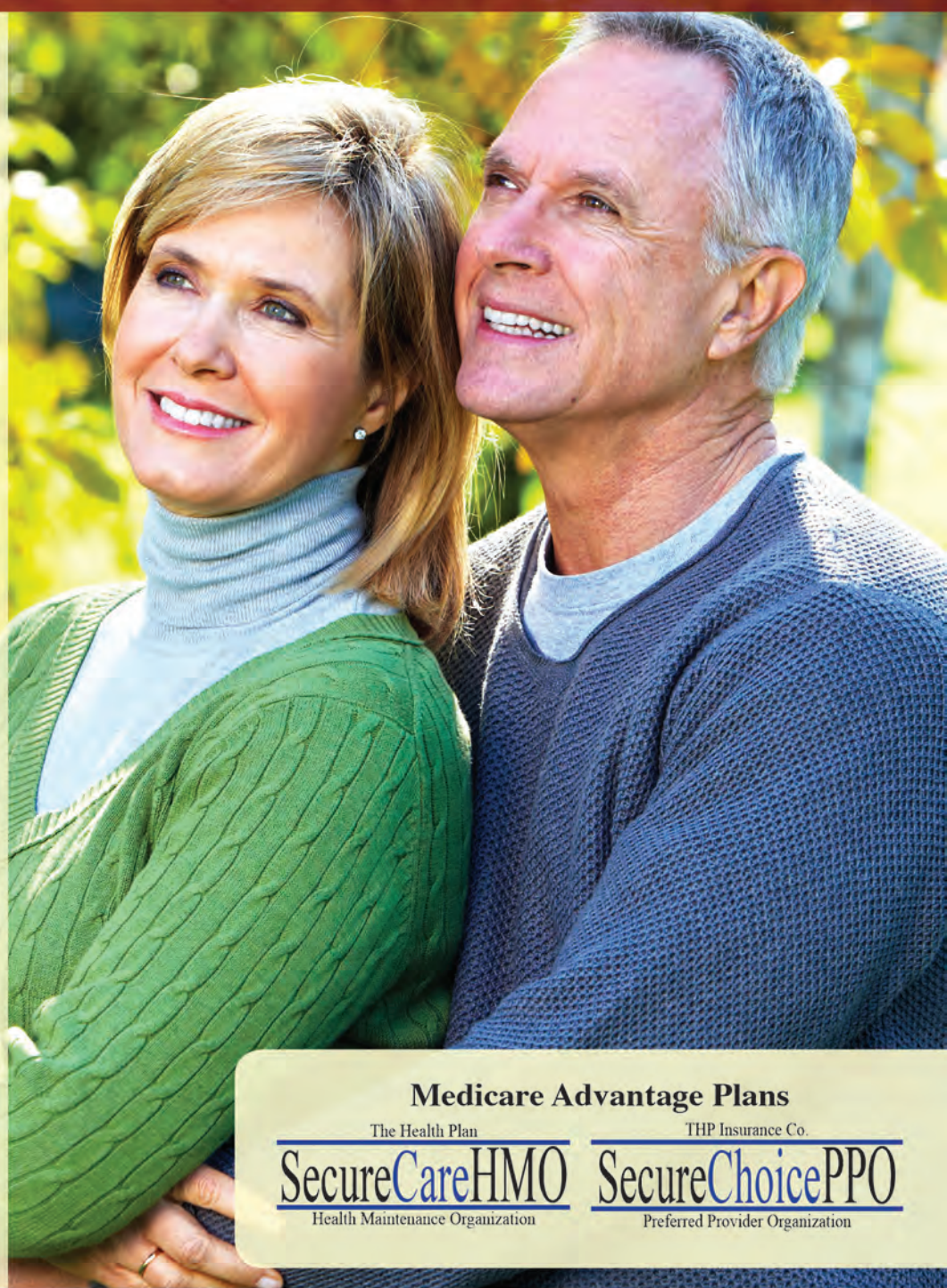

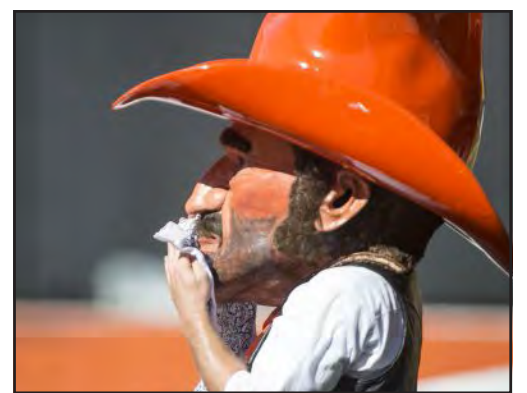

**Cream's Jack Bruce dies at 71**

LONDON — Jack Bruce was part Mississippi Delta and part Carnaby Street. In his glorious heyday as bassist and lead vocalist of 1960s power trio Cream, he helped create a sound that combined American blues and psychedelia to thrill audiences throughout the world.

Bruce, who died Saturday of liver disease at age 71, enjoyed a long, respected solo career after the band's acrimonious breakup, but will be best remembered for his stint with Cream and for classics like "Sunshine of Your Love" and "I Feel Free."

Much of the attention was focused on guitar wizard Eric Clapton, but Bruce wrote many of the band's signature tunes and served as lead vocalist. He also provided the intense bass guitar that, with Ginger Baker's explosive drums, underpinned Cream's rhythmic, driving sound.

They had it all — commercial and critical success — until individual egos intervened and they disbanded, entering rock and roll mythology as the original supergroup: Super-talented and super-troubled.

Bruce was an important member of the British blues movement, which saw bands like the Animals and Rolling Stones first imitate and then expand on the American blues tradition as exemplified by Muddy Waters, John Lee Hooker and other stalwarts.

**Custom urns courtesy of company's 3-D printer**

EDEN PRAIRIE, Minn. — A Minneosta startup is using a 3-D printer to create custom urns shaped like objects that were important to the person whose remains they hold.

The Eden Prairie-based Foreverence offers urns made with a ceramic material that looks different than the plastic material typically produced by a 3-D printer. The process takes about a day, starting with about nine hours of printing, and then followed by several hours of touchups. Each urn can take the

form of just about anything, including ballet slippers, cars and instruments.

It has even made an urn shaped like the signature hats worn by rock band Devo when co-founder Bob Casale died this year. Foreverence offered Casale's family the urn and ended up making two for them. Casale's family told the company that it was "the first joyous moment in a dark period of time for them," company CEO Pete Saari said.

Foreverence sells its urns, which typically cost thousands of dollars,

through funeral directors.

"We want funeral directors to keep conversations focused on legacy," said Saari, whose privately held company launched five months ago. "What was important to the deceased? What was symbolic of a life, a dream, the pursuit of a passion?"

The urn is created by a ceramic-composite material that's fed into the 3-D printer in a powdered form. Its shape gradually takes form with coloring that bonds each layer together, and staff members put the final touches on the urns.

**Ice Age human settlements found in the Peruvian Andes**

Archaeologists say they've found the highest-known remains of Ice Age human settlements in the southern Peruvian Andes, dated to more than 12,000 years old.

The two sites, described in the journal *Science*, sit higher than 4,000 meters (more than 13,100 feet) above sea level and indicate that humans may have adapted to the extremely harsh climate far sooner than many researchers had expected.

"These sites extend the residence time of humans above 4,000 (meters above sea level) by nearly a millennium," the study authors wrote, "implying more moderate late-glacial Andean environments and greater physiological capabilities for Pleistocene humans than previously assumed."

The two sites in the Pucuncho Basin lie nearly 3,000 feet above other settlements from around the same time period. One,

called Pucuncho, is a workshop site filled with 260 formal tools such as stone scrapers and projectile points; it sits 14,288 feet above sea level and has been dated to 12,800 to 11,500 years ago. The second, Cuncaicha, hosts a rock shelter sitting 14,698 feet above sea level that dates back to 12,400 years and a workshop site 14,583 feet above sea level. The shelter is filled with soot-marked ceilings from campfires, rock art and sediments on the ground that include charred plant remains.

Cuncaicha was also filled with ceramics, chipped-stone tools, animal bones, bone beads and quartz crystals, as well as red ochre fragments. Most of the stone tools were made from the obsidian, andesite and jasper found nearby.

**Study: Headache condition linked to weight-loss surgery**

By reshaping the gastrointestinal tract, bariatric surgery appears to set in motion a cascade of physiological changes — most obviously weight loss. But a new study suggests that such surgery may also be linked, in rare cases, to a headache condition caused by a leak of cerebrospinal fluid from the brain.

Neurologists generally diagnose spontaneous intracranial hypotension, which can bring on sudden headaches and nausea

while a person is upright, in tall, lanky people. But research published this week in the journal *Neurology* found, in searching through the medical records of some 338 patients with the condition, 11 — or 3.3 percent — had bariatric surgery.

That suggests that a history of weight-loss surgery may put a person at increased risk of developing these headaches. While lying down often causes the symptoms to disappear, the condition can be disabling. On average, bariatric

patients who developed the painful condition did so anywhere from three months to close to five years after the surgery, and after they had lost, on average, about 116 pounds.

Evidence is finding that bariatric surgery prompts physiological changes in patients that are not just a downstream effect of weight loss: Improvement in a metabolic function — and resolution of Type 2 diabetes — is at the top of that list.

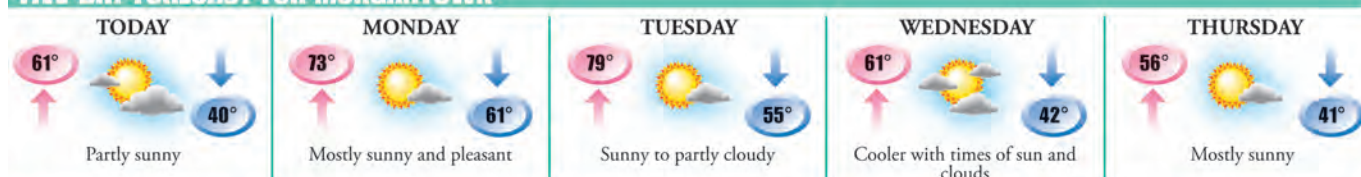

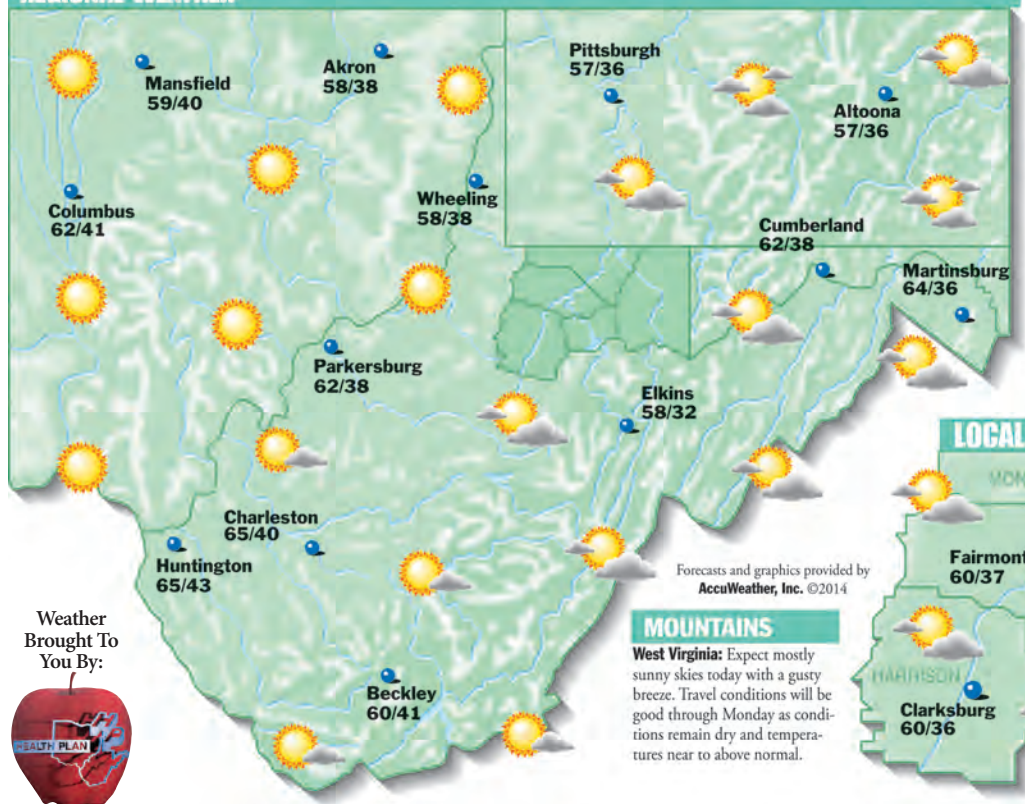

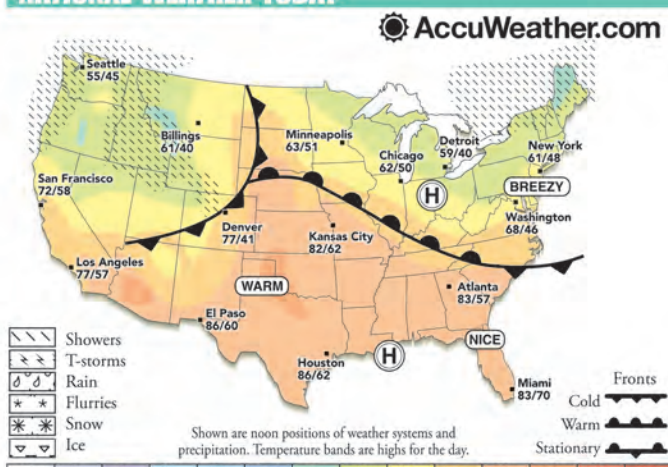

## Water funds at risk

Preston project seeks \$1M OK

KINGWOOD — More than \$2 million in funding for a Rowlesburg water extension project is in jeopardy unless an additional \$1 million grant is approved.

Rowlesburg Mayor Barbara Banister said the project, which would extend the town's water service south of town to the Tucker County line, began in 1999, but stalled when the town had its own water issues.

Those issues have been resolved, she said, "and in 2012, those people came to council again," Banister said. The town now has the water supply to serve the additional customers, she said.

It's just a matter of putting in a storage tank and laying pipe. The line would run from W.Va. 72 where it meets U.S. 50 to Etam and the Tucker County line.

Banister said she met with Robbie Queen, Gov. Earl Ray Tomblin's senior staff member, on Oct. 21, to discuss the project.

Also at the meeting were representatives of the Region VI Planning and Development Council, Clay Riley, of Thrasher Engineering, Delegate Randy Smith, R-Preston, and West Virginia senators Bob Williams, D-Taylor, and Dave Spolt, R-Preston.

The representatives are all on board for the project, Banister said, and will write letters of support.

Some funding is in place — a \$1.5 million loan with a 1 percent interest rate, and a \$1 million grant, both from the West Virginia Infrastructure and Job Development Council (IJDC). But the remaining money, \$1 million in a Small Cities Block Grant (SCBG), requires the governor's approval.

The project was submitted in 2013, but was not approved. Without the additional funding, the IJDC money could go away. "Some of the other moneys will expire next year if the project isn't fully

**Deadline for disaster loans approaches**

CHARLESTON — The deadline approaches for West Virginia small businesses and nonprofit organizations affected by the January water crisis to apply for low-interest federal loans.

The U.S. Small Business Administration said applications for the economic injury loans must be received by Wednesday. Working capital disaster loans of up to \$2 million are available at 2.625 percent for private nonprofits and 4 percent for small businesses, with terms up to 30 years.

The loans are intended to pay debts, payroll and other expenses that could have been paid had the disaster not occurred.

**Charleston police to try body cameras**

CHARLESTON — The Charleston Police Department will join a growing list of law enforcement agencies considering the purchase of body cameras for officers.

State media outlets reported that the department has received one sample camera. Capt. Ted Malone said the depart-

ment will order two more to try out before making a final decision.

Morgantown and Fayette County authorities have ordered cameras. Buckhannon police expect all nine officers to be wearing cameras by early 2015.

Morgantown Police Chief Ed Preston said the body cameras would have been helpful to police responding to the Oct. 18-19 riots after the WVU football victory against Baylor.

**Symposium about safe water slated**

CHARLESTON — A public symposium on water-system safety is set for November, at the University of Charleston.

The panel discussion was organized by Advocates for a Safe Water System, a community organization formed in response to the January chemical spill that contaminated drinking water for about 300,000 West Virginians in nine counties. The event is set for Nov. 6, at the university's Erma Byrd Gallery.

Three experts from the health, utility and environmental fields will offer their insights and answer questions about the safety of West Virginia's water systems and how to improve them.

Breast cancer survivor Dana Dolney said companies shouldn't be allowed to use breast cancer publicity to improve their images.

funded ... if they don't use it," Williams said.

"It's certainly a worthwhile project," he said. "These people are in desperate need of water — they've been hauling water for years," he said. Some have had their water go bad; for others, their wells are dry.

"They're hauling water for household use and for drinking," Williams said.

He said the process of obtaining SCBGs can take a couple of years.

"The issue is there may be \$40 million or \$50 million worth of requests and only \$10 million available."

In Rowlesburg, he said, "there is a need and it is a good project. And this is the second year they've applied."

The process involves projects being ranked by the state Development Office and presented to the

governor for approval.

Williams said he'll write a letter of support for the project. Smith said he will, too.

"I think their chances are pretty good this year," Smith said, "because they were turned down last year. They did everything right, and they have been patient." The way the project was presented to Queen made clear "this wasn't just a case of convenience but necessity."

Banister said more than 100 households have asked to be included in the project, and those households may represent more than 300 people. If the funding is approved, they could have town water within about a year. Williams said Tomblin's decision should come in December or January.

"We're going to send letters and get the federal representatives involved," Smith said. "This isn't about politics. It's about people who need fresh water."

# WHO: Number of Ebola cases passes 10,000

DAKAR, Senegal — More than 10,000 people have been infected with Ebola and nearly half of them have died, according to figures released Saturday by the World Health Organization (WHO). The Ebola epidemic in West Africa is the largest

outbreak of the disease with a rapidly rising death toll in Guinea, Liberia and Sierra Leone. There have also been cases in three other West African countries, Spain and the United States.

The U.N. health agency said Saturday that the number of confirmed, probable and suspected cases has

risen to 10,141. Of those cases, 4,922 people have died. Its figures show about 200 new cases since the last report, four days ago.

Even those grisly tolls are likely an underestimate, WHO warns, as many people in the hardest hit countries have been unable or too frightened to seek

medical care. A shortage of labs capable of handling potentially infected blood samples has also made it difficult to track the outbreak. For example, the latest numbers show no change in Liberia's case toll, suggesting the numbers may be lagging behind reality. On Thursday, authori-

ties confirmed that the disease spread to Mali, the sixth West African country affected, and on the same day, a new case was confirmed in New York, in a doctor who recently returned from Guinea.

Mali had long been considered highly vulnerable to the disease, since it

shares a border with Guinea. The disease arrived there in a 2-year-old, who traveled with her grandmother by bus from Guinea and died Friday.

The toddler, who was bleeding from her nose during the journey, may have had high-risk contact with many people, WHO warned.

### Ebola: N.Y. has guidelines from cases in Dallas

NEW YORK — Talk about a tale of two cities: A Dallas hospital got a pop quiz in Ebola and made an early mistake. New York got a peek at the answer sheet and was better prepared at the start.

The contrast in handling two Ebola diagnoses highlights how differently cities and hospitals prepare for health emergencies.

"The lesson I would take from New York is you have to practice," Dr. Amesh Adalja, a represen-

tative of the Infectious Diseases Society of America. "Preparedness isn't something you just make a plan for and put it on the shelf."

Ebola came to New York via a doctor who had volunteered to treat patients in Ebola-stricken Guinea. Dr. Craig Spencer alerted his aid agency that he had developed a fever, and was taken to Bellevue Hospital Center by specially trained emergency workers wearing protective gear.

In Dallas in September, a hospital initially sent home a sick Thomas Eric Duncan, who had traveled from Liberia and who days later would become the nation's first Ebola diagnosis.

### Ebola-stricken doc a driven do-gooder

NEW YORK — Dr. Craig Spencer, the physician being treated for Ebola in New York City, is the kind of globe-trotting do-gooder who could walk into a small village in Africa and, even though he didn't know the language, win people over through hugs alone, according to people who worked with him.

Even before leaving for Guinea this summer to fight Ebola with Doctors Without Borders, the 33-year-old amassed an ordinary man's lifetime worth of world travel, much of which was in the

service of the poor.

In the past three years alone, Spencer, an attending physician at New York-Presbyterian Hospital/Columbia University Medical Center, had been to Rwanda to work on an emergency care teaching curriculum, volunteered at a health clinic in Burundi, helped investigate an infectious parasitic disease in the Democratic Republic of Congo and traveled to 32 villages in Indonesia to do a public health survey.

"He was never afraid of getting his hands dirty or his feet dirty," said Dr. Deogratias Niyazonkiza, founder of Village Health Works.

### Worker criticizes quarantine process

NEWARK, N.J. — The health care worker who was quarantined at a New Jersey hospital because

she had contact with Ebola patients in West Africa is sharply criticizing the way her case was handled.

Kaci Hickox, the first traveler quarantined under Ebola watches in New Jersey and New York, gave a first-person account to the *Dallas Morning News*.

Hickox said she was stopped at Newark Liberty International and was questioned over several hours after touching down Friday. She said none of those who questioned her would explain what was going on or what would happen to her.

Hickox is a nurse who had been working with Doctors Without Borders in Sierra Leone. Officials said she was taken to a hospital after developing a fever.

She tested negative for Ebola in a preliminary evaluation. Hospital officials would not say whether she would remain in the hospital for the entire 21-day, state-ordered quarantine period or be moved.

### U.S. journalist says body was 'at war'

PROVIDENCE, R.I. — Ashoka Mukpo knew he really was in trouble when he saw the people treating him in full suits and hoods.

The American video journalist is home now after recovering from Ebola. In an interview with The Associated Press, he described the fear he felt when medical workers appeared at his bedside in the heavy duty gear needed to prevent the spread of the deadly infection.

Mukpo said he felt as if his body was "at war" with the virus: He was in pain and weak, he had a fever that went as high as 104 degrees, it was hard to walk and eat, and he lost 15 pounds in a week. Mukpo isn't sure how he contracted Ebola because he said he was careful while filming.

