Murder count for Martin

A second man is charged for Montrose killing

A man previously accused of armed robbery was charged with murder for his role in a Montrose Avenue shooting and now faces life in prison.

UPDATE

A second man was also arrested and charged Saturday for his role in the incident.

Jeremiah McKinley Martin Jr., 32, of Westover, was charged with first-degree murder. Martin was previously charged with first-degree robbery and conspiracy by the Morgantown Police Department. He was arraigned on Saturday in Monongalia County Magistrate Court by Magistrate Darris Sum-

Police eye 'smoofted' messages

Officials investigating city council's emails

The Morgantown Police Department is investigating emails sent to city employees that were made to appear as if they were sent by members of City Council.

City Manager Jeff Mikorski confirmed as much Friday when asked about an email included in the packet for the April 5 City Council meeting.

The email, sent by Mikorski to members of council on March 11, addresses two items: First, the claim that Mayor Marti Shamberger contacted city employees directly to request snow removal on her street and the results of the subsequent city investigation that showed otherwise.

Second, "We are also tracking recent emails that have been sent to employees from 'smoofted' email addresses that appear to come from City created Council member addresses, but are not coming from real council members' addresses. This criminal activity is being investigated by the

Unsafe water found in hundreds of schools

TOLEDO, Ohio — Responding to the crisis in Flint, Mich., school officials across the country are testing classroom sinks and cafeteria faucets for lead, trying to uncover any concealed problems and to reassure anxious parents.

Just a fraction of schools and day care centers nationwide are required to check for lead because most receive their water from municipal systems that test at other locations. State and federal lawmakers have called for wider testing.

Among schools and day care centers operating their own water systems, Environmental Protection Agency data analyzed by The Associated Press showed

that 278 violated federal lead levels at some point during the past three years. Roughly a third of those had lead levels that were at least double the federal limit.

In almost all cases, the problems can be traced to aging buildings with lead pipes, older drinking fountains and water fixtures that have parts made with lead.

Riverside Elementary in the northern Wisconsin town of Ringle has lead pipes buried in its concrete foundation that used to leach into the tap water before a filtration system was installed. Replacing the pipes, which were installed when the school was built in the 1970s, is not an option.

"For the cost of that, you

might as well build a new school," said Jack Stoskopf, an assistant superintendent.

Instead, he said, school officials decided to rip out the drinking fountains more than a decade ago and buy bottled water for students, costing about \$1,000 a month.

Buying bottled water for drinking has been the routine at Ava Head Start in Ava, Miss., even before lead levels spiked after the preschool moved into a new building in 2010.

But it was not until February, after another round of high test results, that state regulators told the preschool to use bottled water for cooking and cleaning the toothbrushes for the 59 children, ages 3 and 4.

3 on island rescued after writing 'help'

sands of people who stopped by the mall for the WVU Medicine Children's Health fair. Children's Hospital Director Cheryl Jones said the annual event is a way for the facility to thank the community for all the support — from volunteering to donations.

"This really is our way to give back," Jones said.

At the fair there were things to see and do, run by organizations. Many featured games or activities to help kids learn about being healthy. Most areas also featured giveaways, such as bicycle helmets, stickers or toothbrushes.

The fair is also a chance for those families without a primary care provider to get health screenings for children, Jones said. For example, blood sugar tests were provided, and if needed, referrals were given to people to seek the appropriate doctor if there was an issue.

Last year, about 9,000 people stopped by the fair, Jones said. She added she didn't know if the wintry weather was going to cause a spike or a decrease in attendance in 2016.

Police Department."

Mikorski explained that "smoofed" is the term the Police Department identified as an email made to appear as if it came from a specific email address when it actually originated from somewhere else.

"They appear to come from council's city email system, but when we look at the email system, there's no evidence that they were created and sent from our system," Mikorski said.

While he would not offer specifics, Mikorski said that the emails were asking "very odd questions."

"It was strange enough that we contacted the Police Department to investigate," Mikorski said.

Mikorski said his email to members of council was included in the agenda packet inadvertently.

Police Chief Ed Preston was not available for comment in time for this report.

State senate candidates file campaign finances

The May 10 primary election is approaching and candidates have filed the first of six campaign finance reports that they are required to submit to the secretary of state's office. The reports detail what they've raised and from whom, and what they've spent and where.

Here are the campaign finance report figures for area state Senate races: The 2nd, 13th and 14th districts. They are for the Primary-First period through March 25, and were due by April 1.

The next set, Pre-Primary, covers March 26 through April 24 and is due April 29.

2nd District

The 2nd District is an open seat. Incumbent Sen. Jeff Kessler, D-Marshall, is running for governor. Re-

publicans Mike Maroney and Ginger Nalley are vying to face Democrat Lisa Zukoff in November.

Maroney, of Glen Dale, raised \$14,250 in individual contributions and spent \$7,371.80, leaving a balance of \$6,878.20.

Nalley, of Sistersville, raised \$741.64 in individual contributions, including two from herself totaling \$116.64.

She spent \$34.19, on checks, but lists \$6,576.58 in unpaid bills, owed to herself. She didn't fill in the box for her account balance. Excluding the unpaid bills — an accounting provision to allow a candidate to avoid a negative account balance — it was \$707.45.

Zukoff, of Moundsville, raised \$15,204.82 in individual donations and spent the same amount. Among her donations was one from herself for \$1,854.82.

She also lists \$1,141 in unpaid bills.

13th District

Incumbent Sen. Roman Prezioso, D-Marion, faces a primary challenge from Jack. L. Oliver, who previously ran for the House in 2004 and 2006. The winner will face Republican, who previously ran for the House in 2012 and 2014.

Prezioso, of Fairmont, transferred \$30,075.65 from his 2012 campaign account and raised \$4,600 in individual contributions.

His total raised was \$34,675.65. He spent \$11,295.07, leaving a balance of \$23,380.58.

Oliver, of Fairmont, raised nothing but spent \$543.13 — \$200 of that on his filing fee. That left him with a negative balance. Secretary of state

spokeswoman Briana Wilson said that while negative balances are not allowed (Oliver's negative figure is recorded in a box that says, "Report cannot be submitted with a negative balance."), there are no consequences for reporting one.

"On the campaign finance reports, we accept what is sent to us," she said. "Then we review as many as we can before the next filing period so we can instruct the candidate to file an amendment."

Bledsoe, also of Fairmont, transferred \$208.10 from his 2014 House of Delegates 50th District campaign account. He raised nothing else and spent nothing, leaving his balance at \$208.10.

14th District

Incumbent Sen. Bob Williams, D-Taylor, faces a challenge from Delegate

Randy Smith, R-Tucker. Neither are challenged in the primary.

Williams, of Bridgeport, transferred \$16,726.81 from his 2012 account. He raised \$4,292.98 in individual contributions and \$5,150 at a January fundraiser in Charleston. The fundraiser also included \$88.62 in-kind for food and beverages for the fundraiser.

His total income was \$26,258.41. He spent \$2,528.86, leaving a balance of \$23,640.93.

Smith, of Davis, transferred \$119.48 from his prior election account. He raised \$2,030 in individual contributions and \$30,500 at a November 2015 fundraiser in Wheeling.

His total revenue was \$32,649.48. He spent \$47,805.46, leaving a balance of \$24,844.02.

mers.

He then only spoke to answer the questions and wished Summers a great day following the arraignment. No bail was set on the murder charge as it is to be issued by a circuit

court judge.

Also on Saturday, Benjamin Louis Bradley, 32, of Westover, was charged with armed robbery and conspiracy for his role in the March 31 incident. He had his bond set at \$75,000.

According to Martin's criminal complaint: A man identified by initials J.J.L.

— who police said is Jesse James Loya, 36, of Morgantown — was shot and murdered during a robbery at a Montrose Avenue residence. Martin was identified by eyewitnesses.

Police say that on March 31 two men forced their way into the Jerome Park residence. When police of-

ficers were called to the scene around 4 a.m. they found Loya on the ground with a gunshot wound. He was pronounced dead at the scene.

Another man Kyle A. Brown, 22, of Morgantown, was shot in the hand and taken to Ruby Memorial Hospital for treatment.

On April 2 police arrested Martin in the Fairmont area. If convicted of first-degree murder, Martin faces life in prison. First-degree robbery is punishable by a minimum of 10 years in prison. Conspiracy is punishable by one to five years incarceration.

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Marian Mazgaj

Father Marian Stanislas Mazgaj, 92, entered into eternal glory on April 7, 2016, at Ohio Valley Medical Center in Wheeling, in the care of his loving wife, Mildred Juanita Mazgaj, and the wonderful medical staff of the OVMC cardiac and intensive care unit.

Born on Dec. 8, 1923, in the Polish village of Gaj, he was the son of Jozefa Soja and Jozef Mazgaj.

Raised on a working farm for the first 16 years of his life, he knew the joys of a loving family, many good teachers and classmates, and a deep and abiding Roman Catholic faith.

On Sept. 1, 1939, he experienced the Nazi invasion of his homeland, and later as a member of the Jedrus Group and Flying Commando. He engaged in combat operations behind enemy lines for the duration of the war; received Allied air drops, witnessed the Holocaust first hand, and supported Operation Tempest in 1944. He often said on many occasions that he considered it a miracle to have survived the war.

Following the Soviet occupation of Poland in 1945, he responded to a call to serve Christ as a Roman Catholic priest, and was ordained on May 25, 1952. He later studied at the Jagiellonian University in Krakow, Poland, where he was awarded his doctorate in theology, and undertook post-doctoral work at the Catholic University of Lublin.

When the Soviet police apparatus began rounding up former members of the Polish underground, Father Marian received permission from his bishop to obtain a visa to the United States, and left Poland in

1957. He later became a U.S. citizen, achieved a second doctorate in canon law at the Catholic University in Washington, D.C., and a master's degree in philosophy at Duquesne University in Pittsburgh.

He taught at the Penn State University McKeesport and Fayette campuses for several years before resigning from the priesthood to marry his loving wife, Mildred Juanita Mazgaj, in 1972. He was later received into the Episcopal Church of the United States in 1981, where he continued his priestly ministry for another 30 years, serving a total of 60 years as a priest to God's people.

He was the eldest of 10 children, and is survived by three brothers, Klemens, Robert, and Zbigeniew; and four sisters, Henryka Baran, Danuta Bernys, Zdzislawia Wiecezorek, and Anna Lawrence. He is also survived by his loving wife Mildred Juanita; and their two sons, Marian Anthony Mazgaj, his wife, Corina and their two daughters, Isabel and Valentina of Encinitas, Calif., and Joseph Marian Mazgaj, of Rogersville, Pa.

He was preceded in death by two younger brothers, Olik and Eugeniucz.

Visitation will be at Kepner Funeral Home, 900 National Road, Wheeling, from 2-4 and 6-8 p.m. Monday. Funeral services will be held at St. Matthew's Episcopal Church at 1410 Chapline St., Wheeling, at 10:30 a.m. Tuesday, April 12, with the Rev. Mark E. Seitz officiating. Burial will follow at West Alexander Cemetery, West Alexander, Pa.

Woman files civil suit against alleged attacker

A woman who says she was assaulted by a man inside a parking garage has filed a civil suit against her attacker.

Earlier this month the woman filed suit in Monongalia County Circuit Court against Sadeq Abbas Alhakeem. The Dominion Post does not typically identify victims of sexual assault.

According to the civil suit, the attack resulted in bodily harm to the victim

and emotional distress. She has also suffered medical expenses, humiliation, mental anguish and embarrassment as a result of the attack.

The suit asks for an unspecified amount of damages.

Alhakeem was charged with two counts of first-degree sexual abuse and one count of second-degree sexual assault by the Morgantown Police. His case has yet to be presented to the Monongalia County Grand Jury.

Police say that in late January they responded to the Chestnut Street parking garage for a report of a man and woman stuck in an elevator. Video surveillance showed Alhakeem trying to sexually assault and abuse the victim.

He told police that the victim said no and she was very intoxicated.

Second-degree sexual assault is punishable by 10 to 25 years in prison. First-degree sexual abuse is punishable by one to five years incarceration.

Wyoming gives Sanders another win

CHEYENNE, Wyo. — Wyoming Democrats handed presidential hopeful Bernie Sanders another victory Saturday over front-runner Hillary Clinton, but the small delegate prize was split evenly between them.

Officials say the caucuses in 23 counties resulted in seven delegates each after Sanders won 56 percent of the votes cast and Clinton collected 44 percent.

The win did prolong the momentum of Sanders, who has now won seven of the last eight caucuses and primaries but still trails Clinton in the overall delegate count.

The roughly 7,000 Democrats who attended the caucuses showed plenty of enthusiasm and spirit.

At a noisy high school gymnasium in Cheyenne, Van Snow and his girlfriend Sara Rhodes parked themselves in different stands marked off for each candidate.

"I don't dislike Bernie," Snow, a 27-year-old attorney, said as he sat on the Clinton side. "He clearly has a lot of passion ... But I have some real concerns about his

electability to win the general, and I also have concerns about his ability to implement policies."

Rhodes, a 25-year-old graduate student seeking a social work degree, sat on the Sanders side, which appeared to have a few more people than the Clinton section.

"I feel like he stands for a lot of things that I believe in," Rhodes said. "I think he's one of the better candidates for women and people of color and the LGBT community. ... I just don't get a good vibe from Hillary, I guess."

Ben Rude, 18, of Cheyenne showed up at the Laramie County caucus to observe the process as part of his high school class on U.S. government.

Not registered with any party, Rude said he is undecided about which candidate would receive his first vote ever for president. He's sure it won't be Republican frontrunner Donald Trump.

"If Trump does win the Republican primary, I most likely will be voting Democrat regardless of the candidate," Rude said.

Steeped in conservative cowboy culture and proud of being the first state to grant

women the right to vote, Wyoming is a heavily Republican state where more than 140,000 residents are registered with the GOP, compared with about 41,000 registered Democrats.

However, the Wyoming Democratic Party has boosted its registration by about 5,000 new members this election year; state party Executive Director Aimee Van Cleave said.

Van Cleave was encouraged by the turnout of about 7,000 people even though it wasn't as big as the record 8,600 who caucused statewide in 2008.

Sanders made a campaign stop in Wyoming on Tuesday, attracting about 2,000 people at a rally in Laramie. His wife, Jane, held two town hall meetings in Wyoming leading to the caucus.

Clinton bypassed the state in favor of campaigning elsewhere, sending her husband and former President Bill Clinton to Wyoming to campaign on her behalf.

Wyoming has a total of 18 delegates who will cast votes for presidential candidates at the Democratic National Convention in July.

Belgians find 'man in hat' from video

BRUSSELS — After nearly three weeks of frantic searching, Belgian authorities announced Saturday they had finally identified the elusive "man in the hat" spotted alongside the two suicide bombers who blew themselves up at Brussels Airport: It was Paris attacks suspect Mohamed Abrini.

Belgium's Federal Prosecution Office said the recently detained Abrini — the last identified suspect at large from the deadly Nov. 13 Paris attacks — had also confessed to being the vest- and hat-wearing man linked to the Brussels bombers whose image had been widely circulated by authorities.

"After being confronted with the results of the different expert examinations, he confessed his presence at the crime scene," they said in a terse statement.

The revelation that a Paris attacks suspect escorted two of the Brussels bombers to their deaths at

the city's airport is the strongest sign yet that the Islamic State attackers who brought mayhem to both European cities — killing a total of 162 people — were intimately linked.

Ex-FBI agent was military shooter

DALLAS — A former FBI agent who later enlisted in the U.S. Air Force was identified Saturday as the man who killed his commander at an air base in San Antonio before turning the gun on himself.

A statement from the Air Force identified the two men as Tech. Sgt. Steven D. Bellino and Lt. Col. William A. Schroeder. The statement did not name the gunman, but a federal official close to the investigation said Bellino opened fire Friday at Joint Base San Antonio-Lackland. The official spoke on condition of anonymity because the person isn't authorized to speak publicly about the case.

The official said Bellino was an FBI agent for less than two years before resigning in 2013 and later enlisting in the Air Force. Authorities have not confirmed why

Schroeder was targeted. He was commander of the 342nd Training Squadron.

Man who fled hospital caught

SPOKANE, Wash. — A man who escaped from a Washington state psychiatric hospital where he was held after being found too mentally ill to face charges that he tortured a woman to death was found hiding under a pile of debris in the woods and apprehended without incident.

Anthony Garver, 28, was taken into custody Friday night by law enforcement in Spokane, Washington State Patrol spokesman Todd Bartolac said. Garver crawled out a window of a locked, lower-security unit on Wednesday with another patient, Mark Alexander Adams, 58, who was caught the next day.

The escapes intensified federal scrutiny on Western State Hospital, Washington's largest psychiatric facility. Western State had already been under investigation for attacks on patients and staff and a failure to improve safety.

A levy to provide an annual revenue source for the West Virginia Botanic Garden as well as a total of eight baseball and softball diamonds in five city parks will be among the six measures considered by Monongalia County voters in the May primary election.

The five-year levy would generate \$105,000 annually at a rate of .12 cents for every \$100 of Class II property and .24 cents for every \$100 of Class III and IV property.

According to information provided to the Monongalia County Commission, the levy would provide \$10,000 annually for two youth ball fields in White Park, two in Krepps Park, two in Marilla Park, and one each in Valley View Park and Jack Roberts Park.

Bader Giggenbach, vice president of operations for Morgantown Pony Baseball League, said the money would be used for field maintenance, as well as upkeep of bleachers and concession stands.

"There are a lot of people in our community who spend a lot

6 levies on May 10 ballot

There are no excess tax levies on the books in Monongalia County.

That could change as a total of six levies will go before the voters in the May 10 primary election.

Five-year levies have been presented for transit; parks and trails; volunteer fire departments; libraries; youth baseball and West Virginia Botanic Garden; and fairs and festivals.

If all six levies passed, they would generate a total of 4.96 cents for every \$100 of

Class II property (with single family home) — 9.92 cents for every \$100 of Class III and IV (with rentals).

Keeping with the examples provided with several of the levies, a resident with Class II property that has a market value of \$200,000, and assessed at \$120,000, would pay an additional \$59.52 each year — \$119.04 for Class III and IV — if all the levies are successful.

In order to pass, a levy needs 60 percent support from the voters. Any levies that do reach that threshold can go into effect on July 1.

Author giving books away to help kids learn

Morgantown's O'Brien to hand out 500 copies

A children's author donated hundreds of copies of her latest work to early learning programs statewide.

Cindy O'Brien, of Morgantown, worked in Head Start and pre-kindergarten programs in West Virginia and Pennsylvania for many years before writing several books.

Her latest, "ABC with You and Me," was written specifically for teachers of young children, and she's giving copies away.

"I have 500 copies — I don't want them in my backroom," O'Brien said, adding that she'll be traveling to an early childhood learning conference in Charleston today to distribute the book. "It's my way of sharing the kind of things I've found effective to work with kids, to get them actively involved in trying things out."

"ABC with You and Me" focuses on creating ideas for classroom activities that develop social and early literacy skills. Each letter in the book features a different exercise designed to accomplish a variety of goals, from improving reflexes and motor skills to teaching kids to politely request and refuse favors, among many others.

O'Brien said this is a crucial aspect to the book because pre-K is the first environment for many children in which they interact with people other than their parents, particularly those their own age.

In addition to social and literary elements, the book incorporates creative art. O'Brien made figurines out of clothes buttons, clothes pins and other recyclable materials, forming letters. She photographed them and features them on each page.

Bobbie Warash, director of the WVU Nursery School, said she received O'Brien's new book about two weeks ago and had her student teachers duplicate the artwork for use in their classrooms.

"I like her books because they're so practical and they're easy to use," Warash said, adding

Thanks to the work of hundreds of local volunteers, in one month 45,000 people around the world won't be hungry for a meal.

Residents gathered at Wesley United Methodist Church on Saturday for the sixth annual Stop Hunger Now drive, where volunteers pack foods in bags and boxes to be shipped all over the world.

"It's a wonderful project," said Jim Culberson, one of the organizers.

He said 200 volunteers worked in shifts to pack 45,000 meals. Volunteers were from Rotary

Clubs in Monongalia and Preston counties, WVU students and townspeople. They set up on three long stretches of tables to pack the meals while music played and smiles were shared.

In about a month, Culberson said, an email will arrive informing the volunteers where the meals were sent.

