DOH talks bond sale bucks

Official explains how money is divvied up for projects, work

Why is the West Virginia Division of Highways District 4 saying it doesn't have enough money for adequate road maintenance when taxpayers just voted to al-

low \$1.6 billion in bond sales for transportation projects?

Because you don't take out a mortgage to buy the groceries.

That's how West Virginia Secretary of Transportation Tom Smith summed it up when asked a reoccurring question sur-

rounding road maintenance across the district.

The topic spurred the creation of the North Central Caucus on Roads, after the Preston County Commission declared a state of emergency over road conditions there. The caucus is made up of county commissioners and state office holders from five of the district's six counties.

It held its third meeting last week, in Fairmont.

Smith explained that using

one-time funds to pay for annual expenses is bad business.

"When we're talking about resurfacing and pothole patching, you don't really want to be paying for 25 years for material you put in potholes, which has a two- or three-year life, and next year you're patching again," Smith told The Dominion Post. "So short-term things being taken care of with bonded or bor-

They were some distance back from the garage, and hadn't even seen their brother or the car at that point, but no matter. (Sonic recognition, you know.)

"Hey," Tudek said. "The 'Cuda."

"Sounds good, huh?" Charlton replied.

They grew up hearing that sound. Kaleb, especially.

Said rumble makes a personal soundtrack for their dad, Mike Kelly.

It also makes for a fun irony.

distributorship, is known around the community as a measured guy.

Doesn't talk too fast, nor too slow. Chooses his words carefully. Never gets mad.

The "Christmas tree" start-

Governor praises Bray Cary

Says he has faith in senior adviser

CHARLESTON — Gov. Jim Justice says he trusts Bray Cary.

The former media executive was one of Justice's biggest critics during the 2016 election. He's also a board member for the natural gas company EQT, with millions of dollars in stock holdings.

And now, Cary is Justice's senior adviser, earning \$8.75 an hour.

"Bray Cary is the most unlikely person in the world to have a bond with Jim Justice," the governor said. "Nobody on the planet beat on me worse than Bray Cary beat on me through the election process and everything. Bray called me about everything you could possibly call somebody."

"So how? How is that? Well, you see, I don't carry bad thoughts with me. I don't. And really, truly, Bray Cary is an extremely talented man that genuinely loves our state. Bray Cary truly makes not one single dime being here but he works his tail off. He's a worker, and he's got knowledge."

Cary has been on EQT's board of directors since 2008, which means he would have a fiduciary

POROS, Greece — There are ghosts in the ocean. Silent killers carried by the currents, wrapping themselves around reefs and claiming the lives of millions of marine creatures great and small, from sponges and tiny crustaceans to dolphins, sharks and whales.

A group of volunteer divers aimed to disrupt this cycle of destruction when they plunged recently into the depths off the coast of the Greek island of Poros in the Saronic Gulf to recover some of these ghost nets.

rowed dollars, we just don't think that's as good of a philosophy as what we're doing."

What the DOH is doing, according to District 4 Engineer Donny Williams, is providing about half of the funds needed to address the district's maintenance needs.

Williams receives between \$30 million and \$32 million annually for the district. He told the latest caucus meeting that by his estimation, he would probably need an additional \$36 million to \$38 million a year to keep the district's roads maintained to the level prescribed by the DOH's own core maintenance plans.

That said, Smith explained the passage of the road bond in October has resulted and will result in increased dollars for main-

tenance, which should be ramping up with the warmer weather.

"What we do is have regional projects that are regionally significant and have name recognition to them. We try to borrow money for that," Smith said. "When we have a large amount of money to build those projects, it frees up the regular program for us to do more of the routine maintenance we're talking about. So you really do get the best of both when you end up having these big bonding programs."

Smith also conceded that the state is playing catch-up when it comes to infrastructure across the board.

"We understand this spring has been a hard pot-hole season. It was actually a brutal winter in terms of road conditions, and people are getting impatient, but the truth of it is we've really

not invested as we should have in our transportation infrastructure for the last 10 years," Smith said. "We've been on a downhill slide, and you can't instantly turn that around."

Another reoccurring theme in the road maintenance discussion is the DOH's ability to attract and keep employees due to non-competitive wages.

Williams has said truck drivers start with the state at \$11.77/hour, and the average hourly pay for DOH employees is about \$13.94. He told the caucus it's not uncommon for DOH workers to use social services to make ends meet.

"What we're trying to do is look at needs job by job. What I mean by that is, if you have a particular job category that is really underpaid, to go in and surgically try to address that. We're not talking

about across-the-board types of things," Smith said, noting regional pay rates may be an option, particularly in places like Monongalia County.

"That's one thing we're talking about. So up in your area, the economy in Morgantown is one of the best in the state, if not the best in the state. Well, that hurts us as far as our pay and its impact there. ... That area is one of the hardest hit because of the disparity between pay on the public side and what you can get elsewhere," Smith said, recalling Morgantown pays laborers \$3.23/hour more than the DOH pays truck drivers.

"That really sets the stage to where you can have quite an issue, so yes, we're looking at that."

Lastly, a number of questions have been raised about why counties

couldn't take a more active role in road maintenance through House Bill 4009, also known as the "local bill," which was signed into law in 2016.

The law allows counties to finance a road construction project by adding up to 1 percent to the state's 6 percent sales tax.

Monongalia County Commission President Tom Bloom said road maintenance was what was in mind when the bill came out of Monongalia County.

"The county pushed the original bill, and it was for maintenance. It got substituted by the Legislature through the state chamber of commerce to go toward new projects," Bloom said. "We still got it and we were going to consider it until the road bond issue passed."

Bloom went on to say that even if the law did address maintenance of

smaller county roads, it provides a process that includes a formal proposal, public hearings, approval from the secretary of transportation and a referendum that must go before the voters in a primary or general election — a process that he said would likely take between 12 and 18 months.

"Getting the funding to actually meet the needs of our county is going to have to come through the Legislature," Bloom said, adding that talk of the local bill is an attempt to deflect responsibility from state lawmakers. "Any delegate who states that is not giving the full truth to the citizens of Monongalia County and it frustrates me. They need to read their own bill."

responsibility to the company. Cary also leads EQT's corporate governance committee. Last year, he made \$367,860 in cash, stock awards and other compensation, according to EQT's report to shareholders.

Cary bought several rounds of EQT stock in June 2017, including one pur-

chase of 22,627 shares valued at more than \$1.2 million.

"Never one time, never one time do I feel like there is any type of conflict with EQT. Nothing," Justice said. "If we get into a natural gas discussion, many times he has excused himself. Many times I've said 'Bray you shouldn't be in this and everything.'"

"But really and truly, never once, never one time

has he asked me even remotely think (sic) that could be tied or a favor for anything for EQT. Never one time."

Amid ethical questions, Justice feels a kinship with Cary: Both are businessmen facing conflicts of interest as they enter public office.

"You've never had a governor that has this many tentacles all through every-

thing that I have," Justice said. "I'll never possibly be able to please you on every single thing all the time."

"Bray Cary is a successful guy. He's done a lot of work," Justice said. "You'll be able to find something about him that you could report or say something bad about."

Cary's business ties warrant scrutiny after Justice and his chief counsel revealed Friday the investigation of a private businessman — believed to be Mid-Atlantic Technology, Research and Innovation Center CEO Steve Hedrick — possibly leveraging his own company's interests during the Department of Commerce's negotiations with China.

"The individual associated with that is an outside party that had also been working with Commerce," said Brian Abraham, senior counsel in the Governor's Office. "We heard some information within that that didn't make sense."

"Then that caused us to go, 'Why is this person behind the curtain at Commerce if they're an individual on the outside?' That created an ethical dilemma."

Cary began with the Governor's Office as a citizen volunteer and worked that way for months, with an office, a parking spot, a Capitol entry card and the ear of the governor.

In early May, the Governor's Office put Cary on

the official payroll at \$8.75 an hour, a move Abraham said was meant to reduce confusion as he began "to interact with agencies or outside the office."

Since that change, Cary's time sheets have reflected him working 9 a.m. to noon.

"I tell you, he could probably file a claim against us because he works, realistically works 80 hours a week," Justice said. "He's working all the time."

Cary has been receiving checks for \$26.25.

"I am just saying to you no way, no way in the world should we do anything but applaud Bray Cary for coming in here and doing all the good work he's doing because he believes in the goodness of West Virginia," Justice said.

"What is he getting out of this? What is he getting out of it? I mean, \$8.75 an hour for 15 hours? What is Bray Cary getting out of this? Do you really think he's after power or influence or whatever it may be? Or maybe he's trying to sneak something by me as far as EQT?"

Justice said that will never happen.

"I'm working all the time. They know it. There's no way in the world Bray Cary is going to sneak something by me. There's no way in the world people are going to sneak stuff by me, they're just not going to do it."

# Divers halt the carnage of 'ghost' nets

**POROS, Greece** — There are ghosts in the ocean. Silent killers carried by the currents, wrapping themselves around reefs and claiming the lives of millions of marine creatures great and small, from sponges and tiny crustaceans to dolphins, sharks and whales.

In their former lives, these ghosts were nets and other fishing gear essential to the livelihoods of millions around the world, and put food on the plates of millions more. But once lost, abandoned or discarded into the sea, these nets continue doing what they were designed to do: Catch fish.

Mostly made of strong plastic such as nylon, this lost gear known as ghost nets doesn't easily decompose.

"They can remain there for hundreds of years and continue fishing," said Maria Salomidi, environmental researcher at the Hellenic Centre for Marine Research. The trapped fish quickly become bait, attracting larger predators who in turn become entangled themselves.

"And so starts a vicious cycle which ... can kill anything from small crustaceans such as crabs and lobsters to large fish, turtles, seals, dolphins," Salomidi added.

This isn't the only damage the discarded nets cause. When they snag on rocks or coral, they can destroy entire underwater habitats.

"A rock in the sea isn't just a rock," Salomidi said. "A rock is full of life, it harbors many organisms. These organisms are injured and die under a net that has been caught on the rock."

Whole reefs can quickly turn into barren wastelands.

An estimated 10 percent of all marine litter in the world's oceans and seas, or some 640,000 tons, is made up of lost or abandoned fishing gear, according to a 2009 report by the U.N. Food and Agriculture Organization and the U.N. Environment Program.

A group of volunteer divers aimed to disrupt this cycle of destruction when they plunged recently into the depths off the coast of the Greek island of Poros to recover some of these ghost nets. Aegean Rebreath, a group of volunteer mainly recreational divers, carries out underwater cleanups and raises awareness about marine pollution.

above-mentioned day that honors Dad as it is drag racing.

Except when it isn't.

### Throwing a wrench in the works

Kelly raised his kids the way his dad, Oliver F. Kelly Jr., raised him.

The elder Kelly, who died in 2000, was a guy who could fix anything. That was out of necessity for a farm kid who grew up during the Depression, his son said.

"If you couldn't fix it, you did without, because you couldn't afford a new one, whatever it was," Mike Kelly said.

When WWII hit, Oliver Kelly turned wrenches for Uncle Sam when he wasn't shouldering a rifle in Europe with the U.S. Army's 1st Infantry.

He picked up work as a mechanic when he came back home, and young Mike was right there with him.

Mr. Kelly delighted in the fact that his kid displayed the same aptitude.

"I was all the time working on something," his son said. "He would always say, 'I'm not gonna fix this for you — but I am gonna tell you to do it.'"

After that, the budding mechanic was on his own. The lessons took. If it had wheels, a motor and could be steered, the Kelly kid was all over it.

Dirt bikes, which he and buddies tore up and down on, in the hills behind their neighborhood where Morgantown Mall is now located.

Drag races at the former Eldora Raceway, right down the road in Fairmont.

Along the way, he bought his first Barracuda — a sleek, black 1970 model, not the above dragster — that would accumulate lots of family history on its odometer.

He and Marjorie drove from the church to the re-

ception in that car after the wedding in 1975.

### Bumping the box, quantum physics and other dinnertime lessons

Marjorie Kelly still laughs about how earnest the man she would marry was on their first date.

"He said, 'I just want to tell you that I like cars and that I do a lot of racing,'" she remembered. "I just kind of laughed and said, 'Well, I like cars, too.'"

To a point, she said. She has yet to peg the Enthusiasm Gauge whenever Kaleb shoots the '67 'Cuda down the quarter-mile.

"That's still a little nerve-wracking," she said. "But you give it to God. And his dad taught him about cars and how to race, so I'm definitely comfortable with that."

Kelly mainly taught his kids how to be lifelong learners, his daughters said. Growing up, fast cars on sanctioned race tracks were just the delivery system.

Charlton said her dad would quickly shift into the learning gear himself, if his kids expressed an interest in something, be it music, sports or mechanics.

"He was always encouraging," she said. "He'd say, 'Now let's research this, and learn how to do it the right way.'"

Having a methodical

drag-racer teaching you how to parallel park for your driver's test was a uniquely effective exercise in car-confidence and muscle memory, Tudek said.

Two giant cardboard boxes that once held appliances were enlisted.

"Dad set them up like barrels for the driver's test," Tudek remembered. "He'd make you bump the box on purpose the first couple of times, so you'd really know where it was in relation to the car. It was like you could sense it."

Every Kelly kid passed the test on the first try.

When all three kids were still living at home, dinnertime meant mini-seminars on quantum physics, presidential politics, torque ratios — whatever percolated up.

Marjorie Kelly still marvels at that.

"I used to say, 'How many families are having these kinds of discussions at the dinner table?'"

A couple of years back, Kelly told his wife he was buying new appliances for the kitchen. Time for an upgrade, he said, in his mechanic's lexicon. She balked, and told him to buy a new roll-cage for the racer, instead.

Now, it was time for her husband to marvel.

"I just said, 'What did I ever do right to deserve you?'"

KINGWOOD — Voices of the past mixed with those of the present Saturday as Preston County celebrated its 200th birthday.

The daylong celebration was centered in the county seat but included a 5K walk/run in Arthurdale and music festival at

Alpine Lake.

Residents re-enacted the trial of Elihu Gregg, known to generations of Prestonians as the man convicted of burning down the courthouse on March 7, 1869, to avoid having his land on Gregg's Knob sold at the courthouse door to satisfy a \$100 judgment.

## Mon Power completes inspections

With the hot, humid summer months expected to produce higher electric usage, Mon Power, a FirstEnergy Corp. subsidiary, has completed projects, inspections and equipment maintenance across its 34-county service territory in north-central West Virginia to enhance service reliability for customers.

Helicopter patrols completed inspections on more than 2,000 miles of FirstEnergy transmission lines in the Mon Power area. The inspections are designed to look for damaged wire, broken cross arms, failed insulators and other hardware problems not visible from the ground. Potential reliability is-

sues identified during the inspection will be addressed.

On the ground, the inspections include using "thermvision" cameras to capture infrared images that can detect potential problems with Mon Power substation equipment such as transformers and capacitors. By identifying hot spots, maintenance and repairs can be handled prior to a power outage occurring.

Mon Power utility crews also conducted inspections of distribution circuits, which also included transformers, capacitors, reclosers and lightning arrestors to ensure the equipment is operational and the lines are ready to perform efficiently when demand for

electricity increases during the summer, typically due to air conditioning use.

"Our customers turn up their air conditioning to keep cool during sweltering summer weather," said Holly Kauffman, FirstEnergy's president of West Virginia operations. "We proactively inspect and maintain our equipment to ensure system reliability to meet the increased electrical demand when the temperatures climb and customers depend on us to help them stay comfortable."

Tree trimming is another key to preparing the system to meet the rigors of summer operations by maintaining proper

He and Thorn decided to hold a triad along with University High and Morgantown High and invite all classes to be involved.

"We all were friends, we played sports together, and then we branched off and went to our own high schools, and so we thought this would be a great opportunity for us to get everyone back together and open it up to all the classes," Gregg said.

Gregg's classmates always called him "the organizer" because he always steps up when it comes to planning get-togethers with former classmates.

"Something needs done, just call me," he said.

Aside from the softball game, there will be a gathering from 7-9 p.m. June 22, at Big Red's Shanty, on Cheat Road. Another one of Gregg's classmates, Chris "Big Red" Hewitt, owns the burger joint and plans to have an acoustic band on the deck that evening.

The co-ed softball game starts at 9:30 a.m. June 23, at White Park. A pavilion has been reserved, so people can bring their families and spend the day. Eric Jordan, a well-known DJ on the East Coast, is going to spin '80s music all day. Pyles of Pasta food truck will sell eats.

The alumni band from St. Francis, open to any alumni who wants to play, will march from the pavilion to Ogden Field prior to the game.

At 8 p.m., there will be a gathering at The Back Door downtown, which is owned by another St. Francis alum, John Gentile.

Gregg said there's no fee to play softball, and no cost to attend the reunion. He just wants people to show up, bring a baseball glove, and if they don't have one then one will be found for them to use. He wants people to come out and enjoy the day — and at the end wants to see who gets to take home the tri-ad trophy.

He said the main goal is for everyone to get together and see friends they haven't seen in years. Even if people don't want to play softball, he wants people to come

and his wife, Susan, took information from local histories to write the play. Miller acted the part of Judge John A. Dille. Bruce Wiley portrayed Gregg.

A jury was pulled from those attending the performances, led by jury foreman Nancy Copney. The performances were outside the Preston Academy — where Gregg's actual trial was held.

"There's a lot of really interesting issues in this when you look back at it in 2018," Judge Miller said.

Gregg was indicted by a special grand jury on July 12, 1869, and tried the same day. He was represented as a scalawag, a liar and, as witness A. Lee (Bruce Helsley) said, "Mr. Gregg is mighty mean."

His defense attorney was George O. Davenport, a Wheeling lawyer (portrayed by attorney Kristen Antolini) who happened to be in Kingwood that day and was drafted to the job. The prosecutor was sick, so Judge Dille picked his friend William G. Brown (attorney James "Jay" Shay Jr.) to fill in.

The prosecutor said Gregg's "heinous act" destroyed all the records of the county and those of the Preston County Journal, which was housed in the courthouse. It also destroyed the rooms where Peter Voltz (Michael Lipscomb) lived in the courthouse.

Gregg denied his guilt, and his defense attorney pointed out no one saw him set the fire, which began on the courthouse steps and ran up the second floor steps to the records. Some said they saw him later that night with ice in his beard.

James H. Carroll (Nathan Jones), attorney for the man who had the judgment, said he suspected Gregg. Special Constable Andrew B. Menear (Joe Stiles) said he went to Pennsylvania to arrest Gregg, who was "quarrelsome," "litigious" and said to carry a weapon.

They didn't have a warrant for Pennsylvania, but while following a

shortcut Gregg pointed out to that state's courthouse, passed through Preston County and charged him on the spot.

Noah Titchenell (Jason Jenkins) said Gregg told him he was going to burn down Kingwood. Lee said Gregg told him there were three ways to stop the county taking his land, "and one of them will work."

The Guseman family (John Hayes, Paige Miller Hayes and Brayden Hayes) said Gregg had a jug of oil when he stayed with them. Pharmacist Lazier (Dr. Fred Conley) said Gregg bought a gallon of oil from him. Jessica Lipscomb

was the narrator and Porter Stiles the bailiff.

Judge Dille sentenced Gregg to hang on Sept. 3. Gregg appealed to the State Supreme Court, and a new trial was ordered. He was found guilty again in October 1869 and ordered to hang on Jan. 28, 1870. He escaped and sent the sheriff his regrets for not being able to attend.

In 1877, he was arrested in Rice's Landing, Pa., where he shot his son-in-law three times and his daughter twice because he thought they told police where he was. He was sentenced to death a third time in 1880 but was given le-

niency and then pardoned by the governor in 1886.

Gregg was found shot through the chest in December 1887, and his exploits were written up in the New York Times.

**County bell**

The dedication of a monument holding a bell cast in 1870 that was used in the former courthouse was also held Saturday. The bell had been taken down and forgotten until last year, when it was discovered in the courthouse basement while workmen were repairing leaks.

Artist Jamie Lester and Vandalia Bronze restored the bell and built the concrete monument on the Main Street side of the courthouse lawn.

County Commissioners Craig Jennings, Dave Price and Don Smith; Abbie Belanger, the Preston High student who designed the logo for the celebration; and Pastor LaDeana Teets each rang the bell once.

Smith said that Preston is "a beautiful place because of the beautiful people and the beautiful scenery." He said those present were looking at history but also at the future.

Jennings said Prestonians today share the same love for citizens, community, county, country and rural living, and a willingness to help one another, as those 200 years ago.

"We are just like them: Standing together, working together and celebrating together," Jennings said. "The Lord has blessed us beyond measure and we are proud. We are Preston County proud."

Susan Hardesty read a history of the bell, Price read from the proclamation that created the county, the West Virginia National Guard Band performed the National Anthem, the Preston County Community Choir performed two songs, and Teets gave the benediction at the bell ceremony.

the vendors lining High Street, Lizzie Zuchowski and Anita Berns watched over pets they hoped to find forever homes for. The dogs, cat and kittens were a few of the animals available for adoption from the Preston County Animal Shelter.

"We have about 23 cats and kittens and 13 dogs available for adoption," Zuchowski said. She said the fee to adopt a dog is \$150, \$50 for cats and \$75 for kittens.

Page Hayes, her husband, John Hayes, and son Brayden, from Gainesville, Va., said they came to Kingwood to take part in the Elihu Gregg trial re-enactment. Gregg burned the courthouse down on March 7, 1869. She said she, her husband and her son played the parts of the Guseman family who were witnesses at the trial.

Kathy Opel and Vicky Graham, members of the Buckwheat Stitches showed off about 69 quilts that were displayed at the Kingwood United Methodist Church. Each quilt displayed had the name of the person who made it and a story about the occasion. Graham said

two of the quilts were made from wool from the Englehart Woolen Mill that burned down about 60 years ago.

Opel said she made one of the quilts on display.

"My mother had feed sacks torn apart and washed. I used them to make the diamond patch quilt," she said.

Also on hand were members of the Woodburn Chapter of the Daughters of the American Revolution (DAR). The DAR promotes historic preservation, education and patriotism. Any woman 18 or older who can prove lineal, bloodline descent from an ancestor who aided in achieving American Independence is eligible to join the DAR. The DAR was founded Oct. 11, 1890, and incorporated in 1896 by an Act of Congress.

City Councilwoman Michelle Whetsell said about 72 vendors participated. "Main Street put out a lot of information about the events. I believe it's good for the community and a bonus for the city," she said.

Whetsell added that the recently reopened pool was free for the first 200 people who wanted to swim.

## Council learns tax law

### 39 West Virginia towns collect municipal sales contribution

KINGWOOD — Kingwood learned more last week about how to implement a municipal sales tax, when it could expect to

collect funds and restrictions on how they can be spent.

Mark Morton, of the West Virginia Tax Department, spoke to council Tuesday.

Currently, 39 West Virginia towns have the tax. Four more will begin collecting it July 1: Athens, Davis, Elizabeth and Elkins. They will collect a total of about \$73 million this year, Morton said.