# Teacher tried to stop Washington state shooting

TULALIP, Wash. — A recently hired teacher confronted a gunman and was being hailed as a hero Saturday after a deadly shooting rampage in the cafeteria of a Washington state high school.

Social studies teacher Megan Silberberger intervened in the attack Friday at Marysville-Pilchuck High

School, teachers union president Randy Davis said.

The teacher intercepted the gunman as he paused, possibly trying to reload, student Erick Cervantes told KIRO-TV.

"I'm completely amazed by her actions and I feel for her," Davis told The Associated Press. "I don't know why she was in the cafeteria but I'm just grateful

she was there."

The attacker killed one girl Friday and seriously wounded four others — including two of his cousins — before he died of what police said was a self-inflicted wound.

However, it wasn't clear if the shooter committed suicide or if he accidentally shot himself in the struggle with the teacher.

A school resource officer al-

so ran to the scene, Davis said.

The shooter was Jaylen Fryberg, a popular freshman, a government official with direct knowledge of the shooting told The Associated Press. The official spoke on condition of anonymity because he was not authorized to speak to the media.

Students and parents said Fryberg was a member of a prominent family from

the nearby Tulalip Indian tribes and a freshman who played on the high school football team. He was introduced at a football game as a prince in the 2014 Homecoming court.

Fryberg left months of troubling messages on social media, and friends said he'd recently been in a fight over a girl. One of his tweets said, "It breaks me ... It

actually does ..."

The tight-knit Native American community on scenic Puget Sound struggled to cope with the tragedy.

Davis said he spoke briefly with Silberberger, who was traumatized. The Marysville School District released a statement from her saying that she is grateful for all the support, but wishes to have privacy at this time.

### Ukraine pauses before elections in parliament

MARIUPOL, Ukraine — Ukraine braced for decisive parliamentary elections Saturday against the backdrop of unrest in eastern regions roiled by conflict between government troops and pro-Russian separatist forces.

Campaigning material was being taken down across the country in line with election laws ahead of a vote today that pollsters said will be dominated by President Petro Poroshenko's party.

Parliament is seen changing composition completely with the former ruling party of ex-President Viktor Yanukovich, who was ousted by a street revolt in February, set to disappear from the legislature.

Speaking in a televised address Saturday, Poroshenko said the election would lead to a "full reset of power" and enable the formation of a reform-minded legislature.

### 26 dead in Zambia boat accident

LUSAKA, Zambia — At least 26 people, most of them children, died when a crowded boat capsized in Zambia while on the way to a national celebration,

police said Saturday.

Among the drowned in Friday's accident were school children aged from six to 15 years, as well as a baby. The state broadcaster said 23 of those who died were children. One student survived.

They were traveling to another school across Lake Kariba, in the south of the country. They were meant to participate in celebrations marking the 50th anniversary of the southern African nation's independence from Britain.

Military and police divers were sent to the lake to retrieve the bodies.

### Mussolini shelter opens to tourists

ROME — A Roman villa's wine cellar, which was converted into an air raid shelter for Benito Mussolini and the Italian dictator's family, opened its anti-gas, double steel doors to tourists Saturday.

Visitors, at a preview Saturday, saw the iron-rung ladder used for emergency exits and a rusting contraption to purify air in case of a gas attack.

### Israeli says 'crisis' in U.S. relationship

JERUSALEM — A top Israeli minister said there is a "crisis" in the country's relations with the United States that must be fixed.

Finance Minister Yair Lapid's comments Saturday came a day after U.S. officials said the Obama administration refused Israeli Defense Minister Moshe Yaalon's requests to meet several top national security aides.

The White House and the State Department rejected Israeli proposals for meetings with Vice President Joe Biden, National Security Adviser Susan Rice and Secretary of State John Kerry on his five-day trip to the United States.

## Iran hangs woman for fatally stabbing suspected rapist; says attack was planned

TEHRAN, Iran — Iran hanged a woman Saturday who was convicted of murdering a man she said was trying to rape her, drawing swift international condemnation for a prosecution several countries described as flawed.

Reyhaneh Jabbari was hanged at dawn for premeditated murder, the official IRNA news agency reported. It quoted a statement issued by the Tehran Prosecutor Office on Saturday that rejected the claim of attempted rape and said that

all evidence proved that Jabbari had plotted to kill Morteza Abdolali Sarbandi, a former intelligence agent.

The United Nations, as well as Amnesty International, and other human rights groups had called on Iran's judiciary to halt the execution, which was carried out after the country's Supreme Court upheld the verdict. The victim's family could have saved Jabbari's life by accepting blood money but they refused to do so.

According to her 2009 sentencing, Jabbari, 27,

stabbed Sarbandi in the back in 2007 after purchasing a knife two days earlier.

"The knife had been used on the back of the deceased, indicating the murder was not self-defense," the agency quoted the court ruling as saying.

Britain, Germany, and a group of European parliamentarians, among others, condemned the execution, as did the United States.

"There were serious concerns with the fairness of the trial," State Department spokeswoman Jen Psaki said in a statement.

**Lebanon brawls kill 5 and wound more than 12**

BEIRUT — Lebanese troops battled Islamic militants in the northern city of Tripoli for a second day Saturday, with five people killed and more than a dozen wounded in the clashes, the Lebanese army and state media said. An army statement said troops surrounded the gunmen, exchanging fire and wounding several of them. It said it also had detained some of the fighters and seized weapons and ammunition, although some gunmen were able to flee the area.

The fighting came two days after troops killed three militants and detained a local leader in a raid in the northern Din-

niyeh region. One of the three killed was Abdul-Qadir Akkoui, a Lebanese soldier who announced in a video released this month that he had defected and joined the Islamic State group, the army said.

**Canada reopens Parliament Hill area**

OTTAWA, Ontario — Canadians returned to the reopened grounds of Parliament Hill on Saturday, just three days after a gunman shot and killed a soldier at the national war memorial and then stormed Parliament before he was gunned down.

House Speaker Andrew Scheer said tours of Parliament will resume Monday, but visitors can expect to see a heightened Royal Canadian Mounted Police presence at building entrances. Counseling ses-

sions will be provided for Commons staff, he said.

On Wednesday, Zehaf-Bibeau, 32, shot to death Cpl. Nathan Cirillo, 24, who was assigned to the honor guard at the national war memorial. Zehaf-Bibeau was eventually gunned down inside Parliament by the sergeant-at-arms of the House of Commons, Kevin Vickers.

Zehaf-Bibeau's motive remains unknown, but Prime Minister Stephen Harper has called the shooting a terror attack, and the bloodshed raised fears that Canada is suffering reprisals for joining the U.S.-led air campaign against Islamic State extremists in Iraq and Syria.

**Extremists' numbers growing in Germany**

BERLIN — The number of Islamic extremists in Germany is growing rapidly, the head of the country's domestic intelligence agency said Saturday.

The agency estimates that some 6,300 people in Germany are adherents of an ultraconservative strain of Islam known as Salafism, Hans-Georg Maassen told public broadcaster rbb-Inforadio. In Germany, all Salafis are considered Islamic extrem-

ists and on the radar of the security services, though other groups are also monitored if they are determined to be a threat to the state or democratic order.

Maassen said the number of Salafis could rise to 7,000 by the end of the year, compared to about 3,800 three years ago.

Extremist strands of Islam provide disaffected young people with a sense of belonging and purpose that allows them to hope they'll go "from being underdogs to top dogs," he said.

**New attack launched on Syria border town**

MURSITPINAR, Turkey — Fighters from the Islamic State group launched a new offensive Saturday, on the northern Syrian town of Kobani, after shelling the area from their positions nearby, activists and a Kurdish official said.

Heavy fighting took place in Kobani and many mortar shells were fired into the town. Machine-gun fire could be clearly heard from inside the town where black smoke was billowing.

The U.S. Central Command said an airstrike destroyed an IS artillery piece near Kobani. In the afternoon, warplanes of the U.S.-led coalition could

be heard flying over Kobani.

Idriss Nassan, a senior official in Kobani, said the fighting concentrated on the southern and eastern edges of the town, also known as Ayn Arab.

"They think they can enter the city and these are just dreams," Nassan told The Associated Press by telephone adding that IS fighters have not been able to take Kobani despite more than a month of attacks.

**Women on front lines in Syria, Iraq vs. IS**

SURUC, Turkey — Just over a year ago, Afshin Kobani was a teacher. Now, the Kurdish Syrian woman traded the classroom for the front lines in the battle for Kobani, a town besieged by fighters from the Islamic State extremist group.

The 28-year-old Kurdish fighter, who uses a nom de guerre, said she decided to join the fight in her hometown when she saw IS advances in Syria.

"I lost many friends to this, and I decided there was a need to join up," said Kobani, who declined to reveal her birth name. "This is our land — our own — and if we don't do it, who else will?"

Perched on the other side of the Turkish border, the Syrian town of Kobani has been under an intense assault by IS for more than a month. The town — surrounded on the east, south and west by IS — is being defended by Kurdish forces in Syria.

**Egypt: Foreign cash behind Sinai attack**

CAIRO — Egypt's President Abdel-Fattah el-Sissi said Saturday that an assault on an army checkpoint in the Sinai Peninsula that killed 31 troops was a "foreign-funded operation" and vowed to take drastic action against militants.

In thundering remarks delivered before cameras ahead of a military funeral for the slain troops, el-Sissi said there are foreign powers that want to "break the back of Egypt," without elaborating. He vowed to take drastic measures to uproot the militants and said Egypt is engaged in an "extensive war" that will last a long time.

**Marine dies after noncombat incident**


WASHINGTON — The Pentagon said a Marine who died Thursday in a noncombat incident in Baghdad was the second U.S. military death associated with the campaign against the Islamic State group in Iraq and Syria.

The Marine was identified as Lance Cpl. Sean P. Neal, 19, of Riverside, Calif. The Pentagon isn't providing more details and said it's investigating.

On Oct. 2, the Navy said a Marine who ejected from an MV-22 Osprey aircraft over the Persian Gulf was presumed lost at sea. That was the first death associated with the fight against IS.

Punter **Nick O'Toole** was one of the few players to even say the word "bowl" during WVU's postgame interviews, and even that was only to reaffirm Holgorsen's statement.

"This would be the first bowl game I've ever gone to, which would be great, but coach Holgorsen said that he doesn't want to hear anything about us being bowl eligible and that he doesn't want to hear anything about rankings," O'Toole said. "We have a top 10 team (TCU) coming to Morgantown next week and we have to focus on that."

Seeing TCU looming on the schedule certainly had a sobering effect on WVU's post-victory euphoria. The No. 10 Horned Frogs crushed Texas Tech, 82-27, on Saturday. TCU averaged 60 points in its past three wins.

The Horned Frogs are a formidable opponent, but don't count on the Mountaineers backing down from a challenge.

This past week, Holgorsen made a point of saying that his players weren't going to be satisfied with the team's 5-2 start to the season. That mentality was one of the reasons I had so much confidence in WVU's ability to win in a hostile environment in Stillwater.

And it's one of the biggest reasons not to count the Mountaineers out as they prepare to face their fourth Top 25 opponent of the season.

WVU isn't just happy to be here. The Mountaineers aren't simply content with beating their 2013 win total. The team has bigger goals than simply making a bowl. WVU is out to prove that it is better than good. The Mountaineers want to be elite.

"We're not finished," wide receiver **Mario Alford** said. "We want to win-out from here. We're excited, but we have a couple more in front of us. We want to win the Big 12: That's our goal right now."

Congratulations on the win. Now get back to work.

STILLWATER, Okla. — Wendell Smallwood had a pretty good idea how Oklahoma State would try to corral the WVU offense in Saturday's Big 12 Conference game.

"We figured they were going to try and stop the passing," the Mountaineers' sophomore running back said.

With a star receiver like WVU's Kevin White on the field, who could blame them?

Certainly not Smallwood and his fellow backs.

"It opened it up for all the running backs," Smallwood said. "We knew we could run the ball into a five-man box. We just took advantage of it."

Smallwood racked up a career-high 132 yards, and the No. 22 Mountaineers registered 210 on the ground in their 34-10 victory, before a Boone Pickens Stadium crowd of 59,124.

Dreamius Smith collected 72 yards and a touchdown, as WVU (6-2, 4-1 Big 12) earned its fourth straight win and clinched a bowl berth with four games remaining.

WVU played without running back starter Rushel Shell, who suffered a foot injury in the first quarter of the Oct. 18 Baylor game.

"Oh, man, I'm just proud of those guys to stay in it and understand the situation and be the next man up," WVU running backs coach Ja'Juan Seider said. "I couldn't be more proud of Wendell and the way he fought."

Smallwood sustained an ankle injury in the Baylor game and missed nearly half the game. He did not practice Thursday of this week but answered the call Saturday.

"He ran the way Rushel ran," Seider said. "He set the tone for those guys."

# Fall a good time to take kids angling for panfish

ONCE LABOR DAY arrives, too many people forget about fishing, especially fishing for panfish.

These are bluegills, crappie, sunfish, etc. Some people may blame the Division of Natural Resources (DNR) for this, since we open squirrel season much earlier than before, but what a great way to spend a Saturday with your kids. Get up early and hunt squirrels and then fish. When late afternoon comes, hit the woods again for more squirrels if you haven't killed your limit in the morning.

Going after bluegills is a great way to teach a kid to fly fish. Use a 7- to 9-foot rod that's made to cast 4- to 6-weight line. A weight-forward or double taper line works the best with a 3- to 6-pound test tippet on 7- to 9-foot taper leaders.

A pond is a great place to start a kid out casting a fly line. Accuracy is not as important as

it is on the moving water of a stream. Even if they don't make a good cast, they may still catch a fish. It's a great way to teach them to "set the hook."

In the spring and summer, we see lots of bluegills and crappies around docks and in shallow water next to the bank near weeds. However, in the early fall, they move to deeper water. This is especially true of the bigger ones. Then, as the temperature cools, they move into the shallower water. Since they feed by sight, fishing in the middle of the day can be very productive at this time of year. Hence, hunt

squirrels, fish and hunt again. When winter comes, they are back in the deep water until spring and the spawn begins.

What type of bait should you use? Crappies like larger baits because they have much bigger mouths than bluegills. When using artificial bait for bluegills, choose something that is white, pink or chartreuse. Spinner baits and small, soft plastic jigs work well.

Live bait is also an excellent choice. Worms and nightcrawlers work great, but remember to use only enough of the worm to cover the hook because the bluegill has a small mouth. Grasshoppers and crickets are also great baits. But if you want to use them now, you'd better hurry because the freezing temperatures are just about here, and that means no hoppers.

No matter what type of live bait you're using, a thin wire hook with a long shank works best. When using a grasshopper,

thread it on the hook from head to tail with the hook sticking out of the tail. This way, it's almost impossible for the fish to eat any part of the bait without grabbing the hook. Using this method does kill the hopper. If you don't want to kill it, just run the hook through the lower section of the abdomen. The longer shank hook is also easier to remove from the fish's mouth.

Bluegills and crappies are great eating and, of course, the bigger, the better and the easier they are to clean.

Where do you find the big ones? In a body of water that has fewer numbers of panfish. People often ask me why this is true. It's simple. The fewer the number of fish, the more each of them has to eat. A body of water will only support so many pounds of fish. The larger the number of fish, the smaller they will be. The same thing is true of deer: When their numbers get too high, the smaller they are because of the limited amount of food on a given area of land.

I have trouble convincing people who fish in my ponds to keep or throw out fish they catch. However, I have a few giant catfish and some very large bass that help keep the bluegill and crappie populations down. I've been known to fill a couple of 5-gallon buckets with bluegills and take them to the woods to feed the "critters."

# Bumgarner faces Shields again in Game 5 today

**KANSAS CITY** and San Francisco played Game 4 late Saturday. The game ended past deadline.

**SAN FRANCISCO** — When it came down to it, the San Francisco Giants decided that having a fully rested Madison Bumgarner start-

ing one game was preferable than trying to send him out twice on short rest.

So Bumgarner will take his sterling postseason resume into Game 5 of the World Series tonight on his usual four days' rest, when the Giants take on James Shields and the Kansas City Royals, in the final game of the season in San Francisco.

That decision allowed Ryan Vogelsong to start Game 4 on Saturday, with Jake Peavy and Tim Hud-

son set to start the final two games if the Series goes seven. Bumgarner would be available in relief in Game 7 if necessary.

"I don't think at this point we should push Madison either," manager Bruce Bochy said. "Then you're going to ask him to go on another three days. So we're keeping things in order because of how well all of our starters have thrown."

A report surfaced during Game 3 on Friday that

Bumgarner told his teammates he demanded to pitch on short rest for Game 4 for the first time of his career.

Bumgarner forcefully denied the report Saturday and said he just prepared to be ready whenever Bochy needed him.

"It sounds like I'm trying to run the team, which I'm certainly not," he said. "That's no good that that got out there somehow. It doesn't make any sense to me why that would happen.

I never said anything to anyone about anything. We knew that was an option, and I'm prepared where I would be ready for Game 4 or 5 or any of them. That's just ridiculous."

The Giants trailed the Series, 2-1, heading into Saturday night's game.

Bumgarner is the ace on the Giants' staff with Matt Cain sidelined by injury and two-time Cy Young winner Tim Lincecum relegated to the bullpen.

He backed that up by going 18-10 with a 2.98 ERA during the season, but it has been in October when Bumgarner is usually at his best. He allowed one run in seven innings to get the win in Game 1 against Kansas City and is 6-3 with a 2.54 ERA in 11 career postseason appearances.

He pitched a four-hit shutout to beat Pittsburgh in the wild-card playoff and went 7 2/3 scoreless innings to win Game 1 of the NLCS.

## Dawson leads Champions AT&T tourney by a stroke

## WVU corrals Oklahoma State

### Four downs with WVU football

STILLWATER, Okla. — Believe it or not, the sense of calm that typically surrounds the No. 22-ranked WVU football team sometimes unnerves the coaches.

“Some of our coaches are like, ‘Why are you guys so calm?’” nose tackle Kyle Rose said. “I think we have a business-like approach to games now.”

“We’ve been through every experience, every adversity. I don’t think there’s anything that fazes us.”

The Mountaineers broke open a seven-point game with 17 fourth-quarter points en route to a 34-10 Big 12 Conference victory, against Oklahoma State, on Saturday afternoon. “I’m obviously excited for our coaches and players to come to Stillwater and get a victory,” WVU coach Dana Holgorsen said after his team’s fourth straight Big 12 win.

“There wasn’t anything easy about it. It was a lot more challenging than what the final score indicated. I think everybody agrees with that.”

### Four plays that Defined the game

**Running the football**  
Oklahoma State was determined to do everything it could to make sure Kevin White and the Mountaineers’ receivers did not beat them. They limited White to three catches, 27 yards and one touchdown.

Where the Cowboys didn’t fare so well was in their run defense, particularly in the second half.

Behind 132 yards from Wendell Smallwood, the Mountaineers piled up 210 yards on the ground. Dreamius Smith gained 72 yards.

“We have great backs,” White said. “Whenever they touch the ball, they always try to make the most of it. They’ve been doing a great job so far.”

### Third-down defense stifles Cowboys

WVU’s defense figured to have more than it could handle in trying to repeat the third-down feat it pulled

off against Baylor a week ago.

The then-No. 4 Bears went an anemic 3-for-16 on third downs in their 41-27 loss, at Milan Puskar Stadium.

WVU’s defense met the challenge once again on third down, as Oklahoma State converted just two of its 15 opportunities.

“It looked like we were playing defense,” Holgorsen said with a smile. “It looked like we mixed it up. Sometimes we’d blitz on third down and sometimes we’d drop everything. It keeps them off balance.”

### Coming up with turnovers

The Mountaineers’ inability to force turnovers has been a season-long sore subject with the coaching staff.

WVU came up with two in Saturday’s victory, courtesy of true freshman safety Dravon Henry.

Henry intercepted two Daxx Garman passes. He returned the second pick 52 yards for a fourth-quarter touchdown that sealed the win, with 4:44 remaining.

“The whole defense is playing good,” Holgorsen said. “To get two turnovers in a game and one of them actually score? That was like, ‘Wow!’ I didn’t think I was ever going to see it again, to be quite honest with you.”

### Keeping Tyreek Hill in check

Oklahoma State’s star “athlete,”

as he is listed on the Cowboys’ roster, quickly became a major focal point for WVU’s defense and special teams in preparing for Saturday’s contest.

He registered 123 all-purpose yards Saturday, but the Mountaineers kept him out of the end zone. Five of Mike Molinari’s seven kickoffs were touchbacks. Nick O’Toole placed five of his seven punts inside the 20. Hill had just 5 punt-return yards.

“Both Nick O’Toole on the punt team and Mike Molinari on the kickoff team probably deserve a few game balls for keeping the ball away from No. 24 (Hill),” Holgorsen said. “He’s pretty dynamic.”

### Inside the numbers

4 — That’s the Mountaineers’ winning streak. The last time they did that was in 2012.

6 — The number of WVU victories this season, which qualifies it for a bowl game. The Mountaineers won only four games a year ago in missing out on bowl season for the first time since 2001.

8 — Quarterback Clint Trickett has thrown a touchdown pass in all eight of the Mountaineers’ games this season and in nine straight games dating to the 2013 campaign.

### Overheard

### PASSING DEFENSE

**A** WVU limited the Cowboys to 242 passing yards, marking the fourth time in the past five games that the Mountaineers have held an opponent below 250. Freshman safety Dravon Henry notched his first career interception, in the first quarter, and put an exclamation point on WVU’s win when he returned his second interception of the afternoon 52 yards for a touchdown. The Mountaineers also recorded two sacks and had four quarterback hurries against Daxx Garman.

### RUSHING DEFENSE

**A-** The Mountaineers gave up 194 yards on the ground, but a good chunk of that came on just a handful of plays. Brandon Sheperd tallied the Cowboys’ longest rush of the season (51 yards), while Tyreek Hill,

Desmond Roland and Garman all had carries of at least 13. But WVU’s defense held when it mattered most. The Mountaineers held OSU without a third-down conversion until the fourth quarter and didn’t allow a rushing touchdown for the first time this season against an FBS opponent.

### RUSHING OFFENSE

**A** Running the ball was going to be a key to winning this game, and the Mountaineers came through in a major way. Wendell Smallwood racked up a career-high 132 yards, and Dreamius Smith added 72, as WVU collected 210 yards on the ground. The Mountaineers made Oklahoma State pay for double-teaming star wideout Kevin White.