The meals packed in Morgantown were funded by grants and donations totaling \$13,000. Since its founding, in 1998, Stop Hunger Now has provided 225 million meals in 73 countries.

of time on these fields. With BOPARC's budget tightening and coal severance dollars dropping, I think it's a good levy to give folks in our community a chance to vote yes or no as to whether they would be willing to spend about a tenth of a cent on \$100 on this," Giggenbach said. "I think it's pretty reasonable and I hope it will pass."

The money, Giggenbach explained, would flow through BOPARC, the Board of Park and Recreation Commissioners, which would be "required to use these funds in the manner in which the voters vote on it."

For its part, BOPARC has not adopted an official position in regard to the levy. BOPARC is, however, part of the Parks and Trails Levy, which would generate \$455,000 annually for BOPARC's Morgantown Ice Arena.

Giggenbach said the \$10,000 figured to go toward each field was

prompted by the \$40,000 annually to go to four Westover Park baseball fields if the Parks and Trails levy passes.

"My thought was, let's be fair. Westover's going to get a chance at \$10,000 per field, then let's be fair and let Morgantown have a chance to get \$10,000 per field also, and let the voters vote on it," he said. "That's all that was driving this from the very beginning. Let's just be fair and equal."

The levy would also provide \$25,000 each year for the West Virginia Botanic Garden.

Barbara Howe, secretary of the West Virginia Botanic Garden Board of Directors, said the levy is aimed at replacing funding cuts expected from the county's coal severance fund.

"We're open every day at no charge, so we'd be using the money for utilities, insurance, plant material, garden supplies, office supplies — just general operating expenses," Howe said.

When the levy was presented to the County Commission, it was explained that it would not be used to pay salaries.

Howe said the Botanic Garden is funded through memberships, donations and grants, and annual funding from the city of Morgantown. Budget documents show \$25,000 for the Botanic Garden in the City's 2016-'17 budget.

In years past, the county has typically provided about \$14,250 each year to the Botanic Garden. That number was \$15,000 for the current fiscal year prior to the county pulling back 25 percent from each agency due to lower-than-expected coal severance revenue.

One of the problems, Howe explained, is that the majority of grants cannot be used for day-to-day expenses. Because the city owns the land, the city's funding is used for specific site projects, and in recent years, the county has changed its requirements so that its funding also goes to specific projects. The levy is

crucial in that it will provide day-to-day operating expenses.

The reduction in funding comes at an especially bad time as the Botanic Garden plans to open a new welcome center this spring — a structure designed as WVU's entry into a solar decathlon.

Howe said the structure was donated to the Botanic Garden, but transitioning the structure from a house to a public building — complete with a new lower level to be devoted to education — has been an expensive process and will increase the park's operating costs.

"It will be a huge addition to the garden, but it will also add a huge expense," Howe said, adding that a failed levy will likely mean some hard choices.

"We'll certainly just have to rethink things. Certainly we'll need to do more private fundraising," Howe said.

The West Virginia Botanic Garden is free and open to the public daily from dusk until dawn.

Pa. faculty union won't strike this academic year

STATE COLLEGE, Pa. — The union representing faculty and coaches at Pennsylvania's 14 state-owned universities said members decided against a walkout before the academic year ends next month.

But the Association of Pennsylvania State College and University Faculties said delegates at its legislative assembly voted Saturday to take a strike authorization vote either at an emergency session during the summer or at the next scheduled meeting in September, if there is no progress in contract negotiations.

Union president Kenneth Mash said that despite what he called "palpable outrage" on the part of members, they decided that a strike at the very end of

the semester "would unfairly burden students and their families."

"Uncertainty about the budget and the complications of tuition increases have made this a very stressful semester for students," Mash said in a statement.

The union said members, who have never gone out on strike, have been working under an expired contract for almost a year. Officials said the last talks were in January and the next session is scheduled April 28.

A union spokeswoman said earlier that the decision to consider a strike authorization vote followed "negative comments" about the union during last month's legislative budget hearings as well as the lack of progress in contract talks.



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

New inductee Steve Miller slams the Rock and Roll Hall of Fame

Steve Miller had just performed at the Rock and Roll Hall of Fame ceremony, but he wasn't finished.

In fact, he was just getting started. The new inductee ripped the rock hall in a backstage interview, calling the evening a "lazy" night with "a bunch of fat cats" that was tantamount to a bad reality show — only he used a stronger epithet than "bad."

"I don't know why I was nominated for this because I said this for 30 years," the 72-year-old musician said in the interview. "I don't get along with the people running it. When I found out about it, I felt like I was in a [expletive] reality TV show."

Of the evening as a whole, Miller said: "It wasn't very overwhelming. It was a lazy kind of night with a bunch of fat cats at the dinner table. It's not a

real pleasant experience, to tell you the truth.”

Asked why, he said: “The reason ... is because they make it difficult for the artists. I think it's time for the people running this to turn it over to new people because it doesn't need to be this difficult. You don't need to insult every artist that comes along.” He added: “People in the crews are nice, but people that are running it at the top have no concept of how to run a

concert, or how to run an award ceremony or how to take care of artists.”

The rock hall issued a statement Saturday in response to Miller's comments. “Rock and roll can ignite many opinions,” it said. “It's what makes it so great. The Rock and Roll Hall of Fame was honored to induct Steve Miller last night.”

Miller explained that he only appeared at the ceremony for the sake of his fans. “My fans take it seriously,” he said. “I really didn't want to show up.”

Entering the rock hall along with Miller at the ceremony at Brooklyn's Barclays Center was the rap group N.W.A., along with 1970s-era rock acts Cheap Trick, Chicago and Deep Purple. N.W.A., which opted not to perform at the ceremony, was inducted by one of music's hottest artists, Kendrick Lamar, who said

the group had “proved to every kid in the ghetto that you could be successful and still have your voice while doing it.”

Miller and his band, who are preparing for a summer tour, played the crowd-pleasing hits “Fly Like an Eagle,” “Rock 'n' Me Baby” and “The Joker” to an audience of fellow musicians and industry professionals sitting at tables, and ticket-buying members of the public in the surrounding stands.

“If you listened to the radio, you listened to Steve Miller,” said the Black Keys' Dan Auerbach, who inducted Miller with his bandmate Patrick Carney.

Backstage, Miller even questioned the purpose of the rock hall.

“You tell me what the hell is the Rock and Roll Hall of Fame, and what does it do besides talk about itself and sell postcards?” he said.

Friars Club hosts tribute for Jerry Lewis' birthday

NEW YORK — At the Friars Club tribute for Jerry Lewis' 90th birthday, many of the jokes were not about Jerry Lewis.

There were R-rated wisecracks Friday night about Donald Trump, Monica Lewinsky, doctors, sex and growing old from speakers including Richard Belzer, Freddie Roman and Max Alexander. When the subject did turn to Lewis, the kidding around turned to praise as Lewis was honored as a

comic master, inspiration, and, for Belzer, a savior.

“My mother was very physical; she used to be beat me up or give me an enema for punishment,” said Belzer, one of Lewis' closest friends. “Once in a while I would do a Jerry shtick ... and my mother would laugh and sometimes not hit me.”

About 200 people attended the 90-minute tribute. Lewis, whose birthday was last month, sat to the side of the dais, where he laughed and cried.



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

QB transfers past and present, and a plane to New York

THE CASE CAN BE MADE that Will Grier's transfer to West Virginia didn't start with a phone call, but rather, with a boarding call.

This particular flight from Atlanta took off a few days after Halloween. It was bound for New York, and for two embattled quarterbacks, it was bound by fate.

Thanks to the intricacies of zone seating on commercial airliners, the plane was mostly full by the time Grier made his way down the aisle and buckled in. Not long after he did so, Grier turned to the passenger next to him and struck up a conversation.

It was **Clint Trickett**.

"He was walking through and we looked up at each other at the same time, and it clicked at the same time," Trickett said, reached by phone Saturday afternoon. "It was pretty funny."

At the time, neither pretty-boy passer was laughing. A few weeks earlier, Grier — who led Florida to a 6-0 record during a sensational start to his freshman season — had learned the NCAA would suspend him for one calendar year following a positive test for a performance-enhancing substance. Similarly, Trickett's East Mississippi Community College team (He's the quarterbacks coach, remember?) missed out on its chance to play for a national title when a wide-scale brawl broke out during a playoff game.

Trickett was headed to the Empire State to see friends from WVU. Grier was visiting his brother **Nash**, a teenage internet personality on the popular social media site, Vine.

More than anything, "I think we were both trying to get away," Trickett said.

Each knew who the other was. Trickett, of course, transferred to WVU in 2013 and the following season, threw for 3,285 yards and led the Mountaineers to seven wins in the process. But Trickett — despite his status as Morgantown's walking, talking, heart-breaking QB transfer success story — claims he didn't try to sell Grier on WVU. (Which makes sense, considering at the time, he wasn't yet in the market for a new school).

Before the pair disembarked, they exchanged numbers. And in January, when Grier declared his intention to transfer, he called Trickett.

This time, Clint didn't play coy. As long as **Dana Holgorsen** was head coach at WVU, Trickett assured Grier, there would be an open competition for the starting quarterback job. Nothing more, nothing less.

He added his opinion that the 2014 Parade National Player of the Year could win such a competition.

"I told him that it'd be a good decision," Trickett said. "He's a bigger, better version of me. It's a no-brainer."

Of course, there's every chance that it was all coincidence, that Grier and Trickett only chatted to avoid listening to a flight attendant recite safety instructions and only kept up for pleasantries.

But do you buy that even for a New York-minute?

"Clint's time here was very valuable," Holgorsen said before Saturday's practice at the Caperton Indoor Facility. "It was a great experience for him, and he'll be the first to let you know that. Whether he had any impact on him will come here? I don't know."

PHILADELPHIA — Wayne Simmonds scored two goals, Steve Mason stopped 18 shots and the Philadelphia Flyers clinched a playoff berth with a 3-1 win over the playoff-bound Pittsburgh Penguins on Saturday.

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Clarissa Chun seeks final shot at Olympic gold

Clarissa Chun hears the questions all the time.

She could be grocery shopping in the summer in a T-shirt and her fellow customers will notice her biceps.

"Oh, do you work out? Are you a gymnast?"

Not quite.

"I wrestle," she'll say.

The ever-polite Chun will then help the customer scoop his or her jaw off the floor.

In reality, Chun, 34, an operations assistant with the WVU wrestling program, is more than just a wrestler, she's an Olympic medal-winning wrestler.

The 4-foot-11 Chun, who wrestles in the 48-kilogram (105.5 pounds) weight class, placed fifth in the 2008 Beijing Games.

Chun won bronze in the 2012 London Games, and she'll try for her third Olympic berth in today's U.S. team trials, at Hawkeye-Carver Arena, in Iowa City.

"She can do something that's never been done before: (Make) three Olympic teams," said WVU wrestling coach Sammie "The Bull" Henson, who coaches Chun as part of the Sunkist Kids Wrestling Club.

That's an incredible statistic to most folks for one reason.

"Outside of the wrestling community, people don't know that women's wrestling is in the Olympics for the most part," Chun said.

"When we're on TV, it's probably 2 or 3 in the morning. It's kind of like if you're not looking for it you don't know that it's there kind of thing."

Chun, who was born in Honolulu and raised in Kapolei, Hawaii, is the first female wrestler from Hawaii to win an Olympic medal.

"I wouldn't say I'm a household name like Marcus Mariota," she said in reference to the Tennessee Titans quarterback, who is also a Honolulu native.

"In the community of women's wrestling or wrestling in general in Hawaii, I am known."

She was one of the pioneers of women's wrestling in Hawaii. It became a state-sanctioned sport in 1998, when she was a junior at Roosevelt High School.

Chun competed in swimming and gymnastics as a

child, but judo piqued her interest when an older brother began bringing home trophies from his competitions.

Because of her diminutive stature, Chun recognized she wouldn't be collecting many swimming trophies.

Her parents did not encourage her interest in judo, so she began sneaking into her brother's practices. Chun won five junior national championships in judo.

When girls' wrestling began in Hawaii, the coach at her high school — who was aware of her judo background — asked her to come out for the team.

She won a state title in her first season, in 1998.

"The transition from judo to wrestling in high school in Hawaii was an easy transition for me because I was used to training with boys," Chun said.

"Sometimes there's a hesitancy girls have training with boys. That was something my family and I were used to through the judo background."

Chun figured her wrestling days would be over after high school, so she was stunned to receive a scholarship offer from Missouri Valley College for freestyle wrestling.

"I'm like, 'What's freestyle?'" she said with a chuckle.

Her career progressed quickly at Missouri Valley. She finished second in the U.S. World team trials and earned medals in the U.S. Nationals and Pan American Games in her three years at the school.

She left before her senior year when she was offered an opportunity to work out at the Olympic Training Center, in Colorado Springs.

Chun nearly made the

Olympic team in 2004, placing second in her weight class.

She upset 2004 Olympic bronze medalist Patricia Miranda to secure her first berth in the Olympics, in 2008.

"That was a turning point in believing that I belonged and I could do it," said Chun, who also won gold at the World Championships, in Tokyo, that year.

"That's mainly because I had to come through the tournament and beat someone I had never beaten before," Chun said.

Chun is seeking one more productive day at the Olympic trials, for she realizes that at her age this is her final attempt at making an Olympic roster.

"I don't imagine going to 38," she said. "I would like to, but maybe just as a spectator: It's going to be in Japan. I love Japan."

He'll compete for a spot on the U.S. Olympic team in the 74-kilogram (163 pounds) weight class at the U.S. trials, at Carver-Hawkeye Arena, in Iowa City.

"I feel fresh, which is good," said Marable, 28, who is aiming for his first Olympic berth. "I haven't competed in a while. I'm excited to compete, which helps."

"Watching our (WVU) guys compete at (NCAA) nationals really motivated me too. I'm excited for my own competition. I feel really good going into it."

Marable ranks sixth in the nation in his weight class.

He finished third at the U.S. Open/Olympic trials qualifier in December. Sixteen wrestlers are competing this weekend for one spot in each weight class.

Marable's chief challenger for a spot on the U.S. team that will travel to Rio de Janeiro this sum-

mer is 2012 Olympic gold medalist Jordan Burroughs, the top-ranked wrestler in the class.

Only one American has defeated Burroughs in international competition: Marable.

That victory came at the 2014 Yasar Dogu International, in Istanbul, Turkey. Marable's stunning upset ended Burroughs' 69-match winning streak.

Because he was a 2015 World medalist, Burroughs automatically advances to today's finals. Marable isn't solely thinking about Burroughs, though.

He can't afford to.

"All the people in my bracket are all national champions, All-Americans," said Marable, a two-time All-American at Missouri who placed third in the 2008 NCAA tournament.

"All 16 people will be some of the best kids in the country. Every match is going to be a battle. I actually like it. I like wrestling all

the best guys. It's fun. It gets me excited."

Marable trains under his boss, WVU head wrestling coach Sammie "The Bull" Henson, as part of the Sunkist Kids Wrestling Club, at the Mountaineer Regional Training Center, in Morgantown.

Marable and Henson have known each other since Marable's wrestling days at Missouri. Henson was then an assistant coach at Oklahoma.

Marable's first impression of Henson was not positive. He didn't care for Henson's constant yelling during matches.

"I thought he was annoying," Marable said.

The two hit it off when Marable traveled to Phoenix to do a camp with Henson as part of the Sunkist Kids Wrestling Club.

"Once I met the guy, it was a good athlete-coach connection," Marable said. "On top of being coaches, we became

friends as well."

Henson thought highly of Marable during his college days, once telling him, "If I trained you, you would be really good."

Their first training session was nearly their last.

While demonstrating a move, Henson accidentally head-butted Marable, and blood poured out of a gash above Marable's eyebrow.

"I bust this guy's eye open, and I'm thinking, 'Yeah, he's never going to want to be around me again,'" Henson said with a smile.

"I wanted to win him over: I felt like I could help him. We're built alike. Our styles are alike. I felt it would be a good match for both of us. He was really cool, laid back about (the accident). That's when I knew he was tough. For some people, that would have been a big issue."

Marable helped Henson land a job as an assistant at Missouri.

Henson brought Marable to Morgantown when he was tabbed to replace Craig Turnbull, in 2014.

He has helped Henson realize that each wrestler has his own approach to

preparing for matches.

Marable enjoys keeping the mood light, laughing and joking with friends before taking the mat.

Henson was the exact opposite. He was a fierce competitor who remained in an intense zone of concentration before matches.

"He's helped me be a better coach with his demeanor," Henson said. "You have to adapt for your athletes. I had to do a lot of things with him I didn't want to do. His demeanor is different. He competes better when he is relaxed."

"My son Jackson (a two-time state champion at University High) is like that. It's helped me with him."

Marable intends to enter today's competition with a relaxed but focused mindset.

He understands in the back of his mind that this is not his final shot at an Olympic berth, but he almost has to treat it like it is.

"I definitely want to make the team now," he said. "It's been a lifelong goal. As long as I train in the moment, everything will be fine."

making their debut with Konate and Bender.

"We had a hoop in our yard, but I had never really used it before," he said. "Everyone kept telling me to play basketball."

Bender, too, didn't play the sport until he was in the seventh grade.

"I got a late start," he said. "I've been working to catch up."

They both came to the United States during their high school years, leaving their family behind to not only learn the game of basketball, but a new language and customs.

"That was very hard for me," said Bender, who played his high school basketball at Mountain Mission in Grundy, Va. "I was very nervous, but the best way to learn a new language is to go to that country and learn it all."

Konate came to the United States last year and played at Kennedy Catholic in Hermitage, Pa.

"I never dreamed that basketball would lead me here," Konate said. "How could you dream something like that?"

There is a future dream of seeing Konate's brute physical strength matched up with Bender's guard-like skills inside a 6-foot-10 frame.

"They both have different skills that can blend together pretty well," Harler said. "Sagaba is so physically strong and Maciej can help you spread the floor and then he can go by you."

"Getting a chance to see them together, I think it's going to be a good fit for us all at WVU."

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Cubs slugger Schwarber out for season with knee injury

PHOENIX — Chicago Cubs slugger Kyle Schwarber is out for the season after tearing two knee ligaments in an outfield collision, a major setback for a team that many picked to win the World Series.

The Cubs made the startling announcement Friday, a day after the 23-year-old Schwarber was injured in a game at Arizona. An MRI revealed the injuries to his left knee and a sprained ankle. There was no immediate word on possible surgery.

"A young man in his sophomore season in the big leagues," Cubs manager Joe Maddon said, "one of the most refreshing and talented in all of major league baseball. Now to be out for the rest of the season, it's not easy."

A catcher by trade, Schwarber made his major league debut last year. He then hit a franchise-record five home runs in nine post-season games.

"He's going to be missed. I mean there's no sugar-coating. We love the guy. It's a sad day here in our locker room," Cubs catcher David Ross said.

"Freak things happen. You've got to move on. The game doesn't wait around. He doesn't want us to dwell," he said.

Schwarber was expected to produce plenty of power for a Cubs team that was a leading contender to win its first World Series champi-

onship since 1908. The Cubs were 3-0 this season going into Friday night's game against the Diamondbacks.

"We're going to miss him, there's no doubt we're going to miss him," Maddon said. "On and off the field, he's a big part of who we are and what we do."

Schwarber was playing left field when he was hurt. He collided with center fielder Dexter Fowler and tumbled on a ball that became an inside-the-park home run for Jean Segura.

"That kid hit the ball and it's in the wrong spot, at the wrong height, the wrong trajectory, the wrong everything for us," Maddon said. "If it went over the wall, we'd all be better off."

Maddon said the Cubs have the depth and versatility to have several options in left field. Jorge Soler was in left field Friday night and will play there often, the manager said. Tommy La Stella can play in the outfield and so can second baseman Ben Zobrist and third baseman Kris Bryant.

"It's a classic validation of why we signed Dexter Fowler," Maddon said. "I know everybody was talking before the season, 'How are you going to get playing time for everybody?' It's a cruel, cruel game sometimes."

The overall fourth pick in the 2014 draft and Chicago's backup catcher, Schwarber stayed on the ground for several minutes before being helped to his feet and driven off the field in a cart.

Major leaguers trying to figure out proper slide into 2nd

Something that used to be second-nature in baseball — sliding hard into second base to prevent a double play — is deciding games and giving major leaguers fits a week into the season. From the AL to the NL, runners making that 90-foot dash are wondering: What's acceptable anymore?

