Brake slows SAFER grant

City manager raises concern with funds that allow for new firefighters

BY BEN CONLEY The Dominion Post

At surface level, it seems like a no-brainer. By national firefighting standards, the Morgantown Fire Department is understaffed — par-

ticularly to handle a fire in the high-rise apartment buildings that have become commonplace in the city. So when the federal government offers \$1.7 million over three years to grow the force by 25 percent, you simply accept

the money. But the decision isn't that simple, according to City Manager Paul Brake. During the most recent city council meeting, Brake warned members of council that the SAFER grant brings with it a lot of difficult decisions, starting at the Aug. 15 city council meeting. "This is going to be a tough issue. I'm just kind of preparing you for that meeting. We'll guide

you through that. There's no real simple answers, but bottom line, we'll give you a recommendation for how to proceed," Brake said. The grant will be provided on a sliding scale over the three-year period. In years one and two, the grant covers 75 percent of the cost to pay 12 new firefighters. In year

U.S. in bull's-eye for total solar eclipse

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. — It will be tough eclipsing this eclipse. The sun, moon and Earth will line up perfectly in the cosmos on Aug. 21, turning day into night for a few wondrous minutes. Its path will cross the U.S. from sea to shining sea for the first time in nearly a century. Never will a total solar eclipse be so heavily viewed and studied — or celebrated. "We're going to be looking at this event with unprecedented eyes," promised Alex Young, a solar physicist who is coordinating NASA's education and public outreach. And the party planning is at full tilt from Oregon to South Carolina. Eclipse Fests, StarFests, SolarFests, SolFests, Darkening of the SunFests, MoonshadowFests, EclipseCons, Eclipse

Encounters and Star Parties are planned along the long but narrow path of totality, where the moon completely blots out the sun. Vineyards, breweries, museums, parks, universities, stadiums — just about everybody is getting into the act. The Astronomical League for amateur astronomers is holding up at Casper, Wyo.. Minor league baseball teams will halt play for "eclipse delays" in Salem, Oregon, and elsewhere. By a cosmic quirk of the calendar, the Little Green Men Days Festival will be in full swing in Kelly, Ky., as will the American Atheists' annual convention in North Charleston, S.C. And where better to fill up on eclipse T-shirts and safety glasses — and eclipse burgers — than the Eclipse Kitchen in

Makanda, Ill. "This is a really amazing chance to just open the public's eyes to wonder," said Montana State University's Angela Des Jardins, a physicist in charge of a NASA eclipse ballooning project. The student-launched, high-altitude balloons will beam back live video of the eclipse along the route. Satellites and ground telescopes will also aim at the sun and at the moon's shadow cutting a swath 60 to 70 miles wide across the land. Astronauts will do the same with cameras aboard the International Space Station. Ships and planes will also catch the action. "It's going to be hard to beat, frankly," Thomas Zurbuchen, head of NASA's science mission office, said. At the same time, re-

road is closed but the businesses remain open. Jones said the DOT wanted to make sure people knew they would have access to businesses in the area.

searchers and the just plain curious will watch how animals and plants react as darkness falls. It will resemble twilight and the temperature will drop 10 to 15 degrees.

Expect four hours of pageantry, from the time the sun begins to be eclipsed by the moon near Lincoln City, Ore., until the time the moon's shadow vanishes near Charleston, S.C. NASA will emcee the whole show, via TV and internet from that coastal city.

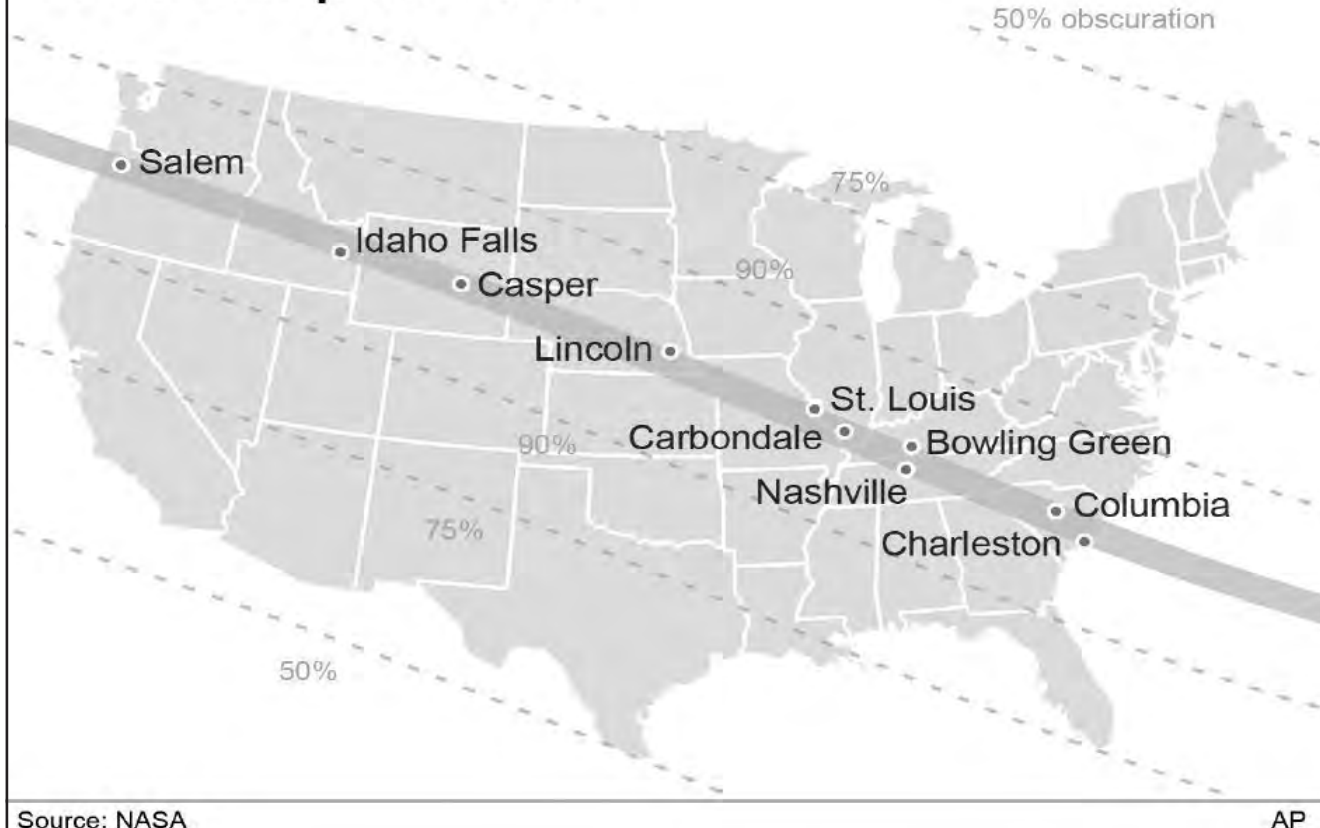
The total eclipse will last just 1 1/2 hours as the lunar shadow sweeps coast to coast at more than 1,500 mph beginning about 1:15 p.m. and ending at 2:49 p.m. The sun's crown — the normally invisible outer atmosphere known as the corona — will shine forth like a halo.

Sure, full solar eclipses happen every one, two or three years, when the moon positions itself smack dab between the sun and Earth. But these take-your-breath-away eclipses usually occur in the middle of the ocean somewhere or near the sparsely populated top or bottom of the world. In two years, Chile, Argentina and the empty South Pacific will share top billing.

The United States is in the bull's-eye this time.

It will be the first total solar eclipse in 99 years to cross coast-to-coast and the first to pass through any part of the Lower 48 states in 38 years.

NASA's meteor guru, Bill Cooke, was in Washington state for that one in 1979. This time, he's headed to his sister's farm in eastern Tennessee.

"It is the most weird, creepy, awe-inspiring astronomical event you will experience," Cooke said.

No other country will be privy to the path of totality. Originating in the wide open North Pacific and ending in the Atlantic well short of Africa, the path of totality will cover 8,600 miles from end to end.

In all, 14 states, 21 National Park locations and seven national historic trails will be in the path.

Darkness will last just under two minutes in Oregon, gradually expanding to a maximum two minutes and 44 seconds in Shawnee National Forest in southernmost Illinois, almost into Kentucky, then dwindling to 2 1/2 minutes in South Carolina. Staring at the sun with unprotected eyes is always dangerous, except during the few minutes of totality. Even then, most pros recommend eclipse glasses.

With an estimated 200 million people living with in a day's drive of the path, huge crowds are expected. Highway officials already are cautioning travelers to

be patient and, yes, avoid eclipses in judgment.

The view from the sidelines won't be too shabby, either: A partial eclipse will extend up through Canada and down through Central America and the top of South America. Minneapolis will see 86 percent of the sun covered, Miami sees 82 percent Montreal gets 66 percent, while Mexico City sees 38 percent.

But who wants to settle for not quite when you can experience the whole eclipsed enchilada?

Not Kevin Van Horn, an astronomy buff from suburban Pittsburgh who will make the 8 1/2-hour drive to

Nashville with his wife, Cindy. Nashville is the biggest metropolitan area along the eclipse's main drag.

"It would be like going to the Super Bowl and sitting outside the stadium rather than being inside and watching it," Van Horn, a solar eclipse newbie, said.

By contrast, it will be the 13th total solar eclipse for Rick Fienberg, spokesman for the American Astronomical Society. He's headed to Oregon.

"Going through life without ever experiencing totality," Fienberg declared, "is like going through life without ever falling in love."

three, it drops to 35 percent.

"So we're looking at allocating funds well above and beyond to the fire department," Brake said, explaining that the additional salaries are just one aspect of a complicated equation.

"There are direct costs and there's indirect costs. We've talked about appropriation to the pension system ... There's some pretty serious financial struc-

tural issues that we need to address that go well beyond the realm of this, and it could exacerbate those circumstances," Brake said, noting that increased equipment and apparatus costs also need to be considered.

"This is not anything against the fire department. I just want to outline this for very careful consideration," Brake said. "In order to sustain this arrangement, quite simply, what we would be faced with is looking at raising

revenues or making cuts in other areas."

In other city news, Brake asked for and received council's blessing to enter contract negotiations for the construction of a new gravel trail loop in Krepps Park.

The decision to move forward with the trail comes after the Morgantown Utility Board (MUB) completed a storm water project in the area.

Brake explained that project predates his arrival in Morgantown, but

he has learned that the post-project restoration of the park was never really nailed down.

It was explained that MUB would actually hold the contract, which would be with the same contractor the utility hired for the storm water work.

While Brake said council could come back to the issue in the future, the heavy equipment is already on site. Going forward now, he said, would eliminate future mobilization costs and avoid ad-

ditional impacts to the park.

Councilor Jenny Selin said she heard plenty about impacts on the park.

"This is a pretty heavily used area and now it looks pretty awful to the people who use it frequently," Selin said. "This would go a long way toward them feeling better about the fact that there were huge, wide swaths that got bulldozed and all the trees removed."

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'Lucifer' heat wave stifles large swath of Europe

BELGRADE, Serbia — No wonder it's been dubbed "Lucifer."

A relentless heat wave that gripped parts of Europe last week sent temperatures soaring to record highs for several days, causing at least two deaths and prompting authorities to issue severe weather warnings.

"It is just too much," real estate agent Sasa Jovanovic, 52, said during an early morning walk in Serbia's capital, Belgrade, where the temperature was forecast to hit 102.2 degrees Fahrenheit Saturday. "Sometimes it feels as if I cannot breathe."

The extreme heat stifling Serbia, Romania, Croatia and parts of Spain, France and Italy fueled wildfires, damaged crops and strained energy and water supplies. Authorities in some areas issued traffic restrictions and banned outdoor work during the hottest part of the day.

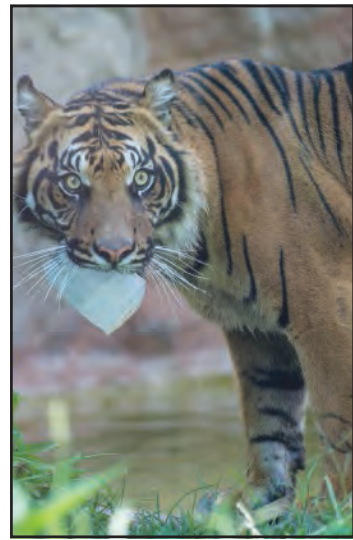
Spain's national weather service on Saturday issued an emergency warning for high temperatures in 31 of the country's 50 provinces as forecasts predicted temperatures of up to 111.2 F.

Western and northern Europe, in contrast, was experiencing colder and wetter weather.

Although southern Europe is used to scorching summers, meteorologists have warned that hot spells lasting several days aren't that common.

The public health institute in Belgrade issued heat instructions, telling people to keep wet towels on windows if there is no air conditioning, and avoid physical strain and alcohol.

Thousands of residents sought refuge from the heat at the city's recreation area, swimming in the local lake and the Danube or the Sava rivers. Some of those who ventured to the city center dipped their feet or wet their hair in the fountains.

Animal rights groups urged citizens to place plastic bowls with water outside their buildings and in parks for the city's many stray dogs.

In Croatia, health authorities reported a surge in

emergency calls over the last week. They appealed to the thousands of tourists vacationing along the country's Adriatic coast to be careful on the beaches and while traveling.

Romania reported two

heat-related deaths — a 45-year-old man collapsed and died Friday while working in a field in the northeast, while a 60-year-old man died of a heart attack in the street in an eastern port Thursday.

U.N. imposes new sanctions on N. Korea

UNITED NATIONS — The U.N. Security Council unanimously approved tough new sanctions on North Korea on Saturday including a ban on coal and other exports totaling more than \$1 billion — a huge bite in its total exports, valued at \$3 billion last year.

U.S. Ambassador Nikki Haley praised the new sanctions, telling council members after the vote that it is "the single largest economic package ever leveled against the North Korean regime."

The resolution also bans countries from giving any additional permits to North Korean laborers — another source of money for Kim Jong Un's regime. And it prohibits all new joint ventures with North Korean companies

and bans new foreign investment in existing ones.

The U.S.-drafted measure, negotiated with North Korea's neighbor and ally China, is aimed at increasing economic pressure on Pyongyang to return to negotiations on its nuclear and missile programs.

The Security Council already imposed six rounds of sanctions that failed to halt North Korea's drive to improve its ballistic missile and nuclear weapons capabilities.

The resolution's adoption follows North Korea's first successful tests of intercontinental ballistic missiles capable of reaching the United States on July 3 and July 27.

"All of this ICBM and nuclear irresponsibility has to stop," Haley told reporters as she headed to

the council to vote.

The resolution condemns the launches "in the strongest terms" and reiterates previous calls for North Korea to suspend all ballistic missile launches and abandon its nuclear weapons and nuclear program "in a complete, verifiable and irreversible manner."

The resolution bans North Korea from exporting coal, iron, lead and seafood products estimated to be worth over \$1 billion. This represents one-third of last year's exports.

It adds nine North Koreans, mainly officials or representatives of companies and banks, to the U.N. sanctions blacklist, banning their travel and freezing their assets. It also imposes an asset freeze on two companies and two banks.

Oxford finance officer, Northwestern professor jailed in stabbing death

SAN FRANCISCO — Far from their prestigious campuses, a Northwestern University professor and a University of Oxford finance officer were jailed in the San Francisco area Saturday after eight days as fugitives sought in the death of a young hairdresser in Chicago stabbed repeatedly until the knife broke, police said.

The Northwestern microbiologist, Wyndham Lathem, had a personal relationship with the victim, although the nature of it wasn't clear, and Lathem had made a video apologizing for what he called "the worst mistake of my life," police said.

Lathem, 42, was being held without bail in Alameda County and faced a court appearance in the city of Pleasanton. The other suspect, Andrew Warren, a treasury

assistant at one of Oxford's residential colleges in England, was being held at the county jail in San Francisco.

Both men surrendered separately and peacefully in the Bay Area on Friday evening.

They had been fugitives since the body of 26-year-old Trenton James Cornell-Duranleau was found in Lathem's Chicago apartment, on July 27.

Police said Lathem had a relationship with Cornell-Duranleau, who moved to Chicago from the Grand Rapids, Mich., area after receiving his cosmetology license. They have not elaborated on how Cornell-Duranleau or Lathem knew Warren, or if Warren knew them before he arrived in the United States.

Chicago police said Warren was 56; he was booked into jail as age 49.

Police confirm mosque attack; FBI takes lead

BLOOMINGTON, Minn. — Someone apparently threw a bomb through the window of a suburban Minneapolis mosque on Saturday as people were preparing for morning prayers, damaging the imam's office but not causing any injuries, authorities said.

Minneapolis police said a preliminary investigation shows a destructive device caused the explosion, "in violation of federal law," and that the FBI has taken the lead in the investigation. An FBI spokesman didn't return a phone message Saturday seeking details about the investigation.

3 people dead on Indian reservation

LODGE GRASS, Mont. — Three people were killed and two others were injured in a shooting at a residence on the Crow Indian Reservation. The tribe instituted an emergency curfew.

The FBI said Saturday that three people were shot and killed Friday afternoon in Lodge Grass. Big Horn County Coroner Terry Bullis said autopsies were planned Saturday.

Officials have not released the names and ages of the victims or the conditions of the injured.

Flight encounters turbulence; 10 hurt

PHILADELPHIA — American Airlines said 10 people on a flight to Philadelphia were injured during severe turbulence.

The airline said Flight 759 was heading from Athens with 287 passengers and a dozen crew members Saturday when it briefly encountered severe turbulence before landing. American said the "fasten seat belt" sign was on.

U.S. 'disturbed' by Rwanda's landslide vote

KIGALI, Rwanda — The United States said Saturday it was "disturbed by irregularities observed during voting" in Rwanda's election, which longtime President Paul Kagame won with nearly 99 percent of the vote.

A State Department statement reiterated "long-standing concerns over the integrity of the vote-tabulation process."

Kagame easily won a third term in office in what he had called "a formality." Electoral authorities said Kagame won 98.63 percent of the vote. Neither of his two challengers won a full percentage point.

Putin shows spoils from fishing trip

MOSCOW — Russian President Vladimir Putin went spearfishing in southern Siberia's mountains, the latest outdoors exploit for the action man and adventure-loving Russian leader.

Footage released Saturday by Russian state television stations showed Putin steering an inflatable boat and fishing bare-chested with a rod.

"It's a good catch," a beaming Putin said, displaying his spoils.

Venezuela assembly removes prosecutor

CARACAS, Venezuela — A newly installed constitutional assembly ousted Venezuela's defiant chief prosecutor Saturday, a sign that President Nicolas Maduro's embattled government intends to move swiftly against critics and consolidate power amid a fast-moving political crisis.

A total of 638 children were beneficiaries of last year's event, Cheryl Callen, Christian Help's executive director, said.

WVCSTI receives \$20M to improve health

The West Virginia Clinical and Translational Science Institute (WVCSTI) competed for renewal funding from the National Institutes of Health with a five-year \$20 million grant to improve health outcomes in West Virginia.

This grant provides five more years of funding, extending WVCTSI's 2012 Institutional Development Award for Clinical and Translational Research through 2022.

"This funding will enable WVCTSI to reach a new level of statewide programming, supporting West Virginia investigators in academic medical centers and community clinics to find real solutions that will lead to better health for West Virginians," Dr. Sally Hodder, WVCTSI director and principal investigator, said.

"WVU's mission to serve the state can't be met without strong links between our scientists, clinicians and the communities we serve. The biggest contributions that Dr. Hodder and all the partners in the Clinical and Translational Science Institute have made to our health are the thousands of connections they've created among researchers, doctors,

nurses and health professionals in dozens of communities across West Virginia," Dr. Clay Marsh, vice president and executive dean for health sciences at WVU, said. "Together, they are changing how research is done and changing the lives of people for the better."

WVCTSI will continue to offer funding and services to accelerate the creation and translation of new knowledge to affect health issues in rural communities. Additionally, WVCTSI has planned new programs and support, particularly for early career researchers starting their careers in West Virginia. WVCTSI resources will be focused on five priority health areas including addiction and resulting emerging epidemics (such as hepatitis C), cancer, cardiovascular disease, chronic lung disease, and neurologic diseases.

Over the last five years, WVCTSI has partnered with academic and clinical institutions from across the state, including WVU Medicine, the

Charleston Area Medical Center, WVU (including regional campuses in Charleston and Martinsburg), and the West Virginia School of Osteopathic Medicine. WVCTSI is strengthened and enhanced by the addition of three new partners in the next funding cycle, including Marshall University, the National Institute for Occupational Safety and Health and the Department of Veterans Affairs.

Together, these organizations committed an additional \$35.5 million to WVCTSI, for a total funding commitment of \$55.5 million over the next five years.

Over the last five years of funding, WVCTSI created the state's first Practice-Based Research Network, a group of 74 mostly rural primary care clinics that conducted 77 projects related to improving health in West Virginia. Many of these community projects have impacted the way rural health care providers treat patients.

Long said the timing of the program's creation couldn't have been better, as WVU joined the Big 12 the first year Goodwill City started.

"The joining of the Big 12 was an opportunity to revamp our image," Long said.

Easily identifiable by their gray shirts and hats with the program's logo and wearing armbands the color of the visiting school, the group has made incredible strides in changing attitudes both at home and in how WVU is perceived, Long said.

"We were booed the first year," Long said.

One of the biggest signs that things have changed, according to Long, is she hasn't heard anyone say they are afraid to bring their kids to Morgantown in a few years.

"I think that means the mission is really getting through to people," Long said.

Bishop said the group's message is infectious. Ambassadors are often joined by WVU fans in welcoming the visitors to the area. Some even get invited to join in tailgating.

The best part of being an ambassador, according to Long, is the opportunities to meet so many new people.

Oil company prepares to pause work in Alaska

ANCHOR POINT, Alaska — An oil company that the state owes about \$75 million in refundable tax credits to is preparing to pause drilling off the shore of Alaska.

Benjamin Johnson, the CEO of Texas-based BlueCrest Energy Inc., said the company is drilling a lengthy production well that should be ready to flow oil in September.

But after that, the company might need to suspend drilling operations until alternative financing is secured, the Alaska Journal of Commerce reported.

BlueCrest Energy is the sole owner and operator of the Cosmopolitan oil project on the edge of the Cook Inlet. If it is forced to pause drilling, about 300 employees could be affected.

"We were hoping we

could squeak by and make it without any additional tax credits; we're working to try and avert that (drilling stoppage)," Johnson said. "Hopefully in the best case we're pausing briefly, only for a month or two, on the drilling. It might be longer; we just don't know."

The state has paid BlueCrest \$27 million in tax credits since the company purchased the project in 2012. But the company now holds about \$75 million in refundable credit certificates and expects to earn another \$15 million for eligible drilling and development work, Johnson said.

Gov. Bill Walker was criticized by energy industry representatives and many Republicans in the Legislature for vetoing \$630 million of tax credit payments in 2015 and 2016.

Billions lost in abandoned S.C. nuclear power projects

COLUMBIA, S.C. — A decade ago, utilities were persuading politicians around the country to let them spend big to go nuclear.

Expanding nuclear energy capacity was a sure bet, they said: Natural gas prices were rising, energy needs skyrocketing, and the federal government was poised to cripple carbon-emitting fossil fuel plants. With a dozen or more nuclear power projects being developed around the nation, cost savings could be found through simultaneous construction.

State legislators were sold. In South Carolina, they even passed a law allowing utilities to charge customers up front and to recoup their investments even if the projects never produced a kilowatt. Several other Southern states also passed "pay-as-you-go" laws.

This week, having spent more than \$10 billion, executives with

South Carolina Electric & Gas and Santee Cooper acknowledged that all their assumptions were wrong.

Worse still: Consumers may have to pay billions more on the rusting remains of two partially-built reactors at the V.C. Summer Nuclear Station north of Columbia.

"When we started, there was talk of a nuclear renaissance restarting a whole industry in the U.S.," said Santee Cooper's chief financial officer, Jeff Armfield. He was among several executives recommending the project be abandoned. The board of the state-owned utility unanimously agreed at a public meeting Monday.

Most of the 18 nuclear projects pending before the Nuclear Regulatory Commission a decade ago have been aborted or suspended indefinitely. None of the 7 projects the NRC licensed are operational. Only one is still being built, in Georgia, at a cost of \$100 million a month.

Swift, ex-radio host head to court over groping claim

DENVER — Taylor Swift and her support team didn't call police after she said she was groped by a Denver radio host during a photo session before a concert.

Instead, they called his boss, and David Mueller lost his job. The disc jockey later sued the singer-songwriter, saying he was falsely accused and wanted \$3 million in damages.

Swift countersued, claiming sexual assault, setting up a civil trial set to begin Monday in federal court in Denver that will largely turn on who the eight-member jury believes.

Swift is scheduled to testify. Both sides say no

The lawsuits provide differing accounts of backstage events before Swift performed at a 2013 concert at

the Pepsi Center in Denver.

Swift tried to keep the situation "discreet and quiet and confidential" and was upset by Mueller's

claim that "for some reason she might have some incentive to actually fabricate this story," her attorney argued in court.

Fox News host suspended amid photo investigation

LOS ANGELES — Fox News said Saturday that it has suspended Eric Bolling, co-host of its late-afternoon news program "The Specialists," while it investigates allegations he sent a lewd photo to co-workers.

Word of the suspension came one day after a HuffPost report relying on anonymous sources stated Bolling sent a lewd photo to at least three female colleagues at Fox News and Fox Business.

"Eric Bolling has been suspended pending the results of an investigation, which is currently underway," Fox News said in a brief statement.

An attorney for Bolling, Michael J. Bowe, denied the allegations.

"The anonymous, un-

corroborated claims are untrue and terribly unfair," Bowe wrote in an email Saturday. "We intend to fully cooperate with the investigation so that it can be concluded and Eric can return to work as quickly as possible."

Bolling is the best-known personality on "The Fox News Specialists," a program that airs weekdays at 5 p.m. The show replaced the network's series "The Five" in April. He also hosts the weekend show "Cashin' In."

He joined Fox News in 2008 after working as a commodities trader, according to his bio on the network's website.

Bolling wrote a March op-ed accusing establishment Republicans of betraying the president.