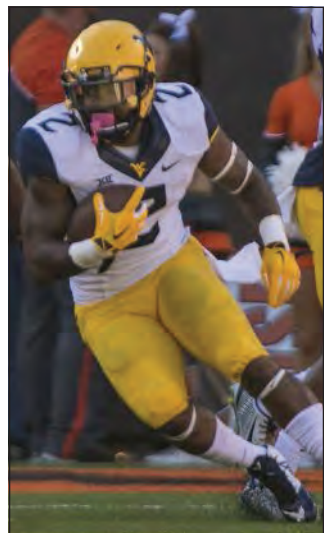
### PASSING OFFENSE

By their standards, the Mountaineers’ 238-yard passing day

was merely pedestrian. Mario Alford caught seven balls for 136 yards and a touchdown. Clint Trickett did not continually force the ball into double coverage. WVU relied on its running game to emerge with this victory.

### SPECIAL TEAMS

**A** Hill entered the game as one of OSU’s most feared weapons, but WVU neutralized the Cowboys’ electric return man. Hill totaled 19 yards in the return game thanks to kicker Mike Molinari, punter Nick O’Toole and the Mountaineers’ coverage units. O’Toole had a long punt of 56 yards (his sixth of 50-plus yards this season) and pinned OSU inside the 20 five times. Kicker Josh Lambert connected on both field goal attempts (39 and 43 yards) to move into fourth place on WVU’s single-season list, with 18.

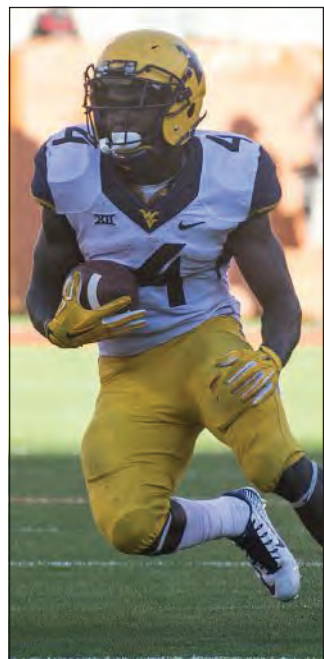

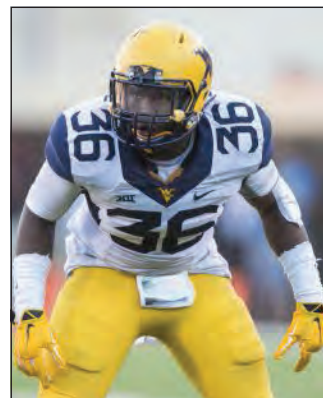

# WVU prepped for a hot time in Stillwater

STILLWATER, Okla. — WVU quarterback Clint Trickett couldn't believe it.

Neither could many of his teammates.

The Mountaineers' coaches warned the players all week how hot it was going to be in Stillwater on Saturday.

To prepare, WVU practiced at the Caperton Indoor Facility on Tuesday and Wednesday, with the heat cranked up.

"We were like, 'Dude, it isn't going to be that hot out there,'" Trickett said with a laugh.

Turns out they were wrong. The temperature was 89 degrees at kickoff, and the players said it felt like 110 degrees on the field.

"It was 15 degrees hotter than the indoor (facility)," Trickett said.

After Saturday's 34-10 victory, the players were counting their blessings for having practiced indoors with the heat.

"It helped us a lot," said sophomore running back Wendell Smallwood, who ran for a career-and game-high 132 yards.

WVU running backs coach Ja'Juan Seider said it made all the difference for his charges.

"You talk about the little things," he said. "I think doing the little things throughout the week helped us. You can never simulate [the heat]. We had it hot in there. I don't care what you say. That felt like August and South Florida heat. It was hot. Our kids felt it."

"That's one thing about this team: Being resilient and overcoming obstacles because it was hot. It was hot for them too. We had to finish."

### Happy birthday, Dravon

Freshman safety Dravon Henry turned 19 years old Friday. He celebrated Saturday.

Henry picked off OSU quarterback Daxx Garman in the first

quarter and grabbed his second of the interception of the day in the fourth, tying cornerback Daryl Worley for the top spot among the Mountaineers' defenders.

"It's what we've all been waiting for, for [Henry] to make the big play," Worley said. "We all

knew that he had it in him. Today it was just pulled out of him. He was the best defensive back on the field, hands down. Big-time players make big plays. And that's what he did."

Henry, who wasn't made available due to head coach Dana Hol-

gorsen's team rules preventing freshmen from speaking with the media, also scored his first career touchdown against the Cowboys. He returned his fourth-quarter interception 52 yards for a score, becoming the first WVU player since Darwin Cook (2013) to

record a pick-six. Henry also became the first Mountaineer to log two interceptions in a game since Brodrick Jenkins, against Rutgers, in 2011.

"He's a kid who works so hard," WVU defensive coordinator Tony Gibson said of Henry. "He wants to be great. He studies film and works at practice. [Safeties coach Joe] DeForest told me Thursday after practice that Dravon was going to have a big game, that he's really worked hard this week."

"Baylor a week ago was his best day, until today. That was a good birthday present for him."

### Shaq attack

Defensive end Shaq Riddick's fourth-quarter sack of Garman marked Riddick's fourth sack in WVU's past two games. Riddick, who recorded three against Baylor, has six sacks on the season, tying Will Clarke's team-leading total from 2013. Riddick is also tied for No. 24 on WVU's season sack list.

### TCU may be missing two

The Fort Worth Star-Telegram reported that TCU's leading receiver Josh Doctson left Saturday's 82-27 rout of Texas Tech on crutches because of a foot injury, and safety Chris Hackett was ejected for fighting — likely leaving the Horned Frogs without both players for at least the start of this week's game at WVU.

Doctson, who caught two touchdown passes in the first half, appeared to have his right foot or ankle turned under a tackle on a catch for a first-and-goal in the third quarter. He went to the locker room on crutches.

Hackett was called for punching on the Tech sideline following Sam Carter's interception for TCU, late in the third quarter. The ejection means the junior weak safety will have to sit out the first half of the WVU game.

Smallwood was adamant about not being stopped. To be at his best, he did his best to stay hydrated before the game in oppressive 89-degree heat.

He may have overdone it, though.

"I drank too much before the game, so my stomach was crazy full," Smallwood said. "I knew it was going to come up in a matter of time. I just kept drinking, and it kept coming back up."

When Smallwood hit the field, he hit the holes and kept bouncing around for even more yardage. The Mountaineers weren't shy about calling his number.

"I think the more I get the ball, the better I get," he said. "I was getting kind of tired, but I kept going. The more carries, the more yards. I liked it."

The Cowboys and their double-coverage held White to a season-low three catches for 27 yards and a touchdown. They paid a price for not having more defenders in the box.

WVU's pack of four running backs delivered the punishment for that strategy.

"Giving those guys the ball when they are dropping nine people is something that makes sense to me, so we're going to continue to do it," WVU coach Dana Holgorsen said. "If they crowd the box, we'll probably throw it."

The Mountaineers were particularly effective running the ball in third-down situations.

WVU converted 50 percent (9 of 18) of its third-down plays.

Holgorsen wasn't afraid to run the ball on third-and-long plays.

"We saw something there we could take advantage of," he said. "I know the chatter. I know what people say. It's something I felt was the best thing to do."

"Believe it or not, we try to call plays on third down

that work. We saw a few things we would be able to get. Dreamius made a couple of great runs on third down. Those are some of our better players."

The third-down success not only kept drives alive but

also allowed the defense to rest on the sideline. That was critical in Saturday's heat.

"There was a point where we kind of had to help the defense out," said quarterback Clint Trickett, who completed 21 of 30 passes for 238 yards and two touchdowns.

"Either we were scoring too fast or it was three-and-out. Those (third-down runs) definitely helped."

Trickett said the Mountaineers had to come together after their 85-yard rushing effort in the first half and demand more of themselves.

"We ran the ball better in the second half," he said. "We were running it the first half, and in the second quarter when we got up, we just weren't running it very well."

"We'd get three yards and be in third-and-long and we'd have to convert. Sometimes we did. Some-

times we didn't. The second half we really got in there, everyone was focused and there was a lot of energy."

"Everybody was going to be tired. We were like, 'Let's be tired after a win.' We got some energy and were able to come out rejuvenated in the second half and were able to run the ball."

Smith put a fitting exclamation point on the game, when he broke loose for a 40-yard run and WVU's final touchdown, with 3:12 to play.

Smith, who hails from Wichita, was playing in front of 52 family and friends, who cheered wildly near the WVU sideline as Smith cross the goal line.

"It was great to have Dreamius come back," Trickett said. "With Rushel out, we needed other guys to step up. We've always had a committee of backs. That's just what happens."

ed just six plays.

"That really saved us the game," Gibson said. "They were 3-of-20 on third and fourth downs. I'm happy with the way we played."

The Mountaineers consistently put Oklahoma State in third-and-long situations, with the Cowboys needing an average of 8.3 yards in order to convert.

"The good thing about our third-down package is that we're doing a good job on first and second down," defensive lineman Kyle Rose said.

"We're getting them into long third-down situations, which forces them to make high-impact decisions. We have a good 'nickel' package and we get to the quarterback a lot. If we're rush-

ing three and dropping eight, the guys do a good job in coverage. And we're trying to get home with three."

Both of Oklahoma State's turnovers came in similar situations. WVU freshman safety Dravon Henry snared his first career interception when OSU quarterback Daxx Garman took a shot on second-and-15 in the first quarter. Henry struck again in the fourth quarter, intercepting Garman on third-and-10 and returning it 48 yards for a touchdown.

Henry's pick-six blew the

game open, giving the Mountaineers a 27-10 lead with less than five minutes to play.

"We emphasize getting off the field, working hard on third downs and making a stop," sophomore cornerback Daryl Worley said. "When we get off the field, it means our offense is coming on the field — and we know they're going to put points on the board. So on third down we just emphasize doing your job. As

long as we do that, we're going to be good."

The Mountaineers have been better than good. The team entered Saturday's contest ranked No. 25 nationally in third-down defense, holding opponents to a percentage of .327. They dropped that to .304 following the win against OSU. That could be good enough to push WVU inside the top 15 in third-down defense.

"It was a combination of things," cornerbacks coach Brian Mitchell said, when asked about WVU's third-down success. "Gibson kept [OSU] off balance and our kids were really straining

on third down. They were 3-for-20 if you include fourth down, too. It goes back to the collective. It's not just the secondary: It's the front, it's the linebackers, it's everyone doing their part."

## County has to respond

Alarm on funding VFDs requires urgent solution

Whenever you hear sirens screaming to a fire, it's often no more than a distraction.

Unless it's your property or life on the line.

Or you're the volunteer firefighter risking your life to save someone else's or their property.

In early May, the Monongalia County Volunteer Fire Companies' Association (VFCA) presented a new funding proposal to the County Commission.

Almost six months later, that proposal, which would have imposed a fee of 38 cents on every \$1,000 of a county resident's tax bill, appears to have crashed and burned. Most of that time was spent waiting for the prosecuting attorney's office to issue an opinion on the proposal.

Now, it appears that opinion has set off another alarming proposal — any fire fee will require creation of a county fire board.

The fire board would have control of all revenues and the authority to create fire districts, and most of its members would not be members of volunteer fire departments (VFDs).

"This letter (the opinion) has added as many questions as answers, but at least we've got direction," is how one commissioner described it.

Though we're inclined to agree with the first part of that statement, we question the direction part.

We're not in the business of assuming things, but we doubt Monongalia County's 12 VFDs will agree to give up local control to gain additional funding.

If memory serves, this concept of a countywide fire board was tried once before and was met with a lukewarm response then, too.

Like many questions at every level of government, this issue is complicated. For now, VFDs get \$20,000 annually from our county and another \$40,000-\$50,000 from a state tax on insurance policies to subsidize VFDs.

Imposing a fire fee on all county residents, including Morgantown residents who already pay a fire fee, will be a tough sell. A county fire board also appears dead on arrival.

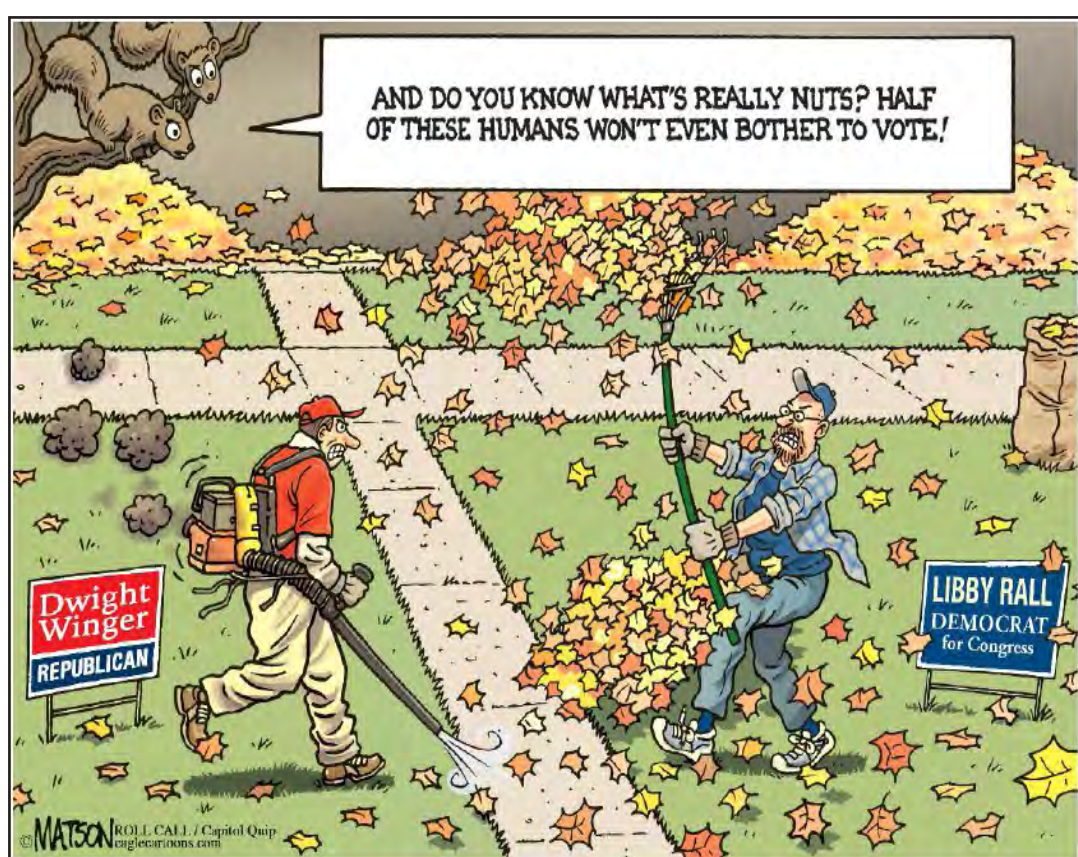
Yet, this issue cannot afford to be put on warm for another six months without any real movement toward a solution.

It's not a political issue, though some might want to think so. It's not a seasonal issue, either, such as maintaining our roads.

What it is, is a life-and-death issue no one wants to think about until something terrible happens.

The County Commission must find a way to at least double its appropriation to county VFDs and not simply indulge in wishful thinking to find another \$240,000 for them.

If we close our eyes and ears to those sirens, it'll just lure us to an even greater disaster.



## Thank you Mr. Bradlee for all of it

**DID THE FIRST AMENDMENT** ever have a more stylish defender — and one who made more effective use of it — than Ben Bradlee?

The legendary managing editor of *The Washington Post* who died Tuesday at 93, Bradlee's 23 years at the helm were marked by landmark collisions between a free press and government, from the Pentagon Papers to reporting on Watergate. He also weathered criticism that he was too close to one-time Georgetown neighbor John F. Kennedy to be an objective journalist, and too removed from a story by a young reporter, Janet Cooke, that resulted in a returned Pulitzer Prize.

With style and wit, and without apology, Bradlee championed a free press as a watchdog on government.

"Obviously the First Amendment is the cornerstone of our business and of democracy," he said in a 2006 interview at the Newseum. "It isn't something that I commit to memory and say like my prayers, but it has a place in my day-to-day life. It is the freedom that allows us to do good work. It allows us to be important in society."

Americans generally take their First Amendment rights for granted, Bradlee continued. I know they do ... and that's great. That means we're doing something right."

Even so, Bradlee said, there was strength in his belief that "freedom of the press is ingrained in American society. A president comes and tries to do something, and in the process, tramples on the First Amendment. He gets brought up short and doesn't make a fuss about it. They all cave. And that's good. The Pentagon Papers was a once-in-a-lifetime fight over the First Amendment. But it was worth the fight. You got to draw the line, and you can't let them cross it."

Bradlee's courage in holding government accountable is the stuff of myth — and fact. After reviewing a particularly significant bit of reporting by *Post* reporters Bob Woodward and Carl Bernstein that implicated Attorney General John Mitchell and President Richard M. Nixon in Watergate wrongdoing, Bradlee recounted the high stakes involved, and then reportedly said, "You had better be right." As it turned out, they were.

His gruff manner, aristocratic bearing and journalistic independence grated on some, to be sure. But his career embodied what the founders must have had in mind in building into the basic laws of this nation such a strong protection for a free press: An unflagging, unabashed passion for finding the truth, and an enthusiasm and commitment to telling it to one's fellow citizens.

And for all of that, thank you, Mr. Bradlee.

# Ghosts not listed

Fear survey: Majority believe crime rates up despite reality

**JUST IN TIME FOR HALLOWEEN** a new poll asks what Americans fear most. It isn't zombies or ghosts. These lists of fears and concerns are more than entertainment. They are a window into how we view the dangers in our lives.

Researchers at Chapman University, in southern California, conducted a lengthy survey of adults from across the country. They then organized the responses into four areas of fear or concern: Personal fears, crime, natural disasters and what they called fear factors in which researchers tried to figure out who has what fears and why.

In general, Americans think crime rates are climbing, when in fact they've been declining for about 20 years. (The decline has been dramatic, but some crimes have increased in the past couple of years, though not to 1990s levels. The recent upticks aren't a trend yet, but might affect perceptions of safety.) And most Americans, while concerned about natural disasters, aren't prepared for the very real dangers posed by them.

Law-enforcement data show the country getting safer over the past two decades as rates for violent crime declined, or for some crimes remained flat, but a majority of surveyed Americans are sure the rates have gone up. Among the crimes Americans think are on the rise are school shootings, human trafficking, gang violence, pe-

dophilia, sexual assault and child abduction.

This matters because broadly shared misconceptions about crime rates affect both personal behavior and public policy. Someone worried about stranger violence might choose to stay home rather than venture downtown in the evening, or voters might demand harsher laws if they feel unsafe.

Americans' top five fears are:

- Walking alone at night
- Becoming the victim of identity theft
- Various risks of using the Internet
- Being the victim of a mass/random shooting
- Public speaking

Except for public speaking, the list reflects the kinds of stories that have high profiles in the news, and they get airtime and big headlines because they are out of the ordinary. Cancer, heart disease and stroke are far more dangerous, but weren't at the top of the list.

It's important to stay safe on the Internet and to avoid walking in truly dangerous places, but should they be at the top of people's concerns? No. Eat right, exercise and drive responsibly, and you'll have a good chance of living longer. But that's kind of boring. People respond to more dramatic dangers. Sugar just doesn't look that scary.

Here's another list from the survey, the top five worries or concerns:

- Identity theft on the Internet
- Corporate surveillance of Internet activity
- Running out of money in the future
- Government surveillance of Internet activity

# Hysteria about Ebola needs to stop real quick

When the Obama haters met the Ebola hysterics, they fell in love.

Faster than you could say President Obama — the latest slur against the president — right-wing bloggers, talk-show hosts and politicians pushed the racial panic buttons.

In Dallas, young children of African immigrants have been called “Ebola kids.” And across the country, recent African immigrants, many of them American citizens, report fear on the part of their co-workers, neighbors and even friends that they are somehow secretly infected.

Fox News has been the most egregious peddler of racialized nonsense. “The Five” co-host Andrea Tantaros opined that Africans will come to the United States and then “seek treatment from a witch doctor.” Fox News medical “expert” psychiatrist Keith Ablow argued that Obama supports the spread of Ebola because his sympathies and “his affiliations” are with Africa.

Given the general lack of knowledge and stereotypes regarding Africa, nearly 40 percent of the American public believes that the United States faces a potential Ebola epidemic.

Their call to stop all flights from and to West African countries severely affected by Ebola — or all flights from and to anywhere in Africa — is a very short hop away from the demand to stop all Africans from entering the country.

The obvious fact that anyone can get around the flight ban by traveling to a third or fourth country, or that white Americans or non-Africans might carry the infection seems beside the point.

What’s more, some African countries have demonstrated amazing efficiency in combating the Ebola outbreak. Senegal and Nigeria have been declared Ebola-free by the World Health Organization.

One of Obama’s first actions should be to debunk the myths, rumors and racial hysteria that are contagious right now.

### ■ Becoming ill

These are all things we often can do something about if we make good judgments about the risks they pose. You probably won’t be exposed to Ebola, but you have a good chance of contracting flu. You probably should get a flu shot and stay out of hospitals, if you have a choice, for reasons other than Ebola. The flu kills more than 30,000 Americans a year, and infections acquired in hospitals cause far more deaths than the flu.

Natural disasters are frightening. In the Pacific Northwest, we face potentially devastating volcanic eruptions and earthquakes, though they happen infrequently enough that most people probably don’t think about them very often.

Americans listed these as the top five feared natural disasters (and their consequences):

- Tornado/hurricane
- Earthquakes
- Floods
- Pandemic or major epidemic
- Power outage

A power outage is not exactly a natural disaster, but outages are often caused by natural phenomena, like our fall windstorms. It’s almost November, so I’d better check my flashlights.

The survey found that despite fears, only 25 percent of Americans have emergency kits ready.

The researchers found that most Americans knew they should be prepared, but just didn’t act on the information they had about preparedness.

The survey looked at the factors that affect which people are more likely to have various fears. A couple of things stood out as predictors of fear — having a lower level of education and watching lots of television.

Fear is necessary for survival, but it poses its own dangers when it doesn’t match reality. The value of this survey is that it offers a starting point for some mental and emotional rebalancing to match fears with realistic levels of danger so that we can do what we need to do to really be safer.

Frich reads all the bills on her committee agendas so she can either try to improve them or prevent them from becoming law.