Twice during opening week, a game turned on a slide that was ruled unacceptable. The most recent dust-up occurred Friday night in Milwaukee when Colby Rasmus was called for interference, resulting in a game-ending double play in the ninth inning that allowed the Brewers to hold on for a 6-4 win.

Astros ace Dallas Keuchel later vented on

Twitter: "Are we even playing baseball anymore??? Unbelievable."

Better believe it's going to keep happening until everyone figures out what's allowed under the "Chase Utley rule," enacted after his slide broke the leg of Mets shortstop Ruben Tejada during the playoffs. Players have to slide at the base and be able to maintain contact with it — Rasmus slid past the base and was called for interference.

Every team in the majors will see the play as another teaching moment. Major League Baseball sent 20 videos to teams in the offseason defining what's acceptable and what's not. The Pittsburgh Pirates show videos of the most recent "Utley rule" slides at the start of each series.

"Any time there becomes an issue in the league where

a guy is called out, we show that slide so guys can see it," manager Clint Hurdle said Saturday morning before a game against the Cincinnati Reds. "When we have our next (team) meeting, Monday in Detroit, we'll show the slides that have happened from the last bit of slides."

"We catch them up on what's going on in the league, what's been called out and what's been called appropriate."

One week in, teams aren't so sure. Hurdle asked for clarification from MLB on why a Cardinals runner wasn't called out for turning his body toward the infield while sliding into the base during their opening series.

Is that allowed? Was it a borderline call? Is it a gray area that needs to be cleared up?

"We're confused by it," Yankees manager Joe Girardi said Saturday before a game in Detroit. "We've told our players: Slide into the base. But I'm going to say it again: We've told players for years not to dive head-first into first base. What do they do? Their instinct takes over, they're playing hard, and they do it. So I think it's hard. I think it's going to be hard for players."

MLB knew there would be a break-in period. Only three days into the season, the outcome of a game was directly affected by the new rule. Tampa Bay got a 3-2 win over Toronto when Jose Bautista was called for an illegal slide into second base in the ninth inning, negating an errant throw by Logan Forsythe that would have let in a go-ahead run for the Blue Jays.

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Jordan Spieth stumbles but still keeps Masters lead

AUGUSTA, Ga. — Another march to a Masters title for Jordan Spieth suddenly turned into a walk on the wild side Saturday.

Spieth finished in the lead for the seventh straight round at Augusta National. He was one round away from becoming only the fourth player to win back-to-back in 80 years at the Masters.

But he sure made it hard on himself.

Spieth had a four-shot lead as he stood on the 17th tee. The wind that caused so much havoc earlier in the round had subsided. Rory McIlroy was out of the picture. And then it all changed with two wild tee shots, two poor wedges and

three dropped shots.

And just like that, it's a wide-open Masters.

"It was a really tough finish to go from holding a four-shot lead ... to where all of the sudden, now it's anyone's game," Spieth said. "So it's tough to swallow that. I'm in the lead after 54 holes. If you told me that at the beginning of the week, I'd be very pleased. So it's mixed feelings right now."

A bogey and a double bogey gave Spieth a 1-over 73 and a one-shot lead over Smylie Kaufman, playing in his first Masters. It also gave plenty of hope to a cast of challengers that include 58-year-old Bernhard Langer and Hideki Matsuyama of Japan, who were two shots behind.

Looming were world No.

1 Jason Day and Dustin Johnson, only three back. Spieth was at 3-under 213.

Eleven players — even

to put it behind me," Spieth said of his finish. "That wasn't a fun couple of holes to play. It's not going to be fun tonight for a little while. Hopefully, I'll sleep it off and I'll be fine tomorrow."

He led by four shots after the third round a year ago and was able to protect the lead. With a forecast for less wind Sunday, it could be a sprint to the green jacket filled with birdies, eagles and those Augusta National roars.

"I know I have to shoot a significant under-par round tomorrow in order to win this tournament, when I could have played a different style of golf, like I did on Sunday last year," he said.

Kaufman, who qualified for the Masters by shooting 61 in the final round to win in Las Vegas, used to spend his

summers playing junior golf against Spieth. He kept the stress to a minimum and rallied with three birdies over his last six holes for a 69.

No one has won a green jacket on his first try since Fuzzy Zoeller in 1979. Maybe there's one waiting for a 24-year-old named Smylie.

"This place fits my eye pretty well," Kaufman said. "I just enjoy playing, coming out every day. It's Augusta National. It's hard not to have some fun out there."

The biggest surprise was Langer, who won the second of his two Masters in 1993 about three months before Spieth was born. Playing alongside Day — and usually playing from some 60 yards behind him — Langer plodded his way around in the wind and ran off three birdies for a 70.

flies above Mountaineers coaches and players.

For now, the idea of using an unmanned aircraft to film practice hovers between novel — providing angles and vantage points that are impossible to obtain otherwise — and novelty — as a gimmick best reserved to impress recruits and churn out high-gloss highlight tapes.

Either way, nine practices into the spring, the concept has taken off.

Cleared for takeoff

By his own estimation, it took Kyle Butler, 27, about an hour's flight time before he summoned the courage necessary to send the athletics department's newly-purchased drone on its maiden voyage overtop a sea of gold and blue jerseys.

"I've played video games my whole life, so it wasn't too crazy," said Butler, the football team's

video coordinator.

That's not to say it was easy.

Before flying, Butler first contacted the WVU Police Department and Facilities Management to check on any campus restrictions. Finding none, he called the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) and took the necessary steps to register WVU's drone; Butler used the football office's labelmaker to tack an official tail number onto the aircraft in clear view.

Since WVU's practice facilities are within five miles of the Morgantown Municipal Airport, Butler has to make an additional call before each flight — informing the airport when and how high the drone will go.

The typical exchange unfolds something like this.

Airport: Will you be flying at an altitude of more than 400 feet?

Butler: No.

Two weeks into using a drone to film practice, neither entity has turned him down.

"But they could, anytime they want to," Butler said.

'The coaches are going to love this'

Around noon on April 2, Butler stood near the corner of the practice field clutching what resembled a first-generation Game Boy with an oversize screen.

The drone's controller is white and has two joysticks (the left controls elevation,

called "Mountaineer Drill," an understandably re-branded version of the famous Oklahoma Drill, which pits two linemen against one another while the rest of the team forms a tight circle around the action.

With some shots, "I know right away: 'The coaches are going to love this, it's going to look great,'" Butler

said. "They can see this, they can see that. Maybe it's something they can't see from another angle."

Other attempts have been markedly less successful. When the Mountaineers' offensive and defensive linemen split off into individual drills, even the drone's overhead shots come across as redundant.

Players are aware of the airborne presence, but it hasn't disrupted their workouts so far. Sophomore wide receiver David Sills said he only notices the drone during ball-security circuits or stretching, instances when there's less intensity across the field.

"You kind of hear a little buzzing, it's pretty cool to see it flying around and the videos on Instagram or wherever they post them," Sills said.

A work in progress

Ron Crook is coming around to the idea of drones, though WVU's third-year offensive line coach admits his acceptance has been somewhat gradual in nature.

"I'm beyond the point where I hear that thing buzzing around me and start trying to throw something at it," Crook said with a laugh.

Across Holgorsen's coaching staff, there's an understanding that this is the future, that drones have the potential to recast the way practice film is reviewed and dissected. But at the moment, it's just potential.

One problem Crook has with the typical static, rear-view camera angles is movement behind the line of scrimmage. For example, a receiver in motion will obscure a lineman's first step or his split away from surrounding teammates. Overhead footage eliminates that issue.

But there are limitations. Using the same example, Crook evaluates his linemen based on their stance, how low or high they are coming off the snap. A drone isn't likely to capture that perspective.

A more realistic scenario, according to Crook, is one in which drone footage supplements conventional camera angles and two are cut into one comprehensive video.

"It's all got to tie in together," he said.

Beyond practical, on-field applications, Holgorsen sees a recruiting aspect to WVU's drone experiment.

If the Mountaineers' new shiny toy can spit out unique highlights that stay tack-sharp even when viewed on a huge projection screen, that's an edge his program will gladly take. The head coach even joked he'd like to see three or four of the devices flying around practice, to maximize angles.

"I tell Kyle [Butler], our video guy, just give me a different angle every day, and we'll figure out what we like," Holgorsen said.

Longtime DJ still working the airwaves

KINGWOOD — Mike Barnett said he knew what he wanted to do by the time he was 9 — be a radio DJ.

"I've never had any formal training in radio," he said. "I graduated from Fairmont State with a degree in psychology. I worked for the Armed Services Network while I was in the military."

Barnett has worked for WFSP Radio in Kingwood for 25 years and has been in the DJ business 44 years.

"I worked part time at WFSP in 1970 and came back here to work full time in 1991," he said. While attending Fairmont State, he worked part time at the station.

WFSP ad salesman Dave Price remembers when Barnett

came in looking for a job.

"What do you do when someone with a voice like Mike's comes in and asks for a job? You go to the station owner and say 'We need this guy.'"

Price said Barnett knows the music the station plays, which according to the station's website, is oldies and classic rock. "He grew up with that music. He can tell you who every one of the musicians are. He's been there a long time and it fits for him to still be there."

For many years he was the morning man at WFSP, signing on to Al Jarreau's tune "Morning" and going off with Chuck Mangione's "Feels so Good." Long before the days of Facebook and texting, he gave listeners their first inkling of what the weather and the roads were like.

He still plays the tunes, but now he works an afternoon shift. And the music is familiar

regardless of the shift.

"I was a flower child in the '60s," Barnett recalled. "I had a big Afro and wore bell-bottom jeans. I had a chance to go to Woodstock with some friends, but my grades were low and my mom insisted I study instead. I know some people who went but I didn't. College was more important."

Barnett worked at WMQC in Morgantown for two years. After his son Mike Jr. was born, he and his wife moved to Gaithersburg, Md., but returned to Kingwood in 1991. In October of that year, his wife was killed in an auto accident.

"Since then I've put myself through a lot of lifetime changes," Barnett said. "I live my life the best I can. I believe I'm still here because I have things I have to do."

He said although he has had some hard times, he has

KINGWOOD — The first obstacle those willing to brave the Cheat River rapids have to overcome is the road to where the boats are put in.

Representatives of Friends of the Cheat (FOC), American Whitewater and Cheat River Outfitters approached Preston County commissioners recently for help with getting the County Route 14/4 to Jenkinsburg, also known as the Blue Hole or High Bridge, ready for the season.

"We really need big help," Friends of the Cheat Director Amanda Pitzer said. She pointed out it is not only about business but also safety, because emergency vehicles need to access the site.

Commissioners said they would contact the state about the road.

The last two miles of the road before the river are the worst, the three said. Pitzer said one culvert is especially bad and some rock needs to be jack hammered away.

Kris Lake, of Cheat River Outfitters, said that rafters joke the river has Class 5 rapids and a Class 6 road. He and the others said they wonder how many repeat customers are lost because of the road.

Commissioner Don Smith asked the group to try to compile estimates of how many dollars the rafting business and use of

been fortunate.

"I've been in several accidents. I broke my hip and ankle when a deer ran in front of my car," he said. "That was in 2002 or 2003." In 2015 he had bypass surgery. "I had a stroke in 2004," Barnett said.

With his two sons grown, he now lives with his mother, Ruth Barnett.

"Preston County is a part of my family," Mike Barnett said. "My mom was a teacher here and my uncles worked in the coal mines." Barnett smiled. "I was born one week before mom's birthday. I tell her I was the best birthday gift she received in 1951."

Barnett played sports while growing up, particularly liking baseball.

"Scotchy Sanders was the guy if you wanted to play baseball. He had an old van with benches in back for kids to sit on. He would come around and pick them up and take them to the game," he said.

Barnett said although there was a lot of discrimination and race riots in cities across America,

when he was growing up it didn't affect life in Preston County. He did experience discrimination while on a bus trip with other students in the '60s.

"We stopped in Virginia for something to eat and my coach came over and said he was sorry but I had to eat my meal outside. I didn't think anything about it until my mom explained it to me," he said. "Being black didn't hold me back from getting a good education in Preston County."

Although he has received job offers that paid more than WFSP, he turned them down.

"I'd like to think I'm doing something for Preston County because Preston County has done a lot for me," he said.

"I've worked with Mike for 25 years," WFSP owner Dave Wills said. "Mike is like a brother to me. Mike knows his music and is a nice guy who is fun to work with."

Barnett said he would like to thank the people who have helped him with his career: Dave Wills, Larry Nelson, Ruth Barnett, Art George, Dave Price, Kathy Mace and Donna Nelson.

the Cheat and Big Sandy bring to Preston County. He said that information would provide leverage when commissioners approach the state.

The road is on the Bruceton side of the old metal bridge at the river. The road from the Mason-town side is "kind of a lost

cause," Pitzer said.

The state Division of Highways (DOH) was on the road recently to do some ditching, clean culverts and grade the road.

DOH spokesperson Carrie Bly said that is the only maintenance the state will do because the road has a very low average daily traffic count.

"We're just doing the basic stuff because in our

eyes we have to walk a fine line because it is a very low traffic roadway most of the time," Bly said. "We realize in the summertime it picks up, and we certainly want to help support tourism and activity in the area, but it's going to snow again and we have other patching to do, so we took a day and we did it just to be friendly and do that. But

we do have other, higher traffic roads that we need to focus on."

FOC collected donations in 2014 and 2015 for money to improve the road. The group collected \$11,000 in only three weeks in 2014 and raised about \$8,000 last year.

Bly said any projects done by private contractors have to be reviewed by the DOH first.

Reds send Pirates to their first loss

CINCINNATI — Eugenio Suarez drove in three runs with a single and a homer, and ace-by-default Raisel Iglesias made another solid start as the Cincinnati Reds sent the Pittsburgh Pirates to their first loss, 5-1 on Saturday.

At 40, Pittsburgh was off to its best start since 2003. The Pirates also had their top starter making his debut — Gerrit Cole (0-1) was pushed back in the rotation after developing a sore ribcage during spring training. He still couldn't beat the Reds.

Cole won 19 games last season and finished fourth in the NL Cy Young voting, but failed to beat the Reds in four starts, going 0-3 with a 5.95 ERA. Over his career, he's 0-5 in seven starts against them.

Suarez had an RBI single in the first and a two-run homer in the seventh off Kyle Lobstein, his team-leading third of the season. He also scored three times.

Iglesias (1-0) gave up a run and eight hits in 5 2/3 innings. He was moved to the front of the rotation when injuries sent four starters to the disabled list.

It was 38 degrees at the first pitch with a wind chill of 25. Light snow fell during the game, which featured a Reds blanket giveaway. Many of the 22,799 fans were wrapped in them.

It didn't go well for Cole

at the outset. He allowed three hits in his first 11 pitches, including Suarez's RBI single. Jay Bruce's one-out single made it 2-0. After the ragged start, he settled in and retired nine in a row. Cole lasted 4 2/3 innings, giving up five hits and three walks.

Iglesias allowed at least one runner in each of the first four innings, but was bailed out by a pair of dou-

ble plays, including one with the bases loaded. The Pirates stranded four runners in scoring position in those four innings.

Pirates: Cole threw 100 pitches in his first start, 62 for strikes.

Reds: 2B Brandon Phillips was in the lineup for the second straight day after missing two games with a stomach ailment. He singled home a run.

Up next

Pirates: Jeff Locke makes his first start. He's 3-3 career against the Reds in 11 starts with a 3.32 ERA. He was 1-2 in four starts against them last season, giving up 10 earned runs in 21 innings.

Reds: RH Tim Lincecum makes his major league debut, the second Reds starter to do so in the opening week along with Robert Stephenson. The 26-year-old Lincecum has played in the Royals' and Tigers' farm systems and signed a minor league deal with Cincinnati last November.

Former Vanderbilt football player found guilty of rape

NASHVILLE, Tenn. — A former Vanderbilt football player has been found guilty of raping an unconscious student in a dorm.

It took less than three hours for the jury of nine men and three women to find Cory Batey guilty of aggravated rape, two counts of attempted aggravated rape, facilitation of aggravated rape and three counts of aggravated sexual battery.

Batey, a 22-year-old from Nashville, is one of four former football players charged with rape and accused of violating the female student in a dorm room in June of 2013. He was the only one on trial.

The verdict Friday arrived as other colleges and universities across the country continue to face significantly increased scrutiny of sexual misconduct on campus, both by activists, lawmakers and the federal government.

A jury last year convicted Batey and former player Brandon Vandenburg on multiple aggravated rape and aggravated sexual battery charges. The verdicts were thrown out after Davidson County Criminal Court Judge declared a mistrial after lawyers discovered that the jury foreman had been a victim of statutory rape.

Just like the trial last year, the retrial featured graphic images and videos

of the sexual assault. Police said they recovered images and videos from the players' cell phones. Testimony showed that one of the players sent video of the assault to friends while it was happening.

"Our first thoughts are with the victim and the incredible strength she has shown, and continues to show, both throughout the investigation and the legal proceedings," Vanderbilt University Vice Chancellor for Public Affairs Beth Fortune said in a statement. "Our heart continues to go out to her as she has endured this retrial. This case has had a lasting impact on us all."

The trial this week once again raised questions about bystanders in campus sexual assaults. At least five student athletes saw the unconscious woman in a state of distress but did not call for help, including several who testified that they saw her lying partially nude in a dorm hallway.

In closing arguments, prosecutors told jurors that the woman was raped in the dorm room and then taken out in a hallway and left out there like trash. But they also said jurors had more than enough evidence to convict.

"I've never had a case that was videoed and photographed by the people who committed the crime," Tom Thurman, one of the prosecutors, told jurors.

BROKER RULES

The government issued new rules for brokers that may change the kinds of investments they recommend to people with retirement accounts. The Labor Department guidelines will require the brokers to act as fiduciaries, meaning they must put their clients' best interests above all. That could push them to recommend less-risky investments, and they may have to disclose conflicts of interests like fees that could affect their investment advice. Critics say investors lose billions of dollars a year because of brokers' conflicts of interest.



BUSINESS TRAVEL TIGHTENS

Almost everyone loves traveling on the bosses' dime, but it may get harder to do that as companies start cutting back on travel. The U.S. Travel Association says domestic business travel has declined, a trend it expects to continue in coming months. Meanwhile Deutsche Bank analyst Michael Linenberg forecasts a drop in international corporate travel because company profits are getting squeezed, increasing their reluctance to pay for expensive trips.

It has 27,000 stores in the U.S. Some other chains, including McDonald's and Panera Bread, have posted that information for a few years. The 2010 health care overhaul required major chain restaurants to start displaying that information, but the regulation has been delayed repeatedly and it's still not clear when it will go into effect.




Move over, Xbox

In 2015, consumers spent more money on cheaper mobile games than on those for PCs or game consoles like Microsoft's Xbox or Sony's PlayStation, according to a recent study by market-research firm International Data Corp. and App Annie, which tracks mobile apps. That's for the second year in a row. And mobile games are widening their lead. One reason: More people are getting smartphones, particularly in developing countries, says Lewis Ward, IDC's research director for gaming. "It just so happens that smartphone gaming is along for the ride."



new console game typically runs \$60; many apps are free or cost just a few dollars. (In-app purchases often run up the cost later.) But way more people play the cheaper games. Some traditional game companies are shifting toward mobile. Nintendo just released its first mobile app, while Sony announced plans to make PlayStation-based games for Asian smartphones. "Call of Duty" publisher Activision Blizzard paid \$5.9 billion for King Entertainment, which produced the addictive phone game "Candy Crush." Electronic Arts bought PopCap Games, which created "Bejeweled," for \$750 million back in 2011.

Company Spotlight Marriott nears Starwood deal

Marriott International cleared a major hurdle on its journey to acquire rival Starwood and become the world's largest hotel chain Friday when shareholders in both companies approved the \$14.41 billion sale. The vote puts an end to a hectic month in which Marriott had to fend off a last-minute competing bid from China's Anbang Insurance Group. After aggressively pursuing Starwood, Anbang suddenly withdrew its bid last week, clearing the path for Marriott.



The acquisition has already been approved by U.S. anti-trust regulators but still needs to clear authorities in the European Union and in China. The deal is expected to close in the middle of this year. Marriott emerged as the winner in a deal that will create the world's largest hotel chain with 5,500 properties and more than 1.1 million rooms around the world. The next-largest hotel company is Hilton Worldwide with 4,500 properties and about 735,000 rooms.


