Almost 150 dogs removed from home

PARKERSBURG — The Parkersburg Humane Society is working to care for and re-home 146 dogs after they were removed from a residence Wednesday evening.

"I would like to say, I don't believe it was at all intentional," Gary McIntyre, executive director of the shelter, said. "It's just unfortunate that none of the animals were spayed or neutered."

McIntyre said humane officers handle complaints and investigate any cases of potential cruelty, neglect, abuse or just to do welfare checks. He said two officers responded to a request for a check at a residence near City Park. He said the officer initially believed there might have been 30-40 animals in the household and requested back-up to help transport them to the shelter.

"So we sent a couple of staff, and the van, and loaded up a bunch of crates, thinking, we're going to get 30 dogs in," McIntyre said. "Shortly after the staff got there, the 30 became 40. The 40 went to 50, and it kept going up to 60. And finally, by the end of the night, when the last load got here at almost 7 (p.m.), there were 146."

McIntyre said the ages of the dogs ranged from a few days old to around 10 years of age. He said many of the dogs appeared to have never been outside the home, as they seemed disoriented when they were brought out into daylight. He said the shelter did not find any serious medical conditions among the dogs initially, but they did treat them for

MORGANTOWN — Mon Health Medical Center Auxiliary's 60th Ball of the Year was a rousing success Saturday evening.

Leading up to the ball, ball chair Jess Maroulis and Auxiliary President Bethann Gamponia sat down with The Dominion Post to talk about preparations for the evening and share some thoughts on the 60th ball being the Auxiliary's last.

The Auxiliary will be moving to a spring fundraiser, a Derby party set for May 3 in conjunction with the running of the Kentucky Derby, while a fall fundraiser gala not run by the Auxiliary will serve the mission of Vandalia Health North.

Maroulis joined the Auxiliary in 2020, she said, and was appointed as ball chair by previous President Chris Battin.

"My first reaction was, 'This is awesome. I'm so excited.'" She smiled. "Then it set in, and I was like, 'I don't know if this is a great idea.'" She has four small children to care for — but

she kept thinking. "You let it marinate a little bit longer and you're like, 'OK let's do this.'"

She got the job last November and planning began in January. It wasn't a solo effort, by any means. "I have a great team," she said. A lot of people on the ball committee have experience and taught her, and helped her delegate. "It's all just helping each other. With all that I felt like it was pretty seamless."

The biggest issue, she learned, is the cost of putting on a gala for more than 600 people. She thought, "Wow this is the kind of money you have to spend to put on an event." But the investment pays off in raising money for the hospital.

This year's proceeds will go toward an endowment fund for the Caring Cottages project — furnished apartments to serve patients and their families coming in for care from out of town.

While it's been a lot of work, "it's also been a lot of fun," she said. She's enjoyed things like trying the menu.

This year's theme was "Wild, Wonderful & Whimsical." Her

original vision for the décor was greens, blues and wine colors, she said, but they shifted to a 60th anniversary diamond theme with silver and black. Inspired by West Virginia's nature, Maroulis worked in whimsical lighted décor such as LED butterflies.

Setup used to be a bit of a slam-bam, Maroulis and Gamponia said — they had to do it the night before. But with the move to the event center at the Morgantown Marriott at Waterfront Place, the hotel has allowed them to begin sooner. They started last Sunday, with volunteers coming in as they could, working around their regular daily schedules.

They talked about their feelings as this ball became the Auxiliary's last.

"I struggled from the beginning when we made this decision," Maroulis said. While she's been with the Auxiliary only a few years, "you watch something grow." But she takes heart. "The Derby fundraiser will be spectacular."

Gamponia said, "It is very bittersweet, not just for myself

186,500 syringes distributed in eight months

The numbers almost require a double take.

In 243 days — from Jan. 1 to Aug. 31 — Milan Puskar Health Right's LIGHT program distributed 186,580 syringes.

They were passed out to 545 unique individuals across 1,364 total visits.

That number breaks down to about 767 needles a day, or, per capita, that's just over six syringes for every person living in the city of Morgantown.

And while Health Right is certainly passing them out in quantity, they're getting the overwhelming majority of them back — about 94%, or 175,573.

That's up from the 79% return rate in 2023.

"We are happy with the way the numbers are going," Milan Puskar Health Right Executive Director Laura Jones said during a recent harm reduction update to Morgantown City Council.

The briefing came as Jones prepares to request the annual approvals needed from the city and county to continue Health Right's needle exchange program — a requirement since the 2021 passage of SB334 by the West Virginia Legislature.

Additionally, the law mandates syringe service programs provide additional harm reduction services, require proof of residency and account for each syringe distributed under penalty of fines.

Along with the data, Jones arrived with a desire to refute what she calls the "myths" of harm reduction.

"Everyone thinks it causes or increases drug use. This is not true. No one comes to us and says, 'Hi, I think I want to use, can you give me some syringes?'" Jones said. "The people who come to our program have been using for a long time and they are interested in taking care of themselves and

# GOP candidates for attorney general and secretary of state hold fundraising lead

MORGANTOWN – The Republican candidates for attorney general and secretary of state held significant leads in fundraising and spending in the weeks leading up to Tuesday’s general election.

The figures come from their 2024 General Reports. The post-election reports, covering Oct. 21-Dec. 31, are due Jan. 7, 2025.

For attorney general Republican J.B. McCuskey – currently state auditor – faces Democratic Wheeling attorney Teresa Toriseva.

McCuskey opened the reporting period with \$203,068.76 in his campaign account. He raised \$36,000 in individual contributions plus \$21,700 at a Morgantown fundraiser.

He spent \$19,487.98, leaving a balance of \$241,280.78.

His year-to-date totals were \$1,499,879.26 raised and \$1,270,772.38 spent. He gave his campaign \$121,927.92.

Toriseva’s numbers are a fraction of McCuskey’s. She opened with her account in the red, at negative \$575.70. She raised \$729.37 and gave her campaign \$123.28 in-kind (goods and services).

She spent \$1,100, leaving her account still in the hole at negative \$946.33.

Her year-to-date totals

were \$47,709.10 raised and \$43,829.87 spent. She’s given her campaign \$4,861.64.

### Secretary of state

Republican Kris Warner faces Democrat Thornton Cooper.

Warner is executive director of the state Economic Development Authority and brother of current Secretary of State Mac Warner. Cooper is a South Charleston attorney who has served on the Kanawha County and South Charleston Democratic Executive Committees.

Warner opened with \$9,162.12. He raised \$24,603.03 and gave his campaign a loan of \$410.38.

He spent \$3,965.11, leaving a balance of \$30,210.42.

His year-to-date totals were \$182,268.29 raised and \$151,533.65 spent. He gave his campaign \$2,300 and lent it \$2,440.49. He still records an unpaid bill of \$1,420 for a venue rental.

Cooper opened with a bigger account balance but closed the period with a smaller account.

He opened with \$10,378.09 and raised \$2,452.78, with \$1,957.78 of that from himself. He also received \$15 in-kind.

He spent \$2,967.36, leaving a balance of \$10,863.51.

His totals were \$24,822.15 raised and \$13,913.64 spent. He gave his campaign \$19,572.15.

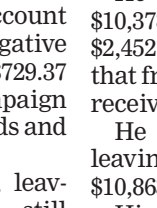

### Harris, Trump zeroing in on Sunbelt states

ATLANTA — Democrat Kamala Harris and Republican Donald Trump are zeroing in on Sunbelt states as they embark on one last weekend quest to sway undecided voters in battleground states that will determine the next

president. On Saturday, Harris encouraged supporters in Atlanta to vote early while Trump spoke in North Carolina about his days as a candidate coming to a close with this election. Harris was ending her day in Charlotte, North Carolina, while Trump has events planned for Salem, Virginia, which isn’t a battleground state

before another North Carolina rally in Greensboro.

### Agreement at U.N. to give Indigenous a voice

CALI, Colombia — After two weeks of negotiations, delegates agreed at the United Nations conference on biodiversity to establish a subsidiary body that will include Indigenous peoples in future deci-

sions on nature conservation. They also decided to oblige major corporations to share the benefits of research when using natural genetic resources. The COP16 summit hosted in Cali, Colombia, was a follow-up to the historic 2022 accord in Montreal, which includes 23 measures to save Earth’s plant and animal life.

### Coming home

When The Ogden Newspapers purchased The Dominion Post last month, Wolf’s name quickly rose to the top to lead the publication.

By then, she had logged nearly 27 years in newsrooms at the Observer-Reporter in her Washington hometown – she began her career there writing obituaries – and at the Daily Mining Gazette in Houghton, Michigan, where she most recently served as editor and publisher.

While she’s still getting to know Morgantown, she’s also very familiar with the region.

As she puts it, being a western Pennsylvania native, right next door to north-central West Virginia, has a way of doing that.

“I’ve had plenty of experiences up and down the I-79 corridor,” she said. “This is the same place. One big neighborhood. It really is coming home.”

And coming home is about more than just working in the region – it’s about becoming part of the greater Morgantown community, becoming part of the greater West Virginia University community.

Wolf has already moved into Monongalia County and looks forward to getting involved in the local scene. She also is working with the newspaper’s account executives to find ways to add value to the newspaper’s business partners.

For Wolf, being put in charge of The Dominion Post means becoming fully ingrained in the re-

gion and its happenings, of reminding folks of the newspaper’s 148-year history of chronicling the events and people of this region – and assuring them that will continue. She’s up to the task.

### Family, personal and professional

She and her husband, Damian, were high school sweethearts – and their two grown children still live in Pennsylvania.

So does her dad, in Washington.

Wolf stayed in the Keystone State for college, earning undergraduate and graduate degrees in English education and organizational leadership from Mercyhurst University, in Erie.

Those fledgling forays in journalism on the staff of JFK Today would come to define her career.

At Mercyhurst, she ran the school’s tutoring center and produced a newsletter, chronicling its life and times.

Wolf enjoyed learning things – and then explaining what she learned, by way of the printed word.

She also enjoyed a sense of place. She was an infant in Chicago when a job opportunity brought her family to Pennsylvania.

Her father was in human resources for Bethlehem Steel and her mother became a real estate broker, which, in another one of those full-circle turns, launched her career at the Observer-Reporter.

While juggling multiple part-time jobs, she answered an ad.

The Observer-Reporter was looking for an obituary writer to work Saturday and Sunday nights. She got the job and pret-

ty soon was getting the nuances of writing in the Associated Press news style – not to mention being taken by the life stories of her neighbors who had passed.

Narratives, of course, appeal to her English major, storyteller side.

A friend and workplace colleague who knew she grew up with real estate knowledge, soon recruited her for real estate advertising at the newspaper.

That gig got her to the design desk, as a night-side editor.

Wolf’s role expanded when Ogden acquired the Observer-Reporter, managing a production team for Washington and Uniontown publications.

### Who wants to buy a lighthouse?

Ogden two years ago asked her to assume the publisher and editor duties at its Daily Mining Gazette in Houghton, a picturesque town of 8,500 on the shores of Lake Superior in Michigan’s Upper Peninsula.

Houghton’s history was copper mining, which is how the newspaper got its name.

There, the new publisher would wield a pen and reporter’s notebook at events when other staffers weren’t available.

She became known for her regular contributions that celebrated people and places of the region that’s part of Michigan – and apart from it, too.

Wolf wrote about everything.

Such as Michigan real estate that couldn’t be more uniquely U.P. See, there was this lighthouse for sale, and she and Damian wondered aloud

about making an offer, which naturally warranted a column.

And her profile and tribute following the death of a kindly church pastor she befriended early on in Houghton: a clergyman who had offered support and immeasurable comfort when her mother had passed months before.

She said she’s excited to be working with the Dominion Post’s news reporters and editors to ensure stories such as these get their appropriate coverage in Morgantown.

### ‘I read it in The Dominion Post’

Houghton rekindled her fire for community journalism, she said.

Not that it needed rekindling, she’s quick to add.

She wants to do the same thing for The Dominion Post, she said – “That means as much local, community content as we can give.”

Which means, she said, getting it all on the record and into the pages of the newspaper and on the website, DominionPost.com.

People. Politicians. Meetings, moments.

Serious issues, head-on – and fun detours, definitely taking the scenic route.

It means, she stressed, attracting a younger readership while continuing to nurture the people who have subscribed to the newspaper for years.

“We have a great community, and we have a great newspaper,” she said.

“I’m excited for the future. I want to be able to overhear someone say, ‘Oh, I read it in The Dominion Post.’”

reducing harm. That’s really important because that’s the first step in recovery.”

Harm reduction, she continued, is an evidence-based approach to not only prevent the spread of infectious diseases like HIV and Hepatitis C, but connect at-risk community members with treatment, medical or mental health referrals, SNAP, HUD and Medicaid benefits and a number of other services.

It also allows for the distribution of overdose reversal medication, like Narcan. Health Right has been recognized as a national leader in the distribution of the lifesaving drug, having passed out more than 22,000 doses in two years.