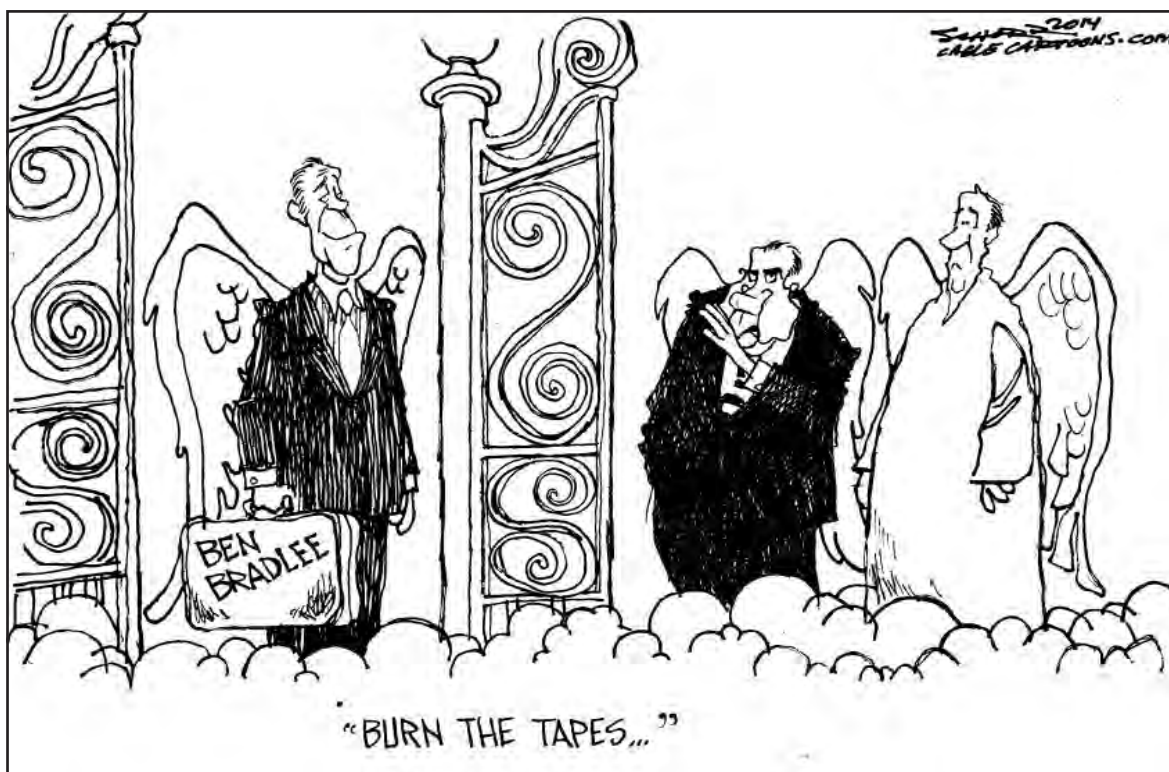

# Reinvest all of the timber revenues into forest

Monday’s *The Dominion Post* included a letter from the Coopers Rock Foundation concerning proposed timbering at Coopers Rock.

As a lifelong resident of Monongalia County, I have enjoyed Coopers Rock State Forest for decades and would like to see it properly managed.

First, I wholeheartedly agree that revenues from this timbering should be reinvested into the forest. I would further suggest that the Foundation request that all the revenues be reinvested into the forest, since they are being generated by trees taken from the forest, rather than the 25 percent the Foundation is requesting.

Secondly, I wholeheartedly agree with applying sound timbering principles, including “best practices,” in removing mature timber from the forest. I get the impression the Foundation would like to see no timbering at all, but this viewpoint is based on an incorrect understanding of what

constitutes healthy biodiversity. First, it should be noted that Coopers Rock is a state forest, not a state park. People like to see mature forest with little brush or other undergrowth. I agree such park-like settings are beautiful; however, there is little biodiversity in such a uniformly aged forest. Also, it is unhealthy for wildlife.

Any wildlife biologist will tell you that to maintain healthy wildlife populations, a forest must have a wide variety of different-aged tree groups.

While I think clear-cutting is ugly for a while, in fact, brushy clear-cut areas are vital for ground-nesting birds and also for other animals such as deer.

Especially with the fairly recent return of coyotes to the area, doe need thick brush in which to have and hide their young. Fawns are vulnerable to predators in their first few weeks, and without the thick brush that comes from heavy timbering, they really don’t stand a chance. The same goes for



ground-nesting birds such as wild turkeys. The hen is at great risk during the weeks she sits on the nest, and once the eggs are hatched, the chicks are also vulnerable to predators.

In addition to providing

birthing areas, brushy clear-cut areas also provide needed food during the winter when food supplies are short.

The young, tender sprouts provide food for deer and a variety of animals and birds. Once the trees grow up and mature, their bark becomes tougher and the animals cannot reach the buds. It’s nice to have acorns from the mature oaks, but those acorns only last a few months. They can’t carry wildlife through the entire winter.

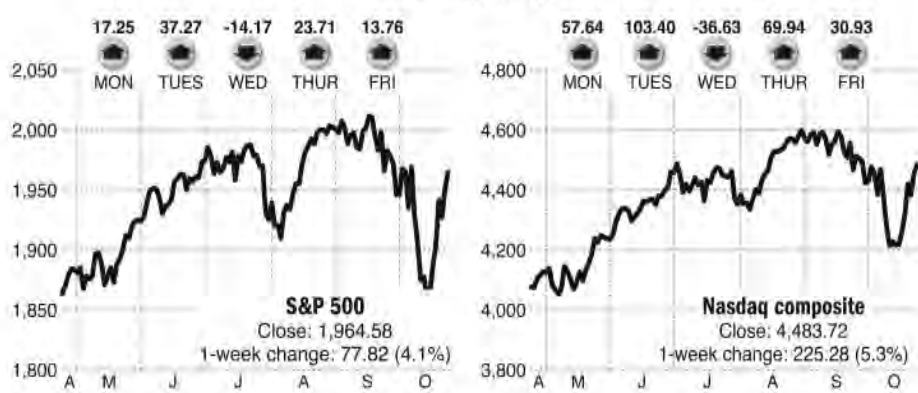
I support a timbering plan that calls for regular timbering rotations in the life span of trees.

It makes no sense to let a valuable resource like mature oak trees rot on the stump, and it’s not good for wildlife either. I also support reinvesting 100 percent of the proceeds back into the forest.

# Greer companies deemed safe by MSHA

All five of Greer Industries Inc.'s mining companies received a Certificate of Achievement in Safety from the Mine Safety and Health Administration (MSHA) for their 2013 No Days Lost Injury incident rates.

The awards were issued as follows: Greer Limestone Co., large metal/nonmetal mill group, 82,945 man-hours worked; Greer Lime Co., large quarry group, 27,428 man-hours worked; Buckeye Stone Co., small metal/nonmetal mill group, 12,161 man-hours worked; Cheat River Limestone Co., small metal/nonmetal mill group, 12,995 man-hours worked; and Decker's Creek Limestone Co., large met-

al/nonmetal mill group, 25,444 man-hours worked.

Under the Federal Mine Safety and Health Act of 1977, active and intermittently active mineral mining operations are required to report injury and employment data to be eligible to receive the MSHA Certificate of Achievement in Safety Awards.

Qualification for an award requires mining operations to report data to MSHA for the calendar quarter in which it was active during the calendar year; to have not experienced a work injury in the designated subunits that resulted in a fatality, permanent disability, days away from work or days of

restricted work activity; to have a No Days Lost (NDL) injury incidence rate (degree 6) no greater than the national incidence rate for these same subunits; and to have accumulated at least 4,000 employee-hours in these same subunits during the calendar year.

Mark Wilson, vice president of safety and human resources, said, "I am very proud of our employees and the job they are doing with safety. This is the first time in my career that all five Greer Companies were recognized in the same year for their No-Days-Lost safety records in MSHA's designated subunits. Avoiding lost time accidents in the mining industry is a difficult

task and our employees understand what it takes."

In general, any revocable or irrevocable trust is established to put conditions on the assets owned by the trust to control who receives how much and when. An individual will no longer own the assets; the trust will, but the assets in the trust will benefit one or more people or entities. Trusts can be set up dur-

ing a person's lifetime or through his or her estate. A variety of purposes can be served through revocable and irrevocable trusts. The main advantages are tax benefits, control of the assets for a period of time, and the potential for professional management of the assets

when needed. During one's life, an irrevocable trust can be used to transfer assets as a way to reduce estate taxes later and receive financial benefits from the assets now. A trust created through a person's estate can be used to shelter the amount of assets (currently up to \$5.34 million per estate) not subject to estate taxes. Those trust assets can provide income and support for the surviving spouse after the first spouse's death and assure professional asset management if the remaining spouse would ben-

efit from that. Typically, the trust assets will pass to the children when the second spouse dies. For those concerned about wasteful use of an inheritance, a trust can impose income limitations and spendthrift restrictions to preserve assets long-term. For future educational expenses, a trust can be helpful, although Section 529 plans are simpler overall. A trust can be the owner of a life insurance policy. The proceeds will be paid to the listed beneficiaries without being a part of the policy owner's estate

for taxation purposes. To support those with special needs, a trust can provide auxiliary funds. Finding the right organization or person to serve as trustee for administration, management and investment purposes is as important as are the trust's terms. Trusts can also serve a charitable purpose while benefiting loved ones first. The terms of your will or revocable trust can create a charitable trust that will provide income for your spouse, children or others and earn an estate tax deduction. When the income pay-

out ends, the remaining funds will carry out the charitable purpose you specified years before to help the organization carry out its important goals. Trusts are not a do-it-yourself project. Seeking professional assistance from an attorney or a financial institution's trust department can assure the trust complies with state law and other requirements. That's good planning.

## Nonprofit helps fight Ebola with solar lights

New Vision Renewable Energy, a West Virginia nonprofit, is joining the fight to contain and treat the deadly Ebola virus. New Vision produces solar lights that can illuminate entire rooms, but the organization needs funds to produce more lights.

Recently, New Vision was contacted by Alphonso Quamele, executive director of Family Line Foundation Ministries in the cities of Paynesville and Monrovia, Liberia, about sending lights to the organization.

He is working with community youth to help get the word out about prevention and help health care workers identify Ebola victims. They need solar lights for the Liberian youth to distribute to the community and portable solar lights for the health-care workers to use for their nightly visits.

Quamele reported that hospitals and clinics are

overwhelmed and sending patients away. With 90 percent of the nation living without electricity, families and small clinics must shut down at dark or try to administer IVs and medications to fight the fevers as they spike at night, using just the light of candles or kerosene lamps that emit toxic fumes.

New Vision is investing its money in a new prototype whole-room solar light — designed with the help of 3M scientists — to create a brighter light with a more powerful battery that is portable and can hang from the ceiling to light an entire room. The solar-powered battery also charges mobile phones, helping rural communities to communicate.

## Maui voters to decide whether to ban GMO crops

**HONOLULU** — Dozens of Maui mothers are going door-to-door to urge voters to back a ban on the cultivation of genetically engineered crops because they think they are unsafe.

A group backed by companies growing the crops counters with ads playing heavily on the airwaves that urge rejection of what they are calling the "farming ban."

The dueling campaigns

over a Nov. 4 ballot measure that would prohibit the growing of genetically modified organisms until studies show they're safe isn't just a local issue in a county of only 160,000 residents in the middle of the Pacific Ocean. Experts say the ban's effects could ripple across the nation because some of the world's largest corn-seed producers research and develop new varieties of genetically engineered seeds at their farms in the county.

Kendall Lamkey, chairman of the agronomy department at Iowa State University, said the initiative — if passed — could potentially make seed development more expensive for Monsanto Co. and a Dow Chemical Co. subsidiary, Dow AgroSciences.

"It's not going to stop it, but it will slow it down," Lamkey said. The companies will "adapt. I mean, there will probably be workarounds for this that may or may not cost more money and may or may not raise the cost of goods to

our farmers." About 90 percent of all corn grown in the U.S. is genetically engineered and has been developed partially at farms in Hawaii. There has been little scientific evidence showing foods grown from GMO seeds are less safe than their conventional counterparts. But fears persist in Hawaii and elsewhere. In the islands, those concerns are compounded by worries about the companies' use of pesticides.

**W**hether they were carved from myth or gleaned from some truths, monster legends exist in almost all cultures around the globe.

"Vampires are some of the oldest and [most] widespread monster legends throughout the world. Nearly every culture has a story about a creature that has vampiric qualities," Burns said.

Popularized by author Bram Stoker, in his novel, "Dracula," vampire tales were heightened in the Victorian era, but blood-sucker tales were told for a long time before that.

"The most popular story — and one that Stoker based his character Dracula on — was Eastern European ruler Vlad III, Prince of Wallachia (1431-1476). He was part of the ruling family, the House of Draculesti (from where the name Dracula comes — the word actually means dragon,)" Burns said.

Vlad was often known as Vlad the Impaler because of his penchant for torture, including impaling his enemies on spikes.

"He is also reputed to have dipped his bread in their blood and eaten it," Burns said.

The Mountain State connection: Accord-

# 'Little Dancer' musical readies for opening in D.C.

WASHINGTON — "Little Dancer Aged Fourteen," a famous sculpture by Edgar Degas that can be seen in museums around the world, is coming to life in a new musical exploring the story of a mysterious 14-year-old dancer and the artist who portrayed her.

The production imagines the story of Marie van Goethem, a struggling dancer in the world of the Paris Opera Ballet in the late 1800s when dancing represented a chance at escaping poverty. Degas took an interest in dancers for his paintings and sculptures, leaving behind images of young ballerinas popular more than a century later.

The \$7 million Kennedy Center musical opens Saturday for previews and runs through Nov. 20 in Washington.

It's the brainchild of the Broadway team of playwright and lyricist Lynn Ahrens, composer Stephen Flaherty and director and choreographer Susan Stroman. The show was born out

of their love of dance and an interest in one of the most important sculptures at the National Gallery of Art.

"I would wonder about that little girl," Stroman said during a recent visit to the museum. "Like, 'Who was she? Why did he choose her?' She looked different from all the other ballerinas that he would paint, and you could tell that she had spirit, she had character."

Degas, played by Tony Award-winning actor Boyd Gaines, made the wax-and-clay sculpture between 1878 and 1881 as his eyesight began to fade. The piece was cast in bronze and circulated widely after the artist died, making it a fixture in museums.

Parts of the story are based on writings left by Degas and American artist Mary Cassatt, who collaborated with him and who figures in the story as a strong woman amid a rising feminist movement.

When Degas exhibited his sculpture, critics disapproved, saying he created a homely specimen. Later, his young subject was fired

from the ballet, though it's not clear why. She disappears from the records, curators said. That gave Ahrens an opening to create the rest of Marie's story.

Stroman and Ahrens said they grew up seeing Degas' images of dancers. Ahrens would pose like the

"Little Dancer" as a girl.

"For every little girl, every dancer, everybody who loves art ... they know the face of that tough little girl," Ahrens said. "But they don't know her name."

The story is a unique concept, crossing art forms

with a music-and-dance-infused story inspired by a 130-year-old artwork that was inspired by the ballet. It's a risk for the Kennedy Center in seeking to draw a crowd and to recoup its costs from often disparate audiences for theater, dance and fine art.

Stroman — whose Broadway credits include "The Producers," "Contact" and "The Music Man" — said she is one of the few people bridging genres as a lover of both ballet and musical theater. But she hopes "Little Dancer" will appeal more widely.

"What I'm hoping for is that someone who loves the ballet will want to come see a story about a ballet dancer in Paris and then someone who loves art will come to see the real story about the sculpture and then someone who loves musical theater will come because of that," she said.

Tiler Peck, the New York City Ballet principal dancer who plays the young Marie, has visited the sculpture twice since rehearsals moved to Washington.

"I want to make sure I get it as perfectly as possible and to be as true to the sculpture as I can," she said. "To be able to see exactly how her hands are clasped and what her hair looked like, where the ribbon was placed."

ing to Burns, because many West Virginians came from Eastern European ancestry, the stories of bloodsucking demons were often told around fires. "In my research, there is only one vampire story that I have discovered from West Virginia, and that being about a child vampire that allegedly rose from his grave in a Morgantown cemetery. The body had been buried for nearly 80 years, and yet looked like it was buried the day before. The story has some vampiric characteristics (such as the dead having a youthful appearance), but the story does not tell that the vampire attacked anyone," Burns said.

### Werewolves

"The ancient Greek traveler, Herodotus, mentioned a tribe of werewolves in his book, 'Histories' written between 450-420 B.C.," Burns said. "This is an ancient legend, like the vampire, but it hit its height of popularity during the Middle Ages in Europe."

Werewolf hunts were popular, just like witch hunts, he said.

"The idea of lycanthropy, the act of being afflicted with a disease or a curse that caused you to turn into a werewolf, was a common belief. The legends grew from that point on until it began to arise in literature, such as Clemence Annie Housman's novel, 'The Werewolf' in 1896," Burns said.

Often, the shapeshifter legends of American Indian tribes included beings who could change into wolves or other creatures.

The Mountain State connection: "Within the confines of West Virginia folklore, werewolves exist alongside the legend of Bigfoot," Burns said. While Bigfoot is often perceived as a legend of the Pacific Northwest, several counties in West Virginia also have had Bigfoot sightings, including Tucker, Pendleton, Randolph and Pocahontas. "The only known actual werewolf

## Mountaineer Week brings back ghost tour Monday

WVU's Mountaineer Week will host the fourth annual WVU Ghost Tour at 7 p.m. Monday. The tour will begin with a reception in the main lounge on the first floor of E. Moore Hall on WVU's Downtown Campus.

Conducting the tour will be West Virginia storyteller Jason Burns, whose award-winning performances have taken place all across the state at various schools, conferences, churches, libraries, festivals and other events. Burns is the driving force behind The West Virginia Spectral Heritage Project, which seeks out, researches, records, and performs ghost and monster stories from around West Virginia. To this date, the project has collected nearly 500 ghost and monster stories from West Virginia.

The tour of WVU will include ghost stories from the Downtown Campus, all while walk-

ing to the alleged haunted locations on campus. "On the Downtown Campus of WVU, there are many alleged hauntings that take place," Burns said. In addition, the tour will include some tales and legends about the city of Morgantown, which has its own ghostly denizens.

The tour will last for about 1 1/2 to 2 hours, so good walking shoes and a light jacket are recommended. Burns also recommends personal discretion when bringing small children or others who may be affected by the stories. "One thing about ghost stories is — someone has to die for there to be a ghost," Burns said.

### Zombies

Nearly as popular as the vampire these days, the stories of the undead can be traced back to Africa.

"The word 'zombie' probably comes from the word 'nzambi' — a word from the Kongo language of Central Africa that means 'god.' This tradition was undoubtedly brought with the slave trade to the Caribbean, where it and other storytelling traditions combined to form the Voodoo religion's zombie," Burns said.

The Mountain State connection: There are some zombie tales found in the hills of Appalachia. "For instance, there is a story of a zombie that terrorized the Parkersburg Riverfront during the late 1800s," Burns said.

### Mummies

These wrapped, undead creatures were popular in Egyptian culture for obvious reasons, but Burns said mummies have expanded into many different cultures.

"The idea of a mummy as an undead creature was originated during the Georgian era in a book called 'The Mummy! Or a Tale of the 22nd Century' by Jane C. Loudon in 1827," Burns said. "The mummy reached its height of popularity after the opening of King Tut's tomb by Howard Carter in 1922, and by the 1940s Hollywood had made the Mummy part of our modern folklore."

The Mountain State connection: "West Virginia has mummies, which were created by a local scientist, Graham Hamrick, by using what he called the 'biblical method of mummification' on two cadavers from the TransAllegheeny Lunatic Asylum," Burns said. The mummies are on display at the Barbour County History Museum, in Philippi.

### Witches

"Witches are another old legend, which is found in every culture on Earth," Burns said. "Beginning in ancient times, the dark ages saw the height of belief in witches, and the persecution/systematic murder of thousands during the witch hunts in Europe."

Today, witchcraft is a common practice, one that is protected by the Constitution, Burns said, like all religions.

"Movies have skewed the legends of witches and witchcraft," he said.

The Mountain State connection: Burns' family, who were from Pendleton County, often told him stories about witches and magic. "Probably the most popular witch story in West Virginia, however, is the story of Serilda, the Highland Witch," Burns said. Serilda lived near Mannington, he said, and is buried in Highland Cemetery.

### More W.Va. monsters

Anyone who's watched "Mountain Monsters" on Destination America may be familiar with some of the creatures said to roam the hills of Appalachia.

The Mothman of Point Pleasant, for instance, was said to be a large, bird-like creature with glowing red eyes that appeared to many residents in the 1960s.

Other West Virginia monster legends include the Grafton Monster, Flatwoods Monster, Sheepsquatch, Bighoot (a giant owl), giant cats and Thunderbirds. Even Morgantown legend includes the Ogua, the state's only water monster, Burns said. That creature is said to inhabit the Monongahela River.

## Mick Jagger, the film producer, heads to work

NEW YORK — Song credits won't be the latest place to feature Mick Jagger's name. Instead, look to upcoming films and TV shows.

The Rolling Stones frontman has been busy producing projects, from this year's James Brown biopic "Get on Up" to a not-yet-titled HBO series directed by Martin Scorsese.

Jagger is also behind the HBO documentary "Mr. Dynamite: The Rise of James Brown," which debuts Monday (9 p.m. EDT). The rock icon said he was asked to produce the documentary before the film.

"I was really interested, but I was kind of a bit documentary-ed out at that point," the 71-year-old said with a laugh, explaining that he was asked to produce "Mr. Dynamite" around the time he finished working on the 2012 Stones' documentary, "Crossfire Hurricane."

"It's very time-consuming ... but I said, 'Yeah and I'd really like to do the documentary.' Then I woke up the next morning and thought a feature film would be a great idea."

Jagger asked Oscar-winning director Alex Gibney to work on the documentary, which takes an overarching look at the Godfather of Soul's life. Brown died in 2006, at 73.

"The fact that we were doing it after Mr. Brown had passed allowed people to be a little bit more free about talking about him," Gibney said.

Gibney, whose credits include "Taxi to the Dark Side," said he enjoyed collaborating with Jagger.

"I heard some things that made me nervous, but I had a great time. He's a good producer," he said. "I just heard rumbles ... but I didn't find that to be the case. Just the opposite."