Ex-'Prairie Home' host stays busy as he nears 75

ST. PAUL, Minn. — Garrison Keillor is not spending his time in retirement baking biscuits or drinking coffee down at the Chatterbox Cafe now that he's hung up his microphone as host of his popular public radio show, "A Prairie Home Companion."

He turns 75 on Wednesday and boards a bus the next day for a 28-city "Prairie Home Love & Comedy Tour — 2017," which he vows will be his last.

"I don't think you should go out onstage after the age of 76," Keillor told The Associated Press during a recent interview at his St. Paul office. "You don't want to fall down out there and then all of these people, you know, there's a sudden intake of breath. And men in white jackets come in from the wings and put an oxygen mask on you."

"You don't want that to happen. It's too much entertainment for the dollar," he adds. "An entertainer is supposed to go away and have a quiet dotage, and you know, lose your marbles in private and not do this out where people can see you."

Keillor started his Sat-

urday-evening radio variety show featuring tales of his fictional Minnesota hometown of Lake Wobegon — "where all the women are strong, all the men are good-looking, and all the children are above average" — in 1974. He went out with a final show at the Hollywood Bowl in July 2016 and turned the show over to mandolinist extraordinaire Chris Thile, who starts his second season as "Prairie Home" host on Oct. 7.

Keillor admits he misses being on the air and says he hasn't listened to "Prairie Home" since Thile took over.

"I keep my distance because I was given tremendous freedom when I did the show and it took a while for me to even get a grasp of what was involved. Made a lot of mistakes in the course of all those years. So the new people really should be given the same freedom and allowed to make their own mistakes," he said.

Wearing his signature red tennis shoes without socks and his gray hair freshly cut as he prepares to hit the road, Keillor talks about his projects, which include finishing a screenplay about Lake Wobegon.

Chappelle on 30 years in showbiz, comedy

NEW YORK — As Dave Chappelle reflects on spending 30 years in comedy, he said he's grateful and humble to still be living his dreams onstage.

"In all honesty, I mostly feel grateful that I survived it, and that I'm able to still do it, and that I have the respect of my peers," the 43-year-old said in an interview Friday night following a show at Radio City Music Hall, where he was joined by The Roots, Dead Prez and T.I.

Chappelle's residency at the venue in New York kicked off last week, and included guest performers such as Lil Wayne, Usher, Ice Cube and others. Week-

end shows featured Chris Rock, while Trevor Noah, John Mayer, Lauryn Hill, Leslie Jones, Chance the Rapper, Solange, Childish Gambino, Erykah Badu.

"Not to tip my hand, but the next couple nights are probably one of the most expensive comedy shows ever done, and everybody's working under the fee, everybody's works under their fee just so we can be together in this room," Chappelle said. "It means a lot of to me."

Chappelle — who received some criticism about his jokes about transgender men and women during the new shows and on his Netflix special — talks about his

residency, sensitive jokes and more.

"What's funny about it is my son, my youngest son, is as old now as I was when I started (at 14), and looking at him makes me understand how crazy that was to start at that age, even though at the time it felt very natural. ...

People generally like me — they're always going to be people that don't like me — but it doesn't matter, enough people like me that I can make a living this way. After I left my television show ... I can't explain to people what the emotional content of those decisions were like."

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McConnell to consider bipartisan plan for health insurer payments

FANCY FARM, Ky. — A week after an attempt to repeal the Affordable Care Act failed, Senate Majority Leader Mitch McConnell said he'd consider a bipartisan effort to continue payments to insurers to avert a costly rattling of health insurance markets.

McConnell told reporters Saturday there is "still a chance" the Senate could revive the measure to repeal and replace "Obamacare," but he acknowledged the window for that is rapidly closing.

The Kentucky senator noted Republican Sen. Lamar Alexander, of Tennessee, is working on "some kind of bipartisan approach" that would involve subsidies for insurance companies.

Alexander recently said he will work with the com-

mittee's top Democrat, Sen. Patty Murray of Washington state, on a bill next month that would pay insurers through 2018. In exchange, Alexander wants Democrats to agree to make it easier for states to choose their own health coverage standards that insurers must provide, rather than abiding by former President Barack Obama's law.

"If the Democrats are willing to support some real reforms rather than just an insurance company bailout, I would be willing to take a

look at it," McConnell said, hours before he was expected to speak at the famously raucous Fancy Farm picnic, in western Kentucky.

Saturday marked McConnell's first appearance in Kentucky since the failed health care vote, and he sought to reassure disappointed conservative voters who, since 2008, have elected a wave of Republican lawmakers at the state and federal level based on the promise of getting rid of "Obamacare." Their efforts

came up one vote short on July 28 in the Senate, where McConnell controls the agenda.

McConnell spoke Saturday afternoon at Fancy Farm, a political tradition where lawmakers from both parties give speeches before hundreds of hecklers. McConnell did not mention health care during his roughly five-minute speech, instead focusing on his successful effort to block Obama from filling a vacancy on the Supreme Court in the final year of his term.

A few hours before his speech, McConnell told a gathering of Republicans that he chooses "not to dwell on situations where we come up a little bit short." He said he consoles himself by remembering that "Hillary Clinton could be president."

"Almost instantly, I feel better," he said.

Trump takes a break from White House with his 'working vacation'

BRIDGEWATER, N.J. — President Donald Trump is taking a break from the capital after a rocky first six months in office, but he insists he is not on vacation.

Burdened with West Wing conflict, a stalled legislative agenda and a pile of investigations, Trump departed Washington on Friday afternoon for a 17-day trip to his private golf club in central New Jersey. He was accompanied by his daughter Ivanka Trump and son-in-law Jared Kushner, both senior advisers, as well as the aide charged with resetting his chaotic administration — new chief of staff John Kelly.

Trump said it was not a holiday on Saturday evening, tweeting: "Working in Bedminster, N.J., as long planned construction is being done at the White House. This is not a vacation — meetings and calls!"

A White House official said Trump's plans for Bedminster included meetings with aides and lawmakers. He was briefed by Kelly about the three U.S. Marines who were missing after their Osprey aircraft crashed into the sea off the east coast of Australia on Saturday while trying to land.

The White House did not answer questions about whether Trump was golfing, but he did chat with some wedding guests at the club, according to a video posted by WPVI-TV, in Philadelphia.

Trump sent out a flurry of tweets in the early evening, defending his travel plans and hailing a vote by the U.N. Security Council to impose new sanctions on North Korea. He also praised Attorney General Jeff Sessions for pledging to clamp down on government leaking, after previously complaining he was weak on the matter.

There is some renovation work underway at the White House while Trump is out of town. Everyone working in the West Wing, including Trump, had to clear out so the government could replace a 27-year-old heating and cooling system.

So far, Trump has spent 13 of 28 weekends in office away from the White House, mostly at his properties in Palm Beach, Fla., or in Bedminster, N.J., according to an Associated Press count. The figures include a weekend during official travel overseas and Father's Day weekend at Camp David, the government-owned presidential retreat in Maryland.

Kelly's first week on the job was marked by his efforts to crack down on a disorderly system. He quickly made his presence known on Monday, ousting newly appointed communications director Anthony Scaramucci and revising the command structure so that all senior staffers report to him.

Still, it is not clear Trump will change his Twitter ways. On Tuesday, he tweeted that "only the Fake News Media and Trump enemies want me to stop using Social Media."

Before he took office, Trump was a frequent critic of former President Barack Obama's vacation and golf habits.

"@BarackObama played golf yesterday. Now he heads to a 10 day vacation in Martha's Vineyard. Nice work ethic," Trump tweeted in August 2011.

So far, Trump has spent 13 of 28 weekends in office away from the White House, mostly at his properties in Palm Beach, Fla., or in Bedminster, N.J., according to an Associated Press count. The figures include a weekend during official travel overseas and Father's Day weekend at Camp David, the government-owned presidential retreat in Maryland.

Trump also frequently plays golf at his properties, though the White House typically will not acknowledge that he plays.

Congressmen oppose refuge as border site

MCALLEN, Texas — A group of Democratic congressmen want more details about preliminary plans to build a section of President Donald Trump's proposed border wall through a federal wildlife refuge, saying such a move could do serious damage to the environment.

Federal officials told landowners and officials that they intend to build on about 3 miles of the river levee that runs through the Santa Ana National Wildlife Refuge.

The Trump administration proposed 60 miles of wall construction in the Rio Grande Valley, the region of farmland and border cities at the southernmost point of Texas. The U.S. House has passed a budget proposal with \$1.6 billion in funding to start construction in South Texas as well as 14 miles in San Diego.

Advocates are concerned that the Santa Ana refuge, a key sanctuary for birds and endangered wildcats, could be cut off at its northern edge by the construction of a wall, reducing visitor traffic and displacing wildlife.

Man fights for another appeal

James DeGasperin Jr. cites a flawed indictment, pre-trial publicity as issues

KINGWOOD — James DeGasperin Jr. is pursuing another appeal of his 2008 convictions for killing his pregnant girlfriend and her 4-year-old son.

This year, the West Virginia Supreme Court upheld Preston Circuit Judge Lawrance Miller Jr.'s refusal to throw out the convictions. Now DeGasperin is ar-

whether DeGasperin was the unborn baby's father.

He was also convicted of two counts of concealing human bodies.

Miller sentenced him to 92-100 years in prison. He is scheduled for a parole hearing April 16, 2039, according to the State Division of Corrections.

At a hearing last week in Preston Circuit Court, DeGasperin's latest attorney, Jeremy Cooper, asked for and was granted 30 days to prepare an amended petition for the court to consider.

Among the reasons De-

Gasperin argued the Supreme Court should grant his motion were claims that the statute under which one of his convictions was obtained was unconstitutional, the indictment was flawed, there was prejudicial pretrial publicity, he shouldn't have been given consecutive sentences for the same "transaction," the prosecutor suppressed evidence, the state knew of perjured testimony, his attorney was ineffective, he was held without bail, there wasn't enough evidence for a conviction and the sentence was too harsh.

In the latest proceeding,

DeGasperin accused Hoosier "of "incompetence and dereliction" and said he provided "poor representation."

Hoosier did not return a request for comment in time for this report.

Cooper was appointed by the court to represent DeGasperin, who said his only income is 61 cents per hour he is paid for working in the Mount Olive Soap Shop and what his relatives give him.

About 4,300 students are expected to ride buses in Preston this year. Harris said that's an increase, even though enrollment has not gone up. He thinks it's because parents see the value of children riding the bus versus private transportation, and studies show

buses are safe.

There will be some changes in this year's bus schedules.

"Really look at the schedule," Harris urged parents. "Make sure [you] see the times."

Valley District schedules changed because West Preston

is no longer in Masontown. West Preston Principal Leah Moss is also working with Harris to color code buses and to make it easier for younger students to recognize their bus.

Leah Moss brings new ideas to principal role

ARTHURDALE — With 800-plus students and about 100 staff members, West Preston School is larger than some Preston County municipalities.

Leah Moss is the new principal at West Preston. While she's new to Preston County, she's not new to education and brings some ideas with her.

Moss was born in Turkey, "an Air Force brat." Her father was originally from outside Charleston, but the family went back and forth between Indiana and Florida.

Ex-workers in secretary of state's office sue

CHARLESTON — Ten former employees of the West Virginia secretary of state's office filed wrongful termination lawsuits stemming from their dismissals by new Secretary of State Mac Warner.

A state media outlet reported the suits claim the employees were part of a

mass firing orchestrated by Warner so he could replace longtime office staffers with handpicked new hires. The workers were part of a 16-employee purge when Warner took office in January.

Warner initially contended the firings were part of a downsizing of the office staff to reduce costs,

but he ultimately hired 22 new employees.

Warner spokesman Steven Adams said the office doesn't comment on pending litigation.

The suits were filed recently in Kanawha Circuit Court. The suits name the West Virginia Secretary of State as the only defendant.

Officer indicted on charges related to crash

CHARLESTON — A police officer was indicted on three misdemeanor charges stemming from a deadly crash this year.

Charleston police Officer Stephen Doss was indicted by a Kanawha County grand jury on charges of negligent homicide, speeding and an emergency vehicle violation, according to media reports. The negligent homicide charge carries a maximum of one year in prison.

Doss is accused of crashing into a woman's

car on Jan. 4.

The indictment returned Thursday says the woman, Dora Clarke, died as a result of Doss' "reckless disregard for the safety of others." Clarke died five days after the crash.

Police refused to release her identity, but she was identified in the indictment against Doss. She was 80 years old, according to her obituary.

The indictment says Doss was driving 74 mph while responding to reports of a man armed with a knife at a housing complex. The speed limit

where the crash occurred is 30 mph.

Charleston Police Chief Brent Webster said it appears Doss was speeding without using his emergency lights or siren, which goes against department policy and state law, a state media outlet reported.

The department said the officer was driving in the left lane of a one-way, two-lane road.

Doss is scheduled to be arraigned Sept. 7 by Kanawha Circuit Judge Carrie Webster.

for the West Preston job after Principal Mark Graham retired.

"She was most impressive in her interview," Preston School Superintendent Steve Wotring said. "Ms. Moss has been able to clearly articulate a direction for West Preston School. She will be a motivator in her school improvement efforts while

maintaining an unwavering path to success. We are very lucky to get her in our system."

Moss is introducing the Eureka Math program. It is rigorous program that matches state standards.

Attendance will be focused on in the Never Be Absent (NBA) All-Stars. Mentors in school and the community will focus on children, encouraging them to attend classes and re-enforcing the good that

can bring.

Moss and her team are also tweaking the Positive Behaviors Intervention and Support program to re-enforce good behavior.

Colored paper will be placed in the service window of the buses serving West, and students will receive colored arm bands or stickers that match the color of their bus.

Schedules are based on those children who were enrolled at the end of the last school year, so some pre-K students' stops may not be listed.

Preston has about 15 substitute drivers and 10 backup buses, so Harris

feels well prepared. The 67 buses on the road will include three new ones: Two 77-passenger buses and one 65-passenger.

Most of the buses are diesel. Gasoline engines are starting to make a comeback in other states' bus systems, but the legislature would have to act to allow West Virginia to switch, he said.

"I've held off on propane," Harris said. "I worry about it here in our county because we don't have the infrastructure, and I'm concerned about

the fuel mileage."

His fear is that mileage gained from the fuel will be lost driving long distances to a filling station. Propane buses also don't have engine brakes, "and that's a safety feature I don't want to lose," Harris said.

Almost all the buses in Preston have automatic transmissions as well, noted mechanic Dana Sanders. All the new buses have automatic transmissions.

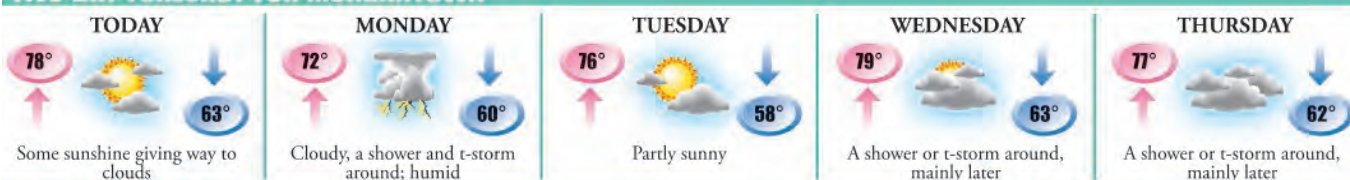

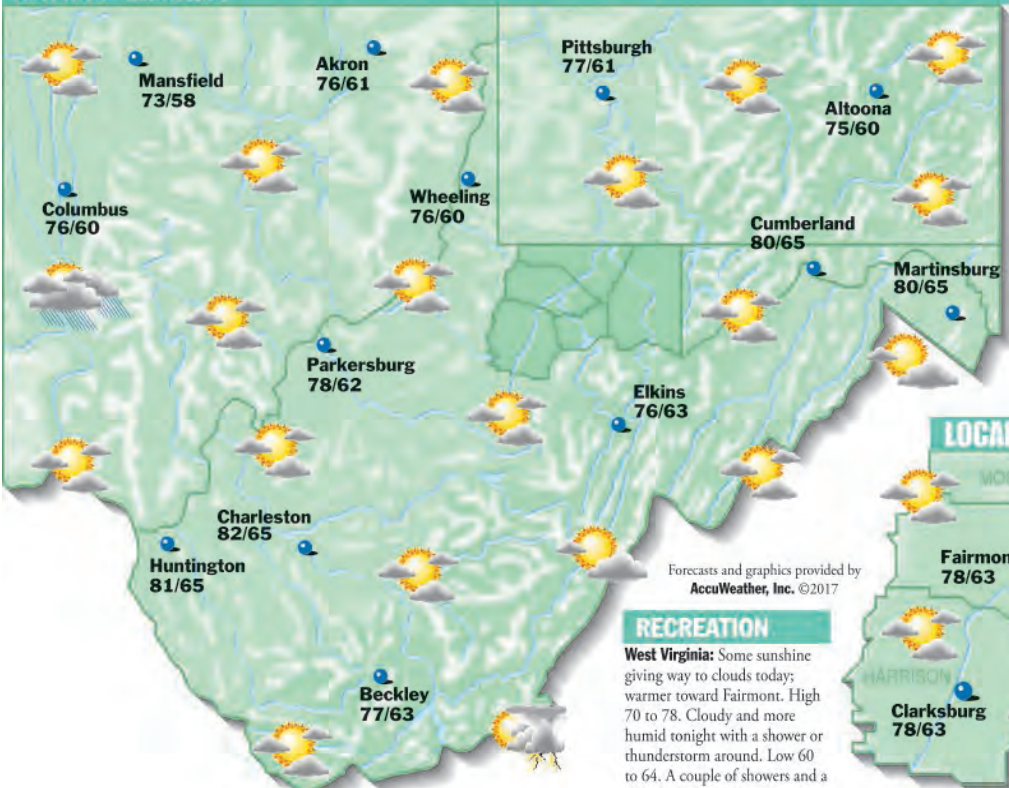

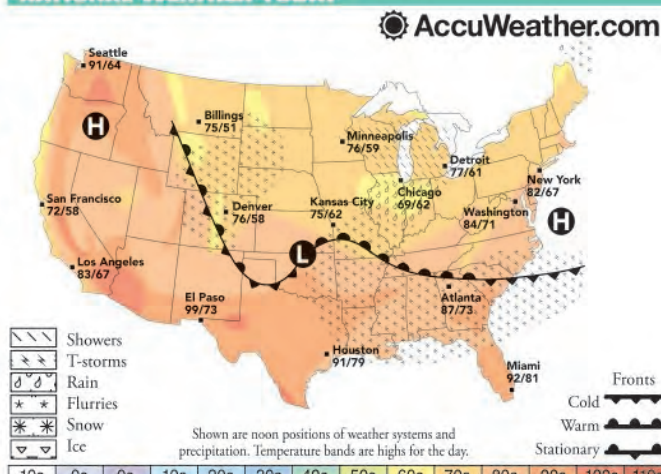

Deadly heat may affect parts of Asia

NEW DELHI — Venturing outdoors may become deadly across wide swaths of India, Pakistan and Bangladesh by the end of the century as climate change drives heat and humidity to new extremes, according to a new study.

These conditions could affect up to a third of the people living throughout the Indo-Gangetic Plain unless the global community ramps up efforts to rein in climate-warming carbon emissions. Today, that region is home to some 1.5 billion people.

"The most intense hazard from extreme future heat waves is concentrated around the densely populated agricultural regions of the Ganges and Indus river basins," wrote the authors of the study, led by former MIT research scientist Eun-Soon Im, now an assistant professor at the Hong Kong University of Science and Technology.

While most climate studies are based on temperature projections, this one — published Wednesday in the journal Science Advances — is somewhat unique in also considering humidity as well as the body's ability to cool down in response.

Those three factors together make up what is called a "wet-bulb temperature," which is the air temperature taken when a wet cloth is wrapped around the thermometer. It is always lower than the dry-bulb temperature — how much so depends on the humidity. It can help estimate how easy it is for water to evaporate.

It can also offer a gauge for where climate change might become dangerous.

Scientists said humans can survive up to a wet-bulb temperature of about 95 degrees Fahrenheit, beyond which the human body has difficulty sweating to cool down, or sweat doesn't evaporate, leading to heat stroke and ultimately death within just a few hours — even in shaded, ventilated conditions.

So far, wet bulb temperatures have rarely exceeded 88-90 degrees F, a level that is already considered extremely hazardous.

"It is hard to imagine conditions that are too hot for people to survive for a more than a few minutes, but that is exactly what is

being discussed in this paper," Stanford University climate scientist Chris Field, who was not involved in the study, said. "And of course, the danger threshold for punishing heat and humidity is lower for people who are ill or elderly."

Most of those at risk in India, Pakistan and Bangladesh are poor farmworkers or outdoor construction laborers. They are unlikely to have air conditioners — up to 25 percent in of India's population still has no access to electricity.

For the study, the researchers carried out computer simulations using global atmospheric circulation models under two scenarios: One in which the world comes close to meeting its goal of curbing emissions to limit Earth's average temperature rise to 3.6 degrees F above pre-industrial levels, and one if it continues emitting at current levels.

Both scenarios play out dangerously for South Asia. But with no limit on global warming, about 30 percent of the region could see dangerous wet bulb temperatures above 88 degrees F on a regular basis within just a few decades.

Football might be headed to sidelines of history this time

LONG BEFORE YOU and I were old enough to start reading the sports pages, there were good reasons not to play football.

And if you want to go all the way back to when the pro game was still fledgling and didn't appear to have a future, well, time has always found a way to outweigh the reasons not to play.

That is, perhaps, until 2017. That is not the year we are calling for last rites on the game by any stretch, but it may be a starting point.

In all the years that have gone by, the game beat out all of the other reasons not to play, financial or otherwise.

The game is a financial monster today, but before that, football eventually became a destination career in the sense that pro players no longer had to sell insurance in the offseason to make ends meet.

Through the years, just think of all the reasons not to play.

Remember how kids spent too much time playing video games?

Remember how the growth of soccer was going to kill football?

Kids wanted to use summer for vacations and not to train for football. Athletes began to "specialize" in one sport and were going to stop playing football.

All of it was supposed to hurt the game, yet time (or maybe a change in the sign of the times) took care of it.

Time made us all conscious of our health, and so training for football became an "in" thing again.

Many of the athletes who decided to "specialize" did just that — with football.

And somewhere along the way, soccer and football seemed to find their comfort zones and formed a truce at the youth levels.

But honestly, I cannot begin to form any sort of logical realization for how football will survive the concussion or CTE era.

Roster numbers are down across the board for high school football teams in Monongalia County. In some cases — compared to just 20 years ago — the numbers are considerably down.

Can all of that be traced back to the recent study that found 90 percent of the brains that had been donated and had played football at either the high school, college or professional level had formed CTE?

Absolutely not, but it's another reason not to play the game.

To be sure, there are questions to be asked about that study. For instance, what are the percentages of soccer players with CTE? What are the percentages of Average Joes who simply bump their heads a lot with CTE?

"We can't force kids to come out and play," said Clay-Battelle head coach **Ryan Wilson**, who reported his numbers at 32 this season. The team approached 50 in recent seasons. "There are a lot of things out there right now that probably keep some away. The concussion thing I'm sure plays a part."

If the numbers keep dwindling at the high school level, that eventually trickles up to college and the NFL.

Will the game die? Probably not, but a higher percentage of the better athletes may start hitting fastballs or dribbling basketballs.

And time may not be on football's side this time.

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Eating them is one way to get groundhogs out of your garden

I WAS TALKING WITH an older gentleman and the topic of groundhogs came up. I asked him if he'd ever eaten one and he replied that his family ate lots of them when he was a kid.

He told me his family with 10 kids grew up poor not long after the Depression, and they often had to kill what they ate. He said he remembered digging for hours to get a "whistle-pig" out of its hole so they could have it for dinner.

If you decide that you want to try eating groundhog and have killed one (young ones are the best), it's time to prepare it for cooking.

If you've ever cleaned squirrels or rabbits, this is just a bit more complicated, but the end result is worth it. Like any other animal, you must first remove the entrails and drain the blood the best you can. Rinse out the entire body cavity. Then hang it in a cool place for two days before you skin it.

After skinning, prepare some saltwater and soak it for a day. There are some scent glands behind the front legs and at the back. Be sure to remove them. If it's an older groundhog, remove the fat covering the body. Then all you have to do is decide how you

want to cook it.

Some of the best I've ever had was grilled with barbeque sauce after it was parboiled for about a half hour. Another good grilling method is to chunk up the meat after parboiling and make kebabs with onions, peppers and tomatoes.

You can cook groundhog just like you would any other meat. You can fry it just like you would chicken, make stew just like beef stew, and bake it. My parents used to travel all over the world and ate many types of meat, including monkey and dog. They told me that in most cases unless they were told what it was, it tasted just fine and they would never have guessed what it was. It had to have been the seasoning because I can certainly tell the difference between squirrel and rabbit.

Gardeners are keenly aware of how much damage groundhogs can do to a garden. They have been known to decimate an entire garden by taking only a single

bite out of every zucchini and pepper plant. They will do the same to pumpkins, tomatoes and almost any other vegetable you might grow. I've even seen them up in apple trees, getting after the apples.

There are several things you can do to deter groundhogs from invading your garden aside from killing them, which is the best deterrent of all. One is to bury chicken wire at least 1 foot in the ground and be sure it's at least 3 1/2 feet above the ground. This is a lot of work and doesn't look very good, but works well.

Groundhogs don't like strange and noisy things. Try hanging some pie plates or wind chimes around your garden.

There are several repellents on the market that

will keep them at bay, but most need to be replaced after a rain. Epsom salts also do a good job and are good for the plants. You can also soak rags in ammonia and put them around. This lasts longer than repellents, but must be refreshed regularly.

A good one I used is a "smoke bomb" that you put down the main entrance of the burrow. You can buy these at most farm supply stores. You must find all of the groundhog's escape holes in addition to the main entrance and cover them with cardboard to keep the smoke in. Light the bomb (they don't explode, but put off poisonous smoke), put it in the hole and cover it with cardboard. That should take care of your groundhog problem.

Here's an amazing fact about these creatures: The average den requires that the groundhog excavate about 700 pounds of dirt, and it may have four or five dens in your area.

If you live out of town and have several groundhogs, you can be sure that you don't have a coyote problem. Coyotes love to eat groundhogs.

Logano's mind set as NASCAR playoffs loom: Just win, baby!