Between Jan. 1 and

Sept. 1, the LIGHT program connected 10 people with treatment and made 30 referrals to primary care. It led to 75 HIV screenings and 50 Hep C screenings.

According to information on syringe service programs distributed through WVU’s Bridge Initiative for Science and Technology Policy, Leadership and Communications, nearly one in four West Virginians with HIV acquired it through the use of contaminated syringes. That’s the third highest rate in the country.

That same paper said West Virginia was down to 10 syringe service programs serving 12 counties as of January 2024.

Jones said she credits the LIGHT program with suppressing the kind of HIV outbreaks being experienced in other parts

of the state.

“We’re one of the communities that does not have that right now. There are communities in rural areas that have never had an HIV case that are starting to see HIV. So, we feel our program is contributing to not having an HIV outbreak among IV drug users. The [WVU] Positive Clinic would agree with that. We work very closely with them.”

The passage of SB334 led to the closure of exchange programs across West Virginia, including those in Marion and Harrison counties. Jones said the quick response teams in those neighboring counties drive people to and from Health Right regularly to get the syringes and services they need.

The LIGHT, or Living in Good Health Together, program began in August

of 2015. At one time, it was seeing over 1,000 individuals. Today, it’s about half that number.

Jones said Health Right has always tried to approach the program in a comprehensive manner with a focus on keeping people alive so they can turn their lives around.

“It takes time. Nobody walks in the door their first night and says, ‘I think I’m ready for treatment.’ We have to develop a relationship and a rapport with them. It’s that relationship that eventually leads them to that request,” she said.

“We just recently had someone come in who said, ‘I’m done. I’ve had it. This is enough. Get me into treatment.’ We did that. That’s a success we feel good about. It doesn’t happen often, but when it does it’s a good thing.”

but some of the Auxiliary members and board members who have been doing this for quite a number of years. ... It's quite a legacy that we've built."

**Some Ball of the Year facts**

- The Ball of the Year started in 1963, and this year would have been the 62nd, but COVID came in 2020 and the event was postponed in 2020

and 2021.

- The first one raised \$4,173 for a new emergency room and renovation of the maternity floor. The 1969 ball raised \$6,800 for beds, furniture and equipment on the maternity floor.

- Along the way they raised money for an obstetrical bathroom, a portable X-ray machine, 28 electric-powered hospital beds and a cardiac care unit.

- In 1975, the fundraising jumped to five fig-

ures - \$11,191.78 for two defibrillators. 1988 saw \$31,195.79 for an ambulance.

- And while the figures would go up and down a bit from year to year, they trended steadily upward: \$43,000 in 2000, \$60,204.19 in 2005, \$95,906 in 2011.

- All told, from 1963-2013, the ball raised \$1,323,920.83. The 2023 ball raised \$273,000 for the construction of the first Caring Cottage, going up on a lot on Pineview Drive near the hospital campus.

parasites and administer their initial vaccinations. He also said the potential for outbreaks of parvovirus and kennel cough was a concern, as the dogs had not been exposed to other animals and could quickly spread illness in the shelter environment, but no signs of the diseases were found.

"They've gotten their first set of vaccinations, and then, as long as they're here, we'll continue to follow up with the subsequent boosters," McIntyre said.

He said the shelter is working with its partners in Dayton to take some of the dogs, including some pregnant females, to help alleviate the burden. He said they also have a rescue partner in Pittsburgh that has a "rescue ranch" that is interested in taking some of the dogs. He said the goal is to find placement for as many of the dogs as possible with

other shelters and rescue organizations, as the HSOP does not have the capacity to adopt out all 146 dogs on its own.

In the aftermath, the Parkersburg community has also rallied to support the HSOP, donating hundreds of supplies like food, blankets, and cleaning products within 24 hours.

"I have to just say, the community of Parkersburg, the entire Mid-Ohio Valley, has brought cash, sent cash on our website. We have food out front. We actually have so much in donations that we now need some place to store it," McIntyre said. "Our entire courtyard is filled with food and blankets and towels and water and everything. Just to think, that in less than 24 hours, we've gotten all of that, and it's going to help us take care of these animals, and get them into a home, and then, certainly, still going to be lasting longer than that."

McIntyre emphasized the importance of spaying and neutering pets to prevent similar situations in the future.

"It definitely is an argument for spay and neuter," McIntyre said. "Because if you only had a couple of dogs and you spayed or neutered them, you would not have this situation."

The HSOP has been relying heavily on volunteers to help care for the dogs, including walking them, doing laundry, and assisting with other tasks. McIntyre said they are holding a volunteer training session on Saturday to onboard new volunteers to help with the increased workload and anyone interested can fill out an application on the HSOP website.

"Everybody is just really stepping up, and it's humbling," McIntyre said.

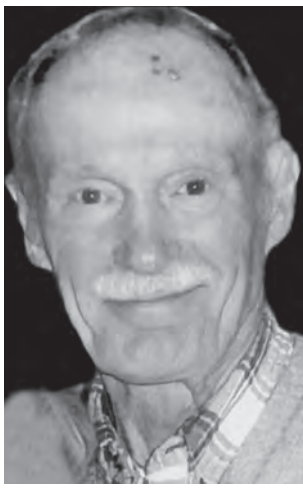
Bob's skilled hands and sharp intellect were not the only gifts he shared; his spirit of fraternity was evident through his engagement with colleagues and associations over the years.

William Samuel "Bill" Arnett, 80, of Cheat Lake, passed away Thursday, October 31, 2024, surrounded by loved ones, in Mon Health Center following an extended illness. Bill was born August 22, 1944, in Morgantown, to the late James and Dorothy Arnett.

In 1962, he graduated from Washington Irving High School in Clarksburg, where he was a standout lineman on the football team, an experience that provided lifelong memories.

At Washington Irving he also met the love of his life, Diane Rowe Arnett, to whom he was married June 26, 1965.

Bill graduated with a bachelor's degree from West Virginia University before earning Master's and Doctorate degrees in History from Ohio State University, where he specialized in the study of ancient Egypt.

Bill taught at Bowling Green State University before returning to Morgantown in 1970 to begin a 40-year career at WVU. He taught courses in ancient Greece and Rome, King Tut's Egypt, humanities, women in the Middle East, and the modern Middle East. He also developed a reputation for being an accessible and thorough academic advisor. During his tenure, he was named the WVU College of Arts

and Sciences Outstanding Teaching of the Year, Distinguished Professor of the Year by the Phi Sigma Kappa Fraternity, and was recognized as an Outstanding Faculty Member by WVU Disability Services. He also served as faculty advisor for the WVU Kuwait Student Union and was a member of the Mountain Honorary. He retired from WVU in 2010.

Bill made multiple trips to the Middle East to study the region and its culture, and as part of a delegation representing the National Council on U.S.-Arab Relations.

He served for many years on the West Virginia State Archives and History Commission. During the first Gulf War and after 9/11 Bill was sought out by churches, community groups, and local television stations to share his insights on the importance of taking a holistic view of the Middle East and respecting the region's various peoples, cultures, and religions.

An avid and devoted WVU sports fan, as an

undergraduate Bill tutored multiple athletes. As a professor, he counted among his students many Mountaineer players as well as future coaches and athletic administrators. In addition to being a football and men's basketball season ticket holder, for more than 30 years he worked as a ticket-taker at Mountaineer Field and the WVU Coliseum.

A lover of music, Bill sang in the choir at Suncrest United Methodist Church, where he was an active member and served on various committees.

He coached youth basketball and soccer, and he and Diane also served in leadership roles with the Morgantown High School Band Auxiliary.

At home in South Park, where he and Diane lived before moving to Cheat Lake in 2011, Bill could often be found grading papers or putting together PowerPoint slide decks for his classes. But he was as generous with his time for his children and their friends as he was with his students on campus. Bill was known for his corny "dad jokes," his willingness to jump into any needed home repair project, his repeated threat to deliver "a three-hour lecture on Gilgamesh," his extraordinary kindness and decency, his unfailing devotion to his family, and his homemade pizza.

He was preceded in death by his parents and his beloved in-laws, Chester and Eleanor Rowe, formerly of Clarksburg.

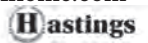

Jury convicts former Kentucky officer of using excessive force on Breonna Taylor

LOUISVILLE, Ky. — A federal jury on Friday convicted a former Kentucky police detective of using excessive force on Breonna Taylor during a botched 2020 drug raid that left her dead.

The 12-member jury returned the late-night verdict after clearing Brett Hankison earlier in the evening on a charge that he used excessive force on Taylor's neighbors.

It was the first conviction of a Louisville police officer who was involved in the deadly raid.

Some members of the jury were in tears as the verdict was read around 9:30 p.m. They had earlier indicated to the judge in two separate messages that they were deadlocked on the charge of using excessive force on Taylor, but chose to continue deliberating. The six-man, six-woman jury deliberated for more than

20 hours over three days.

Taylor's mother, Tamika Palmer, celebrated the verdict with friends outside the federal courthouse, saying: "It took a lot of time. It took a lot of patience. It was hard. The jurors took their time to really understand that Breonna deserved justice."

In a statement posted to social media Saturday, the Louisville Metro Police Department said that it respects the jury's verdict and that since 2020, it has improved training, practices and policies and implemented reforms emphasizing "accountability and thorough investigations."

"It is not lost on us that this event forever altered the fabric of our community, and we acknowledge the pain caused by the death of Breonna Taylor," the department said. "Our officers are sworn to protect and serve the community, upholding the law with integrity and fairness. We condemn any behavior that runs afoul of the mission to help and protect our citizens."

"Breonna Taylor's life mattered," said Assistant Attorney General Kristen Clarke of the Justice Department's Civil Rights Division. "We hope the jury's verdict recognizing this violation of Ms.

Taylor's civil and constitutional rights brings some small measure of comfort to her family and loved ones who have suffered so deeply from the tragic events of March 2020."

Hankison fired 10 shots into Taylor's glass door and windows during the raid, but didn't hit anyone. Some shots flew into a next-door neighbor's adjoining apartment.

The death of the 26-year-old Black woman, along with the May 2020 police killing of George Floyd in Minneapolis sparked racial injustice protests nationwide.

Bernice King, the daughter of Martin Luther King Jr., called the verdict "a long-awaited moment of accountability."

"While it cannot restore Breonna to her family, it represents a crucial step in the pursuit of justice and a reminder that no one should be above the law," King said in a social media post Friday night.

A separate jury deadlocked on federal charges against Hankison last year, and he was acquitted on state charges of wanton endangerment in 2022.

The conviction against Hankison carries a maximum sentence of life in prison. He will be sen-

tenced on March 12 by U.S. District Judge Rebecca Grady Jennings.

Hankison, 48, argued throughout the trial that he was acting to protect his fellow officers after Taylor's boyfriend, Kenneth Walker, fired on them when they broke down Taylor's door with a battering ram.

This jury sent a note on Thursday to the judge asking whether they needed to know if Taylor was alive as Hankison fired his shots.

That was a point of contention during closing arguments, when Hankison's attorney Don Malarcik told the jury that prosecutors must "prove beyond a reasonable doubt that Ms. Taylor was alive" when Hankison fired.

After the jury sent the question, Jennings urged them to keep deliberating.

Walker shot and wounded one of the officers. Hankison testified that when Walker fired, he moved away, rounded the corner of the apartment unit and fired into Taylor's glass door and a window.

Meanwhile, officers at the door returned Walker's fire, hitting and killing Taylor, who was in a hallway.

Hankison's lawyers argued during closing statements Wednesday that Hankison was acting properly "in a very tense, very chaotic environment" that lasted about 12 seconds. They emphasized that Hankison's shots didn't hit anyone.

Hankison was one of four officers charged by the U.S. Department of Justice in 2022 with violating Taylor's civil rights. Hankison's verdict is the second conviction from those cases. The first was a plea deal from a former officer who was not at the raid and became a cooperating witness in another case.

A member of St. Francis de Sales Catholic Church, he lived his faith through action, visibly reflected in his years of volunteering at Mon General after retirement and his steadfast



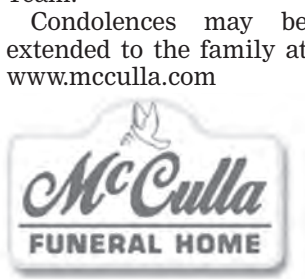
dedication to his church.

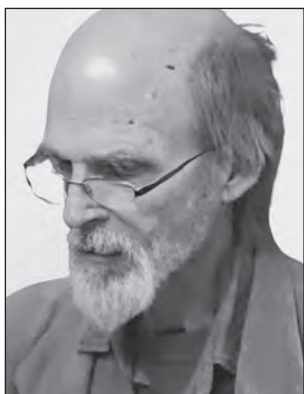

During her nearly three decades roaming the snowy wilderness of the Teton Range, Grizzly No. 399 became a beloved mama bear with millions of parkgoers following her yearly adventures and her ever-growing family tree.