Economic snapshot

The Federal Reserve releases its latest Beige Book on Wednesday. The report is a snapshot of business conditions in each of the Fed's 12 regional bank districts. March's Beige Book showed that the economy was expanding in most of the country in January and February, helped by gains in consumer spending and home sales. The survey also indicated that some sectors of the economy were being held back by falling oil prices and the strong dollar.



Eye on consumers

Economists predict that consumers are feeling a little better about the economy this month. They anticipate that the University of Michigan's consumer sentiment index, due out on Friday, will be 91.8, up from March's reading of 91. The index fell in March to the lowest level since October as Americans worried about the country's economic outlook.

Playing for keeps

U.S. toy makers are coming off a standout year, but no one is playing around when it comes to what's next.

Toy sales in the U.S. grew by 6.7 percent in 2015 according to retail data from The NPD Group, generating \$19.4 billion and marking one of the strongest performances in years. That has industry giants Hasbro and Mattel looking for ways to fuel further growth and keep their share prices on the upswing.

Hasbro has gotten a big boost from Hollywood, with sales of "Star Wars," "Jurassic World" and other movie-related toys driving its sales. It also recently




acquired rights for some Disney princess products away from Mattel; the bulk of those shipments are expected during the current quarter.



Mattel meanwhile is trying to rebuild by focusing on its core brands. It is putting a special emphasis on design — it recently started selling Barbie dolls in three new body types to appeal to consumers and answer critics of her unrealistic figure. And it recently announced the arrival of famed designer Jonathan Adler as creative director for its classic Fischer-Price brand.

The toy makers should give a hint at how these efforts are playing out later this month when they report their quarterly earnings.

With gobbler season quickly approaching, know what to grow

JUST A REMINDER that spring gobbler season opens a week earlier than usual this year, on April 18. This opening day may be interesting from a weather standpoint the way things have been going so far. In the past, I've seen it snow on opening morning and the way this spring has gone, it's hard to tell what we might have.

When you mention food plots, people immediately think of deer. However, turkeys will also benefit from the proper crops being planted. There is a large overlap with the foods that both deer and turkey like, but there are some big differences.

Before discussing the crops to be planted, you need to understand the three types of habitat the turkeys frequent throughout the year. These are the ones they use in the winter, at nesting time, and during the summer and fall.

The winter habitat is where they spend about six months of the year and must provide adequate and reliable sources of food and water along with cover for when the weather gets bad.

Turkeys, along with deer, love pine thickets when the snow gets deep. Acorns, wild grapes, and crop residue such as corn, plus trefoil and other green leaf material that they can scratch up make up the bulk of their winter feed. At this time of year, the hens, gobblers, and young of the year stay pretty close together mainly for safety. The more eyes they have watching for predators, the better.

When the weather begins to warm up, the gobblers will start to move away from the hens and begin gobbling long before the season opens. This doesn't mean that the season should be open. As I've reported before, we like to have at least half of the hens on nests before opening the gobbler season to protect the resource.

The hens begin to move

apart from each other as the mating season begins. They'll continue to eat any acorns they can find along with new grass leaves, some grass seeds left over from the winter, along with any bugs and beetles they can find. Turkeys nest around the edges of old fields, along trails, or in blackberry patches or other briar patches. A hen had her nest in a pile of old pine tops on my farm last year.

When summer arrives, you'll see the hens and poults out in the open areas eating new green growth and bugs. When the grasshoppers are present, they'll gobble them up like crazy. It's interesting to sit and watch a flock of turkeys chasing grasshoppers. It can be quite comical. If you have any clover food plots, you'll find the turkeys in them if you have clipped them back to six or eight inches. Not only is this necessary for the young birds to get through the grass, but the deer will be there since the growth is new and tender.

When fall comes, they'll continue to eat grasshoppers,

but will head to the woods for acorns, wild cherry seeds, and grapes. They will also be in the crop fields.

Like I said, we all know that deer and turkeys like some of the same foods such as clover, corn, soybeans, wheat, oats, rye, and buckwheat. If you want to plant anything but clover and want the turkeys to get some of it, you'd better plant three acres or more if you have plenty of deer around. Any area much smaller will require some type of fencing until the crop matures and it doesn't make much difference if the deer eat it, too.

I can assure you that this is true from my own experience. I planted about one half acre of sunflowers one year for the deer, doves, and turkeys. The crop matured and the wildlife ate it all. I planted the sunflowers again the next year and all ended up with was a field of sticks ... the stems of the sunflowers. The deer ate them before they matured.

One thing that you can plant for the turkeys is a

tuber called chufa. It grows well in most soils, but prefers sandy or loam soils. They are high in proteins, carbohydrates, and sugars. They are also known as tiger nuts, earth almonds, and ground nuts.

Planting chufa is fairly easy. All you need to do is till your plot and broadcast your seed. It will take about 45 pounds of seed per acre. Then disc the ground so that the seed will be from one to two inches deep. This will give you three or four plants per square foot. Be sure to check the pH of your soil. It should be between 5.5 and 7.0.

In this area, chufa should be planted in April and May. It takes about 100 days for it to mature. After it matures, you'll want to disc around the outside edges of your plot. This will bring some of the "nuts" to the surface. When the turkeys find them, they'll figure out that they need to scratch them out. One thing that can make it tough on the turkeys is hard, dry soil.

Since we don't have wild boars around here,

about the only thing you have to worry about eating your chufa is raccoons. They love them and will work a patch out in no time. If you have very many coons, plant a large plot so the turkeys get some.

The ideal chufa plot should last through the winter into spring. If you don't replant the plot, some of them that are left will re-grow, but it's better to replant. Also, the plot should be rotated every couple of years to prevent nematode disease.

If you want to try field corn for turkeys, plant a plot of at least three acres. The deer will begin to eat it before it matures, but when it matures, brush hog around the outside edge and the turkeys and deer will eat the corn on the ground.

Chufa seed can be found on-line or in various wildlife magazines. The National Wild Turkey Federation also sells other seed along with chufa.

Jets' Ferguson makes retirement official in letter to fans

NEW YORK — D'Brickshaw Ferguson played 10 rugged seasons in the NFL, never missed a snap due to injury and established himself as one of the best at his position.

Now comes the toughest assignment of all for the New York Jets left tackle.

The 32-year-old Ferguson made his retirement from football official on Saturday in an open, heartfelt letter to fans.

"As I considered the words I would say to you," Ferguson wrote in the letter posted on his Facebook and Twitter pages, "I recognize a simple

truth: it just isn't easy saying goodbye." He first said hello to the Jets and their fans in 2006, when he was the No. 4 overall pick in the NFL draft out of the University of Virginia. Ferguson was a starter from Day 1, and he made three Pro Bowls along the way while protecting the likes of Chad Pennington, Brett Favre, Mark Sanchez, Geno Smith and Ryan Fitzpatrick.

While he was critical of the NFL in December after watching the movie "Concussion," Ferguson didn't

cite any health concerns in his decision to retire. Rather, a major role was no longer being able to play at the lofty standard he set for himself.

"I never wanted to define myself by the size of a potential contract, but rather by my ability to compete with the best that the game could offer," Ferguson wrote. "Though I was successful in accomplishing that feat largely throughout my career, the difficulty in playing at such a level began to increase."

When word of Ferguson's decision began to leak on Friday, many were stunned because it was believed he had a few more solid seasons left. But his play slipped a bit last season, and his contract situation made it uncertain

whether he'd even be on the Jets' roster this season. Ferguson was scheduled to count \$14.1 million against the team's salary cap, and the Jets were sorely in need of relief as they try to re-sign Fitzpatrick and other free agents, as well as their draft picks later this month. The team had even broached the idea of a pay cut with Ferguson.

Instead, Ferguson's retirement creates nearly \$9.1 million in salary cap space, one final big play for the team from the man nicknamed "Brick."

"I also recognized a desire in myself to pursue other goals in life," Ferguson wrote, "and because there isn't always a discernible

point in professional sports where one must retire, the decision becomes a very personal one that all athletes must decide on their own."

So, he went out on his own terms.

Ferguson thanked those who helped him "along this journey," including wife Kirsten, his parents, Jets owner Woody Johnson, his current and former coaches and teammates and the Freeport, New York, community in which he was raised. He noted the "sacrifices" many people made to help him "achieve my dreams."

In a statement posted on the team's website, Johnson called Ferguson "one of the finest players in Jets history."

"There are a few things you hope for when you select a player fourth overall in the NFL draft," Johnson said. "First, you want him to be a responsible citizen and role model. Second, you want him to be a leader in the locker room. Third, you want him to be reliable while performing at a high level for a number of seasons. D'Brickshaw has exceeded each of these expectations during his career."

Ferguson started every game of his career, 167 in a row, including the postseason, and missed just one snap — when then-coach Eric Mangini pulled the entire offensive line on a trick play in the 2008 season finale against Miami.

A friend of mine safety

Put substantive reforms ahead of hollow platitudes

Only weeks before the Iraq War, in February 2003, Sen. Robert C. Byrd said, "We are truly 'sleepwalking through history.'"

He then paused and added, "In my heart of hearts, I pray that this great nation and its good and trusting citizens are not in for a rudest of awakenings."

Byrd was one of only 23 U.S. senators who voted in October 2002 against authorizing the use of force in Iraq.

But that nay or that speech cannot ever be construed as a vote or voice to not support our troops in Iraq.

Byrd came to mind last week after the former CEO of Massey Energy, Don Blankenship, was sentenced to a year in jail for conspiring to violate mine and health and safety laws — a misdemeanor.

That charge is closely linked to the deaths of 29 miners in an explosion at the Upper Big Branch Mine on April 5, 2010.

Blankenship was found innocent of felonies involving securities fraud and lying to investors.

But it's unconscionable to think laws to keep money safe are felonies, while laws to keep miners safe are misdemeanors.

When the punishment for consciously putting miners at risk gets you less time than stealing a car, something's wrong.

It may come as a surprise to many, but almost all of the laws in the federal mine safety books are misdemeanors.

Still, the real tragedy in all this is that the Robert C. Byrd Mine Safety Protection Act has withered away in Congress since it was first blocked on a partisan vote by House Republicans in December 2010. Efforts to advance this legislation to a floor vote have all died.

What this legislation would do is hold mine operators accountable for putting their workers in unnecessary danger.

But more importantly, it makes willful violations of mine safety and health standards felonies.

We call on all three Republican House members to become co-sponsors of this legislation.


And if Sen. Shelley Moore Capito is still "open" to tougher criminal punishments for such violations, she should put her influence where her platitudes are.

Byrd died in June 2010, shortly after the Upper Big Branch disaster. In his latter years, it would be a mistake to call him a so-called "friend of coal."

But he was a tireless champion and advocate for miners' health and safety up until the day he died.

Admittedly, we're no "friends of coal," either, which we take to mean allowing coal executives to put profits before lives, limbs, lungs and the environment.

Yet, this rudest of awakenings about mine safety laws should get everyone's attention.

'Rebooting' a free press one byte at a time

THE GLOBAL FUROR over the trove of financial records and other documents contained in the Panama Papers also speaks to any number of Digital Age canards about journalism and a free press.

Granted, none of the following have yet reached the status of "Aesop's Fables" in common knowledge. But they go something like this: "News is dead." Another: "Journalists don't matter." And: "Who needs the press — old mainstream or new online — when there's the web and algorithms to edit it for us."

Even as the resignations, re-primations and outcry gather worldwide over the leak of some 11.5 million documents from a Panamanian law firm — first to a German newspaper and then to the International Consortium of Investigative Journalists (ICIJ) and more than 100 news operations — it's news professionals making sense of the massive data dump.

And news it is, the intricate details of how some of the world's most powerful people use tax avoidance loopholes in nations' laws, coupled with "offshore" shelters, or outright skulduggery, to hide ill-gotten gains or remove legally earned income to low-or-no tax havens.

News with nary a trace of "click bait" fluff here.

And journalists do matter when it comes to sorting through — and making sense of — a stupefying assembly of raw information and documents totaling 2.6 terabytes of data.

The total amount of leaked data from an as-yet unidentified source is the biggest in history, say several news operations. WikiLeaks' 2010 release of classified diplomatic cables came to just 1.7 gigabytes. Edward Snowden's leaked data totaled just 60 gigabytes, the online Global Post says. (OK, I had to look it up: A terabyte is 1000 gigabytes).

The leaked material includes 4.8 million email messages, 1 million images, and covers 40 years of the operations of the Panama-based law firm Mossack Fonseca, starting in 1977 — with 14,000 clients and 214,000 companies named in the files.

And what of ICIJ, a 19-year-old nonprofit group of reporters, editors and news outlets? Created as a project of the Washington, D.C.-based Center for Public Integrity, its aim is to counter the increasingly global nature of major stories with — according to its website — "computer-assisted reporting specialists, public records experts, fact-checkers and lawyers."

In sum, just the kind of vigorous and effective watchdog role envisioned by this nation's founders for a robust and free press. From challenging the nature of million-dollar contracts to private companies during U.S. military operations in Iraq and Afghanistan, to reporting that as long ago as the year 2000, Pentagon leaders recognized the risks of having private contractors like Snowden with access classified materials, the consortium has been a new era global thorn in the side of those who once were considered too big or too distant to be held accountable.

There's no question that the Digital Age has turned upside down the economics of journalism, realigned the audience, and likely changed forever even the manner of how we take in news. But the Panama Papers illustrates that having journalists in place to gather, make sense of and then report what they have found is a required, resilient and valuable asset.

And it's not just this single example that's bringing new faces and new methods to news reporting. On local and regional levels, news partnerships reaching across media and linking one-time competitors are becoming more common.

To be sure, the disclosures contained in the Panama Papers are the news. But the manner in which it is happening signals what may just be — in today's terms of art — how journalism and a free press "reboot" for the 21st century.

Terra Alta is becoming a well-known clothing outlet and restaurant center. But as soon

as you enter this interesting town, the impression due to poor roads is discouraging.

Preston County and Terra Alta "could" grow and add millions to the tax base. People driving in from tourist areas could invest.

Gov. Earl Ray Tomblin needs to do something about the lack of road maintenance and resurfacing in Preston County before it damages the economy, or gets someone killed.

If there is a fatal accident or, God forbid, a school bus crash that takes the lives of children, then the responsibility lies with the state of West Virginia.

Please act to save a county and allow it to grow and add significantly to the tax base. Please protect my friends and fellow citizens of the great state of West Virginia.

Secret money is one huge problem for America, too

THE HEADLINES ABOUT THE "PANAMA PAPERS," the gigantic trove of offshore records that surfaced this week, were all about the famous names connected to secret financial accounts: Russia's Vladimir Putin, Ukraine's Petro Poroshenko, China's Xi Jinping, Syria's Bashar Assad, Saudi Arabia's King Salman and more.

But on second glance, most of the names weren't too surprising. You didn't really expect the world's autocrats to keep their money at home, where it could be seized by whoever came next, did you? (And in some cases, the autocrats' names weren't really there; the accounts were held by family members or friends — in Putin's case, an old classmate, a cellist with \$2 billion.)

What was more striking was the industrial scale of the money transfers: almost 215,000 offshore shell companies, more than 14,000 clients, more than 11 million documents — and uncounted billions of dollars.

That and the fact that the business of moving secret foreign money isn't confined to steamy tax havens like Panama. Some of the money in the Panama accounts ended up in the United

States, invested in real estate and other assets from Miami to Las Vegas. The firms that transferred the funds included major European banks headquartered in Switzerland, Luxembourg and London. And most of the shell companies formed by the Panamanian law firm Mossack Fonseca were set up in the British Virgin Islands, a possession of Britain.

"Those shell companies are being formed to buy property and open bank accounts in safe places — places like New York and Los Angeles," said Sarah Chayes, a former U.S. advisor in Afghanistan who now works on global

efforts to combat corruption.

"What that law firm did is just one step in a chain of corruption services," Chayes told me. "And the next level outward includes people in the United States — lawyers, real estate brokers, other agents."

Indeed, the United States is an active competitor in the "corruption services" business.

Nevada, Wyoming and South Dakota have all passed laws making it easier to set up shell companies — and harder to identify the real owners. Bankers say that has actually prompted a flow of foreign assets from traditional tax havens such as Zurich and Bermuda to less elegant banking centers like Reno and Sioux Falls.

"How perverse that the USA, which has been so sanctimonious in its condemnation of Swiss banks, has become the banking secrecy jurisdiction du jour," Swiss lawyer Peter Cotoceanu wrote in legal journal cited by Bloomberg News. "That giant sucking sound you hear? It is the sound of money rushing to the USA."

Some people think that "rushing" is actually good news for the American economy. High-end real estate brokers from New York to Beverly Hills have seen a flood of buyers from Russia,

'Sanderism' not going away, win or lose election

SEN. BERNIE SANDERS is waging an improbable presidential campaign, but he won't disappear after this election. Nor will his followers: Perhaps they'll be called the Bernie Brigade or Sanderistas.

The Vermont socialist probably has no more than a 10 percent shot at winning the Democratic nomination — and that's if something bad happens to Hillary Clinton or, less likely, if after winning in Wisconsin this week, he scores a huge upset in New York two weeks later and transforms the race.

Yet Sanders, who for the left wing was a consolation choice after Sen. Elizabeth Warren wouldn't run, has a message that will continue to resonate, especially among the multitudes of young supporters.

The clarity and coherence of the campaign have surprised even those who disagree with him.

"Bernie has run a much better campaign than I ever thought he would," says Trent Lott, the former Senate Republican leader and Mississippi conservative.

Sanders is setting much of the Democratic agenda, forcing Clinton to move left by opposing the Trans-Pacific Partnership, the Keystone pipeline and by frequently assailing Wall Street. Even Republicans have picked up some of his populist rhetoric.

If, as the odds-makers now predict, Clinton wins the nomination and the presidency, Sanders, with two years left in his Senate term, will be looking over her left shoulder. If Democrats, including the next president or the next Democratic Senate leader (likely Chuck Schumer of New York), cozy up to Wall Street, expect a Sanders-Warren barrage. The so-called bank bailout in 2008 probably prevented the economy from going over the cliff. But Sanders has reinforced a public sense that bankers are making out like bandits while Main Street struggles.

One virtual certainty: the next Treasury secretary won't come from Wall Street.

Sanders also has galvanized public outrage over Supreme Court decisions that unleashed a flood of big money into politics. Most Americans agree with him that the U.S. system of money in politics is corrupt. Both President Bill Clinton and Barack Obama paid lip service to campaign-finance reform and then put it on the back burner: Sanders's campaign ensures that another President Clinton won't have that luxury.

Some of his radical notions, including sky-high taxes on the wealthy and a totally government-run health care system, are non-starters. But the public has moved closer to his view on economic fairness, and his call for free public higher education is a debate that will endure.

Sanders has attracted extraordinary support from young voters, beating Clinton by huge margins. These Americans have grown up in tough times, with more limited opportunities. They're skeptical about the establishment and the socialist label doesn't have the negative connotation it does for many older Americans.

The question is whether Sanders will keep these young people politically energized. The last such cause-centric pied piper was Eugene McCarthy in 1968, though he basically checked out of Democratic politics after he lost the presidential nomination.

Katy Harriger, a political scientist at Wake Forest University who has studied the youth vote, thinks that Sanders has the capacity to keep them mobilized on issues such as campaign financing and economic inequality. That engagement could carry to the off-year elections, when participation of young voters traditionally drops off.

"He has tapped into something very real and has credibility with a lot of these young voters," Harriger says.

Unlike McCarthy, whose views evolved over time, Sanders has been consistently to the left for almost a half-century. Although he started in dingy basements and sparsely attended rallies for lost causes, he now has a national megaphone that he's not likely to relinquish. He also will have more than 2 million contributors, mostly small donations, and almost to 4 million have clicked "like" on his Facebook page. In today's politics, that's a machine.

And keeping college affordable remains a priority for state leaders and our colleges and universities.

In spite of the challenging times we find ourselves in, I remain committed to preserving as much as we can in college financial aid dollars awarded through state programs like the PROMISE Scholarship program and the West Virginia Higher Education Grant program. In addition to state support, the federal government also offers thousands of dollars in grant programs and tax credits to offset the costs of pursuing a college degree — and a majority of West Virginia students qualify for some form of this financial aid.

Gaining access to funds and resources to help pay for college starts with one important step: Completing the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA). Filing a FAFSA is a required component of applying for state, federal and many private scholarships and grant programs. Sadly, many students who might qualify for thousands of dollars in financial aid fail to complete this process.