Locally, Bridgeport, Clarksburg, Fairmont, Grafton and

White Hall have the tax. Kingwood Councilwoman Michelle Whetsell brought the idea to council in April. Council hasn't voted on levying the tax.

The tax can be up to one cent on each \$1 of business done in town. Businesses remit the tax to the state with the state sales tax, and the state tax department sends the municipal tax to the town.

Some purchases are exempt from the tax, including the sale of fuel, sale or use of motor vehicles, satellite television service and other transactions where federal law preempts local.

Internet sales are not exempt. If a product is purchased online

and delivered in the city, it is taxed. There are some exemptions, such as prescription drug sales. Many online sellers are already collecting state tax because they are part of the streamlined tax provision, Morton said.

"The thing to remember in relation to municipal sales tax is there's a timing issue," Morton said.

The tax can become effective Jan. 1 or July 1, but not until 180 days after the State Tax Commissioner has been notified that council passed the tax and the town provides boundary files, showing which businesses are

## City official details time in position

### Deputy circuit clerk marks 39 years at job

KINGWOOD — There have been a few changes at the circuit clerk's office since Betsy

Castle came to work there 39 years ago.

She remembers the old courthouse bell that was rung at 9 a.m. and noon. Castle said the rope for

the bell hung just inside the circuit clerk's office, next to the door. The bell was recently found in the courthouse basement and was dedicated yesterday during the Preston County bicentennial celebration.

"I was looking for a job and I almost accepted one with the DHHR WIC program," Castle said. "I had a young daughter and the job required me to travel. My mom called me and told me [Circuit Clerk] Richard Smith was hiring a deputy circuit clerk. I applied for the position and he hired me."

Castle said every case that comes in, whether civil or family court, comes through her office. New legislation and court rules constantly change the procedures.

"We issue summonses for every case but domestic battery," Castle said. "Those cases start in magistrate court. If bond is posted in a civil, criminal, guardianship or adoption case, we make sure the property offered covers the cost of the bond. I consider we are dealing with people's lives so we want to do everything right."

The circuit clerk is also responsible for finding people to serve on a jury. A computer randomly chooses names of potential jurors from the voter registration and driver's license lists. About 275 questionnaires are sent out to the people selected.

"Out of these we end up with about 80 names from the pack," she said. Another form is sent out that contains an excuse calendar on the back. This allows jurors to mark off days they might have doctor appointments, vacation scheduled or other obligations.

Castle said the first change she made when she took office was changing the process orders information. She said the information had to be retyped in an order book then proofed and the judge had to sign them. Castle said the information is now scanned in and placed in a book. This eliminates possible typing errors and frees up workers to do other jobs.

She said a lot of people come into the office. When they do, Castle and her staff provide procedures. They are not allowed to provide legal advice.

Prior to her job as a deputy circuit clerk she worked for the State Police for nine and a half

## Bus to travel to seven county locations

KINGWOOD — The Learning in Motion Bus will provide learning and lunch programs for Preston County students this summer.

The converted school bus will be traveling to seven locations in the county providing STEM programs, story time, a library and Osmo. Osmo is an accelerated learning system that uses an iPad, physical objects and educational tools. The bus will also provide a free lunch to students up to age 18.

For example, students may read "Stellaluna," a book about a bat, then participate in activities revolving around bats.

# Trump 2020 working with ex-Cambridge Analytica staffers

WASHINGTON — A company run by former officials at Cambridge Analytica, the political consulting firm brought down by a scandal over how it obtained Facebook users' private data, has quietly been working for President Donald Trump's 2020 re-election effort, The Associated Press has learned.

The AP confirmed that at least four former Cambridge Analytica employees are affiliated with Data Propria, a new company specializing in voter and consumer targeting work similar to Cambridge Analytica's efforts before its collapse. The company's former head of product, Matt Oczkowski, leads the new firm, which also includes Cambridge Analytica's former chief data scientist.

Oczkowski denied a link to the Trump campaign, but acknowledged that his new firm has agreed to do 2018 campaign work for the Republican National Committee.

The AP learned of Data Propria's role in Trump's re-election effort as a result of conversations held with political contacts and prospective clients in recent weeks by Oczkowski and Trump's 2020 campaign manager, Brad Parscale. In one such con-

versation, which took place in a public place and was overheard by two AP reporters, Oczkowski said he and Parscale were "doing the president's work for 2020."

In addition, a person familiar with Data Propria's Washington efforts, who spoke on condition of anonymity to protect business relationships, confirmed to the AP that Trump-related 2020 work already had begun at the firm along the lines of Cambridge Analytica's 2016 work.

Both Oczkowski and Parscale told the AP that no Trump re-election work by Data Propria had been planned, but confirmed that Parscale had helped Data Propria line up a successful bid on 2018 midterm polling-related work for the RNC, awarded earlier this week.

Oczkowski had previously told the AP the firm had no intention of seeking political clients, but now says his young company had changed course.

"I'm obviously open to any work that would become available," Oczkowski said, noting that he and Parscale had worked together closely during Trump's 2016 campaign.

Parscale told the AP that he has not even begun awarding contracts for the 2020 campaign, which he

Cloud Commerce's board of directors and provides the company with the majority of its \$2.9 million in revenue, according to the company's most recent Securities and Exchange Commission filing.

Even though Parscale is not directly receiving money from Data Propria work, he owns a stake equivalent to 22 percent of the company's current equity and Cloud Commerce is obligated to pay him roughly two million dollars in special dividends and debt payments related to the purchase of his old business.

Aside from the ties to Parscale, Cloud Commerce's parent company is an unusual candidate for blue chip political work. Founded in 1999, the firm has repeatedly changed its name and business model, and the company's most recent audit "expressed substantial doubt about our ability to continue as a going concern" without continuing infusions of cash.

An AP investigation of Cloud Commerce in March found that a former CEO of its predecessor firm pleaded guilty to stock fraud in 2008 and remained active in Cloud Commerce's affairs until at least 2015. Cloud Commerce says the man has had no connection with its business since at least 2011.

was appointed to manage in March.

"I am laser-focused on the 2018 midterms and holding the House and increasing our seats in the Senate," he said. "Once we do those things, I'll start working on re-electing President Trump."

London-based Cambridge Analytica was accused of playing a key role in the 2014 breach of 87 million Facebook users' personal data. The company said it did not use the information for Trump's 2016 campaign, but some former employees have disputed that. Facebook CEO Mark Zuckerberg has said that it was "entirely possible" the

social media data ended up being used in Russian propaganda efforts.

In May, Cambridge Analytica filed for bankruptcy and said it was "ceasing all operations." A British investigation of Cambridge Analytica and its parent company will continue despite the shutdown, the U.K.'s Information Commissioner's office said last month.

Among the former Cambridge Analytica employees at Data Propria is David Wilkinson, a British citizen who was the company's lead data scientist. During the 2016 campaign, Wilkinson helped oversee the voter data modeling

that informed Trump's focus on the Rust Belt, according to a Cambridge Analytica press release issued after the election.

Another issue raised by Data Propria's work on Trump's re-election effort is the firm's financial links to Parscale, Trump's campaign manager.

Parscale is a part owner of Data Propria's parent company, a publicly traded firm called Cloud Commerce that bought his digital marketing business in August. Over the last year, Cloud Commerce has largely rebuilt itself around Parscale's former company, now rebranded Parscale Digital. Parscale sits on

within the city and are to collect the tax.

The first receipts will not come in until the end of the quarter after this.

The money can be put into the city's general fund or into a special fund, dedicated to certain uses. Morton advised council to "get a good lawyer, who really knows how to deal with those funds and statutes and details and knows exactly where all the pitfalls are."

For example, the tax department notes on its website, Charleston puts its municipal tax receipts in a special fund. It "issued revenue bonds to finance capital improvements to its civic center secured by a first lien on its special revenue fund."

Kingwood Council has discussed using the mon-

ey it could collect to replace the street sweeper and garbage truck, or to help with paving and other expenses.

Councilman Mike Lipscomb asked Morton about a bill introduced in the last legislative session that would have allowed the state to keep part of municipal taxes as an administrative fee.

"That idea never got traction," Morton said. "What they are talking about... is a total, statewide, 7 percent or 7 and a half percent [tax], and then just distributing back ... a piece to the counties, a piece to the municipalities, and just have the state collect that 7 percent."

But that proposal hasn't been passed into law yet, Morton noted.

## X-rays, soy on front lines of U.S.-China trade spat

BEIJING — President Donald Trump is hiking the price of Chinese-made forklift trucks and X-ray machines for American buyers.

They are part of a \$50 billion list of Chinese exports targeted for a 25 percent tariff hike in response to complaints Beijing steals or pressures foreign companies to hand over technology.

The list of 1,102 products issued Friday includes 818 remaining from a tentative list of 1,333 released in April. The U.S. government also released a second list of 284 additional products it said were being considered for tariffs.

It is the first direct impact on American consumers of the dispute over a state-led technology de-

velopment strategy the White House says violates Beijing's free-trade commitments and hurts foreign competitors.

More than a routine trade dispute, it reflects Washington's unease that American technology leadership and prosperity might be eroded by China's state-led efforts to compete in smartphones, electric cars, biotech and other fields.

Economists and businesspeople say Beijing is unlikely to give ground on a strategy seen by Communist leaders as the path to higher incomes and to restoring China's rightful role as a global leader.

### What is the dispute?

U.S. officials say the tariff hike targets goods that might benefit from Chinese theft of technol-

ogy or pressure on foreign companies to hand it over in exchange for market access.

They point to plans stretching back two decades that call for state-led development of Chinese competitors in artificial intelligence, clean energy, electric cars, robotics, biotech and other fields. Foreign companies complain Beijing subsidizes fledgling Chinese developers and shields them from competition in violation of its free-trade commitments.

Trump is hardly the first foreign leader to complain. Others have filed World Trade Organization complaints or lobbied Chinese leaders in person during visits to Beijing. But Trump has attacked head-on, threatening to disrupt Chinese exports.

**Trucker charged in 1987 death of Wash. couple**

EVERETT, Wash. — A Washington state trucker who authorities say was linked by DNA evidence to the 1987 deaths of a young Canadian couple was charged with two counts of aggravated first-degree murder.

William Earl Talbott II, 55, of SeaTac, was charged Friday in Snohomish County Superior Court, the Daily Herald reported.

Authorities say they used information from public genealogy websites to pinpoint Talbott as a suspect, then arrested him after getting a DNA sample from a cup that fell from his truck.

Talbott is charged in the killings of 18-year-old Tanya Van Cuylenborg and 20-year-old Jay Cook.

"From all available information, these acts of violence were as random as they were savage," Craig Matheson, Snohomish

County's chief criminal deputy prosecutor, wrote in court documents. Talbott is being held in the Skagit County Community Justice Center with no bail. It wasn't clear if he

business.

When they failed to return home, their families filed a missing persons report. Their bodies were found days later.

Van Cuylenborg was sexually assaulted, bound with plastic ties and shot in the head. Investigators say the assault evidence provided a direct link to Talbott.

Cook's battered body was found about 75 miles away. Police say he was beaten with rocks and strangled.

Police say a genealogist used the DNA evidence and worked with a lab to build a family tree for the suspect.

Police say the genealogist used information uploaded by distant cousins to narrow their search to Talbott.

Police kept him under surveillance and finally got his DNA when a cup fell from his truck.

**Brother of NBA's Zach Randolph killed outside Indiana bar**

INDIANAPOLIS — Authorities say Sacramento Kings forward Zach Randolph's brother was shot and killed early Saturday outside of a bar in the Indiana city where the two grew up.

Police said that an officer heard gunfire at around 5 a.m. and found Roger Randolph bleeding between two cars outside of Hop's Blues Room in Marion, which is about 60 miles northeast of Indianapolis. They said investigators don't know the circumstances surrounding the shooting, but they don't think it was a random attack.

Roger Randolph, who was 35 years old, had sev-

eral brushes with the law, including for a 2004 shooting at a nightclub that wounded three people and landed him in prison.

Roger Randolph was sentenced to three years in prison in 2005 for his role in the nightclub shooting in Anderson, which is about 30 miles south of Marion and is where court records say he was living when he was killed. The shooting apparently stemmed from an argument on the dance floor.

Zach Randolph was at the club that night and was questioned, but he wasn't charged.

Roger Randolph was charged last year with OWI, the Indiana equivalent of driving under the influence. There was a hearing last week in that case, which was unresolved.

Zach Randolph led Marion High School to a state championship in 2000 be-

fore heading to Michigan State University and then the NBA. In addition to the Kings, he has played for the Portland Trail Blazers, New York Knicks, Los Angeles Clippers and Memphis Grizzlies. He is a two-time NBA all star.

In a statement, Kings General Manager Vlade Divac called Randolph's death "tragic," adding "our prayers, heartfelt condolences and thoughts are with Zach and his family during this painful and difficult time."

Roger Randolph was also a gifted basketball player growing up in Marion, but he got into trouble and was kicked off the high school team. His mother sent him to a boarding school in Pennsylvania.

"The cliché [is], 'this is a man's world,' but we definitely learned at our six days at Girls State that we can definitely turn it into a women's world," Oliverio said.

clearances around electrical systems and helping to protect against tree-related outages. Mon Power tree contractors have trimmed more than 1,000 circuit miles of electric lines since January and expect to trim another 3,500 miles by year end.

In addition, a team of Mon Power and FirstEnergy employees recently conducted a readiness exercise

to test the company's restoration process used to repair storm-related power outages. Storm drills are becoming more common in the utility industry in the wake of severe weather over the last several years.

Mon Power's power plants also are making preparations to meet the expected demand for electricity this summer.

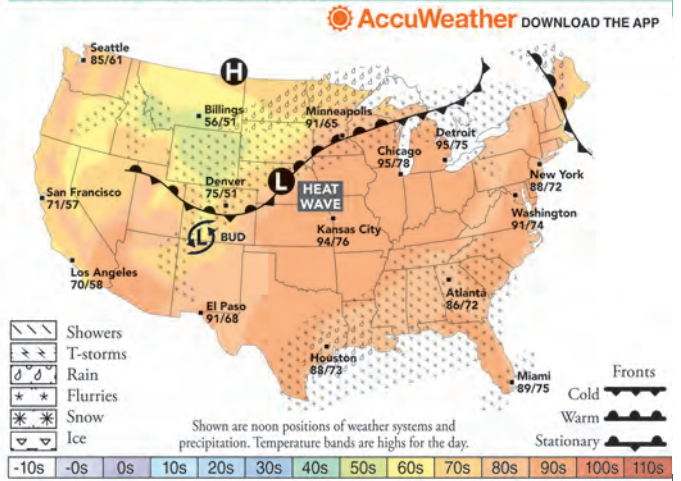

## Tomac, Plessinger High Point winners

MOUNT MORRIS, Pa. — The Lucas Oil Pro Motocross Championship, sanctioned by AMA Pro Racing, made its first trip to the east coast Saturday for the fourth round of the season.

The Red Bull High Point National from High Point Raceway has become a Father's Day tradition, and fittingly a pair of riders following the racing lineage of their fathers triumphed at the famed facility.

While it wasn't easy, Monster Energy Kawasaki's Eli Tomac

withstood his stiffest challenge to date in the 450 Class to capture his fourth straight victory.

In the 250 Class, Monster Energy/Yamalube/Star/Yamaha's Aaron Plessinger earned an unlikely 1-1 sweep for his second win of the season, which allowed him to regain control of the point lead.

Tomac won the overall at all four rounds thus far in 2018.

With his 6-0 record and commanding point lead entering the race, Tomac emerged with his first Motosport.com Holeshot of the season in the opening 450 Class moto, ahead of Team Red Bull KTM Factory Racing's Marvin Musquin and Monster Energy/Yamaha Factory Rac-

ing's Justin Barcia. A first-turn crash took several other top competitors out of contention early, including Team Honda HRC's Ken Roczen and RMATV/MC-WPS-KTM's Blake Baggett, the fastest qualifier. Both riders got back into action and completed the opening lap in 31st and 33rd, respectively.

Out front, Tomac sprinted out to an early lead while Barcia applied pressure on Musquin for second. The Yamaha and KTM-mounted riders almost made contact on several occasions, but Barcia ultimately prevailed when Musquin went off track. That bat-

## Jones has shot at spot on the World Cup team

He turned down a chance to play in \$2M tourney

FAIRMONT — Kevin Jones is a man with options these days.

One of them — an opportunity to play for team Armored Athlete in The Basketball Tournament (TBT) — could have netted him a \$112,000 share of a \$2 million winner-take-all prize.

"It was tempting, for sure," said Jones, a former WVU men's basketball standout who took part in the annual WVU Alumni Game on Saturday, at Fairmont State's Feaster Center. "I decided there were some different things I wanted to do this summer."

That would be Jones' other option and it may afford him a chance to represent the United States, at the FIBA World Cup.

Jones said he was leaving Wednesday for a training camp in Houston, where the final team will be announced.

Team USA, coached by former New York Knicks and Houston Rockets head coach Jeff Van Gundy, will consist

mainly of professional players from the NBA G League and American-born players who have played overseas.

It will be a short training camp — the Americans have a qualifying game against Mexico, in Mexico City, on June 28. Team USA will then travel to Havana to play Cuba, on July 1.

"I've never been to Cuba before," Jones said. "It could be a once-in-a-lifetime thing for me."

Even before the two games in the coming weeks, Team USA qualified to move into the second round of FIBA World Cup

qualifying play.

The ultimate goal for the U.S. is to advance past the second round and qualify for the 2019 World Cup, in China, which will also serve as a qualifier for the 2020 Olympic Games, in Tokyo.

"I'm not all that sure who all will move on to play in all the games," Jones said. "For this round, I know they're looking to keep 15 guys and 12 will play, so we'll see what happens once I get to training camp."

As for TBT, a yearly single-elimination tournament set up in the same fashion as the NCAA tournament with a \$2 million prize split up among the players on the winning team, former WVU standout John Flowers said an attempt was made to get a WVU alumni team into the tournament this year, but it never materialized.

## Mountaineers make offer to Polar Bears DL

THE STATE OF WEST VIRGINIA continues to churn out high-level football prospects lately.

Yes, you read that first sentence correctly.

A state long known to be lacking in that department has become a mini-hotbed of talent, with seven prospects earning Power 5 offers from a long list of schools.

The current class features the nation's No. 2 prospect in consensus five-star offensive tackle **Darnell Wright**, from Huntington High, while six others hold Power 5 offers already. Beyond that, there is a list of several others who hold Division I offers inside the Mountain State.

That has only continued the run that began in the 2017 class, when seven players signed with Power 5 programs, and last year, when Fairmont Senior defensive end **Dante Stills** climbed the rankings.

This isn't just a three-year window either.

The class of 2020 now is represented by another Fairmont Senior product. Defensive lineman **Zach Frazier** earned a scholarship offer from WVU on Saturday, after an impressive performance at a one-day camp.

Frazier, 6-foot-2 and 277 pounds, received word of the offer following the camp. The in-state prospect is no stranger to Morgantown. He made a number of visits to campus the last couple years. An admitted fan of the program, Frazier was obviously excited that the Mountaineers became the first school to offer him a scholarship.

Defensive coordinator **Tony Gibson** and defensive line coach **Bruce Tall** are the coaches who have remained in contact with Frazier. He was able to work extensively with them during the camp. That was enough to secure the offer.

"They like that I'm a home-state guy," Frazier said.

The defensive lineman is the third prospect at that position from Fairmont Senior to receive an offer from the Mountaineers since 2017 joining current WVU players and brothers **Dante** and **Darius Stills**.

It's a new era in the Mountain State and the Mountaineers now don't need to go as far to try to find some high-end division one talent within its borders.

## Gray earns ABCA all-America honors

Junior second baseman Kyle Gray was named to the ABCA/Rawlings all-America third team, the American Baseball Coaches Association announced Saturday.

The all-America accolade is the first of Gray's career, and he

is the 18th in program history. The Mountaineers have had at least one all-American in each of the last four years, while Gray's honor is the 16th total in coach Randy Mazey's six seasons.

The award adds to a long list of honors for Gray, who also was named to the ABCA all-region first team on Wednesday, the all-Big 12 first team and the Big 12 all-tournament team. The Blan-

co, Texas, native was selected in the 14th round of the MLB draft by the New York Yankees.

Gray's season was highlighted by a 23-game hit streak, the longest by a Mountaineer since 2009, and 14 home runs, tied for sixth-most in a season in program history. He led the team in nearly every defensive category and was second in the Big 12 with a .677 slugging percentage; third

with a .374 batting average, a .462 on-base percentage and 14 home runs; fourth with 134 total bases and seventh with 74 hits.

In Big 12 play, Gray led the league with a .391 batting average, was second with a .759 slugging percentage and 66 total bases, third with eight home runs, fourth with a .460 on-base percentage and 34 hits, and seventh with 24 runs scored.

tle allowed Tomac to establish a multi-second lead, but it was short lived. Musquin regrouped and successfully repassed Barcia for second. He kept Tomac in his sights with slightly quicker lap times and continued to chip away at Tomac's lead. It wasn't long before Musquin closed to within a few bikes lengths and began to look for ways around Tomac. As they worked through lapped traffic, Musquin took advantage of faster lines to get alongside Tomac and make a pass around the outside with 6 1/2 minutes left in the moto.

Once on the front, Musquin continued to pull away from Tomac and brought the defending champion's moto winning streak to an end. Musquin took his first checkered flag of the season 5.4 seconds ahead of Tomac, while Barcia finished a distant third. Autotrader/Yoshimura/Suzuki Factory Racing's Justin Hill finished fourth in his first ever 450 Class moto, while Baggett battled all the way back to finish fifth. Roczen finished just a couple spots behind that in seventh.

When the gate dropped on the second moto, Roczen put his Honda out front with his first holeshot, narrowly beating out Tomac and Musquin. Musquin was able to slip under Tomac for second, but as he went to pressure Roczen the Honda rider bobbled, slowing the momentum of both riders and allowing Tomac to move past on the outside. Roczen countered

Tomac's pass attempt and maintained his hold of the lead, while Musquin was forced to settle into third.

A short time later, Roczen made another costly error, carrying too much speed into an off-camber corner and running off track. This allowed Tomac to slip by and assume control of the lead, while Roczen got back on track in second. That presented an opportunity for Musquin to apply pressure on Roczen, and after a couple laps of following the German, the Frenchman made his move to take over the position.

Tomac picked up the pace in defense of Musquin's prowess on the highly technical track. Despite his best efforts, Tomac still lost time to the Frenchman and as the moto wore on, the two rivals continued to inch closer and closer to one another. As they navigated through lappers the distance between Tomac and Musquin stabilized, but with just over a minute remaining Musquin picked up the pace and closed in on Tomac's rear fender.

Tomac defended by protecting the inside line in virtually every corner, and he also used lapped riders to his advantage, getting by with ease while Musquin occasionally got held up. On the final lap both riders let it hang out. Musquin got alongside Tomac on two different occasions, but since the KTM rider didn't have the preferred line, Tomac maintained the advantage and held off the Frenchman through to the finish.