Nature lovers are mourning the matriarch of the world-famous bear family after she was fatally struck by a vehicle Oct. 22 on a highway in western Wyoming. On Saturday night in the picturesque ski town of Jackson, dozens are expected to brave frigid weather to attend a candlelight vigil, and hundreds more will watch online.

Wildlife photogra-

phers, biologists and community members will come together to share fond memories of the 28-year-old grizzly known for frequenting tourist-heavy spots and roadsides in Grand Teton National Park.

A PBS documentary crowned her "Queen of the Tetons" and an Instagram account dedicated to her has amassed more than 60,000 followers.

"She was a living legend, and she became this ambassador for her species and a kind of rallying symbol for people working to conserve American public lands," said Jack Bayles, a wildlife tour guide who is organizing the ceremony in Jackson's town square.

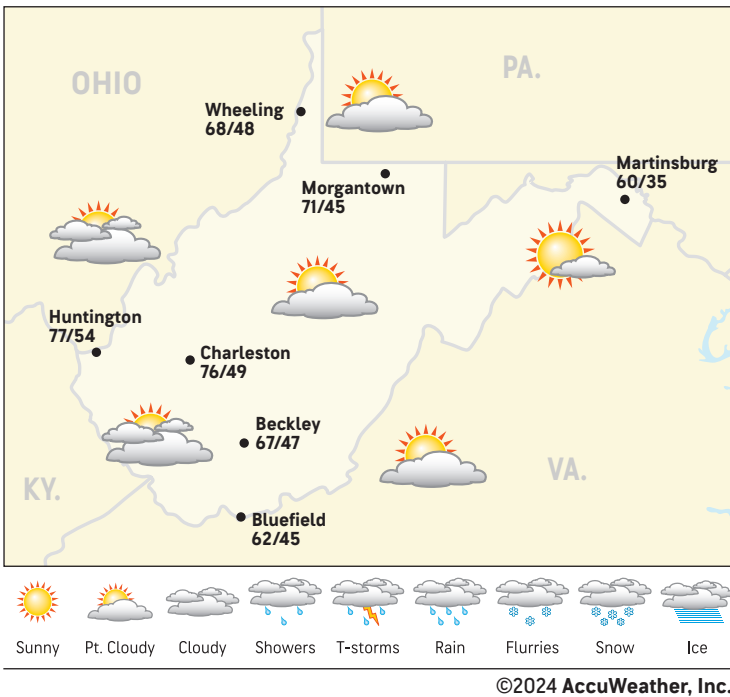

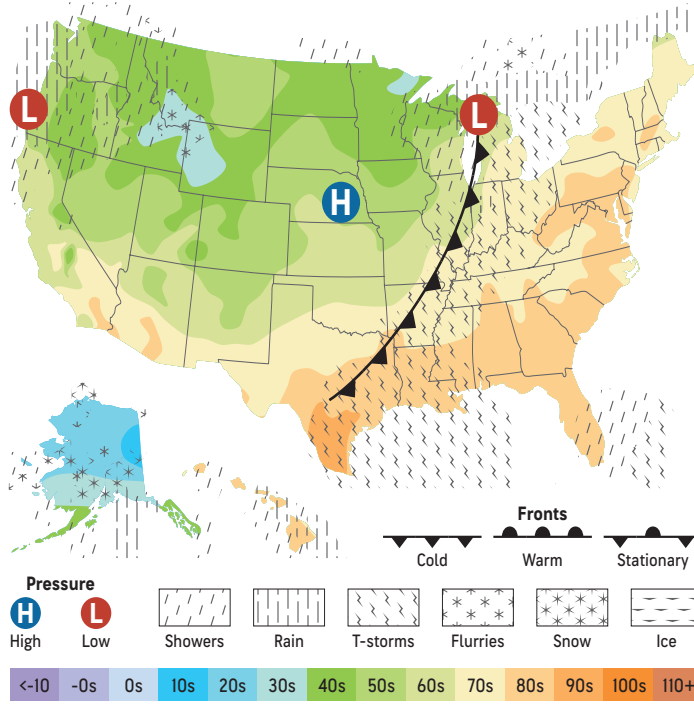

Grant now serves as the inaugural Tribal Liaison for the

University of Virginia.

The annual Peace Tree Ceremony is held every academic year.

The university community welcomes Morgantown-area residents and members of the local Native American communities to campus to join in this tradition.

The Rain location will be in the the Gluck Theater at the WVU Mountainlair Student

Union.

The Peace Tree ceremony and lecture are provided with support from the WVU Division of Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion.

According to Anna M. Schein, WVU librarian, author and Native American Studies Committee Member, the WVU Peace Tree was planted on Sept. 12, 1992, to commemorate the university's commitment to the re-

discovery of America's Indian heritage. Chief Leon Shenandoah, Tadodaho of the Grand Council of the Haudenosaunee Six Nations Iroquois Confederacy, and Chippewa Chief Robert TallTree, also a musician, artisan and storyteller, were invited to plant and bless the tree.

On Aug. 8, 1996, vandals cut down the Peace Tree and a sec-

When most people awaken in the morning, it's usually another routine day – get the kids off to school and head into the office. But for Bob Havern, a local veterinarian from Star City, the morning just might bring with it a choking horse.

"My work hours used to be from about 7 a.m. until I finished late in the evening, but after being a vet for close to 40 years, I'm trying to retire," Havern said, "but the calls keep

coming in. Now, I start at 9, until I finish – it depends on what the caller needs, emergency or routine."

An emergency call could mean anything from an equine case of colic, a bad cut, or that aforementioned worrisome cough. A routine call, he said, would be for tetanus, flu, West Nile and rabies shots and other routine and preventative care.

"After returning calls,

sometimes four to six per day – I always make the emergency visits first – that usually sets the number of [other] visits for that day, as most are routine," Havern said, admitting his plans to retire are a work in progress. "I guess the love of animals keeps me working, and the number of friends I have made over the years is wonderful."

Havern said in his close to 40 years as a veterinarian, having his out-of-state

health certificate, he's worked at Waynesburg Animal Hospital, North Central West Virginia Veterinary Emergency Clinic, Babette Simms' clinic in Farmington and more.

Even after four decades in the business, looking into the eyes of a creature who needs his care never loses its power, he said.

"As for me, it's just the love of the animals and the many friends that keeps me going."

## 'Here' gets lost in the message

WHEN IT COMES TO FILMS THAT WILL CAUSE AN EMOTIONAL GUT PUNCH, DIRECTOR ROBERT ZEMECKIS HAS HIS SHARE. But while his new film "Here" certainly attempts to harken back to some of his previous work, most notably "Forrest Gump," it is ultimately a cheap imitation of what made that film a classic.

"Here" spans the entirety of existence but focuses on one very particular spot of the world. The static camera angle starts with the age of dinosaurs, through the ice age, and then through the ages of industrialization when the houses were built, including the house that would eventually be the residence of the Young family.

While we see others who live in that space, the focus is on Al Young (Paul Bettany) and his wife, Rose (Kelly Reilly), who purchase the home through the GI Bill when Al gets home from the war. They raise three children there, including their son Richard (Tom Hanks), who eventually lives there with his wife Margaret (Robin Wright) when they experience an unexpected pregnancy.

Watching the movie, there is a compelling and potentially moving sto-

ry in there, but overall, "Here" gets lost in the overarching theme of the circle of life while not providing any compelling characters or narrative. There are at least five other families depicted living in that house (or the one across the street), but none complete any kind of throughline for the story. The Indigenous couple that lives on the land and the Black family that lives there in the present seem to exist only to bring up "important issues" while not actually having any kind of characters.

And maybe some of that would work if the story of the Young family was engrossing, but even that didn't come together. The characters are flat, and despite the talented cast, the performances are also lackluster. Few actors can tug on the heartstrings like Hanks, but even he

## WVU Heart and Vascular Institute first in state to offer new AI-powered screening

The WVU Heart and Vascular Institute is the first in West Virginia to offer a new, AI-powered cardiovascular screening algorithm to improve cardiovascular care for its patients.

Using an advanced algorithm to determine a total coronary artery calcium (CAC) Agatston score, the tool, provided by Bunkerhill Health, helps to improve the early detection and management of heart disease.

CAC represents hardening of the heart blood vessels and is an indicator of future risk of coronary artery disease.

Previously, this type of screening required a special order from

a physician.

With this tool, the automated algorithm runs in the background of chest CT scans, like those used in lung cancer screening. Patients automatically receive a CAC score during any non-contrast chest CT scan.

When a patient with elevated CAC is identified, their primary care provider or cardiologist is promptly notified.

The notification includes the patient's CAC score and Multi-Ethnic Study of Atherosclerosis (MESA) risk percentile, allowing for timely and personalized follow-up care for the patient.

Depending upon how early the elevated CAC is discovered, treat-

ment can include simple lifestyle adjustments, such as dietary or exercise recommendations, medication, or further cardiac testing, if needed.

"Coronary artery calcium is a powerful predictor of future risk of coronary heart disease. Its early detection through this AI algorithm can help identify high-risk patients that would benefit from preventive measures to improve their outcomes," Irfan Zeb, M.D., WVU Heart and Vascular Institute cardiologist, said about the screening algorithm.

# Sheriff asks FBI to investigate death of Black man found hanging

MONTGOMERY, Ala. — The FBI is investigating the death of a Black man in Alabama, who was found hanging in an abandoned house, following a request from a local sheriff amid fears among community members who accuse local law enforcement of longstanding, unchecked misconduct.

Sheriff's deputies found Dennonriss Richardson, 39, in September in a rural part of Colbert County, miles away from his home

in Sheffield, a city of approximately 10,000 people near the Tennessee River.

The Colbert County Sheriff's Office ruled Richardson's death a suicide. But Richardson's wife, Leigh Richardson, has said that is not true, explaining her husband did not leave a note and had no connection to the house where he was found.

Instead, the 40-year-old fears her husband's death was related to a lawsuit he filed against the local police department in Feb-

ruary. Dennonriss Richardson, who coached kids in baseball and football, had alleged he was assaulted, denied medical attention, sprayed with tear gas and shocked with a Taser while in jail.

Leigh Richardson said she is not accusing a specific person but is adamant her husband didn't kill himself.

She is not alone in her belief. Widespread skepticism about Richardson's death underscores deep-seated distrust of

local law enforcement in Colbert County. In a region where hanging invokes a long history of state-sanctioned lynchings for Black people, residents in the county allege a pattern of excessive force among local law enforcement.

Sheriff Eric Balentine, who confirmed the FBI accepted his request to investigate, said his department "exhausted all resources" in its investigation.

"We feel confident in what our findings were,

but we feel like by doing this we can give the family more peace of mind," Balentine said.

A spokesperson for the FBI's field office in Birmingham confirmed the FBI is aware of Dennonriss Richardson's death and is reviewing the allegations.

Tori Bailey, president of the local NAACP chapter and the only Black member of the six-person county commission in Colbert County, said the community's reaction to Richardson's death was partially

informed by the region's history with lynchings.

In Alabama, there were 359 reported lynchings between 1877 and 1943, according to the Equal Justice Initiative, a criminal justice reform nonprofit. In Colbert County alone, there were 11.

Bailey said, although there may be nothing to these accusations, it makes sense the community would have a "visceral" reaction to a Black man hanging and want a thorough investigation.

## Buffett sitting on over \$325 billion in cash

OMAHA, Neb. — Warren Buffett is now sitting on more than \$325 billion cash after continuing to unload billions of dollars worth of Apple and Bank of America shares this year and continuing to collect a steady stream of profits from all of Berkshire Hathaway's assorted businesses without finding any major acquisitions.

Berkshire said it sold off about 100 million more Apple shares in the third quarter after halving its massive investment in the iPhone maker last quarter. The remaining stake of roughly 300 million shares was valued at \$69.9 billion at the end of September remains Berkshire's biggest single investment, but it has been cut drastically since the end of last year when it was worth \$174.3 billion.

Investors will also be disappointed to learn that Berkshire didn't repurchase any of its own shares in the quarter.

CFRA Research analyst Cathy Seifert said shareholders will wonder why Buffett is continuing to accumulate so much cash. "Are they more pessimistic about the future economic and market picture than perhaps others are?" she said.

Buffett said at the annual meeting in May that part of why he started selling some of his Apple shares is that he expects tax rates to go higher in the future. But Edward Jones analyst Jim Shanahan said he wonders if part of the reason Buffett started selling Apple is tied to last year's death of Vice Chairman Charlie Munger because the sales started shortly after Munger's death. Shanahan said Buffett has never been as comfortable with technology businesses as his longtime partner was.

"If Charlie Munger were still alive, perhaps he wouldn't have sold down the position quite as aggressively — maybe at all," Shanahan said.

Berkshire said Saturday that investment gains again drove its third quarter profits skyward to \$26.25 billion, or \$18,272 per Class A share. A year ago, unrealized paper investment losses dragged the Omaha, Nebraska-based conglomerate's earnings down to a loss of \$12.77 billion, or \$8,824 per

Class A share.