That's one reason West Virginia set a goal of increasing the number of 12th grade students who complete the FAFSA to 60 percent. Teachers and counselors, higher education officials and community partners across West Virginia are working together to help families complete this crucial step in preparing for college. You can check your school's FAFSA completion rate at www.cfwv.com.

If you or your child is considering

college or a certificate program within the next year, please take time to complete the FAFSA at fafsa.gov. This important funding is not only available to 12th grade students, but also to adults who are returning to the classroom to retrain for new careers and current college students who will be returning for their sophomore, junior or senior years.

The deadline to file your FAFSA to be considered to receive funds through West Virginia's Higher Education Grant Program is Friday, April 15. This grant program provides up to \$2,600 per year. When paired with the federal Pell Grant (\$5,775), students could receive up to \$8,375 per year. Meanwhile, the average tuition at West Virginia's two-year community and technical colleges is only about \$3,600, and tuition at four-year public schools is around \$6,700.

The College Foundation of West Virginia (CFWV), an initiative of the West Virginia Higher Education Policy Commission and the Community and Technical College System, offers many free resources to help families complete the FAFSA. Students can visit www.cfwv.com to find a local workshop or call (888) 825-5707 to speak to trained financial aid counselors. Additionally, students can text their questions to counselors at (304) 241-6735.

China and the Middle East.

"Wouldn't it be great if we could get all the Russian billionaires to move here?" Michael Bloomberg said in 2013, when he was mayor of New York.

But if there are short-term benefits to anonymous money, the long-term picture is far less sunny. At least some of that money is undoubtedly the product of corruption in other countries. And corruption is one of the main drivers of instability and terrorism around the world, including the rise of groups such as Islamic State.

"Corruption is a radicalizer because it destroys faith in legitimate authority," Secretary of State John F. Kerry said in a speech earlier this year. "No one knows that better than violent extremist groups, who regularly use corruption as a recruitment tool."

Corruption also robs poorer countries of money for economic development. One respected research group, Global Financial Integrity, estimates that corruption costs developing countries at least \$1.1 trillion a year — more than all the foreign aid and direct investment they receive from the rest of the world.

There's no easy fix. Nobody's suggesting that corruption can be eliminated. But there are at least two things the United States can do to make it harder for foreign investors to evade taxes or conceal the proceeds from corruption.

One is a practice European countries have already begun: Establish a "beneficial ownership registry" of the true owners of shell companies.

In most countries, the registry is designed to be easily accessible to any government agency investigating a violation of the law; in Britain, it's intended to be open to the public.

A second, less ambitious reform: Require lawyers, real estate brokers and registered investment agents to follow the "know your customer" regulations that apply to U.S. banks. Thanks to energetic lobbying, those industries are exempt from the federal requirement to report dubious inflows of foreign money.

The Obama administration will have a chance to work on both of those ideas soon; British Prime Minister David Cameron is holding a global summit on corruption next month.

Cameron has a personal stake in a successful outcome. His late father, Ian Cameron, ran an offshore investment fund to help wealthy British clients avoid paying taxes in Britain. His name turned up in the Panama Papers, too.

Candidate responds to NRA questionnaire

As a candidate for public office (51st House District), I received a questionnaire from the National Rifle Association's Political Victory Fund. I answered their questions as best I could.

I included this statement with my responses:

"Thank you for your thoughtful questionnaire about gun rights in West Virginia.

"I believe the Second Amendment was enacted to make sure that if the United States was invaded again by Great Britain, the government could call up citizens, who would own guns, to fight the invaders as a "well-regulated militia." This happened in the War of 1812. This does not mean that anyone can legally carry a gun anywhere including schools, universities, churches and public parks.

"More guns does not equal public safety. More guns mean more murders, more domestic violence leading to death and injury, more accidental deaths, often involving children, more suicides of young people.

"I strongly opposed the recently-passed West Virginia law allowing anyone over 21 to carry a concealed weapon without any training or permitting. Law enforcement throughout West Virginia opposed this bill, and I choose to stand with law enforcement op-

posed to your organization.

"We live in a university town, and our school should be totally free of guns. Anyone found with a weapon on campus should be arrested. When law enforcement receives a report of someone with a gun at WVU, they will not have to decide who is the "good guy" and who is the "bad guy."

"I have no problem with regulated hunting. As to the issue of Sundays, now left to the individual counties, that is how it should be. Often hunting lands are also used for family recreation, and making those lands safe for recreational purposes one day each week should be a priority.

States need to end puppy mills the right way

PUPPY MILL. Two words that evoke images of horrible living conditions and provoke strong emotions.

Unfortunately, lawmakers have been unable to equate the term with licensed, inspected breeders — rather than the illegal, substandard operations it rightly describes. They've been told a ban on pet store sales would eliminate these bad actors.

Despite these good intentions, these bans are not the solution. They are an emotional overreaction to a complex problem.

I have spent the past 41 years working for the welfare of animals. As the president of the American Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals, I pushed for retail pet sale bans, but ultimately found this approach had no measurable impact on the protection of puppies. Surprisingly, it shifted the sale of puppies from a regulated environment to the underground marketplace, like Craigslist and flea markets.

I authorized a dozen raids to rescue and rehabilitate over 2,500 puppies and dogs from substandard breeding operations. Not one of those facilities was a USDA licensed breeder, and none of those puppies were headed for a pet store.

In the past, I said a multitude of negative things about commercial breeders. Then someone asked me if I had ever visited a licensed one. The honest answer was I hadn't.

After leaving the ASPCA, I visited USDA-licensed breeders. I found high-standard kennels and well-educated breeders. I met hardworking professionals

who are dedicated caretakers for their animals.

The truth is most licensed USDA breeders meet or exceed humane standards of care with state-of-the-art facilities where dogs get the best veterinary care, a healthy diet, clean and spacious kennels, compassionate attention, and plenty of exercise.

These are the breeders selling to pet stores, who put animal well-being before profit. These individuals — not puppy mills — are hurt by these bans.

Instead of targeting small business owners who make up a significant portion of pet retailers, we should focus on breeders themselves to ensure all of them are adher-

ing to high standards.

Rather than a ban, states and counties are increasingly adopting legislation requiring all pet store puppies originate from USDA-licensed breeders, who are regularly inspected and comply with appropriate care standards. Such legislation employs the same sensible framework already adopted by other states, including Virginia and Connecticut.

My message has not changed. Always make adoption your first option, but the demand for puppies and dogs is now more than seven times the population of homeless dogs at risk for euthanasia, and that gap is increasing every year.

In acquiring a pet, consumers should be able to choose among several respectable sources — including pet stores.

Without a reliable, quality supply of pets subject to regulation and sourcing transparency, prospective pet owners will be driven to unscrupulous sellers of pets who are not licensed and are not concerned about compliance with animal

care standards.

The process of choosing a new family member is not one-size-fits-all. Some families require a certain breed due to temperament or characteristics, such as being hypoallergenic. Shelters have a limited selection and, often times, due to dog importation, the temperament of adult dogs is an unknown factor.

Many potential dog owners want a puppy, providing them the opportunity to train the dog to their preference. However, many dogs available for adoption are not puppies.

The single most effective way to ensure a lifelong bond and to prevent a pet being surrendered is to allow prospective pet owners choose how they find their ideal pet.

To serve the best interests of both pets and people, we need standards that provide the safety of animals, give consumers the choices they deserve, and support the growth of responsible businesses serving pets and their owners.

I want to shut down and stop puppy mills as much as activists do. And I want to protect responsible, legal breeders in the process.

In recent years, state legislation to improve breeder standards has resulted in the closure of over 1,000 puppy mills. Pet store sale bans have closed none.

By implementing reasoned regulations and protecting the freedom of choice, we can best protect citizens and eliminate puppy mills.

Spare-time science

Experiments are fun and enlightening for all ages

If you notice your kids' brains rotting away with technology-based fun on a daily basis, you may want to introduce them to the concept of visual and interactive science experiments.

With the use of just a few common household items, science experiments can entertain children while cultivating a willingness to learn outside of the classroom.

Amy Conneway, a sixth grade teacher at South Middle, highlights the role science plays in building character at a young age.

"Most of what we do with science is trying to build that inquisitive nature and get them to think about why things happen," Conneway said. "By the time kids get to middle school, the inquisitive nature is dampened by them being told not to ask questions. Bringing science home can build the inquisitiveness back up."

Cheryl Deaner, another sixth grade science teacher at South Middle, said doing science experiments with the family may be just as beneficial for the parents as it is for the kids.

"I've had parents say they can't help their kids with homework anymore because everything is so advanced, and I think [doing science experiments] would help them understand what their kids are learning," Deaner said.

With the potential to encourage learning, teamwork and curiosity among all age groups, science experiments could turn out to be just the activity your family is looking for.

Cornstarch goo

Deaner said this experiment yields a substance that acts like a solid but flows like a liquid. The goo has a unique feeling, and kids will have fun playing with it. This experiment comes from the website, ehow.com.

"Measure 5 teaspoons of water into a bowl.


"Add 2 to 4 drops of food coloring if you would like. Stir gently to mix the color into the water, adding more as needed to reach the desired hue.

"Measure a level 1/4 cup of cornstarch and add it to the water. Swirl the bowl so the ingredients start to combine and then let it sit. After about 1 minute, stir with the spoon to be sure there are no lumps.

"Test the consistency of the cornstarch goo. It should feel solid to the touch but pour out of the container like a liquid. Add more cornstarch or water to thicken or thin the mixture as needed."

Make an egg float

the time without realizing it," Conneway said. She recommends kids place objects in water and record whether they float or sink. Higher floating objects have a less dense composition than objects that sink. This experiment from ehow.com demonstrates the density of an egg in particular.

"Fill up a glass halfway with cold water from the tap.

"Choose a raw, uncooked egg with no visible cracks in the shell. Place the egg gently into the water.

"Watch as the egg sinks to the bottom of the glass. The egg sinks because it is more dense than the water.

"Add a tablespoon of salt to the water. Stir the water to help the salt dissolve and distribute throughout the glass of water.

"Add more salt if you need to. Add a tablespoon at a time, until you get a reaction.

"Watch as the egg begins to float in the water when you have added enough salt."

Density rainbow

This is another experiment involving density, but it involves layering liquids. Deaner suggests kids try it out at home since it requires liquids that might be common in the kitchen. This experiment comes from the website, hometrainingtools.com.

"Pour an inch (or however much you want) of honey into the

bottom of the cylinder or glass.

"Use food coloring to color a little bit of corn syrup (if it's the light kind; just leave it brown if it's the dark kind). Slowly pour an inch of the corn syrup on top of the honey.

"Color some liquid dish soap and carefully add an inch on top of the corn syrup. You may find it easier to use a pipet instead of pouring.

"Next, use a pipet to add an inch of colored water on top of the dish soap.

"You won't be able to color the vegetable oil, because food coloring is water-based and water and oil don't mix. Go ahead and add an inch of oil on top of the water.

"Finish it off with an inch of colored rubbing alcohol. (If you have lamp oil, you could also add that to the very top.)

"Voila — a beautiful rainbow of stacked liquids!"

Elephant toothpaste

When Deaner took her class to WVU for Engineering Day, a group of students did this experiment. It comes from the website, ehow.com.

"Add several drops of food coloring to 1/2 cup of hydrogen peroxide.

"Set up your bottle inside the lipped dish and pour in the hydrogen peroxide mixture using the funnel. Then add a big squirt

of dish soap.

"Add the teaspoon of yeast to two tablespoons of very warm water and let it dissolve.

"Add the yeast to the bottle and quickly remove the funnel.

"In a matter of seconds, your reaction will occur and the bottle will begin to overflow with a substance that resembles oversized toothpaste."

Silly putty

Deaner said she only gives each student one shot at making silly putty, so they have to do it right the first time in order to enjoy the end product. Who doesn't love playing with silly putty? This experiment comes from the website ehow.com.

"Open an 8-ounce glue bottle and pour the entire contents into the bowl. Add warm water to the empty glue bottle, replace the lid and shake it for several seconds. Open the glue bottle again and pour this warm water into the bowl. Stir the glue and water



well.

"Place two or three drops

of food coloring into the glue-and-water mixture and stir the food coloring in.

"Pour 1/2 cup of warm

water into a measuring cup. Measure a teaspoon of Borax and sprinkle this on top of the warm water. Stir this mixture well.

"Add the Borax water slowly to the glue mixture in the bowl, stirring as you pour. After adding approximately half of the Borax mixture, set the spoon aside and begin to mix the concoction with your hands.

"Continue kneading the concoction with your hands and adding the Borax water. After the water is all added, knead until you have the desired consistency.

"Shape and mold the mixture as desired and place it in the plastic bag to store."

Glitter globe

The glitter globe is suggested by Deaner as a fun activity for kids, and it can also act as a keepsake. This experiment comes from the website, exploratorium.edu.

"Fill about 1/4 of the jar with rubbing alcohol. Add a

drop of food coloring.

"Pour vegetable oil into the jar. Leave about 1/2 an inch of air at the top of the jar. Let the globs of oil settle. Is the oil on top of the alcohol or underneath it?"

"Drop tiny, shiny things into the jar. Use as many as you want. Don't use anything too heavy — like a marble — that might break the jar when you shake it.

"When all the tiny things are in the jar, carefully pour in more oil until the jar is completely full ...

"Screw the lid of the jar on very tightly. (If you want, you can tape around the lid to make sure it won't leak.)

"Gently shake the jar. The oil and alcohol will mix and turn a milky color, and the beads and glitter will float and spin.

"Let the oil settle again. That will take about 5 or 10 minutes. Now, spin the jar instead of shaking it. What happens?"



If conversion is coerced, it was never really real

Q: I'm writing with a request that my conversion to Judaism be annulled. I would like to have the conversion annulled because I do not subscribe to any Jewish beliefs, nor have I ever. My conversion from Catholicism to Judaism was a lie. While I fully own that I went through with the conversion, it was 100 percent due to the pressure my fiancé put on me. I had expressed my feelings throughout our engagement that I was not ready to convert but he said he would not get married to me unless I converted. I was very young and meek. I had proudly stood up for myself but I was not heard and eventually I gave in. So I entered the marriage feeling angry about feeling forced to convert and so alone.

There were no Jewish traditions in our home, nothing. My husband said that for him, being Jewish is tribal, and that was enough for the house. Any attempts to even discuss how I was feeling were shut down. After many miserable years, we divorced. If I only had the strength to stand my ground for what I believed in and knew to be true for me, my life would look very different today. This annulment would be a hugely important act of healing for me and allow me to move forward and forgive myself. It's also about reclaiming my life as I should be living it.

Forgiving my ex-husband has been the easy part, compared with me struggling to forgive myself for being weak. I want and very much need to live an authentic life. I know in my heart that annulling this conversion will allow me to be true to myself again and finally move on and return to the Catholic faith of my previous life. How can this happen? — Anonymous

A: My dear suffering soul, you were never converted to Judaism. Conversions like yours — performed under duress and false premises — are not sincere, and because they are not sincere or true they are not real or binding. Your pain has already annulled your coerced conversion to a religion that you never truly wanted to embrace as your own.

You don't need to do anything. But if it would comfort your soul, you can contact the rabbi who converted you and the two additional rabbis who were part of the rabbinical court that authorized your conversion and tell him or her that you want your conversion formally annulled. Most conversions include documentation that is filed with the appropriate rabbinical associations. Ask for that documentation to be returned to you.

Now, as to your return to Catholicism, the question is whether or not you formally and actually renounced Catholicism or merely wandered away from the church for a time and are returning. Canon law does not specify a particular ritual for return after renouncing the faith. Your next step is to consult with your parish priest and follow his instructions as to whether confession or some formal right would be required of you to solemnize the return to your religious roots. Don't worry. One way or another, you are home again. I am so sorry for your pain but I am also inspired by your courage to get right with God and with your life after making a bad decision. You are surely not meek any longer. God bless you.

Celebrations after a breakup can be tricky

Q: My son is recently divorced after a 15-year marriage. He has two beautiful daughters, ages 7 and 10. His ex was seeing someone else and wanted the divorce. My oldest daughter (in another state) will be 50 years old in a few months and my son, his two daughters and I want to surprise her for her birthday. I mentioned this to my daughter's husband and he wants us to also invite my son's ex-wife. He said they feel strongly that either both be invited to functions or neither one be invited. What's good ex-etiquette?

A: Although it sounds like your son-in-law is trying to not take sides after thinking of your son's ex as a sister-in-law for a very long time — and that's commendable in principle — what he's proposing is just not practical. Life does change after a breakup and expecting to include your son's ex or exclude him from every family gathering from this point on is not a real-world answer. Of course, there may be holidays, like Christmas, where your family may opt to celebrate the same as always, but this is not a requirement for every get-together as your son-in-law proposes and should not be attempted unless everyone is on board.

Good ex-etiquette suggests

that family members can invite anyone they want to a special occasion they host, but they can't dictate the guest list when others throw a party. You and your son should be able to celebrate or initiate a family get-together without consulting your son's ex-wife. However, if you were suggesting your son-in-law host the party, then he's in charge of the guest list.

This approach may take some of the spontaneity out of family get-togethers for a while, and that can be frustrating. All you wanted to do is celebrate a milestone birthday with your daughter. But, if your family is so close that family members still want to include your son's ex — although this is a little surprising since she initiated the breakup by leaving for someone else — you will work through this in time. Let your genuine affection for each other be your guide, coupled with frank conversations (Good ex-etiquette rule No. 8, "Be honest and straight forward") keeping family gossip to a minimum (Good ex-etiquette rule No. 3, "No bad-mouthing") and you will be moving in the right direction.

Sometimes dreams aren't sweet at all: Taming kids' nightmares

ASK MR. DAD

Q: My six-year-old daughter has nightmares at least a few times every week. We've talked to our pediatrician, but he said that nightmares are pretty normal at this age. The doctor may not be concerned, but my wife and I are. How can we help our daughter?

A: Your doctor is right — nightmares are pretty normal, affecting 10-50 percent of kids six and under. But that doesn't make it any easier on you when your child wakes up screaming in the middle of the night. Before we talk about how to help your daughter, you need to figure out exactly what's going on. Is she having nightmares or night terrors? They sound similar but are actually very different.

Nightmares generally happen in the last half of sleep — 2 a.m. and later. Your child will wake up with a clear memory of a scary dream, will be able to talk about it, and may be afraid to go back to sleep. It's not clear what causes nightmares, but they're often associated with something the child has seen or is worried about.

Night terrors, however, tend to happen in first few hours after falling asleep. The child may thrash, kick, moan, or scream for 10-30 minutes. Her eyes may be wide open, but she's basically unconscious. The good news is that she'll go back to sleep and will have no

memory of the incident. The bad news is that night terrors are really scary to watch and there's very little you can do.

Here are few things you can do to help:

■ Make sure you can always hear her if she cries out in the night. Get a monitor if you need to.

■ Take it easy. Really. If you act scared, you're essentially telling her that yes, there's something to be frightened about.

■ Reassure her in a calm, soothing voice that it's safe to go back to sleep.

■ Stay with her until she's settled down. Reading a story is a great way to ease her back to sleep.

■ Discuss the nightmare, but only if your child is open to it. If she remembers her dreams in the morning, encourage her to talk about the frightening parts and to make up a happy ending to it. But if she doesn't want to discuss it, don't push the issue.

■ Probe — gently. One recent study found that 36 percent of children who have nightmares are the victims of bullying. Is something stressful going on in her life (such as moving to a new home or mom and dad fighting a lot)?

Q: I am curious about Henry, one of my red-eared slider turtles. I have had him for 17 years and lately he has been isolating one of his river rocks and caressing it with his nails. I believe this is a mating ritual. I have two sliders, both male, and they have been kept separately most of this time. The other slider doesn't do this. Is this bad? Is it boredom?

A: You are correct that this is a part of turtle lovemaking. A male slider turtle has much longer front claws than the female so that he can gently stroke the face of the female and woo her into accepting him as a mate. Turtles do not have many hopes and aspirations in life, and getting a mate seems to be one of Henry's. That is why he has developed this fantasy about that one particular rock as his dream of what a desirable female turtle is. I would just allow him this little fantasy and look the other way when he is doing this.

Q: We bought a male canary in December and he has been singing wonderfully since then. However, in the last month, we noticed that his singing is done only once or twice a day at most. We also see many feathers at the bottom of the cage, and he

seems to like to pick up the feathers and chew on them. We were wondering if he was lacking something in his diet?