Jagger's other upcoming production projects include the films "Tabloid" and "The Tiny Problems of White People" with Colin Firth. He'll play rescheduled dates with the Stones in Australia starting Saturday, and said in a recent interview that his production duties have helped him deal with his tumultuous year following the suicide of his longtime partner, L'Wren Scott.

**AP: What was your relationship with James Brown?**

Jagger: I'm not claiming that we were buddies (laughs), but I met him early on in my career. When I first came to New

York ... I went to the Apollo and I spent the day there ... I introduced myself to him, I'm sure he had no clue (who I was) ... But he was very, very nice to me. Very generous.

**AP: How influential was Brown?**

Jagger: He was such a big influence on all kinds of music. He was influential on performers that came later like Michael Jackson, Prince, and then the beginning of hip-hop and so forth. But he was also influential (on) every band, every rock band, (they) didn't necessarily play all James Brown numbers, but we all knew them.

**AP: The documentary focuses on his music and activism, but it also touches on domestic violence, which was glossed over in the film.**

Jagger: I think Alex wanted to concentrate really on the two areas (music and activism) ... without ignoring the other areas. We could have made a whole movie (on), 'Was James Brown a drug addict and wife abuser?' but that's the negativity and I don't think you want to be ... white-washing people, but you don't want to be turning up their negative side. And really we wanted to explore James Brown the musician, the performer. We wanted to explore James Brown the activist, because those were really interesting times. A lot of people obviously didn't live through them and a lot of people forget, me included, so we didn't heavy-hand the negativity of it.

**AP: What other musicians would you like to do a documentary about?**

Jagger: I have been asked to be involved in producing a movie on an adolescent Elvis ... so that's in the works. And I'm doing a series on HBO which is very much music-orientated. It's fictional drama. The lead character is the owner of a record company and it's about his life.

**AP: Are you going to appear on the HBO series?**

Jagger: I'm not in it. It's a story I worked on with Marty (Scorsese). ... It was going to be a movie and then we made it into a TV series. ... The action starts in 1973 in New York so it's a kind of a weird time because it's like the beginning of hip-hop and so a lot is going on.

## WVU event honors patients and caregivers

**THE THREE PATIENTS** honored at the WVU Healthcare Jon Michael Moore Trauma Center's fifth annual Night of Recognition are walking miracles. At the event, held Oct. 9 in Morgantown, the patients and representatives from each stage of their care were presented with a Cornerstone of Recovery Award. About 75 awards were presented.

"More often than not, our patients have no idea how many people it takes to get them from the scene of their accidents through treatment and recovery. This event gives us the opportunity to show them how much of a team effort went into getting them where they are today," said Dr. Alison Wilson, director of the Jon Michael Moore Trauma Center and vice chair and Skewes Family Chair for Trauma in the WVU Department of Surgery. "We also get the chance to thank those individuals for the very critical role each one plays in the trauma system."

During the event, three videos were shown that spotlighted the patients honored. The videos, available at [youtube.com/wvuhealthcare](http://youtube.com/wvuhealthcare), illustrate the quality of care these patients received:

■ Paige Snider, 2, of Reedsville, who was playing with her mother on their farm when she darted under a fence corraling the family's horses. One of the horses, which weighed more than 1,000 pounds kicked her, causing near-fatal injuries. Her stomach burst, her spleen was perforated and her lungs were bruised. She spent three weeks in the hospital, including two on a ventilator in intensive care, and underwent two surgeries. She has since returned home, where she still loves to ride and feed her horses.

■ Clark Currie, 78, of Bethel Park, Pa., was traveling to his job in a coal mine when he was hit head on by a gravel truck in Greene County, Pa. The accident collapsed his lungs, ruptured his spleen, damaged part of his colon, broke almost all of his ribs and his sternum, and severed his internal



thoracic arteries. After 18 days in Ruby Memorial Hospital, he spent a month at Kindred Hospital in Pittsburgh before being transferred to HealthSouth for rehabilitation. He has since retired from his job in the mine, but he is keeping busy with work around his home.

■ Sabrina Hanlon, 57, of Morgantown, who was driving down I-79 to Doddridge County when a large truck ran her off the road and into the guard rail. The car went airborne and wrapped

around a pole holding the directional signs across the interstate. The crash broke both legs in multiple places, broke six ribs, broke her arm, bruised her lung and heart, and damaged her spleen and

liver. She spent two weeks in the hospital and another two weeks at HealthSouth. Today, she and her husband are both retired and using their time to enjoy their grandchildren.

"The fact that all of these patients are now doing as well as they are speaks volumes of the hard work and dedication of the people who helped get them there," Dr. Wilson said. "Each job in the trauma team is vital to ensuring that each of these patients transitioned from accident victim to survivor."

Each year, the Jon Michael Moore Trauma Center, at WVU Healthcare's Ruby Memorial Hospital, treats more than 3,000 patients from across West Virginia, as well as Ohio, Pennsylvania and Maryland.

## Refusing to forgive only keeps pain fresh

**Q: I was raised in the Episcopal Church, and even though a good Christian will forgive someone who's hurt you, I'm having a very difficult time forgiving my ex-husband for all he did to hurt our two daughters. He's never asked for my forgiveness. However, last year, at his stepson's wedding, he finally told the girls he was sorry for everything — after 36 years! How can I forgive when I still hold so much anger? — L., Raleigh, N.C.**

**A:** I often receive questions about forgiveness — and I ask them in my own spiritual life. Your understandable anger at your ex-husband can't be disposed of by a few words from me, or even by his apology to your daughters.

When I teach children about forgiveness, I have them watch as I pound nails into a board. I tell them to think of each nail as a bad thing someone does to another person. They're usually upset about the pounding. Then I pull out the nails and ask

them to think of that as what happens when we say we're sorry for each bad thing we've done.

They're usually smiling by then because they realize there's something they can do to make things right. Then I show them the board with all the nail holes in it and ask how we could get rid of the holes. They have no idea and I admit I have no idea, either. The holes will always be there, I point out. Even if we put filler in them, we'd still see the outlines of the holes.

In a quiet but serious voice, I explain to them that this is why we have to be so careful not to hurt anyone because it always leaves a hole behind.

Now, I know this all sounds grim and despairing, but it's important to feel what happens when

you hurt others. However (and this is a lesson children are generally not mature enough to absorb), at some point we must let go of our anger at being hurt. Holding on to it is like drinking poison and expecting the other person to die.

Forgiveness is obviously something we do for the person who's hurt us, but it's also something we do to save ourselves from further spiritual corrosion.

So there it is, one of the most enduring contradictions of the human condition: We cannot forgive because we're broken, yet we must forgive to avoid being broken more. Furthermore, we can't simply forgive; we must also agree to heal up and move on with life.

The moment when this contradiction becomes unbearable (you are there now) is precisely the point where religion enters our lives with a message of divine grace (Hebrew: *Hesed*). Our faiths teach us in different ways, but to the same effect, that if God can forgive us, then we can forgive each other.

You don't have to be religious to resolve this contradiction, but we must find our way through, not around, our brokenness into a more forgiving place. As Hemingway wrote in "A Farewell to Arms": "Everyone is broken but some become stronger at the broken places."

Now is your time to decide if you'll become stronger at your broken places. I completely understand if you want to cling to your anger because your ex-husband has not apologized to you, but over time your choice will have less to do with him and more to do with you and the spiritual consequences of holding onto your anger.

I can tell you that my decisions to forgive others who've hurt me were not the fruit of any great virtue or compassion, but based on the fact that I can't swim through the often rough waters of life while hanging onto a heavy stone.

## Survey: Harassment a common part of online life

**NEW YORK** — A new study confirms what many Internet users know all too well: Harassment is a common part of online life.

The first-of-its-kind report by the Pew Research Center found that nearly three-quarters of American adults who use the Internet have witnessed online harassment. Forty percent have experienced it themselves.

The types of harassment Pew asked about range from name-calling to physical threats, sexual harassment and stalking. Half of those who were harassed said they didn't know the person who had most recently attacked them.

Young adults — people 18 to 29 — were the most likely age group to see and undergo online harassment. Women ages 18 to 24 were disproportionately the victims of stalking and sexual harassment, according to the survey. And people who have more information available about themselves online, work in the tech industry or promote themselves on the Internet, were also more likely to be harassed.

Case in point: Celebrities. Stars such as actress Jennifer Lawrence had nude photos stolen and posted online in a widespread hacking scandal in late August. Lawrence, 24, later told *Vanity Fair* that she considered looking at the pictures a sex crime.

It can be difficult for police to go after online bullies in part because "our legal system hasn't quite

caught up with technology," said Elizabeth Dowdell, a nursing professor at Villanova University who studies online aggression. On top of that, adults are generally hesitant to report harassment because they might view it as a "child or teenage problem."

"But the Internet has no age limits," Dowdell said. "People look for outlets for aggression and the Internet is a wonderful place because it's anonymous and you don't have to be truthful."

Social networking companies have sometimes been criticized for not doing enough to stop online harassment, even though it's standard policy to ban threats, bullying and harassment. But they have at least tried to respond to complaints.

Twitter, for example, changed its policy recently after some users sent crude,

altered images of Robin Williams to his daughter Zelda following the actor's suicide in August. The company now says it can remove images of deceased individuals that circulate on its site.

Trendy new social networking site Ello, meanwhile, recently added tools people can use to block or mute users who are bothering them. The ad-free, decidedly anti-Facebook website was criticized early on for not providing blocking features that are standard practice for social networks.

Though online harassment is as old as the Internet itself, the Pew survey is particularly timely as conversations around it have grown louder in recent months — and not just because of the celebrity hacking scandal. Beginning this summer, people involved in an online campaign dubbed "Gamer-

gate" have been harassing several prominent women in the video game industry and their supporters for criticizing the lack of diversity and how women are portrayed in games. One of the targets is Brianna Wu, a software engineer and founder of game developer Giant Spacekat. Wu, who is in her mid-30s, said she has frequently been harassed online, but it's gotten worse this year.

Earlier this month, people threatened her and her husband with rape, death and castration on Twitter and posted her address online, she said, and they have been trying to impersonate her on the Internet to smear her reputation. She got so frightened that she left her home in Boston.

Wu went to the police, but most people harassed online don't. According to Pew, just 5 percent of those who were harassed reported the incident to law enforcement, while nearly half confronted the person online. Forty-four percent said they unfriended or blocked the person.

But victims of harassment often don't know where it's coming from. Thirty-eight percent of people who were harassed online said a stranger was behind the threats, and another 26 percent didn't know who the person was.

"You can have many different (personas) online," Dowdell said. "So you might think 'I'm going to block Scaryfriend123' and Scaryfriend says 'Fine, I'm going to use my other name Superniceguy' and you just don't know."

## Studies support chiropractic treatment for neck pain

**Q: I am considering going to a doctor of chiropractic for my neck pain. Can you tell me about any studies that show how it compares to other options?**

**A:** Patients with chronic neck pain — defined as pain lasting at least eight weeks — got significant benefit from chiropractic adjustments, according to a recent report in the *Journal of Manipulative and Physiological Therapeutics*. The report was based on a review of nine previously published trials.

After getting therapy for chronic neck pain, the nine trials reviewed showed that all trial groups showed positive changes up to 12 weeks after the end of treatment. And no group reported any major adverse effects. Another study pub-

lished in the *Journal of Rheumatology* showed results from the largest database review of its kind.

This study categorized dozens of treatment options for neck pain as "strong evidence" of effectiveness to "no evidence" of effectiveness, and two or three categories in the middle.

The only therapy listed as "strong evidence" was the combination of chiropractic manipulation and physical therapy (for mechanical neck pain with and without radiculopathy). This study included

review comparisons of just about every other type of treatment option I have heard of, from acupuncture to NSAIDs to narcotics, and everything in between.

That is truly impressive, in my opinion — but I see that kind of result every day so it is not surprising to me.

Neck pain is a relatively common affliction, with some 15 percent of women and 10 percent of men estimated to have chronic

neck pain at any one time, according to the American Chiropractic Association. Spinal manipulation, also referred to as a chiropractic adjustment, is the practice of making sure vertebrae, the bones that make up the spine, have proper alignment and motion. *The Journal of Manipulative and Physiological Therapeutics* is the leading publication in the field of chiropractic and is the official scientific journal of the American Chiropractic Association. *The Journal of Rheumatology* is a long-time favorite of the medical field and has been a point of reference across multiple specialties for years.

## The new family portrait? 3D-printed statue selfies

NEW YORK — Walk into Eddie DaRoza's office and you'll find two of him there: The actual 32-year-old video producer, and a 5-inch statuette of him.

"There are a lot of double takes. It's like a little action figure of myself," the Los Angeles native said.

He had the statue made on a lark. While waiting for his brother at a mall, he stepped into a studio that scanned his body and sent the scan off to a 3-D printer. These studios are popping up rapidly as 3-D scanning and printing technology gets more advanced. In New York City alone, there are at least four stores that offer the service, including three just in the past year. You can get scanned in just a few seconds and get your statue delivered in days.

The advent of digital cameras and smartphones killed the traditional mall portrait studio, but 3-D printing has sparked a new trend. Overloaded with digital photos, statues may be moving in to fulfill our desire for portraits that stand out.

Many of the customers of the statue studios are

parents who want statues of their kids. Sylvain Preumont, who opened a New York branch of his London-based iMakr store

this year, said a soldier's wife had their three children scanned so he could bring them to Afghanistan. Victor De Los Angeles,

owner of New York 3-D printing and scanning store Cubo, has scanned several pregnant women.

"I had a lady come in the day before she went into labor and she was like: 'I need it done today,'" he said.

New York's Museum of Art and Design offered scans and statues earlier this year. Shapeways, the company that supplied the exhibit, said it scanned about 6,000 people and sold about 1,500 statues for \$30. Woody Allen got himself scanned there, so it's now possible to buy a 3.5-inch statue of a slumping Woody Allen in a cardigan. The Smithsonian Institution scanned President Barack Obama and revealed a 3-D printed bust of him this summer. It will be added to the National Portrait Gallery.

The typical 3-D-printed statue is printed in full color in a material known as "sandstone" — really, gypsum powder. It's glued together by color ink ejected from a head similar to the one found in an inkjet printer. The statues range from three to eight inches tall. The technology allows for a lot of variation in materials. iMakr offered chocolate statues for Easter. For 99 pounds, you got a

box with six small chocolate likenesses of yourself.

Big businesses are getting into 3-D statuary as well, with Wal-Mart Stores Inc. at the forefront. In July, at a newly opened Sam's Club in Montgomery, Ill., and another outside Fort Worth, Texas, 3-D printers scanned shoppers' faces and placed resin printouts of their heads on action figure-sized bodies of one of three Marvel characters. Wal-Mart's British unit, ASDA, starting testing a service in November that lets customers buy 8-inch figurines of themselves for 60 pounds, or \$100. The studio is now permanent in one store, and it's been so popular that the company is considering rolling it out to other locations.

"It's become the new family portrait," said ASDA spokesman Russell Craig.

A Staples store in New York scans people's faces and puts them on NBA and Star Trek figurines. The goal of the pilot program is to get small businesses to use Staples Inc. for 3-D scanning and printing jobs, just like they've provided those services for paper.

## Officials eye Ebola protocol for pets

**Q: Can dogs and cats get the Ebola virus? If the answer is no, as I believe it is, why did they kill that dog from Spain? — S.H., Chicago, Ill.**

**Q: I'm worried about a full-out Ebola epidemic eventually coming to America; it's inevitable. And since so many people in this country live with pets, what will happen to them? — J.K., Lubbock, Texas**

**Q: Will this be how it happens in America: When a family member is diagnosed with Ebola, pets will be killed and the rest of the family quarantined? I'm not sure as cases (of Ebola) mount that this is a viable plan. What is the plan for animals? — T.A., Louisville, Ky.**

A: The American Veterinary Medical Association (AVMA) is working side by side with the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) and various public health officials regarding the concerns expressed here about Ebola and animals — from the pets who share our beds to food-producing animals.

Dr. Ron DeHaven, AVMA CEO, said, "Like you, we've received many inquiries; certainly the public is concerned. We're working to create a specific protocol, though there remain many unknowns."

DeHaven continues, "What's challenging is that we don't know a lot about how Ebola behaves in various species. We do believe dogs can get Ebola. Dogs appear to mount an immune response so they don't get sick. The big question then is if they don't get sick from the virus, are they capable of spreading the virus to people or other animals? These are questions that we just don't have answers to."

Personally, rather than euthanizing the dog belonging to the Spanish

victim of Ebola (earlier in October), I think it might have been more beneficial to human medicine and obviously for the dog's family to quarantine the animal.

After a necropsy (animal autopsy) is conducted, there's nothing more to be learned from a dead animal. A living dog may have offered clues. For example, if physicians and veterinarians can learn why dogs don't get sick from Ebola, this knowledge could be the key to creating more effective drugs and a vaccine for people. Also, had that dog been allowed to live, more might have been discovered regarding virus transmission from animals to people.

A Dallas, Texas, county judge took a completely different route from the judge in Spain who ordered the dog there be euthanized. Instead, Dallas Ebola-stricken health care worker Nina Pham's dog — a King Charles Spaniel named Bentley — was moved to disused military and is under the care of Dallas Animal Services.

DeHaven warns, "Let's keep this all in perspective. In the U.S., human cases remain very isolated, and there have been no pets identified with Ebola."

**Q: We adopted a mixed-breed puppy who just doesn't like being in a crate. I don't like him being in a cage, either. Don't you agree? — A.A., Des Moines, Iowa**

A: Frankly, I think it's cruel to allow a puppy, who doesn't know any

better, to roam the house freely and potentially eat something that will make him sick, or make you sick by chewing on an expensive heirloom.

Aside from training your pup, you need to be "trained," or at least agree that a crate is a good idea when your dog is home alone. Also keep in mind that your dog may pick up on your anxiety about crating him.

Crates serve two purposes for pups: To keep them out of trouble and to fast-forward house training.

Feed your dog from the crate, and periodically drop treats into the crate. Before you begin leaving him alone in the crate, just leave the room where your pooch is crated. If the dog barks, demanding your return, don't comply. Wait until your pet is quiet and calm before removing him from the crate.

Ask your veterinarian about a calming pheromone product (Adaptil) and L-Theanine (Anxitane), both of which may lessen anxiety. Also, consider using a Thundershirt.

### Favorite Fruit of Fall

## Pumpkin Power

Red, orange and yellow leaves and bright orange pumpkins make autumn glow with color. It wouldn't be Halloween without jack-o'-lanterns. In many homes, it wouldn't be Thanksgiving without pumpkin pie. To learn more about this favorite fall fruit, The Mini Page talked with an expert from Ohio State University.



By the late 1800s in America, it was popular to carve jack-o'-lanterns for Halloween decorations. In the early 1900s, Americans decorated with jack-o'-lanterns at Thanksgiving as well.

### Jack with a lantern

About 400 years ago, "Jack-o'-Lantern" was a nickname for a real person. It meant "a man of the lantern," or a night watchman. The British used to call an unnamed man "Jack." This was like using "Joe" in terms such as "G.I. Joe" or "a regular Joe."

People later called mysterious lights appearing over the marshes jack-o'-lanterns, or will-o'-the-wisps.

### Lighting up the vegetables

Hundreds of years ago, the English, Irish and Scots made candlelit lanterns out of different fruits and vegetables, such as turnips, apples, beets, potatoes and cucumbers.

In Scotland and Ireland, people carved scary faces out of these fruits and vegetables and placed candles inside. They hoped the creepy lighted faces would scare off evil spirits. In the 1800s, boys in Great Britain began playing tricks, frightening people with the spooky vegetable lights.

American Colonists realized that pumpkins were the best vegetable of all for carving out a lantern.

### Spooky tale

There is an Irish legend, or old story, that says the jack-o'-lantern was named after a man called Stingy Jack. He tricked the devil, forcing him to keep Jack out of hell. But God didn't think he was a very good man, so he wouldn't let Jack into heaven either.

The devil condemned Jack to wander over the Earth at night. His only light was a turnip lantern lit with fire from hell. The legend says the Irish named this eerie ghost Jack-o'-Lantern.

Many European countries have their own stories about the beginning of the jack-o'-lantern.



## Rookie Cookie's Recipe Pumpkin Smoothie

### You'll need:

- 1 can low-sodium pumpkin, chilled (about 15 ounces)
- 1 can evaporated low-fat milk, chilled (12 ounces)
- 1 1/2 cups orange juice
- 1 small banana (sliced)
- 1/3 cup light brown sugar, packed (or 1/3 cup regular sugar)
- 2 dozen ice cubes (optional)
- 2 teaspoons ground cinnamon (optional)

### What to do:

1. Place pumpkin, evaporated milk, orange juice, banana and sugar in blender.
2. Cover and blend until smooth.
3. If using ice, pour mixture over ice. If using cinnamon, add that too. Serves 6.

You will need an adult's help with this recipe.

## A Family of Pumpkins

### Yes, it's a fruit

One way of classifying pumpkins is by how they taste. We think of fruits as the sweet parts of plants. Pumpkins are not that sweet. That's why we see them as vegetables.

However, botanists, or plant scientists, organize plants by how they grow and look. In science, a pumpkin is a fruit.

Fruits grow from the female parts of flowers. They carry the seeds for reproduction.



There are about 30 types of pumpkins. They come in many colors, including orange, white, yellow, green, gray, red, tan and blue.

The fruit of a pumpkin is called a pepo (PEA-poe), from the Greek word "pepon," meaning "ripe gourd." The word "pumpkin" comes from a Latin version of "pepon" — "pompon."

### All in the family

Pumpkins are members of the cucurbit (kyoo-KUHR-bit) family. Their close cousins include squashes, gourds, cucumbers, watermelons and cantaloupes.



Most cucurbits have big, star-shaped flowers; hairy, hollow stems; long vines and a thick outer covering.

### To eat or not to eat

Pumpkins grown to make jack-o'-lanterns are edible, or fit to eat. But they are not as tasty as pumpkins grown especially for food.

Pumpkins are a very healthy food. This low-calorie fruit is filled with vitamins A, C and B, fiber and minerals such as potassium and iron. Pumpkin pie is a holiday favorite, but pumpkin is great in soups, breads, cookies, butter and casseroles, too. Roasted pumpkin seeds are a healthy snack.