Buffett has long recommended that investors pay more attention to Berkshire's operating earnings if they want to get a good sense of how the businesses it owns are doing because those numbers exclude investments. Berkshire's bottom-line profit figures can vary widely from quarter to quarter along with the value of its investments regardless of whether the company bought or sold anything.

By that measure, Berkshire said its operating earnings were only down about 6% at \$10.09 billion, or \$7,023.01 per Class A share. That compares to last year's \$10.8 billion, or \$7,437.15 per Class A share.

The four analysts surveyed by FactSet Research predicted that Berkshire would report operating earnings of \$7,335.11 per Class A share.

Berkshire's revenue didn't change much at \$92.995 billion. A year ago, it reported \$93.21 billion revenue. That number was ahead of the \$92.231 billion revenue that three analysts surveyed by FactSet predicted.

Berkshire owns an assortment of insurance businesses, including Geico, along with BNSF railroad, several major utilities and a varied collection of retail and manufacturing businesses, including brands like Dairy Queen and See's Candy.

One of Berkshire's insurers, Guard, reported some additional losses on previous years after managers reassessed its policies.

Berkshire did resolve one mystery from the quarter by spelling out how much it paid to acquire the rest of the shares in its utility business from the estate of former Berkshire board member Walter Scott.

Berkshire said it paid \$2.4 billion cash, issued \$600 million in debt and gave the Scott family Class B Berkshire shares worth a little over \$1 billion. So the total compensation was about \$4 billion. That means the Scott family didn't get nearly as good of a price for their 8% stake in the utilities as when Berkshire Vice Chairman Greg Abel sold his 1% stake in the utility business two years ago for \$870 million.

## Man who took in Peanut the squirrel says it's 'surreal' officials euthanized his pet

NEW YORK — A man who took in an orphaned squirrel and made it a social media star vowed Saturday that New York state's decision to seize and euthanize the animal "won't go unheard."

"We will make a stance on how this government and New York state utilizes their resources," Mark Longo said in a phone interview.

He declined to specify his possible next steps but said officials would hear from him soon about what happened to Peanut the squirrel and Fred, a rescued raccoon that was also confiscated and put down.

The state Department of Environmental Conservation took the animals Wednesday from Longo's home and animal sanctuary in rural Pine City, near the Pennsylvania border. The agency said it had gotten complaints that wildlife was being kept illegally and potentially unsafely.

State law requires people to get a license if they wish to own a wild animal. Longo has said he was working to get Peanut — also known as P'Nut or PNUT — certified as an educational

animal.

The DEC and the Chemung County Health Department said Friday that the squirrel and raccoon were euthanized so they could be tested for rabies after Peanut bit someone involved in the investigation.

Longo said Saturday that he didn't see Peanut bite anyone during what he described as an hourslong, heavy-handed search. The authorities haven't spoken with him since they left the proper-

ty, he said.

"Honestly, this still kind of feels surreal, that the state that I live in actually targeted me and took two of the most beloved animals on this planet away, didn't even quarantine them. They took them from my house and just killed them," he said.

A request for comment was sent to the DEC on Saturday.

Longo said he started caring for Peanut after the animal's mother was hit

by a car in New York City seven years ago. Tens of thousands of users of Instagram, TikTok and other social media platforms glimpsed the animal sporting tiny hats, doing tricks and nibbling on waffles clutched in his little paws.

Longo said Fred the raccoon was dropped off on his doorstep a few months ago. After helping the animal recover from injuries, Longo said, he and his wife were planning to release the creature into the woods.

## Zelenskyy urges allies to act before North Korean troops reach Ukraine

KYIV, Ukraine — Ukraine's President Volodymyr Zelenskyy urged its allies to stop "watching" and take steps before North Korean troops deployed in Russia reach the battlefield, and the country's army chief warned that his troops are facing "one of the most powerful offensives" by Moscow since the all-out war started more than two years ago.

Zelenskyy raised the prospect of a preemptive Ukrainian strike on camps where the North Korean troops are being trained and said Kyiv knows their location. But he said Ukraine can't do it without permission from allies to use Western-made long-range

weapons to hit targets deep inside Russia.

"But instead ... America is watching, Britain is watching, Germany is watching. Everyone is just waiting for the North Korean military to start attacking Ukrainians as well," Zelenskyy said in a post late Friday on the Telegram messaging app.

The Biden administration said Thursday that some 8,000 North Korean soldiers are now in Russia's Kursk region near Ukraine's border and are preparing to help the Kremlin fight against Ukrainian troops in the coming days.

On Saturday, Ukraine's military intelligence said that more than 7,000 North Koreans equipped with Russian gear and

weapons had been transported to areas near Ukraine. The agency, known by its acronym GUR, said that North Korean troops were being trained at five locations in Russia's Far East. It did not specify its source of information.

Western leaders have described the North Korean troop deployment as a significant escalation that could also jolt relations in the Indo-Pacific region, and open the door to technology transfers from Moscow to Pyongyang that could advance the threat posed by North Korea's nuclear weapons and missile program.

North Korean Foreign Minister Choe Son Hui met with her Russian counterpart in Moscow

on Friday.

Ukrainian leaders have repeatedly said they need permission to use Western weapons to strike arms depots, airfields and military bases far from the border to motivate Russia to seek peace. In response, U.S. defense officials have argued that the missiles are limited in number, and that Ukraine is already using its own long-range drones to hit targets farther into Russia.

Moscow has also consistently signaled that it would view any such strikes as a major escalation. President Vladimir Putin warned on Sept. 12 that Russia would be "at war" with the U.S. and NATO states if they approve them.

ond Peace Tree, which still stands today, was planted by Mohawk Chief Jake Swamp on Oct. 19, 1996.

### The Peace Tree tradition

According to Haudenosaunee oral tradition, the Creator sent a Peacemaker to unite the warring Seneca, Cayuga, Oneida, Mohawk and Onondaga

Nations by planting the original Tree of Peace at Onondaga around 1000 A.D.

The tree marked the formation of the Haudenosaunee Six Nations Iroquois Confederacy.

As told by Chief Jake Swamp, when the tree was planted, the Peacemaker told the first leaders:

"This will be the symbol that we will use.

The white pine will be the symbol of peace.

*Now the greenery of this tree will represent the peace you have agreed to.*

*Every time you look at this tree and its greenery, you will be reminded of this peace you agreed to because this tree never changes color the year round, it's always green, so shall be your peace."*

cannot elicit much of an emotional response. Wright has one poignant moment at her fiftieth birthday party, but beyond that, the movie fails to connect.

The gimmick of the static camera is interesting, and the use of in-panel transitions can construct some lovely blended scenes. Unfortunately, they never connect the stories of the people who live in the

space in a way that creates something to hold onto. Instead, it just feels like a neat film trick that doesn't add anything to the movie itself.

It's tough to go into a film by a filmmaker as esteemed as Zemeckis and come out calling it soulless, but this movie simply doesn't deliver the goods. In his best films, Zemeckis taps into a sense of humanity and connection that allows us to see the world differently, perhaps with a bit

more compassion. Unfortunately, "Here" feels like a collection of clichés strung together with some clever filmmaking techniques rather than the profound human experience that it boasts.

## UHS wins boys, girls state titles; MHS streak ends at five

ONA – University High became the crowned kings and queens of West Virginia distance running on Saturday, at the 5,000-meter course at Cabell Midland High School.

For a sixth consecutive year, the UHS boys' cross-country team brought home a state championship, placing three individual runners in the top 10 and all five scoring runners in the top 23. The Hawks finished with 42 points overall, easily beating out second-place Cabell Midland (80). Morgantown High placed fourth with 108 points.

"The boys kind of like don't want to be the ones not to do it," University coach Ed Frohnapfel said. "They want to keep things going. The tradition of prior years and the great runners. I worry about the team. Individuals take care of themselves."

Meanwhile, the UHS girls dethroned Morgantown High from the top of the mountain to win its first state team championship since 2018.

Even with Adelyn Tager sitting out with an injury, her teammates stepped up and won the title with 56 points, with Cabell Midland taking second with 74. Morgantown High, which entered the meet winners of the last five state championships, finished third

with 83 points. Preston High took fourth with 100 points.

"It's everything to us," said Abigail Rogers, who took second with a time of 18:40.79. "We were working for the seniors. We all just wanted to do it for each other and Adelyn. I was near the fence urging the girls to come on. We're happy to do it. Wouldn't want it any other way. We stepped up."

The UHS girls had all five of its runners place in the top 23.

"Really happy for the girls," said Frohnapfel, who also coaches the UHS girls' team. "I didn't think we'd have five to finish. The fact we did shows the effort they put in. They worked hard all year."

Hurricane's Tyler Steorts was the Class AAA boys individual winner for a third straight year, winning in 15:11. Aidan Kneeland of Cabell Midland was second.

"Steorts, he's just special,"

Frohnapfel said.

Tyler Umbright led University High with a third-place finish in 15:55.41. Ethan Conroy (16:07.35) was fifth, Micha Gainer (16:07.97) sixth, Logan Conroy (16:38.68) finished in 14th place, while Colin Schrull (17:07.47) was 23rd.

"Don't want to be the ones that end it," Umbright said of six consecutive state titles. "They perform each year. I have great teammates and a

great coach. We push each other every day. We didn't win the race today. It's all the work we do all season."

Umbright started out hoping to stick with Steorts, but the Hurricane runner proved too strong.

"We planned on starting out together," Umbright said. "He started to pull away, I tried to catch up and expended too much energy. When the fifth

## A look at how the Mountaineers' season is going so far

The West Virginia University football team has hit the two-thirds mark of its season, resting this weekend with a bye before visiting Cincinnati at noon Saturday. At 4-4, the Mountaineers' campaign has seen its ups and downs. Here are some numbers that tell part of the story as to why WVU's season has turned out as it has thus far:

– 49.5% – That's how often WVU's opponents have been successful in converting third and fourth downs this season. Foes have converted 44 of 95 third downs and 11 of 16 fourth downs. That means it's nearly a literal coinflip whether West Virginia can stop an offense on those two downs,

which tells you a lot about the defense's struggles in 2024.

– 21 – How many plays 30 yards or longer the Mountaineers have allowed this season. That figure ties the Mountaineers for 115th in the Football Bowl Subdivision with five other teams. They're also near the bottom of the FBS in 40-plus-yard plays allowed (tied for 129th with 14) and 50-plus-yard plays allowed (tied for 86th with five). The Mountaineers have been too much in the habit of giving up huge chunks of yards at a time.

– 38 – WVU's ranking in rushing defense, a respectable 121.5 yards per game. West Virginia doesn't give up a ton of yards on the ground, though that could be because of ...

– 114 – WVU's ranking in passing defense, allowing 261 yards per game. And it doesn't take much for opponents to reach that mark. The Mountaineers are allowing 9.3 yards per attempt, second worst in the FBS. Throw all those numbers together, and they offer some reasons as to why Jordan Lesley was let go as defensive coordinator earlier this week.

– 4.6 – The Mountaineers don't often hurt themselves with penalties. They average 4.6 per game, tied with Bowling Green and Oregon State for 14th best in the FBS. And the penalties they are flagged for often aren't big ones. Their 34.4 penalty yards per game are sixth best in the nation.

– 9 – However, interceptions are a much bigger problem

this year for West Virginia than they were last year. The Mountaineers have thrown nine so far, eight from Greene and one from Nicco Marchiol. West Virginia threw just seven interceptions all of last season.

– 22 – WVU's FBS ranking in rushing offense. The Mountaineers are averaging 202.25 yards per game. No one on the team is averaging more than

## MHS grad Alayna Corwin finds new success at Michigan Tech

Morgantown High 2021 graduate Alayna Corwin was the first NCAA Division-I signee in MHS volleyball history as she joined Marshall following her senior season.

Alayna was selected as captain of the 2020 Class AAA all-state second team after posting 338 kills on a 38.5 hitting percentage, 289 digs, and 375 receptions during her senior season with MHS. She helped lead the Mohigans to the state semifinals with a 24-8 record in 2020.

Corwin played two seasons with the Thundering Herd in Huntington before entering the transfer portal and finding a new home at Michigan Tech-

nological University in Houghton, Mich.

"I played at St. Francis in middle school before going to Morgantown High and had a few different coaches there," she said. "I moved on to Marshall and enjoyed my time there, but I felt like I wanted to make more of an impact on the court. Michigan Tech allowed that and has a good mechanical engineering program, which was important for my decision."