Tomac took the win by 1.7 seconds over Musquin,

while Roczen followed more than a minute behind in third.

By virtue of his second moto win, Tomac (2-1) earned the tiebreaker on Musquin (2-1) in the overall classification, securing his fourth straight victory this season and the 13th of his career. Barcia finished third overall (3-5).

Tomac remains 28 points ahead of Musquin in the 450 Class standings, while Barcia is third, 57 points out of the lead.

In the 250 Class, Plessinger enjoyed a dominant first moto and earned his class-leading third win of the season, 7.6 seconds ahead of Jeremy Martin. Justin Cooper followed in third, with Monster Energy/Pro Circuit/Kawasaki's Austin Forkner in fourth and Troy Lee Designs/Red Bull/KTM's Jordan Smith in fifth.

The second moto got underway with Cooper out front again, sweeping both holeshots. Martin slotted into second, with Forkner in third, while Plessinger started inside the top five.

Just past the halfway point, Martin lost power on his Honda and was forced to stand in the middle of the track holding the bike up. Plessinger and everyone behind him rode past.

Plessinger led the final portion of the race while Forkner was forced to battle with Monster Energy/Yamalube/Star/Yamaha's Dylan Ferrandis, who was making his season debut, for second. Plessinger took a surprising win, and capped off a 1-1 sweep, by crossing the line 2.1 seconds ahead of Forkner.

It was the fourth career win for Plessinger.

Federer returns to No. 1 with victory at Stuttgart

STUTTGART, Germany — Roger Federer defeated Nick Kyrgios, 6-7 (2), 6-2, 7-6 (5), to book his place in the Stuttgart Open final and reclaim the No. 1 ranking from Rafael Nadal on Saturday. "It's nice that it happened but I've other problems," said Federer, playing his first tournament since March. "I hadn't played in three months, it's on grass, it's fast and difficult to get so far here. Still, I'm delighted to have achieved it."

The Swiss great will play Milos Raonic as he bids for his 18th grass-court title and 98th altogether.

Raonic earlier hit 19 aces and saved the only

break point he faced as he defeated defending champion Lucas Pouille, 6-4, 7-6 (3), in the other semifinal.

Federer was pushed all the way by the fourth-seeded Kyrgios, who had 23 aces.

Kyrgios forced a mini-break in the deciding tiebreak, but Federer remained steady and sent a short backhand past the Australian on his first match point to clinch the win.

Federer was trailing Nadal by 100 points at the start of the week and is guaranteed of taking the top spot on Monday regardless of how today's final goes.

It will be Raonic's first final since the 2017 Istanbul Open.

The Canadian won his last title at the 2016 Brisbane International.

Tar Heels KO Oregon State star Heimlich

OMAHA, Neb. — North Carolina knocked out Oregon State ace Luke Heimlich during a five-run third inning and went on to beat the Beavers, 8-6, on Saturday, in the opening game of the College World Series.

The Tar Heels (44-18) used six pitchers in a 4-hour, 24-minute slog in 95-degree heat that was the longest nine-inning game in CWS history.

They turned back threats from one of the nation's most potent offenses in the sixth and seventh innings and prevailed against an opponent they hadn't faced since losing to the Beavers in the 2006 and '07 CWS finals.

Ashton McGee and Ben Casparius, North Carolina's Nos. 8 and 9 batters, combined to drive in five runs as the Tar Heels built leads of 6-1 and 8-4.

Oregon State (49-11-1) was poised to go ahead in the seventh, after loading the bases with two outs against Josh Hiatt and with Steven Kwan coming to bat. Kwan reached base on his first four trips to the plate and struck out only 15 times in 247 at-bats, making him one of the toughest players in the nation to strike out. Cooper Criswell came on and struck him out on three pitches.

The Beavers were uncharacteristically sloppy while losing their third straight game over two years in Omaha. Carolina scored on a passed ball, and the Beavers committed three errors after making one in their first five NCAA tournament games.

Then there was Heimlich (16-2), the two-time Pac-12 pitcher of the year who lasted just 2 1/3 innings — his shortest start in two years.

Last year, Heimlich left the team for super regionals and the CWS after it was revealed he had pleaded guilty to molesting a young relative when he was 15.

"I played a lot of sports myself, so that probably played a role in it," Noonan said. "But for him, I think it was the first WVU football game we took him to. He fell in love with sports. I'm not from around here originally — a friend took us to our first WVU game, and I saw that passion come out."

Things easily could have been different for Keilan, though — he suffers from a birth defect known as microcephaly. The cortex in the back of his brain is significantly smaller than the average size.

"There's a multitude of effects. He is high functioning — he can take showers, feed himself, play sports and such," Noonan said. "His motor skills are there — it just takes his brain a lot to process in order to do things, such as brushing his teeth, putting on deodorant and such. That part of his brain works a little slower."

Noonan didn't want his son to miss out on any chances in life, despite his disadvantage. He wanted to ensure Keilan had an equitable opportunity to enjoy and excel in a variety of disciplines — including sports.

"He's developmentally delayed, but I wanted him to have the chance to do what all other kids do," he said.

These desires drove Noonan to seek out any and all extracurricular activities for Keilan as high school approached. That's where Preston girls' basketball coach Brian Miller came into play.

"It's kind of a funny story. Four years ago, he was a freshman, and his mom told my wife she wanted to get him involved at high school," he said. "My wife brought it up to me, saying that he loved sports and loved basketball and said, 'We can do this.'"

Miller wanted to bring Keilan out, and offered to make him a manager on the team. Four years later, Keilan is a fixture in Kingwood during basketball season. He does pre-game introductions with the squad, and joins Miller on the bench. Now and again, he'll even help coach the girls, or give them a piece of his mind when they're not following instructions.

To any players, parents and fans involved with the program, Keilan is practically inseparable from Preston basketball.

"You can't have a bad day when he's around. No matter what type of day the girls

have had or I have had, when he's around, within minutes everyone is laughing and having a good time," Miller said. "He's brought a lot of positive things to the girls and to the team."

In fact, Miller believes that even though the gig started as a way to get Keilan involved, it's been a more helpful experience to everyone else involved.

"The big thing is, I think it's been more positive for everyone else than him. It started off with the original goal of getting him involved, but he's probably had a more positive impact on us than we have on him," he said. "But just helping him get out, get involved and have a good time, that's what the goal is."

In addition to his work at PHS, Keilan is involved with the Special Olympics; he golfs, bowls and competes for the Preston County basketball team. Most recently, he qualified for the Special Olympics national bowling championship, in Seattle. He'll leave to compete at the end of June.

"That's a big accomplishment for him," Noonan said. "And what a lot of people don't know a lot about the Special Olympics is that these kids are close. They form friendships and have a camaraderie together."

His accomplishments across the sports world are certainly something no one can take away from him, but perhaps most important is the legacy that Keilan will leave at PHS. He has become a symbol of what Preston pride is supposed to be, and has made a genuinely positive impact on most who meet him. His presence has become a foundation for both success and pride at PHS; a mighty impressive feat for just one teenager.

"Since he became the basketball manager, the morale on that team when he's around is 10 times, 100 times better than when he isn't around. His pure love for high school sports — it's hard to explain," Noonan said. "He'll cheer every team at Preston on with 100 percent. To put on that PHS logo brings such a joy to him. It brightens his day. I think that's what you call true pride in your school."

"To see when he runs out before basketball games — he's the first one that runs out and gets his name called, and the crowd goes wild. That's the spirit he brings to the gym."

## Johnson in 4-way tie at the top

SOUTHAMPTON, N.Y. — The only thing that spared Dustin Johnson from another U.S. Open implosion is that everyone around him suffered on a Shinnecock Hills course that even the USGA conceded got out of hand Saturday afternoon.

Daniel Berger and Tony Finau were the exceptions, each posting a 4-under 66 about the time Johnson was just starting out on greens that became so slick that Phil Mickelson swatted a ball that was still moving on the 13th green and no one in the final 22 groups broke par.

Johnson, who started the third round with a

four-shot lead, barely nudged his 17-foot birdie attempt on the 18th hole. It ran 8 feet by the cup and he missed the par putt for one last bogey and a 7-over 77.

At least he still has a chance. Johnson was in a four-way tie for the lead at 3-over 213, the highest 54-hole score to lead the U.S. Open since the fabled "Massacre at Winged Foot" in 1974.

"You were seeing shots that were well played and not rewarded," said Mike Davis, the chief executive of the USGA. "It was a very tough test, but probably too tough this afternoon."

Berger and Finau, who started the day 11 shots out of the lead, will play in the final group.

Johnson and defending champion Brooks Koepka

will be right behind them. Koepka made only two birdies in a hard-earned round of 72, leaving him in position to become the first back-to-back winner of the U.S. Open since Curtis Strange, in 1989.

Henrik Stenson made one birdie and picked up three shots on the leader.

Mickelson celebrated his 48th birthday by matching his worst score in his 27th U.S. Open with an 81, and he provided the snapshot of a day that was entertaining for reasons the USGA didn't imagine.

He went from behind the 13th green all the way off the front. His next shot was 18 feet above the hole. His bogey putt slid by, and after a few putts, Mickelson trotted after it and then stuck out his putter

and hit the ball back toward the cup to keep it from running off the green. That's a two-shot penalty, giving him a 10.

"It's just a moment of madness," said Andrew "Beef" Johnston, who played with Mickelson and couldn't stifle a laugh.

Mickelson apologized if anyone was offended by his act, even after saying he knew the rules for hitting a ball in motion and was happy to take a two-shot penalty instead of playing a crude version of tennis.

Johnson didn't have anything that wild, rather more of a slow bleed that began with a shot off a sandy path and three putts on the par-3 second hole for his first double bogey of the championship.

# SSAC set to add archery as a sanctioned sport

**THE EXTREME POPULARITY** of archery among West Virginia youngsters attracted the attention of the West Virginia Secondary Schools Activities Commission. Executive Director **Bernie Dolan** told MetroNews the SSAC is ready to sanction archery as a school sport.

"We're going to be working on it to roll it out in the next year or two," Dolan said. "We want to see how quickly it can become a fully sanctioned sport."

The framework for the sport is already in place through the Archery in Schools program run by the West Virginia Division of Natural Resources. The A-I-S has teams in almost all West Virginia schools, including elementary and middle schools, and the popularity drew the attention of Dolan and the SSAC.

"All of our sports come about because of interest in schools," he said. "We don't drive the interest. If there's enough schools doing a particular activity, often they will submit a letter to us to be recognized as a sport, and that's the case here with archery."

Dolan said Elkview Middle School coach **Eddie Gray** was instrumental in coaxing the Activities Commission to consider archery. Gray's program is one of the original Archery in the Schools teams and hosts the biggest school

archery tournament each year. This year's tourney, due to problems after the 2016 floods, was moved to the Cline Center at Marshall University.

Archery as an SSAC sport, according to Dolan, would start out as a co-ed offering. Dolan likes the even playing field regardless of a participant's physical stature or means. Since all participants use identical equipment, the challenge lies in a shooter's ability. Shooters who have a lot of money cannot simply buy better equip-

ment to improve their accuracy. Size and strength also have almost no impact on success.

"The one thing I like about this is, the girls shoot as well or better than the boys," Dolan said. "It will be exciting to see the girls competing on the same level."

Dolan thinks it may also attract a whole new group of students who presently do not compete in any extracurricular activities.

"That's one of the draws, the number of different kids who are going

to be able to participate and win some awards in our championships," he said. "You're really not going to be stealing a lot of kids from other sports."

Dolan said the SSAC will monitor the sport in the next year or so to see how it develops. He believes it will grow and as that happens it will be revisited as numbers and participation warrant changes and upgrades.

# Iceland battles Argentina to draw

MOSCOW — The World Cup rookies from the tournament's smallest nation are suddenly legitimate contenders for the knock-out stage.

Two years after reaching the quarterfinals at the European Championship, Iceland earned its first point in its first World Cup match, holding two-time champion Argentina to a surprising 1-1 draw Saturday.

The round of 16 could be beckoning.

"Ah, you're not going to get me to say that when we play in a group with Nigeria, Croatia and Argentina," said Iceland goalkeeper Hannes Halldorsson, who saved a penalty from Lionel Messi. "You also saw the game tonight. They had a lot of possession. They had more shots than us."

Spoken like a veteran.

They may not be cocky, but after passing one of their first competitive tests against a top-ranked side from outside Europe, the Icelanders aren't short on confidence, either.

They know no one wants to play them.

"This is a typical game for us: We defend well, we get the opponent impatient and then, when we attack, we are fast and we have quality," Halldorsson said. "So we are a nightmare to play against and we can beat anybody when we have our day."

You're not likely to get an argument from Messi, who will be dogged by visions of Halldorsson blocking the penalty that could have given Argentina all three points.

Besides its run to the quarterfinals of Euro 2016, which included a win over England, Iceland won its World Cup qualifying group. The team earned its reputation as an organized, stout defending side that's dangerous on set pieces.

"We have a clear identity and everybody is on board how we should play," Iceland coach Heimir Hallgrimsson said.

They don't just dig into the trenches, either. Alfred

Finnbogason, who scored Iceland's goal Saturday, noted that the team moved from a traditional 4-4-2 lineup to having five midfielders, which bolsters the marauding ranks on the counterattack.

"We are more unpredictable now, and hopefully we'll show that in the competition," he said.

Confident though they are, the Icelanders don't need to be reminded that they are from the smallest country every to qualify for the World Cup.

"Deep down, we know that we come from Iceland. And we are very outnumbered if you look at population numbers," Halldorsson said. "So there's always this thought that, maybe we are tiny Iceland and maybe they are going to crush us. So maybe that's also what keeps us on our toes, that we are always a bit worried that we might get smacked."

**Denmark 1, Peru 0**  
SARANSK, Russia —

Kasper Schmeichel's slew of saves made Yussuf Poulsen's opportunistic second-half goal stand up in Denmark's victory.

Poulsen squeezed his goal between charging Peru goalkeeper Pedro Gallese and the left post in the 59th minute, after collecting a pass from midfielder Christian Eriksen.

Appearing at the World Cup for the first time in 36 years, Peru had overwhelming fan support in the Mordovia Arena and the bulk of scoring chances, including a late first-half penalty shot that Christian Cueva sent sailing over the crossbar.

**France 2, Australia 1**

KAZAN, Russia — Technology twice helped the 1998 champions as they labored to beat a gritty Australia.

The French team was given a controversial penalty kick, converted by Antoine Griezmann, in the 58th minute, after the referee watched the replay of a foul on the sideline.

Paul Pogba later scored the winning goal in the 81st minute, and goal-line technology was used to confirm the ball crossed the line after bouncing down off the crossbar.

Pogba had been unimpressive until the goal, but the Manchester United midfielder set up a 1-2 with substitute Olivier Giroud and beat Australia goalkeeper Mat Ryan to give France the victory.

**Croatia 2, Nigeria 0**

KALININGRAD, Russia — Luka Modric set up one goal and scored another from the penalty spot to give Croatia a win.

The Real Madrid midfielder sent in a corner that was headed by two Croatians and then deflected into the net by Nigeria midfielder Oghenekaro Etebo in the 32nd minute.

Modric then converted a penalty in the 71st, after William Ekong held on to Mario Mandzukic.

# WVU's Carter is among the top guards available

There's little question about where to start when looking at the top point guard prospects in the NBA draft: Trae Young and Collin Sexton.

Young was the national leader in both scoring and assists with the Sooners as a freshman, while Sexton provided an aggressive presence at the helm of the Crimson Tide's attack in his only year at Alabama.

Young is expected to be the first point guard chosen Thursday, while Sexton could join him as a top-10 pick.

Here's a look at the top prospects:

### Trae Young

Young's scoring and play-making ability drew comparisons to three-time NBA champion Stephen Curry.

**STRENGTHS:** The 6-foot-2, 178-pound Young averaged 27.4 points and 8.7 assists while putting up his share of eye-popping numbers, including four 40-point games and a Division I record-tying 22 assists against Northwestern State. He ranked fourth nationally in 3-pointers per game (3.69) and can score in bunches from anywhere, positioning him to thrive in the NBA's free-flowing game.

**CONCERNS:** All the offensive stats were often fairly empty down the stretch as Oklahoma lost 13 of 18 before squeaking into the NCAA Tournament for a first-round loss. Young wasn't the most efficient scorer; he was in the top four nationally in both overall shots and 3-pointers attempted but the percentages weren't great (.422 on field goals, .360 on 3s) while he also led the nation with 167 turnovers. He also had the smallest wingspan (6-3) of players at the combine and could stand to get stronger to handle physical pro defenders.

### Collin Sexton

Sexton led Alabama back to the NCAA tournament for the first time since 2012.

**STRENGTHS:** Athleticism — the 6-2, 183-pound freshman has plenty of it. He averaged 19.2 points while shooting nearly 45 percent, offering a quick first step and the aggressive edge needed to get to

the rim. He had a solid floor game with 3.8 rebounds and 3.6 assists per game. And while a similar height to Oklahoma's Young, Sexton has a bigger wingspan (measuring a bit over 6-7 at the combine).

**CONCERNS:** Sexton is capable of hitting from outside, such as when he hit six 3-pointers against Auburn and had five other games with at least three made 3s. The trick now is becoming a more consistent threat after making just 34 percent (44 of 131) for the season.

### Shai Gilgeous-Alexander

Kentucky's latest one-and-done talent wasn't the Wildcats' top recruit but thrived after becoming a full-time starter in January to make himself a possible lottery selection.

**STRENGTHS:** He offers good size at the point after checking in at 6-6 at the combine with a nearly 7-foot wingspan. And he improved as the year went on, averaging 16.4 points, 5.7 assists and 4.6 rebounds after becoming the starter. He also shot 40 percent from 3-point range on the year.

**CONCERNS:** He'll need to add bulk to a lean 180-pound frame to handle physical play both on the perimeter and driving to the rim.

### Others to watch

**JALEN BRUNSON:** The Associated Press national player of the year doesn't have eye-popping athleticism, but he's a steady and efficient performer who led Villanova to a second NCAA title in three seasons. The junior is a potential first-round pick.

**JEVON CARTER:** WVU's floor leader and two-time Big 12 defensive player of the year could sneak into the first round.

**TREVON DUVAL:** After one year at Duke, he is likely a second-round pick with good athleticism (third at the combine in max vertical leap at 41.5 inches) but a suspect outside shot (29 percent on 3s).

**AARON HOLIDAY:** The UCLA junior is a first-round prospect and seems next up after the trio at the top. He was the Pac-12's leading scorer (20.3 points) while averaging 5.8 assists, though he's a bit undersized (6-1, 187).

# Bucs slug 3 HRs, beat listless Reds

Ivan Nova (4-5) worked through heavy trouble in six innings to pick up his second victory in as many

starts since returning from the 10-day disabled list with a sprained right ring finger. Nova allowed only Eugenio Suarez's 13th home run of the season, in the second, striking out three while giving up three walks.

The Pirates have won three straight to move back to .500 (35-35).

**Rockies 5, Rangers 2**

ARLINGTON, Texas — Adrian Beltre hit a tiebreaking two-run triple in the eighth inning, and Texas stopped a seven-game slide with a win over Colorado.

It was Beltre's 3,095th career hit, tops among active players.

**Blue Jays 2, Nationals 0**

TORONTO — Washington's Max Scherzer (10-3) lost a second straight start

for the first time since 2015, when Marco Estrada pitched 6 2-3 shutout innings and Devon Travis homered for Toronto.

**Astros 10, Royals 2**

KANSAS CITY, Mo. — Houston won its 10th straight game, with Dallas Keuchel (4-8) getting three-run homers from Max Stassi and Alex Bregman to rout Kansas City.

**Yankees 4, Rays 1**

NEW YORK — Luis Severino (10-2) pitched eight sharp innings and also jumped to steal away a pop-up from catcher Gary Sanchez, leading New York over Tampa Bay.

**Tigers 7, White Sox 5**

## Team earns honors in NASA Mars challenge

Not a leaking drain plug nor a blown water line could keep the MIDAS II team from WVU from placing in NASA’s Mars Ice Challenge.

Led by Powsiri Klinkhachorn, professor of computer science and electrical engineering, the Mountaineer Ice Drilling Automated System team picked up second place and top honors for extracting the clearest water during the three-day event, besting the likes of MIT, Carnegie Mellon and Virginia Tech.

Held at NASA Langley Research Center in Hampton, Virginia, the Mars Ice Challenge tasks teams to create innovative designs for drilling and water extraction systems on Earth that could be modified for use on Mars. Teams tested their drilling systems on simulated Martian subsurface ice stations — solid blocks of ice covered with regolith, a mixture of clay and gravel, about one meter deep. Teams competed to extract the most water from the ice station. The competition was won by first-time competitor Northeastern University.

While WVU won the competition in 2017, it wasn’t satisfied just sitting on its laurels. The team took the technology used to create MIDAS I a step further when creating MIDAS II.

“MIDAS I had two systems to complete its operation: One to plunge into the regolith and ice sample and another to heat and melt the water,” Klinkhachorn said. “MIDAS II combined both systems into one singular probe to go about its operations. The all-in-one bit included heaters, a pipe for water to go through and a copper tip.”

The all-in-one bit plunged into the regolith sample with a hammer drill and industrial-grade compact linear rail system. Once the predetermined depth was reached, heating cycles began to form a cavity, known as a Rodriguez well, within the sample.

“The Rod well’s shape keeps dirt out of the water sample and allows for the formation of plentiful water,” said Bert Wieliczko, an electrical and computer engineering graduate student from

Holderness, New Hampshire. “We designed this system with all intentions set on Martian operations. The Rod well is the centerpiece of the operation.”

Additional changes included a better pump and blower, which allowed for clearer water samples, and MIDAS II was foldable, proving the process created by the team could easily be made portable, thus suitable for transport to Mars.

While day two of the competition started off well with all systems operating flawlessly, the team soon ran into problems.

“All systems were functioning like they did during testing prior to the competition. However, we did not accumulate as much water as we thought we would,” said aerospace engineering major Kermit Sah (Honors College; Lexington, South Carolina). “We assumed we got too excited with our first hole and pumped all the water out during the primary part of the heating sample.”

After running MIDAS II through multiple tests to ensure

everything was operating properly, the team noticed water escaping from the bottom of the NASA-supplied ice box via a defective drain plug. Once the defect was corrected, the team went back to drilling, collecting 755.5 milliliters, nearly twice what they extracted in 2017.

Day three, which challenges the teams to operate the robotic system autonomously, saw muddy water clogging and ultimately blowing the system’s water line. After some minor repairs, the team unofficially collected more than three liters of water.

Over the course of two days, the team collected 859.5 milliliters of water.

“We collected the cleanest water and were able to show consistency during all operations,” Klinkhachorn said. “We are proud of the system we have built because it not only worked well during competition but it showed a unique and innovative way to allow for the extraction of liquid water on a Martian environment.”