WATKINS GLEN, N.Y. — Joey Logano isn't quite ready to push the panic button as NASCAR's playoff season looms. At least he knows what will ease his mind — winning one of the next five races.

"I'm not sure it's even a must-win yet, but it's getting closer to that point," Logano said Saturday, before Cup practice on the road course at Watkins Glen. "This is one of our best shots, but we also have some great race-tracks coming up. We've won at four of the next five. We know we can do it."

Logano has a victory already, but NASCAR ruled that his win at Richmond, in April, was "encumbered," so it won't count toward a playoff berth.

Logano has become a fixture in the playoffs and made the final round two times in the three years the current format has been in place. The only time he failed was when he was intentionally wrecked by Matt Kenseth at Martinsville, in 2015. That year, he led the series with six wins and appeared to be the driver to beat.

But this summer hasn't

been kind to him. In the last 10 races, Logano has six finishes outside the top 20, and last week, at Pocono, the No. 22 Penske Ford team self-destructed with pit road problems. He had to make three stops late and finished 27th, leaving him 69 points behind Kenseth in the race for the final berth in the playoffs.

Both Logano and Clint Bowyer, who enters today's race just 17 points behind Kenseth, have road-course wins on their Cup resumes — Logano at Watkins Glen, two years ago, and Bowyer at Sonoma, in 2012. Bowyer finished second at Sonoma in June, behind Stewart-Haas Racing teammate Kevin Harvick, and at Watkins Glen International he's earned one top-five and four top-10s. Kenseth has never won on a road course.

Logano has emerged as a real threat at this track. He's won two straight races in the Xfinity series and finished second last year in the Cup race to Denny Hamlin.

Strategy always comes into play on both road courses the Cup series visits. The repaving of the track before last season's race made passing tougher.

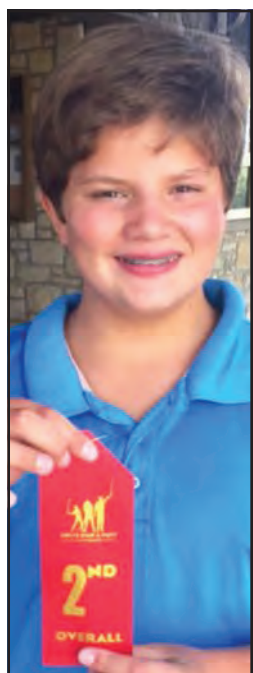

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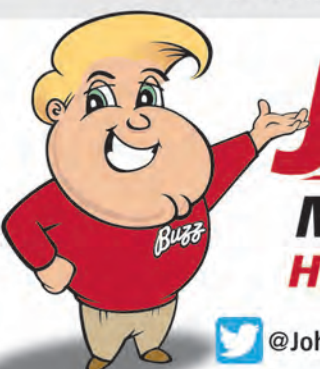

footsteps at Lackawanna when Kevin became a household name with the Mountaineers. On Saturdays, instead of watching big brother, Ka'Raun and Kyzir were helping the Falcons win games.

"I didn't even get to catch half the games because we had football back at our JUCO, but I would watch the re-runs and I kept thinking to myself, 'Man, he's playing at another level right now,'" Ka'Raun said.

It wasn't an easy journey for the eldest White to get to the NFL, but his ability to persevere through conflicts was not lost on Kevin's little brothers.

"I've been watching him grow up since he was a little kid and was always talking about the NFL," Kyzir said. "Seeing him struggle through JUCO and struggle to make his dreams come true of being a Division I football player, only to eventually become a first-round, top-10 draft pick, was great."

Before Kevin decided to come to WVU, all three brothers knew about the type of program the Mountaineers had. The year before, in 2012, Geno Smith, Tavon Austin and Stedman Bailey were a trio that opposing defenses dreaded to go up against. It was no secret that head coach Dana Holgorsen knew how to coach offense and produce talented receivers.

That ideology was exactly what Ka'Raun was looking for, being a wide receiver like Kevin. But Kyzir was cut from a different cloth and became known as a hard-hitting and top safety while at junior college.

Now, both are entering their senior seasons with the Mountaineers and shed the stigma of being the little brothers of Kevin White to become stars in their own right.

Ka'Raun, 24, got off to a late start in his college career. He spent two years at Lackawanna, including overlapping with Kyzir in 2014. Ka'Raun decided to transfer to WVU and has played a significant role each of the last two seasons

for the Mountaineers — catching 63 passes for 858 yards and five TDs.

Kyzir, 21, also spent two years at JUCO and wanted a chance to play in WVU defensive coordinator Tony Gibson's 3-3-5 defense. In his first season in Morgantown, last year, Kyzir had three sacks and seven tackles for loss. He found himself on several preseason awards watch lists as one of the top safeties and defenders in the country.

While they play opposite positions on the field, that doesn't mean Ka'Raun and Kyzir haven't been able to help one another.

"We help each other out with coverages — I help him with our coverages, even though he pretty much knows the entire offense already," Ka'Raun

said. "We do the little things to help each other understand the other side to better our game."

Kyzir said that since one is on the sideline when the other is on the field, whenever one makes a big play, it can motivate the other to go out and do the same.

So just how did Kyzir become a defender when his brothers play offense? It started in 11th grade at Emmaus High School, in Macungie, Pa.

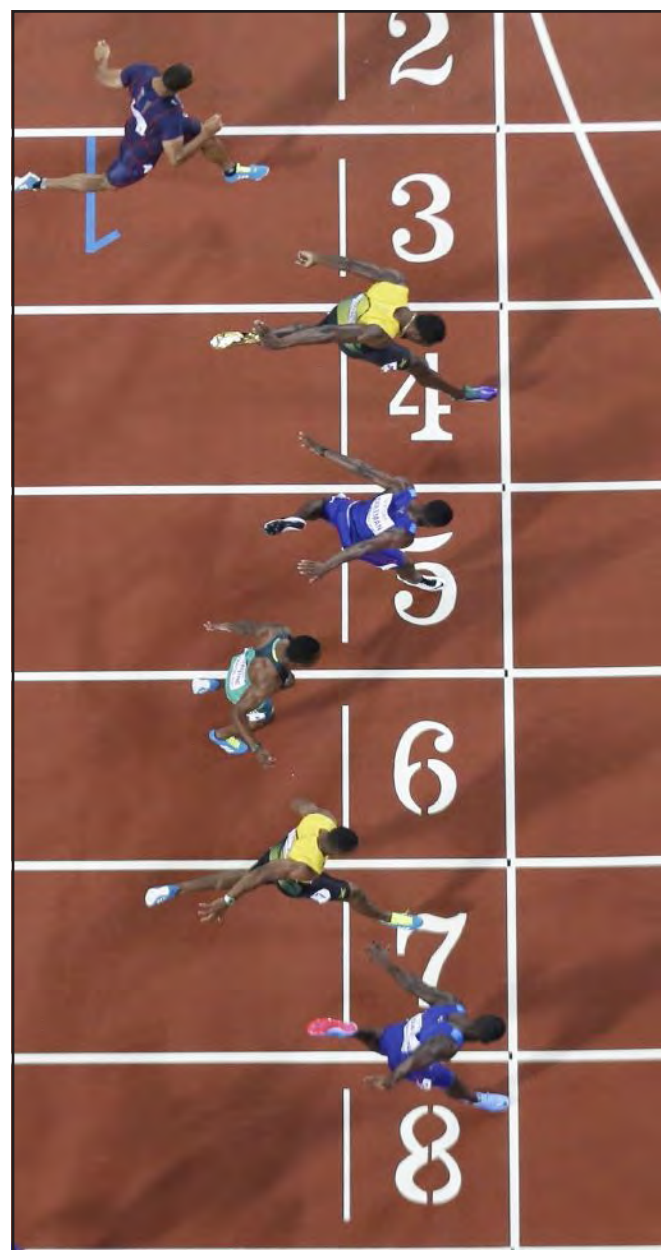
Despite playing both ways, Kyzir started to figure out that playing defense just felt like a more natural fit for his skill set.

"I just like to hit people," he said with a laugh.

The Whites have a little sister, Kiyae', who will be a freshman on the women's basketball team at Auburn this year.

With her decision to head south, the White family tree may be done at WVU after this season, and what a legacy it has been.

Bolt beaten in final 100m race

3rd at Worlds behind Gatlin and Coleman

LONDON — Usain Bolt was no longer stunning. He was just stunned.

At the end of a career in which he dominated his sport for a decade, Bolt was beaten in his final 100-meter race by an American almost five years his senior — Justin Gatlin.

Calling it quits at age 30 and looking for a golden farewell in his last individual race at the world championships, Bolt lost to a man who produced a comeback not only on Saturday but also through a doping-tainted career.

In a tight finish, Bolt was punished for his slow start and Gatlin fought back to nip everyone at the line in 9.92 seconds. Christian Coleman took silver, in 9.94 seconds, while Bolt got bronze, in 9.95.

"My start is killing me," Bolt said. "Normally it gets better during the rounds but it didn't come together."

Gatlin knows what Bolt has meant to the sport, graciously bowing in admiration in front of him — even after beating him.

The two men, never really friends, warmly embraced and spoke.

"It's just so surreal right now," Gatlin said. "Usain has accomplished so much in our sport and inspired others."

When his victory sank in, Gatlin let out an almighty roar and then put a finger in front of his mouth for silence as the

crowd continued to show him disrespect.

It was an amazing turnaround for Gatlin, who was the Olympic champion in 2004 before Bolt emerged and won an unprecedented three straight 100-meter titles at the Olympics.

Thirteen years later, Gatlin bounced back to win in the Jamaican's last individual race.

In between, Gatlin's career was stopped twice for doping suspensions. Yet fighting controversy all the way since, he got perhaps his greatest gold at 35.

"It was almost like 2004 all over again," Gatlin said. "I won by a little margin, and to be able to come across the line is amazing."

The 60,000-sellout crowd at the Olympic Stadium, ready for a party in a race they were convinced Bolt would win, had to acknowledge a champion they relentlessly booed over the opening two days of the meet.

It turned into awkward scenes with the champion being overlooked for the bronze medalist.

"It's not about the crowd," Gatlin said. "I tuned it out through the rounds and stayed the course."

Bolt didn't smile any less afterward. "It is just one of those things," he said, showing his carefree demeanor even in defeat. "It has been brilliant."

Bolt was again slow out of the blocks in the final and came back strong, but he ended up short. When he ran out of steam, Gatlin gathered more.

"He knows how hard I work," Gatlin said. "Tonight was all about the W (win) and I managed to sneak it."

AKRON, Ohio — Thomas Pieters ended a roller-coaster round with a 30-foot birdie putt for a 4-under 66 that gave him a share of the lead with Zach Johnson going into the final round of the Bridgestone Invitational.

Pieters built a big lead early with five birdies on his opening eight holes at Firestone, only to run into trouble off the tee. He made only three pars over his last 11 holes and wound up with his best chance yet to win in America.

Johnson, who hasn't won since capturing his second major at St. Andrews in 2015, holed a 10-foot birdie putt on the 18th for a 65. They were at 9-under 201.

Scott Hend, who got into his first Bridgestone Invitational on a loophole, shot a 63 and was one back.

ST. ANDREWS, Scotland — I.K. Kim answered the challenge with a 6-under 66 to build a six-shot lead as she goes after her first major championship.

Kim faced a battle before she even teed off Saturday, at Kingsbarns Links. Imbee Park tied a course record with a 64 to pull one shot behind. Stacy Lewis shot a 65 and was only two shots back.

Kim was equally impressive. The 29-year-old South Korean played bogey-free and was at 17-under 199.

She was six shots clear of Georgia Hall, of England, and Moriya Jutanugarn. Lexi Thompson shot 74 and was 10 shots behind.

Kim's best shot at a major was the Kraft Nabisco five years ago, when she missed a 1-foot putt, then lost in a playoff.

3M Championship

BLAINE, Minn. — Paul Goydos shot a tournament-record 60 and is tied with Kenny Perry and Gene Sauers after two rounds.

Goydos, who shot 59 at the PGA's 2010 John Deere Classic, was 7-under through 12 holes, before birdies at 15, 16 and 17 and an eagle on the par-5 18th. He needed one putt on 16 greens and two on the others at the TPC Twin Cities.

Perry, a co-leader with Mike Goodes after round one, shot his second straight 65. He won the tournament in 2014 and 2015.

Sauers shot an 8-under 64.

Scott Dunlap (63) and Brandt Jobe (64) were one shot behind, and Steve Stricker (63) and Marco Dawson (66) were two back.

Goodes shot 68 and was one of seven players trailing by three shots.

Members of Hall champion causes

CANTON, Ohio — For several members of the Pro Football Hall of Fame's class of 2017, it was a time to campaign while celebrating.

Terrell Davis wants more attention paid to the running game, and stronger hall consideration for running backs — something similar to this year, when both he and LaDainian Tomlinson were selected.

Morten Andersen, just the second full-time kicker to make the hall, spoke out Friday for the guys who put the foot in football.

Kenny Easley can't believe there are only eight pure safeties enshrined.

So while enthusiastically embracing their entry into the hall, which happened Saturday night along with Kurt Warner, Jerry Jones and Jason Taylor, Davis and Andersen and Easley represented.

"The running game is not just go to minicamp and then training camp in shorts and T-shirts and think you will be successful," Davis said when the unusual presence of two running backs in the same hall class was mentioned. "You need the pads on, need lots of hitting and repetitions. It's like an orchestra."

"I think now they are realizing in the NFL you've got to find other ways of getting the running game going."

Davis pushed for more Broncos in the hall. From the two Denver teams he helped win NFL titles, in 1997 and '98, only John Elway and Shannon Sharpe also are in.

"Steve Atwater, Jason Elam, Rod Smith, (owner) Pat Bowlen," he said, reeling off the names. "Those are ones I played with and I certainly think they will all be in."

Andersen joins Jan Stenerud as the enshrined kickers; Ray Guy is the only pure punter in the hall. Although Andersen is the NFL's scoring leader and kicked for 25 seasons, it took him eight years of eligibility before getting in.

Considering the role kickers play, especially in today's game, he believes that trend will change.

"With my election to the Hall of Fame and the level of skill today, it moves the conversation along," Andersen said. "I would argue

that, besides the quarterback position, kickers affect the outcome of games more than anyone.

"There are a lot of guys I feel should be looked at more seriously," he added, mentioning not only kickers such as Gary Anderson and the still-active Adam Vinatieri, but special teamer Steve Tasker and punter Sean Landetta. "It's a tight squeeze."

"It feels good to be on the other side, and now it's my obligation to enhance their chances. I hope it's not another 21 years where no one gets in."

Andersen doesn't expect a special-teams player to get in yearly, instead targeting "every three to five years." Easley, selected by the seniors committee, is in more of a rush to see safeties inducted.

"We set the tone on defense," the former hard-hitting Seahawks star said. "We're going to get a lot of these guys in the hall. Between John Lynch, Atwater, Brian Dawkins, Darren Woodson — any of those four are fine, or all of them."

"I prefer all of them," he added with a laugh, calling for a "megaflycatcher."

Beyond that quartet — Lynch has been a frequent finalist in the voting — Easley recognized another group that soon will be eligible.

"We've got a lot of guys coming behind them, you know, Ed Reed, Troy Polamalu," Easley said. "We got some guys who (annually) will be genuine contenders."

Davis' election was delayed by questions about such a short career: Davis played seven NFL seasons, the last two wrecked by injuries. But the other five were spectacular.

His comparison, he noted, is Gale Sayers, who also had a mercurial career but was a first-ballot entry. That led to more campaigning by Davis.

"Now the precedent is reset," he said. "It should not be how long you played. What it should be based on is how well you played in the NFL."

Asked about the exclusivity of any hall of fame, Davis said: "That's what makes it special, everyone can't get in."

Then he chuckled. "But when you're on the other side, you say, 'Can't they open the floodgates and unplug the hole and let guys in?'"

Bucs reacquire SRod, claim pitcher Kontos

PITTSBURGH — The Pittsburgh Pirates turned to a familiar face in their attempt to stay in the crowded National League Central race.

Pittsburgh claimed utility infielder Sean Rodriguez off waivers from Atlanta on Saturday and sent the Braves minor-league infielder Connor Joe in return. The Pirates hope Rodriguez's versatility and bat can give their bench a much needed boost over the final two months of the season as they try to remain within striking distance of first-place Chicago.

This is Rodriguez's second stint with the Pirates. He revitalized his career while filling several roles for Pittsburgh in 2015 and 2016, when he hit .260 with 22 home runs in 279 games. He helped Pittsburgh to a playoff berth in 2015 and put up career highs in hits, home runs and RBIs in 2016. Rodriguez turned that into a two-year, \$11.5 million deal with the Braves, who promised to give him a chance to become an everyday player after filling a super utility role in Pittsburgh.

A Jan. 28 car crash in Miami that involved Rodriguez, his wife and two young sons changed the trajectory of Rodriguez's season before it even began. His wife was seriously injured and he sus-

tained a significant tear in his left rotator cuff as well as a dislocated biceps tendon and damage to his labrum. He underwent surgery in February and didn't make his debut with the Braves until after the All-Star break. He hit just .162 in 15 games with Atlanta, though the Pirates are hardly worried about Rodriguez's bumpy start since his return.

"We see the same aggressiveness, see the same impact" he had in 2016, Pittsburgh general manager Neal Huntington said. "The swing and miss has been a challenge in a short sample, but it's a short sample."

Both Huntington and manager Clint Hurdle said the Pirates heavily pursued Rodriguez when he hit the free agent market. Rodriguez, 31, provided a "unique energy and edge" in his first go-around with Pittsburgh.

"I anticipate getting him on the field and him being able to spot up in a number of different places, not just in the field but at the plate," Hurdle said. "He's been very aggressive in his rehab to come back. I'm just looking forward to putting my eyes on him."

Depth has been an issue for Pittsburgh, which began Saturday 4 1/2 games behind the Cubs in the tight NL Central. Third baseman Jung Ho Kang has spent the entire season in South Korea with visa concerns following an off-

season DUI arrest and conviction and outfielder Starling Marte served an 80-game suspension for testing positive for steroids.

The Pirates spent most of Marte's absence trying to turn Adam Frazier, John Jaso and Jose Osuna — infielders by trade — into outfielders. Results were mixed at best. Rodriguez can play three infield positions and both corner outfielder spots.

The Pirates also claimed reliever George Kontos off waivers from the San Francisco Giants. Kontos went 0-5 with a 3.83 ERA in 50 games for San Francisco this season. The Pirates designated reliever Jhan Mariner and outfielder Danny Ortiz for assignment.

Kris Bryant and Jon Jay each added a run-scoring hit as the Cubs snapped a three-game losing streak.

NEW YORK — Yasiel Puig hit a tiebreaking homer in the seventh inning and Los Angeles went deep five times, rallying past New York.

Chris Taylor, Justin Turner, Corey Seager and rookie Cody Bellinger also connected for the Dodgers, who are 43-7 since June 7.

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Losing is the quickest way for Baylor to repair image

LOSE BIG.

Or lose by a small number. Throw in a loss to Kansas. Maybe lose by a safety as time expires at Texas Tech.

Who knows? Maybe Baylor coach **Matt Rhule** can be creative — Baylor has the ball at the other team's 8-yard line with four seconds remaining in a tie game.

Instead of kicking the field goal, he should opt for a running play. The running back will fumble the ball and a defender will pick it up and return it for a game-winning, 99-yard touchdown run.

Actually, in a season where Baylor needs to establish credibility, he should reject such an incredibly absurd option. No one could believe that scene could ever happen, even if it did in 1999, at Floyd Casey Stadium.

During a recent visit with Baylor fans, the consensus was that the Bears made a good hire in Rhule. The man has said every right word since accepting this impossible job, but it does not change Baylor's perception problem.

There is but one way to truly fix the image of a school that was enhanced by a successful athletic department, then damaged by it: Lose. In football. It would help if **Scott Drew's** basketball team took a dive for a year or two as well.

As Baylor — and every other school crushed by a scandal — knows, the best way to smell good is to stink.

If Rhule's first team manages to win eight or nine games, which in this Big 12 is highly plausible,

the national perception will continue that Baylor learned nothing from a rape scandal that led to several settled lawsuits and the dismissal of every major figure from its athletic department.

It may not be entirely accurate or true, but that's how these narratives are built and how they crawl, walk and run. The truth always resides somewhere in the middle.

In order for Baylor to truly restore its reputation as a faith-based school built on the principles and ethos of the Baptists, winning football games will have to become secondary. That means no more flirting with a spot in the College Football Playoff.

It means returning to the glory days of **Kevin Steele** or **Dave Roberts**. Back when that good ol' Baylor line consisted of a herd of freshmen who could not wait to escape Floyd Casey Stadium, and a fleet of senior citizens who enjoyed a game to fill a fall afternoon before they went to grab a Gut Pak.

That was well before the arrival of the Messiah, **Art Briles** and the construction of McLane Stadium. That was all before Baylor football became a Top 25 power. It was also before the school was linked to ignoring the claims of rape by its students. As a rule of thumb, that's not good point of sale to Baylor parents.

The best thing for Baylor football is to be irrelevant. Not forever. Just for a season or two.

Losing is the only way to sell a story that Baylor regained its soul and "moral compass," even if it is a load. Moral compasses tend to swing loose in big-time college athletics.

Baylor University needs credibility. Rhule

saying "we need to treat women with respect" is appropriate and sounds good, but it won't be as helpful as a 27-24 loss to the UT San Antonio Roadrunners in the second game of the season.

A 4-8 season will stink, but it comes with boosters and fans telling ESPN and every other media outlet, "We believe in Coach Rhule because we're doing this the right way."

All ye gather 'round the Google Search Engine: Ain't none of 'em doin' it the right way. It's always a matter of degree.

If you are Baylor, just look at how Scott Drew and his basketball team fared after the **Dave Bliss** fiasco in 2003.

Hammered with NCAA sanctions, and the fact it was Baylor basketball, the team finished with a losing record in each of Drew's first four seasons. After that, the Bears have not had a losing season, finished with a winning record in each of the last 10 years and became a consistent member of the AP Top 25, the most consistent program in the state, and a national player in the NCAA tournament.

The only problem is that it's basketball in a football state.

What drives traffic, donations, applications and enrollment is a good football team. There is a direct correlation to the rise in Baylor's enrollment and donations to winning football games. There always is.

Baylor didn't give Rhule a seven-year contract worth millions and millions to lose games.

In the long term, he won't. But if Baylor wants to change its perception as a school that regained its soul, it should follow this golden rule: Just lose.

Continuity, chemistry key on Steelers' O-line

LATROBE, Pa. — Alejandro Villanueva was in mid-answer trying to put his new contract — the one that puts the former Army Ranger-turned-NFL left tackle in charge of protecting Pittsburgh Steelers quarterback Ben Roethlisberger's blind side for the rest of the decade — in perspective when Ramon Foster's distinct Tennessee drawl came crashing over the top.

"Oh yes, Al!" Foster said as he walked past. "Pay the man! Get us new chairs in the O-line room."

Villanueva smiled and shook his head at Foster's impromptu interview bomb, though the veteran guard and elder statesman on the unit most vital to Pittsburgh's chances at ending New England's long run at the top of the AFC might have a point.

The seats in the group's meeting room are getting well worn. Call it the byproduct of the kind of stability that's a rarity in the salary cap era. The way the Steelers figure it, better to break in new furniture than new faces.

Villanueva's deal, signed minutes before the defending AFC North champions opened training camp, means Pittsburgh's entire front five — Villanueva at left tackle, Foster at left guard, Maurkice Pouncey

at center, David DeCastro at right guard and Marcus Gilbert at right tackle — are all signed through the end of the 2018 season, with all but Foster in the fold through at least 2020.

"It's rare, especially in this league," DeCastro said. "Guys are all under their second contracts. It doesn't really happen. You have to make it show."

It certainly did last season. Pittsburgh ripped off seven straight wins after a 4-5 start to win its second division title in three years, with the line opening gaping holes for Le'Veon Bell and keeping Roethlisberger's No. 7 jersey pristine in the process. Bell averaged 139 yards rushing during the stretch, with Roethlis-

berger being taken down just three times.

While Roethlisberger is serious when he says he's working on a season-by-season basis at this point, there are certain factors that could see him walk off into retirement later rather than sooner. Namely, staying upright nearly all the time behind a line among the best in the business.

"If they play as well as they've been playing and getting sacked 17 times in a year, that might keep me around a little longer," he said with a smile.

Compare that to the early days of Roethlisberger's career, when he spent a considerable portion of his time picking himself up off the turf.

"I'm the guy that's gotta go break 'em down," he said. "You know, you get in your same mode for so long. It feels good. There was a lot of buildup and it was a bit of a mad rush there from early June to now, so just to finally get on the field and get going and do what we all love to do — it was good."

Riley isn't stepping in for just anyone. Stoops went 190-48 in 18 years, with a national title and three other appearances in title games. Stoops still works for the athletic department, and he has helped Riley's transition by attending some practices and offering advice.

"He's not the type of guy who is going to call me every single night," Riley said. "That's just not his personality. He wouldn't do it that way. But he's always available for a call."

Riley appreciates Stoops' input. "Always good to hear what he sees. A lot of times, it's just confirming what you think you're seeing. He just wants to be there in any way I or this program can use him. And I certainly will."

One of Riley's first moves upon becoming head coach was hiring Ruffin McNeill as an assistant. Riley was an assistant for McNeill at East Carolina. McNeill was assistant head coach at Virginia last season before Riley brought him to Oklahoma.

McNeill said Riley is handling things calmly and with poise.

Sooners WR out for year with an Achilles injury

NORMAN, Okla. — Oklahoma receiver Nick Basquine will miss the season because of an Achilles tendon injury.

Coach Lincoln Riley made the announcement Saturday, during Oklahoma's Media Day. A team spokesman said Basquine was hurt during practice Friday.

Basquine caught 20 passes for 265 yards and two touchdowns last season. He started two games, including the

Sugar Bowl. Quarterback Baker Mayfield called Basquine one of the team's hardest workers and said he was going to be a "huge, huge part of our offense."

Oklahoma was already trying to replace Biletnikoff Award winner Dede Westbrook, a senior last season.

This is the second season-ending injury the Sooners announced last week. Reserve offensive lineman Alex Dalton injured a knee before camp.