Last season (2023) with MTU, Corwin appeared in all 31 matches the Huskies played, finishing third on the team in total sets (117) while acting as a defensive talisman for her club. Corwin finished third on

Research provides interesting insight on what impacts wildlife

If you are a loyal reader, then you know that I rely on scientific research for many of my columns. A review of the latest Journal of Wildlife Management and The Wildlife Society Bulletin provided some interesting information on various wildlife species. Here is just one example of a fascinating wildlife study. Wood ducks nest in tree cavities, but will also use artificial nest boxes in North and South Carolina. It turns out that eastern rat snakes and woodpeckers were primary predators of wood duck eggs in nest boxes. In this study the researchers used snake repellent pellets and a plastic raptor decoy to deter the snakes and woodpeckers. They used cameras to record 671 nest failures and rat snakes were responsible for 40%, while woodpeckers took 22%. The snake repellents were of no use. The raptor decoy, when used while the

ducks incubated eggs increased nest survival significantly. Apparently, the woodpeckers want to nest in those boxes, so they destroy eggs. The snakes obviously want to eat the eggs and are able to climb the pole holding the nest box. Although there were a lot of nest box failures, they didn't mention how many boxes were successful in raising wood ducks. Supplemental feeding is commonly done for deer. It also attracts other species, and this can cause disease problems and also lead to predation. In addition, the presence of wild hogs may prevent other species from feeding there.

This study was done in South Carolina. Between March and July they found that the presence of large pig groups prevented deer from using the feed. This caused deer to be there at night when pigs don't use the supplemental feed. However, this exposed younger deer to more predation from coyotes who actively hunt in early morning at sunrise and late at night at sunset. The authors concluded that supplemental feeders should not be used where wild pigs, deer, and coyotes live.

Wild pigs can also cause problems for wild turkeys. They predate the nests and adult birds. They used cameras to assess wild turkey responses to removal of wild pigs. They had three study areas of which two were over 10,000 acres in size and one was a control area where no wild pigs were removed. Over a 20-month period they removed 1,851 pigs. The analysis is a bit detailed, but the end results were that pig removal increased the turkey population by 1.5 times. Turkey poults were 3.5 times as likely to occupy an area where pig removal was high.

They concluded that reduction of wild pigs may lead to a local increase in turkey numbers. These last two studies are a great reason that we do not want wild pigs scattered over West Virginia. The ones we do have in southern West Virginia are controlled under rigid hunting guidelines by our DNR.

Sage grouse numbers have dropped significantly throughout their range, mainly due to habitat degradation. In fact, there are several studies that show that oil and gas development

has had a negative effect on sage grouse. Each spring, male sage grouse perform an elaborate sunrise display on communal breeding grounds known as "leks." Often such leks are in open areas where males can be more easily seen and heard by female grouse. Researchers in Wyoming examined use of 78 leks located within nine miles of wind turbines. Often the turbines were clustered so that there was more undisturbed habitat for the birds. They noted that this study was conducted on areas of low grouse populations as areas that have the highest grouse numbers in Wyoming are off limits to all energy development.

The use of wind turbines in these lower grouse population areas did not impact the birds. Just another example where research results benefit wildlife.

Blaney lost sleep after last week's loss, needs a big showing at Martinsville to defend NASCAR title

Ryan Blaney had the checkered flag in sight and a spot in NASCAR's title-deciding race within his grasp last week on the last lap of a contentious battle. Then out of nowhere, Tyler Reddick slid past Blaney in the final turn and snatched the victory away.

Reddick will now race for his first Cup Series championship next week at Phoenix Raceway.

Blaney? He needs either to win today at Martinsville Speedway in Virginia or a miracle for a chance to defend his NASCAR championship. He admits the defeat cost him sleep, particularly in the hours after the race at Homestead-Miami Speedway.

"I rewatched it when I got home Sunday night," Blaney said. "I rewatched the whole race and rewatched the end of it and lost some sleep over the end of that race." The replay showed Blaney he made the wrong

defensive move in an attempt to hold off Reddick and Denny Hamlin — and he's second-guessed himself for days.

"When I watch a football game, I'm like, 'Why didn't he just do that?'" Blaney said. "In the moment, when you're that person and you're that athlete, or living in that time, it's so much harder than being on the outside and watching on TV with all different angles and things

like that. You're making real-time decisions in the moment. You don't have any time to process, think about it, go through all the options. It's boom, boom, boom. It's all happening super fast.

"You're never going to be batting 1.000 for making the right decision, the right call and that's what the difficulty of sporting is, is can you make the right decisions? And how often do you make the

right decisions?" The loss put Blaney sixth in the playoff standings and one of six drivers fighting for the two remaining spots in the winner-take-all championship race. Joey Logano and Reddick claimed the first two spots in the title field with victories in this third round of the playoffs. Blaney of Team Penske is 38 points below the elimination line.

There remains a path for Blaney, though, who if he can make it into the championship would join teammate Logano with two Ford drivers having a 50% chance to win the title. Chase Elliott was below the cutline at Martinsville in 2020, won the race and won the championship. Similar for Christopher Bell, who was below the cutline at Martinsville and won the race to advance to the championship.

Blaney is the defending Martinsville winner and used the momentum from that victory to win his first NASCAR championship.

# Thomas equals TDs in Mohigans' 49-7 Mohawk Bowl victory

## MHS running back sets school record with 7 rushing scores

If you could roster A.J. Thomas for your fantasy football team this week, there's a strong chance the matchup would lean heavily in your favor.

The Morgantown senior set a new single-game program record of seven touchdowns in a 49-7 victory over the University Hawks on Friday night in the 2024 Mohawk Bowl at Pony Lewis Field.

Thomas finished the night with 16 carries for 186 yards and seven scores.

"The entire team came in this week in practice with a lot of energy and purpose, and it showed tonight in our performance," Thomas said. "Last week before our game against Hedgesville, we really focused on intensity and bringing it in practice, and we saw what that resulted in. This week, we did the same thing, and that's what this game called for."

From the opening drive, the Mohigans (7-3) dominated the line of scrimmage, as Thomas only took two plays to get his night started with a 58-yard run for his first score of the night.

The Morgantown defense used the momentum of its offense's opening drive to force a punt from the Hawks after a three-and-out.

MHS fullback Rhys Wells exploded for a 65-yard run on the third play of the next offensive drive that set Thomas up for his second score, this time from nine yards out that gave his team a 14-0 lead after the first quarter.

UHS (4-5) opened the next quarter with the ball on fourth down and lined up to punt inside its own redzone. The snap was

mishandled by Hawks punter Jimmy Gregg and downed by the Mohigans at the seven-yard line.

Thomas punched the ball in on the next play for his third touchdown 15 seconds into the second quarter.

"It was important for us to start fast, but I'm not sure we expected to start that fast," MHS head coach Sean Biser said. "Our guys did a great job up front tonight. We weren't really sure what they were going to do, and they mixed some things up and brought some pressure. Our kids worked hard and played as close to a complete game as you could get against a quality rival. Having that early success and stealing that momentum away before they could build it was vital."

After another UHS punt was returned to the red zone by Carter Cooper, the Mohigans dialed Thomas' number once again, and he answered with a 17-yard score, his fourth of the night with 10:37 still left until halftime.

University managed a well-executed drive on its next offensive possession and was rewarded as junior quarterback Glenn Brown found freshman Brody Kehler in the endzone for a touchdown. The Hawks then intercepted a pass from MHS senior Alex Himes with 2:15 left in the first half but came up empty, missing a field goal from 27 yards away.

The second half started slower than the first had, as the two sides traded punts, but the Mohigans soon picked back up where they had left off.

MHS drove down the field on its next possession, and Thomas scored his fifth touchdown on a four-yard tote to put his team ahead 35-7 as the Hawks struggled to find an answer.

"Much of it is undoubtedly their (MHS) executing, but it's also our lack of execution," UHS head coach Eric Snyder said of the battle up front. "And when they're as good as they are up front, and we

have a mistake, they punish us heavily."

Thomas added his sixth touchdown on a 33-yard run in the third quarter and his record-breaking seventh to begin the fourth as the Mohigans claimed the Mohawk Bowl Trophy for the third-straight season.

Biser is now 4-1 against the Hawks as head coach at MHS.

"We will take that every day of the week and twice on Sundays," he said of his record against UHS. "But it's not about me. It's about these kids. They do a great job. We have a great coaching staff that puts a lot of time and effort into what we do around here. I couldn't be more proud to be a part of it all."

With the win, the Mohigans have virtually secured the right to host a game in the first round of the playoffs and will enjoy a week of rest next week during their bye week.

The Hawks will close out the regular season at home against Oak Hill next week.

# Manko accounts for 5 scores, Preston powers past Buckhannon-Upshur

Preston High got off to a fast start Friday night, and celebrated its Senior Night by dominating Buckhannon-Upshur in all phases on its way to a satisfyingly 47-7 victory at Knights Stadium.

Under the command of impressive junior quarterback Slaton Manko, the PHS offense started hot, quickly rolling out on a 10-play, 63-yard drive that culminated with Manko's 8-yard off-tackle touchdown run. After Preston's defense forced a near-instantaneous three-and-out from BU (0-10), the Knights (3-6) turned in several chunk plays on a 73-yard scoring drive capped by Manko's pretty rainbow pass to Aiden Schmidle down the sideline just inside the pylon from the 30-yard line.

Down two scores, the Buccaneers responded nicely with a 13-play, 44-yard grinding drive, with quarterback Dawson

Tenney powering in from the 2-yard line, but it was the only offense for Buckhannon on this night.

Preston fullback Ethan Likens pulled in a perfectly designed, perfectly executed screen pass and rumbled down the right sideline for a 34-yard score. Then it was Preston's special team's turn to shine, as senior Cole Turner blocked a punt, and fellow senior Shelden Miller scooped it up and ran it in from the 22 to stretch the Knights' advantage to 27-7 at the break.

Hoping to get back into the game to start the second half, the Buccaneers instead served up an interception by PHS junior safety Easton Hayes, and the Knights offense picked up right where they left off, drilling through the B-U defense on an efficient 10-play drive that covered 76 yards and ate up most of the third quarter clock. Manko tossed another TD pass, this one

to Selyden Greaser on a 9-yard corner route along the back line, boosting the lead to 34-7.

"It started after that game," he explained. "We knew we had a chance to finish the season strong, and although we came up just a little short last week at University (a narrow 42-35 defeat), everyone kept working hard and stayed upbeat. We knew that we were putting ourselves in position to win."

The Knights close out their season at Philip Barbour next week.

Howard, who believes Penn State thought he "wasn't good enough" when it declined to offer the Philadelphia-area native a scholarship, exacted a measure of revenge in front of the largest crowd in Beaver Stadium history (111,030).

While Howard wasn't perfect by any stretch — he threw a pick-6 on his first pass and later fumbled as he was crossing the goalline for what would have been a touchdown — he connected on first-half scoring passes to Emeka Egbuka and Brandon Inness and Ohio State's defense did the rest.

**No. 5 MIAMI 53, DUKE 31**

MIAMI GARDENS, Fla. — Heisman Trophy hopeful Cam Ward threw for 400 yards and five more touchdown passes, three to Xavier Restrepo on a re-

cord-setting day for both of them, and the Hurricanes erased a double-digit deficit for the third time this season to roll past the Blue Devils.

Ward now has 29 touchdown passes, tying Steve Walsh's Miami season record set in 1988. A 66-yard scoring grab with 7:36 left was the big history-maker: Restrepo tied Mike Harley's Miami career reception record with his 182nd, broke Santana Moss' career receiving yards record with 2,573, and Ward tied Walsh's TD pass mark for the Hurricanes (9-0, 5-0 Atlantic Coast Conference).

Maalik Murphy threw for 325 yards and three touchdowns for Duke (6-3, 2-3), but was intercepted three times and fumbled the ball away once. Sahmir Hagans had nine catches for 139 yards and a score for the Blue Devils, who had a 28-17 lead in the third quarter in Duke coach Manny Diaz's first game against Miami since the school fired him in 2021.

**No. 19 MISSISSIPPI 63, ARKANSAS 31**

FAYETTEVILLE, Ark. — Jaxson Dart set Ole Miss records for yards passing and touchdown throws in a single game, leapfrogging Matt Corral and Eli Manning, in the Rebels' dominating win

over the Razorbacks. Dart threw four scores and 321 yards in just the first half. He found Jordan Watkins on three of the TDs, including one for 62 yards and another for 66 on back-to-back drives. They were just three offensive plays apart. Dart ultimately finished 25 of 31 passing for 515 yards with six touchdowns.

Ole Miss (7-2, 3-2 Southeastern Conference) led

35-10 at halftime after scoring on three straight drives over the first and second quarters. The Rebels opened and closed the first-half scoring when Princely Umanmielen pounced on a Taylen Green fumble in the end zone midway through the first quarter and Dart capped things with a three-yard touchdown pass to Jordan Watkins with five seconds left in

the half, his fourth passing score in the game's first half-hour.

**No. 21 ARMY 20, AIR FORCE 3**

WEST POINT, N.Y. — Kanye Udoh rushed for 158 yards and two touchdowns to help Army win over the Falcons and the Black Knights' nation-leading 12th straight victory.

Playing without start-

ing quarterback Bryson Daily, who missed the game with injury or illness per an academy statement, Udoh stepped up and carried the running load.