Joining Wieliczko and Sah on the team were Dylan Johnson (Heaters), Eric Loy (Keyser), Nathan Owen (Fairfax, Virginia), Derek Roesch (Nazareth, Pennsylvania), Amanda Stevens (Inwood), Daniel Torti (Long Beach, New York), Nicholas Wallace (Roxboro, North Carolina), Andrew Wallace (Crownsville, Maryland) and Joseph Yeager (Summersville). Co-advising the team was Ilkin Bilgesu, associate professor of petroleum and natural gas engineering.

WVU’s second team, IS-ICE, the In-Situ Ice Chip Extractor, was led by Sean Lantto, an aerospace engineering major from Manassas, Virginia, and advised by Thomas Evans, research associate professor in the Department Mechanical and Aerospace Engineering and director of the West Virginia Robotic Technology Center. Guest speakers will address several topics relating to the history of law in West Virginia, such as pioneer lawyer James Wilson; J.R. Clifford, the state’s first African-American attorney; Louis A. Johnson; women in the field of law; and WVU’s College of Law.

Following the talks, the WVRHC will open an exhibit of photographs, artifacts and documents chronicling the history of law in West Virginia in the James Hornor Davis Family Galleries.

## Researchers make discovery about brain’s detection process

Every day, people are asked to find something — a familiar face in a crowd, a child in the park, a particular house on a street. While researchers have long since known that the ability to effectively search and detect goal-relevant targets is controlled by top-down signals from the brain’s frontal area, a researcher from WVU has found evidence that the human medial temporal lobe — or MTL — also plays an essential role in this process.

In a report recently published in “Current Biology,” Shuo Wang, assistant professor of chemical and biomedical engineering, has found that the MTL contains a strikingly functional type of cell never described before in humans: Target cells.

Wang and his collaborators — Ueli Rutishauser and Adam Mamelak from Cedars-Sinai Medical Center and Ralph Adolphs from California Insti-

tute of Technology — took the very rare opportunity to record single neurons from epilepsy patients, who were undergoing seizure monitoring at Cedars-Sinai. They performed concurrent recordings of eye movements and single neurons in the MTL and medial frontal cortex — or MFC — in human neurosurgical patients performing a memory-guided visual search task.

“During goal-directed visual search, these target cells signal whether the currently fixated item is the target of the current search,” Wang said. “This target signal was behaviorally relevant because it predicted whether a subject detected or missed a fixated target, i.e. failed to abort the search.”

Wang was surprised to find that these target cells were not visually tuned; they didn’t care about the content of the target but only whether an item is a target or not. Their response to identical items could be differ-

ent, depending on whether or not an item was the target of the search.

“This type of response is fundamentally different from that observed in upstream areas to the MTL, i.e. the inferior temporal cortex, where cells are visually tuned and are only modulated by target presence or absence on top of this visual tuning,” Wang said. “The discovery of this novel type of cell in the MTL, in humans, shows direct evidence for a specific top-down goal-relevance signal in the MTL.”

The study also found that target cells in the MFC respond significantly earlier relative to target cells in the MTL.

“This latency difference was derived from simultaneously recorded target cells in both areas, which is a rare opportunity to directly investigate the flow of information of top-down signals,” Wang said. “This finding suggests that the MFC may be

one specific source of top-down signals that specify stimulus meaning in the MTL.”

Wang and his collaborators are conducting further experiments and analysis on how different brain areas coordinate with each other to give rise to target detection.

“This is particularly important for people with autism, because they show impaired visual search, especially when they search for people and faces,” Wang said. “One possibility is that there is pathology within neurons of the MTL itself. Another is that there is abnormal connectivity between the MTL and other brain areas. Our single-neuron recording experiment permits a temporal resolution that will help distinguish these possibilities.”

This work was supported by the National Institute of Mental Health, the WVU Rockefeller Neuroscience Institute and The Dana Foundation.

**US CHARITABLE GIVING HITS RECORD**  
 Fueled by a surging stock market and huge gifts from billionaires, charitable giving in the United States in 2017 topped the \$400 billion mark for the first time, according to the latest comprehensive report on Americans' giving patterns. The Giving USA report found that giving from individuals, estates, foundations and corporations reached an estimated \$410 billion in 2017. The total was up 5.2 percent in current dollars (3 percent adjusted for inflation) from the estimate of \$389.64 billion for 2016. Giving increased to eight of the nine charitable sectors identified by Giving USA. The only decline was for areas related to international affairs.



**TESLA TRIMS WORKFORCE**

Electric car maker Tesla Inc. is laying off about 3,600 workers as it slashes costs to improve its profitability. The cuts amount to about 9 percent of the company's workforce of 40,000. Tesla would not say how much money the layoffs would save, but said no factory workers would be affected as the company continues to ramp up production. Tesla has not made an annual profit in its 15 years of doing business, and it has posted only two quarterly net profits.



**GUESS CO-FOUNDER RESIGNS**

The co-founder of jeans and fashion brand Guess Inc. is stepping down following a company-commissioned investigation into sexual harassment and assault allegations. Paul Marciano is resigning immediately as executive chairman of the Guess board, and his brother Maurice Marciano, another company co-founder, will take over, according to a filing with the Securities and Exchange Commission. The investigation concluded that Marciano "exercised poor judgment in his communications with models and photographers and in placing himself in situations in which plausible allegations of improper conduct could, and did, arise." Paul Marciano has denied the allegations.

Inflation on simmer

The economy is growing and unemployment is shrinking, but a steady rise in inflation has tempered the broader economic outlook. In May, the Consumer Price Index rose at its fastest pace in six years, with Americans paying more for housing, food and gas. The figures are generally in line with expectations, though it's a delicate balance. "This temperature keeps slowly ratcheting up," said Matt Miskin, market strategist at John Hancock Investments. "It's OK, but at a certain point it very well may get to a boil."



The nation has enjoyed a decade-long economic expansion and the Federal Reserve has been pushing both growth and inflation to boost the economy. But a key fear now is that the growth cycle is in its late stage, raising the stakes for a potential pullback or recession. That could be set off by rising inflation or a misstep at the Fed. "It's this kind of slow and steady pace that's keeping investors waiting and conscious of the Fed and making sure it remains on track in terms of raising rates," Miskin said.

Company Spotlight **Goose up, not Goose down**

Canada Goose made its biggest gain ever after the Toronto-based winter apparel maker surprised investors with its strong fourth-quarter report. The coat maker, whose parkas can retail for upwards of \$1,000, posted an adjusted profit in the quarter, which analysts hadn't expected. Canada Goose said it expects revenue to grow at least 20 percent in the current fiscal year. The company also said it's planning to open three new stores in New Jersey, Montreal and Vancouver. Canada Goose jumped 33 percent to \$61.02 Friday, a down day for the rest of the market. The stock has surged 80 percent since a sell-off following its third-quarter results in February. The pricey parka maker went public in March 2017 at \$12.78 a share and its value has more than quadrupled since then.

Self-driving vans proliferate

French autonomous vehicle company Navya has sold about 65 self-driving shuttles, with many ferrying passengers at hospitals, airports and on public thoroughfares worldwide. Last week the University of Michigan began running two of its shuttles on part of its campus. Pierre Bourgin, Navya's U.S. general manager, says the company is focusing on low-speed vehicles that go less than 25 miles per hour to carry people on the first and last miles of their trips. A higher-speed six-passenger cab is in the works. The shuttles, which have been running for two or three years now, mostly operate from parking lots and transit stations to buildings using sound, laser, radar and camera sensors and detailed three-dimensional maps. Researchers with the Ann Arbor, Michigan, university and its M-city autonomous vehicle research unit will collect data from the rides and survey passengers to study consumer acceptance. Bourgin talks about how his company's shuttles, which have logged 200,000 passenger hours, are increasingly being used worldwide.

**How has the fatal crash from earlier this year involving an Uber self-driving SUV striking a pedestrian affected your work?**  
 We're all just saddened by the news and we extend our condolences to the family of the woman. It's sad because this technology may save lives by avoiding human error. Obviously the technology is meant to surpass the human and human error by whatever amount, but you will always have that percentage of risk, it's kind of unavoidable. We're focused on slow speed. On average we are about 15 mph. Everybody is surprised at how fast it can brake. We've created something that's very, very safe. We've definitely proven the way we are developing our technology is done the right way. Hopefully the demonstration can move forward and that everyone can have those same standards.

**There are humans on board to answer questions and stop the shuttles in an emergency. But some people may not get on board out of fear. What do you say to them?**  
 It's kind of like at the beginning of the elevator. It was a new technology, so you had someone in it pressing the button so it can go up and down. Then people got more comfortable. It's the same way, it's kind of a comfort level. At some point it becomes pretty boring, and I can do that myself.

**You had an incident in Las Vegas where one of your shuttles stopped and a truck backed into it at low speed. What happened there?**  
 We did have a little fender bender there. The shuttle bus stopped in front of a truck that was backing up. I think one of the operators got a little scared and jumped on the emergency stop. Maybe a half-second later the truck ran into the front of the shuttle. They were able to kind of put a little Band-Aid on it. We're still running out there safely ever since. We will always encounter a few challenges. We will always keep on learning.

## Quick Fix Destination: not broke

How to plan an overseas destination wedding.

Planning an overseas destination wedding is no vacation. Details can be lost in translation, costs might dampen attendance and legal requirements may get complicated. Here are some tips to help keep things under control.

**Factor in costs** According to a 2016 survey from wedding site The Knot, the average cost of an international destination wedding is \$25,800. That figure may be within your event budget, but for guests, international airfare and multi-night lodging could be out of reach. In addition to costs, consider logistics for your guests. Work schedules, health conditions or a lack of child care may pose additional burdens.

**2 Consider an agent** Travel agents can alleviate some of the pressure by handling guests' needs, questions and payments. They also may be able to negotiate discounted group rates or secure perks when more guests stay at the same hotel, such as a free welcome happy hour or brunch, or even free rooms.

**3 Anticipate guests' needs** Consider creating a wedding website to answer frequently asked questions about travel requirements, hotel options, local restaurants, scheduled activities and more. At a minimum, give guests enough notice to save the date.

**4 Delegate planning** A wedding coordinator can keep details from falling through the cracks. Consider a coordinator in the U.S. who has relationships with vendors in the destination; a private on-site wedding coordinator; or an on-site wedding coordinator provided by an all-inclusive resort. For destinations overseas, on-site coordinators who speak the local language can make communication with local vendors easier.

**5 Understand foreign fees** A budget can quickly balloon with foreign fees. For example, debit or credit cards may charge foreign transaction fees ranging from 1 percent to 3 percent of each purchase. A no-foreign-transaction-fee credit card can eliminate that cost. Some destinations abroad may operate mostly in cash, but your bank might charge a fee for international ATM withdrawals. Research your vendors' payment methods.

**6 Make it legal** Getting legally married abroad can be costly and time-consuming. The U.S. State Department notes on its website. Among the requirements could be blood tests, documents, and the translation and authentication of documents. Contact the embassy or tourist information bureau of your destination for specifics.

## Don't blame messenger

Media attention not reason official became 'distraction'

There are any number of reasons to be grateful for modern telecommunications. But one journalists are especially thankful for is that we no longer live in fear of anyone shooting the messenger.

That metaphoric phrase is derived from a time when messages ("real" bad news) were usually delivered by a human envoy.

Today, that threat of lashing out at the blameless bearer of bad news comes in the form of malicious innuendo and often baseless accusations.

Last week, the secretary of the state's Department of Commerce resigned in light of an investigation into \$150 million in community block grants for flood relief.

Commerce was charged with administering these federal grants that were only released in February.

Applications for these funds for housing assistance in the wake of the devastating June 2016 floods began in August 2017.

A little more than \$1 million of those \$150 million in funds was actually doled out to flood survivors since then.

That's despite a November 2017 news release by the Commerce secretary claiming more than 1,100 families were served, which the governor said was "totally inaccurate."

"There's no question that Commerce has dropped the ball," the governor said at a recent news conference.

So when we read of the Commerce secretary's resignation, we initially thought that he fell on his sword or the governor twisted his arm.

Instead, the governor now says the Commerce head did a "solid job," but that he was leaving because recent media attention was a distraction.

Let the record be clear: There was no media plot, no group of mean-spirited evildoers that set out to drag down this leader of economic development. The only person responsible for his downfall and him becoming a "distraction" was himself.

That goes doubly for the governor, who even chided the media in May for not asking happier questions at a news conference.

And perhaps tenfold for the president who created the phrase "fake news" to dodge and weave out of bad news for him.

Clearly, political leaders and agency heads are not the only ones who lay blame for their woes on the media.

The list is endless, ranging from powerful movie producers to parents whose child is arrested for a misdemeanor.

Our intent is simply to report what the public has a right to know while being accurate and fair.

Conventional wisdom holds that knowing the truth will set you free. It, of course, might also make you mad.

As in angry (or crazy) at the messenger or the medium that's delivering the message.

To err is human — but to blame it on the media is more so.



## North Koreans, Trump and all the possibilities

ONCE UPON A TIME, IT WAS FIRE AND FURY and loads of sanctions like nobody ever saw before, and look, it was said, President Donald Trump is going to get us into a nuclear war. But then North Korea came around, saying it wanted to talk. So Trump met with Kim Jung Un, who promised to denuclearize, and now it's said Trump has elevated a murderous dictator to hero status and set us up as dupes.

What I want to say is, wait and see and quit trying to make Trump out to have handled this so badly when there were three predecessors who put us in this fix in the first place. One was President Bill Clinton, upset in 1994 because North Korea was preparing to use nuclear fuel rods to help make nuclear weapons. Military preparedness and U.N. sanctions came to mind even as an ex-president named Jimmy Carter said he would visit with Kim Il Sung to quiet things down.

That's OK, he was told, as long as he did not negotiate a deal, which he did, announcing it on CNN TV before telling Clinton. Clinton aides were furious and, according to the author Steven Hayward, the State Department joke after Kim died shortly thereafter was that he laughed himself to death. The deal, which Clinton accepted, involved the United States shipping big bucks worth of energy materials North Korea's way. The team of President George W. Bush found the deal deficient, ended it, and we now know the North Koreans were cheating.

After 2006, when the North Koreans tested a nuclear device, the Bush administration got in the concession business to no avail, even as we let North Korea get away with sending nuclear materials to Syria. Then we had President Barack Obama in power with a plan known as "strategic patience," apparently meaning, look, when San Francisco is taken out, our patience will be at an end. Understand?

Of course, Obama gets credit for the Iran nuclear deal in which allies can inspect everything, except of course military bases that Britain, German, France and the United States want to look at. There have been no deal violations except for 32 in which Iran tried to secure nuclear technology from German enterprises. Iran's peaceful intent, meanwhile, has been shown by the recent discovery of what experts say is development of a long range missile that could reach America. The nation purrs softly by constantly testing ballistic missiles, funding terrorists and building up its own military to further control its neighbors. It still has the capacity to make nuclear weapons, but it might take a little longer than it once would have. So don't worry.

North Korea's nuclear cravings began in the 1960s, but it was only lately that it began testing missiles left and right while aggressively bragging it could hit the United States. Trump said, hrm, have you ever heard of total destruction? Working with China and the United Nations, he inflicted grave economic pain on the country, and Kim Jung Un said he wanted to talk, and there was this session in Singapore with Trump clapping him on the back, showing him a film about how great things could be and getting some vague assurances.

Yes, vague, but pointed in the right direction with more talks to come, more details about such things as inspections and speed of dismantlement. Secretary of State Mike Pompeo — tough and smart — is in charge, and yes, we have already said we will end military exercises in South Korea. But we will also keep sanctions in place, and maybe Kim will somehow outwit all of that and maybe there is no way Trump can win, anymore than he could ever be elected in the first place.

I think there is another possibility and that Trump has already been abler than Clinton, Bush or Obama.

### State vs. market trap a false dichotomy

As the PEIA task force listening tour wrapped up last week, misconceptions about the relation between the market and the government animated the panel's response.

Facing the need to offer more affordable health insurance, the Republican leadership has refused to back proposals that include revenue streams from initiatives such as cigarette taxes or higher severance on extractive industry.

Such taxes, they claim, would harm business, hurt the economy and cost jobs. Much like their national counterparts, state Republicans appear committed to the principles of small government and an unfettered free market.

Political leaders have, in fact, wedded themselves to a false dichotomy of market vs. state. For too long, we have been told that we must pit the state against the market in a

zero-sum game, where more of one necessarily means less of the other. Policy platforms and ideologies have been constructed in favor of more market or more state, so that the notion not only becomes part of the furniture of American politics, but also our fate.

The truth is that there is no inverse relationship between the market and the state. Not only have Nobel prizes been won showing this dichotomy to be false, but the urgent need to fund PEIA, as voiced by hundreds in nearly two dozen meetings, forces us to re-evaluate our conventional thinking.

Rather than seeing state and market in direct contrast with each other, where state funding of health care, for example, must necessarily come at the expense of business and the economy, the state can be mobilized to create equal business opportunity and democratize the economy.

We have a rich history in

such arrangements, after all: From the Homestead acts to the agricultural Extension services, American agriculture is just one example of the successful employment of state-led cooperation and competition, and there is no reason why such practices cannot be extended to other areas.

We must demand an alternative to the state vs. market trap presented in our political debate. We must ask our representatives and candidates to harness the state to empower people and create a more prosperous West Virginia.

Enabling access to affordable health care need not come at the expense of the economy, but rather is part of the work of the government in ensuring that all citizens are of sound body and have equal opportunity to not only participate in the market, but also create new markets themselves.

## No news is bad news — the looming Social Security crisis

THE SOCIAL SECURITY CRISIS IS NOT ONLY REAL, IT IS ALREADY WELL UPON US.

That may not have been obvious to everyone from the annual report issued by the program's trustees recently. With neither a dire nor stellar update, the report inspired little passion. In fact, many might have mistaken the minor changes to mean that Social Security's finances are now stable. But don't be fooled: The absence of alarming headlines is anything but good news.

The trustees reported that Social Security's slide toward insolvency sped up over the last year: They also estimated that its combined retirement and disability trust funds will run dry in 2034, the same projection as last year. That means Social Security's day of financial reckoning is now one year closer at just over 15 years away.

If action isn't taken sooner,

there would be a 23 percent reduction in benefits at that point. To ensure that Social Security remains viable for the most vulnerable in our society, policymakers must soon address its severe and urgent financial challenges.

Take the program's revenue. Payroll taxes and interest on the bonds held in the Social Security trust funds have been able to cover full benefits since 1982. But not any longer: The trustees now estimate that Social Security is expected to run a deficit of \$2 billion this year. The

drawdown of the trust funds has officially begun.

As further evidence of the program's financial problems, the 75-year financial shortfall for the combined trust funds is \$13.2 trillion in present value. Extending beyond that time frame, the estimated total shortfall is a whopping \$34.3 trillion. For comparison, our nation's gross domestic product is slightly over \$18 trillion, and our gross national debt at the end of May was \$21.1 trillion.

It's important to understand that there are actually two separate trust funds: One for the retirement program (Old-Age and Survivors Insurance, or OASI), and one for the disability program (Disability Insurance or DI). For the former, the trustees estimate the fund can continue to pay full benefits until 2034, at which point the program will be able to pay only about three-quarter-

# Why are costs for college so unknowable?

After the all-important college acceptances, the next vital pieces of paper arrive: Financial aid “award” letters. High school seniors and their parents have to scrutinize each grant, scholarship and loan option to figure out which college they can afford and exactly what it will cost to set foot on campus in the fall.

Colleges make this much harder than it needs to be. An analysis of financial aid letters from more than 500 colleges and universities conducted by New America and uAspire shows that they provide information that is at best confusing and, at worst, downright misleading.

One-third of the financial letters we reviewed did not include the total cost of attending college — tuition, fees, room and board — at all.

One high school senior in Pennsylvania who got such a letter was ecstatic when he read that he received a \$20,000 scholarship from his first-choice school. He put down a nonrefundable deposit. But because the letter did not list the total cost, he didn’t realize he would still have to pay more than \$17,000 just for his first year of college until he got a bill in August. He had to forgo college entirely that semester.

Financial aid jargon is particularly bewildering. In our analysis, we found that institutions itemized one type of student loan, the Federal Direct Unsubsidized Loan, 134 different ways. Nearly two dozen colleges and universities didn’t even use the word “loan” in the description.

Many colleges and universities present financial aid as a “package” without distinguishing between what’s free money, such as grants, and loans that have to be repaid. As just one of many examples, the University of Arizona sent a student in our study a letter saying her “net costs” were \$0. Upon examination, this “award” included more than \$40,000 in federal student and parent loans bundled in with some grants.

Borrowing \$40,000 for a single year of college is not \$0 in costs; it is debt the student and her family will be paying off for years.

The cost of college has been outpacing the availability of financial aid for decades. More students are taking on more debt. Sometimes the high cost leads them to drop out with no degree. More than 1 million people default on student loans each year.

So how well colleges communicate cost and financial aid does matter. A 2015 survey by New America found that 88 percent of current and soon-to-be college students listed the availability of financial aid as a key factor in determining which college to attend. A lack of precise and comparable aid information from colleges imperils students’ education and financial health, not to mention taxpayers’ investment in higher education.

The Higher Education Act, which established this system of student financial aid, is overdue for renewal. After the midterm election, Congress should use that opportunity to include legislation that demands clarity from award letters, including: standardizing the terminology that colleges use, stating costs plainly, separating loans from scholarship and grant aid and providing clear instructions on next steps for accepting a financial aid package. These reforms would enable students to make financially informed choices when selecting a college.

When picking out a car, consumers know exactly how much they have to pay because of the federally required disclosures on window stickers.

And yet no federal or state policies require consistent information, terminology or formatting on financial aid letters.

A new car costs, on average, about \$33,000. A college education can cost tens of thousands of dollars more and is an investment that should last a lifetime. Surely Americans need clarity around college costs as much as they do car prices.

ters of scheduled benefits.

The disability program, the trustees estimate, will hit insolvency in 2032.

But focusing too much on small changes on the insolvency dates can also lead to a false sense of security. The DI trust fund was on track to run out of money in 2016, which would have triggered an automatic 20 percent cut in benefits.

But the previous November, Congress passed and President Barack Obama signed the Bipartisan Budget Act of 2015, temporarily reallocating some payroll taxes to shore up the fund — putting a little less into the retirement trust fund and a little more into the disability fund. But taking from one Social Security trust fund to backfill the other is just robbing Peter to pay Paul; it doesn’t fix the underlying problems with the disability program, and reforms are still necessary.

The trustees have once again sent a clear warning that the Social Security crisis is real, of a staggering magnitude and already here. We can’t afford to wait or grow complacent, and risk Social Security’s retirement and disability pro-

grams becoming far larger and more difficult to shore up.

Fortunately, there are bipartisan policy solutions available. An expansive project housed at the Bipartisan Policy Center suggested reforms to improve retirement security and personal savings. Those include restoring Social Security to a secure financial footing by making changes to both benefits and taxes. Importantly, this is possible while still safeguarding those most dependent on the program, and “reducing” poverty in the long term among older Americans.

While less alarming headlines won’t compel policymakers to act on Social Security, the numbers should. With the program beginning to draw down on its trust funds, we are another step closer to automatic benefit cuts when the trust funds run dry, which would throw millions of elderly Americans into poverty.