A: Canaries will molt or change their feathers in the spring and summer months. This takes a great deal of their energy and body reserves. (They have to lose every one of their feathers and regrow them in a 12-week period. As a result, they really do not have the energy or will to sing during this time.)

Out in the natural world, it just blows away. But in a cage, it just falls on the floor. They attract the bird's attention and it will pick them up to investigate. Sometimes, when a bird runs out of molted feathers to play

with, it will then start to pull out its own feathers. This applies to all birds, not just canaries. So do your best to clean his cage every day, and hang a bunch of fibrous greens such as kale or chicory in his cage for him to pluck at and entertain himself. In another two months or so, he will have regrown all his feathers and then will start to sing again.

Q: I remember on one of your YouTube videos you were talking about a household powder that you could run into a dog's fur to use as a dry shampoo when your dog is smelly and you do not have time to bathe it. The ones I have bought in the pet

stores seem to have a lot of heavy fragrance in them that makes me and my dog sneeze.

A: Cornstarch works very well. You just rub a handful through your dog's fur and then comb it out. I have found that this works well with bunnies, too. A bunny is not an animal that deals well with getting a traditional bath, but using the cornstarch as I have described will tidy a messy bunny right up. There is nothing much more inert and natural than cornstarch, and it certainly has no artificial fragrance or anything else in it that may make you or your pet uncomfortable.

No, glasses don't make your eyes weaker — vision changes

Q: I just had an eye exam and my doctor wants me to begin wearing glasses. I have heard that wearing glasses can cause my eyes to become dependent on them, and my eyes might get weaker over time. Is this true?

A: There are many myths or old wives tales about vision and eyes, but this has to be the most common one I hear from my patients almost every day. While we are asked this most often about children, many adults have similar concerns when faced with their first vision correction.

I can see where this thought arises, when after years of seeing "normally," your eye doctor finds that your vision can be better with a little help. I put that word normally in quotations, because while for some patients the vision problem is

genuinely of recent onset, for many others their vision has not actually been "normal" or 20/20 at both distance and near. They are simply accustomed to seeing the world as it has been, and assume that their vision must be as good as it can be.

The truth is that our vision changes naturally over time due to mostly genetics and partially our environment. Generally, our vision changes continuously from birth up through our mid 20s largely based on our family heredity. This progression is usually a

gradual change in the overall shape of the eye. Just like developing diabetes or high cholesterol and many other health problems, the most common trait is genetics. Perhaps you have heard the old adage that you should choose your parents carefully.

Research points toward the environmental aspect of vision change in children. Specifically, kids who spend more time doing near work (like spending hours on a tablet or computer) tend to become more nearsighted. In fact, one study found that prescribing multifocal contacts for kids slowed down the progression of nearsightedness.

After 20-something, our vision continues to change as the crystalline lens inside our eyes continue to change. This change

in shape eventually becomes a change in clarity and the lens becomes cloudy or yellowish — what we call a cataract.

But not to worry, your vision changing is indeed normal, and it will likely continue to change regardless of whether you wear glasses or not. So you can disregard those warnings about "glasses making your eyes get weaker" as it is not correct. Almost all vision corrections can be prescribed now in either eyeglasses or contact lenses, so talk with your eye doctor about your specific options as well. And enjoy your new improved vision.

Even so, the gardens will be pretty, if not as beautiful and perfect as in our day-dreams. If nature allows, we will enjoy the special flavors of fresh vegetables picked at their peak of ripeness.

Finally, one day we will be able to sit on the patio and survey the flowers, watch hummingbirds fly to the morning glories that form a shading curtain on ones side of the patio. We will survey the gardens our labor has brought to fruition. More work lies ahead, of course, but for a little while, it will be enough to sit and look upon what we've created — our own small Eden.

Keeping mosquitoes at bay

MOSQUITOES CAN BE a host for many diseases, including the Zika virus, but according to WVU Extension Service Entomology Expert **Daniel Frank**, the state's residents should not overreact at the sight of the common summer pest.

By now, you might have heard about Zika virus as it continues to spread rapidly through the Caribbean and South and Central America — even as far north as Mexico. While the cases of the virus grow, so can worry over it. According to the Centers for Disease Control (CDC), for many healthy adults the symptoms aren't as severe as other mosquito-borne diseases, but it may be linked to microcephaly in babies whose mothers had the virus while pregnant.

According to public health experts, while some cases may be present in the United States, most feel the possibility of a widespread Zika outbreak is low.

The CDC reports that Zika is primarily spread through the yellow fever mosquito and the Asian tiger mosquito.

Mosquitoes become carriers after feeding on the blood of an infected individual, then can transfer the virus to a different individual through saliva when feeding on them.

But what exactly does this all mean for West Virginians? Especially as a temperatures warm and we head toward the summer months where mosquito activity is at its peak? According to Frank, while residents shouldn't be alarmed they can take precautions to reduce instances of exposure to mosquitoes in general.

"The yellow fever

mosquito prefers tropical and subtropical regions, so it's likely they're not going to establish in areas past the Southern United States," Frank said. "The Asian tiger mosquito has adapted to survive in a broader, cooler temperature range, but the United States is better equipped with resources to monitor and implement wide-range mosquito control programs to deal with it if necessary."

Frank also noted that people in the United States spend more time indoors in the air conditioning, have screens on windows and doors and have widespread access to mosquito repellents — all of which greatly limit exposure to the pest.

If residents want to further control populations of mosquitoes around their home, there are a few simple steps to take.

"Mosquitoes lay eggs in standing water, and the mosquitoes carrying Zika prefer to lay their eggs in water-filled containers and the water that can collect in trash, so the simplest way to prevent more mosquitoes is to limit these breeding habitats," Frank said.

He recommends that residents store buckets or watering cans indoors or turn them over when not in use, discard trash such as tires and cans so they cannot collect water, dump water from tarps and children's toys and ensure that roof gutters are

free flowing so rain water doesn't collect.

If there are intentional water features, such as a bird bath, change the water once a week. Aerate ornamental ponds or stock them with a mosquito eating fish.

Additionally, maintain swimming pools or treat with a mosquito larvicide if not in use.

Not only can mosquitoes carry diseases that afflict humans, they can also transmit several diseases and parasites that pets and livestock are very susceptible to. According to the American Mosquito Control Association, mosquitoes cause more human suffering than any other organism. These include dog heartworm, West Nile virus and Eastern equine encephalitis (EEE). In addition, mosquito bites can cause severe skin irritation through an allergic reaction to the mosquito's saliva — this is what causes the red bump and itching. Mosquito vectored diseases include protozoan diseases, i.e., malaria, filarial diseases such as dog heartworm, and viruses such as dengue, encephalitis and yellow fever. CDC Travelers' Health provides information on travel to destinations where human-borne diseases might be a problem.

DON'T MISS: "Confirmation" — TV seems determined this year to make us relive our lurid, must-see spectacles of the past. First, it was the O.J. Simpson murder trial. Swedes invite world to call 'random' citizens on hotline

STOCKHOLM — Ever felt like calling up a complete stranger in Sweden? Now is your chance.

The Swedish Tourist Association set up a hotline that lets callers worldwide "get connected to a random Swede."

On its website, the non-profit group says the idea is "to spark people's curiosity about Sweden — our culture, nature and mindset. To help us do this, we have the people of Sweden."

It's not completely random. The Swedes who take the calls have volunteered by downloading an app. But they are not vetted or given any instructions about what to say.

"It's like when Swedes travel the world. You don't know who they're going to talk to and what they're going to say," said Magnus Ling, the head of the Swedish Tourist Association.

About 3,000 people dialed the "Swedish Number" by midday Thursday, a day after it was launched, and roughly the same number of Swedes had signed up to answer calls, Ling said.

The website says the initiative honors the 250th anniversary of Sweden's 1766 Freedom of the Press Act, believed to be the world's first law supporting the freedom of expression.

Ling admitted there was another motive: Recruiting members to the tourism association, which is funded through membership fees. Swedes who sign up to receive calls will receive an email inviting them to join the group, he said.

The calls are not monitored but they are recorded, "so that if someone says I was threatened or ha-

arrassed we can go back and see who it was and even block that number," Ling said.

The website didn't say that calls are recorded when AP checked it Thursday. Ling said it was listed in the user terms, which those answering the calls — but not those making them — must agree to. He later called back saying the information would be added to the FAQ section of the website.

The biggest number of incoming calls has come from Turkey. Ling said he didn't know why, but thought it had to do with the initiative getting attention there both in traditional media and social media.

After signing up to test the service, this Stockholm-based AP reporter received four calls, about one an hour. The first was a woman from Turkey with limited English skills. The second hung up. The third was an engineering student from Britain. And the fourth was another journalist: Tim Nudd, creative editor at *Adweek* in New York.

"I just wanted to call and see how this whole thing works," Nudd said.

He, too, was writing an article about it.

The hotline follows a similar initiative on Twitter by the Swedish Institute, the government's own PR agency. Since 2011, it lets a different Swedish citizen manage its official @Sweden account every week.

Ling said the feedback he received on the hotline was almost all positive, though he said a small number of callers were just trying to hook up with Swedish women.

"I've heard of just one or two such calls," Ling said.

'Quantum Break' marred by tiresome gunplay

What would you do if you could control time? Visit the future and grab an iPhone 5? Kill a despised historical figure while he's still a baby? Carve out some time to catch up on your Netflix queue?

Will Joyce, the genius who discovers time travel in "Quantum Break" (Microsoft, for the Xbox One, PC, \$59.95), wants none of that. He's the kind of quirky brainiac who just wants to unlock the secrets of the universe. Unfortunately, his tinkering has busted the time-space continuum so badly the whole thing's about to collapse.

You play Jack Joyce, Will's brother, who's dragged into the whole mess by an old friend named Paul Serene. Paul is head of Monarch Solutions, one of those mysterious corporations that's so powerful it needs its own military — and he has his own ideas about how to harness time travel. Is Paul insane? Can Will be saved? It's up to Jack to find the answers.

Fortunately, he's the kind of average-Joe who turns out to be skilled

with firearms. Unfortunately, saving the world is going to require him to kill hundreds of people who made the mistake of signing on with Monarch. So what could have been a brain-bending time-travel romp turns into yet another trigger-happy explosion of violence. Sigh.

At least Jack's exposure to Will's device gives him some unique talents. He can dodge bullets, freeze enemies and unleash "time blasts" that hurl opponents into the air. Occasionally, Jack needs to use his powers to solve rudimentary puzzles — like, say, reversing time to restore a broken bridge.

What's most distinctive about "Quantum Break" is the way it's

presented. Most of the time you're controlling Jack in computer-generated scenarios, like you would in a typical video game. But, on occasion, you're invited to put down your controller and watch what Paul and the other characters are up to.

These non-interactive episodes are shot on full-motion video, with human actors in real-life settings. The quality is decent — about on the level of an episode of "24" — and the cast has some familiar faces, like "The Wire" veterans Aiden Gillen and Lance Reddick. Jack is played by Shawn Ashmore, best known for "The Following," and it's a little disconcerting to switch from watching the real actor to controlling a com-

puterized version.

The combination feels like binge-watching a season of a middling TV thriller, except you have some control over the outcome. The video segments you see are determined by some of the choices you make in-game, enough so that you'll want to play through "Quantum Break" a few times to see all the variations.

That makes it all the more disappointing when the drama wraps with an exasperating firefight that depends more on old-fashioned ballistics than trippy quantum physics. "Quantum Break" pulls off some neat tricks with its overall presentation — I just wish its separate elements were cleverer. Two stars out of four.

Matt grew up in San Diego, near the border with Mexico, but now he lives in Brooklyn, New York. In Brooklyn, he said, he is "surrounded by talented writers and musicians and artists." He lives with his wife and their 2-year-old daughter.

"I spent a lot of time in high school secretly composing spoken-word poems," Matt explained. "My 11th-grade English teacher was the first to tell me I had talent." Matt began to love reading in college with the help of an enthusiastic professor. "I loved that books could make me feel things," he said.

About writing, Matt said: "I steal all my ideas from the world. I like real people. Working-class people. I like to reveal moments of grace and dignity that I find on the 'wrong side of the tracks.'"

Matt's advice for kids: "Read everything. Read outside your favorite genre. And write with heart. There's a great quote by Goethe that I love to apply to writing: 'Do not hurry; do not rest.' It's perfect, I think."

Sophie grew up in South Australia. "I spent most of my childhood up a tree reading and occasionally pelting the neighborhood boys with pink peppercorns, which are sticky and smell weird," she said. Today she lives in Brooklyn, New York, with her partner, Ed.

She became an artist "when I realized that making art was my favorite thing to do in the world. My mother had a room filled with wool and scraps of fabric and paints and threads. I would go to the beach to collect shells and into the woods to collect pine cones, and I put it all together and made stuff."

Sophie said she likes all types of art. "Secretly I'd love to sew or make theater sets or design wallpaper," she said.

Her advice to kids: "Read lots and lots of picture books. Nobody ever gets too old for (them). Find artists you like and try to figure out how they made their drawings. Look at how sometimes the drawing fills the whole page and bleeds off the edge of the paper, and other times there's just a tiny drawing and lots of white space. Think about why the artist would do this."

Cook's Corner

Gelatin Parfait

You'll need:

- 1 (0.3-ounce) package sugar-free orange gelatin
- 1 (0.3-ounce) package sugar-free lemon gelatin
- 1 cup orange juice

- 1 cup green grapes, quartered
- 1 banana, sliced
- 2 cups light whipped topping



What to do:

2016 seen as a good year to buy a house in the area

For most people, buying a house is the biggest financial transaction they will ever make. That's why it is important to be informed.

According to Melanie Thompson, vice president and mortgage loan officer at Huntington Bank in Morgantown, 2016 is a good time to buy a house.

"Rates have stayed low, and the interest rates have been low," Thompson said. "But we are seeing signs rates are going to go up."

She said there are programs that do not require 20 percent down to get a good rate.

"People don't realize they don't always need that 20 percent down," Jessica Lipscomb, Realtor and part owner of Houses and More, in Kingwood, said. "Sometimes the down payment can be as little as 5 or 0 percent depending on the program the buyer qualifies for."

Thompson said she is seeing a lot more first-time homeowners come in. She said there has also been an increase in loan applications from buyers wishing to build their own home.

"People are getting their tax refunds back, and they use that money to go toward their down payment or their closing fees,"

she said.

Lipscomb said she believes another factor in the increase in the number of first-time homeowners is renters wanting to put their money into a permanent home.

"There are also people buying because of job placement to a new area," she said. "Renting is not a sound financial decision, although it is sometimes necessary. With today's low interest rate, you can own a home with less than the cost of rent."

Lipscomb said she believes the majority of renters would like to own a home but have credit problems due to divorce or other things that hurt their credit.

"Some buyers doesn't understand credit scores. We suggest people check their credit score," she said. "One way to do this is to talk to one of the mortgage officers at your bank. They'll check your credit and see if you are able to buy a home."

She said if a buyer does not qualify, he or she can ask the mortgage officer what must be done to do the raise the score. "Banks are always willing to help. Some will even give you a time line to raise your credit."

Lipscomb said that by working with the bank, the mortgage officer knows who you are and you know him or her when you are financially able to buy a home.

Thompson agreed that anyone interested in owning a home should talk to a mortgage officer who will give professional guidance. "I would hate for someone to sit on the sideline and miss out on owning their own home because they don't believe they can."

"I believe the increased rental rates have an effect on first-time buyers," Thompson said. "This is true with the Morgantown market. With West Virginia University and the hospital, the majority of the rentals are full."

Thompson said she believes the biggest challenge is housing stock.

"Everybody who can buy has a hard time finding their perfect house. It sometimes takes three or four months to find the house they are looking for," she said. "To find the perfect house, Realtors recommend obtaining pre-approval of your loan so you have an idea of what price range you can afford."

Lipscomb said there are programs available for individuals who are ready to purchase a new home.

"A very popular program for Mon County is both the FHA and VA loans. An FHA loan can be as little as 3.5 percent down. VA loans are as favorable as 0 percent down," she said. "In Preston County and part of the Cheat Lake region, USDA Loans can be 100 percent financed with 0 per-

cent down."

She said all of these programs are very popular with buyers but are based on income.

Lipscomb said she has seen an increase in the number of out-of-state buyers and believes that is driven by the Morgantown economy. She said some of the sales in Morgantown involve people coming to WVU or people transferring to or obtaining a new job in the area.

"Preston County's out-of-state buyers are coming from Maryland or D.C.," she said. "These people are usually looking for peace and quiet but still want to be close to the city."

Lipscomb said the vast majority of home buyers are technologically savvy. "They have looked at the house they are interested in online and have driven by it. When they come in for a tour, it will be the third time they have seen the house."

Both Thompson and Lipscomb say 2016 is a good year to buy a house. The interest rates are still at near-record lows, and buying a home builds equity in an asset that may appreciate over time.

"In a week or two, the market is going to hit," Lipscomb said. "I believe we will see a lot more people buying homes than we have in the past."

Home Fix: How do you repair a patio?

Q: The person buying my home insists on replacing the patio or reducing the home's sale price so he can replace the patio. The patio is cracked and the inspector said it drains water to the foundation. The inspector also

said the settlement has caused the step to settle, and it could be a trip hazard. Removing the patio and trying to get a cement truck to my backyard to replace the patio is going to be expensive. A repairman told me the patio can be repaired. Is this true, and how would it be repaired?

A: When concrete settles, and most of the time it will, it can either be replaced or it can be repaired by "slab jacking." Concrete settles because of poor site preparation, unstable soils or erosion. Slab jacking is a process where holes are strategically drilled in the settled section or sections of the

concrete slab and a slurry mixture of sand, cement and additives or a foam product is pumped under the slab to raise it back to its original position. The process is quick and easy, and there is far less mess than you would experience with removal and replacement, and it will cost a lot less than replacement.

Slab jacking can be performed on areas as small as an entry porch or as large as a factory or warehouse floor. Contact foundation repair companies in your area to see if they perform slab jacking. You can learn more about the process by visiting concretenetwork.com and type "slab jacking" into the search

box in the upper right hand corner. You can also view YouTube videos of foam slab jacking by doing an Internet search.

1880s-style smoking jacket made of silk cigar bands

FABRICS WERE EXPENSIVE in the 18th and early 19th centuries. Recycling was important, and every scrap of fabric left from a sewing project was saved to make a quilt or even a "coat of many colors." But not many thrifty housewives saved the cloth bands that held bundles of cigars to use for a sewing project. Someone made a cigar-silks smoking jacket in the 1880s style. The cut-away jacket had hundreds of silk cigar bands, imprinted with a brand name, that were feather-stitched in black thread. The shawl collar, cuffs, pocket flaps and lining were made of black silk cloth. Brand names like Old Poet, Harvard, Boston Bar, Press Club, Bachelors and Flying Dude could be read by those admiring the jacket. It sold at a February Thomaston Place auction for \$1,755.

of furniture. By the 1850s, a new look gained favor. The lower part of the dresser was made with cupboards on each side and an open space in the middle. The space probably got the name "dog kennel" because a dog could crawl in to sleep. Often, a large tureen or pot was stored in the space. By the 1890s, it was sometimes used to store a sewing machine. The Welsh dresser is still popular, and copies have been made since 1915 that could be mistaken for antiques.

Q: Were Hummel figurines ever made in Japan? I thought they were all made in Germany by the Goebel factory.

A: Hummel figurines, based on the drawings of Berta Hummel, were first made in 1935 by the W. Goebel Porcelain factory in Germany. They became very popular and were a major collectible for many years. When World War II ended, exported merchandise had to be marked "Occupied Japan." This was required from 1947 to 1952, when there still were American troops occupying Japan. Ceramics were a major Japanese export,

and they copied many best-selling pieces made in Germany, England, the United States and other countries. Many copies of Hummel figurines were made and marked "Occupied Japan." Prices for German Hummel figurines have dropped since 2008. But Japanese figurines were always less expensive and, because there are Occupied Japan collectors who want them, they have remained about the same price as before. Real Hummels were made by Goebel until 2008 when several other German factories got the rights to the Hummels.

Q: I have a Pan American Airways flight bag from a 1955 flight into Cuba, along with a tourist pass stamped 1955. I would like to know if it's worth anything. And would an airline collector be interested in this?