"Still keeping everybody accountable and involving everyone on the staff as well," McNeill said. "He's doing a great job himself of just handling the different situations that come with that job. That head coaching job is a three-legged stool. It's wobbly. But he's doing a great job keeping it balanced."

Quarterback Baker Mayfield said the things that made Riley popular as offensive coordinator make him popular now. He's still brilliant, down to Earth, honest and humble. Mayfield said receiver Jeff Mead razzed Riley for three weeks before he finally upgraded his car.

"He has an ability to adapt to his players and relate to them," Mayfield said.

"Coaching-wise, he adapts to our personnel and he calls plays based on that. But he has the ability to relate to them and get the best out of every individual person."

Riley is adjusting to being the final decision-maker when it comes to discipline. He suspended cornerback Will Sunderland indefinitely after Sunderland was arrested for burglary, and he recently dismissed backup quarterback Chris Robison from the team for a rules violation.

"Certainly, being that person that makes the final decision or has that final talk or whatever it is, that is different," he said. "It's not part of the job I shy away from, but it's definitely one of the worst parts of the job, too."

The Claude Worthington Benedum Foundation recently awarded five grants to WVU, through the WVU Foundation, totaling \$540,000.

The grants will benefit programs and initiatives at WVU and across the state, including:

- Office of the Provost (\$325,000) — The West Virginia Public Education Collaborative and the WVU Energy Institute will benefit from this grant, receiving \$225,000 and \$100,000, respectively. Over the course of a three-year project, the West Virginia Public Education Collaborative will hire an executive director, conduct oversight of pilot projects between different academic divisions of WVU and pre-K12 schools, and manage other initiatives and studies in order to form educational partnerships and shape nonpartisan education policy.

Brazilian soccer star Neymar plans to leave his current team, Barcelona, and move to Paris Saint-Germain. The league said it wouldn't get involved because it feels the money violates financial rules that govern UEFA, the European soccer league. IVORY CRUSH

New York environmental officials, the Wildlife Conservation Society and Tiffany & Co. teamed up this week to destroy almost two tons of ivory trinkets, statues and jewelry. The artifacts are valued at around \$8.5 million, and they were made from the tusks of at least 100 slaughtered elephants. That's approximately the number of elephants the wildlife group says are killed every day in Africa. Three years ago, New York banned the sale, purchase, trade or distribution of anything made from elephant or mammoth ivory or rhinoceros horn, except in limited situations with state approval. State officials say New York City is the nation's largest port of entry for illegal wildlife goods.



FIRST US COIN WORTH A MINT

Experts think they've discovered the first silver coin ever made by the United States government. David McCarthy, of the coin and collectibles firm Kagin's, paid \$1.18 million for the coin at an auction in 2013 and has spent years studying it. He argues that it dates to 1783 and is a prototype for what would become the U.S. dollar a decade later. The front of the coin features the all-seeing eye of God, surrounded by rays of light. The rays shoot out toward 13 stars — one for each of the colonies that had rebelled against Great Britain. Numismatist Jeff Garrett says a 1794 silver dollar recently sold for more than \$10 million, and that may be comparable to the value of the newly-discovered coin.

The president puts his political opponents on trial. Erdogan's power, has provided stability after a July 2016 coup attempt provoked a government crackdown and raised tensions with Washington. "Markets are more interested in stability than (the) shift toward authoritarianism," says Onur Bulbul, president of the InnoNative Advisors consultancy. Some investors aren't sold. The Turkish currency, the lira, is still down 18 percent against the U.S. dollar since the July 15, 2016 coup. And foreigners are balking at long-term bets: Foreign direct investment in Turkey, which includes acquisitions and new factories, dropped 30 percent last year.

Company Spotlight Fit quarter at Weight Watchers

Weight Watchers International's stock soared Friday after the company reported a strong quarter and raised its forecast for the year. The weight-loss program operator also said that it ended the second quarter with 3.5 million subscribers, a 20 percent gain from a year earlier. Weight Watchers reported late Thursday that it posted net income of \$45.2 million, or 67 cents per share, in the three months ended July 1. That compares with net income of

\$30.5 million, or 46 cents per share, a year earlier. Revenue increased 10 percent to \$341.7 million. The latest results exceeded Wall Street analysts' consensus forecasts, which called for earnings of 51 cents per share on \$344.1 million in revenue. The results prompted management to forecast strong revenue growth and operating income the rest of this year. Weight Watchers shares climbed \$8.31 or 25.1 percent Friday. The stock is up 261.5 percent this year.



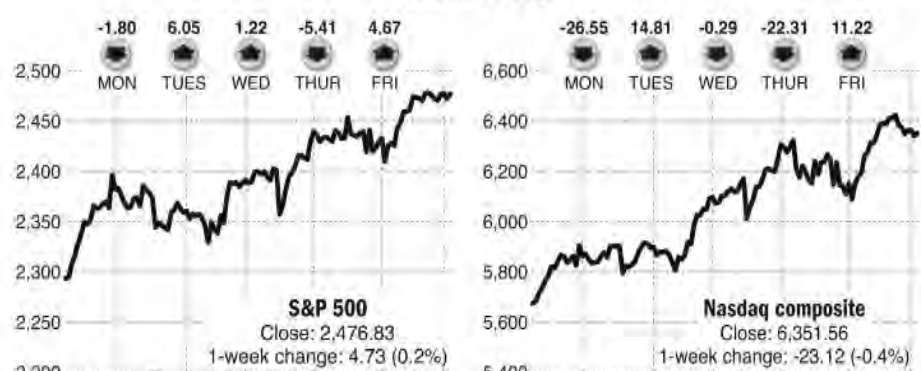

Quick Fix Car leases

End your car lease without getting dinged

Your car lease is ending soon. Looking at the dent in the driver's door, you wonder if you'll be charged for it. Or maybe you've exceeded the mileage limit and you're bracing for a big hit. But you can avoid common issues like these if you know when the game is played.

For any scratches or dents larger than a credit card. Before the inspection, clean the car and remove all personal items. You can address any issues the inspector finds and request a second inspection. Or, if you prefer, turn your car in and pay the repair charges.

1 In the 'hot zone' The last 90 days of a lease is the "hot zone." During this time, the leasing company will likely contact you about your options, including offers designed to keep your business. You can:
 • Buy the car
 • Return the car to the leasing company
 • Lease another car
 • Extend your lease contract on a month-by-month basis
 The leasing company will remind you of the buyout price (set at the beginning of your contract) and provide the contact information of the lease inspection service it works with so you can schedule an inspection appointment.

2 Excessive wear and tear Before the inspection you can figure out what sort of damage the leasing company is looking for. Toyota's "Wear and Use Guidelines" show what damage to the car's interior, exterior, tires, glass and lights a customer might be charged for. Financing company Ally Financial Inc. also offers a handy checklist for lease returns. Many manufacturers say they'll charge customers rubber when they turn in the leased car.

3 Preemptive repairs You can fix some problems yourself and possibly save some money in the process. Deep scratches can often be remedied with some touch-up paint, an artist's brush and a steady hand. Stains may come off with stain remover, upholstery cleaner and some scrubbing. You can also pay for repairs independently before turning in your car. While you may not save much, you'll know the cost upfront. Some car experts recommend replacing the tires two years into a three-year lease. That way, leaseholders get to use some of the tires' life and won't get dinged for new tires when they turn in the leased car.

4 Excess mileage Most leasing companies charge around 15 to 20 cents per mile over the amount allowed in the contract, commonly 12,000 miles per year. If you're way over the allowed mileage and looking at a big penalty, you still have options. If you like the car, you can buy it rather than pay the mileage penalty. In most cases, the buyout price is close to the current market value price.

Road leads to Oct. 7

State's residents need to put bond referendum in gear

"I think we will pass it by the greatest vote in the history of the world."

Sound familiar? Well, he didn't say it but his counterpart in Charleston did.

Yes, Gov. Jim Justice, during one of his visits to rally support for his \$1.6 billion road bond proposal, recently said that.

He preceded that by saying, "You've got to pass this."

He's right about that, but we doubt the world will be all that impressed with the outcome of this vote Oct. 7, one way or another.

But every West Virginian who has ever complained about our deplorable roads and bridges should be.

Improving our infrastructure, creating jobs, bringing people back home and stimulating our economy are all the reason we need to vote yes.

Locally, we would point to the estimated \$40 million in projects to widen West Run, Van Voorhis and Green Bag roads that these road bonds will help finance as an additional incentive.

If that's not enough, there's the \$100 million listed to construct a new connector to Interstate 79 from Morgantown (the location of which has yet to be determined).

Another reason some will want to vote for this referendum is that it will not raise taxes.

With the passage of two legislative measures — SB 1003 and SB 1006 — in June, everything is already in place to pay for these bonds.

SB 1003 allows the Parkways Authority the ability to keep charging tolls on the West Virginia Turnpike beyond the previous 2019 deadline.

But more importantly, it gives it the power to issue revenue bonds for road projects in the geographical region of the Turnpike, financed by those tolls.

It also allows the Authority to apply tolls on other state highways and issue revenue bonds to finance road projects.

The other bill most of us are already familiar with raised the state's wholesale gas tax, DMV fees and the privilege tax on vehicle sales.

That legislation, when combined with the bond measure, is estimated to provide a nearly \$3 billion roads package.

Plans are also to apply for matching federal highway funds.

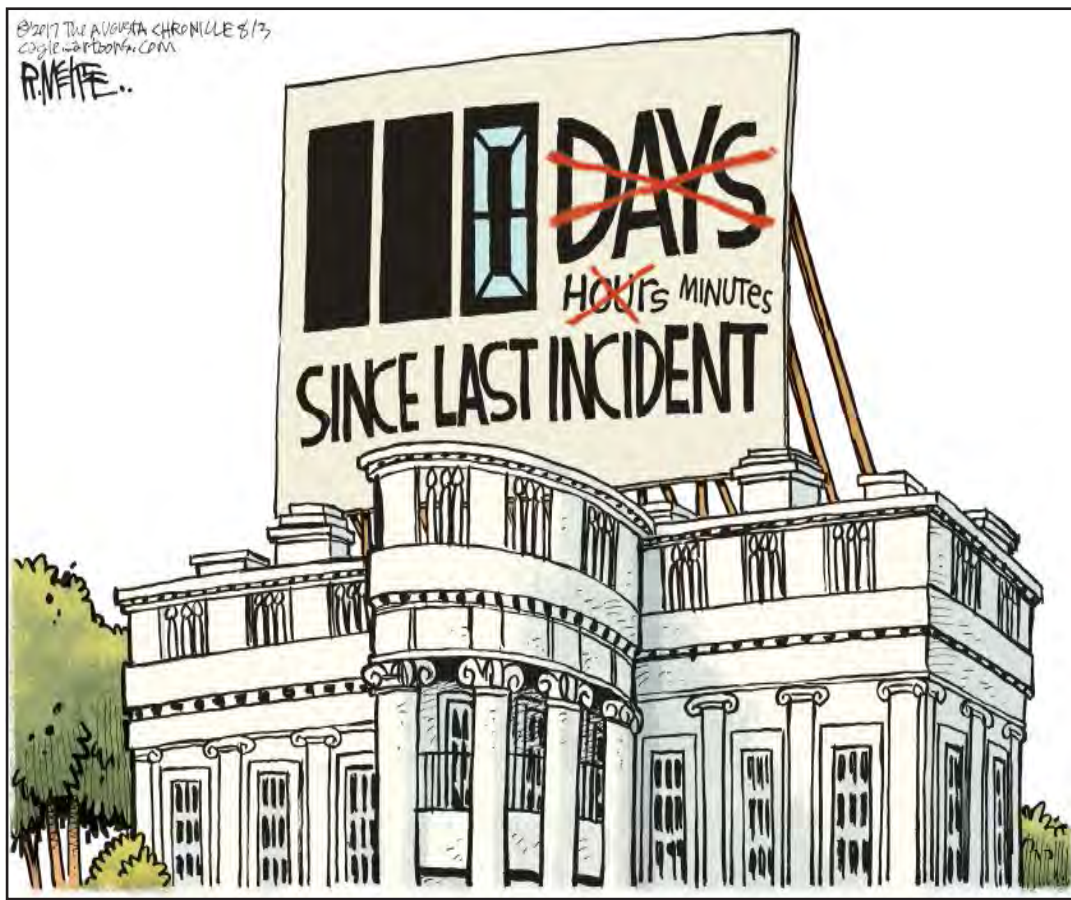
As for that election date, yes, it's a football Saturday. But WVU plays an away game and Marshall plays that evening.

Though voting should take only every bit of a minute, for many, Saturdays are often devoted to all things fun, which doesn't include voting.

So if that describes you, there's always early voting on this constitutional measure, which begins Sept. 22 and ends Oct. 4.

Still, we urge everyone to circle Oct. 7 on their calendar today.

We may not make history, but we can get our state on the road again.

Revolving door not important; the results are

IT IS TEMPTING TO BASK IN THE DAILY DOSE OF PALACE INTRIGUE these days at the Trump White House, but the running narratives of who reports to whom are not ultimately important. What matters is the path forward for the president's agenda, and whether it is helped or hindered by the ever-changing cast of characters.

Change itself is not usually helpful. The ideal is to see a team selected, then watch it harmoniously coalesce on a smooth, sure path toward its goals.

That's not this presidency. But in fairness, that's not any presidency. Every administration has its sharp-elbowed infighting; this one simply has a special talent for putting it in a display window.

Amid turnover of this dizzying pace, the first question is: Are we upgrading at every position?

Sean Spicer to Sarah Huckabee Sanders as press secretary? Yes. Reince Priebus to John Kelly as Chief of Staff? Yes. Anthony Scaramucci to his successor as communications director? Without even knowing that successor yet? Yes.

Scaramucci's arrival and exit both warrant examination. His arrival showed Donald Trump's desire to work with people who resemble him. His departure shows Trump's unwillingness to work with people who embarrass him.

This is where the Trump haters step up to suggest there's irony in someone as brash as Trump possibly being embarrassed by the language of anyone in his sphere.

But no Trump tweet or other public comment comes close to the reckless, inexplicable idiocy of Scaramucci's vulgar rant to a New Yorker reporter. The president likes fighters, but will not tolerate underlings who mortify critics and supporters alike for no reason.

So does the arrival of a retired Marine general as chief of staff bring instant discipline? It brought Scaramucci's instant departure and delivered an instant message. From here on out, it's anybody's guess. Kelly will almost surely enforce a certain decorum among the ranks, but do not expect him to constrain the instincts of his boss.

Nor should he. The Trump tweets are the engine that inspires and delights his base, even as enemies float withering tales of Russia collusion.

But even the most loyal portions of that base are eager to see some actual results. The Obamacare repeal failure was not his fault, and there is no doubt that the half-year of Trump ushered in an America that feels very different in terms of borders, the economy, energy and various social issues, just for starters. Those changes were welcomed by the vast majority of voters who sought exactly this type of change.

But as John Kelly plugs in to whip the troops into shape toward goals like tax reduction and regulatory reform, history observes that chiefs of staff are rarely famous and rarely long-serving; Barack Obama had four in his first term. The best evidence that Kelly is doing his job will be how seldom he appears in the headlines.

That will be a test in a carnivorous media environment that will obsess at the slightest whiff of a West Wing soap opera. The best thing Kelly can do is enforce message discipline around the Oval Office while the man inside figures out what his daily or hourly passions are.

At no point will this come to resemble a White House akin to what any of Trump's 2016 rivals might have rolled out. At no point will it resemble any White House, ever.

John Kelly is a welcome asset who can be of great value, but the direction of the Trump administration will not be dictated by anyone but the president himself.

Class integration

Ban dorms; they only serve to worsen social inequality

CONJURE AN IMAGE OF WHERE UNDERGRADUATES LIVE: A dry-erase board at the door, opening onto a tight space with lofted beds, desk chairs engineered against tipping over backward, fluorescent lighting overhead and bad poster art on the walls.

For decades, the most selective institutions of higher learning in the United States have championed a residential model of university life, with successive classes assigned to dormitories clustered around pleasant quads. My alma mater, Pomona College, has long housed 99 percent of its stu-

dents on campus. I enjoyed that culture and thought it should survive indefinitely.

But now I wonder if that model is bad for the country. I wonder if it should be tweaked or even abandoned in favor of an alternative that exposes over-achievers to more

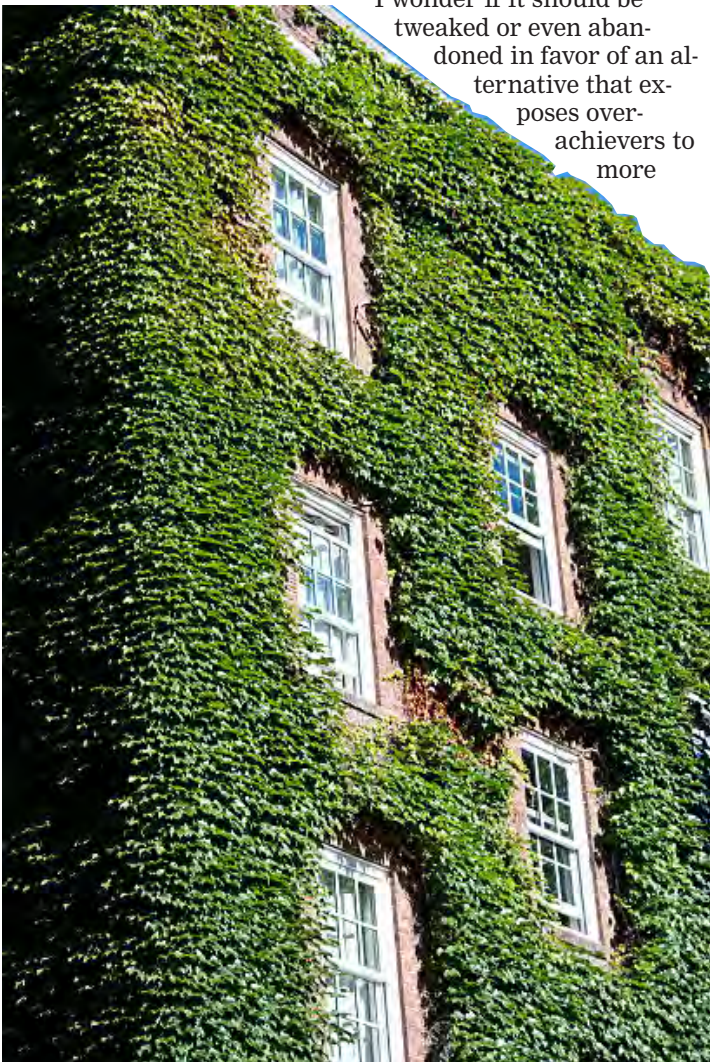
people unlike themselves. Later, I'll sketch an idea for how that might happen.

Don't worry: The typical American college student would not be affected. At public four-year institutions, just under a quarter of students live on campus. Just 1 percent of community college students live in dorms. But America's ruling elites would face a profound change. The percentage of students in university-affiliated housing is 99 percent at Harvard, 93 percent at Stanford and 84 percent at Yale.

Such unapologetically elitist institutions operate on the premise that it is proper to identify gifted young people with leadership potential; to separate them out from their peers; and to cluster them in an exclusive, member-only settings for four years of intense learning. That approach has some validity. When bright young people study math, physics, philosophy and other subjects among minds of similar caliber, they learn at a similar pace and help one another to achieve greater mastery. Their greater mastery is, in turn, good for society.

But if the case for grouping the best students together for academic purposes is as strong as ever, it is much harder to defend a separatist approach to their lives outside of the classroom — especially insofar as elite institutions purport to produce not just future scholars, but also future leaders.

Students would learn more outside the classroom if exposed to young people from a greater variety of backgrounds than they'd typically find at a top-tier college. And the future leaders among them might better serve the public, or the private sector workers beneath them, if they spent more of their formative

Cluster bombs still pose grave threat to world

Tuesday (Aug. 1) marked the 7th entry into force anniversary of the Convention on Cluster Munitions (CCM).

The CCM was adopted by 107 nations at a meeting in Dublin, Ireland, and was formally signed in Oslo, Norway, in 2008.

In August, the West Virginia Campaign to Ban Landmines and Cluster Bombs along with Cluster Munition Coalition members worldwide will take part in coordinated campaign actions to recognize the anniversary.

The life-saving Convention on Cluster Munitions is a comprehensive, effective solution to the problem of cluster munitions.

It prohibits the use of the weapon, as well as requiring clearance of cluster munition remnants, destruction of stockpiles and the provision of assistance for victims.

To date, 119 countries have joined the global ban. Under the convention, 29 countries have completed the destruction of nearly 1.4 million stockpiled munitions containing 172 million sub-munitions, or bomblets. These countries recently included Germany, Italy, Japan, France, Mozambique and Sweden.

Cluster bombs have caused unacceptable harm to civilians in every conflict in which they have been used, and contamination continues to kill and injure people trying to rebuild their lives for decades after.

Cluster bombs are large weapon systems containing often hundreds of smaller bomblets. They can be dropped from the air or fired from the ground.

Unexploded munitions act as de facto landmines.

It has been well established that cluster bombs have a devastating impact on the lives of civilians, both at the time of use and long afterward.

Cluster bombs are indiscriminate weapons and cannot distinguish between a soldier or a civilian. When cluster bombs are used in or near populated areas (the site of most modern conflicts), it is inevitable that civilian casualties, including women and children, are the result.

Cluster bomb contamination can make land unsafe to live on and cause economic insecurity.

WVCBL/PSALM (Campaign to Ban Landmines and Cluster Bombs/Proud Students Against Landmines) students are particularly moved by the human cost: civilians account for 94 percent of casualties, a significant portion, 40 percent being children. Farmers working their land may accidentally set off the bomblets.

Tragically, children are often attracted by their small size, curious shape and color, and mistake them for toys, killing or injuring themselves and others by picking them up and playing with them. Contamination can stop people from safely accessing schools, hospitals and land for housing and subsistence. Some communities have no choice but to carry on their daily lives on contaminated land, risking lives and limbs.

Countries with the highest number of casualties include Laos, Iraq, Vietnam, Afghanistan and Lebanon.

The Cluster Munition Coalition is a global network of civil society groups including the West Virginia CBL/PSALM working in 100 countries to end the harm caused by cluster bombs.

Every country in the world can and should join the Convention on Cluster Munitions. It's a question of placing a priority on the protection of civilians over the use of outdated and indiscriminate weapons.

The 7th Meeting of States Parties of the Convention on Cluster Munitions is scheduled to take place Sept. 4-6, in Geneva.

On the occasion of the anniversary of the entry into force of the Convention on Cluster Munitions, we call on the United States to act now to prevent further harm from this weapon, attend the meeting and accede to this life-saving treaty.

We encourage supportive members of our community and state to learn more about cluster munitions and landmines.

China snookers world on Paris Climate Accord

A couple of weeks ago, the New York Times published an article which suggested that 1,600 new coal plants are planned or under construction in 62 countries around the world. The new plants would expand the world's coal-fired power capacity by 43 percent. In contrast, utilities in the U.S. have only four coal fired plants set to go online through 2020.

When China halted plans for more than 100 plants earlier this year, it seemed to confirm for some China's new role as a leader in the fight against climate change.

But the New York Times article suggested that China is expected to construct more than 700 new plants. India is expected to construct 446, Japan 45 and the European Union (E.U.) 27 power plants, even as they admonish the U.S. for pulling out of the Paris Climate Accord.

When this construction cycle is completed, China will

have 3,000 coal-fire stations and India in excess of 1,000, while the U.S. will have under 600.

China is lauded by some because it is the leading producer of solar panels, with much of their production going to the U.S. and the E.U. The production of solar panels requires a lot of energy.

Since many U.S. power plants utilize scrubbers while those in China don't, the pollution impact of the production of solar panels in China is twice as large as those produced in the U.S. But the owners of the solar panel farms in the U.S. are more interested in the price of the panel than the environmental impact of the production of the panels. It really is all about the dollar.

When China agreed to the Paris Climate Accord, it agreed to the peaking of carbon emissions by 2030 and would make its best effort to peak early. On the other hand, the U.S. agreed to reduce its emission levels by 26-28 percent below its 2005 levels by 2025.

Even with our withdrawal from the Paris accord, I expect that we will meet the 26 percent goal by 2025. We don't need the national, state or local governments to set goals for us. We are a technology savvy and environmentally friendly people.

But I really do hate being snookered once again by China.

Maduro's crackdown likely to blow up in his face

VENEZUELAN PRESIDENT NICOLÁS MADURO'S DECISION to imprison opposition leaders Leopoldo López and Antonio Ledezma will not help his beleaguered regime. On the contrary, it may backfire.

Judging from what I'm hearing from well-placed Latin American and U.S. diplomats, the Maduro regime's incarceration of the two internationally known politicians — who were under house arrest serving long sentences on phony government charges — infuriated leaders around the world.

The arrests on Tuesday and the revelation Wednesday by the CEO of the Smartmatic voting technology firm that the Venezuelan regime rigged his company's count of the government-convened weekend vote for a Constituent Assembly are likely to move more countries to take a stronger stand against the Maduro dictatorship.

"It will have an important impact," Chilean Foreign Minister Heraldo Muñoz said in a telephone interview, referring to the late-night raid by security forces into the two opposition leaders' homes, and their return to prison. "This can't go on. There can't be more arrests, and violation of the rule of law."

López, the Harvard-educated leader of the opposition Voluntad



Popular party, is Latin America's best-known political prisoner.

His wife, Lilian Tintori, a former TV anchorwoman, has been leading an international campaign for his release since he was first jailed, in 2014. She has met with President Trump and the leaders of Brazil, Argentina, Peru and several other countries to share her husband's story, and to press them for greater pressure for a return to democracy in Venezuela.

It's hard not to be moved by the López couple's story. During his three years in a military prison — until he was transferred to house arrest three weeks ago — López was often denied permission to see his children, Manuela, 8, and Leopoldo, 4. In a pre-taped video released by his family after his reincarceration this week, López — holding hands with his wife — announced that the couple is expecting a third child.

Ledezma also is a well-known

international figure. He was the democratically elected mayor of Caracas, until then-president Hugo Chávez created a Venezuelan Capital District that cut the mayor's budget and stripped him of all powers. Ledezma was imprisoned in 2015, and sent home under house arrest for health reasons shortly thereafter.