But this crisis can be avoided altogether if those in charge base their decisions on the needs of Social Security beneficiaries — not the headlines.

# Betting on sports — straight from our phones

**THOUGH SPORTS BETTING HAS BEEN TECHNICALLY ILLEGAL** for years, it hasn’t stopped anybody from joining in the office pool, participating in a March Madness bracket once or twice or making a friendly wager on the Super Bowl. But it has meant that everything had to happen in an under-the-table fashion. And if Carl from accounting decides he’s entitled to the winnings alone, it’s not like there’s any legal recourse for anyone else — until now, that is.

The U.S. Supreme Court recently overturned the Professional and Amateur Sports Protection Act (PASPA), clearing the way for states to make sports betting legal. And recently, Delaware became the first to take advantage of the decision, launching sports betting at its three casinos. Maryland could have been on the forefront, but the state Senate killed an effort this session to put a referendum on November’s ballot to authorize sports betting. Now, the earliest Maryland could get it is 2020.

With the Supreme Court sports betting decision, Maryland will be behind the curve on gambling again. That’s not such a big deal.

In states with legalization, you won’t have to rely on the honesty of

other bettors to regulate your bracket. That’s the idea, at least. The problem is that some of the proposed bills leave everything to the casinos.

Existing casino properties would have full authority to manage how sports betting is regulated in the states, and they obviously have a powerful motivation to ensure that betting occurs strictly on the casino premises. That’s fine if you’re a casino regular, but what if you’re one of the million Americans who bet on sports casually? Casino oversight would cost states hundreds of billions in gaming profits.

If legalizing sports betting doesn’t make it more convenient, there’s no point. Now is the time to legalize sports betting the right way — straight from our phones.

Online mobile gaming is the present and future of the wagering industry. In Las Vegas, more than 60 percent of sports book bets are

placed with Nevada’s mobile gaming app.

And why not? These days, everybody lives on the phone. We can communicate, entertain ourselves and even buy groceries with a handy device we keep in our pockets. So why would legislators possibly think Americans will travel to the casino every time they want to place a bet?

Mobile sports betting is also a good way to protect bettors. Major sports leagues have hinted that bringing legal wagering to the second screen, using mobile apps that track statistical data, could protect game integrity.

Our research shows that online gaming in New Jersey generated \$998 million in economic output, 3,374 new jobs and \$124 million in tax revenue to state and local governments — including \$83.5 million in online gambling taxes. Online gaming hasn’t taken any revenue from casinos; it has simply increased the size of the betting

pool. Other states can emulate New Jersey’s success if they follow its model for regulation, including legislative provisions directed at mobile gaming.

Permitting sports betting on the same devices that an increasing number of Americans are using to actually watch sports should be a given. But some state legislators seem painfully out of touch with what Americans want: Sports betting that’s at least as convenient as everything else.

# Is taking on Trump too risky for Republicans?

**THE BIG PRIMARY NEWS ON TUESDAY WAS THE DEFEAT OF REPUBLICAN CONGRESSMAN MARK SANFORD.** It’s a good opportunity to repeat one of my favorite themes: How a party’s interpretation of an election matters, whether the interpretation is correct or not.

Why did Sanford lose? Everybody knows: It’s because Sanford has been critical of President Donald Trump. As the Washington Post put it, “Sanford founders in South Carolina after critical tweet from Trump.”

But is that true? I’m pretty confident that Trump’s late-afternoon tweet didn’t make much of a difference, even if it swayed some last-minute voters. There is, however, good reporting indicating that both candidates talked about their support for Trump during the campaign.

It’s worth recalling that Sanford, the former governor of South Carolina, was previously famous for covering up an affair

by claiming he was “hiking the Appalachian Trail.” While he recovered from the scandal to win back his old House seat, as Kyle Kondik notes, he also survived a serious primary challenge in 2016. For what it’s worth, others who paid attention to the contest said he ran a bad campaign.

I’ll add one more piece of perhaps relevant information: South Carolina Republican Gov. Henry McMaster, a very strong Trump supporter whom the president had endorsed, fell well short of avoiding a runoff election.

So put it all together and ... I have no idea. Perhaps Sanford wins

easily if he doesn’t rock the boat; perhaps attacking Trump cost him just enough to lose; perhaps it made little or no difference.

But none of that matters very much. What does matter is what Republican Party actors, especially Republican politicians and campaign professionals, believe about the costs of opposing Trump. And that won’t come down to careful studies; it will be whatever the news media report and what those within the Republican Party network tell each other.

It looks pretty clear that, at least for now, what they’re all telling each other is that taking on the president from within their own party is a suicide mission. They’ll point to Bob Corker and Jeff Flake, who are retiring; they’ll point to Sanford and to Alabama Republican Martha Roby, who may lose her own re-election contest.

As long as Republican politi-

cians and campaign operatives believe that, they will be extremely reluctant to take Trump on, at least in ways that might show up in primary advertising. Even if it’s not actually true that Trump made Sanford lose. Even if there are plenty of counterexamples out there in which Trump failed to sway Republican electorates — such as Roy Moore’s loss in Alabama.

All politicians are paranoid; what matters is what they’re currently paranoid about. Tuesday’s Republican primary in South Carolina makes it more likely than ever that Republican politicians are going to be paranoid about taking on Trump. Even if it makes some of them, and their party in general, more vulnerable in November.

**LAST SUNDAY**, I did something I rarely ever do.

Themes of family secrets, motherhood and mental illness loom large over the proceedings.

Even so, the movie doesn't get so bogged down in thematics that it forgets to be a darn good yarn. With tension so thick it felt almost physically oppressive.

## Honoring Fathers Around the World

One year later the state of Washington recognized the nation's first Father's Day.

It was not until 1972, 58 years after President Woodrow Wilson announced Mother's Day, that President Richard Nixon made Father's Day a national holiday.

Here is a glimpse of how five other countries celebrate dads.

### RUSSIA

In Russia, Father's Day is a holiday that emerged from a military celebration honoring all men. Defender of the Fatherland Day honors the Red Army's establishment during the Russian Civil War. The day now also includes the celebration of Russia's fathers.

### GERMANY

On the 40th day of Easter, known as Ascension Day, Father's Day is celebrated in the form of hikes and other outdoor activities — with lots of food and beer of course. The day is referred to as Gentlemen's Day.

### NEPAL

In Nepal, celebrating fathers is a ritual that is taken very seriously. Occurring in the early fall, the day is known as Gokarna Aunsi, which includes a ceremony where children must look directly in their father's eyes and give gifts of appreciation. Deceased fathers are also honored through other celebrations,

including visiting temples.

### ROMANIA

This holiday is relatively new for Romanians. It was the last

nation in the European Union to have its own special day for dads, designating a day in 2010 after the Alliance Fighting Discrimination Against Fathers

lobbied hard for the day.

### THAILAND

In Thailand, Father's Day is celebrated on the king's birth-

## Community key to suicide prevention

**WE ARE HERE** to be saved by God. Knowing that we are saved gives us hope to endure the burdens of life and give thanks for our blessings. Knowing that we are saved gives us compassion for the struggles of our neighbors. Knowing that we are saved gives us courage to struggle for justice in a broken world. We do not all share the same beliefs of why or how we are saved, but we believe that somehow we are loved and embraced by a loving and embracing God who has made us all in God's image as an act of grace. And as an act of gratitude to God for this salvation, we try to fill the world with compassion and goodness. That is why we are here.

Today I am not writing for those of you who know why we are here. Today I am writing for those who have lost their way. Today I am writing for those who wake up to dark mornings and fall asleep into stormy nights and who know of no shepherd in the valley of the shadow of death. Today I am writing for those who do not know or have forgotten why we are here.

Today I am writing for those who are thinking of taking their own life.

The recent suicides of the fashion designer Kate Spade and the chef/author/travel show host Anthony Bourdain have brought immense grief to their families, deep sadness to their admirers and a chilling question to those who are on the verge of deciding to kill themselves as well. Their question is this: "If their lives of success and celebrity were not worth living, what hope is there for me?"

There is hope for you. Do this one thing and you will find your way back to hope.

Get bundled.

There is a very wise saying from the Maasai tribe in Africa, "Sticks in a bundle are unbreakable. Sticks alone can be broken by a child."

A bundle is a community. A community is a group of people who gather together to help each other remain whole and help the broken become healed and embraced. That is a community. It is not a business, though some in your business could be in your community. It is not a group of friends, though some of your friends could be in your community. It is not even a family, though your family could be — and should be — a part of your community. A community does not care how rich you are or what team you root for. A community just cares that you show up.

When I speak of communities, you know I mean mainly (but not exclusively) churches, synagogues and masjids. The reason religious communities have existed since the beginning of humanity is that we have always known that sticks in a bundle are unbreakable, and sticks alone can be broken by a child. The religion of the community is the glue binding all the sticks together, but it is the people who are the visible sign of hope.

Religious communities bundle us. I have had many people tell me that one of things they most admire about Judaism is the shiva minyan. This is the custom of the community of Jews to gather in the house of a mourner for seven nights. At the time when the mourner feels like a single stick, the community bundles them.

This idea that joining a religious community will help to reduce suicide is not just my professional prejudice as a rabbi. There is now empirical evidence from a study just published in the Journal of the American Medical Association that studied a large group of Catholic women. The women who attended church at least once a week were five times less likely to commit suicide than those who did not attend church. And this occurred during a period between 1999 and 2010, when suicide rates in America skyrocketed 80 percent. My life experience in my synagogue confirms these findings.

A teaching from the Talmud, the post-biblical rabbinic collection of law and legends, tractate Ta'anit 23b, in Aramaic is "o hevruta o metuta" — "Give me community or give me death."

That has always been the choice. Amen.

## Ex doesn't believe in co-parenting

**Q: I met the perfect man and his four kids about six years ago. His ex does not believe in co-parenting and has told us many times to leave HER kids alone, but that's impossible because they share the kids' time equally — one week with us, one week with her.**

**Over the years I usually take the kids shopping for something for their father on Father's Day, but this year, for some reason, their mom decided she would do it also. She didn't say a word; she just took them out and bought him a fishing rod — from the kids. Evidently, they used to fish and camp as a family, but we haven't gone fishing or camping since we have been together. She recently got another divorce and I'm thinking she is looking for a way to feel connected again, but it made me really angry. Am I being petty? What's good ex-etiquette?**

A. There is a problem here, but whether you're being petty is only a small component. Your angry reaction is quite human.

More importantly, it does sound like mom is looking for a way to connect with life again, but she's going about it the wrong way. It appears her mind is going back to a better time rather than dealing with her current divorce.

### EX-ETIQUETTE

A better way might be to get some counseling and do some personal soul-searching. Reaching out to the ex when he has been remarried for years is only going to make things worse, and sets her up for some serious rejection.

That really doesn't help you, I know, but empathy often allows us to have patience because overreacting at this point is not going to help the situation. Re-establishing your personal boundaries might. My suggestion is to sit down with dad, get very clear on what you both believe is proper behavior for the parents — and your place in all this — and let him have that conversation with his children's mother. This would also be an excellent time for them to discuss how to improve their co-parenting since you said that was non-existent. Quite frankly, that should have been done years ago. Hopefully, mom is now ready to hear it.

For the record, when divorced parents share the kids and don't communicate, it puts undue stress on the children and forces them to take sides.

So, if you can, keep your temper and help these parents as best you can.

## Ways to become a better dad

**Q: I'm about to become a dad for the first time. My dad died when I was young, so I didn't have a good role model. How can I be the best father for my new baby?**

A: You already took the first step — asking for advice. Here are a few more.

■ Be active. If you don't take the initiative, you'll never be able to assume the child-rearing responsibilities you really want and your children deserve.

■ Practice. Don't assume that your partner magically knows more than you do. Whatever she knows about raising kids, she learned on the job. And the way you're going to get better is by doing things, too. Never miss an opportunity to change a diaper or soothe your crying baby. Every interaction — especially the most mundane ones — will make you a better dad.

■ Be emotionally available. Physical interaction is undoubtedly an important part of the father-child relationship, but being emotionally available and involved is critical, too. As John Gottman, author of *The Heart of Parenting* suggests, "Men must allow themselves to be aware of their feelings so they can empathize with their children. Then they must take whatever steps necessary to make themselves available to their kids."

■ Be a partner, not a helper. I talked about this a few weeks

ago with regard to women needing to stop asking for help. If you want to be a truly involved dad, you need to see what you do in the home and with your children as fathering not helping.

■ Be available more than on weekends. To be an effective father, get involved in the day-to-day decisions that affect your kids. Leaving everything to your partner means that you'll miss out on the little things that give meaning to a child's life.

■ Respect your partner. Being an involved father means recognizing all the ways your partner keeps the family running, and respecting the decisions she makes when you're unavailable. Develop a system to plan family activities together, and as the kids grow, get them involved in the planning as well.

■ Always communicate. If you don't like the way things are, let your partner know. If she seems reluctant to share the role of child nurturer with you, don't take it personally. Show her that you're serious about wanting to be an equal participant and that you're doing everything you can to build your competence.

## What you need to know about vitamin D

**THERE'S LOTS OF TALK** about vitamin D these days.

How much do you need? What are health risks of not getting enough? Can you get your daily dose from the sun?

Doctors more often are testing patients for vitamin D deficiency, and more people are taking supplements to ward off potential ills.

Vitamin D helps the body absorb calcium, which is necessary for bone health, and boosts the immune system. But claims that vitamin D may help prevent a host of other diseases have caused a good deal of confusion, said Dr. Gabrielle Sakellarides, a primary care physician at Mon Health Primary Care in Core.

"Vitamin D deficiency is rather common, and it can lead to loss of bone density, putting you at risk for osteoporosis and bone fractures," said Dr.



Sakellarides.

Who's at risk for vitamin D deficiency?

- Breast-fed babies
- Older adults
- People with certain diseases and conditions, including Crohn's disease, celiac disease, chronic kidney and liver disease, obesity, osteoporosis and lymphomas. People who've had gastric bypass surgery are also at higher risk.

### How do I get vitamin D?

There are 3 sources: Foods, sun exposure and supplements. Not many foods are rich in vitamin D.

Fatty fish such as salmon, tuna and swordfish are

among the best food sources. A 3-ounce serving of cooked salmon provides about 350 IUs (International Units) of vitamin D. That's a little more than half the daily-recommended allowance for most people.

The National Academy of Medicine recommends 600 IUs per day for people ages 1 to 70, and 800 IUs for 71 and older.

Other vitamin D foods include:

- Beef liver
- Swiss cheese
- Mushrooms
- Egg yolks
- Vitamin D fortified milk and yogurt
- Sardines
- Fortified orange juice
- Fortified cereals

### Sun exposure not recommended

Vitamin D is sometimes called the "sunshine vitamin" because ultraviolet rays from

the sun trigger vitamin D production in the body.

But Dr. Sakellarides says you shouldn't try to get your vitamin D that way. The risks of skin cancer from unprotected sun exposure outweigh any vitamin benefits.

Just 10 to 15 minutes of unprotected sun exposure can damage your skin and increase the risk of skin cancer, according to the Skin Cancer Foundation.

High SPF sunscreens significantly reduce your risk of skin cancer.

Another problem with trying to get vitamin D from the sun is variability. The amount produced depends on time of year, time of day, location and your skin type.

The number of Americans taking vitamin D supplements has increased, but doctors warn that taking too much can have adverse health consequences.

## Follow these tips for a safe beach day with your dog

Summer is right around the corner, and as the weather heats up, many people head to the beach to cool off. You can have a fun-filled day with your canine companion as long as you do a little extra planning.

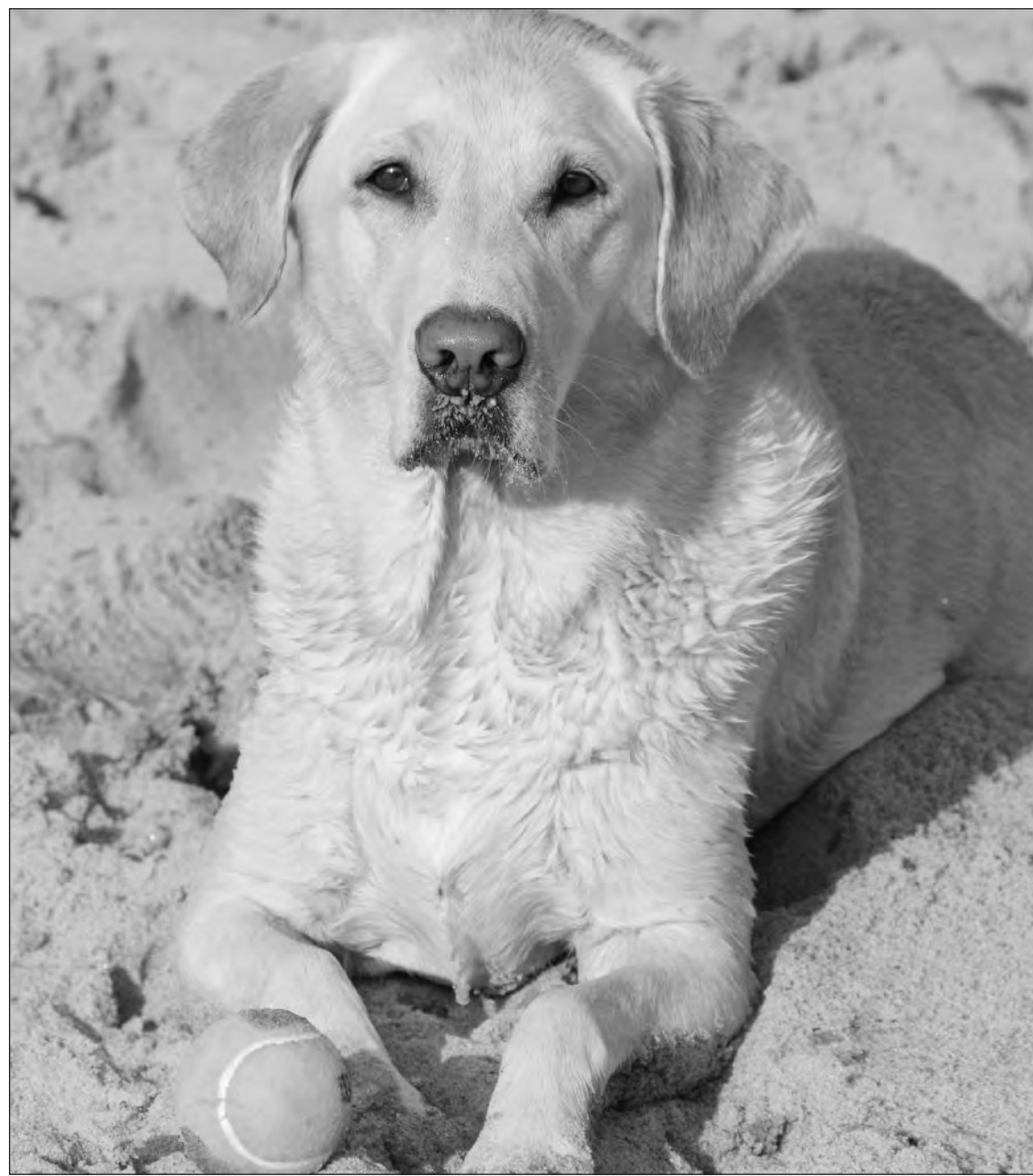
To help owners have the best beach experience possible with their dogs, the American Kennel Club offers the following safety tips:

■ Bring plenty of water. Be sure to bring plenty of fresh water for your dog to keep him from drinking the ocean water. The high sodium content in the water along with other contaminants can be harmful to your dog's health. Having fresh water on hand will keep him hydrated and decrease his chance of getting sick.

■ Provide shade. If you plan to be at the beach for an extended period of time, be sure to have an umbrella with you. This will ensure that your dog has a place to get out of the sun and rest.

■ Use sunscreen. Dogs that are hairless or have a short or light-colored coat are especially vulnerable to the sun. It is always wise to apply a dog-friendly sunblock to make sure your four-legged friend is protected from the harmful rays of the sun.

■ Rinse off. Rinse your dog off as soon as he is done playing. Your dog may love to roll around in the sand at the beach, but the sand and saltwater can irritate him. Rinsing him off sooner rather than later can help avoid rashes on your pup.

# Cutting height in hay fields: How low can you go?

**MANY FARMERS** over the last few years have expressed concern they are losing their hay stands quicker than they used to, especially grass hay. **Dwane Miller**, Penn State Extension, provides some information producers need to consider as we cut hay this year.

As you head to the field this year, it's important to pay attention to cutting height in your hay crop. One of our goals as farmers is to maximize our yield; however, cutting a hay crop too low can lead to several negative issues. The introduction of the disk-type mowers (disc-bines) allows for cutting very close to the ground. I've seen many fields that have been "scalped" right to ground level. This dif-

fers considerably from the older sickle bar mowers (haybines), whose technology required that some level of stubble height remain. Stand longevity can be compromised when the crop is cut too low. As a general rule, alfalfa can be cut closer to the ground than our grass hay crops. We need to think about where energy reserves are stored in the crop. For alfalfa, carbohydrates are stored below ground in the taproot. Our

grass hay crops store their energy above ground in the stem base or tillers. Frequent mowing at a close height will continue to deplete these energy reserves, resulting in stand longevity issues.

The second consequence for mowing too close to the ground is increased ash content of the forage. All forage has a natural ash content of about 6 percent. However, mowing too closely with disk mowers can add soil to the crop, and increase the ash content by as much as 12 percent (18 percent ash content in total analysis). If we all had table-top smooth fields, it would also be much easier to make a closer cut across

all fields. However, things such as groundhog holes and the unevenness of fields can add to increased ash content of our harvested forage.

So, the million dollar question is, how low can you go? The best answer is — it depends! The first question I always ask is: Is it a solid stand or a mixed stand? If you have grasses involved, you must keep cutting height higher than a pure stand of legume, if you want to keep the grass in the stand. Keep in mind these are minimum recommendations; it's OK to mow higher than the numbers below. Here are my minimum cutting height recommendations:

**Alfalfa or clover**  
 ■ 2 inch minimum.  
 Some literature shows a cutting height of 1 inch will not reduce stand longevity, but remember the increased ash content issue. Also, keep in mind that frequent cutting at early maturity will continue to deplete carbohydrate reserves. One cutting of alfalfa should be allowed to reach the bloom stage each year.

**Cool-season grasses (Orchardgrass, Timothy)**  
 ■ 4 inch during the establishment year  
 ■ 3 inch minimum during production years. This is where we see most of our stand longevity issues. Frequent cutting of cool season grasses at a low

height will continue to deplete energy reserves.

**Mixed stands**  
 ■ You must manage for the predominant species. Do you have a grass stand with some alfalfa, or an alfalfa stand with some grass?  
 ■ Alfalfa with some grass: 2.5 inch minimum.  
 ■ Grass with some alfalfa: 3 inch minimum (if you want to keep the grass stand).