Udoh ran seven times for 48 yards on Army's opening drive of the second half. The sophomore finished the possession off with a 12-yard touchdown run, his eighth of the season.

**MINNESOTA 25, No. 24 ILLINOIS 17**

CHAMPAIGN, Ill. — Max Brosmer threw a 1-yard touchdown pass to Jameson Geers and Dragan Kesich kicked his fourth field goal of the game in the final five minutes, rallying the Gophers to a victory over the Fighting Illini.

It was the fourth consecutive win for Minnesota (6-3, 4-2 Big Ten), while Illinois (6-3, 3-3) dropped its second straight.

Brosmer completed 22 of 37 passes for 213 yards and a TD. Darius Taylor ran for 131 yards and a TD on 22 carries and was the Golden Gophers' leading receiver with nine catches for 58 yards. Elijah Spencer had six catches for 67 yards.

Luke Altmeyer was 20 of 33 for 226 yards and a TD for Illinois, but lost two fumbles.

All these guys did was throw money at something when it could have been better spent elsewhere. But stunts like these billboards are nothing special — and nothing new. It's just another page in the wacky annals of college football fandom.

It's not like The Wolfpack birthed a novel concept, even at WVU. Remember, Mountaineer fans hung Bobby Bowden in effigy in 1974, his lone losing season out of six in Morgantown. In 1999, competing banners were flown over WVU's home

game against Virginia Tech both for and against coach Don Nehlen, one saying "Nehlen Must Go" and another saying "We Support Don Nehlen and WVU." And does anyone remember the "Don Nehlen Up-The-Middle-O-Meter" banner hung in the corner of Mountaineer Field in the 1990s? At least that one was funny.

Shoot, Bowden couldn't dodge the dagdummed detractors after he moved to Florida State, where he won two national titles and finished in the Associated Press top four for 14 straight seasons. In 2006, an FSU fan created the website RetireCoach-

Bowden.com, which was much more polite than down the road in Gainesville, where University of Florida fans created FireRonZook.com. And there's also the time where a fan filed a Freedom of Information Act request for then-Arkansas football coach Houston Nutt's cell phone records.

The bottom line is fans have been logging protests against college football coaches since time immemorial. Coaches know second-guessing from outside the football building comes with the territory. Brown said that himself earlier this year.

"If you're going to play, if you're going to coach, you're going to work at a high level in any given profession that you're in public — which this is a public profession — you're going to get scrutinized," he said. "And I will tell you ... you've got to be careful who you take criticism from. Don't accept criticism from somebody you wouldn't go to for advice. I try to live that."

Translation: Three billboards inside Morgantown, West Virginia, probably won't be as effective as you'd hope. In fact, public displays like that could turn around and bite the program

down the line.

If a coaching change does happen somewhere down the line, who's to say a highly prized candidate doesn't look at that stunt and say, "Hmm, the previous guy won nine games and a bowl the year before and they bought billboards wanting him fired when he was .500 eight games into the next season? No thanks." Now, I'm sure some of the fanbase will say, "If they can't handle that, they shouldn't be coaching." But hiring a football coach at WVU's level is a seller's market. There are 67 Power Four football coaching jobs

in America. The top-dog contenders might stomach that at Auburn or Michigan, but probably not in Morgantown.

I'm sure footing the bill for billboards or airplane banners or websites make those doing the spending feel better, but it's really just another example of how goofy college fandom can get.

If you're looking to spend money, give it to an NIL group, a school at the university or even a local animal shelter, some place where it can do some good. And if you're looking for a hobby, try birdwatching. It's much more relaxing.

than Garrett Greene's 67.3 yards per game, but WVU has three players averaging at least 56.6 yards per game — Greene, Jaheim White and C.J. Donaldson. The Mountaineers don't have a bellcow, so much as they have a herd.

—81.8% — That was quarterback Nicco Marchiol's completion percentage against Arizona in WVU's last game. Marchiol completed 18 of 22 passes in that contest. It was the

best completion percentage for a WVU starting quarterback since Skyler Howard went 10 for 12 (83.3%) in a win over Texas on Nov. 14, 2015.

— 3 — That's how many of WVU's 2024 opponents remained undefeated entering this weekend. Penn State, Iowa State and Pitt all were 7-0. Kansas State was right behind that group at 7-1. Those four make up the Mountaineers' losses this year. The four opponents they've defeated — Albany, Kansas, Oklahoma State and Arizona — are a combined

11-21, a 34.3% winning percentage.

Let's wrap up with a number for the future.

— 53.1% — That was the total winning percentage of WVU's final four opponents of 2024: Cincinnati, Baylor, UCF and Texas Tech. Combined, they came into this weekend at 17-15. There aren't any studs left on the schedule, but there aren't necessarily any tomato cans, either. If anything, the home stretch of WVU's regular season should remain interesting.

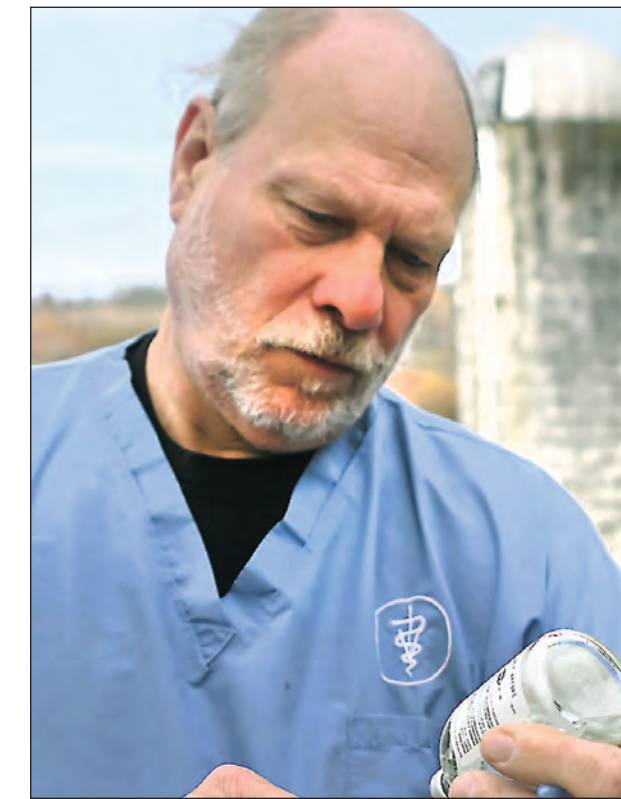

## Getting out the vote important

Leaders of both major political parties agree on one thing: The presidential election scheduled for Tuesday is among the most important in American history.

Its outcome will shape our government, economy, even our society for many years to come, and may even come to truly define just who we are at this time. Your life and that of your children and grandchildren will be affected profoundly no matter who is elected.

Don't you want to have a say in the matter?

To judge by voter turnouts in previous elections, many of your friends, family members, co-workers and neighbors simply don't care about how we are governed.

They do not bother to vote. Imagine that — they don't even bother to vote.

There is no reason for such apathy this year — in fact, there should never be an excuse to be so fed up with the system that you don't vote. We already have had several opportunities to vote over the past few weeks — absentee voting by mail, early voting in person (which ended Saturday afternoon). If you prefer to vote on Election Day, you can hit the polls with your fellow citizens to ensure your voice is heard. Let's be frank: If you are reading this, you probably understand the importance of this election. Perhaps you have voted already.

But what about others you know, perhaps even in your own family or circle of friends?

Are they as engaged as you are? Are they even fully aware that Election Day is Tuesday?

If not, encourage them to make a difference by voting. Offer to help, perhaps by explaining the ballot process or offering to drive them to their polling place on Tuesday. Talk to them about the candidates on the ballot. It's likely they know who's running for president, but what about the Monongalia County Sheriff's race? Or the County Commission?

How you vote is important, of course. But more critical in the long run is whether you participate in the election. Our form of government — of, by and for the people — can endure only if we Americans are part of it. If we do not use the most effective tool at our disposal — the ballot — to get the kind of government we want, we will not get it.

It really is that simple. Vote, then, and spread the word about how important it is to do so. You can make a difference there, too.

## Sales tax appears overboard

A move by the town council in Granville to become a Home Rule city and add a 1% municipal sales tax is of real concern. If passed, the town of 1,400 would see its municipal budget balloon from its current \$9.5 million to about \$13.3 million. Morgantown, by contrast, has 30,500 residents and a \$45 million budget. How is it that Granville, at 1.31 square miles, needs a budget one-third the size of Morgantown? Someone on council should explain.

Yes, the University Town Centre is part of Granville, and the town handles some paving there. But according to Mayor Patty Lewis, the tax increase would serve in many ways as a just-in-case fund if the Business and Occupation tax is eliminated.

"We're trying to be proactive," Lewis said. "I just don't want residents or anybody who shops at the (University) Town Centre thinking we're doing that just to boost our budget and be wasteful. We're doing it as a precaution. So we know that we'll have the funds to provide the services we're obligated to provide."

Taxes should not be levied simply in such a manner that allow government to feel comfortable. They instead should be levied at a level that requires government to be as efficient as possible. That doesn't appear to be the case here.

Town council meets again Nov. 12. Those elected to serve *the people* should offer some real answers.

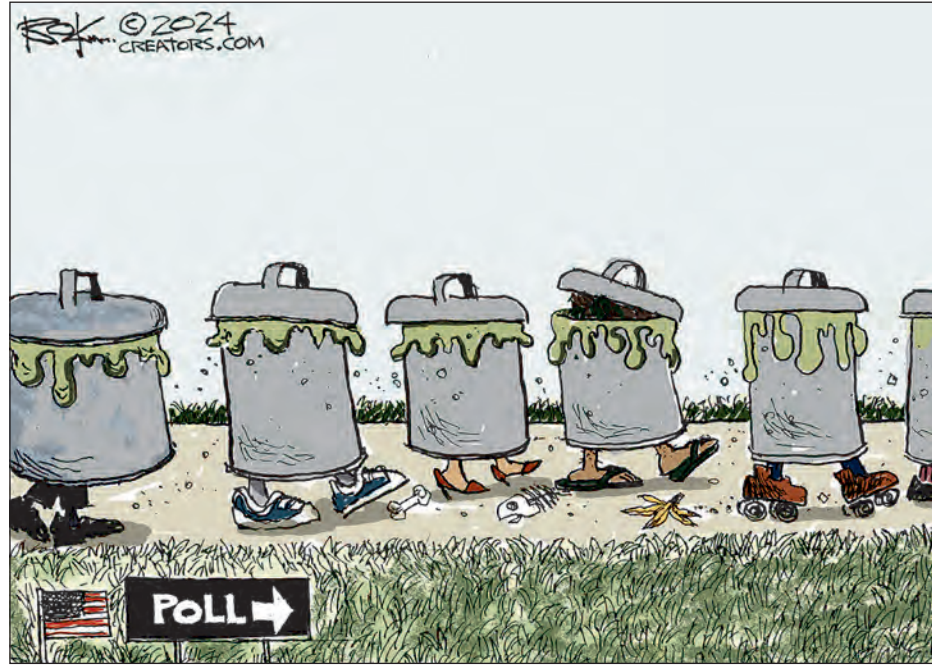
## Remember what's important

America, even with all its problems, still remains the shining city on a hill that the rest of the world admires. We must not let our differences get in the way. As we head through this upcoming election and the results are revealed, always remember: we live in the greatest nation in the world. No matter who wins, America remains strong and the beacon of hope. Don't let that change.



## Tweedledee and Tweedledum

My family and friends are angry with me because I won't tell them for whom I plan to vote for president. I have not voted for the Republican or Democrat for president since 1984, when I happily voted for Ronald Reagan. Since those days, the Democrats have gravitated to principles of big government, and Republicans have abandoned all principles.

Both Trump and Harris favor spending trillions more per year than the feds collect in taxes, just to keep certain folks happy. Some of those folks are the unfortunate have-nots, and some are the bankers and arms manufacturers.

Both candidates believe in increasing the reach of the federal government so far beyond the confines of the Constitution as to make the government utterly unrecognizable to those who crafted it 250 years ago. They both believe in giveaways for the poor, tax breaks for the middle class, bailouts for the rich and bribes to the states.

Neither believes in the values that underlie the Constitution.

One of them wants to amend the First Amendment so as to enable Congress to criminalize flag burning. When the Supreme Court last looked at this, the late Justice Antonin Scalia wrote that the flag

## Donald Trump's American oligarchy

When he bounded onstage at Madison Square Garden on Sunday night, Elon Musk declared himself to be not just MAGA, but "dark, gothic MAGA."

Believe him.

The sorry spectacle of leading industrialists, newspaper owners, tech executives, Silicon Valley entrepreneurs and others seeking to ensure their good standing with Trump reflects a blend of cowardice and cupidity. Mark Zuckerberg, whom Trump labeled a "true enemy of the people" as recently as March, and called "Zuckerschmuck," demonstrated that there are no hard feelings where money and power are concerned. He let it be known that he was moved by Trump's survival of an assassination attempt, claiming that it stirred his patriotic heart to see a "bass" pump his fist.