When the foreign affairs ministers of Latin America's largest countries meet Tuesday, in Lima, Peru, to discuss the Venezuelan crisis, they will surely be influenced by the latest developments.

More countries may join Mexico and Panama in following the United States and slap financial and visa sanctions against top Venezuelan officials. Others, like Chile, will continue pressing for a credible mediation in Venezuela's political crisis, but this time adding — as Muñoz told me — the requirement that any such negotiations be "to permit the return of a democratic order that has been broken."

Skeptics say that none of this will help bring down the Maduro government, and that the latest moves by Maduro show that the Venezuelan dictator has decided to burn his bridges, and turn the country into a Cuba-style dictatorship.

Maduro surely would want

that, but I don't think he will get away with it. Venezuela is not an island, like Cuba. And this is not 1959, when there was a Soviet Union able to bankroll bankrupt anti-American regimes.

Unlike what happened in Cuba after the 1959 revolution, polls show that about 80 percent of Venezuelans blame Maduro for the near 1,000 a year inflation rate, and a more than 30 percent drop in the country's economy over the last three years.

And, more importantly, unlike in Cuba, the Venezuelan people's democratic instincts are very much alive, despite two decades of government propaganda and press censorship. More than 120 people died in recent street protests, and they still turn out in massive numbers in opposition demonstrations.

The re-arrests of López and Ledezma, and the farce of Maduro's Constituent Assembly vote, will not help Maduro buy time and weaken the street protests, as he hoped. Anything could happen, but my bet is that it will further enrage the international community, and further encourage Venezuela's courageous opposition.

years with generational peers who, for whatever reason, did not want to or could not attend a fancy university — i.e., the vast majority of Americans.

The status quo certainly seems inadequate.

In the United States, the ideological gap between more- and less-educated adults is widening. A majority of Republicans now say that higher education has a negative effect on the country. Voters have lost faith in elites of all kinds.

And that's true at least in part because elites unthinkingly perpetuate their own tribe's interests — without ever having to meet the people harmed — through trade policy or restrictive urban

planning or professional licensing laws that disproportionately burden the working class.

It therefore seems perverse to maintain tax-exempt, institutionalized programs of extreme residential cloistering where cognitive elites form social bonds exclusively with one another.

How would the world be different if the next startup billionaire from Stanford formed friendships in college with elder care workers, plumbers and long haul truckers in addition to doctors, lawyers and consultants?

These arrangements are unlikely to occur naturally even off-campus. (Our residential housing market is highly segregated by class and race.)

They could, however, happen at institutions already dedicated to shaping leaders through con-

trived housing regimes.

Imagine a selective college that used part of its hefty endowment to partner with nearby institutions on a brand new kind of dorm.

Half its residents would come from the college itself. The other half would be drawn from vocational schools, community colleges and technical training programs — people of the same age cohort, all working toward a degree or certificate, though the particulars of their circumstances would vary depending on the particular city or town.

They'd go off to their respective classes by day and return in the evening to programming and activities that encouraged them to interact.

Graduates of selective institutions would balk at such a

change. They have fond memories of living on campuses composed of people with very similar academic profiles, some of whom went on to be close friends. Consumerist students tend to prefer what is comfortable to what will help them learn or serve best.

Finally, selective colleges recognize that they appeal to families in part because they bring together up-and-coming young people in a world where who you know matters tremendously.

But maybe there's a university out there that's ready to put its narrow interests aside and build the E Pluribus Dorm before it's too late.

"Let the 'boo!' bit go, Katie, it's seriously enough," I can imagine the living saying. "Every night with this stuff. It's not healthy. Have you thought about getting a hobby?"

As I'm still around, however, I've had to make due with choosing more earthly compulsions in my former vices' wake — namely: Shopping, sugar and coffee.

And since one of the side effects I most hoped for in giving up alcohol was weight loss, I'm really trying to wean myself off the sugar now, too.

The shopping, well that only works as long as I have money in the bank, so it sort of controls itself. Or at least it's starting to, one couch, a sideboard and four unnecessary armchairs later.

Which leaves coffee. Beautiful, minimally caloric, highly caffeinated, delicious-hot-or-cold, now-up-to-about-eight-cups-a-day coffee.

What's that? Did someone say "excessive?" (Actually, yes, my coworker just did.)

But that only goes to show she's no doctor (that, and the fact that she works at a newspaper and didn't go to medical school), because I read an article this very morning that said coffee may, in fact, help people live longer.

Apparently, according to two studies published in *Annals of Internal Medicine* recently, drinking coffee "is associated with a reduced risk of death from various diseases."

Yes, the research indicates, some people can suffer adverse effects from caffeine. However, there is evidence coffee can also decrease one's likelihood of Parkinson's, Type 2 diabetes, depression and bad moods.

Thank God for life's sacred goats

Q: You once told a sad and poignant story about a goat whose magnificent horns were given away, piece by piece. — S from Melville, N.Y.

A: It is a story recorded by the Jewish philosopher Martin Buber in his edited compilation, "Tales of the Hasidim." It is attributed to Rabbi Menahem Mendel of Kotsk (1787-1859) who was called "The Kotsker Rebbe." Hasidism is a branch of Orthodox Judaism that emphasized joyous worship over scholarly rigor. Hasidism is itself divided around the teachings of various charismatic rabbis, called affectionately "Rebbs". The followers of a Rebbe are his "Hasidim."

Of all the early Hasidic Rebbs, the Kotsker was the most troubled. He spent the last 20 years of his life in seclusion, seeing only a few Hasidim. One of his visitors was Rabbi Yitzhak of Vorki, who said upon entering his room, "Peace be with you, Rebbe." The Kotsker angrily said, "Why do you say Rebbe to me? I'm the goat! I'm the sacred goat." Then he told this story:

"An old Jew once lost his snuffbox made of horn on his way to the House of Study. He wailed: 'Just as if the dreadful exile weren't enough, this must happen to me! Oh me, oh my, I've lost my snuffbox made of horn!' And then he came upon the sacred goat. The sacred goat was pacing the earth, and the tips of his black horns touched the stars. When he heard the old Jew lamenting, he leaned down to him, and said, 'Cut a piece from my horns, whatever you need to make a new snuffbox.' The old Jew did this, made a new snuffbox and filled it with tobacco. Then he went to the House of Study and offered everyone a pinch. They snuffed and snuffed, and everyone who snuffed it cried: 'Oh, what wonderful tobacco! It must be because of the box. Oh, what a wonderful box! Wherever did you get it?' So the old man told them about the good sacred goat. And then one after another they went out into the forest and looked for the sacred goat. The sacred goat was pacing the earth and the tips of his black horns touched the stars. One after another the people went up to him and begged permission to cut off a bit of his horns. Time after time the sacred goat leaned down to grant the request. Box after box was made and filled with tobacco. The fame of the boxes spread far and wide. At every step he took, the sacred goat met someone who asked for a piece of his horns. Now the sacred goat still paces the earth — but he has no horns."

Kotsker Rebbe's story of the sacred goat is an exceedingly great story. It raises the question in the minds and hearts of all teachers and parents, all healers and caregivers — everyone who willingly cuts off their horns to give to others — is my sacrifice worth it?

The goat was undeniably giving and gracious, but it gave away its sacred horns to make snuff boxes! What a waste of good horns. On the other hand we worship a God who gives us salvation even though we neither deserve nor appreciate it sufficiently. Is this the act of a loving parent or is this the foolish confusion of self-sacrifice with self-destruction? My view of the goat is that they are noble gifts of one's substance to help others. Remember, the goat is still called the sacred goat even after its horns have been cut off.

When I see the sacrifices parents and grandparents and siblings and caregivers and healers and clergy and physicians and teachers make every day, I am overwhelmed by the number of sacred goats who still pace the earth. We are all here because we have been given pieces of sacred horns that remind us always to reach for the heavens and to freely give what we have been given.

Include all kids in gift-giving

Q: I have recently remarried and now have four children — two from my wife's first marriage and two from my first marriage. The problem is my mother. She loves my children very much but doesn't really feel my wife's kids are part of her family. She will bring presents for my kids and forget hers. It's very hurtful, and I don't know what to do about it.

A: It's not uncommon for people of an older generation to not take stepfamilies seriously. I have faced it in my own life. When I remarried, I also had two bio-kids and two bonuskids, so I, too, had four kids around most of the time. Although my mom acted like she accepted all the kids, when no one was looking she would sneak an extra \$50 to my daughter around Christmas time. Of course, being a typical kid, my daughter let the other children know about the extra cash, and then I was left explaining to my bonuskids why my mom really wasn't that mean. I remember my bonusdaughter saying, "That's the first time I really felt like your stepchild, Jannie." I was furious with my mother until I thought it through.

Your mother, like mine, probably adores her grandchildren, but may worry that they will feel slighted if she openly includes the new bonuskids in the gift giving. She's probably at a loss for

exactly how to handle it — and if you put it that way, you may now understand why she seems to openly defy your wishes. She doesn't know what to do. She's walking the same tight rope bio-parents walk when they try to combine families. How do you show your own child love and not make your bonuschildren feel like second-class citizens?

It begins with you setting the stage. Have a conversation with your mother that lays the groundwork for what you would like to see. Have patience. Set the example, and know that you may have to repeat yourself many times for your mother to grasp how important this is to you.

Next, grandparents, look for one-on-one time with biological grandchildren when the bonuskids are with their bio-relations. That's a perfect time to go places and do things when it's just the two of you. Connect when you are not together by phone calls, email, Facetime or Skype. There are also things like trusts or special scholarships that can be set aside for biological relations, so preferences are not openly flaunted.

Does my teen have an evil twin?

Q: If I wasn't in the delivery room for my daughter's birth, I'd swear that she had a secret, identical twin. Sometimes she's delightful and lovely to be around, other times, she's a nightmare. Some days she seems to love us and need us, other days she's hateful and nasty. People keep telling me to relax, that's she's just a normal teen. Is there some way to get rid of some of the "downs" but keep the "ups"?

A: I wish that nature had come up with a better way for young people to discover their adult identity, but I'm afraid we're stuck. Their logic-defying careening back and forth between being an irrational infant one second to being wise and wonderful the next is part of the deal. But think about it this way. While it's confusing and painful for us, it's got to be a lot worse for them.

Actually, if you think back really hard to when you were your daughter's age. You may be able to remember how scary it felt at those times when you had no idea what you might do or what might come out of your mouth. You may be able to get back in touch with the emotional highs and lows you felt, how infuriating it was that no one understood you, and how frustrating it was that everyone insisted on treating you like a child and refused to give you the responsibility you (thought) you were ready for. You felt completely out

of control — and you were right.

Adolescence is a time of real upheaval, when our mind, body, and everything else is constantly changing. Teens are struggling to figure out where they fit in the world; and they're trying on different feelings and moods. Throw in a still-developing brain that's being assaulted by hormones, and you've got a bunch of Frankenstein-like creatures that the world doesn't understand — and who don't understand themselves either. And it keeps getting worse: Parents fear teens' volatility (rightfully so), their teachers push them to succeed academically, and their peers push them to conform socially and physically, which makes it hard for them to maintain their individuality.

As a parent, you're going to struggle too. You'll need to be authoritative but not authoritarian, and you'll need to be protective but maintain a respectful, loving distance. In other words, be there for her, but do so without looking like you are. It's natural to want to know everything that your daughter is doing at every second, but trying to make that a reality will backfire and alienate her.

Turtle suffers from swelling on head

Brandon has been taking care of Herbie for seven years. Herbie, a box turtle, was a lost soul that Brandon found walking in the street when he was 11 years old and has been part of Brandon's life ever since. He lives outdoors in the spring, summer and early fall and spends the winters indoors in a heated terrarium.

Herbie has had no health issues while in Brandon's care until he recently began to develop a swelling or mass on the left side of his head. Brandon noticed Herbie not eating with his normal amount of enthusiasm, especially when it came to snails, Herbie's favorite food.

For all his seven years with Brandon, the sight of a snail would bring Herbie sprinting for the food dish; of course, sprinting for a box turtle is a relative term.

This decrease in glee over snails became more evident over a few weeks until Brandon finally noticed the swelling.

It is likely not possible to definitively determine the cause of Herbie's swelling simply by looking. It may be a swelling filled with liquid such as a cyst or it could be a solid mass lesion. In order to figure out how to help Herbie, we need to know what we are dealing with.

The first step would be a simple test called a fine needle aspirate — a needle attached to a syringe is introduced into the lesion to aspirate out some of the material inside. The material would be looked at under a

microscope.

It is important to distinguish this procedure from a needle biopsy. A needle biopsy involves actual tissue removal from a lesion with a somewhat larger needle. This harvested tissue is then sent to a pathologist for processing and microscopic examination. This is a more in-depth test and is also better at identifying a mass.

In Herbie's case, I am confident that a simple fine needle aspirate will give us the necessary information.

Having dealt with many box turtles over the past three decades as a veterinarian, I am

going to venture an educated guess that Herbie's lesion is an abscess in his left ear canal. These are fairly common in some species of turtles, box turtles especially, and are usually caused by an infection that starts in the mouth or throat and goes up the Eustachian tube into the middle ear.

People have this tube too; it's the one we try to open up when we fly on an airplane to equalize the pressure across the eardrum.

When a bacterial infection sets up shop via this Eustachian tube into the middle ear in a turtle, the infection elicits a re-

action from the body which causes pus to form. This develops into an abscess, causing the swelling Brandon has reported in Herbie's neck.

Reptile pus is very caseous or thick and somewhat chunky, so it cannot be effectively drained with a needle. Instead, Herbie will need an anesthetic procedure to allow surgical lancing and cleaning out of his abscess.

Along with appropriate antibiotic therapy and continued cleaning at home, Herbie's condition should be entirely curable and return him to his snail-loving self.

Itchy, crusty eyes could be caused by mites on the eyelashes

Q: I seem to always have slightly itchy eyes and my wife tells me I usually have some crustiness in my eyelashes. What should I do?

A: Yours is a very common problem, and very treatable. In the eye care community, we have only in the last few years recognized that many people have an infestation of mites in the eyelash follicles of the eyelids. While this sounds fairly disgusting at first, it is fortunately very treatable.

First, see your eye doctor and explain your symptoms. Because this low grade itchiness and eyelash crustiness is chronic and slow developing, many people do not even realize their eye rubbing or eyelash debris is abnormal. And unfortunately, this eyelash infestation is not

exactly "top of mind" for many eye doctors.

The actual mites causing this are of two different versions, but generically called Demodex. These mites are passed from person to person, and live around the base of the eyelash follicles. While some people also notice a little pinkness or redness along the edge of their eyelids, most patients are largely unaware. In your eye examination, we use an eye specific microscope to examine the mar-

gins of your eyelids and eyelashes, where we can see the evidence of the Demodex mites.

When suspected, we gently remove one or more lashes and examine them under another microscope. In fact, most people are so surprised to learn about their condition, and perhaps disbelieving, that we routinely show the living mites on the lash to the patient! It is a rather shocking image, to say the least.

Treatment involves topical treatment of the eyelashes with a special ophthalmic preparation of turpenol, the active ingredient in tea tree oil. In office, and home treatment may require a few weeks to totally eradicate the mites. And to prevent re-infestation, the patient must discard their pillow, laun-

der the sheets and pillow case in high heat. Lastly, as these commonly are "shared" between spouses, your spouse should be examined as well in the office.

A word of caution, tea tree oil is available over the counter, but in a much too high a concentration for application near the eyes. Do not use that sort of product. While this is a fairly new diagnosis, we are finding patients with this condition every week. And like so many things, the patients initially almost unaware of the low grade irritation, are uniformly more comfortable after successful treatment.

Nissan workers vote on whether to unionize

CANTON, Miss. — Workers at Nissan Motor Co.'s Mississippi assembly plant voted Thursday to decide whether to be represented by the United Auto Workers (UAW) union.

The voting by 3,700 assembly and maintenance workers began before dawn inside the plant. The National Labor Relations Board accepted the secret ballots through 7 p.m. Friday.

On one side are workers who say they need a union to give them a voice in their workplace, to protect against arbitrary treatment and to bargain for better benefits and pay.

Other Nissan employees reject the idea of a union speaking for them. They fear the UAW would be an economic albatross, burdening an employer who pays them well.

Outside analysts assume the union is an underdog, since the UAW has

never fully organized a foreign-owned auto plant in the southern United States. But no one knows for sure.

"The vote will tell us the truth," Bo Green, a Nissan worker who opposes the

union, said.

The UAW's only foothold among these carmakers in the South so far is a local representing maintenance workers at a Volkswagen AG plant in

Chattanooga, Tenn. But globally, Nissan's Canton Vehicle Assembly Plant and two plants in Tennessee are the exceptions — everywhere else in the world, the company's factories have unions.

Gas, diesel ban may be unrealistic

FRANKFURT, Germany — More and more governments are proposing to ban the sale of gasoline and diesel cars by a deadline — 2040, 2030, even 2025.

But how seriously can such deadlines be taken?

The issue of how to phase out polluting traditional engines was pushed to the forefront by scandals and crises. First Volkswagen's admission to cheating on U.S. diesel emissions tests and more recently, a push by cities in Germany and elsewhere to ban diesels to make the air cleaner.

The political desire to switch to get rid of traditional engines, however, runs into a number of hurdles in the real world. More recharging stations need to be set up globally, at a potentially high cost. And millions of jobs depend on the production of internal combustion en-

gines, making the decision politically difficult in many places.

"I think there's a majority, especially in cities, who say 'we need change,'" said Dieter Janecek, a member of Germany's Green party who is campaigning for re-election in the national poll Sept. 24 on his party's official call for an end to new gas and diesel sales by 2030.

He is running not just from anywhere but from Bavaria, home to auto giant BMW.

Yet he thinks the call to phase out traditional engines is a winner. Janecek, 41, said that many people are "skeptical of the internal combustion engine, because they have to live with the consequences and the emissions."

Tax breaks for Foxconn being considered

MADISON, Wis. — Supporters of a planned \$10 billion electronics factory that could bring 13,000 jobs in the largest economic development project in Wisconsin history called it a once-a-generation opportunity during a public hearing Thursday, while critics said the state was being held for ransom.

State lawmakers are moving quickly to approve a \$3 billion tax incentive deal for Foxconn Technology Group, based in Taiwan. The company, the world's largest contract maker of electronics, announced last week that it planned to construct the first liquid crystal display panel factory outside of Asia in southeast Wisconsin. The deal, which Wisconsin leaders and President Donald Trump have heralded as transformational for the state and national economy, requires the state to approve \$3 billion in tax breaks tied to Foxconn hiring and spending, as promised.

Thursday's hearing came just six days after the bill was introduced. Democratic critics, who don't have the votes in the Republican-controlled Legislature to stop it, cautioned that there shouldn't be a vote without a detailed analysis from the nonpartisan Legislative Fiscal Bureau.

"Why do we have to be held ransom for \$3 billion?" Democratic Rep. Amanda Stuck, of Appleton, asked. "Why should they come here with their hand out when there are already reasons to be here?"

Wisconsin's top economic development official Mark Hogan said Wisconsin had to be competitive with other states also trying to land the plant.

Critics raised alarms about other provisions waiving environmental permits and regulations to speed construction of the plant. Foxconn has said it intends to build a campus with 20 million square feet of office space over 1.56 square miles.

But critics question whether Foxconn will follow through, noting that it promised in 2013 to invest \$30 million and hire 500 workers for a new, high-tech factory in Pennsylvania that was never built.

"We cannot let this opportunity pass us by," Scott Neitzel, top aide to Gov. Scott Walker, said.

Foxconn CEO Terry Gou submitted a statement that was read by committee chairman Rep. Adam Neylon. Gou said the project would "transform the American electronics industry."

"Made in America makes sense for Foxconn and our customers and our business partners," Gou said in the statement.

Foxconn hopes to open the plant by 2020 with 3,000 workers that could grow to 13,000 over six years. Walker's administration said there would be 22,000 additional indirect jobs created through the plant's opening, 16,000 of which would be construction-related.

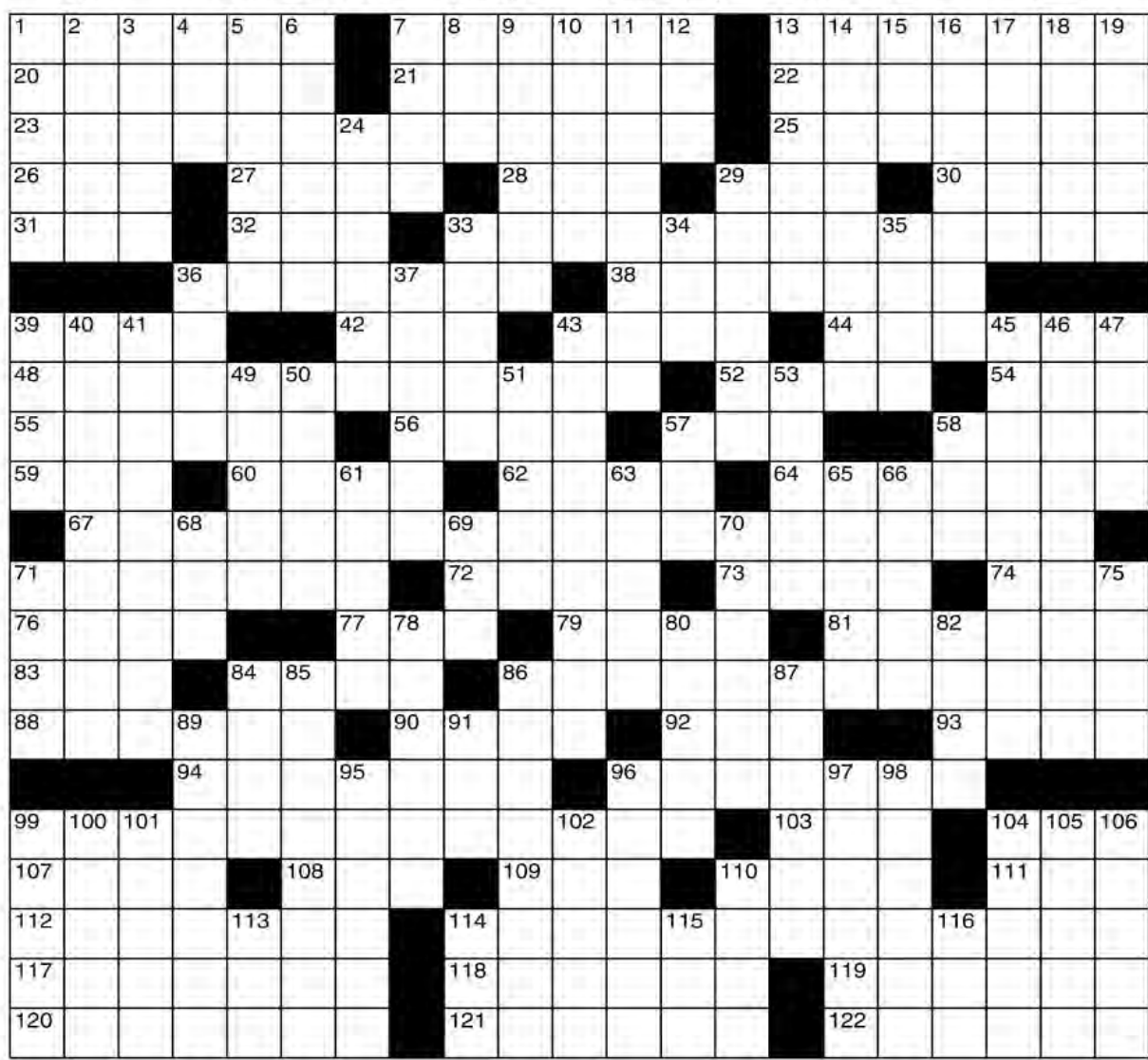

Why is there homework?

Teachers assign homework in order to:

- reinforce what you are taught in school so that the knowledge stays in your mind.
- exercise the brain.
- teach responsibility.
- review things you have already learned so that your skills stay fresh.

Homework is usually related to what you've been learning in school. For example, if you learned fractions in math class, then your homework will probably be to practice problems with fractions.

Making homework easier

Here are some tips to make doing your homework as rewarding as possible.

- Take a short break after school. Get a snack and relax a bit. But do not let yourself

get so interested in doing other activities that it is hard to begin your homework.

- Set up a study pattern that works for you, then stick to it.
- Gather everything you need before you start. Have all your paper, pencils, books and other supplies together at the start.
- Find a comfortable place to study. Some students like to work in the same place each day. Be sure you are not too hot or too cold, and find a place with good lighting. Choose a comfortable place to sit, or lie on the floor or on your bed.
- Turn off the TV. For most kids, television is a big distraction. Don't watch it until your homework is finished.
- If you have a cellphone, put it away. It can distract you while you're trying to study.

Texts, emails and social media pull your attention away from your work and make it hard to focus.

Before you begin studying, silence your phone and leave it in another room. When your work is done, you can reward yourself by checking your phone!

Get organized

Learning to be organized will help you have the tools you need to do your homework well and on time.

- Use a planner. This can be a special book that your teacher gives you or just a spiral notebook. For each subject, write down the details of your homework for the day, including:

1. Textbook page numbers and problem numbers that are assigned;
2. Tools you'll need at home, such as art or math tools or textbooks;
3. When the assignment is due;
4. Special details, such as if the assignment is to be typed or put in a folder.

- Do the most difficult homework first.

If math is your hardest subject, tackle the homework while your mind is fresh. Then move on to your easier subjects.

- Pack your backpack in the evening, after homework.

Don't leave this task until

morning, when you may be in a rush.

- Keep your school subjects organized in folders or sections of a binder.