## Guilder Rodriguez



Each September, every Major League Baseball team is allowed to expand its roster of players from 25 to 40 active players. To fill the additional 15 spots, teams "call up," or promote, players in their minor league system.

Guilder (WHEEL-dare) Rodriguez became one of these "September call-ups" for the Texas Rangers, and lived out every minor leaguer's dream: a chance to play in the big leagues. For this 31-year-old rookie, the dream became a reality after 13 seasons in the minors. After being signed in 2001, Guilder appeared in 1,095 minor-league games — the most games ever played without a major league debut. In that time, he played for 10 different teams, had more than 4,000 at-bats, and saw time at every position except catcher — even making five outings as a pitcher.

On Sept. 22, with his wife and his father watching from the stands, Guilder recorded his first two major-league hits, including a single in the seventh inning that knocked in the game-winning run, setting off a wild celebration with his teammates.

## The Popular, Powerful Pumpkin

### Very important bees

Bees are necessary to pollinate pumpkin plants, or help them reproduce. They carry pollen from the male flowers to the female flowers.

The bees don't have to go far. Male and female flowers grow on the same pumpkin plant.

The pumpkin fruit forms deep inside the female flower. Male flowers bloom for just one day. Then they die and drop off the plant.

Squash bees are the main bees that pollinate pumpkins. Luckily, squash bees are not in danger, unlike many other types of bees.

Some squash bees actually spend the night in the pumpkin flower with the petals closed safely around them. This protects the bees from enemies. It also means they can get a head start on gathering pollen as soon as the flower opens the next day.

About 400,000 visitors come to the Circleville Pumpkin Show in Ohio each October. The town has been hosting this show since 1903. In 2012, Illinois led the country in pumpkin production, followed by California and Ohio.

### Touchy crops

Pumpkin farming is a risky business. Pumpkins can be easily harmed by disease, insects and weather.

Imagine you are a farmer growing pumpkins for jack-o'-lanterns. What if your pumpkins mature too early? By Halloween, you could be left with a lot of rotting pumpkins. If the pumpkins mature too late, you'll miss the Halloween rush.

People like to carry pumpkins by the stems. If the stems break off, people won't buy them. But if the stems are too big, they can damage the pumpkins next to them.

The skins need to be pretty, without big spots. If pumpkins are flat or weirdly shaped, people won't buy them. Size makes a difference.

### Pumpkin past

Pumpkins are native to the Americas. The seeds have been found at 10,000-year-old sites in Mexico.

Native Americans ate the fruit, seeds, flowers and leaves. They roasted pumpkins in the fire or cooked the fruit in soups, puddings or a type of pie. By mixing the fruit with syrup, they made a kind of pumpkin jelly. They cut and dried strips of pumpkin fruit to preserve it.

After drying strips of the shell, people wove them together to make mats. They used whole pumpkin shells for bowls and storage vessels.

American Colonists soon caught on. Pumpkins became a top food.



Today's pumpkin pie recipe is much like the Colonists', calling for spices such as nutmeg and ginger.

## Now is the time to sell your property

**HERE WE ARE** in the middle of another WVU football season, and the hills of West Virginia are beautiful with vibrant fall colors. This also means that in another month, or hopefully two, that white frozen stuff will be flying to let us know winter is here.

There is no question that winter affects the real estate market. We have data from the National Association of Realtors and we can see it in our local MLS (Multiple Listing Service) data.

Also, it just makes sense that buyers do not want to go out and dodge snow drifts to look at homes, unless they have to.

Moving is hard enough on its own, you certainly don't need any additional adverse situations from Mother Nature such as icy roads or sub-freezing temperatures to challenge things.

This all being said, if you are thinking about selling you need to act now. Here is why.

■ Demand is strong: Buyers do not want to move in the snow. If they want to buy before winter hits and they are looking now. In Monongalia County, we typically see on average a 16 percent increase in sales between now and the end of the year. Sellers have about 30 days to take advantage before the holiday season starts, and the median days on market for houses sold in the past six months is 28.

■ Less competition: Housing supply is still under the historical number of six months' supply in all areas of Monongalia County, except the western portion of the county. This means that, in many markets, there are not enough homes for sale to satisfy the number of buyers in that market. This is good news for home prices. However, typically we will see an increase in inventory coming into the spring market.

■ The process will be quicker: One of the biggest challenges of the 2014 housing market has been the length of time it takes from contract to closing. Banks are requiring more paperwork than ever. Typically we will see an increase delay with the process around the holidays.

■ There has never been a better time to move up: Prices are projected to appreciate by more than 19 percent from now to 2018. You also can lock in your 30-year housing expense with an interest percentage rate in the low 4's or even high 3's right now. Rates are projected to be more than 5 percent by this time next year.

At some point it's time to move on. Nobody has a crystal ball, and we can only project based on data and trends to make quality decisions. At some point it's not always about the money, sometimes it's about moving on and doing what works for you and your family. You can only sell your home if it's listed.

## Fancy frights

### Disney Mansion goes to spooky extremes in decorating

ORANGE COUNTY, Calif. — No one around here decorates a house for Halloween quite like the creative minds behind the Haunted Mansion Holiday at Disneyland. It has been 14 years since the seasonal "Nightmare Before Christmas"-themed overlay was launched at the classic Haunted Mansion, and the ghoulish meets quirky meets elegant design continues to evolve as the designers tweak or add new features for a three-month run.

Black wreaths and garlands festooned with custom black-and-white ribbon, flowers and skulls deck the antebellum estate, while vases filled with seemingly dead arrangements accent the wall enclosing the "property." Inside the mansion, there's a 7-foot-tall gingerbread house that features a zombie gingerbread man flanked by candy cane spikes that's new this year. These are just a handful of the decorating ideas that can be adapted for real homes.

Brian Sandahl, senior art director for Haunted Mansion Holiday, recently met with the Register at the New Orleans Square attraction to discuss decorating ideas inspired by the 1993 Tim Burton cult film. Here are excerpts from that conversation:

**Q. What are the signature decorative elements outside the mansion?**

A. Black garland. We didn't even see black Christmas garland when we started doing this attraction. So we bought black pine garland and heated it and twisted it and got it all weird. ... Now there's black garland everywhere — the craft stores have it. We'd like to think we started that trend. (Laughs). Because when two holidays collide, when we're Christmas and Halloween coming together, we don't have holly berry, we have pumpkin berry. The red is gone. Our skulls, our ornaments, anything creepy, we throw in there.

**Q. What's the palette?**

A. We are inspired by the film, we are not copying the film. The things in it — the snake, the man-eating wreath — are actually in the film, and we use them in a different approach here. The palette is Halloween — black, orange, purple, green but vibrant, bright colors. The classic mansion is rather subdued, then we come in with Jack (Skellington) and our overlay and it is quite colorful. It's what Jack's idea of

what Halloween and Christmas would be in Disneyland.

**Q. What are the aesthetic guidelines you use?**

A. Asymmetricality is critical. Nothing is balanced. There are very few straight lines. Everything is crooked. For example, the striping on the ribbon is erratic — it's jiggedy-jaggedy. It's handmade-ish, because Jack supposedly made all this stuff. ... Main Street is normal, Haunted Mansion Holiday is abnormal.

**Q. The flowers in the vases**

**look dead, and it looks like you do a mix of faux and real arrangements outside. Why?**

A. Everything has a dark, macabre twist to it. We're up for three months — October, November and December, so we have to use a tremendous amount of artificial foliage. But we buy stuff that looks dead already — the black garland, twisted branches and spider webs. That orange stuff that hangs from the garlands, that's amaranthus. It has that drippy, ghoulish look to it.

**Q. What can you tell us about that Christmas list inside the house?**

A. It's taken right out of the film, but we've augmented it. There is a naughty and nice list in the attic.

On the list is the production staff. Steven Davison is double naughty — he's the creative director. I'm naughty. I'll tell you a secret. My parents, my dog, my neighbors, friends, family, co-workers are on the list. It's one of the fun things we get to do as designers.

**Q. What are your personal favorites among the decorations?**

A. I come from theater. I've done a few productions of "Little Shop of Horrors," so what we call the snappy plants in the conservatory are kind of an homage to Audrey II, which is the big man-eating plant. But ours have different colors and they have poinsettia leaves coming from behind them so it's like Christmas Audrey II.

# Use tape to add items to your pegboard wall

**I LIKE** to keep tools and supplies where I can see and reach them easily. My pegboard wall is full of these items, and I'm always looking for ways to hang even more stuff there. My favorite way to hang tubes of glue and other tubed items is by tape. Just cut off about an 8-inch piece of tape and fold it in half, securing both ends of the tape to the tube, leaving an inch or so of the folded end of the tape above the end of the tube. This creates a tab that you can punch a hole into, making it easy to hang on any spare hook on your pegboard wall.

**Q:** My new dryer is larger than the old one. I have found that the dryer sticks out a little past the doorway because the vent hose is behind it. I want to know if there is some way to work this out. Any ideas? — T.G.

**A:** Some dryers have an alternative access place on the side of the dryer so that it can be vented out the side instead of the back. There also is a specially designed vent that is flatter than the typical round vent material used on the back. Check your dryer and then check your hardware store or home center.

**DEAR KELLY:** My sister cleans houses for some extra cash. I learned a neat trick from her. She has a plastic tote with a handle on it that she carries with her around the house. It has a variety of cleaners, rags and sponges, detailing brushes and trash bags. She can go from room to room with this tote and get everything cleaned as she goes. She will go back and vacuum some areas but, since I've started doing this at home, my cleaning time is cut in half. I actually enjoy cleaning the house now — somewhat. — C.P.

**Shop talk**

If you've ever had to reach around a corner to loosen or tighten a screw, you could have used a flexible-shaft screwdriver. The Viper Driver has a 7-inch flexible extension stored in the handle that can be pulled out of the shaft. 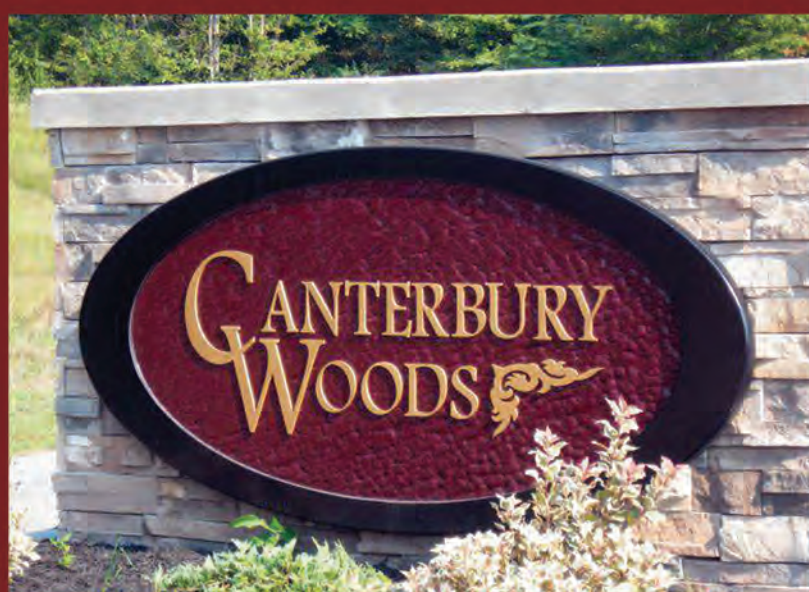

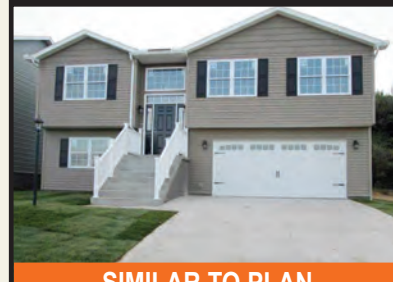

### Cut expenses while husband is in college

**DEAR DAVE:** My husband will be leaving his full-time job in a year so that he can go back to school full time and finish his degree.

We've both agreed this is what we want to do, but it means that we'll go from a yearly income of \$90,000 to \$45,000.

We'll have tuition assistance from my job and his veteran's stipend to help pay for things, plus we're debt-free except for our house.

But in this scenario, once we complete Baby Step 3 should we move directly to Baby Step 4 or continue saving? — Erin

Dear Erin: I think this is a good plan, as long as the two of you are on the same page and you're willing to save like crazy for the next year and beyond.

Even with help from your employer and his stipend, you'll still have some expenses, so you'll have to be ready.

Once you complete Baby Step 3, which is having three to six months of expenses set aside as an emergency fund, Baby Step 4 is usually starting to invest 15 percent of your income toward retirement.

In this case, while he's finishing his degree, you're not investing for retirement directly, but you are investing in your husband and your future together.

That's a great investment, by the way. As long as he's studying something that has marketplace application, you're setting the stage for him to make back the money put into his degree and much more.

If that's the plan, and he's not off pursuing a Ph.D. in something like German polka history, you two are making a great investment. So work hard now, cut all the corners you can and pile up money so you two can get through his time in school.

**DEAR DAVE:** How do you sell a vehicle with a lien amount that's higher than the actual value of the car? — Miranda

Dear Miranda: First, you have to find a way to cover the difference between the amount of the lien and what you can get for the car. Let's look at an example.

If the car is worth \$15,000, and you owe \$18,000, that would leave you \$3,000 in the hole. How do you get out of that car?

The bank holds the title, and until you give them the payoff amount of \$18,000, you're not getting the title.

The easiest and simplest way would be if you had \$3,000 on hand to make up the difference.

But if someone comes along and buys the car from you for \$15,000, you've got to be able to cover the remaining \$3,000, right?

Barring the best-case scenario where you actually have the money, you could go to a local bank or credit union and borrow the remaining \$3,000.

I hate debt, but being \$3,000 in the hole is a lot better than \$18,000 in the hole.

Then, you could turn around and pay back the \$3,000 quickly.

After that, you'd give the total amount owed to the bank.

They would give you the title, and you sign it over to the new owner. That's how it works.

## Veterinary clinic expands

Hillcrest facility has 5 exam rooms and surgery space

Going from 4,200 square feet to 10,000 square feet is quite a change.

But it's a needed one, Hillcrest Veterinary Clinic owner and veterinarian Dr. Kelley Owen said.

Recently, the clinic moved into its new home, right across the parking lot from its former space on Point Marion Road.

The location gives the three veterinarians and several techs and staff members extra room to

treat the animals that come to the clinic.

"A little more room back there for all of us to fit," Owen said smiling as she talked about the facility, which has five exam rooms, three treatment tables and a surgery facility.

"We started, probably three or four years ago, talking about expanding because we were needing a little bit more space, and we finally found a contractor and decided to move forward with it," Owen said.

Construction began in July 2013. In August 2014, the new Hillcrest Veterinary Clinic was ready.

Owen has been practicing just off Point Marion Road since 1990. Her father, Eugene Owen, was also a veterinarian who practiced there, from 1961-'89. He died during Owen's last year of veterinary school. So she took over the family business.

"My father was a veterinarian originally. Of course, I worked in the hospital a lot and it became a passion for me," she said. "I'm inquisitive, so I like the diagnostics. I like a case work-up, and you know it's always good when you can work something up and have it have an awesome outcome or prolong their life."

With the new space, the three veterinarians, Owen, Dr. Aaron Pollock and Dr. Jess Anderson, will be able to do more of that diagnostic work, including endoscopy, digital X-rays and surgery.

"We really outgrew where we were at, and we were running into each other, and it was hard to practice the kind of medicine that we wanted to, so we've been super excited about this," Pollock said.

Pollock has worked alongside Owen since 2007. While he loves animals, he said it's also important to get along with the people in the veterinary business.

"It's rewarding to get to help something that can't speak for itself and figuring things out," he said. "Every day's a mystery. They

can't tell us what's wrong and that's an exciting part about it."

That's the type of dedication to detail Linda Fischer loves about Hillcrest. Fischer has been bringing her pets to the clinic for more than 10 years. She has two corgis — a pembroke and a cardigan — that are cared for at the clinic. One dog has Addison's disease, which requires regular injections.

"He loves going there because they give him treats when they give him his injections," Fischer said. "All the techs are wonderful. They make you feel welcome."

"[Owen] really, really cares about the animals, and she's always done very, very well," she added, noting that when one of her pets had to have a blood transfusion, Owen stayed all night with him at the clinic.

One of the most important aspects of the clinic, though, is working with the Monongalia County Canine Adoption Center and Animal Friends of North Central West Virginia, Owen said, to take in dogs and cats that need help and homes.

"We like to do our rescue. That's one of my passions is to get puppies, kittens, adult dogs, geriatric dogs and cats into homes," she said. "And then we do their preventative care and then hopefully get them to their

forever homes."

Having an updated space to care for all the animals that come through the doors at Hillcrest is important to that success, Pollock said.

"We've all got pets of our own," Pollock said. "We know what it's like, and because we've got a bigger, nicer building doesn't mean that we don't still have a small-town type of an atmosphere and bedside manner about us."

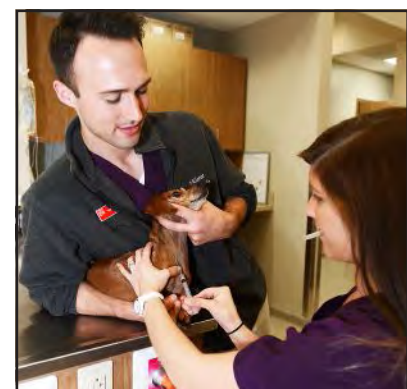

## Corporate America enters a record spin cycle

**CORPORATE EXECUTIVES** have always liked fads, and right now they are keen on spinning.

Their spinning is done with corporate assets. Big companies from Energizer to eBay have decided to break themselves up by handing out shares in a subsidiary, and it's happening at a record pace.

Edge Consulting Group, which publishes the Spinoff Report, counts 44 breakups this year involving companies worth at least \$500 million, and says that surpasses the 2007 record of 43. Spinoffs scheduled for next year already number 23.

Bloomberg, which includes smaller deals, tallies 166 spinoff announcements this year. Many, including eBay's spinoff of PayPal, reverse earlier acquisitions.

Dan Elfenbein, associate professor of organization and strategy at Washington University's Olin School of Business, said spinoffs surge during bull markets. "A CEO never wants to split up a company in a way that doesn't yield nice valuations for both," he said.

Breakups sometimes are forced by activist shareholders such as Carl Icahn, who pressed eBay to jettison PayPal. They also can result when an older, slow-growing unit is obscuring the value of faster-growing businesses.

Energizer, for example, wants to separate the slow-growth battery business from its personal-care products. At Hewlett Packard, the low-margin PC and printer business gets in the way of a sexier technology-services unit.

If some spinoffs undo mergers, others sow the seeds of combinations. Ryan Mendy, chief operating officer of Edge Consulting, said about two of every 10 spun-off companies get acquired within two years.

Examples include both parts of

the old Sara Lee, which was broken up two years ago. Sara Lee's meat business, Hillshire Farms, was bought by Tyson Foods, and its tea and coffee business, D.E. Master Blenders, was taken private by a German company.

Analysts speculated that the current spinoff crop might produce many takeover candidates. Google is mentioned as a possible buyer for PayPal, and Energizer's personal care unit is said to be attractive to larger rivals such as Unilever or Colgate-Palmolive.

If a buyer is ready, though, why not just sell your subsidiary rather than spinning it off?

Perhaps those buyers aren't willing to pay what management thinks the business is worth — until they see the subsidiary publishing its own financial results. "I can imagine that it's more difficult to prepare a unit for sale inside a larger organization," Elfenbein said. "Management incentives are one thing to look at."

Bingo, Mendy said. Shares of a spun-off company are simply handed to the parent company's stockholders.

Many stockholders must dump the shares; an index fund, for example, can't hold shares of a new company that's not in its index. This creates an opportunity for managers, who typically get stock options soon after a spinoff, to make money.

"Management are incentivized not to do a road show ahead of the breakup, as they would do ahead of an IPO" to promote the stock, Mendy said. "They want their options priced as low as possible."

Since 2000, Mendy said, broken-up companies generate eight times the return of the S&P 500 index in the first year after a split. The spun-off company outperforms its old parent by an average of 50 percent.

You can believe executives who say they have a strategic reason to break up what their predecessors put together. You can also bet that they have dollar signs in their eyes when they're saying it.

## Build goal consensus for success

**Q:** I'm heading a company task force to introduce some wellness programs. My concern is that people will pursue their special interests instead of looking at our overall needs, and also that it'll be hard to meet the needs of people at our satellite office. We're not a huge company and resources are limited. Any suggestions?

**A:** Avoid drama and build consensus around the goals instead of the tools.

### The inner game

Leading this type of initiative can be the classic "herding cats" situation, with all of the frustration that can come with it. If you have a high level of control needs, this can add to the challenge. So start by taking some time, relax about the situation and take some deep breaths. Remind yourself that a satisfactory outcome is achievable and trust the process.

To set up yourself — and your company — for success, think about similar processes in which you've been involved. What has worked and, just as important, what has been less successful in terms of process? Consider examples of leaders who have been able to work with committees to achieve their goals, and analyze the strategies and tactics they've used. You may be able to learn a great deal from their examples.

It seems like you have misgivings about the motivations of some of your team members. If you have concrete reasons for your concerns, articulate them and consider how realistic they are. You'll be better able to manage this if you're clear about what you think is going on.

Be sure you understand your company's vision, motivation, willingness to invest and the extent to which leadership has your back. Do some homework on resources that may be available internally and externally, too.

### The outer game

Get ready to work with your group by having a chat with each of the members to learn more about their points of view. This will also give you a chance to ensure there is a good diversity of needs represented, reflecting different health-status levels, ages, family compositions and values — and make sure you have a member from your satellite office. If needed, tweak your team membership to get the representation you need.

Spend some time agreeing on ground rules, roles and responsibilities, and decision criteria. You may find that full consensus is not the best strategy for getting a plan through. However, you all need to buy into the goal you're trying to achieve. And it needs to be specific. Rather than "set up a wellness program," tie it to the company motivation: "Develop a program that will help people manage their health to keep health care costs under control."

When identifying and vetting possible approaches, you can manage special interests by running the idea against the goal. It'll provide a less subjective (hence, less emotional) test of whether someone's pet project is a fit.

Check out your ideas with your co-workers, perhaps using a quick employee survey to assess the appeal of your ideas with the company as a whole.

## Trucking firms are stretching to find more drivers

On a recent Thursday afternoon, Tim Hoag stood in the arrivals area at Minneapolis-St. Paul International Airport, looking for a truck driver.