Jeff Bezos, whose businesses span the globe and make him about as bulletproof as a figure can be in the face of a would-be autocrat, decided that his interest in government contracts for Blue Origin outweighs his dedication to American democracy.

This is what a second Trump term would bring. Trump is the most corrupt figure ever to disgrace the White House and has made no secret of his intention to reward friends and punish enemies if he regains power. The Supreme Court has greased the already slippery skids of Trumpian favor-granting by bestowing unreviewable immunity on presidents for official acts and presumed immunity for all

itself stands for the right to express one's political views by destroying it.

The same candidate wants to amend the Fifth Amendment — which guarantees a fair trial before the government can take the life, liberty or property of any person — so as to permit local police and federal agents to administer corporal punishment at the scene of a crime.

Never mind that they might beat the daylight out of the wrong person, never mind that they might completely misinterpret events that occurred before they arrived on the scene, never mind that one man's punch in the gut is another man's kiss on the cheek, this candidate wants the Constitution to permit "rough justice."

The same candidate wants to deport all foreign-born persons — even those here lawfully — because this candidate believes they are polluting the nation's blood stream.

To this candidate, rights are not natural to all persons but are granted by the laws of the place where one's mother was physically located at the time of one's birth.

One of the candidates wants to amend the 14th Amendment so as to permit mothers and their physicians to kill babies in the womb. This candidate somehow equates baby-killing with personal autonomy, and even calls this a "right."

This candidate needs to understand that the greatest human right is the right to be alive, and this is the gift of the Creator who loves all life.

One of the candidates wants to put Walmart, Costco, Target, Amazon, Apple and Mercedes-Benz out of business by imposing a 200% tax on all goods imported from outside the U.S.

Both candidates have a remarkable antipathy to the Fourth Amendment. That amendment guarantees the right to be left alone. Yet, both Trump and Harris agree that this amendment doesn't really mean what it says.

but purely private acts. Put those things together and you have a perfect recipe for corruption.

Consider tariffs. Trump claims to believe that they are the magic elixir for every ill (including subsidizing the costs of child care and obviating the necessity for income taxes) and denies that they will raise prices for American consumers.

That's all ludicrous, of course. What he doesn't say is that they are also an engraved invitation to favor-seeking from large companies and other interests.

Earlier this year, Musk said he would not contribute to or support anyone for president. A few months later, he was leaping into the air at Trump rallies. It's a safe bet that he has seen an opportunity. Musk is younger, smarter and far richer than Trump. He controls a business empire that dwarfs not just Trump's holdings, but those of every other capitalist.

Boeing can't compete with him. Nor can NASA. Then there's Tesla, which controls 57% of the EV market. And Musk owns X (Twitter).

The Wall Street Journal recently reported that Musk has been in frequent contact with Vladimir Putin since 2022. The Journal further reports that Putin has asked Musk to deactivate Starlink over Taiwan as a favor to China.

Whom does Musk support?

## Panic for profit

The world must be getting so much worse!  
Activists protest everywhere.

Listening to them, I'd think hate, homophobia, racism and environmental threats are at record highs.

But it's not true.

Despite our ugly election politics, for most people, life is better than ever: Our air and water are cleaner. People live longer and healthier lives. There's less racism and homophobia. But if they admit that, activists would be out of a job.

John Tierney, a journalist who's covered protests for years, says, "For activists, success is a threat. It is going to put you out of business." I push back. "They're not a business. They're not making money doing this." "Yes, they are!"

He's right. Environmental groups probably make the most. The head of the World Wildlife Fund pays himself \$1.2 million a year.

Somehow, that will reduce climate change?

"Climate change is the perfect crisis," says Tierney. "You can attribute anything to it, and it's always in the future."

When it comes to deceitful self-dealing, says Tierney, "The ultimate example is the Southern Poverty Law Center."

When the SPLC opened, it promised legal help to those harmed by racism.

After its lawsuits bankrupted chapters of the Ku Klux Klan, the SPLC changed its "Klanwatch" to "Hatewatch." Tierney points out, "fabricating the idea that there's a rising tide of hate in this country. ... It scares people, and they get money."

"Scaremongering and giving people the idea that there's all this hatred and racism," Tierney continues, "when all the evidence shows just the reverse."

The SPLC's founder said he'd stop fundraising once they raised \$55 million. Now they have \$600 million, and they ask people for more money.

Another branch of the crisis industry, The Human Rights Campaign, claims that American gays are under attack. They issued a "national state of emergency" for LGBTQ+ people.

But "Last year, public support for gay rights reached an all-time high," says Tierney. "Gays can marry in every state. There's no stigma against homosexuality."

Racial justice activists claim America is still a racist country. "How did this fundamentally racist country elect Barack Obama and reelect him?"

They raised more than \$10 billion after George Floyd was killed. BLM's leaders spent \$12 billion of it on luxury properties.

Activists' self-promotion often kills.

"One of the great public health advances (of) this century has been vaping," Tierney points out. "Once vaping devices were introduced, smoking rates plummeted to historic lows."

Lots of lives are saved because vaping is *much* safer than smoking.

"But this was a huge threat to anti-smoking activists," says Tierney. "If people were quitting on their own, what happens to us? So, they started scaring people about vaping."

"They've succeeded in persuading most people that vaping is as dangerous as smoking," he adds. "That is a horrible thing to do to the public."

cy killing are murder, and are already illegal. Amendment 1 is only asking voters to prohibit medically assisted suicide.

I believe that people facing a terminal condition should have the right to end their life humanely, quickly, effectively, and painlessly, with the assistance of a willing medical professional.

The legislature refused to place an abortion initiative on the ballot, even though the Dobbs decision sent the issue back to the states.

Instead, the puritanical busybodies in our legislature are using Amendment 1 as a deceitful way to further rob every West Virginian of bodily autonomy.

Amendment 1 states, "Nothing in this section prohibits the administration or prescription of medication for the purpose of alleviating pain or discomfort while the patient's condition follows its natural course".

However, when I am dying, I don't want to live my "natural course." My living will states that I want "treatment to relieve pain or provide comfort even if such treatment might shorten my life." Because if I am dying, I don't want to suffer.

If it passes, Amendment 1 will interfere with how each of us experience our deaths. It means that your doctor won't be allowed to prescribe enough morphine to alleviate pain, because it might interfere with the "natural course" of your life.

It means that the state will decide how much pain each of us must experience before we die.

Mountaineers Are Always Free. I believe that phrase applies to my entire life, including how it ends.

Please vote "no" on Amendment 1.

# Considering the importance of supporting live-donor kidney donations: Call for change

Kidney disease is a silent epidemic in West Virginia and across the United States, affecting the lives of millions. For those who need dialysis or a kidney transplant, their reality becomes a grueling cycle of hospital visits, medications, and uncertainty. For thousands of these Americans, the wait for a kidney is not just a matter of time — it is a matter of life and death.

As a nephrologist, I see firsthand the burden carried by patients awaiting kidney transplants. Many of them endure long, painful waits, and unfortunately, too many die without ever receiving the life-saving kidney which they need. Currently, over 93,000 Americans are on the kidney transplant waiting list, with more in need but not yet listed. In 2023, over half of the states in the U.S. (27) fell under the national average for living kidney donation.

West Virginia shares this low rate of living kidney donation with many Appalachian states. And overall, less than a third of all transplants in the US are from living donors, and over the past two decades, live kidney donations have not increased. This stagnation in living donor kidney transplantation occurs despite our knowledge that kidneys from live donors offer better outcomes, including longer survival times and lower risks of complications. So, it is time for a change.

Across the nation, there is a lack of awareness and a substantial combination of barriers — financial, logistical, and personal — that prevent potential donors from coming forward. In West Virginia, the geographic and economic circumstances that many residents face include those common to rural communities which often have no resources necessary to navigate the complicated transplant process. Nationwide, we've seen

a significant racial disparity in transplant rates: Black and Hispanic patients are less likely to receive kidney transplants compared to their white counterparts, even though they are more likely to suffer from end-stage kidney disease (ESKD) needing kidney replacement therapy. Addressing these social, economic and racial disparities across the country is not only a medical necessity but also a moral imperative.

The Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services' (CMS) proposed Increasing Organ Transplant Access (IOTA) Model is a step in the right direction. This new payment model aims to expand kidney transplant access by addressing key barriers to living kidney donation, including providing navigators to help both recipients and donors through the process. These navigators can guide potential donors through screenings, testing, and the transplant itself — steps that are often daunting without adequate support. By adopting successful small navigator programs like those at the University of Alabama at Birmingham and Johns Hopkins University, we could extend needed support across rural states like West Virginia and even nationwide, making a real difference in the lives of those waiting for a transplant.

Financial concerns are among the greatest obstacles facing potential living donors. The National Living Donor Assistance Center (NLDAC) provides financial support to low-income individuals, reimbursing travel, lodging, and other related expenses. However, these supports do not cover all the costs associated with donation and are available only to those donors whose recipients financially qualify. Under the IOTA Model, CMS could fully cover all out-of-pocket expenses for donors to ensure that financial burdens do not prevent willing individuals from step-

ping forward. Donors should not be penalized for their generosity.

The stories of patients and families in West Virginia illustrate the pressing need for change. One of the lucky ones, my husband, was fortunate to have 11 siblings and many willing donors; he received a kidney from his sister.

However, as a nephrologist, I am acutely aware of too many individuals who, despite having a potential donor, cannot proceed with transplant evaluations or procedures due to economic hardship.

Too many families cannot afford to travel to a transplant center or take time off from work for the testing and hospitalization needed to be a kidney donor. These and other situations are all too familiar and can be corrected with appropriate legislation.

West Virginia needs policies that ensure every patient is given a real chance at life. Proposed federal legislation called the LOVE Act, represents a crucial step by creating a na-

tional support system for living donors by addressing the challenges that currently prevent people from giving a kidney. Supporting living donors means supporting families, saving lives, and ensuring that fewer individuals must endure the prolonged suffering of dialysis to sustain life. The measures in this proposed LOVE Act are crucial in encouraging more people to step forward as living kidney donors by reducing financial and logistical barriers.

The lack of living donors is a national issue, but the impact is deeply personal for the families involved. ESKD affects not only the patient but also the entire family and community. It is not uncommon for patients on dialysis to experience depression, isolation, and financial hardship as they try to maintain their health while managing daily responsibilities. Living kidney donation provides hope and an opportunity for ESKD patients to return to normal lives.

It is time we break down the barriers that prevent potential

donors from coming forward. Both the IOTA Model and the LOVE Act offer hope by addressing the financial and logistical challenges of living donation. But to make this a reality, we need the support of healthcare professionals, lawmakers, and the general public. It is time to ensure that every individual, regardless of their background or financial situation, has the opportunity to give and receive the gift of life.

Living donation is a profoundly generous act that deserves our utmost support. Let us work together to increase awareness, reduce financial and logistical obstacles, and ultimately save more lives through living kidney donation. The people of West Virginia, and indeed all across our nation, deserve nothing less.

The fact is, yes, you will lose them, and it will hurt like crazy.

# Harpers Ferry: Where American history meets the great outdoors

**HARPERS FERRY** — Nestled along two converging rivers, with the Blue Ridge Mountains’ precipitous cliffs offering a backdrop, Harpers Ferry has long been praised for its rugged natural beauty.

Thomas Jefferson was definitely a fan. After visiting the West Virginia town at the height of fall color in October 1783, he wrote that “the passage of the Patowmac (Potomac) through the Blue Ridge is perhaps one of the most stupendous scenes in Nature.... It is as placid and delightful as that is wild and tremendous.... This scene is worth a voyage across the Atlantic.”

The town named for millwright Robert Harper in 1747 soon became one of our third president’s favorite retreats, and today, the mound of Harpers shale on which he stood to survey the water gap below is a popular destination along the Appalachian Trail.

George Washington was more impressed by the small town’s “inexhaustible supply of water,” though for reasons other than today’s passion for tubing, rafting and kayaking on white water. Its gushing natural resources led the former president and wealthy landowner to choose Harpers Ferry for a new national armory in 1796. It turned what had been a somewhat sleepy hamlet into a prosperous industrial village. Between 1801 and 1861, the town produced 600,000 muskets, rifles and pistols for the Army.

Yet this easternmost town in West Virginia didn’t gain national fame until the Civil War.

It was here, in 1859, that abolitionist John Brown and his small group of men seized the armory in hopes of starting an uprising in the South against slavery. The raid itself was unsuccessful. His party was surrounded by federal troops, taking heavy casualties, and Brown was hanged in December 1859 after being convicted of murder, treason and inciting enslaved people to revolt. Many believe that it was the “spark” that ignited the Civil War.

If you love history, it lives on at Harpers Ferry, which became a national historic park

in 1963. It focuses not just on John Brown’s raid, and the Civil War — Stonewall Jackson captured more than 12,500 Union troops here, the largest single capture of Federal forces in the entire war — but also shines a light on African American history, industry, transportation and natural heritage.