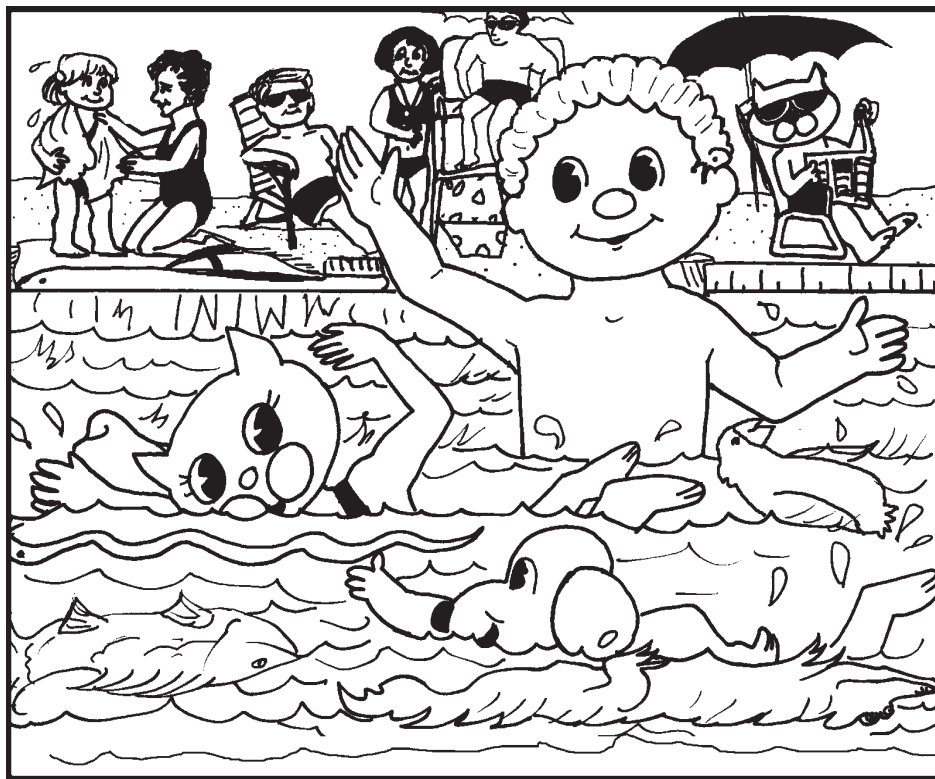

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Living in a homeowners association

THE DIFFERENCE OF OPINION on homeowners associations, or HOAs, depends on several factors, including individual personalities and preferences and the quality of the particular HOA. Rules and dues vary but, in general, homeowners who live in an HOA must abide by its regulations and pay a monthly, quarterly or annual fee that pays for management and maintenance of the community.

HOA benefits

Many homeowners prefer to live in an HOA for several reasons, including:

- **Community appearance:** Homes in an HOA must meet the standards set by the association or face a fine, so you're less likely to see unkempt lawns, peeling paint or a garishly painted house. Some HOAs have a design review board with the power to approve any changes to your home's exterior, and which establishes a color palette for exterior paint and trim.

- **Low maintenance:** Depending on the HOA, services such as trash and snow removal and lawn care may be handled by the association, leaving less work for the homeowner. Typically, common areas are maintained by the association.

- **Recreational amenities:** While not all HOAs have swimming pools and tennis courts, many offer a range of amenities such as a community center, walking trails, sports courts and playing fields reserved for residents.

- **Association management:** If you have a problem with your neighbor's dog barking, loud parties or a dispute over a tree, you can ask the management to handle the issue rather than getting directly into a spat with the homeowner next door.

Living in an HOA

For some buyers, the idea that a management association can tell you when you can put out a decorative flag or that you can't park your truck in front of your property is a deal-breaker. If you have a concern that something that's important to you, such as your ability to run a business from your home, could be banned by HOA rules, then be particularly careful to read all the regulations before you buy a home in such a community.

HOA fees

HOA fees vary as much as HOA regulations and depend on factors such as the amenities in the community and which services are covered by the fees. When you're buying a home, you need to compare HOA fees from one community to another based on what they cover. You may find that the HOA fee includes a gym membership, so you can spend less on a private gym. You should also decide if you'll use the amenities you're paying for, such as tennis courts or a swimming pool. Keep in mind, however, that the presence of these amenities can add to your home's value, even if you don't directly take advantage of them.

Hunting for a house? Better get clicking!

Online tools make it easier than ever

According to the National Association of Realtors, the first step most commonly taken by consumers when buying a home is looking at properties for sale online.

Online realty resources can help potential home buyers feel more comfortable and knowledgeable going into their big decision. Tools like virtual tours, online lenders and digital signatures make it possible to find your dream house and get a loan for it without even leaving your couch.

"In the past, you got an agent, you looked at five or six properties and you kind of debated what you liked about each one," said Jonathan Conner, president of the Morgantown Board of Realtors and a Realtor at J.S. Walker Associates. "Now they can go online, look through what they want to see and make up their minds

before they call a realtor."

Online listing sites such as Zillow and Trulia make it possible to find properties in your area, view the interiors and exteriors of homes, and assess their amenities all at the touch of a button. You can also search for comparative houses in order to figure out a fair price.

"You can search online to compare prices and do your research, and it allows for a very educated consumer. They know what they're getting into and it allows them to feel empowered when they go into this process," said Jessica Kuehn Dunlevy, a Realtor at Century 21.

Not only can you access pictures of houses for sale on listing websites, but you can also take a virtual tour of the property from your computer, smartphone or tablet.

"It's called Matterport 3D tours, and it's basically a 3D mapping software where you

map the entire property," Conner said. "You can go onto any of my listings and click on the virtual tour button, and it'll give you a 3D floor plan of the house and you can go through the house room-to-room."

After exploring the home of your dreams, online lending sites such as Rocket Mortgage and Lending Tree give you the ability to apply for a loan and evaluate rates and terms right at your fingertips.

Though this may be the easiest way to get a loan, not everyone agrees that it's the best option available.

"I would recommend that if a buyer wants to seriously pursue purchasing a home, use a local lender where you can actually go into their office and talk to them," Conner said. "Sometimes with those online lenders, it's really hard to call a person and get your questions answered because it's all an automated mess."

"I always lean towards face-to-face interaction and the ability to communicate with someone from the area who knows the market," Kuehn Dunlevy said.

Technology not only make things smoother for the consumer, but aids realtors as well.

Real estate agencies started using Smart Locks on their properties. These keyless locks are activated by the Bluetooth device in your smartphone and make for a more efficient entry.

Before Smart Locks, realtors had to retrieve the key from the agency possessing it, drive to the property and give the client a tour, then go back to the agency to return the key to the agent. Smart Lock technology eliminates the need for this.

"The lock boxes have saved so much travel time," Kuehn Dunlevy said. For realtors, less traveling means more time to attend to additional clients.

Style at Home: A magical dinner in the courtyard

On lovely summer evenings, the best seat in the house is outside. That's why I entertain al fresco every chance I get when the weather is nice. Today, I want to take you back in time a bit, to the courtyard at my old home in Atchison, Kan., which was one of my favorite places on earth. For one of my spring open houses, we set the back for a beautiful dinner party. The

setting was as delicious as the dinner. I hope it will give you some ideas and inspiration for your own open-air occasion.

When I entertain, I like to set the mood the moment guests enter. Our guests entered the venue from my screened porch. Next to the steps was an iron garden urn. So we turned it into a drinks table, topping it with a silver stand. When you build dramatic stands like this, make sure you anchor the server well or

you'll have a cascade of broken dishes the first time a guest grabs a cup. But it's worth the engineering because multi-level servers pack a lot of visual punch.

The awesome table design was inspired by the centerpiece. Sometimes, we do it the other way, come up with a place setting look we adore, then create the centerpiece to complement it. We had a bevy of fresh plants we wanted to use, so we placed them in a mix of green pots that encircled an

oversized ginger jar. A showy centerpiece like this one is going to make cross-table conversation impossible. But, oh my, does it make your jaw job when you see it.

We let nature set our color scheme for this party, taking our cue from the fresh summer green in my courtyard. The base for each place setting is a summer placemat turned on its end, trailing over the side of the table. This is one of our favorite ways to use place-

mats, giving the look a little edge and allowing more space on the table for additional settings.

To make a place setting more interesting, use a variety of dish patterns, with different shapes and sizes adding to the fun. These leaf majolica plates, with their curled edges, add an interesting structural quality.

When you're entertaining outdoors, lighting is a big part of the party. I didn't have electric lights in my courtyard, so we harnessed the

power of candles. We placed wire lanterns filled with candles on top of iron pillars.

A beauty of entertaining in the garden is that most of the decorating is already done for you. We made the space more magical by hanging votive cups from the branches of the shrubs.

The winking lights suspended from the branches in the dining area made the outdoor room feel like a fairyland. Once the fireflies started up and the cicadas began to hum, it was summer bliss.

Early toy bobble heads were made of painted papier-mache

BOBBLE HEADS ARE POPULAR today as sports collectibles. Most baseball teams offer souvenir bobble-head dolls at some of the games during the year, but today's dolls are made of slick plastic and usually wear fabric uniforms.

Early toy bobble heads were made of painted papier-mache. The head bobs up and down because it is attached to a long-weighted neck that's suspended in the neck's hole. It is balanced on a narrow metal rod that swings back and forth, making the head move. The idea came from 18th-century porcelain figurines that had moving heads and hands.

The major German porcelain factories made complicated nodders. One was a group of four women drinking tea while their heads and hands moved. Another was a 20th-century figure of a woman seated in front of a typewriter. Her hands moved up and down as she typed.

The bobble-head figure pictured here in a lime-green suit and hat is a 5-inch tall smiling Irish Leprechaun nodder. It was made in Germany of a composition material; his glass eye is winking. He's a charming fellow, but St. Patrick's Day collectibles

are not as popular as those for Halloween or Christmas, and there were fewer bids. The buyer paid only \$59.

Q: Is it true that furniture from the U.S. House of Representatives is sometimes sold at auction? Who owns the chair used by each elected official?

A: For many years, there were few rules about the furniture that belonged to the government in the Congressional buildings, the White House or other Federal buildings. It is said that President Lincoln's wife sold some of the furnishings because she needed money to live on, as there was no pension for the wife of a president. Now there are pages of instructions about buying and selling official furnishings. Most pieces have to be paid for by the elected official according to a written schedule. We have seen several Victorian chairs from the House of Representatives sold. They

were made in 1857 by a famous New York firm, Bembe & Kimbel. They featured three stars carved on the chair crest, and carved oak branches representing longevity and laurel for victory on the arms and legs. In 2008, a chair sold for about \$19,000.

Q: Are old Jantzen bathing suits collectible? Sellable?

A: Carl Jantzen and John and Roy Zehntg-bauer started the Portland Knitting Co. in 1910, in Oregon, to make hosiery and sweaters. So when they were asked to make a knit wool bathing suit for a rowing team, they tried. By 1918 their company was called the Jantzen Knitting Mills, and they were making and licensing bathing suits sold all over the world. They made stylish suits that were nationally advertised and promoted swimming events. The diving girl logo was created in 1920. All types of clothing made for sports have become collectible, and many serious fashion collections that started with designer gowns now have a division for sneakers and sports uniforms. A vintage swimsuit could sell for \$25 to \$50.

Q: When I was little, my dad gave me a 3 1/2-inch high teddy bear he got on a trip to Germany. When a knob on the bottom is turned, the head revolves to show two different faces. One side has a stitched nose and mouth and metal eyes.

The other side has googly eyes, a metal nose and a white metal grinning mouth with a red tongue that sticks out. The bear is amber-colored mohair and has movable arms and legs. What can you tell me about it?

A: This little bear was made by Schuco in the 1950s. The company was founded as Schreyer & Co. in 1912 by Heinrich Schreyer. The name was abbreviated to Schuco and used as the company's trademark beginning in 1921. The little bear is called Janus, after the Roman god with two faces. It sells for \$200 to \$450, depending on condition.

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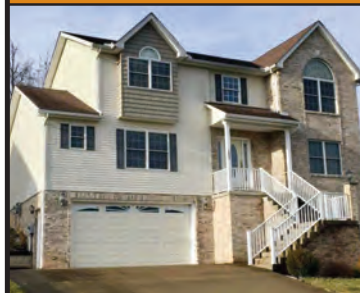

Taupin's ready to saddle up and mosey out

LOS ANGELES — Bernie Taupin, noted lyricist and longtime songwriting partner to Elton John, listed his longtime home in the Santa Ynez Valley for sale at \$4.7 million.

The gated equestrian estate, known as Roundup Valley Ranch, encompasses close to 30 acres. A Mediterranean-style main house, a separate guesthouse/studio and office space share the site with a world-class equestrian center with stables, an outdoor riding ring and a covered arena — a feature now hard to come by because of new building restrictions in the area.

Set on a knoll amid mature oak trees, the main house has a vaulted-ceiling great room that opens to a bar and entertainment area. The chef's kitchen, awash in Jerusalem stone and granite, features an island and a pizza oven. There are five bedrooms and six bathrooms in 5,000 square feet of living space.

French doors lead outdoors to a terrace and swimming pool overlooking the horse facilities and a stream-fed pond.

The guesthouse, originally built as a handball court, serves as an office and art studio. Inside, walls of records and music memorabilia pay homage to Taupin's many hits.

Taupin, 67, has owned the ranch for more than two decades, records show, and has used the property to raise and show horses.

The lyricist and musician penned the words for such songs as "Your Song," "Saturday Night's Alright for Fighting" and "Goodbye Yellow Brick Road." Last year, he and John held a fan contest to celebrate the 50th anniversary of their songwriting partnership.

TV politico makes clandestine move

Actor Kevin Spacey, who plays a conniving politician on the Netflix show "House of Cards," is apparently adept at moving in the shadows. He sold his longtime home in historic Los Feliz in an off-market deal for \$11.25 million.

Although details on the property are scant, tax records show that the 1920s English Tudor sits on more than an acre in the desirable Oaks neighborhood. Its 6,595 square feet of living space includes five bedrooms and four bathrooms.

A circular motor court, an oval-shaped swimming pool, terraces, lawns and mature trees make up the hedged and gated grounds.

Spacey, 57, won Oscars for roles in "The Usual Suspects" (1995) and "American Beauty" (1999). This year the actor appeared in the action film "Baby Driver" and has a role in the upcoming movie "Rebel in the Rye," a biographical drama centered on the life of reclusive author J.D. Salinger.

He bought the property in 1997 for \$2.135 million, records show.

Listing leaves little mystery

Bassist John McVie, of Fleetwood Mac fame, put a home in Brentwood up for sale for \$2.995 million.

Set on a tree-lined cul-de-sac, the Spanish-style house was briefly home to crime novelist-screenwriter Raymond Chandler in the early 1940s. McVie bought the property three years ago for \$2.535 million, 6 percent above the \$2.395-

million asking price.

The 1920s house, with 2,200 square feet of living space and original details, features interior arches, hardwood and tile floors and French doors that open to the grounds. In the living room, decorative tile surrounds the wood-burning fireplace. There are two bedrooms and 2.5 bathrooms.

A newer guesthouse/studio, designed by Lise Claiborne Matthews, sits in a corner of the backyard and features heated concrete floors and walls of glass. Front and rear gardens fill out the 7,440-square-foot property.

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Native cup plant, one stop café for birds, pollinators

When it comes to the backyard wildlife habitat, the cup plant has it all. To me, it is the flag bearer perennial for bees, butterflies, and birds. It is a stalwart native in 34 states from Louisiana north to Canada crossing every border east. Alas however its size is quite imposing. It is big, bold and wonderful, and this is the time of the year it shines the most.

If you are getting interested but are not familiar with the cup plant, it is known botanically as *Silphium perfoliatum* and as I alluded above cold hardy from zones 3-9. It can grow tall, 4 to 10 feet, and colonize, so it is a plant for the back of the border. Here at the Coastal Georgia Botan-

ical Gardens ours are around 7 feet.

Though it may be hard to imagine, they can dwarf a brown-eyed Susan, *Rudbeckia triloba*, or a Brazilian sage, *Salvia guaranitica*, both also considered large plants and terrific partners for the cup plant. Close by, we have the pagoda flower *Clerodendrum paniculatum*, Java glory bower, *Clerodendrum speciosissimum*, as well as Baby Lace, *Hydrangea paniculata*, all of which do their part to bring in hummingbirds, bees, and butterflies.

You may be asking, why it's called a cup plant. This is one of the magical attributes of the plant. As the plant grows, it develops large square stems that give the impression of piercing the center of the

large leaves. It has two leaves without petioles that are attached to the stem, forming a perfect cup to collect rainwater. Small birds like finches take advantage of this natural reservoir of water. These same birds also feed on the seeds as they mature and get ready to disperse.

You'll find the blooms to be covered in what may best be described as a pollinating frenzy. Every kind of bee, including honey bees by the hundreds, bumble bees, and wasps are there doing their thing. A quick glance on a recent morning visit showed eastern tiger swallowtails, long-tailed skippers, fiery skippers and yellow sulphur butterflies. It was like a Serengeti for pollinators. Though I didn't see any, everyone re-

ports hummingbirds on the plants as well.

The nature lover will find this to be one of the most thrilling plants to incorporate in the landscape. Get a chair, a pair of binoculars and a camera, and you are ready for a day of journaling. It will take some attitude adjustment for most gardeners before planting.

First, are you ready to incorporate such a tall, aster-family member into the back of the border? Second, can you accept a col-

onizing racehorse of a plant so to speak? Not only will you have rhizome spread but you will have reseeding. So, in other words, there will be some maintenance to confine to space allotted.

Native plant nurseries sell the plants, but they are also easy to start from seeds. Sow non-stratified seeds in the fall or stratified seeds in the spring. If you want to stratify, moisten coarse sand and seeds in a plastic bag and store in the refrigerator for three months.

Since this plant will be the backbone of your wildlife habitat or pollinator garden choose companions that are not only beautiful but will bring them in too. I've mentioned salvias and brown-eyed Susans, but Joe Pye weeds, milkweeds, and ironweeds na-

tive to your region would partner well.

Other favorites would be anise hyssops like Blue Fortune, Blue Boa, and Black Adder. They would give that complementary sizzle of opposite colors. Lastly, use the cup plant to create mystery in the garden by blocking a view and forming an area of transition.

The cup plant amazingly does it all for both wildlife and pollinators all the while showing out with dazzling 3 1/2-inch yellow blossoms. You have to agree that is pretty doggone special.

Gardening tips, chores for August

It's August, and the tomatoes are finally ripening on the vine, the perennials are rampant and, surprisingly, my spring pansies are still holding on. Weeds, too, are digging their heels in, a constant reminder that the garden doesn't ever go on autopilot, even if it appears that way. Here are some tips and chores to ensure the garden doesn't look tired by month's end.

1. Resist the urge to let zucchini grow big; they're tastier and more tender if picked when small.
2. Sanitation is important for a healthy garden:

Clean up fallen fruit from around trees to prevent pest infestations.

3. To help avoid heat wilt, mist leaves of hybrid tea roses with liquid seaweed.

4. For best flavor, harvest herbs in midmorning just after the dew has dried.

5. If you need to relocate evergreens, it's safe to do so from now through October.

6. When watering the lawn, remember: Less frequent deep waterings trump daily sprinkles on established turf.

7. For a second harvest this fall, plant cool-season crops like lettuce, radishes, spinach and peas now.

8. Keep mower blades set to 3 or more inches. Grass blades are leaves, which

need to photosynthesize; cut them too short and they'll stress.

9. No need to panic if your evergreens' innermost branches begin to brown. It's normal for older branches to shed this time of year.

10. Re-edge beds to give a fading garden a face-lift.

11. Harvest rose hips for tea or jam — as long as you haven't sprayed your plants.

12. Transplant spring-flowering bulbs that are crowded or needed elsewhere in the garden.

13. Turn off pond pumps when electrical storms are in the forecast.

14. If cabbage heads split, harvest immediately or they'll become inedible.

15. Monitor moisture levels in containers often; potted plants may need to be watered twice a day.

16. Harvest onions when their tops flop over, but let them cure in the sun for a few days before storing indoors.

17. Want free plants next year? Take cuttings of geraniums and wax begonias, and root indoors now. Then care for them as houseplants until spring.

18. Harvest beets when 2 inches wide. You can saute and eat the leaves, too (this is not the case for tomatoes or carrots.)

19. Order spring bulbs now, before the best ones sell out. They'll be shipped in time for fall planting.

Appeal and Practicality

New Honda Civic Hatchback Offers Fresh Styling, Logical Packaging

When automakers send a car to journalists for a test drive, they typically provide one of the highest priced, loaded-up trim levels.

Part of the reason is to show off the latest gadgets and gizmos, sure, but I think there's a sneakier rationale at play. I call it option bribery. If you coddle writers in enough leather and car toys, they're less likely to write mean things about you.

That's why the subject of this week's review, the Honda Civic Hatchback, is a bit surprising. Instead of sending me a fancy-pants Sport Touring model with a thumping 540-watt stereo and lots of touch-screen doodads, Honda dropped off the kind of Civic people are much more likely to actually buy: the basic Sport trim priced around \$22,000.

And a model like this explains why the Civic remains a perennial hot seller. It's not about the gizmos. It's not about the luxuries.

It's about the raw appeal and practicality, two things this car has in abundance.

On the emotional side, this new generation Civic steals your heart with a more striking body than before, particularly in the hatchback version with its dramatic side swoops, in-your-face grille and ultramodern back end. It looks like

the kind of car you want to drive, not the kind your budget forces you to drive.

The appeal spills over into the way it handles, too.

The Civic has always been a spirited car, one that feels more firm and connected to the road than its arch nemesis from Japan, the Toyota Corolla. That continues with this generation.

With a manual transmission, especially, the Civic is a blast to drive. While it sends power to the front wheels — not normally ideal for a sporty car — the steering, suspension and throttle all work in harmony to deliver an engaging, responsive sensation to the driver.

All the hatchback models are equipped with a 1.5-liter turbocharged engine that adds to its spirited feel. It makes 174 horsepower in the LX, EX and EX-L models, while Sport and Sport Touring trims crank out 180 horses thanks to their spectacular sounding dual exhaust systems.

There are a lot of little, logical things I like about it, too.

It has ample storage for a compact car, with smartly placed bins and nooks for stashing your stuff. There's a decent amount of cargo space in back, rivaling some small crossovers. And Honda always seems to get the small details right, like gauges that look crisp and sporty with red accents and good lighting at night.

One downside: The manual transmission that I love so much in my \$22,000 tester isn't available on the high-end trims. If you want a fancier flavor with the best transmission, you're out of luck, unfortunately.

Also, the same things I see as strengths — the firm ride, the aggressive exhaust note, the unusual styling — could be negatives depending on the kind of car you're looking for. If you want to anonymously blend in and waft down the highway in buttery silence, this isn't the best fit.

From a technology standpoint, the Civic checks all the right boxes for a 2017 vehicle, including an available suite of driving enhancements called Honda Sensing to help

avoid collisions and make trips more relaxing. I'm a big fan of the adaptive cruise control and lane keeping features that combine to make it feel almost like an autonomous vehicle when on a well-marked highway.

I'm also glad Honda offers this package on the base LX model for a \$1,000 premium, not only on the more luxury oriented trims.

Pricing starts at \$19,700 for the LX hatchback with a manual gearbox or \$20,500 with a continuously variable transmission. It tops out at \$28,300 for the Sport Touring trim before adding options.

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2014 JAGUAR F-TYPE

Jag returns to sports-car roots

PRESS RELEASE

The new Jaguar F-TYPE represents a return to the company's heart: a two-seat, convertible sports car focused on performance, agility and driver involvement. The F-TYPE is a continuation of a sporting bloodline that stretches back more than 75 years and encompasses some of the most beautiful, thrilling and desirable sports cars ever built. Joining the XK convertible and coupe models, the new F-TYPE provides Jaguar with a broader line of sports and GT models.

The Jaguar F-TYPE combines low vehicle weight (starting at 3,521 pounds), high power (340hp, 380hp and 495hp versions) and superb aerodynamics to achieve a pure sports car experience, yet with Jaguar elegance and luxury.

A true two-seat sports car, the all-new Jaguar F-TYPE is equipped with a modern, lightweight soft top that, when lowered, serves as its own tonneau cover. This not only provides a weight savings, but also improves packaging and contributes to the car's low center of gravity for greater agility. The top can be fully raised or lowered in just 12 seconds at speeds of up to 30 mph. Its multi-layer construction includes a Thinsulate lining for opti-

mal thermal and sound-insulating properties.

DESIGN

Jaguar cars have always defined sinuous, muscular elegance, and the F-TYPE continues -- and advances -- this tradition with new, assertive design language. Two "heartlines" define, in just two bold strokes, both the profile and top-down view of the F-TYPE. The main "heartline" theme begins in the blade dissecting the shark-like gills on

either side of the grille. This first heartline runs up and forms the sharp top crease of the fender line, which provides sight lines that aid the driver in cornering maneuvers. It leads the eye along the top of the front fender, which is emphasized by the headlamp design, and then into the door and toward the rear of the car where it gracefully disappears.

This sweeping line is mirrored by the feature line that runs back from the side vent. Along with "light-

catcher" surface detailing above the sill, the line instills a sense of speed to the car. The lightcatcher surface detailing also allows the door surface to wrap around the side of the car, creating a fuselage effect.

The second "heartline" swells out to form the muscular rear haunch before sweeping dramatically around the rear of the car. The clean, sleek lines of the tail are made possible in part by the inclusion of an active rear spoiler that deploys at speed to reduce

aerodynamic lift.

ALUMINUM STRUCTURE

Jaguar, which has innovated the use of aluminum body structures, built the new F-TYPE around its most advanced rigid and lightweight aluminum architecture to date. Jaguar engineers applied more than a decade's worth of aluminum construction experience to achieve the twin goals for the F-TYPE of

low mass and an extremely rigid body.

Aluminum construction, including all-aluminum double wishbone front and rear suspensions, helps endow the F-TYPE with an ideal balance, which enhances the agility demanded of a pure sports car.

POWER

The F-TYPE showcases the new supercharged Jaguar engines, a 3-liter supercharged V6 in 340hp and 380hp states of tune and the 5-liter supercharged V8 in the F-TYPE V8 S with 495hp and 460 ft-lbs of torque. All are equipped with the new Intelligent Stop/Start system to enhance fuel economy under certain driving conditions.

The 340hp version of the supercharged V6, which debuted in the 2013 XJ and XF sedans, produces 332 ft-lbs of torque at 3,500-5,500 rpm. The 380hp version, exclusive to the F-TYPE, produces 339 ft-lbs of torque at 3,500-5,500 rpm. The V8 produces an even broader torque curve, with 460 ft-lbs produced over the 2,500-5,500 rpm range.

The new Intelligent Stop/Start system offers fuel economy benefits under certain urban driving conditions.

High octane recommendations causing confusion

Q: I drive a 2001 Lexus LS430 with 58,567 miles. The vehicle manual says I should use gasoline with an octane of 96 or higher. I cannot find an octane that high. Any suggestions?