## Safe in the Sun



**Mini Fact:**  
The largest organ of the human body is your skin!

If you've been out in the hot sun this summer, your skin may have turned red or brown where the sun's rays touched it. Sunshine helps our bodies produce vitamin D, and experts say sunlight makes our moods happier.

But exposure to the sun's rays can also damage our skin and cause some health problems. This week, The Mini Page learns more about being safe in the sun.

### What is UV light?

Ultraviolet, or UV, radiation comes from the sun. Our eyes can't see this light, but these are the rays that can burn our skin when we're in the sun too long.

There are several types of UV radiation, but only UVA and UVB rays reach the surface of the Earth.

Have you ever heard someone announce the UV Index on the news or weather report? The index is a prediction of the intensity level of UV light in a certain region.

For example, if it's cloudy in your city today, the UV Index will be lower than in another town where the sun is shining.

The UV Index is a scale from 1 to 11+, where 1 represents a slight risk of too much exposure to the sun, and 11+ tells us that the risk is very high.



UV rays are partially filtered by the ozone layer, a protective layer of gas around the Earth.

### Skin and sun

Exposure to UV light is the biggest risk factor for skin cancer. But we can easily prevent damage to our skin from the sun and lower our chances of getting skin cancer.

Researchers believe that getting sunburns in childhood increases a person's risk of having skin cancer. So it's important to take care of your skin now and throughout your life.

### Staying safe

Even though we think of summer as the sunniest time of the year, the sun's rays strike us all year long. If you plan to be out in the sun for any length of time, use sunscreen.

People who need to be even more careful about sun exposure are those who have:

- pale skin
- blond, red or light brown hair
- a family member who has had skin cancer.

But skin protection is important for everyone. The Environmental Protection Agency advises people to:

- Wear clothing that covers the skin — long-sleeved shirts, pants and broad-brimmed hats.
- Reapply sunscreen at least every two hours.
- Wear sunglasses.

- Visit the library. Most libraries have many summer programs for kids. Or you can just browse for a good book and find a cool place to read.
- Take a trip to a cool museum.

Explore the exhibits, go on a tour, or take a class for kids.

- Contact your fire department and arrange a tour for you and your friends.
- See a movie.

### Slip, Slop, Slap & Wrap!

The EPA suggests an easy way to remember to take care of your skin:

- SLIP on a shirt.
- SLOP on sunscreen.
- SLAP on a hat.
- WRAP on sunglasses.
- SEEK shade.

## What you need to know about finding a lender

**LAST WEEK, WE STARTED OUR** major steps to the home buying process. It's time to choose a lender.

The right mortgage lender can save you time, anxiety and loads of cash. And the right loan officer — the professional who represents the lender — can be a powerful ally when you close on a mortgage. As with any potentially life-altering partnership, it's important to choose wisely.

There are three types of mortgage lenders — retail banks, credit unions, and mortgage banks — as well as mortgage brokers, who compare loan products via a coterie of potential lenders to help you, the client, find the right one. Let's talk about your options.

### Retail banks

These are your Chases and Banks of America, plus your local banks. They do their own underwriting (in a nutshell, investigating your finances), so retail banks, especially the smaller ones, can sometimes offer lower fees and less-stringent credit requirements. If you like to have your accounts all in one place, you may want to use your own bank or credit union.

### Credit unions

They're not-for-profit and customer-owned, so they're not beholden to shareholders like a bank. So they typically offer more personal service and lower fees. The flip side is less convenience: They have fewer branches and ATMs.

To apply for a loan, you must be a member of the credit union's community, which could be faith-, employment-, interest- or union-based, among other things. That said, it's typically not difficult to become a member; the National Credit Union Administration's Credit Union Locator is a tool for finding credit unions near you.

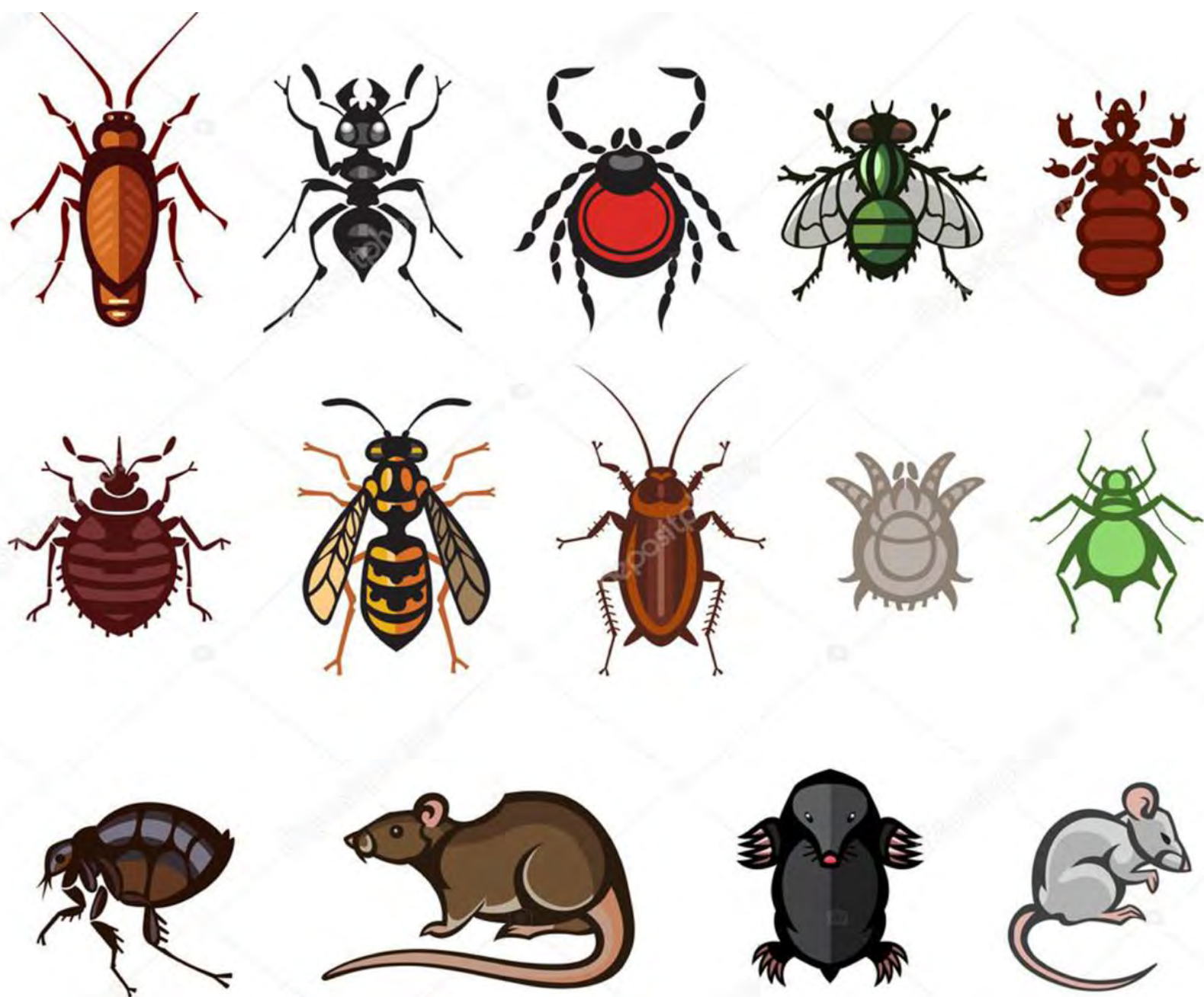
### Mortgage banks

These banks offer only home loans. Many online lenders, like Rocket Mortgage by Quicken Loans, operate as mortgage banks. Getting in touch with an online lender may be more difficult than with traditional lenders. If you'd prefer more hand-holding, consider whether online lenders' often lower rates and fees are worth the tradeoff.

### Mortgage brokers

# Keep the critters out

## How to deal with roaches, rodents and other household pests

It's that time of the year when residents start seeing unwelcome visitors in their homes.

According to Preston County WVU Agriculture Extension Agent Bill Shockey, there are a variety of ways to control pests and the risks they may pose.

"Prevent pests from getting in," he said. "Earwigs, spiders and other crawling insects can be stopped by spreading a barrier of granular insecticide 2 to 3 feet wide around your house."

Shockey said to use a liquid indoor-outdoor insecticide for flying insects.

"Sometime the insects you think are coming inside are already there," he said. "Lady beetles and stink bugs can come in and stay over winter. So the ones you are seeing might have already been inside the house."

According to the United States Environmental Protection Agency (EPA), debilitating and deadly diseases can be caused or spread by pests such as insects,

rodents and microbes. Infectious diseases such as West Nile virus, Lyme disease and rabies can be carried and spread by mosquitoes, ticks and rodents.

Shockey said keeping cereal, sugar and flour in canisters with tight lids helps deter pests. He said when ants and other pests come inside, they look for food. He said spraying door frames and window sills will help deter insects.

Use caution when spraying an indoor insecticide.

"Lock your pets out and leave the room you have sprayed for about a half hour until the spray dries," Shockey said. He said carefully follow labels and cover and secure any food before you spray.

According to the EPA, roaches can live for a month without food, but die in a week's time if denied water. The agency suggests draining dish water from sinks because roaches can swim. Also, wipe water and other spilled liquids off of counters, fix or report leaky faucets, radiators, dishwashers and washing machines, and empty excess water in flower pots and plant stands. A drop of water can be all a roach needs to feel satisfied.

Keeping pests out is the first

line of defense, according to Shockey. He said check and spray house siding where it intersects with the foundation. Check corner covers and spray there also. Look for holes or cracks in siding where insects can crawl in.

"Keep your screens in place and check your attic vents," Shockey said. "Bats can sneak in and hang out in the attic."

He said do not store lumber and wood at the edge of the house, and keep leaves and debris raked away from the house.

"Make sure you have no ground-to-wood contact with the house. If you do, you are creating a direct access for pests."

According to the EPA, each year, rodents cause significant damage to property, crops and food supplies across the United States. In addition to damaging property, rodents may spread diseases, posing a serious risk to public health. Rodent-borne diseases can be transferred to humans through bite wounds, consumption of food and/or water or breathing dust contaminated by rodent droppings and other waste products, and indirectly by way of ticks, mites and fleas that transmit to humans after feeding

on infected rodents.

The most important steps in eliminating and preventing rodent infestations, according to the EPA, are keeping living spaces clean, preventing rodent access and eliminating nesting areas.

Shockey said in case of an infestation, call an exterminator. "The damage [insects] can do can be very expensive. Exterminators have access to chemicals that you must be licensed to use. Large infestations of yellow jackets or other bees have been known to get behind siding."

He said there are other options rather than spray for honey bees. "In the case of honeybees, call the Extension office. We have a list of bee keepers who will come and salvage the swarm."

Shockey said to be careful when spraying outside plants. "Don't spray fruit trees or anything else when the flowers are blooming. This is detrimental to pollinators."

A pollinator is a botanic (living) agent that transfers pollen from the male anthers of a flower to the female stigma. This helps bring about fertilization of the ovules in the flower.

# Stumpwork is a type of early embroidery

**EVER NOTICE STUMPWORK** in an antiques auction or shop? It is a type of early embroidery that makes raised designs on a flat textile to make a three-dimensional design. It uses wire or padding to stuff the figure made of thread.

This difficult type of embroidery was popular in England from about 1650 to 1700, but it was called "raised" or "embossed" work until the 1890s. Stumpwork was used on clothing, decorative boxes and pictures.

Girls learned to embroider as young as 8 years old, and the training culminated with the production of a box, often with the name and date of the embroiderer. Today, these boxes sell for thousands of dollars.

An example made in 17th-century England on silk fabric with flowers, insects and birds, two well-dressed women framed in wreaths, and many other figures and bits of flora and fauna was auctioned in Massachusetts recently. It was estimated at \$2,500 to \$5,000, but sold for \$9,225. The box had doors and small drawers for storage of writing supplies.

**Q:** I have a Sears and Roebuck potbelly stove,

**model No. 119-57, that is missing a few things. I need four legs, the bottom ash door and the hinge pin that holds the door in place. Can you help?**

**A:** You could try to find parts from sources online that list stove parts for sale, but you might be better off selling your stove for parts and using the money to buy a stove that's complete. That model seems to show up online occasionally. One in good condition sold for \$178.

**Q:** A friend recently gave me something he said is from the Civil War. The top is the shape of a four-arm iron cross and is 14 inches high and 14 inches wide. The letters "C," "S" and "A" are on three of the arms. There are two rows of stars crossed in the middle and the words "Deo Vindice" on one side, and the years 1861 and 1865 on the other side. It's made of lead and weighs about 20 pounds.

**I think it might be a grave stone marker or some type of service marker. The rod that would hold it in the ground is 18 inches long.**

**A:** You have a Confederate grave marker. The cross represents the Southern Cross of Honor and the letters "CSA" stand for Confederate States of America. The motto, "Deo Vindice," stands for "with God as our vindicator," and was used on the Great Seal of the Confederacy. The dates are the years the Civil War was fought. These grave markers were made for United Daughters of the Confederacy, a group founded in 1894, and mark the graves of Confederate soldiers. One sold recently for \$165.

**Q:** We have a collection of clear glass cruets of all ages. The newest are 50 years old and many are much older and in excellent condition. We have no idea how to dispose of them and get fair prices. Can you help?

**A:** Glass cruets sell for prices ranging from less than \$10 to several hundred dollars or more, depending on the type of

glass. A few sell for over \$1,000. Cruets made of amethyst glass, cobalt blue glass, cranberry glass, ruby stained glass, and other colored or decorated glass sell for much more than clear, pressed glass cruets, which sometimes sell for \$5 to \$10. If you know the makers and age of your cruets, that's a plus. As with selling most things, convenience is a factor. Are you willing to go the trouble of advertising them, packing and shipping them, or do you want to sell the entire collection

locally? Try local antiques shops or contact dealers who sell glass at antiques shows in your area.

## The pros and cons of buying a timeshare

While many of us would like to own a vacation home, the cost and year-round upkeep prevent us from turning that dream into a reality. If you're set on the idea of having a home away from home, owning a timeshare might be the best option. However, you need to do your homework. First, you'll need to understand how timeshares work.

When you buy a timeshare, you are purchasing the right to use a specific unit at a resort for a designated time period every year—usually one calendar week, though it can be longer. You own that right for the rest of your life, or a contracted number of years. You can sell it at any time. The timeshare is purchased upfront for a lump sum. Pricing will vary based on the property itself, as well as what the week you want is “worth.” Unsurprisingly, summertime and Christmas are going to cost more than less popular times.

In addition, you must pay maintenance fees (a yearly lump sum or monthly payments), plus your share of the property taxes on the resort. Those maintenance fees, which can range from approximately \$500 to \$1,200 a year, must be paid whether or not you use the unit. When you are staying in the unit, you'll be charged a fee for house-keeping services.

A timeshare purchase is legally binding, not an arrangement you can opt out of, so consider the pros and cons carefully. The terms of

owning a timeshare vary, so always read the fine print before making a decision. But, generally speaking, here are the potential perks and drawbacks of being a timeshare owner.

## The pros

## A homey feel

A timeshare unit is like an apartment, with one bedroom and bath (at least), a kitchen, a living room and laundry facilities. Owners get the conveniences and feel of home, plus the ability to save money by cooking their own meals. “With the kids, it has been great to always have a kitchen and laundry available, unlike at a hotel,” said Dawn Lynch, a mom of twins and a timeshare owner who lives in West Babylon, N.Y. “And there are always activities by the pool for the boys.”

## Affordability

A timeshare vacation can be a money saver over the long haul, especially for large families. A group of five or more needs to book two rooms in a hotel—and then hope those rooms are close, if not adjoined. Even if you're a family of four, sharing one hotel room can be less than comfortable. Opting for a timeshare can pay off. Darcy Falcone, a mom of two who lives in New Rochelle, N.Y., said buying a timeshare in Aruba was a great decision. “It sleeps eight, so the kids can bring friends if they like, and we all fit comfortably. And if you compare our per-vacation cost to what we pay for similar-sized accommodations of the same quality in the same area,

we're coming out way ahead,” she added. Plus, if you've ever had to cancel a vacation at the last minute due to unexpected expenses, you may be able to avoid that disappointment in the future with a timeshare, which is essentially prepaid when your vacation week arrives.

Another point worth noting: High-end digs can be accessible to those without high-end finances. For example, buying a posh beachfront condo in Bermuda can cost a fortune. However, a one-week timeshare at the same property might be \$20,000, plus fees.

## Rental income

If you know well in advance that you won't be using your week, you can rent out your unit. The timeshare's management company may be able to rent it out for you, but you'll need to pay a fee. If you have a “lock-off” unit, you may be able to take your vacation and get a bit of rental income. Falcone has done this when only she and her husband visited Aruba. “I can rent out the front two bedrooms, lock the door connecting that part of the unit to the rear bedroom area, and just go in and out the rear door,” she said. “Some people say timeshares are limiting, but I feel I do have options.”

## The cons

## Unpredictable costs

Maintenance fees can—and often do—go up each year. Before you sign, ask whether maintenance fees are capped, meaning they can't rise above a set

amount. In addition, one-off major upgrades, like replacing the carpeting or windows throughout the resort, may not be included in the regular maintenance fees, and you'll have to pay your portion if they're not. Keep transportation costs in mind, too. If getting to your timeshare requires flying, that expense can vary with fuel prices and other factors. And if it costs several thousand dollars to get your family to and from your timeshare, you may not wind up using it every year.

## Use it or lose it

In most cases, the week you pick at the outset is the only one you get, and your unit will simply sit empty if you don't show. That means if you have a last-minute emergency, or a must-attend wedding lands during the same time, you'll lose your vacation that year. Often, immediate family members are allowed to take your place, but if unforeseen circumstances prevent you from going, your immediate family may not be able to get there either.

## Selling challenges

A timeshare property can be hard to sell because you'll be competing with many other timeshare resellers, as well as new timeshare resorts in the area. To further complicate matters, contracts may stipulate that the management company gets a commission on your sale, or places other conditions on reselling. Some timeshare owners wind up selling their unit on eBay for much less than what they paid. They'd rather let it go for very little

than continue paying the maintenance fees. (Of course, this can be a boon for buyers.) Plus, if you do sell your timeshare for less than you paid, the IRS doesn't let you claim a capital loss as you could with regular real estate.

## No increase in value

While a regular piece of real estate can grow in value as time goes by, timeshares are almost never worth more than what they're sold for—and often, are worth less. Much of the price of a timeshare goes to marketing and advertising, management company business costs, and other miscellaneous expenses, rather than being an actual investment in the property itself.

## Long-term commitment

Most timeshare contracts are perennial. That means you're legally obligated to pay the maintenance fee and taxes indefinitely. If you don't, the results are much like defaulting on any other debt: Collection agencies could come after you, and your credit rating will take a hit. It's hard for most of us to predict what our personal situations will be in a decade or longer. You may lose your job or your spouse. Or, perhaps you'll move and traveling to your timeshare from your new home may be more than you bargained for. None of this is to say buying a timeshare is a bad decision. It's just a big decision—one you have to think through to make sure it's right for you. Those who buy a timeshare impulsively, or from a

high-pressure salesperson waving a fancy gift as enticement, often wind up regretting it.

## Pro or con

The predictability of a timeshare vacation can be viewed as a positive or a negative, depending on your outlook. Some people love that aspect of owning a timeshare. Falcone is one of them. “We have week nine in the calendar year. We really like to go away at the same time of year, around our anniversary,” she said. “We enjoy having something to look forward to. We're all beach people who love Aruba. Plus, I don't have to worry about availability. We like the pool level and an ocean view. I don't have to worry about getting what I want when I want it. I have it.”

On the other hand, some people grow bored of vacationing in the same place year after year. If you're one of those folks, you may be able to exchange your timeshare week for one in a different destination. Many timeshare companies—but not all—own properties around the world. Still, exchanges are not a given, and are easiest to nab if you have a highly desirable week and location. Lynch, who has exchanged her timeshare in Kissimmee, Fla. (which she bought on eBay), for ones in other states, cautions that planning is required. “The week we have is at the height of the summer season, so we've had to book our exchanges well in advance as the premier resorts fill up fast,” she said.



# Restoring historic home took 3 decades

MINNEAPOLIS — Undoing a duplex is a huge, daunting job. But Gary Anderson and Tom Waade were determined to tackle it when they bought their Minneapolis house, a handsome Victorian that had been built as a single-family home in 1898, but converted to a duplex in the 1920s.

"We're both interested in old houses and preservation," said Waade. And both share an aversion to updates that don't respect the original architecture of the home. "Our pet peeve is when people rip original features out and put in Sheetrock and skimpy woodwork."

Fortunately, the pair also had the skills to do much of the work themselves — Anderson is a cabinet maker and builder, and Waade is a professional finisher.

The restoration began 30 years ago, after Waade spotted a "For sale" sign in front of the Queen Anne/Colonial Revival-style duplex. "I always liked the house," he said, which was near an apartment building his family owned.

So they decided to take a look. Anderson liked what he saw. "When I moved to the city [from

northwestern Minnesota], I thought, 'If I ever get a house, I'd like pocket doors, fretted columns ... and a built-in buffet.'"

The duplex checked all those boxes. However, the neighborhood at that time (the late 1980s) was less than ideal. Park Avenue, once a grand boulevard lined with mansions and gracious homes, had fallen on hard times.

"A lot of the houses were not being maintained, and it was hard to sell them," Anderson said. "There were a lot of vacant houses."

Still, Anderson and Waade decided to forge ahead. They bought the house, intent on restoring it to its former glory.

First, there were maintenance issues to address. "The front porch was bad. We had to redo the roof. The soffits were starting to rot," Anderson said.

And the exterior was covered with lead-based paint, which Waade painstakingly removed, down to the bare wood, and repainted, sections at a time.

Inside, many of the home's original features, including its massive built-in buffet with stained-glass window, were intact. But the floor plan had been drastically altered when the house was con-

verted to a duplex. The ornate staircase had been removed, to make room for a second entrance and smaller stair. Fortunately, the old spindles and other pieces were still in the attic.

## Guided by 'ghosts'

Guided by an ancient photo, nail holes in the subfloor and "ghosts" (faint traces of where woodwork had been), Anderson and Waade were able to restore their staircase to its former glory. They also re-created the window seat that originally graced the front foyer.

The original butler's pantry had also been removed, to create a hallway and bathroom for the first-floor unit. Anderson and Waade kept the bathroom, but

created a new smaller pantry using vintage cabinet doors.

Four years ago, Anderson and Waade tackled another huge project. When the home became a duplex, the original kitchen on the first floor had been converted into two small bedrooms, with a small kitchen tucked in behind them. The men decided to gut the space and build a new kitchen in the footprint of the old one.

They now have a spacious kitchen that blends modern convenience

with Old World charm — granite countertops paired with vintage-style cabinets with Victorian-inspired molding and bin pulls. There's no dishwasher, but there is an antique crank phone on the wall.

Their home is no longer a duplex but it does still contain a small rental apartment on the second floor. "We were going to make it single-family, but we have enough space — and the rental income is so nice," Waade said.