A: On Oct. 28, 1927, a small plane lifted off a dirt runway in Key West, Florida, and headed for Havana, Cuba. It was made by a fledgling company called Pan American Airways and was the first scheduled international flight of a U.S. airline. The airline was started by Juan Trippe along with other financiers as a mail carrier, having obtained the contract for U.S. mail delivery to Cuba. U.S. Diplomatic relations with Cuba were broken off in

1960, and commercial flights were suspended between the U.S. and Cuba after the 1962 missile crisis. Pan Am ceased operations completely in 1991, but Pan Am collectibles live on. Everything from

Pan Am aircraft models, posters and timetables to safety cards, soap and airsickness bags are sought after, as well as 35 different flight bags. Vintage canvas Pan Am flight bags sell to collectors for \$35 to

\$50, depending on condition. Add the 1955 Cuban tourist pass, and the value increases to about \$75.

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Author shares tips for 'Pollinator Friendly Gardening'

MINNEAPOLIS — Bees have become a high-profile cause in recent years, with lots of talk about their decline and the role of pesticides. But

bees are just one piece of the pollinator puzzle, and helping them thrive requires a multipronged approach that begins in our backyards. That's the topic of "Pollinator Friendly Gardening" (\$21.99, Voyageur Press),

a new book by Minneapolis master gardener Rhonda Fleming Hayes. Hayes has been gardening "since I was in diapers," she said, but lately she's been gardening with a

mission: To help pollinators. "Over the past 15 years, I've been working to enhance habitat value in our gardens," she said. "I wanted to share what I've learned." You may think your garden is

too small to have much impact on the big picture of pollinator health, but Hayes begs to differ. "Collectively, gardeners have a lot of land under their control," she said. Her book covers everything the average gardener needs to know to create a garden that attracts and sustains bees, butterflies and other pollinators — including plant selection, hard-landscape choices and growing practices. We caught up with the author and Star Tribune contributor to talk about natives vs. "alien" plants, why you should think twice before planting one particular bee magnet and how to create a pro-pollinator garden that won't annoy your neighbors.

plant, "What's the habitat value?"

Q: What prompted you to write the book?

A: For a long time, any advice to gardeners about insects was how to kill them. On the topic of pollinators, there were dense entomological texts and native-plant manifestos, with a judgmental aspect that can be intimidating. I wanted to give everyday gardeners things to work with. Publishers told me it was a niche topic. Then there was an explosion of interest in pollinators.

Q: Are you surprised by the recent surge of interest?

A: It's kind of a seismic shift. I felt like I was racing time [to get my book published] — like, "Oh, my gosh, am I going to miss the boat? Wait for me!" It's a hot topic, but I don't want it to be a popular trend that fades away. A lot of people already have bee fatigue. But I

think the everyday person is still interested. If I'm needing garden inspiration, I walk around the garden center and eavesdrop — and hear someone saying, "What's causing colony collapse?"

Q: You take a dim view of the current trend toward all-foilage gardens.

A: Foliage is fashionable — considered more sophisticated than flower gardens. Landscapers really push foliage. But it's a static look. It doesn't change. Change is more interesting. As I started planning for pollinators, my garden got more interesting.

Q: There's been a lot of talk about the importance of native plants in supporting pollinators, but you also make a case for non-natives. Why?

A: You need blooms all season long. For the average gardener to coordinate that, it would be difficult using only natives. I advocate a mix of natives and introduced species.

Some of the top nonnative plants are already there, and people shouldn't feel so guilty about having them. Like hosta. They do have blooms. (Don't remove them.) Old-fashioned plants like lilacs and peonies are food for honeybees. I want to take some of the guilt out of the process. I don't want people to feel they have to rip up their garden, so they give up. Gardens are about joy. You don't want to go out there and feel guilty.

Q: If you could leave a

reader with one takeaway, what would it be?

A: Plant more flowers. Avoid pesticides. Before you spray, identify the bug you're spraying for. Don't spray willy-nilly. Ask yourself, "Is this bug really going to affect my life?" This, too, shall pass. You can't grab a spider spray and think it's killing only spiders. There's collateral damage.

Q: Besides providing food, what can we provide for pollinators?

A: Allow some areas for nesting spaces for native bees. Leave some bare soil, unmulched — not by doors or entries [to your home] but in a little out-of-the-way area. They like east-facing slopes with gentle sun in the morning. Cavity nesters like hollow stems and holes in stumps, so leave some artistic deadfall in your yard.

Q: What's the biggest misconception about pollinators?

A: People are fearful of bees. They see a wasp and call it a bee. Take time to learn the difference between bees and wasps. There are definite situations where you don't want wasps or bees, when someone is allergic. But for most people, bees are harmless. My garden is full of bees. You can hear it. It buzzes. The little girls who are my neighbors have learned that if you don't bother them, they won't bother you. I'm growing little gardeners.

Q: What's in your own garden?

A: We just built a house in

Linden Hills, so it was a blank slate — we put it in all at once. It's all pushed to the front. I don't like private gardens — I like sharing. There are lots of perennials, some foliage plants and lots of blooming shrubs. There's a kitchen garden, raspberry hedges. The back is narrow and wild, with a rain swale, and out front, there are plenty of pollinators.

Q: Some gardeners shy away from native-plant gardens because they're afraid they'll look shaggy and weedy and their neighbors will think the yard looks unkempt. What are some suggestions for keeping neighbors happy with a pollinator-friendly garden?

A: If you use a lot of native plants, you can have wispy texture and smaller blooms. If there's one of everything, it tends to get chaotic looking, so plant natives in groups.

I'm not a big fan of lawns, but visually, they give the eye someplace to rest. Create crisp lines for beds and maintain the edges. If you've got the edges under control, you can get away with a lot.

Keep plants trimmed off the sidewalk. Put one decorative object into a bed of native plants — it shows there's a human taking care of it. And add a cue to care, like a little sign. I rotate my "Bee Safe Lawn" sign with my "Certified Monarch Habitat" sign. It lets people know there's a goal here, a purpose. I do a lot of sidewalk evangelizing.

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The breakfast nook gets a new look

The term "breakfast nook" sounds hopelessly trapped in the 1970s, but modern homeowners are embracing the style and practicality of built-in seating in the kitchen.

"The idea of the built-in, with the kids piled in it and the pillows" can bring the casual fun of a beach house or farmhouse to any home, said Massachusetts-based interior designer Kristina Crestin, featured this season on "This Old House."

Maxwell Ryan, founder of ApartmentTherapy.com, said built-in kitchen seating can maximize space in smaller kitchens and highlight a great window view. It can even become the most distinctive design element in your home.

"People, especially children, will gravitate toward it," Ryan said. "Who doesn't like to get a booth at the diner over a table?"

Practical and pretty

For homeowners with an open-plan kitchen, built-in seating creates a cozy gathering place that functions like a formal dining room but is right in the heart of the cooking and socializing.

In smaller kitchens, a nook allows the dining table to be positioned along a wall or in a corner without looking as if it were stuffed awkwardly out of the way. Built-ins also offer lots of space for storage.

"The space underneath a built-in banquette is ripe with possibilities," said stylist Marianne Canada, host of the "HGTV Crafternoon" web series. Closed cabinets can be designed to match your existing cabinetry, or you

can add open shelving, she says, to "add texture with baskets, show off your cookbook collection, even use it to store large ceramic bowls that take up too much cabinet space."

Just be sure the design of the built-in seating area matches the architecture of the rest of the house, says Crestin. Sketch out what you want and plan carefully before starting construction. If the breakfast nook will include a window, she says, consider the height of the sill and whether it will hit the backs of people seated along the wall.

Also, be sure to use a pedestal table so you're not bumping into table legs when sliding into the seats.

Cool variations

If you can't commit to a fully built-in breakfast area — or if you worry your kitchen will look too much like a roadside diner — Canada suggests adding a banquette to just one side of the kitchen dining area.

"This gives you the best of both worlds," she said, "an architectural feature that provides storage and easy seating, and the opportunity to mix things up with chairs."

This approach is cheaper to build and easier to remove if you want something different later.

One popular option: Extend the bench the entire length of one wall, installing open or closed storage underneath.

"A table at one end for kitchen dining, general seating for those times when everyone ends up in the kitchen, and a space near the door that serves as a landing area for shoes, backpacks and jackets," Canada said.

"Add some hooks above the bench, and baskets below, and you'll find that clutter disappears effortlessly."

Fabrics

One big draw of built-in kitchen seating is the softness and color of the cushions and pillows. A tip from Crestin: Invest in high-quality fabric in a pattern and colors that are neutral enough you can love them for years to come. Then get really creative with fabrics for loose pillows, spending a bit less so you can swap those out seasonally for new ones when the urge strikes.

To highlight the fabrics you've chosen, Ryan painting the backrest area behind the seating in a coordinating color.

"You can easily swap out the fabric on the seat or the paint on the backrest anytime you want to shake up your kitchen decor," he said.

And here's a secret: If you love this look but want to avoid the commitment and cost of real built-in seating, you can create a faux version. Ryan suggests installing a large upholstered

bench along one wall and painting the wall around it with semi-gloss paint (easily wiped clean) to highlight the space. Add pillows and you've got a perfectly cozy space where guests can lean back and enjoy your kitchen.

Moby buys a house that's already in his neighborhood

LOS ANGELES — Electronic-music pioneer, veg-an restaurant owner and trophy-home connoisseur Moby has added another home to his real estate collection, purchasing a property in the Oaks area of Los

Feliz for \$3.4 million.

This is hardly Moby's first venture into the eclectic L.A. neighborhood. Two years ago, after turning a tidy profit on the storied Wolf's Lair compound in Hollywood Hills, he bought a remodeled Tudor on the same street in the Oaks for \$2.9 million.

As for his new purchase,

it's a 1920s home with arresting curb appeal.

Set behind gates and tall pines on a corner lot, the house is distinguished by its steeply pitched roof, decorative siding and rows of casement windows. Stone steps lead up to a red-hued door, adding embellishment to the front entry.

Inside, the house retains

its groin vault ceilings and stone fireplaces; white walls and light wood-paneled ceilings lend a more contemporary look to the 4,600 square feet of interiors.

A formal living room, a chandelier-topped dining room, a media room and an eat-in cook's kitchen are among the common areas. A total of five bedrooms and

seven bathrooms includes a master suite with a fireplace and his-and-her bathrooms and a two-story children's suite with a loft.

French doors open to a 1,500-square-foot entertainer's deck that overlooks the grounds. Nearby, a charming brick and flagstone patio encircles a swimming pool and spa.

The property came to market in February for \$3.495 million, public records show. It previously changed hands more than two decades ago for \$1.05 million.

Moby, 50, a Grammy-nominated musician, gained fame in the 1990s for his electronic dance music, including the 1999 electronica album "Play."



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

Toyota is one year shy of having its Corolla nameplate around for 50 continuous years. Toyota has sold more than 40 million of them and currently operates 16 factories worldwide that ship to 154 countries.

The 11th-generation North American version, released for 2016, has much more style — especially from the windshield forward — than its broad base of customers are used to seeing. The car grew about 4 inches in overall length and in distance between the front and rear wheels. A slightly wider cabin also contributes to more passenger space. Interior styling was also improved, but in a conservative way that differs from more daring competitors.

Likewise, engine choices eschew anything performance-related.

A 132-horsepower four-cylinder carries over from the previous generation and is connected to a six-speed manual transmission. A four-speed automatic is optional for the base L, while a continuously variable unit (CVT) is optional for the LE and S, but standard for the LE Eco. To reduce

that “rubber-band” sensation of varying engine speed that’s prevalent with many CVT applications, Toyota’s engineers added seven artificial shift points that function automatically (or can be controlled through available steering-column-mounted paddle shifters) to simulate the action of a regular automatic transmission.

The LE Eco is also equipped with a 140-horsepower version of the 1.8 that’s rated at 30 mpg in the city and 42 on the highway, compared to the base 1.8’s 29/38 numbers (with the CVT). Those figures are aided by under-body panels that improve the car’s aerodynamics (and reduce highway-speed fuel consumption). Entry-level Corollas

come with air conditioning and basic comfort items, but likely more popular is the LE that includes climate and cruise control touch-screen audio communications interface plus a backup camera. “S” versions add sport bucket seats, sport suspension plus 17-inch wheels (16-inchers are standard). For 2016, a special edition

based on the CVT-equipped S model has different 17-inch wheels with black finish, red contrast stitching and red accents inside, along with keyless entry and ignition.

Of course a wide assortment of comfort, communications and crash-mitigating safety options are offered for each model.

Toyota Land Cruiser gets upgrades, keeps durability for 2016

Toyota has done a nice job of updating the Land Cruiser for 2016, giving its priciest vehicle some new lines to go with upgrades under the hood and behind the wheel while retaining the durability that has given the SUV near-cult status with its owners over the years.

The exterior styling for the five-door, eight-seat SUV has been modernized, with LED headlights and taillights, a new grille, and front and rear bumpers. The

Land Cruiser also got a prominent bulge in the hood for 2016, but it has retained its boxy and brawny look.

For the first time since going on sale in the U.S. in 1957, the Land Cruiser has been given an eight-speed automatic transmission, which has improved the acceleration of the hefty, 5,815-pound SUV.

Toyota has added the latest safety features to this year’s Land Cruiser, such as blind spot monitoring and collision mitigation. Trailer sway control, which helps a driver keep a towed trailer

steady on the road, now comes standard.

Inside, there are more things to make travel enjoyable, including two 10-inch screens so rear-seat passengers can watch movies and play video games, and Siri Eyes Free capability that lets drivers communicate with their iPhones with the push a button.

All of these upgrades only add to the long-running reputation and appeal of the Land Cruiser as the SUV for drivers who value durability and longevity

above all else.

The Land Cruiser’s quality and reliability scores have been consistently high, and *Consumer Reports* lists the 2016 version as a recommended buy.

With a starting manufacturer’s suggested retail price, including destination charge, is \$84,820, the Land Cruiser isn’t cheap. No factory options are available, because the Land Cruiser comes fully equipped.

It will also cost drivers at the gas pump, with the Land Cruiser getting only 13 mpg in city driving and

18 mpg on the highway, according to government ratings. The Land Cruiser comes in only one version, which has a V8 and full-time four-wheel drive.

The Land Cruiser can tow up to 8,100 pounds of boats, campers and the like, and can last for decades. And it doesn’t just look like an SUV, with its body-on-frame rugged construction and Torsen limited-slip locking center differential that adjusts power in rugged terrain from wheels that are slipping to those that aren’t.

It’s a big climb to get inside the 6.2-foot-tall Land Cruiser. With ground clearance of a full 9.1 inches, this SUV provides lots of distance underneath so its mechanicals don’t scrape off-road obstacles such as fallen logs and protruding rocks.

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Fiat Chrysler to lay off 1,300 workers

DETROIT — Tumbling sales of Fiat Chrysler's main midsize car have driven the company to indefinitely lay off 1,300 employees at a Detroit-area factory.

Workers on the second shift at Fiat Chrysler's assembly plant in Sterling Heights, Mich., will be furloughed starting July 5 as the slow-selling Chrysler 200 has started to stack up on dealer lots.

Sales of the cars were down 61 percent through March, and inventory grew to a 150-day supply, according to Ward's Automotive. Automakers consider 60 days to be optimal to give dealers enough of a selection for customers. Fiat Chrysler sold only 7,500 of the cars last month, less than half the number it sold a year ago.

It's the company's first indefinite layoff since 2009,

when demand for cars and trucks dropped coming out of the Great Recession, and it's caused in part by U.S.

buyers shifting from cars to SUVs of all sizes. Midsize cars, which have been particularly hard hit by the

shift, saw sales fall 3.5 percent for the first three months of the year.

But the 200 had other

problems including poor reviews due to unresponsive handling, a rough-shifting transmission and a four-cylinder base engine that didn't have enough power. "Every other sedan in this category is better," *Consumer Reports* magazine said two years ago.

Even Fiat Chrysler CEO Sergio Marchionne criticized the car at this year's Detroit auto show, saying it had a bad rear-door design that was copied from Hyundai's Sonata. Marchionne said later in January that FCA wants to find a partner to build small cars like the Dodge Dart and Chrysler 200 so it can make more hot-selling Jeeps at its U.S. plants. He wouldn't say which factories would get more Jeeps, but last year's United Auto Workers (UAW) contract promised new vehicles for the Sterling Heights and

Belvidere, Ill., factories.

The union said Wednesday that the layoffs weren't a surprise and that FCA wasn't the only company having trouble selling cars. It said FCA plans to build more trucks and SUVs, which will be positive for union members in the long-term.

Fiat Chrysler said the second shift in Sterling Heights, which has been on temporary layoff since Feb. 1, will return to work Monday and be on the job through July 5. But after that, workers will be laid off indefinitely.

The company notified employees represented by the UAW union of the decision on Wednesday, as well as state and city officials, FCA said in a statement. Fiat Chrysler said it will place the laid-off workers in open full-time positions as they become available in the Detroit area.

Experts caution self-driving cars aren't ready for roads

WASHINGTON — Self-driving cars are more likely to hurt than help public safety because of unsolved technical issues, engineers and safety advocates told the government Friday, countering a push by innovators to speed government approval.

Even a trade association for automakers cautioned the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA) that a slower, more deliberative approach may be needed than the agency's aggressive plan to provide its guidance for deploying the vehicles in just six months. The decision to produce the guidance was announced in January and officials have promised to complete it by July.

There are risks to deviating from the govern-

ment's traditional process of issuing regulations and standards, Paul Scullion, safety manager at the Association of Global Automakers, said at a public meeting on self-driving cars hosted by NHTSA.

Issuing new regulations takes an average of eight years, NHTSA has said. Regulations are also enforceable, while guidance is usually more general and open to interpretation.

"While this process is often time-consuming, these procedural safeguards are in place for valid reasons," Scullion said. Working outside that process might allow the government to respond more quickly to rapidly changing technology, but that approach would likely come at the expense of thoroughness, he said.

Mark Rosekind, NHTSA's administrator, said the agency can't wait because early self-driving technologies are already in cars on the road, including automatic emergency braking that can stop or reduce speed to avoid or mitigate a collision. Another

safety option on some vehicles automatically steers vehicles back into their lanes if they start to drift without the driver first using a turn signal.

"Everybody asks, 'When are they going to be ready?' I keep saying they're not com-

ing; they are here now," Rosekind said.

Without federal instructions, "people are just going to keep putting stuff out on the road with no guidance on how do we do this the right way."

Rosekind emphasized that he sees self-driving cars as game-changing technology that can somewhat save the lives of many of the more than 30,000 people killed each year on the nation's roads.

A General Motors official recently told a Senate committee that the automaker expects to deploy self-driving cars within a few years through a partnership with the ride-sharing service Lyft. Google, a pioneer in the development of self-driving cars, is pushing Congress to give NHT-

SA new powers to grant it special, expedited permission to sell cars without steering wheels or pedals.

But many of those who addressed the meeting, the first of two the agency has scheduled as it works on the guidelines, described a host of situations that self-driving cars still can't handle:

- Poorly marked pavement, including parking lots and driveways, could foil the technology, which relies on clear lane markings.

- Bad weather can interfere with vehicle sensors.

- Self-driving cars can't take directions from a policeman.

- Inconsistent traffic-control devices — horizontal versus lateral traffic lights, for example.


To brake or to shift when descending?

Q: My cars are all automatics with the shift lever on the floor. When heading downhill or approaching a red light, I downshift. I do this to save on brake wear, but am I damaging transmission or gears with these frequent downshifts? I seek your advice — brake or downshift?

— B.L., Schaumburg, Ill.
A: Brakes are easier and cheaper to replace than transmissions. So leave the tranny in drive unless you are descending a long, steep hill. Driving down from the summit of Mount Washington can get the brakes very hot. If that heat boils the brake fluid, the brakes will fade. Placing the transmission in a lower range to pro-

vide engine braking is the way to go.

Q: Twenty years ago I bought a used, loaded, 1979 Chrysler Cordoba with 22,000 miles from a private seller. I've kept it in a garage and only drove it 12,000 miles. The problem is that I want to sell it but I've lost the seller's documentation (repair receipts) verifying the low mileage. I thought I could verify the mileage using Carfax, but they cannot provide information for cars built before 1980. Is there any other way I can document the mileage? The car is in pristine condition and could sell for thousands more if I

could verify the mileage. Potential buyers may assert that the car could have had 112,000 miles (or more) on the mechanical odometer because those odometers turn over to zero after 99,999 miles.

— G.B., St. John, Ind.
A: Carfax was not launched until 1984 so, of course, there would be no proof for a potential purchaser. You could offer your word. But with so many words being broken

— especially in political arena — it may carry little value. One option is to create an affidavit and swear to its truth before a notary public.