— J.S.

Fort Lauderdale, Fla.

A: The LS430 owner's manual states: "Only unleaded, 91 octane (research octane number 96) or higher." In the United States, the octane number displayed on the pump is not the same as the research octane number. Instead, pump octane is the average number derived from the research octane number plus the motor octane num-

ber divided by two (R+M/2, which is also called the anti-knock index). Outside the USA, Canada and a few other countries, RON (research octane number) is the standard used.

Q: Toyota was one of the first to adopt daytime running lights to all its cars. But I'm wondering, how come I see more and more newer Toyota cars without DRLs? What's

happening?

— A.K., Skokie, Ill.

A: Toyota is not the only carmaker that provides the option of turning off the DRLs, but the company does make it easy enough to unintentionally turn them off. For example, the 2016 Corolla comes with three different switch types, two of which offer a "DRL OFF" option. When you turn the end of the lever to the "DRL OFF" position, your daytime running lights will be off. By the way, if you choose this setting, the automatic "headlight on" feature also will quit working.

Q: Thank you for answering the question about the price difference

between grades of gasoline. Please go further and address the regional differences. In Chicago, it's often \$1, twice as much as the 50 cent average nationwide between economy and premium.

— D.B., Chicago

A: When we checked the AAA gas price website (gasprices.aaa.com) on July 17 (when we were writing this column), the average prices in Illinois were \$2.295 for regular, \$2.656 for midgrade and \$3.038 for premium gas. The prices in major cities are often higher than the state average due to the requirement for lower emis-

sions-producing fuels. We have a hunch that market factors may contribute to higher prices in areas where dealers have higher operating expenses. By the way, expect premium prices to keep going up as demand increases for turbocharged engines.

Q: I have a 2007 Hyundai Sonata with just under 37,000 miles. While the electronic stability control warning light is normally off, at very irregular intervals, the light will go on. If I stop the engine and restart it, the light usually stays off. I was told that it is not a safety hazard unless I

should make a sudden turn at highway speeds in a rainstorm, which is very unlikely. Do you agree?

— W.C.

Boca Raton, Fla.

A: We have been driving long enough to have had many cars that did not have electronic stability control. If it should fail, your car will behave just like all of those old ones we owned. But ESC can be beneficial at other times, so we would get it fixed.

UNDER THE HOOD

Watch transmission temperature when hauling a trailer

Q: My wife and I took the plunge and bought a fifth-wheel trailer and a truck to tow it. Everything was supposedly chosen to work seamlessly together and, so far, it tows great. My question is about the transmission temperature gauge. I've never had one before and wonder what to look for when towing.

— Kirk M.

A: Sounds like a lot of fun! The added weight and drag of your trailer will increase transmission temperature, especially in hilly terrain. Normal transmission fluid temperature is 160-175 degrees. It might rise as high as 200-220 degrees under demanding conditions but hopefully it won't go any higher.

Transmission fluid degrades rapidly at higher temperatures. Cooked fluid and high operating temperature are transmission killers.

If you are ascending steep grades and find the transmission fluid temperature exceeding 220 degrees, I'd consider pulling over and enjoying at least a half hour of relaxation with the engine idling and transmission in park. Also know that downhill stretches will cool the transmission more quickly

than being parked or idling.

Automatic transmissions typically employ a liquid transmission cooler within the engine-cooling system radiator. This allows engine heat to bring the transmission temperature up to the correct range quickly and then does a fairly good job of maintaining fluid temperature under moderate towing conditions. Depending on your truck's powertrain options, there's a good chance it may be equipped with an auxiliary transmission cooler (a finned rectangular device mounted in front of the radiator/air conditioning condenser). If not, you may want to consider adding one.

If you find the transmission frequently working at

temperatures higher than desired, a larger auxiliary cooler, with fan, and perhaps a deep sump transmission oil pan (adds about three quarts to fluid capacity) may help. Adding a drain plug to the oil pan — if it doesn't already have one — and doing at least a partial fluid change every 15,000 miles can't hurt (about a third of the fluid drains out through the pan).

There's a good chance your truck is equipped with a tow-haul feature. Using it in hilly terrain will ease strain on the engine and transmission, as the software orders quicker downshifts, holds gears longer, allows differing operating characteristics of the torque converter clutch,

and enhances engine braking on downgrades or when slowing. Tow-haul does decrease fuel economy a bit, so you may find it's best left off unless conditions warrant its use.

On a personal note: We're packing up to make our 11th Alaska-to-California trip, a 3,800-mile trek that's become an annual tradition. Lots of planning and inspections are needed when you're crossing the Yukon Territory, in which you're often 500 or so miles from a suitable repair facility or place to buy supplies.

We drive about 10 hours and typically spend each night at a gravel pit. Might seem odd, but these sites

make great camp spots giving their wide availability, great views and lack of bugs. Through our travels, we've also learned about wonderful spots near magnificent rivers and lakes. Canadian provincial parks are also great as long as you watch out for wet paint on the meticulously maintained structures.

The days of mud bogs, two spare tires and broken windshields are largely over. Yukon gravel, for the most part, is preferable to California pavement.

Several unusual features await driver in Tesla's Model 3

SAN FRANCISCO — The Model 3, Tesla's mid-market all-electric sedan, officially launched in late July, includes unusual features.

Such as no gauges on the dashboard: no speedometer, no tach, no mileage readouts, no sound system controls. Not a single button, lever or dial.

Every bit of information that would reside on the dash — in any normal car

— and almost all the user inputs are gathered on a single 15-inch touchscreen mounted up front between the driver's and passenger's seats. The rest of the dashboard is bare.

Some might find that minimalist setup to be cutting-edge cool. Some might find it too barren for a car that, fully loaded, costs \$60,000. Some might find the touchscreen crowded and confusing. Others will see the new instrument

panel as reflective of the way they lead the rest of their digital lives.

The marketplace, ultimately, will judge just how effective the new layout is.

Each Model 3 comes equipped with eight cameras, a radar unit and 12 ultrasonic sensors.

Triggering the software to make Enhanced Autopilot driver-assist technology work costs \$5,000 on top of the base price of \$35,000. That includes adaptive cruise con-

trol, automatic lane changes, automatic freeway exit and self-parking.

Full self-driving software can be flipped on for another \$3,000. The feature is not currently available. The company calls it a "future" option. The timing depends in large part on laws that would allow such cars on the highway. Congress is considering legislation that would allow autonomous cars on the road, superceding state laws that ban

them, or, as in California, allow them but with numerous restrictions.

The feature is also "dependent upon extensive software validation," Tesla said.

For another \$5,000, a "premium upgrade package" includes a glass roof, which adds more light to the cabin along with a feeling of spaciousness. Tesla says the roof includes "ultraviolet and infrared protection" in a nod to potential buyers concerned about

too much heat or heightened risk of skin cancer.

The base model includes Wi-Fi and LTE connectivity with internet streaming radio. The same \$5,000 package that includes the glass roof also buys a higher-quality sound system. A new music streaming service that Elon Musk said Tesla will create to compete with Apple and Spotify doesn't exist yet, but would surely be available in all Tesla vehicles.

First, get yourself a real job

Dear Dave, I have student loans in deferment from earning a degree in hospitality management. My career goal is to own a mobile food vending company, so I'm putting most of the money I make from eBay and ride-hailing services — around \$1,000 a month — aside in savings for that. Should I forego my business idea for the time being, and knock out the student loan debt instead?

— Nicholas

Dear Nicholas, You should put this business idea on hold for now, unless you can start it for less than \$1,000. The first thing you need to do is go out and get a real job. I know you have this dream of being self-employed, but right now you're not doing so well as an entrepreneur.

With a hospitality degree, you can make \$30,000 to \$50,000 a year within the industry, clean up your mess and build out the eBay thing on the side. Just think about how quickly you could save up money for a jump into the food truck or mobile food business then!

Pay your way through it, Nicholas. Don't sit around scraping by on the kind of money you're making now and call that winning. You have a real economic engine at your fingertips, because you have the knowledge from the degree you earned. And it's a valuable degree. If you go in there and bust it, you can escalate yourself upward through that industry in a hurry.

While you're doing that, you can clean up all your student loans and save up money for your food truck. Boom! You're self-employed and you learned a lot of stuff you can use in your new business. Go make some real money, then follow your dream.

A bad move

Dear Dave, I have a whole life insurance policy with zero cash value due to loans I took out per the advice of my agent. I finally realized this wasn't a smart move, as I now owe premiums plus interest every year. Am I still on the hook for the policy loans if I forfeit the policy to buy term insurance?

— Tanner

Dear Tanner, No, you are not. Get your term insurance in place first, then when you cancel the policy, your cash value will offset your loans.

They won't lend you more than your cash value. It's seldom that they will loan you 100 percent of cash value, so you might actually have a cash value that is above your loan amount. If they have loaned you the full amount of your cash value, it'll be an exact break even, and just canceling the policy means you cancel the interest and cancel the premiums.

It was bad advice to buy the policy, and even dumber advice to clean the whole thing out and sit there paying interest to borrow your own money and pay a premium to keep the loan open.

I recommend 10 to 12 times your income on a 15- or 20-year level term policy. During that 15 or 20 years, you should be getting out of debt and building wealth so that you have a big pile of money and no need for life insurance.

Employers still have us covered

Workplace-based health insurance set to stay awhile

WASHINGTON — Get your insurance through your employer? The ongoing political turmoil around “Obamacare” all but guarantees you'll still be able to do that.

Ask Walt Rowen, whose business is etching glass but whose experience managing century-old, family-owned Susquehanna Glass makes him something of an expert on health care. He's provided coverage to employees, then canceled it, steering them to the health insurance exchange. But with those premiums rising, Rowen this year is again covering his 70 or so workers under the umbrella of employer-sponsored health insurance.

Employer-provided health insurance is so ingrained in the American workplace that people expect it to continue even as politicians thrash out the role of government in health care. That's according to polling, business owners and consumers. And in a nearly saturated labor market, employers don't want to give workers a reason to work somewhere else.

“I think a company — any size company — would be incredibly afraid to just cancel its insurance policy and say the hell with it,” said Rowen, whose company is located in Columbia, Pa. He said that could result in employees fleeing, especially in states where the Affordable Care Act insurance markets are weak.

With the GOP crusade to repeal and replace “Obamacare” failing, the federal mandates that people have insurance and that employers with more than 50 workers provide it seem likely to stay in place in the foreseeable future. The Trump administration on Tuesday pledged to keep working with Congress on a rewrite. “Obamacare's mandates saddled many with health care costs they simply couldn't afford,” said White House spokeswoman Sarah Huckabee Sanders.

For now, the Trump administration is considering whether or not to continue paying the law's cost-sharing subsidies, which have helped lower premiums. Without those subsidies, it's estimated that premiums will rise and insurers will leave markets.

The ACA requires companies with 50 or more full-time employees to provide insurance to employees and their dependents. The Kaiser Family Foundation says

nearly 96 percent of companies of that size already were offering coverage before the law took effect in 2014. Nearly 35 percent of companies with fewer than 50 workers also were offering insurance.

Removing the employer mandate wouldn't sit well with a wide swath of the American public.

A poll by The Associated Press-NORC Center for Public Affairs Research says 61 percent oppose revoking the requirement, including 58 percent of Republicans.

Workers have been getting their health insurance through their employers for decades, since the U.S. government exempted employer-paid health benefits from wage controls and income tax during World War II.

Nearly 90 percent of workers are in companies that provide health benefits, according to the Kaiser Family Foundation/HRET annual survey in 2016. Taking into account dependents, roughly half of Americans are covered by employer-based insurance.

Large companies “need to attract and retain employees and they'd be at a competitive disadvantage if they stopped offering health benefits,” said William Kramer, executive director for national health policy for the Pacific Business Group on Health.

As a result, human resource consultants say it's likely that businesses will remain committed to offering coverage. Some experts question whether the ACA's employer mandate makes much, if any, difference when there's a solid business case for providing health care: With unemployment low and the labor market tight, benefits give employers an advantage in recruiting and retaining the best workers.

“What kind of message are you giving to employees if you say, ‘I'm going to take this away?’ Are you really willing to risk losing people?” asked David Lewis, CEO of OperationsInc., based in Norwalk, Conn.

Even if the employer mandate had been repealed, the Congressional Budget Office estimated that larger companies would have

been hard-pressed to cancel their health benefits, although some smaller firms would have done so.

“As soon as you take it back, you cause massive employee dissatisfaction,” said Jay Starkman, CEO of Engage PEO, a human resources provider whose clients include many small and mid-sized businesses.

Rowen, the glass business owner, says his health insurance decisions had less to do with the employer mandate than with cost and employee retention.

In the four years before the ACA took effect, Susquehanna Glass had fewer than 50 employees and saw its premiums rise between 15 percent and 20 percent a

year. “We were fiddling all the time trying to keep our health care costs for our employees as affordable as possible,” Rowen recalled.

He hired an expert to help his employees find insurance on the exchange in Pennsylvania. Lower-paid employees qualified for subsidies, while higher-paid workers could afford plans or went on their spouses' plans, he said.

In some cases, Rowen gave bonuses or raises to help workers afford insurance.

He says he owed a penalty of about \$40,000 for not providing insurance — less than the six figures he thinks he would have paid to provide group insurance.

But by 2016, he said, his workers were complaining that their premiums were increasing. Susquehanna Glass by that time had grown to about 70 employees — enough to qualify for less-expensive group plans joined by medium-sized businesses.

Many of his new employees were younger and less expensive to insure. He found that purchasing group health insurance would cost just over \$100,000 — not as much as he'd feared.

“If they were not able to get an affordable one with me and they found another company that does offer one,” he says, “They might be forced to make the decision to leave me.”



Oklahoma City-area quakes prompt new probe

Seismic activity results in power outage for some

EDMOND, Okla. — Utility regulators and geologists said Thursday they suspect a series of earthquakes in the Oklahoma City metro area — home to about a third of Oklahoma's population — which knocked out electricity to some residents in the wealthy suburb of Edmond, were caused by nearby disposal of wastewater from oil and gas production.

The quakes started Tuesday and continued into Thursday, with at least seven of magnitude 3.0 or stronger being recorded in an area about 4 miles northeast of Edmond — about 15 miles northeast of Oklahoma City. The largest, a magnitude 4.2 temblor, hit Wednesday night.

No injuries or significant damage has been reported, although two Edmond Electric substations were knocked offline Wednesday, leaving about

1,900 customers without power for about an hour.

The Oklahoma Corporation Commission, which regulates utilities, said Thursday that the most likely cause is the injection of wastewater from oil and natural gas production into disposal wells in the area known as the Arbuckle formation, although there is a fault line in the area.

“We are looking at this as an Arbuckle well issue, even though there are no Arbuckle disposal wells right there on that fault,” commission spokesman Matt Skinner said.

Jacob Walter, the Oklahoma state seismologist, noted that there are injection wells within 6 miles of where the quakes struck.

“It may be a case that this fault has been activated by past injections,” Walter said. “Even if you stopped wastewater injection in Oklahoma tomorrow, we would still see seismicity for a number of years ... earthquakes beget other earthquakes.”

Heather Warlick, an Edmond resident, said she could see her ceiling fan shaking when the Wednes-



day night temblor hit.

“I'm from San Diego and I'm kind of used to earthquakes,” said Warlick, who has lived in Oklahoma for several years. “But when you get them here, and it's strong like that, it's different.”

The power outage in Edmond was due to vibrations causing a safety switch to shut down electric circuits to two substations, said Edmond Electric spokesman Casey Moore, and is the third time in the last 18 months an outage has occurred be-

cause of an earthquake.

One substation is less than a half mile from where the quake struck and the other less than two miles away, Moore said.

Scientists have linked a dramatic increase in quakes in Oklahoma, Kansas and Texas in recent years to the underground disposal of wastewater from oil-and-gas production.

Oklahoma experienced a few dozen earthquakes of a magnitude of 3.0 or great in 2012, and got more than 900 in 2015. After state reg-

ulators ordered oil and natural gas producers to close some injection wells or reduce the volume of the fluids they inject, the number dropped to closer to 600 in 2016.

Many of the quakes occurred in north-central and northwestern Oklahoma, with the state's largest-ever recorded earthquake in September when a 5.8-magnitude temblor hit Pawnee, about 90 miles northeast of Oklahoma City. That quake damaged buildings across the community of about 2,200 residents. The sandstone facade of some buildings fell, several others were cracked and one man suffered a minor head injury when part of a fireplace fell on him.

Walter said that earthquake occurred along a different fault from the one on which the latest quakes struck. The tremors are expected to continue across the state, he said.

“The seismic hazard remains high in Oklahoma, despite in the first half of 2017 the seismic activity has gone down,” Walter said.

Badmouthing your boss rarely wise

Mining new connection to customer

Q: I've been assigned to develop a strategy for reaching out to new groups of potential customers. I'm really excited about this assignment but also unsure about how to proceed. We're a small company and don't have someone who specializes in this type of project.

— Syd, 35
product manager

A: Bring curiosity and an open mind to this project in order to find a fresh approach for your new market. Then focus on learning about your potential new customers, developing options and testing your approach. After that, you are on track for a wider rollout.

Start by learning. Let's say, for example, you are offering a service for new parents. What do you already know about the market for this service?

You need to know many things that are readily obtained: for example, their age, race, income, education, etc. The Census can help you here. You also need to understand your competition in terms of their current options are, what they like about them, where they fall short, and so on.

Test your assumptions. When you think "new parents," do you assume, for example, a two-parent family? Do you assume one mom and one dad? Are you thinking across ethnic and racial groups? Are you considering individual differences such as risk aversion, or structural differences such as the strength of personal network? It's easy to think about people like yourself, but to be successful with your task, you need to extend your point of view as widely as possible.

Once you have developed a list of groups, learn about them. You don't need a big budget to do this, but you do need creativity and time. For example, get magazines that are geared to different audiences. Visit online communities and info sources that target specific groups.

Go to places where the people you are interested in hang out. Try parks, playgrounds, stores, family friendly restaurants, or other new parent venues in a variety of communities. Talk to people to find out what's important to them, getting to know them outside of the context of your company and your products.

Recognize that you may hear information that is very new to you. Some of the information may be uncomfortable to hear, especially if it challenging some of your underlying assumptions. If you are serious about your company making it into a new realm, you need to cope with that and truly listen and accept what you are hearing.

Then go back to your company and tell stories. Bring these potential customers and their dreams, visions and concerns to life. At that point you can consider which groups you want to reach out to, and what you have to offer them.

This is not a "one and done" process. As you generate options for products, services, or outreach, take them back to members of your target group for more feedback. Be transparent about their contributions so that they know you're listening.

Next, pilot your new offering, especially if a hefty investment is going to be needed for a full rollout.

Test and learn your way through this process; even if a specific initiative doesn't work out, you set yourselves up for rich learning and long term success.

Q: One of my co-workers recently became my supervisor. "Amanda" is great at managing tasks and projects but she has no interpersonal skills whatsoever. She tells jokes about people that aren't funny and she can be very rude.

I made the mistake of venting about this to a trusted colleague who shared my comments with Amanda's boss. Although he hasn't contacted me, he did ask another employee whether she had any problems with Amanda. She told him no because she didn't want to hurt her chances of being promoted.

Amanda obviously heard about my complaints because she has started calling me a troublemaker. I really enjoy my job, but I don't like my supervisor. What should I do now?

A: Amanda's abrasive personality cannot have come as a complete surprise. Having worked with her before, you undoubtedly

edly knew what to expect when you heard she'd been promoted. And even though she could clearly use some leadership training, her communication style sounds more brusque than abusive.

Fortunately, this experience seems to have taught you two valuable lessons. "Trusted colleagues" are not necessarily trustworthy, and "venting" about your boss is always a huge mistake. When complaints about management wind up on the office grapevine, unwelcome consequences frequently follow.

Perhaps you should take a cue from your more cautious co-worker. She apparently realized that criticizing Amanda would automatically imply that the person who recently promoted her had poor

judgment. So she made the politically intelligent decision to keep her complaints to herself.

Given that you like your job, your best bet now is to try adjusting to Amanda's less-than-perfect leadership style. If you begin acting like an ally instead of an adversary, your relationship with her may improve, and her flaws might become more tolerable.

Q: A few employees of my business were unhappy with their work schedule, so I gave out a survey asking people to select either the early shift or the late shift. Unfortunately, almost everyone wanted the earlier time.

Because the survey didn't help, I let people choose based on seniority, but now the junior employees are angry. Our job application asks people whether they can work outside the typical 8-to-5 workday, so I don't see why they're upset. What do you think about this?

A: Frankly, I think

you've done a poor job of establishing expectations. Instead of making a vague inquiry about atypical work hours, you should clearly define shift times on your application. And if shifts may vary, applicants need to know before coming on board.

I also have to wonder why you chose to do a survey. As employee preferences and shift requirements were unlikely to be a perfect match, that was a recipe for discontent. While a seniority system won't make everyone happy, at least it's an objective, time-tested method for making such decisions.

The big question, however, is why you are doing this at all. If business needs have changed, that would be a valid reason. But making wholesale reassignments because of a few complainers doesn't seem to make much sense.

Uncool and classy ways to quit a job

"TAKE THIS JOB AND SHOVE IT" may make for good lyrics, but it's not the best thing to say when quitting a job.

According to U.S. Labor Department data, the last time the share of employees who voluntarily left their jobs was higher than it is now was 2005.

High quit rates generally indicate strong labor markets for workers. People tend to hold on to jobs if they don't think there's anything better, or anything at all, out there for them. When they perceive opportunities, they're more likely to jump ship.

Therefore, this: There are classy ways to leave and ways that can haunt you down the road.

Even with a strong job market, where help wanted signs abound, it's still wise to have another job in hand before you quit. That's not always possible, but it eases possible financial stress between jobs.

It's also wise to have a thoughtful reason for walking out the door. A decent increase in base pay. A better employee benefits package. An easier commute. Work hours that better fit your family or lifestyle. All the pros and cons should be analyzed before assuming other grass is greener.

Once you've made the decision to go, watch your mouth. Take care about what you type on social media. Your words will leave an impression.

Even if you work for the most tyrannical or ignorant boss imaginable, don't vent. That boss may be contacted by your target employer and totally sink your chances by badmouthing you in return. It happens.

Don't dump on individuals, whether they're supervisors or co-workers. In the digital world, no message, even to your best friend, is secure.

Anything can be forwarded beyond the circle that you intended.

After you've left an organization, what you say about it — even if it's absolutely true — says something to future employers. They may label you as a disloyal employee or a problem child who might never be happy. That could be right; one can't give everyone the benefit of the doubt.

To be safe, it's better to stay mum or neutral in any sort of public pronouncements about your former employer.

And a bit about how to quit: Try to give your current employer some warning before your last day. Many people think two weeks notice is a legal requirement. It's not.

It's a courtesy. It costs organizations time and money to replace you, assuming your job continues after you leave.

It's good practice to inform your immediate boss first and privately. Then let your co-workers know. They may have a rough time assuming your duties until the position is refilled. Say you've enjoyed working with them and thank them for the work they'll take on in the transition.

If you're not at the jump point yet but you're seriously thinking about it, make a list of "stay" or "go" reasons. Understand what bugs you and what, exactly, you want to do.

Vague unhappiness won't help your search for something else. Neither will a change for a few cents more an hour if the same work conditions apply. Be clear about your goals. And be careful about what you say before or after you leave.

Leap to Freelancing

You might have thought about it: taking the leap and quitting your 9-to-5 to freelance, consult or start your own business. There are some very real struggles — such as learning to live on a less-than-dependable regular income — but the rewards are deep if you love what you do.

Think about how you will transition from your current position to a new position, and actually write it down. It might sound dull, but putting the words on paper can help you feel the full weight of the decision.

Before you jump in head first, take the following necessary steps to build a solid professional foundation and avoid feeling sore from a very hard fall.

CREATE A FINANCIAL PLAN

When you transition from a full-time job to freelancing, you are essentially starting a business. You will quickly learn that taxes are a pain when you are a freelancer. There are things you can do to make it as easy on yourself as possible.

For example, set up a separate checking account, savings account and credit line solely for business expenses. This makes it easier to track expenses for tax purposes.

BUILD YOUR PROFESSIONAL NETWORK

Networking is an invaluable professional skill — especially when you are a one-person show. Take the necessary steps to get your face and work out there in front of other people.



This means crafting and updating your social media channels, such as LinkedIn, but it also means setting up lunches, attending professional mixers and perfecting

your "elevator pitch" — being able to sell yourself in just a few minutes — so that you come off relaxed and confident.

WORK "DOUBLE"

In order to perform the above previous three steps, you will inevitably need to begin freelancing before you leave your full-time position.

It will take time to begin earning a livable wage from freelancing alone, so you will need to work incredibly hard and boost your savings before taking the leap.

Employee smells rat in ban on fragrances

DEAR CARRIE: I have worked in the same multistory building for years. About 50 employees work in my area. Recently, a few colleagues announced that they are sensitive to certain fragrances and complained to management about their use in the office. The majority of employees, including myself, have not noticed any strong fragrances. But prompted by the complaints, the supervisors, human-resource and the legal departments called a joint meeting with the staff and announced that, effective immediately, our area of the building will be fragrance free. So none of the staff is permitted to wear cologne, perfume, aftershave or scented versions of lotions, hair products, deodorant and talcum powder. Is this legal and, if so, is the company obligated to purchase the fragrance-free items it insists we use?

— Smells Fishy

DEAR SMELLS FISHY: Even though the policy is broad, it's probably legal, a workplace law expert said.

"Employers can make any work rule they want as

long as it isn't discriminatory," said Lewis Maltby, president and founder of the National Workrights Institute in Princeton, N.J.

But he doesn't agree with your employer's approach. "Banning fragrances from the workplace is a ham-handed approach to a legitimate problem," Maltby said. "Employees who aren't given the chance to moderate their use of fragrances will think the company is being unfair — (and) it is."

Even aggrieved employees should start with a more common-sense approach by letting their offending colleagues know that their overuse of scents bothers them.

Then, "their co-workers should be considerate and cut back on the amount they use," he said.

If they don't, then the company should act.

Still, he said, "This is a situation best handled on a case-by-case basis with common sense and courtesy."

And that shouldn't mean an entire ban, he said.