Over the years, they've researched their

home's history extensively, in part to guide their restoration. They learned that their house was the work of architect James H. Record, who designed a number of other fine homes in Minneapolis and St. Paul. The original owner, real estate developer Samuel Glading, lived there only two years. After his wife died, the brokenhearted developer sold his house to the Gramps family. Harry and Anna and their seven children had been living in an apartment in south Minneapolis. But while

Harry, a traveling salesman, was on the road in 1900, Anna inherited some money — and bought the house, without telling her husband. She tacked a note on the door of their apartment telling him to "Come to 3624 Park." Harry wasn't happy, but he made the move, undertook the duplex conversion, and lived the rest of his life there.

Later the home was sold to a family who had immigrated from Ukraine. "They were here during the Cuban missile crisis, and built

a bomb shelter," Waade said. It's still in their basement, equipped with a water tank, toilet, medicine chest, wall chains to support plywood beds, and an escape hatch to the backyard.

"There were rusted cans of rations," Anderson said. Anderson and Waade are only the fourth owners of their 120-year-old home. They've come to appreciate living on Park Avenue. "In winter, we get plowed first," said Waade. "It's a wide street, so there's a little space between

neighbors. We can sit on the front porch, have coffee and watch people go by."

The neighborhood has changed since they first moved in 30 years ago. There are no longer vacant homes around them. People are buying the old houses, fixing them up and fueling an urban renaissance. "We stuck it out, and we're glad we did," Waade said. "Things improved a lot. ... I feel like it's our legacy — we have saved this house, and brought it back to where it was. We feel good about that."

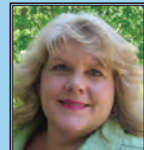

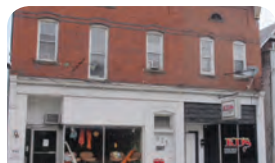

## Stronger, Safer, Better

### Redesigned Expedition Earns NHTSA's Top Overall Safety Rating

**B**arreling down the highway in a vehicle as big as this — the new, palace-sized Ford Expedition — always gives drivers a sense of safety as they look down on the road from their invincible-feeling perch.

Now there's some data to back it up.

After undergoing government crash tests, it was announced on June 8 that this new generation Expedition has earned the highest possible safety score. It gets an overall five-star rating from the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration's New Car Assessment Program, the only vehicle in its class to do so.

It's just another feather in the cap of a vehicle that's gaining attention for leapingfrogging its cross-Detroit competition at General Motors in many ways.

Before we get to those strong points, though, I've got one gripe: too much plastic in the interior. Tightly assembled as they may be, the materials around the center stack and console elicit flashbacks of the bad old days of Ford's past.

Beyond that, though, there's a lot to love about Ford's clean-slate redesign of its spacious, capable family hauler.

At the top of that list is its solid feeling body, all the more remarkable because of the material it's made from: aluminum alloy.

Like the F-150 and Super Duty pickups, the Expedition makes extensive use of aluminum to save weight and improve fuel economy. Surprisingly, the aluminum construction that manages to shave 325 pounds off its waistline also feels stronger than the outgoing Expedition, by a long shot.

Shut the doors, and you're surrounded by bank-vault silence. It's extremely well insulated, offering the kind of respite-from-the-road demeanor that I usually associate with premium brands and higher price points.

The Expedition isn't cheap, starting around \$52,000, but it drives like a vehicle that costs even more than that. In fact, I'd rather spend a long highway trip in the Expedition with its gloriously soft,

supple seats than in, say, an \$84,000 Toyota Land Cruiser.

A smartly designed cabin with 15 cup holders, two glove boxes, ample storage space and seating for eight passengers makes it ideal for big families, especially if you opt for the MAX version that's almost a foot longer than the regular Expedition. With around 17 extra cubic feet of cargo capacity and a bigger gas tank, it's the one you want for road-trip duty.

The new Superman-strong body and frame improve the driving dynamics, too. It has a lower center of gravity now, which makes it feel more stable, and tight steering that makes it seem like it shrinks in parking lots. It's impressively easy to maneuver for something so gargantuan.

A long list of active safety features add to the family-centric appeal. You can get it with Cross-Traffic Alert, Pre-Collision Assist

with Pedestrian Detection, auto high beams and enhanced active park assist to help keep you out of trouble and, hopefully, never find out how accurate those crash test ratings really are.

Most people buy full-size SUVs for their functionality, not their look, but the new Expedition does a good job updating the well-worn box-on-wheels motif for a new generation. It's simplified, cleaner and sleeker now, like someone from the Apple Store gave it a minimalist makeover. I like the look.

Finally, if its fresh body and frame are a home run, the new powertrain is a grand slam. I haven't been this impressed with an SUV's engine and transmission combo in a long time.

The Expedition is powered by a 3.5-liter, turbocharged V6. While in some ways my nostalgic side misses the grunt of a big, American V8 in SUVs like this, the turbo V6's real-world performance and near-instant response win me over.

Coupled with a 10-speed automatic transmission, acceleration and braking feel as well sorted as some sports sedans, even if its hefty feel in corners will never be mistaken for one.

Pricing starts at \$51,790 and \$54,475 for the stretched Expedition MAX, both of which start with the well-equipped XLT trim as their base models.

For luxury shoppers, a Platinum MAX 4x4 is priced over \$80,000.

# Use cellphone video to document tricky mechanical issues

**Q:** We have a 2015 Hyundai Sonata Limited. It wasn't long after we purchased it, it developed the following problem: When I wanted to go into smart cruise control, it would refuse and indicate that SCC (smart cruise control) conditions are not met. The difficult part of this is that this would happen intermittently. The dealership checked it out numerous times over the past two to three years to no avail. Then they brought in a top engineer to check it out. They said he made full alignment of the system, and the problem still happens. They cannot replicate the problem. It seems this is the only

Hyundai with this problem. The problem arises no matter what the weather, and, yes, the car is clean. It is in the garage most of the time. It has over 23,000 miles. Any ideas?

— Roy A.

**A:** Your smart cruise control system employs a radar sensor and smart integration between the power train, braking and other control modules to adapt to traffic ahead and maintain a safe following distance

relative to the speed you've requested.

The list of possible disabling conditions is lengthy, with a dirty, misaligned, or faulty radar unit included.

Here's a question for you: When the SCC system is unavailable, are you able to engage the basic cruise control instead (press and hold the "distance" button for two seconds)? If so, this would rule out about 90 percent of the items on the list.

As with all intermittent problems, carefully detailing the conditions present at the time of symptom is essential. Having a passenger record a phone video of an unsuccessful smart cruise control engagement attempt, narrated with ap-

propriate comments, would solidify your concern (car companies prefer this word over complaint) and help you pressure Hyundai's customer service folks to get that engineer back on it, and perhaps replace the integrated radar/SCC control unit. Seeking a repair attempt as soon as possible after a failure provides the best chance of holding any stored diagnostic trouble codes in memory.

I searched for applicable service bulletins and cast a wide net for similar concerns but came up empty. This appears to be a unique problem. Turn up the heat with that video!

**Q:** My red battery indicator has begun to light

up at certain times. What could cause this?

— Dave W.

**A:** Depending on the vehicle, there could be several possible causes for this; usually it's because the alternator is not supplying sufficient energy for vehicle use and battery state of charge. "Alternator" is a term used for a vehicle's belt-driven electrical generating device; it converts the engine's mechanical energy into electrical energy.

With the engine off and cool, try grabbing and rotating the alternator's pulley against the stationary drive belt. If you can slip the pulley at all, belt tension is inadequate. Also check the battery terminals for looseness and/or corrosion. Al-

ternators typically employ brushes, which are small carbon electrical conductors that ride against the rotor's slip rings. The rotor becomes a multiple-pole magnet, the heart of the generating process. Due to friction, brushes eventually wear out, lasting perhaps 125,000 to 150,000 miles. This may be what's causing your intermittent charging system light. Brushes are inexpensive but, due to the labor involved to renew them, in most cases it's simpler to swap out the alternator with a remanufactured unit.

# Best to keep your windows up at highway speeds

**Q:** Your column about vent windows reminded me of my '93 or '94 Chevy Traverse. One mild day, I rolled down the four side windows. Upon leaving town and accelerating to 55 mph, I thought the car was coming apart since it was vibrating like crazy. It happened again with my Hyundai. I think aerodynamic design is causing this.

**A:** The phenomenon is called wind buffeting. And you are right, the smooth styling does not deflect the air as some old-fashioned cars used to do. But even in

the pre-aero days, buffeting often occurred when the rear windows were opened. Enjoy the fresh air around town and then switch to the A/C on the highway. It even saves gas.

**Q:** I discovered the bad side of vent windows after a thief broke into my parked car through the curbside passenger vent window and stole my stereo system. The police

explained a thief could pry open the vent window with a beer can opener, then reach inside to open the door. My next car, and all subsequent cars, haven't had a vent window. Good riddance.

**A:** That was a sinful use of a trusty church key. We seem to recall vent windows having a latch that required the push of a button before turning to open the window.

**Q:** In response to J.R. from Allentown, Pa., who narrowly escaped a carjacking while at the pump, here's my advice: When filling your vehicle

at the pump, turn the engine off, remove your keys, then start filling. Whether it is a stick shift or an automatic, a carjacker can't hop into your vehicle and drive off if you haven't already INVITED him to do so!

**A:** Good idea. But it probably won't do much good if the bad guy has a weapon.

**Q:** A few years ago, I visited an auto window tinting company and was told that applying any degree of tint to a windshield was unlawful. My neighbor, a police officer, verified the law. Of late

I've seen car after car with windshields tinted — some so dark the driver cannot be seen. I've also read many times that a license plate frame cannot cover the name of the issuing state. However, frames of every width and design are readily sold and only the numbers/letters are clearly visible, with no other hint as to its state of issue.

**A:** Only a small portion of the windshield may be tinted, no lower than the AS1 line. Look for it in the upper corner on the passenger side. In Florida, the

front side windows must allow at least 28 percent of the light to pass. Rear side windows and the rear window, 15 percent. According to Florida law, no part of the license plate may be obscured from view. This includes not only the name of the state, but also the slogan "Sunshine State" or any vanity plate information. Other states have similar regulations.

# Tesla cuts 9 percent of workforce in effort to post a profit

**DETROIT** — Electric car maker Tesla Inc. is laying off about 3,600 workers mainly from its salaried ranks as it slashes costs in an effort to deliver on CEO Elon Musk's promise to turn a profit in the second half of the year.

In an email to workers on Tuesday, Musk said the cuts amount to about 9 percent of the company's workforce of 40,000.

Tesla would not say how much money the layoffs would save, but said no factory workers would be affected as the company continues to ramp up produc-

tion of its lower-priced Model 3 compact car.

The move is part of an organizational restructuring that Musk announced earlier in the year.

"Tesla has grown and evolved rapidly over the past several years, which has resulted in some duplication of roles and some job functions that, while they made sense in the past, are difficult to justify today," Musk wrote in the email. He thanked departing employees for their hard work and said Tesla is providing "significant salary and stock vesting" to those being let go, based on their length of service.

Tesla has not made an

annual profit in its 15 years of doing business, and it posted only two quarterly net profits.

At the company's annual shareholder meeting this month, Musk said he expected the Palo Alto, Calif., company to post a quarterly profit during the July-September period. For nearly all of its history, Tesla has put up losses while investing heavily in technology, manufacturing plants and an extensive charging network.

It's not the first time Tesla laid off workers. The company let go of 400 to 700 workers last fall, after completing annual perfor-

mance reviews, and it laid off a small number of workers back in 2008.

Musk wrote in the email that the company will never achieve its mission to help move the world to cleaner energy "unless we eventually demonstrate that we can be sustainably profitable."

The company is making the move now so it never has to do it again, he wrote. Tesla still has a significant need for production workers as it tries to reach Model 3 manufacturing targets, he wrote in the email.

The layoffs come in engineering, sales and other front-office functions, but

the company says the remaining workforce is large enough to accomplish Musk's lofty goals of rolling out a semi, pickup truck and a new SUV in the coming years.

Tesla shares rose 2.5 percent to \$340.34 in afternoon trading, after reaching as high as \$354.97 around noon.

Musk also announced that the company's solar panel unit decided to end its agreement to sell via Home Depot stores so it can focus on sales in Tesla's company stores and online. A majority of Tesla employees working at Home Depot will get offers to work in Tesla's own stores.

Consumer Edge Re-

search Analyst James Albertine wrote in a note to investors that he views the moves "as a positive in helping Tesla track toward profitability later this year."

He wrote that reaching Musk's Model 3 production goal of 5,000 vehicles per week by the end of June is still the primary driver of profitability. "A focus on 'getting lean' is a positive with respect to Tesla's guidance for achieving consolidated profitability in 2018, in our view," he wrote.

The Model 3 starts at \$35,000, but lower-priced configurations are not available yet. It can easily top \$50,000 with options.

### Step by step

Dear Dave,  
When is the right time to buy a house when someone is following your Baby Steps plan?

— Samuel

Dear Samuel,  
That's a good question. Let's start by going over the first few Baby Steps.

Baby Step 1 is saving \$1,000 for a beginner emergency fund. Baby Step 2 is paying off all consumer debt, from smallest to largest, using the debt snowball. Baby Step 3 is where you increase your emergency fund to the point where you have three to six months of expenses set aside.

Once you've done all that, you can begin saving for a home. I'll call it Baby Step 3b. For folks looking to buy a house, I advise saving enough money for a down payment of at least 20 percent. I don't beat people up over mortgage debt, but I do advise them to get a 15-year, fixed rate loan, where the payments are no more than 25 percent of their monthly take-home pay.

Doing it this way may take a little more time, and delay your dream of becoming a homeowner a bit, but buying a house when you're broke is the quickest way I know to turn something that should be a blessing into a burden!

# Stop work in 'the business of war'

## Google's retreat from AI contract unlikely to cool Pentagon's love for Silicon Valley

Silicon Valley's cutting-edge work increasingly has made it an attractive place for the Pentagon to look for a defensive edge. That's why military officials recently opened an outpost in Mountain View, Calif., to build relationships with technology start-ups and major players.

The Pentagon's enthusiasm to build those tech partnerships is unlikely to cool, analysts said, despite the employee pushback that recently led Google to not renew a contract that allowed the military to use artificial intelligence tools to analyze drone footage.

Google's decision reportedly came after almost 4,000 employees (Alphabet, Google's parent company, has a total workforce of 85,000) signed a letter asking Chief Executive Sundar Pichai to end the contract for Project Maven and stop all work in "the business of war." At least a dozen employees resigned over the issue, according to Bloomberg.

Last week, Pichai laid out a set of principles for Google that bans artificial intelligence work involving weapons or surveillance that violates "internationally accepted norms," and that endorses applications that are "socially beneficial," "built and tested for safety" and "accountable to people." He noted, however, that Google would continue to work with governments and the military in other areas, such as cybersecurity.

The military-tech relationship has flipped from the early years, when the Defense Department acted as an investor in and customer for high-tech products that later worked their way into industry. Development of the ENIAC computer in the 1940s was funded by the Army to calculate weapons trajectories, after all, and the beginnings of the internet were created in the '70s with funding from an arm of the Pentagon.

It wasn't until after the



Cold War that commercial applications supplanted the military as the primary driver of innovation, especially with development of the personal computer and mobile devices.

In recent years, recognizing that it needed to more rapidly adopt advances in areas such as software and networks, the Defense Department turned to the commercial tech sector in search of partners.

The Senate Armed Services Committee's markup of the 2019 National Defense Authorization Act allocated \$150 million and directed the undersecretary of Defense for research and engineering to work on developing Pentagon relationships with academia and the commercial tech industry.

The payoff: Contracts such as the \$927 million deal Microsoft Corp. landed in 2016 with the Defense Information Systems Agency to provide technical support services.

"Silicon Valley firms are leading in a number of sectors of technology that have increasing relevance to national defense," said Tom Mahnken, president of the Center for Strategic and Budgetary Assessments.

In 2015, the Pentagon opened the Defense Innovation Unit Experimental,

or DIUx, an entity based in Mountain View with offices in the Pentagon; Austin, Texas; and Boston that provides capital — without taking an ownership stake — to companies to work on prototype projects that address problems faced by the U.S. military.

A year later, the Defense Innovation Board was set up to advise the Defense secretary on crucial future challenges, including business concepts and technology applications. Chaired by Eric Schmidt, former Alphabet executive chairman and the company's current technical adviser, the board includes university professors as well as tech executives.

Last year, DIUx awarded \$104 million to 48 prototype projects at companies such as Adobe, software development firm Pivotal and Palantir, a big-data company founded by billionaire Peter Thiel. The technologies include autonomy and artificial intelligence, space and information technology.

"If you ask the fundamental question are the linkages between the valley and the Pentagon deepening all the time, the answer is a clear yes," said Paul Bracken, professor of management at Yale University who has studied the role of

technology in defense and has served as a consultant to the Defense Department.

That includes areas such as cloud computing, which the Pentagon sees as a way to modernize and secure IT systems. Last year, Amazon.com Inc. unveiled a cloud computing service available to the U.S. intelligence community called the Secret Region. A press release about the announcement included an endorsement by John Edwards, chief information officer for the CIA, who said it was a "key component" of the intelligence community's cloud strategy.

The deal upped Amazon's credibility in the marketplace "just at a time when cybersecurity was becoming one of the biggest issues around," Bracken said. "Not only is the technology better because it's being innovated under extreme circumstances, but you can get enormous credibility by servicing different markets under DOD because people view these systems as really tested."

In addition to tapping Silicon Valley innovation, DIUx is trying to shorten the often lengthy acquisition process associated with the Pentagon, which analysts say has made fast-moving tech companies wary of working on defense programs.

Concerns about weaponizing technology represent a small portion of DIUx's discussions with companies, said Sean Singleton, its director of business development and marketing. But artificial intelligence was raising difficult questions even before the Pentagon came calling. Some technologists — most famously, Tesla Inc. and SpaceX Chief Executive Elon Musk — worry that its creators haven't fully thought through the implications of truly intelligent computers or the controls that would be needed.

"Military uses of AI, in particular, is something that technologists in Silicon Valley are particularly cautious about," said Peter Eckersley, chief computer scientist and head of AI policy at the Electronic Frontier Foundation. "I don't think we would have seen this same type of backlash

if this were a regular sale of Google cloud services for the military to use for its internal engineering."

Google did not respond to a request for comment.

In his numerous conversations with Google employees about Project Maven, "almost all" expressed alarm about or were opposed to the company's involvement in Project Maven, Eckersley said.

"Many Googlers think that getting the deployment of artificial intelligence right is extremely important and should begin with getting it right," he said, and that a military application should be avoided until the technology is very well understood.

Project Maven intended to use machine learning to pick out specific objects from imagery captured by drones, work that would be extremely time-consuming if done by humans. A Pentagon official said last year that the project's goal was to "turn the enormous volume of data available to the DOD into actionable intelligence and insights."

"Google's AI principles are wholly insufficient for establishing ethical accountability across the industry," said a statement from the Tech Workers Coalition activist group, which circulated a petition calling for Google to not renew its Project Maven contract. "We join Google workers in their call for tech companies to agree to independent external oversight on how their AI is being deployed and used."

That concern is not necessarily a disconnect between the government and Google, said Andrew Hunter, director of the defense-industrial initiatives group at the Center for Strategic and International Studies.

"It's a core issue for both industry and the government to understand and figure out ways to ensure that these artificial intelligence applications that are being used for national security are reliable and can support accountability," Hunter said. "So when they are used for military purposes ... we know what they're doing and why they're doing that."

The pushback at Google was probably also amplified by the company's culture. Founders Larry Page and Sergey Brin encouraged and enabled staff to voice their opinions on "difficult topics," and the company promotes active internal communication on a variety of issues, such as workplace sexual harassment.

"That doesn't mean that the same objections wouldn't be prevalent at Amazon or Microsoft or other big tech companies," Eckersley said. "But Google honestly does a better job of allowing their employees ... to have a loud voice."



## Merger ushers in new era for Warner Bros., CNN and HBO

Time Warner Inc. is no more. Late Thursday, AT&T Inc. announced that it completed its \$85 billion acquisition of Time Warner Inc., just two days after a federal judge in Washington gave the deal the green light. AT&T wasted little time consolidating its hard-fought prize — a blockbuster purchase that instantly transforms the phone company into a major force in Hollywood.

Television networks HBO, TBS, TNT, CNN, Cartoon Network, Turner Classic Movies and the Warner Bros. movie and television studio, based in Burbank, now have a new boss: John Stankey. The 55-year-old executive is a Los Angeles native and a 32-year veteran of AT&T and its predecessors.

Time Warner Chief Ex-

ecutive Jeffrey Bewkes will serve as a senior adviser to Stankey and AT&T during the transition.

"All of Jeff Bewkes' direct reports will now report to John Stankey," AT&T said in its statement.

AT&T and Time Warner spent the last six months battling the Justice Department to gain its approval for the deal. The Justice Department sued in November, alleging that AT&T would use Time Warner's content to put its rivals at a disadvantage.

On Tuesday, U.S. District Judge Richard Leon ruled against the government, saying it failed to prove its case that the AT&T-Time Warner combination was anticompetitive.

AT&T will separate its business into four distinct units: Communications, which encompasses mobile phone service, broadband internet and Di-

recTV; advertising and analytics; international operations; and now the Time Warner properties, which last year generated \$31 billion in revenue.

"We offer customers a differentiated, high-quality, mobile-first entertainment experience," Randall Stephenson, chairman and chief executive of AT&T, said in a statement. "We're going to bring a fresh approach to how the media and entertainment industry work for consumers, content creators, distributors and advertisers."

Time Warner was formed by the 1990 merger of Warner Communications and Time Inc., the magazine empire. In 1996, it bought Turner Broadcasting. At one point, the company was one of the largest entertainment conglomerates in the world, churning out popular movies, 24-hour newscasts

and such popular magazines as Time, People and Sports Illustrated.

It also orchestrated one of the worst mergers ever: Time Warner's \$165 billion sale in 2000 to AOL, the dial-up internet pioneer. A few months after the deal was finalized, the dot-com bubble burst and the company's value plummeted.

The company's roots date to 1923, when Polish immigrant brothers Harry, Albert, Sam and Jack Warner incorporated their pioneering film business in Los Angeles. Warner Bros. remains one of the industry's jewels with such film franchises as "Wonder Woman" and "Harry Potter" and television shows such as "The Big Bang Theory."

Separately, the first copy of Time magazine was published in 1923 and sold 9,000 copies. Time's founder, Henry R. Luce and Briton Hadden, thought there

would be a market among the college-educated crowd. But the digital era has not been kind to magazines, and Time Warner four years ago spun off the titles.

Thursday, AT&T negotiated a settlement with the Justice Department to waive a waiting period for the closing, according to Bloomberg News. AT&T closed the deal about three hours later. AT&T was pushing to complete the transaction before a June 21 deadline, when its Time Warner merger agreement was due to expire.

Stankey served as chief information officer, chief technology officer and, beginning in 2012, AT&T's chief of strategy.