The man he was waiting for, Bill McMahon, had driven trucks for Hoag's company, Copeland Trucking of Fridley, and Hoag made a deal to lure him back.

Because McMahon now lives in California, Hoag agreed to let him drive out there once a month, even

though Copeland avoids jobs in California because of the state's burdensome regulations. But finding drivers is so difficult these days that Hoag was willing accommodate McMahon's desire for regular visits home.

"It will be worth it just to have him available here in the Midwest for those three weeks of every month," Hoag said. "That is what you have to do in today's environment."

McMahon is thrilled. "I think it's awesome. They are going to take care of me

and I am going to take care of them," he said. "That's what we agreed on. That's why I'm here."

Across the country, trucking companies, and manufacturers and retailers with their own fleets, are resorting to an array of incentives, including higher wages, to attract drivers.

Wal-Mart Stores Inc., the nation's biggest retailer and operator of one of its biggest truck fleets, is using radio ads to appeal to qualified truck drivers with an offer of a \$76,000

salary plus benefits to join the company.

That's far above the national average trucker pay of about \$50,000.

Wal-Mart has 7,200 truck drivers but needs more, spokesman Brian Nick said.

"There is definitely a shortage in the company ... and an overall shortage in the industry," Nick said. "We are anxious to get more folks applications so we can pursue more hiring."

The American Trucking Associations reports

that the country has 750,000 "for hire" drivers but needs at least 30,000 more at the moment.

It estimates the industry must hire 100,000 drivers every year for 10 years if it hopes to keep up with retirements, turnover and industry growth.

Hoag estimates he turns down 10 hauling requests from potential customers every day. He's looking to add eight drivers to the 56 who now work for the firm.

## Founder: Whole Foods can't sit still

These are interesting times for Whole Foods Market.

Long the national leader in the natural and organic foods industry — and long a darling of investors, thanks to its consistent earnings performance — the Austin, Texas-based grocer has in recent months found itself on the defensive.

After a series of disappointing earnings reports — and amid growing competition for natural foods customers — Whole Foods is making some changes to how it operates. The company recently unveiled an aggressive price cuts program at its five Austin-area stores, the latest in a series of counterattacks against its competitors. The company also recently launched a national grocery delivery and pickup service, and started its first-ever rewards program, in Princeton, N.J., with plans to expand the program to other stores.

There's plenty at stake for the Austin-based organic foods giant, which has 2,800 employees locally and 85,000 workers at 399 stores worldwide. Co-CEO and co-founder John Mackey sat down at Whole Foods' Austin headquarters to talk with the *Austin American-Statesman* about the company's battle plan going forward.

**Q: What's ahead for Whole Foods?**

**A:** The essence of it is that for the longest time, Whole Foods Market was very differentiated from all of our competitors. If you wanted to get organic produce, you came to

Whole Foods. If you wanted natural foods, you came to Whole Foods. Local foods, Whole Foods. And I think due to our tremendous success, we just have a lot of imitators. This is really how capitalism works. You innovate, you create something new, it works, then people copy it and try to make it better, or try to make it cheaper. That's how progress occurs in our society.

For a while last year, Whole Foods was the most valuable, dedicated food retailer in the United States from a market capitalization standpoint. We were actually valued higher than Kroger. I think that's a huge wake-up call for the conventional supermarket industry and they have just been far more aggressive. I always like to joke

that for about the first 20 years of our existence, we just kind of flew under the radar. Nobody paid attention to us. We were just these weird people selling weird food. What happened was that it's really penetrated now into the mainstream, so everybody and their cousin is selling a lot of foods that are similar to Whole Foods. We still think we're differentiated, we think we have superior quality in pretty much all of the important categories, but it's not always quite as apparent to our customer as it used to be. So we've been working very hard.

**Q: In your July 30 earnings conference call, the company discussed a five-part strategy, including plans to**

**refresh 70 percent of your older stores. What does refreshing your stores look like?**

**A:** It's not exactly a remodel, which oftentimes involves expansion and huge changes. So refresh means that for Whole Foods, we are going to change the signage, we are going to change some of the messaging, we are going to paint the store in some cases. We are very decentralized, so we do a lot of experimentation, a lot of innovations occur everywhere and then these successful experiments get studied and they get copied. So refresh will involve a lot more successful innovations ... put into the stores around the country. So in this (Austin) case, we are refreshing the prices.

**Q: What kind of competition is Whole Foods facing in its hometown and elsewhere?**

**A:** All you have to do is look out the window to see Austin just booming, it's growing so fast and (there's been a) significant increase in competition in the Austin food market. It used to be H-E-B and Central Market and Randalls. Now, you've got Trader Joes, Sprouts and Central Markets continue to grow. It's a matter of time before (more) come in. We used to just have local, regional competitors and now we've got more national competitors in this marketplace. And of course we never want to overlook Wal-Mart, Costco or any of those guys. So we have to be more competitive.

## For some, battle against breast cancer is personal

Across the nation this month, businesses are rallying their employees and customers in the fight against breast cancer. For some owners, the cause is personal and workplace participation is that much more rewarding.

On a recent Monday morning, Scott Collins sat beside his wife, Lori, as she endured another round of chemotherapy to treat her breast cancer. He should have been out at a job site, supervising his team of window cleaners, but he knew they understood the competing de-

mands on his time.

Throughout October, Collins' employees are wearing pink shirts in support of National Breast Cancer Awareness Month. At the end of the month, Affordable Window Cleaning Co. in Davie, Fla., will donate a percentage of its profits to The Gift of Hope, a foundation that helps local breast cancer patients with financial needs.

"I want to support my wife in every way I can," Scott said. "My crew understands that."

Some owners, such as Scott Collins, start small, asking employees to wear pink clothing or ribbons and to get involved in fundraisers. Others, such as Rocco Mangel, of Rocco's Tacos, rally cus-

tomers in a bigger way. Mangel raised \$32,000 in 2013 from an October promotion in which a portion of Tuesday night proceeds at all five restaurants went to the Susan G. Komen Foundation. (Rocco's girlfriend's mother is fighting her second battle with the disease.)

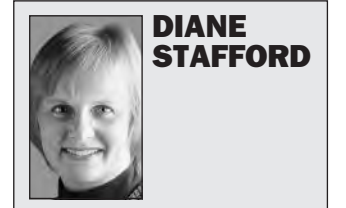
The efforts of both represent more than just fundraisers or awareness events. For spouses and family members of breast cancer patients, these are a way to ease heartache or show solidarity. Some small-business owners gain emotional support from signing up employees for local Race for the Cure teams.

Some take other approaches. Oscar Padilla said his mother died of

breast cancer. The memories of her rapid decline still sting, he said. "Anything I can do to spread awareness is gratifying."

Every October, Padilla turns his Kairos Hair Salon pink and donates 10 percent of sales from services and products to the Komen Foundation. This week, his 10 stylists will participate in a cut-a-thon with raffle prizes donated by neighboring vendors.

Breast cancer remains the leading cancer killer among women ages 20 to 59; more than 1.4 million cases are diagnosed annually worldwide. It is a life-changing event with repercussions that extend beyond the disease and treatment, and affect those who act as a support system.

## 5 guidelines for asking for a raise

**THERE WAS** quite a buzz when the Microsoft CEO suggested that karma will reward women who don't ask for raises. Appropriately chastised, he apologized and national attention moved on.

But for many workers — men and women — asking for a raise remains the sticky wicket. Making the request is tough for any worker who has realistic understanding of the economy and the employers' finances.

In a time of generally stagnant wages and continued fears of job loss, few employees dare to make rash demands. Yet many honestly deserve more pay. Here's how to request it:

Time the appeal correctly. Know when your workplace's budgets are drawn up for next year and put your bid in a couple of months before they're inked. Alternatively, time your request to align with when you've assumed more duties or received a promotion that was offered in name only.

Know the market. You must be realistic in your request. What is the pay range for people who do your job — both inside and outside your company? Consider regional price differences. Use online resources such as [pay.com](http://pay.com) and personal conversations to get the information.

Prepare your reasoning. Be ready to cite specifics about why you deserve a raise. Don't rely on "just because I haven't had one in a long time." Make a list of examples showing how you've exceeded expectations, taken on more responsibility, done things that made or saved your employer money.

Be calm. Approach the appropriate manager at a time when both of you have time to talk privately and at some length. Avoid yelling, crying or other strong emotion. Just state the facts.

Accept the outcome. Sometimes you simply won't win. If you can't accept the rejection, start a quiet job search. If you can wait until later to ask again, try to focus on keeping your morale up in the meantime.

## Come up with an adult strategy to rise above juvenile office rivalry

**Q:** Recently, a colleague called me to complain about a new program that I started. "Joanne" talked at great length about her own ideas for making the program more effective. When I pointed out the flaws in her thinking, she said, "You've upset me so much that I have to get off the phone." Then she hung up. She actually sounded like she was about to cry.

After this conversation, Joanne told her boss I had

been rude and insulting, so now he thinks I'm a trouble-maker. I believe Joanne is trying to damage my reputation because she resents the fact that my program has been well-received. My first inclination is to never

talk with her again for fear that she will twist everything I say. What do you think about this?

**A:** If you stop speaking to Joanne, you will simply be countering one juvenile behavior with another. So instead of getting all sulky and passive-aggressive, you need to come up with a more adult strategy. As a first step, take a moment to consider your recent interaction more objectively.

After an argument, people usually describe their own behavior as calm and reasonable, while portraying their opponent as angry or immature. It is therefore not surprising that you see Joanne as childish and emotional, while she views you as disrespectful and impolite. In reality, there is probably some truth on both sides.

Because you and Joanne have to work to-

gether, you must make an effort to repair this relationship. Instead of focusing on your differences, find a way to involve her in your project or at least solicit her input. If you demonstrate an interest in her opinions, she may be more supportive of your new venture.

## NIH grants WVU \$10.7 million for stroke research

With the help of a major federal grant, WVU is bolstering its faculty and scientific research on stroke to mitigate the devastating effects of the disease across the state and the nation.

The grant of \$10.7 million over the next five years, including more than \$2.1 million this year, will have a transformational effect on basic and translational stroke research at WVU. The funding will enhance mentoring and development of five junior investigators and their research programs, as well as support core resources.

The American Heart Association ranks stroke as the fourth highest killer in the nation and one of the leading causes of long-term disability. The burden of stroke is particularly heavy in West Virginia, with the state having one of the highest incidence rates in the country.

"Risk factors of stroke and stroke itself affect a lot of people — with particular prevalence in Appalachian populations. These populations are seeing stroke events occur at younger ages and with longer-lasting effects," Jim Simpkins, director of the WVU Center for Basic and Translational Stroke Research (CBTSR) and

professor in the WVU School of Medicine Department of Physiology and Pharmacology, said.

"We are being presented with an opportunity to make a significant impact on the quality of life for stroke patients. The discoveries that our faculty make about when and how these events happen can minimize poor outcomes from stroke and help patients recover quickly so they can return to their families and live normal lives."

COBRE, which stands for Centers for Biomedical Research Excellence, is a program of the National Institute for General Medical Sciences focused

on enhancing research and mentoring of young faculty members. This is the third COBRE grant awarded at WVU.

"It's no secret that stroke is a major problem in West Virginia," Glen H. Dillon, vice president for Health Sciences Research and Graduate Education, said. "Receipt of this competitively earned NIH grant will ensure WVU continues to be a leader in conducting cutting-edge research focused on stroke."

Simpkins explained that the West Virginia Stroke COBRE will support a key part of CBTSR. WVU is unique because it has the capability to address bench (lab-

oratory research), bedside (clinical research), and community (outreach) issues in stroke.

"We must engage a lot of people in order to solve West Virginia's stroke issue," Simpkins said. "Stroke prediction, cause, prevention, acute treatment, and rehabilitation are all linked, and a national center for excellence in stroke research will provide the most advanced research into all of these areas."

The grant will support a formal junior investigator mentoring program, which Simpkins said is critical to faculty development and research independence.

## Soils team qualifies for nationals

A second-place finish in regional competition has qualified the WVU Soils Team for the National Collegiate Soils Contest next spring.

Ten students from WVU's Davis College of Agriculture, Natural Resources and Design traveled to Clemson, S.C., Oct. 6-9, to compete in the 2014 Southeast Regional Collegiate Soils Contest. WVU's team members were among 71 students representing 11 schools.

"After three days of practice, the team was prepared for the unfamiliar soils and the students were able to calibrate their judging skills to the local conditions," said James Thompson, a professor of soils and land use in the Davis College and the team's coach.

The students who traveled with the team were David Ackley, a junior in agribusiness management and rural development from Edon, Ohio; Ellie Bell, a senior in soil science from Snowshoe; Riley Biddle, a junior in agronomy from Carmichaels, Pa.; Caleb Griffin, a senior in agroecology from Friendsville, Md.; Jimmy Leonard, a sophomore in agroecology from Middletown; Emily Lessman, a sophomore in soil science from Mount Pleasant, Pa.; Adrienne Nottingham, a senior in soil science from Green Bank; Katie Stegemerten, a senior in multidisciplinary studies from Annapolis, Md.; Becca Swope, a senior in agricultural and extension education from Salem, Ohio; and Emily Wells, a senior in agribusiness management and rural development from Sistersville.

When the results were tallied, six WVU students placed in the top 25. Nottingham finished second, Griffin seventh, Swope 11th, Stegemerten 12th, Lessman 21st and Bell 23rd.

## Livestock team scores at regionals

WVU's Livestock Judging Team traveled to Harrisburg, Pa., on Oct. 4, for the Keystone International Livestock Expo. The WVU team finished second overall, won second place in both sheep and swine, and third place in cattle and reasons.

Robby Currey, an agricultural and extension education major from Salem, was second place individual overall, first in sheep, second in reasons and fourth in cattle. Shawna Rhodes, an animal and nutritional sciences major from Statts Mills, was eighth place individual overall, second in sheep and third in swine. Amanda Kline, an animal and nutritional sciences major from Sabillasville, Md., was 10th place individual overall and fourth in swine.

WVU's team competed against students from Ohio State University, the University of Missouri, Clemson, the University of Florida, the University of Tennessee, Penn State, North Carolina State and Delaware Valley College.

They are coached by Scott Bowdridge, assistant professor of animal science in the Davis College of Agriculture, Natural Resources and Design, and Taylor Harrison, a graduate student pursuing a degree in beef nutrition.

## Social media response

WVU marketing students Deonna Gandy and Chris Hickey have been putting their lessons in a classroom to work this past week.

After the destructive behavior that occurred throughout Morgantown by some students and visitors following the Oct. 18 victory against then-fourth-ranked Baylor, the pair who met freshmen year while living in Honors Hall wanted to help.

So they took to social media, where much of the damage to the university's reputation had been done. Photos and videos from the disappointing events Saturday night had been surfacing and Morgantown had been trending for hours for all the wrong reasons.

Hickey, a junior born and raised in Wilmington, Del., sent a Facebook message to Gandy, a junior from Pittsburgh, asking, "What can we do?"

"WVU educates students to be successful for the workforce, and we need to be a great representation of that," Gandy said. "The behavior that night is not who we are or what we want to be known for."

The answer they come up with was a student-led social media awareness campaign, which they thought could show-

case those who love WVU and Morgantown. To do so, they developed the #RespectfulMountaineer hashtag.

Hickey was the first person to use the hashtag on Twitter: At 4:23 p.m. Oct. 19, he tweeted, "My name is Chris Hickey and I'm a #RespectfulMountaineer. I love and respect this University and the town in which it resides."

He and Gandy could not anticipate what would happen next. The hashtag exploded. While it didn't trend nationally the way Morgantown did on Saturday night, it hit home with many students, faculty, staff, alumni and fans across the world.

"While some students behaved inappropriately on Saturday night, many of us were so upset with how our second home was treated," Hickey said. "We love this town, and the success we've had for this campaign shows that a lot of other students, as well as alumni and residents, feel that way, too."

Within the first few days, the #RespectfulMountaineer hashtag had been used more than 1,500 times and had reached more than 500,000 people and 1.4 million timelines.

"It just clicked," Gandy said. "We want it to be about the celebration, not the devastation. ... I know this is a move-

ment that will have a lasting impact, because many students are fed up."

The completely student-led initiative has university officials talking, including President Gordon Gee, who mentioned the #RespectfulMountaineer hashtag in his letter to the WVU community on Monday. He even joined in on Twitter by saying, "I am a #RespectfulMountaineer, because I know this state, its people and our institution can and will rise to their highest potential."

"Deonna and Chris have clearly hit on a great idea that has resonated with Mountaineers all over," Corey Farris, WVU dean of students, said. "They will help change the culture. Their powerful message will take their university back."

Morgantown City Council also applauded the social media campaign at Tuesday's meeting, calling it "heartening" to see what students are doing to be part of the solution to the culture change.

## WVU joins \$4.89M effort to fight obesity

WVU will help teens "Get Fruved" with the support of a \$4.89 million grant from the USDA's National Institute of Food and Agriculture (NIFA).

The project, will implement a peer-led, train-the-trainer social marketing intervention to encourage teens to eat more fruits and vegetables to help prevent chronic disease including obesity in older adolescents and young adults.

Melissa Olfert, assistant professor of human nutrition and foods in WVU's Davis College of Agriculture, Natural Resources and Design, will lead the Mountaineer efforts on the project in coordination with seven other state partners.

"The goal of our research is to develop a novel strategy to promote healthy behaviors associated with weight awareness in older adolescent populations," Olfert said. To reach this goal, a community-based participatory research approach will be used with partnerships among teens and young adults, graduate students, university researchers and faculty, along with members of WVU's Collegiate 4-H chapter.

Additionally, the program will partner with campus student groups, not only those focusing on majors related to nutrition and health, but also such diverse areas as business, media, and the performing arts. Activities, campus events, and even art and campaign logos will all be developed and implemented by students.

"The peer-led, train-the-trainer intervention is an interactive, non-traditional social marketing, online media, and environmental change approach seeking to promote healthy behavior with communities of college and high school students," Olfert said.

Specific health behaviors targeted include increasing intakes of fruits and vegetables, decreasing foods high in saturated fats and added sugars, managing stress, getting adequate sleep and increasing physical activity.

"Although these healthy behaviors are often targeted in other interventions, this project is unique in that it increases participant engagement through creative interactions, participant-created content and incorporation of age-appropriate technology," Olfert said. "It also incorporates social environments and peer-led strategies while simultaneously addressing changes in environments."

## Physics researcher reacts to nuclear fusion news

Aerospace company Lockheed Martin recently announced that it was one step closer to producing nuclear fusion energy, an industry in development for decades that is expected to bring cheaper, cleaner and sustainable energy to the world.

Earl Scime, the Oleg D. Jefimenko Professor of Physics at WVU, decided as a boy that he wanted to go into physics and his specialty of plasma physics to develop this bountiful clean energy.

He agrees with the scientists quoted in a variety of news publications from *Forbes* to *The Huffington Post* that the company hasn't offered specific details to evaluate the strength of their progress.

"I've seen absolutely no details other than a schematic that looks

to create a compact reactor that, because of its size, would be produced sooner than otherwise anticipated.

"It will be interesting to see what they come up with," he said of Lockheed's research.

Scime, one of four faculty members in the plasma physics group at WVU (the university is hiring a fifth), said Lockheed is one of about a half dozen companies that have secured venture capital to

vaguely like a conventional magnetic mirror, a fusion concept that has been around for quite some time," Scime said.

The company's marketing video purports that Lockheed intends research the various problems that need to be overcome to produce nuclear fusion, in addition to research institutes and universities studying the problem.

Nuclear fusion energy is different from current nuclear fission power plants in that the fusion process wouldn't rely on materials such as uranium, which produces highly radioactive waste and has led to releases of radioactively contaminated air and water, such as the Fukushima accident that resulted from an earthquake-induced, 180-foot high tsunami in 2011.

Nuclear fusion would instead rely on fuel such as heavy hydrogen (deuterium) to create a controlled release of energy to use in a power grid. That goal has eluded scientists for more than 60 years.

Previously, large scale reporting of the quest for nuclear fusion had a negative impact on funding when media outlets in the late 1980s reported the failure of "cold fusion," a nuclear reaction expected to take place at room temperature, which Scime said was a fraud.

"Funding has been very tight, and there have been no new fusion projects in the U.S." in recent years, he said.

Fusion research started at WVU 28 years ago with the hiring of Mark Koepke, who is now the chairman of the national Fusion Energy Sciences Advisory Committee through the Department of Energy. About eight years after that, Scime was hired. Now, Paul Cassak and Felix Julian Schulze have joined them.

## Chevrolet Silverado 2500 HD is massive, speedy

Anything roughly as big as a Motel 6 can quickly become an expressway smasher.

Here, let me get some truck-driving tunes on ... oops. Was that little jolt a Mini Cooper or a Volkswagen Beetle?

Hard to tell from up here.

At 6-foot-6 and 7,000 pounds, the 2015 Chevrolet Silverado heavy-duty pickup trails long shadows, blocking out the late-afternoon sun.

You don't climb into the massive, diesel-powered truck. You inch up a metal cliff to clamber into the cab, hoping you don't slip and slide back down.

Once I got the Silverado 2500 HD docked at Chateau Box in Richardson, though, I always enjoyed the early-evening twinkle of downtown Fort Worth.

OK, some of that might be slightly exaggerated.

But in case you hadn't noticed, big heavy-duty pickups — the ones with enough steel in their frames for a credible bomb shelter — have grown truly huge.

They are longer, taller, slightly wider and probably 1,000 pounds heavier than the largest pickups 15 years ago — and they abso-

lutely mortify Prius drivers.

Moreover, they won't fit in most private garages or many public garages downtown, are way too long for parking spaces and can barely negotiate driveways.

But they also ride and drive better, consume slightly less fuel, haul far more weight and offer vastly more amenities than those old sledgehammers we bashed around in the '90s. (How about a Bose stereo system and heated and cooled seats?)

Granted, the restyled '15 Silverado HD looks a lot like the previous-generation truck, a common approach in the conser-

vative full-size pickup segment.

But I thought the one I had recently really bristled with new toughness in a low-key sort of way.

#### How it runs

Before you blast off in the truck, you may need to lower the window to make sure the Max is spinning.

Like so many modern diesels, the engine emits a slight clatter when it's cold but quickly settles into a pleasant, somewhat muted growl.

Give it the boot — a hard push is needed — and this giant mass of metal rises up some and bolts down the road, feeling a bit like a

house caught in a mudslide.