"Banning fragrances completely is overkill," he said. "It's not a great hardship to give up aftershave or perfume. But it's unfair to make people do so when it isn't necessary."

The prohibition could hurt morale in the long run, he said.

"No one is likely to quit over this, but even small amounts of unfair treatment decrease people's dedication to the company, which diminishes job performance in subtle but real ways," he said. "This employer needs to go back to the drawing board and find a more balanced approach."

DEAR CARRIE: My friend works for a bakery and sometimes is required to be on duty 60 to 70 hours a week. Although he is an hourly employee, his employer does not pay him overtime when he works more than 40 hours. The employer does this to everyone. Is this legal? My friend is afraid to report him because many of the employees will get fired for turning him in to the Labor Department. Is there a way for the Labor Department to question the employer without naming names?

— Friend Underpaid

DEAR FRIEND UNDERPAID: Based on what you have stated, the owner is violating labor laws. Hourly employees have to be paid overtime, or at least 1 1/2 times their regular hourly rate, for every hour over 40 in a workweek. Managers don't have to be paid for overtime but hourly employees do.

Tell your friend to contact the U.S. Labor Department for more information. And he shouldn't worry about the company finding out. The following from the U.S. Labor Department's website should reassure him:

"All discussions with [the Labor Department's Wage and Hour Division] are confidential. All complaints are confidential; the name of the complainant and the nature of the complaint are not disclosed. The only exceptions are: when it is necessary to reveal a complainant's identity, with his or her permission, to pursue an allegation and when the division is ordered to reveal information by a court."

San Diego to Alaska on a motorbike

Ever since my husband's love for motorbikes resurrected from the dust, riding from San Diego to Alaska sat at the top of our bucket list. The dream paced like a caged tiger, anxious for the gate to open on the road-trip adventure.

Three weeks were set aside in May and June for the 4,000-mile journey that would take us through seven states, two Canadian provinces and the Yukon Territory. We opted for the inland route since I would fly home and my husband, Benjamin, would return along the coast.

My orders were to pack light and leave behind anything that made me feel like a woman. Despite the burliness of my getup, I felt like Mary Murphy clutching Marlon Brando in "The Wild One."

Day 1: Vista to Las Vegas, 296 miles

Bundled in protective gear, we hit a scorching 113 degrees near Las Vegas. Curious tourists stopped to chat. "We're going to Alaska!" became my jubilant mantra — triggering conversations of dreams fulfilled, those untouched and ours in the making.

While neither of us is particularly fond of Vegas, it was the most logical place to overnight. The Wynn took the grittiness out of Vegas with silent slot machines, classical music and floral displays. Our tower room had a private entrance, designated pool and complementary breakfast at Tableau.

The property boasts five pools, 18 restaurants and Le Reve — named best show in Vegas. For dinner, it was Costa di Mare, a Mediterranean seafood restaurant where waiters parade carts displaying the catch-on-ice. Among the 50 species of seafood are langostinos that are caught off Italian waters, put to sleep, and flown in that day. No nets and no sharing recipes; and that goes for the four little old ladies who roll homemade pasta.

Day 2: Vegas to Zion, 163 miles

Purple mountains and pink sandstone announced the exit of man and the entrance of nature. Just outside Zion National Park in Utah sat Cliffrose Lodge, our hotel on the river's edge. We hit the trails, climbing three miles to emerald pools where canyon tree frogs sang.

We refueled at the Spotted Dog Cafe, one of the area's more upscale restaurants. Hearty portions of pepita-

crusted trout and wild-game meatloaf left us with happy bellies for the day ahead.

Day 3: Zion to Salt Lake City, 336 miles

Our bodies leaned in unison on Zion's hairpin turns. Braided rivers cut through patchwork fields, stitched together with weathered fences. Cows chewed the cud, unfazed by our bike in their zone. We zipped in and out of tiny towns, each with a school, store, church and bar — in that order.

In Salt Lake City, we stayed central at Kimpton Hotel Monaco. The swanky 1920s art deco haven beckons with gin rickeys and mint juleps. Within walking distance were the Eccles Theater, City Creek Mall and Temple Square — home to the Mormon Tabernacle, gardens, museums and genealogical library.

With culture in our veins, we headed to Barbara for one of our top three meals. The open kitchen had no secrets starting with understated nachos, salmon with coffee butter and beef with truffle aioli.

Day 4: Salt Lake to Sun Valley, Idaho, 293 miles

It was bitterly cold and a poor time to realize our warm layers were back in Zion. With regret, patience and \$100 postage, we hoped for the best.

Instead we got the worst — a hailstorm and 43 degrees. Head tucked low, I hung on for dear life as we putted along the shoulder, doused by 18-wheelers. Soaking and shivering, I told my husband we had to "man up." Clearly I was convincing myself.

Idaho was bipolar, switching from sun to hail to rain and back to sun. Dark skies became billowing clouds, so dense and white it seemed God tripped holding a bag of cotton balls. For miles it was farmland and boom sprinklers, rolling across fields like a row of defensive linemen. Dusty towns boasted pancake breakfasts and carwash fundraisers as main events.

And then there was Sun Valley, North America's oldest ski town that welcomed us with open arms. For one brief night we thawed at Sun Valley Lodge. Opened in 1936, the historic hotel had a down-to-the-studs makeover with larger guestrooms with soaking tubs and fireplaces.

The pulse of Hollywood's heyday remains with photos of A-listers, including Marilyn Monroe, Clint Eastwood and Ernest Hemingway. The alpine-European influence attracts international jet-setters — clinking

cocktails in the Duchin Room while watching figure skaters twirl on ice.

Biking, fishing and hiking left me longing for more of Sun Valley, but we were on a schedule. We settled for dinner at The Ram steakhouse at Sun Valley Inn, where fondue and live piano didn't disappoint.

Day 5: Sun Valley to Missoula, Mont., 277 miles

Maybe it was the sunshine, but I was instantly enamored with Montana — as were campers tucked beside lakes and rivers. We must have seen 20 deer that day, munching as we hugged the curves.

For the love of horses — the silky beasts were 50-a-field, poised for showtime. Classic Fords and Chevys were commonplace, either abandoned beside barns or running strong with bumper stickers like "Make America great again."

As far as I could tell, Montana never lost its greatness. This blessed Bison country had malt shops, trading posts, Flathead Lake and Missoula — a university town surrounded by wilderness areas and rivers. There were barefoot kids, porch swings, faded flags and craftsman-style homes.

When we saw Gibson Mansion, I was overcome with nostalgia. The 1903 Victorian B&B had a parlor and suites overlooking a garden. Tea and scones were delivered to our room, and breakfast was served in the regal dining room.

By day we hiked Mount Sentinel and watched riversurfers, and by night dined at Plonk, another top-three favorite. Rooftop seating, cucumber gimlets and mountain-raised bison sealed the deal — undoubtedly the best meat of the trip.

Day 6: Missoula to Eureka, Mont., 248 miles

We shouldered Flathead's east side, where cherry orchards pushed the shoreline. After lunch in Bigfork, we rode to Glacier National Park. Roadside stands tempted with huckleberry pie, cherry jam and bison jerky. Beyond ice-blue rivers and glassy Lake MacDonald, we hit an avalanche road closure.

We detoured to Wilderness Club Resort in Eureka, 9 miles south of Canada. It offered golfing, horseback riding and rooms with shared lounges. An evening swim and lakeside jog set us in motion for the day ahead.

Days 7 and 8: Eureka to Banff, Alberta, 233 miles

When Canadian border patrol asked what we carried for protection, I

knocked on my helmet to demonstrate our safety gear. "I mean weapons," he snapped. He assumed I was being sassy, and even more so when my husband wiggled his fingers and replied, "Just my hands, sir."

Despite the rough start, we were granted entry with views of Colombia Lake and Radium Hot Springs near Kootenay. Toward Banff National Park we encountered our first black bear — a surreal experience mere feet from bike-to-beast. The resort town of Banff was magical, with chalet boutiques lining the thoroughfare where the smell of chocolateries and pine permeated the air.

The best views were from our room at Rimrock Resort. Built in 1950, the place oozed elegance with top-hat bellman and balconies with sweeping views. Within walking distance were hot springs and Sulphur Mountain Trail that led me 3.4 miles to the summit.

The shuttle landed us at Park Distillery, another in our top-three restaurants. House-distilled spirits and a campfire concept made this the spot for craft G&Ts, Alberta charcuterie and whole-bow river trout.

Day 9: Banff to Jasper, Alberta, 212 miles

If there's one stretch that took the prize, it was this one. The route passed Lake Louise, glacier lakes and Icefields Parkway connecting Rocky Mountain Parks.

Bighorn sheep and grizzlies posed roadside. At the edge of Jasper National Park was Overlander Mountain Lodge with 23 cabins and a main hotel. Fine dining was right on-site at Stone Peak Restaurant, recognized by Wine Spectator and locals who adore chef Alethia Chaconas. That morning, she foraged morels that ended up in my mushroom soup. Between the elegant menu, sunset views and white-chocolate cheesecake, it was our most romantic evening.

Day 10: Jasper to Fort St. John, British Columbia, 340 miles

Straightaways and rain made for a grueling seven-hour ride. We stopped in trucker towns for gas, drip coffee and hotcakes served with condiment caddies full of Smucker's jelly and butter cubes.

For hours it was nothing but forest and the occasional spooked moose or deer. Splattered bugs left our visors looking like a work by Jackson Pollock. At mile 47 on the Alaska Highway, we stopped at Home2 Suites by Hilton. The new addition to bustling Fort St. John was a burst of sunshine. With a

kitchen, pool, gym, laundromat and free breakfast, we felt right at home. Just in time, our winter-wear package arrived from Zion.

Day 11: Fort St. John to Northern Rockies Lodge, British Columbia, 391 miles

Stretching 1,390 miles from Dawson Creek to Delta Junction, the Alaska Highway celebrated 75 years during our journey. Other than nine bears we counted, sections of the road were beyond barren.

Halfway between Whitehorse and Fort St. John was our hotel Northern Rockies Lodge. On the shores of Muncho Lake, it serves as a floatplane base with lakeshore chalets, log cabins and fly-in fishing to out-post cabins.

Day 12: Rockies Lodge to Watson Lake, Yukon, 164 miles

A dip in Liard Hot Springs brought us within feet of a moose crossing our path. In three hours, we passed 20 bison and five bears. That night, we snuggled into A Nice Motel, in downtown Watson Lake. Named for the congenial owner, it's a motel, store and gas station in one. With a kitchenette and fireplace, we were in for the night.

Day 13: Watson to Whitehorse, Yukon, 272 miles

Between Watson and Whitehorse was breathtaking Emerald Lake in Carcross — home to Yukon's oldest general store and Bennett Lake. Yukon's capital of Whitehorse had a surprisingly cool art-and-music scene with an urban vibe to match.

Tracing back to the Klondike Gold Rush, the boutique Edgewater Hotel has the best location in town. Across from the Yukon River, it's a short walk to the Macbride Museum, bars and restaurants like The Wheelhouse in Waterfront Station. Recently remodeled, the hotel has top-notch everything, right down to the sheets.

Day 14: Whitehorse to Tok, Alaska, 386 miles

With the American flag in sight, I saluted the sky and announced our arrival to "the U.S. of Ahh." The border agents asked what we were bringing into Alaska and I said, "A good attitude." They laughed, and together we bonded over motorbikes and America.

The town of Tok was small, with truckers stopping for heaping pizzas and burgers at Fast Eddy's, and a room at Young's Motel. After dinner, we sat on the porch of our cozy cabin and watched the midnight sun.

Days 15-18: Tok to Denali, 329 miles

Denali National Park is

largely why we came to Alaska. From the park entrance, we took a one-way charter with Kantishna Air, circling glaciers and granite spires above Denali — the tallest mountain in North America. At 20,310 feet, it's the centerpiece of the 600-mile Alaskan range and the backdrop of Camp Denali, our home for the next three days.

Founded in 1952, Camp Denali and sister property North Face Lodge are the only two companies authorized to guide outings in designated wilderness. From June to September, the properties run 3- to 7-night stays with ground transportation, communal meals, guided activities and outdoor equipment.

Ninety miles from civilization, we were unplugged in our cabin with a wood stove, propane lights and outhouse. I spent days hiking across spongy tundra while my husband fished at Wonder Lake.

The solitude was a profound experience difficult to come by. Even the sound of my voice robbed nature of a chance to speak. In those moments of stillness, we had some of the most engaging, transformational, life-giving conversations I've known.

Day 19: Camp Denali to Denali Park Entrance

A five-hour shuttle returned us to the park entrance, where we stayed at Denali Park Village. On the banks of Nenana River, the family-friendly property has tours, hiking, rafting and the Cabin Nite Dinner Theater.

Days 20-22: Denali to Anchorage, 231 miles

Final nights led us to our comfy favorite, Home2 Suites in Midtown Anchorage. We rode to Whittier — the gateway to Prince William Sound — and booked the 26 Glacier Cruise with Phillips Cruises & Tours. Our boat pushed through ice-filled waters past otters and seals.

We went out with a bang at Kincaid Grill, where local oysters and salmon paired beautifully with soft jazz and fine wines. That final morning, I returned to San Diego, compliments of Alaska Airlines. My husband headed for Cabo.

At the end of it all, I'd like to think the trip changed me, to find strength in the promise of today and freedom in the potential of tomorrow. Perhaps it will wear off, but for now, the profoundness of nature has left me wondering if maybe, just maybe, God lives in Denali.

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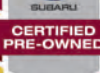

Who knew rich and glamorous celebrities had so many hush-hush problems? Well, maybe they do in real life and maybe they don't, but they sure keep "Ray Donovan's" eponymous anti-hero busy. Last season's finale episode included some uncommonly high notes for Hollywood's problem solver and his rather dysfunctional family, but those sweet moments are fleeting. Among the fictional elite, Ray Donovan (Liev Schreiber "X-Men Origins: Wolverine," 2009) is the guy you call if you need an unsavory problem dealt with quickly and quietly. A native of South Boston, he pulled himself up from his blue-collar roots to mingle expertly with the glitterati as he goes about his shady work making their problems discreetly disappear. He's a firm family man at heart, though the various and sundry members of the Donovan clan are constantly clashing against one another.

The new season sees Ray turning his attention back to his celebrity fixer firm, after season 4 shifted focus to an ongoing crime plot line. A major client this year is played by a major talent: look for Oscar winner Susan Sarandon ("Thelma & Louise," 1991) in a recurring role in season 5.

Things were looking good for the Donovans at the end of last season. Ray avoided prison, and we were even granted an unusually light-hearted scene of him playing video games with his kids. His wife, Abby (Paula Malcomson, "Deadwood"), announced that her cancer is gone, and that she wants the two of them to make a fresh start, while his daughter, Bridget (Kerris Dorsey, "Brothers & Sisters"), was accepted into NYU.

Don't assume the good times will carry on throughout the new season, though. The cast

and showrunners aren't saying much about what happens this season, but, as Schreiber told Collider, "It's a very dark year for Ray." He expanded on this in a promo clip:

"Fairly early in the season, something very profound and big has changed in Ray's life — something I think is going to really shock a lot of people — and the impact of that on this family, and Ray himself, is pretty heavy."

Schreiber, a presence both on the stage and screen, has earned a good deal of recognition for his role over the past four seasons. He's received four Golden Globe nods and three Emmy nominations, the most recent of which could very well turn into a win in September.

It's not just Schreiber who has seen success from the show. "Ray Donovan" opened to record-breaking numbers, becoming Showtime's biggest

premiere of all time. It's won a Critics' Choice Television

Award, a Golden Globe and an Emmy, among its many nominations, and averaged 1.2 million viewers last season.

The well-known cast is one major draw of the show, with Schreiber being just one of a number of big-name actors. Oscar winner Jon Voight ("Mission: Impossible," 1996) plays Mickey Donovan, Ray's abusive father who turns up in the first episode after 20 years in prison. Though murderous, selfish and contemptible, Mickey is also charismatic and charming, and the character is a real fan favorite.

Eddie Marsan ("Jonathan Strange & Mr. Norrell") and Dash Mihok ("The Day After Tomorrow," 2004) play Ray's two brothers, Terry and Bunchy Donovan, who both have their own personal struggles to deal with throughout the series. Pooch Hall ("The Game") rounds out the family as Daryll Donovan, Ray's half-brother and Mickey's son from an affair, who now works for Ray.

Each season has seen its share of talent among the guest stars and supporting cast as well. The likes of Elliott Gould ("Ocean's Eleven," 2001), Hank Azaria ("The Simpsons"), Ann-Margret ("Grumpy Old Men," 1993), Ian McShane ("Deadwood") and Lisa Bonet ("The Cosby Show") have graced the roster of supporting cast members, and there are some big names on deck for season 5 as well.

The biggest of these is surely the ubiquitous Sarandon. The award-winning acting powerhouse has held well over 100 roles between TV and film since launching her career in the early '70s, and the list of accolades attached to her name is dizzying.

She's sure to be another feather in "Ray Donovan's" already well-feathered cap this season. She joins the cast as mogul Samantha Winslow, the legendary head of a motion picture studio, who employs Ray's "fixing" services.

"Susan Sarandon plays someone who Ray comes to work for, who has a very, very, very profound effect on shifting Ray's life," Schreiber revealed in the Collider interview. Saran-

don added to this in a Showtime promo: "They both are kind of outside the law, and so, she has a secret that brings Ray into her life."

"We're really dependent on story being generated by guest stars," showrunner David Hollander told the Hollywood Reporter. "There is no big

bad guy that Ray has to fight year in and year out, and there is no procedural element of whodunit. So we use new characters to bring in what we feel the zeitgeist is."

See what else season 5 has in store when "Ray Donovan" returns Sunday, Aug. 6, on Showtime.

Popular culinary series 'Man v. Food' returns to Travel Channel

Culinary favorite has returned. After five years without new episodes, one of Travel Channel's most loved series is back with new locations, new foods and a new host.

"Man v. Food" premiered in 2008 and became an instant hit, lasting four seasons (with the last one changing both its format slightly, and its name to "Man v. Food Nation"), and remains popular to this day in reruns.

For the new season, "Man v. Food" is returning to its roots, albeit with a new face on screen. Former host Adam Richman ("Food Fighters") has not returned, but actor, food lover and restaurant industry veteran Casey Webb ("Part Timers") is only too eager to take over in the Monday, Aug. 7, premiere.

For the revived series's first episode, Webb checks out some of the biggest and most outrageous foods that the Big Apple has to offer. First, he pays a visit to Manhattan, where he tracks down a burger that's stuffed with

French fries and fondue. Then, he heads to Brooklyn for a taste of what might be the city's most innovative eat: a pizza on a pizza, served in a box made out of (you guessed it) pizza.

Each episode of "Man v. Food" starts out like this: with the host paying a city a visit and experiencing some of its most outrageous foods. The real fun, though, comes in the second half of the episode when Webb takes on one of the host city's food challenges.

For his New York visit, that challenge is at a little place on Staten Island called the Lunchbox. Here, he finds not just one but three extreme culinary tests: an eight-pound sloppy joe, a 151-ounce milkshake and a half-dozen wings doused with habanero ghost chili sauce that packs a million Scoville heat units (that's a lot). Unable to choose which challenge to take on, he leaves it up to chance before diving right in.

And that's where the show really lives up to its name. It's Casey Webb v. Food in "Man v. Food," with a whole new season of the fan favorite premiering Monday, Aug. 7, on Travel Channel.

Summer update: 'SNL's' oldest bit returns to prime time

Summer update: It may be on summer break right now, but with one of its most talked about seasons in years behind it, "Saturday Night Live" isn't taking the season off. The sketch comedy show's longest-running bit hits TV screens for a four-week prime-time run starting Thursday, Aug. 10, on NBC.

The half-hour "Saturday Night Live: Weekend Update" reunites the hosts from the shorter "SNL" version, with anchors Colin Jost and Michael Che sitting behind the news desk and poking fun at the week's headlines. Other "SNL" cast members are also due to make appearances, lending their own brands of humor to the "newscast."

This isn't the first time that Weekend Update has been spun off into its own series. Its first appearance as a prime-time special was in the autumn of 2008 under the name "Saturday Night Live Weekend Update Thursday," and after a three-episode run it was renewed for a second mini-season the following year. It later returned during 2012's election for two episodes of electoral joshing.

So why has Weekend Update been spun off into its own series yet again? Probably because the last season of "Saturday Night Live" brought in the highest ratings the show has seen in years, a feat often attributed to the show's sharp spoofs of the current political situation in Washington. Robert Greenblatt, chairman of NBC Entertainment, backed

that up in a statement announcing the summer series: "'SNL' is having its best season in a quarter of a century — how many shows can say that?! — so we didn't want them to take the summer off," he said in the statement.

Weekend Update has been with "SNL" since its very first episode way back in 1975 — the only still-surviving sketch to have that honor. Its hosts may have changed over the years, but its popularity has always remained strong — strong enough to warrant its own prime-time series. "Saturday Night Live: Weekend Update" premieres Thursday, Aug. 10 on NBC.

A new possession: "The Exorcist" is expanding its cast. The Fox series, which is slated to return for a second season Friday, Sept. 29, has added a versatile actor to its already impressive roster.

John Cho has joined the supernatural drama, bringing his diverse acting range to the critically loved series. Cho has been a movie star

for years, starring as Sulu in "Star Trek" (2009) and as Harold in "Harold & Kumar Go to White Castle" (2004) and their respective sequels. He's no stranger to television either, having starred in the short-lived 2014 ABC sitcom "Selfie," NBC's "Go On" and the sci-fi drama "FlashForward."

Cho won't be the only new face on screen when "The Exorcist" returns. With the first season's plot more or less wrapped up, most of its characters — and thus, actors — will not be in season 2. Geena Davis ("Thelma & Louise," 1991), Hannah Kasulka ("The Fosters"), Alan Ruck ("Spin City") and Brianne Howey ("Scream Queens") have all moved on.

In addition to Cho, Brianna Hildebrand ("Deadpool," 2016) has boarded the cast. Alfonso Herrera ("Sense8"), Ben Daniels ("House of Cards") and Kurt Egyiawan ("Skyfall," 2012) are the sole returning series regulars.

"The Exorcist" serves as a sequel to the 1973 film of the same name. The first season dealt with a family suffering through a demonic influence in their home, and the responses of three priests (Herrera, Daniels and Egyiawan) trying to deal with it. The new season moves on from that now-resolved story (hence the casting changes), with Cho playing a child psychologist whose foster child becomes targeted by something very evil.

"The Exorcist" returns to Fox for a second season this fall.

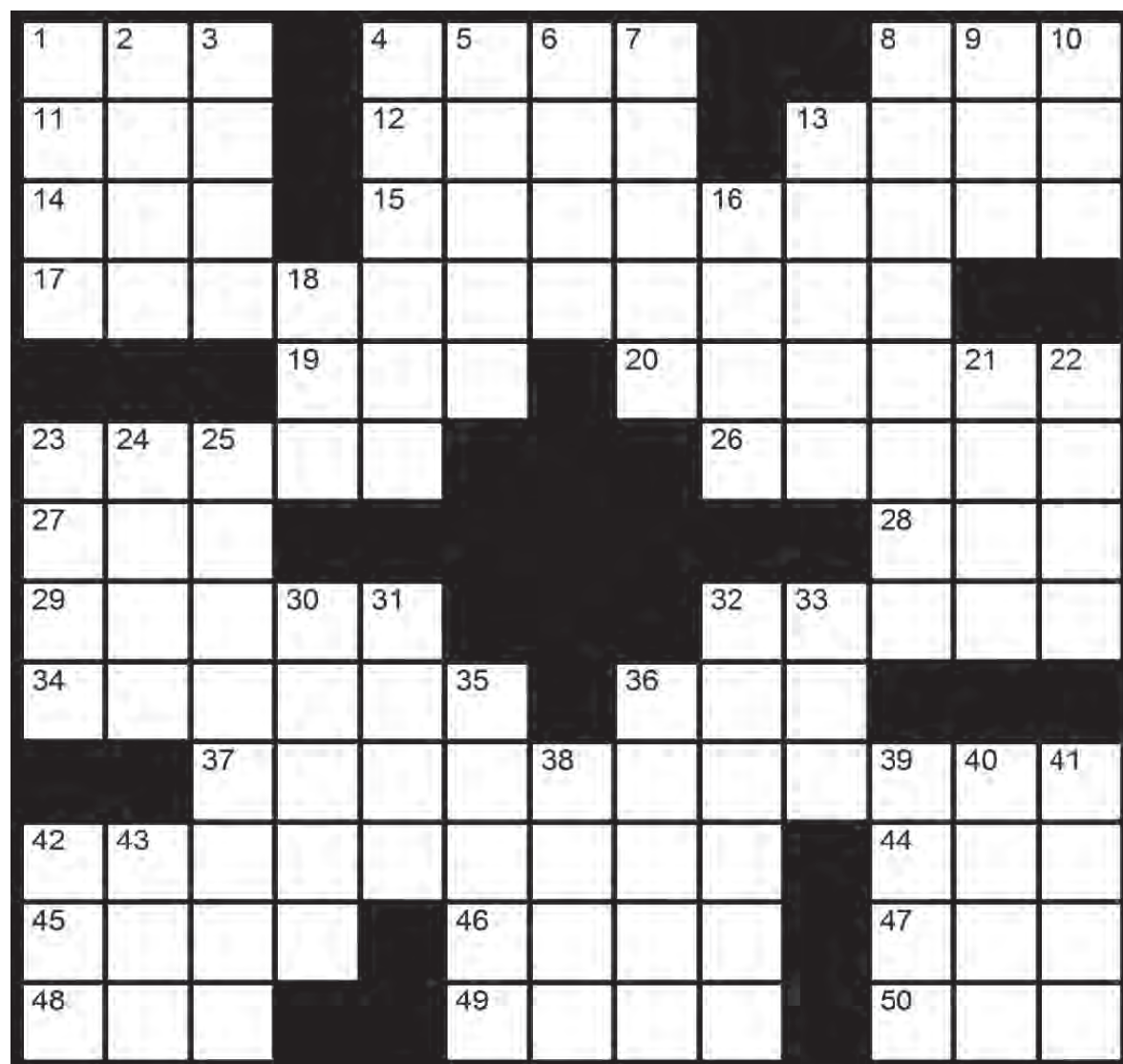
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Television Crossword