Last summer, he was designated the new boss of HBO, Turner and Warner Bros. — but he had to wait nearly a year to take over his new turf because of the battle with the Justice Department.

## Getting to bottom of a bad attitude

**Q:** I've been getting more and more irritable at work. There's nothing specific going wrong, but things just get on my nerves. Any suggestions for getting my attitude back on track?

**A:** Have you taken a vacation lately?

# Seek guidance to 'manage' nightmare boss

**Q:** After starting a new job three months ago, I quickly discovered that my boss is a nightmare. She argues about everything and seems to enjoy yelling at people. Whenever I bring up a work problem, she just rolls her eyes at me and shakes her head.

The worst part is that I have received almost no training for this job. Before I was hired, my manager said she would thoroughly instruct me and answer all my questions. However, she has made it quite clear that she doesn't like to be bothered.

This woman has been with the company for years, so I'm stuck with her as my boss. But the job pays extremely well, my coworkers are great, and I only plan to work here for two years. Should I put up with this aggravation or just leave?

**A:** Because you have several good reasons to stay, perhaps you should try to develop some cop-

ing mechanisms. As a new employee, you may find your coworkers to be a particularly helpful resource. When dealing with a difficult manager, coworkers can often make life bearable by sticking together and strategizing solutions.

Since your boss seems resistant to providing the promised training, look for experienced colleagues who might fill that role. Given their own history with this dysfunctional manager, they should certainly understand your current dilemma. If you can outline the areas where you still need instruction, perhaps they will help you create a training plan.

If certain employees seem particularly adept at communicating with your boss, take a lesson from

their approach. Having identified her hot buttons, they probably know which topics to avoid. They may also have time-tested techniques for asking questions and avoiding arguments. With a little coworker coaching, you may find that "managing up" becomes a lot easier.

**Q:** I supervise a group of drivers who pick up deliveries in the morning and then head out on their routes for the rest of the day. I only see them for 30 minutes before they leave. As a new manager, I would like to create a positive work environment, but how can I do that with so little time?

**A:** When you don't have much time, you must make the most of the time you have. Surveys have shown leadership style to be a strong predictor of job satisfaction, so your own attitude and demeanor can make a big difference. During daily contacts with your team, try to be as helpful, sup-

portive and encouraging as possible.

For any group, one key motivational strategy is to regularly remind them of the importance of their work. Your drivers are not just dropping off boxes, but also insuring that valued items arrive safely and on time.

Through friendly interactions with customers, they can represent the company well and encourage repeat business.

To promote camaraderie, consider asking the drivers to share brief stories about their customers, driving experiences or tips for simplifying the job. Finally, if you also communicate via email or text, take those opportunities to share information or request input. You might even solicit ideas for making those half hour meetings more interesting.

# Search Like It's Your Job

Searching for a job can be as passive or as active a task as you want it to be. The question is how bad do you want it? When you treat your job search as your first priority, you are guaranteed to see better results more quickly.

### CUSTOMIZE YOUR PROFESSIONAL DOCUMENTS

The importance of keeping your resume up to date is obvious. It is also essential to customize your professional documents to each job for which you apply. If you are applying for several positions at once and have decided to adapt your cover letter from one position to another, have someone other than yourself proofread it. The last thing you want to do is send a cover letter and resume to one employer with another's name on it.

### NETWORK OFTEN

When you are looking for a job, you should find ways to network. Networking is an invaluable professional skill, so take the steps to get your face and your work in front of other people. This can be in the form of emails, meeting former colleagues and peers for lunch or coffee, or attending conferences and organized networking events. ### SEND A THANK YOU NOTE

each potential employer who took the time to interview you. This is your final opportunity to get your name in front of those with hiring power in a company and to leave them with a positive impression of you. This prac-

tice isn't exclusively for interviews. By sending someone you met at a networking event a quick email soon after—even a brief, "It was so nice chatting with you this afternoon"—will help you grow your professional network.

## Deductions to correct overpayment may be legal

**My employer overpaid me by six hours and recouped the money by deducting from my pay over two weeks. But it did so without my written permission. Is this legal? I checked on the New York Labor Department website, but the information seemed vague.**

— Questionable deductions

**DEAR QUESTIONABLE:** The company doesn't need your permission to correct the overpayment.

"When an employer mistakenly overpays an employee, it does not need the employee's written permission to recoup the overpayment," said employment attorney Richard Kass, a partner at Bond, Schoeneck & King in Manhattan.

Still, the employer would be subject to some regulations.

"In New York, the employer must give the employee advance written notice of how it calculates the overpayment and how it intends to recoup it, and the employee must have an opportunity to object if he or she believes the employer is acting unfairly," Kass said. "Detailed regulations deter-

mine how much the employer can recoup each pay period, how much advance notice must be given, what information must be contained in that notice, how much time the employee has to object, and how objections must be considered."

That notice should be given at least three days before the deductions begin, he said.

And if an employee contests the company's overpayment findings, the employer has to hold off making the deductions.

"Recoupments cannot be deducted while the dispute resolution process is still going on," Kass said.

"In the case of the reader," Kass said, "since the amount of the error appears to be small compared to the employee's weekly pay, the employer acted properly as long as it gave the employee the required written notice at least three days before the first deduction was made, and the employee did not

submit a timely objection."

**I was recently fired from my job because I complained about not being paid for all the hours I worked. For example, a half-hour was deducted from my pay for lunch breaks, but I never got to take one. During my first 10 years as an employee, the company had no time clock. And even though I often worked 55 hours a week, I was routinely paid for just 48 hours. After installing a time clock, the company still paid whatever it wanted, regardless of what the time cards indicated. When I complained, my boss threatened to have me deported, even though I am a legal resident. I called numerous people for help, but it seemed that no one wanted to get involved. Please help.**

**DEAR DOLLARS:** You should call the U.S. Labor Department right away at 516-338-1890 or 212-264-8185.

If you were an hourly employee, the employer, by law, had to pay you for all the time you worked. That includes your lunch hour if you worked through it.

And you should have earned an overtime rate of 1 1/2 times your regular hourly rate when you worked more than 40 hours a week.

As for the deportation threats, even if you were undocumented, the company would have to pay you what you rightfully earned. That's because all employees are covered by the federal Fair Labor Standards Act, regardless of their immigration status. Threats of deportation to keep an employee from complaining about underpayments would be an additional violation. And for the record, the U.S. Labor Department's Wage and Hour Division, which enforces wage standards, doesn't share information with Immigration and Customs Enforcement, or ICE, based on a memorandum of understanding between the two entities.

## Lessons to finance an education

**HIGH SCHOOL MAY HAVE PREPARED YOU FOR COLLEGE ACADEMICALLY,** but you may be less ready to handle your money, especially if you need student loans.

More than two-thirds of college students at all levels said in a survey that they feel stressed about their personal finances, according to The Study on Collegiate Financial Wellness, a 2017 report by The Ohio State University.

Learning some financial best practices and turning them into habits now can help ease money worries. Here are personal-finance lessons to take to campus.

■ Get the most free aid possible before borrowing money. Every year, submit a Free Application for Federal Student Aid, or FAFSA, to qualify for federal, state and institutional grants, scholarships and work-study.

Search for additional scholarships with tools like the U.S. Department of Labor's Scholarships Finder.

■ If you do borrow, maximize federal student loans before private options. Federal loans offer more repayment options and, in some cases, forgiveness.

Each year, write down the amount you borrow; doing this can make the debt feel more real, personal finance experts say. And having that information accessible will help organize repayment planning and your postgrad budget, said Vince Shorb, CEO of the National Financial Educators Council.

■ Think of a college spending plan as a short-term strategy for your money. It's more flexible than a traditional budget and factors in money available only after tuition, fees, room and board are funded.

Your spending plan could look like this: Say you have \$1,000 for a 15-week semester and you know you'll be making one trip home at Thanksgiving that costs \$200. That leaves \$800, or \$53 per week for extras.

A spending plan shows how overspending one week will leave you with a cash shortage the next week.

■ Student loan payments typically begin when your grace period ends, six months after leaving school. But for all except subsidized federal loans, interest builds daily and is added to the total amount you owe when payment begins.

If your spending plan allows, you can lessen your total debt by making monthly interest payments while you're in school. Or send a lump sum interest payment before the grace period ends.

■ Creditworthiness is key to getting approved when you rent an apartment or apply to get a credit card, auto loan or home loan. The sooner you start building credit, the longer your history will be.

To get a credit card, you need to be 21 or have a co-signer or an income. Another option is to become an authorized user on someone else's card, like a parent. But before you get any card, read the fine print, including specifics about its annual percentage rate.

■ Financial predators come in all shapes, so avoiding them often comes down to trusting your gut: If a transaction seems shady, don't do it.

Some red flags are easy to spot, such as too-good-to-be-true deals or pressure to send money fast. Other scammers are harder to avoid, such as credit card thieves. Defend your money by automating fraud alerts from your bank and credit card company to let you know about unusual purchases.

## Guts and grit: Harlee reveals all in crime drama's final season

For an informant, withholding and manipulating the truth can be a matter of life and death. Keeping secrets and telling white lies can be hard enough for the average citizen and harder still for a mobster, but for a cop? Well, no greater challenge can exist than to try to delude those trained to detect such deception.

Amidst a sea of badges and blue on prime-time television, one series has managed to make huge waves, combining the drama of a mafioso series with the action of a gritty cop show. Despite an exciting run, this year marks the final season of the star-heavy series, as season 3 of "Shades of Blue" premieres Sunday, June 17, on NBC.

"Shades of Blue" explores the lives of the Street Crimes detective squad of the 64th precinct in New York City, focusing on Det. Harlee Santos (Jennifer Lopez, "Lila & Eve," 2015) and her supervisor, Lt. Matt Wozniak (Ray Liotta, "Goodfellas," 1990), with whom Harlee has a 15-year history and a deep, familial relationship. The crew is a tight-knit group of dirty cops who do what is necessary in order to make a crime scene or criminal work in their favor. Other members of the crew include Tess Nazario (Drea de Matteo, "The Sopranos"), Marcus Tufo (Hampton Fluker, "Major Crimes") and Carlos Espada (Vincent Laresca, "Graceland").

After being set up in the series premiere, Harlee had a difficult decision to make, and it's one with which she continues to grapple. She's brought in by the FBI and confronted by Agent Robert Stahl (Warren Kole, "Stalker"), who needs her to act as an informant so that his anti-corruption task force can finally reveal the unsavory underbelly of the 64th. Given that Harlee is a single mother, down on her luck and desperate to give her daughter, Cristina (Sarah Jeffery, "Rogue"), a better future, she has little choice but to agree, realizing that compliance with the FBI could give her a second chance instead of jail time, while simultaneously knowing that even the smallest misstep could spell tragedy for her and her child.

Season 2 of "Shades of Blue" saw Harlee's loyalties increasingly torn. She had suspected that Wozniak would be through with her, having learned of her informant ways, but he revealed some

truths of his own and decided to take advantage of his new-found knowledge. He enlisted Harlee as a double agent of sorts, feeding misinformation to Stahl as a means to continue helping the crew. As the season intensified, fans were constantly immersed in the tension, with a finale that left the fates of both Harlee and Wozniak in perilous uncertainty. Thankfully, early trailers for the new season indicate that Harlee will be able to testify in court, hinting that all of the betrayal and lies of seasons past will come to light, putting corruption from all sides on public display.

Beyond a compelling plot and intense screenwriting, the show's popularity owes a great deal to its phenomenal casting. Since the early 2000s, there has been an increasing shift from the big screen to television for many of Hollywood's

A and B list actors. Claire Danes has shone on the small screen in "Homeland." Colin Farrell and Matthew McConaughey made waves with "True Detective," a show that's boasted more than its fair share of big-screen talent in regular and recurring roles. It's no wonder, then, that when NBC decided to option "Shades of Blue," it wasn't such a difficult sell, with stars Lopez and Liotta eager to get involved in the burgeoning quality TV market.

In an interview for BUILD Series, Lopez and Liotta expressed their excitement and passion for the series. Lopez didn't shy away from addressing the shift for many actors from the big screen to the small screen, noting that "six, seven years ago ... it just seemed like the movie business was not doing as well if you didn't have a big blockbuster." As more niche or unique stories became difficult to pitch to cinematic studios, Lopez believes that "great writers" made the move to television because they'd be able "to do the stories they wanted to do," with the financial freedom and stability to do so. For Lopez — and Liotta, who nodded in approval — "the best movies right now are on TV."

Creative freedom aside, the challenge of television's demanding schedules brings more depth to "Shades of Blue," or so Lopez and Liotta believe. "[The show] is emotionally taxing. It seems, to me, like in every scene, it's life or death ... to keep at that level, for five and a half, six months straight, every

day for 12 hours a day ... it's a tough, grueling process," Lopez states. Neither believes they're holding back for network programming, with both admitting to the difficulties of shaking Harlee and Wozniak after a long day of shooting.

Sadly, this is the final season of the series, but perhaps it's fitting, given that "Shades of Blue" will conclude on

its own terms and be able to maintain the tension that has made it so successful throughout its run. Catch up if you can, get to know the crew and what's at stake, and prepare for the final 10 episodes of NBC's gritty crime drama. The season premiere of "Shades of Blue" airs Sunday, June 17, on NBC.

## Top prospects feature in first round of 2018 NHL Entry Draft

This year's NHL Entry Draft may not have the deepest draft class as in years past, but there's a handful of talented prospects who look ready to make an immediate impact for their respective teams. Tune in Friday, June 22, to find out who goes first at the draft, with live coverage from American Airlines Center in Dallas, Texas, on NBC Sports Network.

Following the NHL Draft Lottery in April, the Buffalo Sabres retained the No. 1 pick after finishing last in the league, while the Carolina Hurricanes and Montreal Canadiens moved up in order, pushing the Ottawa Senators and Arizona Coyotes down two spots from second and third. Based on reports from the NHL Central Scouting Bureau, Rasmus Dahlin and Andrei Svechnikov are the top two prospects of the draft, with analysts favoring Dahlin to be selected first overall by the Sabres.

In the lead-up to the draft, Dahlin has been referred to as a generational talent and described as a talented two-way defenseman. The Swedish

defenseman's style of play has been compared to that of fellow countryman Erik Karlsson of the Senators, who is known for his fast skating and offensive play-making abilities. Similar to Karlsson, Dahlin began his professional career with Frölunda HC in Gothenburg, Sweden, and looks on track to continue a similar path as the five-time all-star defenseman.

After one season with the Barrie Colts of the OHL, Svechnikov has been described as an elite skater and finisher. At 6'3 and 187 pounds, the power forward scored 40 goals and assisted 32 in 44 games, adding 11 points in eight playoff games for the Colts last season. Despite missing two months of action after suffering a hand injury, Svechnikov managed to win the OHL Rookie of the Year award for his dominance in the league. His style of play has been compared to Tampa Bay Lightning winger Nikita Kucherov, who is coming off a 100-point performance in the regular season.

## Dig in

Chefs show off their chops in 'Guy's Ranch Feast'

There are basically two types of shows on Food Network. There's the more informative and laid-back type that features chefs doing what they do best, such as "Giada on the Beach," or the type that shines a spotlight on businesses dishing out amazing food, such as "Vegas Cakes." Then, there are the cooking competitions that put professionals (or even non-professionals, in the case of "Worst Cooks in America") in high-stakes situations, such as "Iron Chef America" or "Chopped."

Host Guy Fieri definitely has a foot in both worlds, with "Diners, Drive-Ins and Dives" sitting firmly in the first group and "Guy's Grocery Games" in the second. Heck, he got his start on Food Network when he won the second season of "Food Network Star," a series that itself blurs the line between the two genres of cooking shows.

Guy's latest offering, "Guy's Ranch Feast," falls firmly into the first category. The TV special, which premieres with back-to-back episodes on Sunday, June 17, is a spinoff of "Guy's Ranch Kitchen" and features Guy's most talented chef friends spending a

day at his beautiful California ranch home.

Of course, when you get a bunch of chefs together, you just know that some amazing food is going to be made. An Italian feast is what's on order on the first menu, and Guy's guests are happy to oblige. While chef Rocco DiSpirito ("Now Eat This! With Rocco DiSpirito") is busy making frito misto di mare with saffron aioli, Iron Chef Alex Guarnaschelli prepares some charred peppers with balsamic and garlic bread, along with a crowd-pleasing baked herb ziti pasta.

Meanwhile, regular "Chopped" judge chef Marc Murphy prepares a vibrant tomato salad with anchovy vinaigrette and some incredible braised artichokes with radicchio, while his frequent "Chopped" sidekick, chef Scott Conant, brings some Tuscan to the ranch with his roasted potatoes with herbs and garlic, and a fig cake with sweet ricotta cheese.

That's a sizable feast, but that's exactly what Fieri gets when he invites his chef friends to his ranch. These chefs just can't resist cooking when they're together. "Guy's Ranch Feast" airs Sunday, June 17, on Food Network.

### 'Detroiders' brings comedy to the Motor City

**Laughter, as advertised:** Who ever would have thought that the world of advertising could be this funny? Before AMC's "Mad Men" came along in 2007, the industry probably didn't seem all that glamorous to very many people, but that behind-the-scenes peek into the highly competitive business of ads definitely opened it up to TV audiences.

Unlike that storied series, "Detroiders" is not a tense drama that takes a serious look at advertising. No, this Comedy Central series swings in the other direction, batting for laughs and hitting a home run along the way, with its second season premiering Thursday, June 21.

Sam Richardson ("Veep") and Tim Robinson ("Saturday Night Live") star in the comedy, which they also co-created. Together, they play Sam Duvet and Tim Cramblin, a pair of local Detroiders with their own ad agency that makes low-budget commercials for local businesses. They may be competing with the big out-of-town firms, but what they lack in resources, experience and glamour of the "big guys," they more than make up for with laughs — and there are lots of them here.

At its heart, "Detroiders" is a buddy comedy about two best friends and business partners getting into all sorts of crazy situations against the backdrop of Detroit's skyline — already a far cry from "Mad Men's" take on an ad agency. Also different here is the complete focus on Sam and Tim, with other characters ebbing and flowing through their lives but never staying around for long.

The Motor City is experiencing a revival, and best friends Sam and Tim are poised to capitalize on it — if they can get their act together. The second season of "Detroiders" premieres Thursday, June 21, on Comedy Central.

**The final course:** Even the greatest and most delectable feasts have an end, and the same is true for TV shows. For "Young & Hungry," the meal's last course is finally being served.

The second half of the Freeform romantic comedy's fifth and final season premieres Wednesday, June 20, following a yearlong hiatus that's left fans championing at the bit for a resolution after the first half's cliffhanger ending. And while it's the end of the show as a TV sitcom, there's more "Young & Hungry" in store for its fans, with a two-hour movie in the works that will serve as the true finale for the beloved series.

Emily Osment ("Hannah Montana") stars as young chef Gabi Diamond, who was hired by self-made millionaire Josh Kaminski (Jonathan Sadowski, "Live Free or Die Hard," 2007) as his personal chef way back in the series premiere. The mid-season finale left audiences hanging after Josh recovered from a bout of amnesia and finally told Gabi that he loves her. With only 10 episodes to go on the small screen, it looks like the two young lovers may finally be ready to commit to each other.

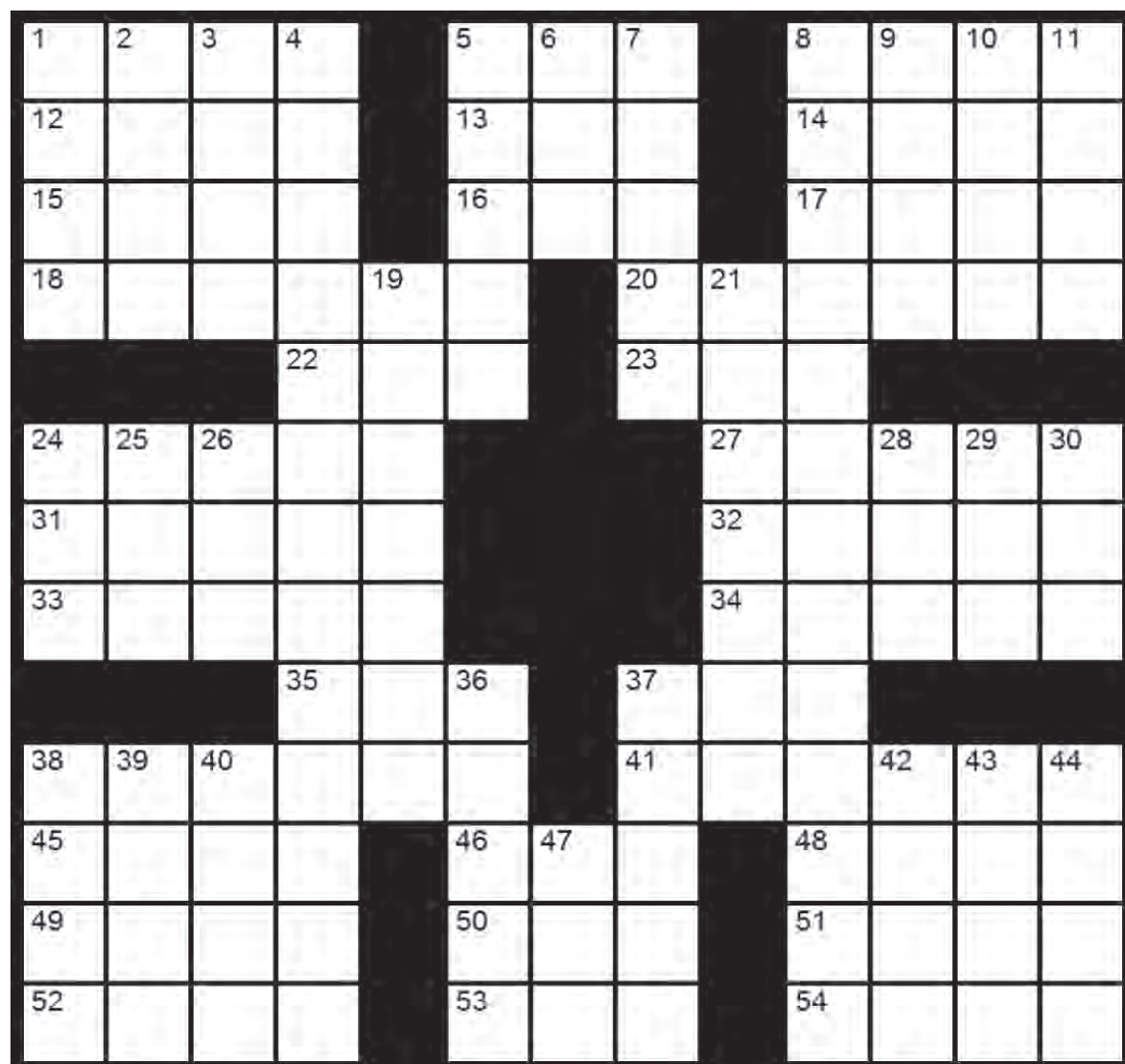