In fact, it will bear-sprint to 60 in a very fleet 7.6 seconds, according to *Car and Driver*, which is quick enough to dust many midsize sedans.

At any speed under 80, the truck responds to jabs of the throttle with a pleasant, torquey surge.

In addition, the Allison transmission did a good job of keeping the Duramax mostly between 2,000 and 4,000 rpm, where life felt good.

Heavy-duty pickups remain exempt from economy standards, so who knows how much the Silverado guzzles?

But I figure it probably returns 15 to 17 miles per gallon on the highway — or a couple of miles per gallon better than my car, which weighs half as much.

It can also tow 13,000 pounds, a max that should easily cover one of those party boats filled with fine tans and frequent misdemeanors.

Oddly, for such a large structure, er, truck, the Silverado steered and stopped nicely.

Unexpectedly light, the steering felt fairly quick with decent road feel, making me think I might just be temporarily in control.

As you might expect, the massive Silverado simply hated corners — even equipped with stability control.

That's what the brakes were for, I guess.

# It takes a village to raise a child, or garden

*My green thumb came only as a result of the mistakes I made while learning to see things from the plant's point of view.*

**GARDENING OFFERS** multisensory, firsthand learning opportunities in a wide variety of disciplines, including the natural and social sciences, math, language arts and nutrition. Due to weak academic scores in science and math skills among American children, the need for innovation in science and math teaching is paramount. There is increasing evidence that students who participate in school gardening score significantly higher on standardized science achievement tests (Klemmer et al., 2005).

Within the past 10 years, there has been amazing growth in the number of school gardens nationwide. This growth seems to be due to various research findings that identify educational benefits for students involved in the process of maintaining a garden. In California, an initiative to get a "Garden in Every School" was started in 1995 and now has gardens in more than 3,000 public schools.

Could you imagine that? A student-maintained garden in every school? It may sound like a monumental amount of work, but the positive effects on students would outweigh any effort necessary to achieve such a goal.

Here in Monongalia County, we seem to be following this national trend with regard to school gardens. Our county has school gardens at Mason-Dixon Elementary, North Elementary and, most recently, at Brookhaven Elementary. The schools and community stakeholders have become aware of the multiple benefits of school gardens for students, teachers and communities.

Most residents of West Virginia appreciate the beautiful landscapes of our state but may not have recognized the educational opportunities they can provide our children. I thought it might be appropriate to share what some of those benefits are with the community that reads my articles.

*To forget how to dig the earth and to tend the soil is to forget ourselves.*

— Mahatma Gandhi

■ Connection with nature: A close relationship with nature can be therapeutic in addressing various diagnoses and other problems faced by so many children today. When children recognize the direct effect they have on their environment, they can find purpose in their behaviors and insight into what healthy nurturing

can do to living things. This insight can be translated into their view of their home environments and support self-control.

■ Promotion of environmental responsibility: When children study about water and energy cycles, the food chain and the peculiar needs of individual species, and when they feel a sense of connection to a certain species or individual plant, they have a reason to care about all the forces that impact that plant's future. A garden offers many occasions for achieving insight into the long-term human impact on the natural environment — which reminds me of what I learned in Scouts: Leave no trace.

■ Improved life-script and nutrition: With West Virginia obesity rates ranked number one again, school gardening offers children opportunities for outdoor exercise while teaching them a useful skill. Gardens with fruits and vegetables can also help revise attitudes about particular foods. Students are more likely to try eating vegetables they have grown themselves and to ask for them at home (Morris & Zidenberg-Cherr, 2002). When students take their newly found preferences back to their families, they can help improve family consumption choices.

■ Multisensory learning and student engagement: Gardening activities can help engage students in learning in ways that are more difficult to achieve in the classroom. Several studies show that many students don't learn well in the traditional lecture-regurgitation style. Gardening allows surprises, not disruptions, to arise when insects land in the vicinity, when plants are afflicted with mites or fungus, or when the weather surprises everyone and disrupts the plan for the day.

The opportunities that school gardens offer our students and community provide a chance to be a part of something great. The greatness comes from embracing Appalachian traditions of using the land, respecting the land and learning from what Mother Nature has provided.

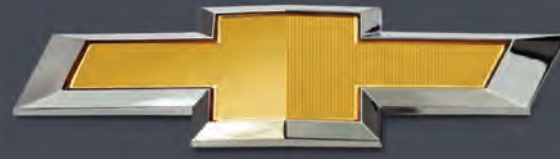

## Ford goes zero-emissions with a Pedego electric bike

Ford Motor Co., as part of its commitment to putting more lower-emission vehicles on the road, has done a deal with California-based electric bicycle company Pedego.

The result: A Ford-branded beach cruiser powered by an electric battery that buys the rider up to 20 miles of pedal-free operation — or longer, if the rider pedals part of the time.

The original impulse, the auto company said, came from Executive Chairman Bill Ford, who encouraged the company to reimagine the future of transportation.

Two years ago, a Ford representative approached Pedego and asked the company to

build a bike.

Pedego Electric Bikes got its start in 2006, when co-founder Don DiCostanzo bought an electric bike so he wouldn't have to pedal uphill on his way back from the beach. He didn't like the bike he bought, so he built his own.

He formed the Pedego company in 2009 with his former college roommate Terry Sherry. Operating from a single shop, Pedego eventually became the largest electric bike retailer in the U.S.

Eight years later, Pedego has sold more than 20,000 electric bikes, about 80 percent of them in the U.S., and about half of those in California.

The plug-in electric bikes retail for \$2,000 to \$3,000.

## Lamborghini Huracan: Music to a driver's ear

With an exterior color named for the myth of Icarus, I should've known. Drive the Lamborghini Huracán too slowly, and it begs the question: Why even bother?

But take it up on its sporting specs, and you might end up like I did: Trailed by the police and chastised.

"You're making a lot of noise, ma'am," was the specific complaint from the officers who pulled me over and, having failed to display any sense of humor or curiosity whatsoever about a hot-off-the-presses supercar that had been swiveling heads everywhere else I'd driven, at least didn't write me a ticket.

Noise is so subjective. Barking dogs, helicopters — those are the sounds that get under my skin, but the siren song of the Huracán LP 610-4? Pure music.

Literally. Its exhaust note is a harmonic two-tone

that's brought to life as easily as pushing a button on the stereo. Specifically, it's enacted through the steering wheel in any drive mode other than its Strada, or street, default, which yields a steady thrum. But Sport and Corsa release its full strength, rev matching and crackling with each downshift, making it grade-A police bait.

An Italian exotic named for a Spanish fighting bull, the Huracán is the successor to Lamborghini's best-selling car of all time, the Gallardo, which has now been put out to pasture. Lamborghini started making the rounds with its "entry-level" \$240,745 how-low-can-you-go coupe in January through private events at racetracks and, appropriately, art galleries. The Huracán has since become the most successful new car in Lamborghini's 51-year history. As it begins to roll into dealerships this month, Lamborghini reports more than 3,000 have been pre-sold globally, 1,000 of them in North America.

Having driven the car

for five days, it's easy to understand the enthusiasm. Not only are its angular lines unmistakably Lambo and phenomenally sexy, its power is almost as quick as its main competitor — the wild child Ferrari 458 Speciale. Powered with a brand-new port and direct-injected naturally aspirated mid-rear-mounted V10, it accelerates from 0 to 60 mph in a lickety-split 3.1 seconds, when properly spooled with its launch feature.

Lacking access to a track, and having had my allotted encounter with the police two days into my loan, I didn't personally attempt to check this particular specification as I wheeled it through my usual exotic stomping grounds. But I will say this: It took very little pedal effort to join L.A.'s occasionally race-like traffic.

In automatic mode, the Huracán's dual-clutch 7-speed is so incredibly smooth and quick shifting, I didn't even feel it move from gear to gear. I heard it — and verified it through the dash, where a gear indicator accompanies the tach.

## Flushing brake fluid suggested after 20K miles

**Q:** Is it necessary to flush the brake fluid after 20,000 miles, as my Mercedes dealer recommends?

**A:** I recommend this routine service for every motor vehicle. Historically, domestic carmakers haven't listed this as routine service for their vehicles, but it has been, and continues to be, a recommended service for most European and performance cars. In fact, race cars are prepared for every race with fresh brake fluid.

Why? Moisture. Hydraulic brake fluid is a glycol ether-based fluid that is hydroscopic, meaning it has an affinity for attracting water. Even the smallest amount of moisture contamination in brake fluid can significantly reduce its boiling point.

This is critical because the characteristic of brake fluid that makes it appropriate for use in hydraulic systems is its incompressibility. There is no loss of force transmitted from the brake pedal through the master cylinder to the caliper or wheel cylinder. When fluid is contaminated with moisture, temperatures reached in the caliper or wheel cylinder can boil the moisture, generating gas bubbles in the fluid which are, of course, compressible. The symptom of this is a soft, somewhat unpredictable brake pedal — not particularly confidence-building when trying to stop the vehicle.

Since some percentage of moisture absorption is normal over time, a periodic flushing and bleeding of the hydraulic system to replace any contaminated brake fluid is a very good maintenance practice. In addition, removing moisture reduces rust and corrosion forming in the brake system.

## Ford profit falls in third quarter on truck costs

DEARBORN, Mich. — Ford's new aluminum-sided F-150 will be a lot lighter and more efficient when it goes on sale this year. But for now it's a serious drag on profits.

Net income dropped 34 percent to \$835 million in the third quarter, largely due to the cost of launching the pickup. The new F-150, which is 700 pounds lighter due to its aluminum construction, is scheduled to go on sale by the end of this year.

Ford repeatedly warned investors that this year would be difficult financially. It's launching a record 23 vehicles worldwide, including the F-150 and the new Mustang sports car that went on sale during the third quarter. It's also building five plants in Asia

and launching the luxury Lincoln brand in China.

Yet, investors keep showing signs of nervousness over the pickup truck gamble. After hitting a high of \$17.84, in July, Ford's shares have steadily declined. After the earnings report, the shares were down 4.3 percent to \$13.77 in midday trading.

The F-Series has been the best-selling vehicle in the U.S. for 30 years: Changing its body from steel to aluminum could be a game-changer for the industry, but it could also hurt Ford's reputation — and profits — if the new material causes quality problems or doesn't meet buyers' expectations. Morgan Stanley analyst Adam Jonas estimates the F-Series accounts for 90 percent of Ford's global automotive profits.

## 'Forever' and a day

New fantasy drama toys with the immortal

How would you explain to your friends and coworkers that you may live forever? Imagine bumping into your college professor decades after graduation looking much the same as the first day you met. How would you explain that away? The fledgling series "Forever" tackles this idea when a new episode of the fantasy drama airs Tuesday, Oct. 28, on ABC.

Enter Dr. Henry Morgan. Aside from being touted as the top medical examiner in New York City, he makes a hobby of playing with dead things. Rest assured, this is all in the name of research as Morgan is immortal. He dies time and time again — four times in the premiere, if you can swallow that — and keeps coming back. The problem is that even though he has studied death, he has no idea why it eludes him.

The dark doctor is played by Ioan Gruffudd ("Ringer"), who has his fair share of dark and brooding in roles on his resumé. You may recall him as Mr. Fantastic from the Marvel Comics-based "Fantastic Four" franchise, where he may have been just as conflicted dealing with a preternatural power few could understand. He also has starred in films such as the biographical drama "W." (2008), "King Arthur" (2004) and "Amazing Grace" (2006).

"I'm a character that has lived for 200 years," Gruffudd said in conversation with ABC News. "Yes, I'm immortal, but

[Dr. Morgan] sees this as a curse rather than a blessing. If you can imagine living for 200 years and everyone else isn't immortal, people come and go in your life, and people pass on, and it's a bit of a tragedy. It's an interesting dichotomy. The character lives and breathes and works in a medical examiner's office, surrounded by death, but he can't die himself."

The rest of the cast comes from so many styles there is bound to be a personality that will speak to any viewer. Alana De La Garza is the tough-as-nails Det. Jo Martinez. She isn't sure what to make of the distracted medical examiner, but ultimately finds him intriguing, though she doesn't know his secret. De La Garza has been dabbling with law in television for a decade, starting with the naval and militaristic "Jag," as well as popping in "Law & Order," "CSI: Miami," "NCIS: Los Angeles" and "Law & Order: Special Victims Unit."

Lucas Wahl, the doctor's devoted assistant, is a bit of an oddball. Although he is more death-obsessed than his liege, he offers a spark of youth to the proceedings. Portrayed by Joel David Moore ("Bones," "Avatar," 2009), he has had less serious roles in films such as "Dodgeball: A True Underdog Story" (2004) and "Grandma's Boy" (2006).

One face that may seem familiar to viewers is Judd Hirsch, who's had a long, successful career in film and television. His career took off in the mid-'70s when he played moralistic

taxi driver Alex Reiger in the hit series "Taxi." Since then, he's starred in hit shows such as "Dear John" and "Numbers," as well as films like "Independence Day" (1996) and "A Beautiful Mind" (2001). He has two Emmys and a Golden Globe to his name, as well as countless other nominations, including an Oscar nod for his supporting role in "Ordinary People" (1980).

Hirsch's character, Abe, is the owner of an antique shop in "Forever" and one of the few people who knows of Henry's odd affliction. Not only is Abe a friend and confidant, he also happens to be the adopted son of the immortal doctor, which adds a special twist to the already-quirky situation. So while many kids seek advice from their parents, there's often a swap in this relationship since Abe encourages his father to live a little. It's an odd sentiment, perhaps, when it's directed at a man who'll live a lot longer than even his own son.

Narrated by Gruffudd's Dr. Morgan, the show's story is also told in flashback and happens to be eerily similar to a now-defunct 2008 program. Astute viewers may recall "New Amsterdam," an ill-fated Fox series that only saw eight episodes before its demise. The similarities begin with the immortal John Amsterdam, played by Nikolaj Coster-Waldau ("Game of Thrones"), who was a mid-thirties New York homicide detective. He was a soldier seeking his true love, and his 65-year-old son is in the picture as well.

According to producer Matthew Miller, "Forever" is not a retelling or spinoff. In fact, it was only in developing the show that Miller heard of the previous series. His idea was actually spawned by far more touching means, as he explained at Television Critics Association press tour in July.

"It was pilot season, and I was putting my five-year-old son to bed," Miller said. "He asked me, 'Daddy, are you ever going to die?'" It's a ques-

tion likely posed by most toddlers at some point, and initially Miller said no. He eventually added, "I will die, but it won't be for a very long time. ... [My son] burst out crying, and my wife came in and continued raising my child, and I went off to write television."

The old saying "time flies" certainly rings true for many of us. For Dr. Morgan, however, that idiom couldn't be further from the truth. See how the immortal doctor handles living forever when a new episode of "Forever" airs Tuesday, Oct. 28, on ABC.

### 'Halloween Wars' comes to a sweet finish

Confession time: I love Halloween. It's the one time of the year when we adults can really let loose and get in touch with our inner children. We get to gorge ourselves on candy and sweets — although maybe not quite as much as we once did. We can get all messy and creative as we tug out the slimy innards of pumpkins and then carve them up into scary faces or spooky scenes. Heck, we even get to play dress-up if we want to!

I think the best part of Halloween is that it only comes once a year. If we got to do all those fun things year-round, they just wouldn't be special — plus all that candy is most definitely not what the doctor ordered.

It's that once-a-year business that keeps the Food Network's "Hallow-

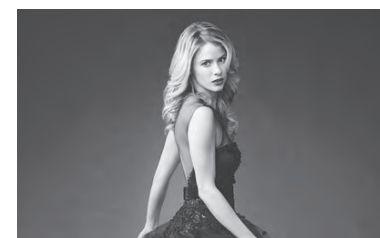

# A 'Masterpiece' murder

PBS brings a killer to America

**A 'Masterpiece' murder:** The list of things that the British do well is doubtless a long one, but television dramas must surely be near the top of it.

PBS's Sunday night standby "Masterpiece" has a long history of bringing the best of British dramas to this side of the Atlantic, and this autumn's season is no exception. With fan favorites "Miss Marple" and "Inspector Lewis" already behind us — compared to American television, British shows have notoriously short seasons — a new, two-part miniseries is next up for the public broadcaster.

"Death Comes to Pemberley" premieres the evening of Sunday, Oct. 26, with the second and final episode airing the following Sunday. Based on the novel by P.D. James, the murder mystery, which aired last year in the U.K. on BBC One, features some big-name U.K. actors who won't be strangers to American audiences.

The star-studded cast counts a number of heavyweights in its corner: Matthew Rhys ("The Americans"), Anna Maxwell Martin ("The Bletchley Circle"), Trevor Eve ("Troy," 2004), Matthew Goode ("The Good Wife"), Jenna Coleman ("Doctor Who") and Eleanor Tomlinson ("Jack the Giant Slayer," 2013).

As a sequel to "Pride and Prejudice," widely acknowledged as one of English

literature's greatest works, many of the characters in "Death Comes to Pemberley" will be like family to anyone familiar with that story.

With an acclaimed novel behind it, star-studded cast and a grisly murder to solve, "Death Comes to Pemberley" has the makings of a true masterpiece. The mystery comes to PBS's "Masterpiece" on Sunday, Oct. 26.

**Star struck:** Until recently, it was an untold story: the tale of the women who stood by America's Cold War-era astronauts as they became the heroes of the West, always standing in their men's earthly shadows as they took to the skies — and beyond.

Last year's non-fiction book "The Astronaut Wives Club: A True Story," by Lily Koppel, peeled back the darkness that had shrouded the details of these women's lives for decades, and now ABC is bringing their stories to the screen.

"The Astronaut Wives Club" is slated to premiere in early 2015, and with an exceptional cast, it's likely to make a mid-season splash when it comes in for a landing.

Odette Annable ("House M.D."), Kenneth Mitchell ("Jericho"), Yvonne Strahovski ("24: Live Another Day"), Desmond Harrington ("Dexter"), JoAnna Garcia Swisher ("Reba"), Dominique McElligott ("Hell on Wheels") and Bret Harrison ("Breaking In") are just some of the actors who are on board.

Despite the plans for a mid-season launch, ABC has high hopes for "The Astronaut Wives Club." It skipped the pilot stage typical of new shows and was given a 10-episode order out of the box.

Though it was originally planned to premiere this past summer, more time can (hopefully) only mean more polish, and with a few extra months to massage things, "The Astronaut Wives Club" could be as awe-inspiring as a rocket ship sitting ready for takeoff.

Watch for "The Astronaut Wives Club" to premiere early next year on ABC.

Beyond his standup gigs, Martin has long had a presence on both television and in the movies. He was a frequent correspondent in "The Daily Show" for a decade, was a writer for "Late Night With Conan O'Brien" and had his own sketch show on Comedy Central, "Important Things With Demetri Martin," which ran for two seasons. On the big screen, he's been seen in "Contagion" (2011), "In a World..." (2013) and "Analyze That" (2002).

On the set of "House of Lies," he'll be joining a cast that's as funny as it is talented. Kristen Bell ("Veronica Mars"), Ben Schwartz ("Parks and Recreation"), Josh Lawson ("Anchorman 2: The Legend Continues," 2013) and Dawn Olivieri ("Heroes") all star alongside Cheadle. And now, for a few episodes at least, Martin will be counted amongst their ranks.

Watch for season 4 of "House of Lies" next year on Showtime.

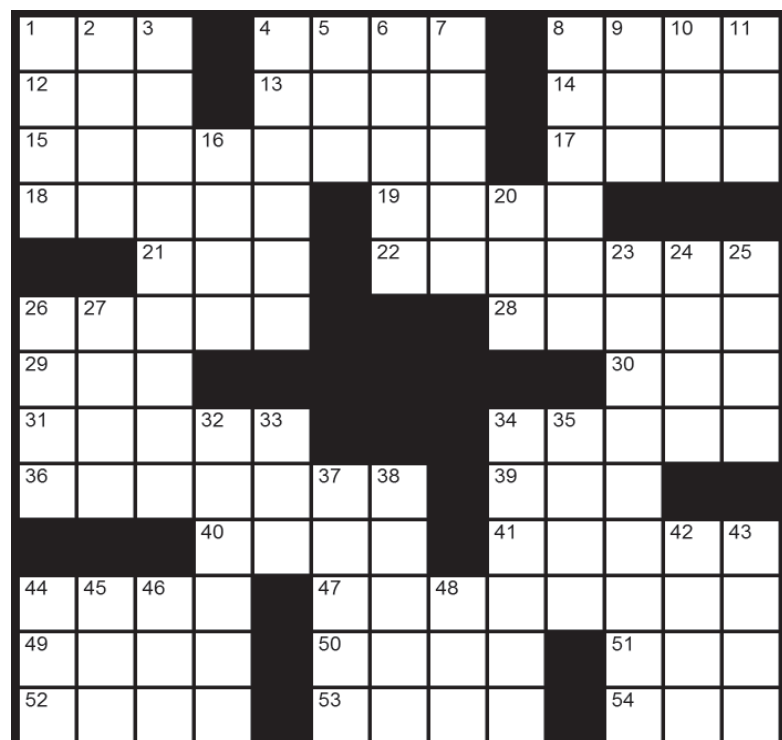

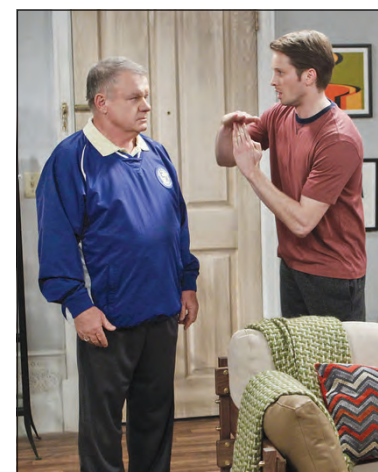

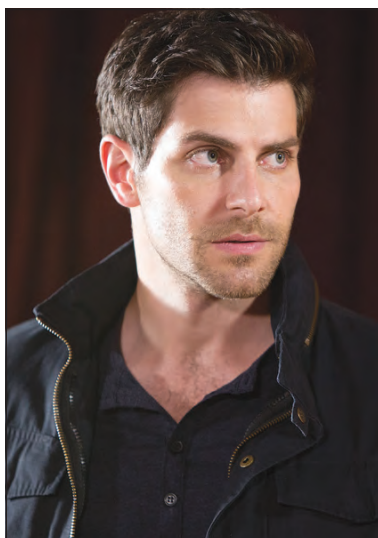