Q: What is the best way to get white bird poop out of a convertible top?

— K.B., Glenview, Ill.
A: We have used two products with success: 303 brand Tonneau Cover & Convertible Top Cleaner, and Meguiar's Convertible Top Cleaner. RaggTopp is one we have heard of, but not personally used. The trick is to allow the cleaning solution to work, sometimes up to 30 minutes, and then use a soft nylon bristle brush to loosen the deposit. If the stain

has been there for a long time, it may never be fully removed.

Q: I have a 2012 Jeep Grand Cherokee with the six-cylinder engine. When I have driven 100 miles or so on a hot day, the climate control stops blowing with any force. The air is cool but it will not blow enough out to cool the car, no matter what setting you put it in. I've had this issue since the car was new. The dealer could not duplicate this situation when I brought it in so they insist it operates normally. Any idea?

— J.S., Northbrook, Ill.
A: This is a classic symptom of an iced up A/C evaporator and is more

likely to happen on a hot humid day. The evaporator is a heat exchanger that resembles a miniature radiator. The cold evaporator under the dash causes moisture to precipitate out of the air. That water falls to the bottom of the housing where it drains onto the ground. If the drain is clogged, ice may form on the evaporator and block airflow.

Side-to-side drifting common among Nissans

Q: I purchased a new 2015 Nissan Altima. It's a very nice car except for the fact that it noticeably wanders left and right when going faster than 25 mph and needs constant correction. This makes for a stressful drive.

The dealership has checked and adjusted the alignment two times and centered the steering wheel. It's still off center. It's also rotated the wheels two times and set and checked the tire pressure, but all this has been no help.

At the last 9,000-mile check, I was made aware of a Nissan technical bulletin that read, "Steering wheel off center may be the normal result of road crown.

Vehicles have a natural tendency to drift to the low side of the crown."

My car drifts as it pleases, regardless of the road surface. This bulletin may be helpful to a new driver who doesn't have 60 years of driving experience and most likely more than 250,000 miles traveled, but it doesn't help me.

I was also told that this car has electrical steering assist and that the system checks out fine. Can you help?

—Bruce

A: The first thing I thought of when reading your letter was that I should check to see if the 2015 Altima's front suspension caster is adjustable or if an aftermarket caster kit is available. No such luck.

Caster is the alignment angle of the upper and lower suspension pivots. It's similar to the rake of a bicycle's front fork: The greater the rake, the greater the straight-line happiness. Your Altima runs about 5 degrees of caster, which is a generous amount.

I researched your issue and found that lots of folks have been complaining about this since Nissan adopted an electric power steering system in 2013.

In this system, hy-

draulic pressure is created by an electric motor-driven pump. The power steering control unit looks at signals from the vehicle speed sensor and steering angle sensor and adjusts system pressure to the programmed values.

My hunch is the rate of steering assist is higher than some folks prefer at highway speeds and results in an over-sensitive feel. Unfortunately, there isn't a correction for this unless enough people complain and prompt Nissan to consider a software adjustment to the system. Some folks report an improvement in tracking after they've reduced tire pressure a few pounds.

Q: My 2000 Mitsubishi Diamante's horn no longer beeps when I set

the car's alarm. How do I find and fix the problem? —Stu

A: This issue is very likely more complicated than I can explain in this short space, but I'll give it a try.

Your anti-theft alarm horn is operated via a relay, which is controlled by the electronic timer alarm control system's electronic control unit.

What's most important here, though, is that your horn would work in the event of a theft.

Try arming the system as you depart, leaving the driver's window down and then reaching inside and opening the door. If the alarm sounds, this proves the system as well as the relay, wiring and horn are OK. If not, I'd recommend testing of the power-door locking system first and

then proceeding with additional scan-tool tests to see if the anti-theft system can be armed successfully. If the alarm does arm and sound when triggered, my hunch would be that there's a fault in the electronic control unit or perhaps the alarm-arming beep choice has been inadvertently deselected.

With the engine off, try unplugging, waiting five minutes and then reconnecting the control unit (it's located behind the left side instrument panel), which should restore the original operating defaults.

Google tests self-driving cars in Phoenix

CHANDLER, Ariz. — Google brought its self-driving vehicles to Phoenix to see how the SUVs perform in Arizona's sweltering summer.

Four of Google's self-driving vehicles were driven around Phoenix last week, mapping portions of the metro area ahead of letting the cars loose. Google officials say they began having the cars drive in Chandler.

"I'm honored that Google selected Chandler as the first city in Arizona to continue testing its self-driving cars project," Chandler Mayor Jay Tibshraeny said in a statement. "Google is a perfect fit; adding to our growing list of technology companies doing business in Chandler. This decision by Google cements our reputation as the premiere innovation and technology

hub of the Southwest." Google officials said they hoped to see how the cars work in high temperatures and in the massive dust storms that occasionally occur in the summer.

"Also, in some communities, there are golf cart crossings, I understand," said Jennifer Haroon, head of business operations for the Google Self-Driving Car project.

Tibshraeny said the city first talked to Google a little over two weeks ago, and within 10 days they were notified that the cars were coming to town.

So far Google has 54 vehicles driving themselves, with Google workers as pas-

sengers, in Mountain View, Calif., — where Google is based — Austin, Texas, and Kirkland, Wash.

The self-driving cars are easy to spot by their extra equipment on the roof and their extra courteous manner of driving.

Haroon said Arizona has provided a good environment for self-driving vehicle research. On March 9, Gov. Doug Ducey announced the creation of a Self-Driving Oversight Committee to advise the Department of Transportation, the Department of Public Safety, universities and other public agencies on how to advance self-driving vehicles on public roads.

GM design chief Ed Welburn to retire

DETROIT — Ed Welburn, General Motors' longtime head of automotive design and the first African-American to lead global design for any automaker, is retiring after 44 years with the company.

Welburn, 65, has led GM Design in North America since 2003, and was appointed global design chief in 2005. He was responsible for the company's interior and exterior designs, leading upgrades as the company emerged from its 2009 bankruptcy.

Welburn steps down July 1 and will be replaced by Michael Simcoe, who has been with the company for 33 years. Simcoe is vice president of international design.

GM said Welburn set up a network of 10 design centers around the world with more than 2,500 employees. He's responsible for functional designs of everyday GM products as well as iconic performance cars such as the Chevrolet Corvette and Camaro.

During Welburn's tenure, General Motors Co.'s designs have im-

proved, with mainstream cars striking a good balance between functionality and looks, said Jake Fisher, auto testing chief for *Consumer Reports* magazine.

Under Welburn, most of GM's designs haven't been flashy, but they have been smart, offering good visibility and interior space with a conservative yet appealing look, Fisher said. "I think they've improved the design of their cars without compromising their function," he said. "It's hard to make a car that looks good but also is packaged well."

I hope this helps a little, William. There's nothing wrong with having some nice things. But there's a big difference between you having things and your things having you. Never let "stuff" stand between you and your family's sense of security and financial well-being.

Poll: Americans pessimistic on country's path

WASHINGTON — More than two-thirds of Americans think the country is moving in the wrong direction, the highest in nearly 4 1/2 years, a new McClatchy-Marist Poll found.

Fully 68 percent of adults think the country is on the wrong track, while just 27 percent think things are moving in the right direction.

The last time such an overwhelming number of Americans had negative opinions of the country's direction was November 2011, when 70 percent thought that America was going the wrong way.

The numbers are marginally worse when the poll narrows to registered voters, with 71 percent sour on the country's path and 26 percent content.

The pessimistic view of the nation's direction — which spans racial, gender, age and economic lines — comes despite signs of an improving economy. Employers added 215,000 positions last month and the unemployment rate was 5 percent. But that's not enough to quell voters' concerns.

"It's the wages," said Lee Miringoff, director of the Marist Institute for Public Opinion, which conducted the survey.

Republican voters say by 89-10 percent that the country is heading the wrong way. Independents shared the downcast view of the nation's course, 77-20 percent. Democratic voters are largely split — 49 percent thinking the nation is on the wrong track and 47 percent thinking it's on the right path.

A beginner's guide to recruiting and hiring

Q: For the first time ever, I have a role in which I will be recruiting and hiring people for my company. What are some things I should do to make sure it goes well?

—Netta, 30, director, process improvement

A: This is a good opportunity to put the "golden rule" into action, treating your candidates as you'd like to be treated if you were in the job market.

There are several elements that go into this, addressing both content and process.

From a content perspective, before you start recruiting, clarify the role so that you're solid on the contributions you need your new hire to make. You'll then be able to know the experiences and skills you need to bring on board. Job titles can be opaque, and ambiguity can lead to a poor fit, wasted resources, and hard feelings.

At the same time, be realistic.

The wish list of ideal features can create a paragon who doesn't really exist. Just be aware of your absolute must-haves and deal breakers. Also, being wedded to an ideal can cause you to overlook someone who could be a great fit.

Consider, too, the culture you're trying to create in your organization. For example, if you want a collaborative environment, watch out for people who prefer "command and control," especially if you're hiring in a leadership role. Your company — any company — will also benefit from a focus on diversity. If everyone looks the same and comes from the same

general set of experiences, you'll miss a lot of opportunity.

From a process perspective, the single biggest pain point I hear about is communication. Consider the times you've been in the job market. Often people are asked to submit through a portal that allows little room for displaying creativity and delivering nuanced information. In the worst cases, they do not even receive an automated acknowledgment. So, one recommendation is to try to bring in a human touch, even at the screening stage.

Once you've been in touch with someone, the stakes become much higher, because their emotional investment increases accordingly. I've heard people say that they just don't have time to follow up personally with people, but that's a short sighted point of view that can have negative consequences. Plus, it just isn't that hard, since you'll

calibrate your follow-up to your level of engagement.

If you've just had a quick screening chat with someone and determined they're not a fit, send an equally quick email letting them know and thanking them for their time. They'll appreciate it, you'll build good will, and it's the rare person who'll follow up to pursue the position further. (Sometimes, they can end up being your diamond in the rough, too!)

If someone has been a serious candidate, give them the courtesy of a call. This isn't the easy call to make, and I think discomfort often keeps people from taking this step, hiding behind busyness. But again, this will help you stand out, build your brand, and create advocates out of potential employees.

Help for workers who can't afford office parties and gifts

HERE'S ONE MEASURE of the financial and emotional toll on lower-paid workers who can't afford what their higher-paid colleagues can.

A reader wrote, already stressing about this year's holiday celebration — as in Christmas, as in more than half a year away.

This worker earns less than the other people in her office and lives on a tight budget. She has sacrificed some of her personal "wants" to be able to participate in office events. But she's worried, and not just about finances.

She's worried that if she doesn't sign up for the office gift exchange, if she declines invitations to parties or office outings, if she doesn't contribute to office collections for whatever purpose, she'll be held in disregard as a team player.

The simple, but not easy, answer is to say upfront, "I can't afford it." Maybe that will make the boss feel a bit bad

about pay disparity and co-workers feel a bit embarrassed about not understanding.

In real life, though, it's not necessarily easy to admit financial pressures. And it's not easy to bare one's feelings about being left out if one can't participate.

It should be up to management to recognize that well-meaning events, designed to be collegial, may be just the opposite for some of the workforce. If participation carries an individual price tag, it's more than some workers can bear.

Especially in small offices, where there's probably greater awareness about pay

disparity due to varying job descriptions, it's everyone's job to be sensitive about the ability and feelings of the lowest-paid colleagues when they're asked to pony up, regardless of the cause.

There are solutions. If a party or gift exchange is an office tradition, bosses who know what their employees make could quietly subsidize participation of the least-paid employees, if not out of their own pockets, at least out of the office kitty.

Expensive gift exchanges could be replaced by "white elephant" or other low-cost presents so fun becomes the purpose, not the accumulation of things. And don't expect co-workers to buy something for everyone. Do a "Secret Santa" or draw a single name and set a very modest price ceiling.

Group lunches or outings to restaurants could be replaced by in-office buffets for which

workers contribute dishes, providing plenty of cost latitude.

In-office collections for goodbye gifts, baby gifts and other causes could be done with a jar placed on a counter rather than face-to-face appeals.

It's good to remember that some workers who seem standoffish or selfish may be suffering from financial worries. But that doesn't mean they like being excluded. It doesn't mean they enjoy looking like a downer who doesn't care about camaraderie.

Over and over, I hear from workers who like their jobs, their organizations and their co-workers. But it's seemingly little things like the office Christmas party that can mess with heads, hearts and wallets.

Roll the 'Dice'

Andrew Dice Clay attempts another TV comeback

Everything old is new again. In the 1990s, Andrew Dice Clay ("The Adventures of Ford Fairlane," 1990) was known for his expletive-laden, brash brand of humor. For a while, he was on top, but the entertainment industry is notoriously fickle, and he faded from view within a decade of his rise to fame.

Now, he hopes to be famous for a new four-letter word. The comedian stages a comeback in the semi-autobiographical scripted comedy "Dice," premiering Sunday, April 10, on Showtime. Created by Scot Armstrong ("Old School," 2003), the six-episode series follows Clay as he moves his family to Las Vegas in the hopes of kick-starting his career after a slump. The aging comedian also struggles to pay his gambling debts, manage his sons' rock band and keep his family afloat, all the while fending off old fans.

The situations Dice finds himself in are billed as "semi-true" in Showtime's release, which Clay reiterated in a behind-the-scenes promo for the series.

"The show is the most berserk thing, and it's funny that I'm saying that because it's a hybrid of my life," he said, adding: "Now, after 38 years of comedy, I like to make fun of where I am."

"Dice's" premise isn't terribly new. Matt LeBlanc ("Friends") won a Golden Globe in 2012 for his portrayal of himself in "Episodes," and Larry David popularized the premise as a fictionalized version of himself in his comedy "Curb Your Enthusiasm," which ran from 2000 to 2011 on HBO. Clay offers viewers a similar self-deprecating take on the genre, but also intends to inject his prime-time doppelganger with sentimentality.

"I'll do anything, but now and then, we should see this guy's heart," explained Clay. "That's what makes any comedy a success."

The cast should also factor into the show's success, and producers have lined up some high-profile guest stars to keep things interesting. Kevin Corrigan ("Grounded for Life") co-stars as Dice's right-hand man and partner-in-shenanigans, a guy known as Milkshake. His character, according to Clay, is a hybrid of a few of his friends. Corrigan explained he liked to think of Milkshake as Dice's conscience.

Natasha Leggero ("Another Period") portrays Dice's girlfriend, Carmen. It's interesting to note that she's listed as a guest star and not a series regular, which leads to speculation she may not be around for very long. That wouldn't come as a surprise, considering Dice's antiquated views about women.

In October, it was announced Lorraine Bracco ("The Sopranos") would join the cast of "Dice" for two episodes as Toni, a Las Vegas overlord in control of Dice's gambling debts. Adrien Brody ("The Pianist," 2002) guest stars as himself in one episode, and other guest stars announced so far include Michael Rapaport ("Boston Public"), Wayne Newton ("Smokin' Aces," 2006), Criss Angel ("Criss Angel Mindfreak") and Rita Rudner ("Hollywood Squares").

It's an impressive roster that just might put "Dice" on the map and help revive Clay's floundering career. He rose to fame on the stand-up comedy circuit and became the first comedian to sell out New York's Madison Square Garden two nights in a row in 1990. However, his controversial persona and material led to a lot of backlash from the public and he ultimately fell from favor. His 1990 appearance on NBC's "Saturday Night Live" was boycotted by both series star Nora Dunn and musical guest Sinead O'Connor.

"Dice" isn't Clay's first attempt at a comeback. Back in 2007, he starred in his own reality TV series — "Dice: Undisputed" on VH1, but it only lasted six episodes. He represented the charity StandUp for Kids in the second season of "The Celebrity Apprentice" but was fired by Donald Trump in the very first episode.

Despite being lambasted by women's groups for his sexist humor and being named one of the world's worst standup comedians by Complex Magazine in 2011, he soldiered on with his career throughout the 2000s. He appeared at The Bamboozle festival in 2012 and starred in the Showtime comedy special "Indestructible" the same year. His role in Woody Allen's "Blue Jasmine" (2013) was praised by critics and inspired many to take another look at the performer as a character actor.

Clay tried to set the record straight with his 2014 autobiography "The Filthy Truth." Also, he exemplified and embraced his controversial history when he hosted Showtime's comedy showcase "The Blue Show" in 2015. More recently, he guest starred in HBO's '70s-era drama "Vinyl."

Ready, set, bake!

'Spring Baking Championship' brightens up the kitchens

It's been spring for a few weeks already, and the temperature's on its way up — both outside in the sun and inside in the Food Network kitchens.

April showers bring frosting flowers, at least it does in the "Spring Baking Championship." The Food Network competition premieres Sunday, April 10, and continues with an hour-long episode every Sunday evening until the spring wedding-themed finale airing May 15.

Eight of the best bakers in the country have signed up for the challenge of

pleasing both the eyes and the palates of the three judges. Duff Goldman ("Ace of Cakes"), Nancy Fuller ("Farmhouse Rules") and the U.K.'s Lorraine Pascale ("Baking Made Easy") are all back to judge the sophomore season, and when it comes to all things sweet and baked, these three aren't to be trifled with.

Food Network personality Bobby Deen ("Not My Mama's Meals") also returns as the host overseeing the events, a role he also fills for the festively themed "Holiday Baking Championship."

For the premiere, the bakers are getting a little bit fruity. For their first chal-

lenge, Deen charges them with making a springtime classic: a sumptuous, tender shortcake.

This is "Spring Baking Championship," though, not the local church social, and these bakers need a bit more of a challenge than just a plain old strawberry shortcake. In a "berry" sweet twist, the bakers have to make their shortcakes without any berries at all.

It's a twist that's turned on its head for the night's second challenge. With the shortcakes behind them, the bakers turn their attention to naked cakes that must feature berries as their main flavor. The stakes are high, too: whoever bakes the least satisfying confection is sent home empty-handed.

Of course, by the end of the series, all but one of the eight bakers will be going home without anything but their experiences. For the winner, though, there's a sweet \$50,000 waiting at the end of the finale, along with the bragging rights that come with out-baking some of the country's top talents.

The second "Spring Baking Championship" premieres Sunday, April 10, on Food Network.



Daily detour: TBS is bulking up its newfound relationship with former "Daily Show" correspondents. Comedy Central's late-night laughfest has been a launching pad for a lot of comedic careers over the years, and now "The Daily Show's" husband-and-wife duo is settling into their new home.

The new TBS series "The Detour" premieres Monday, April 11, with former "Daily Show" correspondent Jason Jones at the helm as both the star and co-creator; he shares that second credit with his wife, Samantha Bee, whose own TBS show, "Full Frontal with Samantha Bee," premiered in February.

The scripted comedy stars Jones as Nate, a father of two who

loads up the car for a family road trip from New York to Florida.

Natalie Zea ("Justified") stars as his wife, Robin, while Ashley Gerasimovich ("We Need to Talk About Kevin," 2011) and Liam Carroll ("The Neighbors") star as his kids, Delilah and Jared.

At the recent Television Critics Association's winter press tour, Jones was candid about his inspiration for the comedy: his own experiences during family trips with Bee and their children.

"The core of it is how I speak to my children, which is in a very honest and blunt fashion," he explained. "I don't see that on television a lot."

With the huge success that other former "Daily Show" correspondents, such as Steve Carell ("The Office"), John Oliver ("Last Week Tonight with John Oliver") and Ste-

phen Colbert ("The Late Show with Stephen Colbert") have found, it's no surprise that TBS is looking for some of its own "Daily Show" magic. "The Detour," starring Jason Jones, premieres Monday, April 11, on TBS.

Gale Anne Hurd serves as one of the show's executive producers, and her list of credits is the stuff that sci-fi dreams are made of: "The Terminator" (1984), "Terminator 2: Judgment Day" (1991), "Aliens" (1986) and "The Walking Dead" are just a few the notches on her belt.

Natalie Chaidez is the writer in charge of adapting the source material, the bestselling novel "Alien Hunter" by Whitley Strieber, and is another one of "Hunters'" executive producers. Her writing and producing credits include "12 Monkeys," "Terminator: The Sarah Connor Chronicles" and "Heroes."

"Hunters" has a bestselling novel inspiring it, and some wicked talent both on and off the screen. Science fiction lovers won't want to miss its premiere when it airs Monday, April 11, on Syfy.