And if you find joy in hiking, cycling, mountaineering or paddling? You will find lots to do in and around this picturesque town on the Shenandoah and Potomac rivers. There also are numerous shops and restaurants, including in nearby Bolivar, if eating, drinking and shopping are high on your to-do list.

### Food for thought

History buffs love Harpers Ferry because it played an important role in the Civil War. And walking around charming Lower Town gives the feeling of stepping back in time. One of the most visited historic sites is the only Armory building to escape destruction during the Civil War: John Brown’s Fort, where the abolitionist and several followers barricaded themselves during the final hours of their doomed raid. In 1891, it was dismantled and transported to Chicago for the World’s Fair.

Other buildings reach even further into the past.

When Robert Harper established a ferry across the Poto-

mac River in 1761, it made the town a starting point for settlers moving into the Shenandoah Valley and further west. They included members of the famed Lewis and Clark expedition, who in 1803 made preparations here for their historic exploration of the western portion of the country after the Louisiana Purchase.

In addition to buying supplies and weapons, Meriwether Lewis had craftsmen design a lightweight iron frame for a boat he’d need once he got to shallower water out west. The boat, which was later outfitted with animal hides, was a disaster, sinking right away. But as you learn in the park’s exhibit space on Potomac Street, across the street from the town’s historic Victorian train station, that was the fault of the animal hides — not the ironwork of the town’s (excellent) craftsmen.

Harpers Ferry had become a ghost town by the 1950s and was reconstructed by the Park Service in the ‘60s as a “multi-leveled interpretive proving ground.”

Wearing comfortable shoes? National Park Service rangers lead free tours detailing the history of Harpers Ferry National Historical Park. Or, take a self-guided Black heritage walking tour that includes 34 stops.

It starts at Lockwood House, which overlooks what was Harper Cemetery. Originally built in 1848 as housing for the

armory paymaster, it transitioned after the Civil War into living quarters for formerly enslaved men and women at Storer College, a historically Black college that operated from 1867 to 1955.

Lower Town also includes an industry museum, a 19th-century “landscape” that will fascinate the kids and both Civil War and Black History museums. And if you climb the rocky set of 44 steps that were carved into the hillside in 1810 behind the museums, you can take in a view of the city below from the stone patio of St. Peter’s Roman Catholic Church.

### The great outdoors

West Virginia is famous for its variety of outdoor activities on both land and water, and Harpers Ferry does not disappoint. The Appalachian Trail, one of America’s most famous footpaths, passes through Lower Town, and visitors can trek or bike the Chesapeake and Ohio Canal towpath that runs along the banks of the Potomac River. (You’ll find maps at the Visitors Center.)

If you don’t mind breaking a sweat and have a few hours, a moderately strenuous but rewarding hike follows the Maryland Heights trailhead to Overlook Cliff. The climb is both steep (1,154 feet uphill) and long (a 4.5-mile loop). But when you get to the top, the view of Harpers Ferry below is bucket-list spectacular. And be forewarned: It takes fluids to get to the top and there are no restrooms (or water) on the trail. You’ll have to hold it for hours, especially if you pack a lunch!

The cliffside overlook also can be dangerous if you’re hiking with small children or are wearing the wrong shoes. There’s no fencing to stop anyone from toppling over the rocks — and people can get pretty close to the edge for that perfect Instagram photo.

Also Insta worthy, but on more solid ground: the rock climbers that can frequently be spotted scaling the southern face of a 300-foot vertical cliff leading to Maryland Heights.

Less challenging (but not accessible to those with physical

# Pistachios and lutein: How nutrition can affect your eye health

**Q: My eye doctor recommended that I take a nutritional supplement to help protect my eyes from macular degeneration, but I have heard that some foods can also be helpful. Is this true and what would they be?**

antioxidants and carotenoids for retinal health. Carotenoids are essentially forms of pigment that serve in the eye to absorb radiation (light) and protect the retinal layers. Ultraviolet light is particularly “toxic” to our bodies — skin, eyes and more. So the more carotenoids you have in your eye the more UV protection you have.

A: Generally all supplements contain ingredients that one could theoretically get in foods. Unfortunately, most Americans do not eat a very healthy diet, and do not get important nutrients through the foods they eat. This is a good example.

For macular degeneration prevention, many eye docs have recommended supplements for years to provide

es of pistachios per day significantly increased carotenoids in the retina. The most commonly studied carotenoid is called lutein, and is the one proven to increase with pistachio intake. Other sources are kale, collard greens and broccoli. We advise patients that if they do eat a good serving of these foods each day, likely a supplement is not needed. But most people do not eat such foods every single day, so a supplement like Macuhealth is a good addition to your diet.

One caution, just lately there is a growing problem with online sales of many supplements. Turns out many products have little or

none of the desired nutritional ingredient you were after. Some “substitutes” for Macuhealth contained entirely different components of an unknown source. So be cautious buying these

products online, and beware of “equivalent” substitutes.

There is so much inaccurate “advice” online these days it is hard to know who to believe, but this news about pistachios appears to be valid and useful.

limitations) is the hike up the Stone Steps to St. Peter’s church, past the ruins of St. John’s Episcopal Church, to Jefferson Rock.

You’re not allowed to climb onto the Harpers shale slab that gave Jefferson such pleasure, but you’ll share his terrific view. Continue up the hill a little farther and you’ll hit the Appalachian Trail on your way to Camp Hill, the 32-acre site that once housed Storer College and is now owned by the Park Service.

Harpers Ferry is considered the halfway point of the trail, and during the season weary-looking hikers are a common sight around town and on the towpath across the Potomac. Many stop at the trail’s hikers’ lounge on Washington Street to rest or take a picture on its front porch. So far in 2024, visitor center rep Dave Tarasevich has counted more than 1,240 northbound hikers.

“It’s one of the few places where the trail goes through town, literally,” he said.

Water sports, including fishing, are also popular here. Some people canoe and kayak through October; there’s also white water rafting in season. You also can go horseback riding.

### Shop, eat, drink

After all that walking and history learning,

you’re going to want to unwind with some good food and drink. While you won’t find big-city gourmet eats, you can get a pretty good meal at several places around town.

I had a tasty salad made with microfarm hemp hearts, greens, tomatoes and avocado on the patio at The Rabbit Hole, and a pretty good burger at Coach House Bar and Grill.

For coffee, fresh-baked pastries and sandwiches, head to Battle Grounds Bakery & Coffee. If you don’t eat meat, West Virginia’s very first vegan restaurant — Kelley Farm Kitchen in Bolivar — has got you covered with salads, Impossible burgers, hoagies and ramen bowls.

Some places are dog-friendly, including my favorite spot for pizza and a beer — Harpers Ferry Brewing in neighboring Purcellville, Va. Perched on the side of a mountain next to Harpers Ferry Adventure Center, it offers an awesome view along with local craft brews and live music on weekends through November.

Just know that everything in this small town, even the brewery, shuts pretty early. The only life downtown after dark is The Barn of Harpers Ferry, a music venue and bar that offers live music every night Wednesday through Saturday.

Want to take a piece of West Virginia home with

you? In boutiques along High Street and Public Way, you’ll find everything from original art and distinctive jewelry crafted by regional hands to old-fashioned candy and confections, antiques and hokey souvenirs.

### Getting there

Harpers Ferry, West Virginia, is about a 3 1/2-hour drive from Pittsburgh on mostly highway roads (Interstates 76 and 70). If you’d rather be chauffeured, it’s about a six-hour ride on Amtrak, and the train drops you off right in town. A one-way fare runs \$65-\$220, depending on class. Once there, it’s easy to get around town by foot or bike.

An avid cyclist? Harpers Ferry is at mile 60.7 on the C&O Canal Towpath.

If you do drive, it costs \$20 to enter the park (for three consecutive days) and both metered parking and park parking are extremely limited in Lower Town; on weekends it’s best to park at the Visitors Center at 171 Shoreline Drive and take the free shuttle into town.

Lodging options include bed and breakfasts, campgrounds, a hostel and locally and nationally owned motels. For a guide on where to eat, seasonal events and other attractions, visit [wherealmostheavenbegins.com](http://wherealmostheavenbegins.com).

# At 50, Hello Kitty is as ‘kawaii’ and lucrative as ever

TOKYO — Hello Kitty turns 50 on Friday. Befitting a pop icon at mid-life, the bubble-headed, bow-wearing character’s fictional birthday has brought museum exhibits, a theme park spectacle and a national tour. And that’s just in Japan, her literal birthplace but not the one listed in her official biography.

Confused? Welcome to the party. If there’s one thing about Hello Kitty, it’s that she’s proven adaptable and as much a study in contrasts during her long career. She — and Kitty is a she, according to the company that owns her — may have been conceived as a vessel for the feelings of others, but some women see an empowering symbol in her mouthless face.

“Shrewd” is how Mika Nishimura, a design professor at Tokyo’s Meisei University, describes the way Hello Kitty conquered the worlds of commerce, fashion and entertainment. As a tabula rasa open to interpretation, the non-threatening creation was the perfect vehicle for making money, she said.

“American feminists have said she doesn’t say anything and acquiesces to everyone. But in Japan, we also see how she may appear happy if you’re happy, and sad if you’re feeling sad,” Nishimura told The Associated Press. “It’s a product strategy that’s sheer genius. By being so adaptable, Kitty gets all those collaborative deals.”

The character’s semi-centennial is evidence of that. Sanrio, the Japanese entertainment company that holds the rights to Hello Kitty’s name and image, kicked off the festivities a year ago with an animation account on TikTok, Roblox games and an avatar for the social networking app Zepeto.

There have been anniversary editions of merchandise ranging from pet collars, cosmetics and McDonald’s Happy Meals to Crocs and a Baccarat crystal figurine. A gold coin pendant with the image of Hello Kitty holding the number 50 is selling for about 120,000 yen (\$800), while a Casio watch costs 18,700 yen (\$120).

But first, more on the origin story. Unlike Mickey Mouse

and Snoopy, Hello Kitty didn’t start as a cartoon. A young Sanrio illustrator named Yuko Shimizu drew her in 1974 as a decoration for stationery, tote bags, cups and other small accessories. The design made its debut on a coin purse the next year and became an instant hit in Japan.

As Hello Kitty’s commercial success expanded beyond Asia, so did her personal profile. By the late 1970s, Sanrio revealed the character’s name as Kitty White, her height as five apples tall and her birthplace as suburban London, where the company said she lived with her parents and twin sister Mimmy.

“The main theme of Hello Kitty is friendship. When I first created it, I made a family of which Kitty was a part. But then Hello Kitty started to appear in other settings as the character grew,” Shimizu told the BBC in June. “Sanrio put a lot of effort into building the brand into what it is today.”

At some point, Sanrio designated Kitty’s birthday as Nov. 1, the same as Shimizu’s. Her background was embellished with hobbies that included playing piano, reading and baking. Her TV appearances required co-stars, including a pet cat named Charmmy Kitty that made its debut 20 years ago.

But Hello Kitty’s 40th birthday brought an update that astonished fans. Sanrio clarified to a Los Angeles museum curator that Kitty, despite her feline features, was a little girl. A company spokesperson repeated the distinction this year, renewing debate online about the requirements for being considered human.

“She is supposed to be Kitty White and English. But this is part of the enigma: Who is Hello Kitty? We can’t figure it out. We don’t even know if she is a cat,” art historian Joyce S. Cheng, a University of Oregon associate professor, said. “There is an unresolved indeterminacy about her that is so amazing.”

Part of the confusion stems from a misunderstanding of “kawaii,” which is Japanese for “cute” but also connotes a lovable or adorable essence. Sanrio recruited Shimizu and other illustrators to create “kawaii” characters at a time when

cute, girlish styles were popular in Japan. But the word is used often in Japanese society, and not only to describe babies and puppies.

An elderly man, something as innocuous as an umbrella, a subcompact car or a kitchen utensil, or even a horror movie monster can be labeled “kawaii.” By Western standards, the idea may seem embarrassingly frivolous. But it’s taken seriously in Japan, where the concept is linked with the most honorable instincts.

The complexity of “kawaii” may help explain Hello Kitty’s enduring appeal across generations and cultures, why Canadian singer-songwriter Avril Lavigne released a song titled “Hello Kitty” a decade ago, and why Britain’s King Charles wished Hello Kitty a happy 50th birthday when he hosted Japan’s Emperor Naruhito and Empress Masako at Buckingham Palace in June.

Although Hello Kitty may seem to embody the self-sacrificing woman stereotype, it’s revealing that three women have served as the character’s chief designers at Sanrio. Yuko Yamaguchi, who has held the role since 1980, is credited with keeping the character both modern and timeless, giving Kitty black outfits or false eyelashes as trends dictated but never removing the bow from her left ear.

“Hello Kitty, this cultural object, has something to tell us about the history of women in East Asia, and how East Asian women modernized themselves and became professional citizens in a modern society,” the University of Oregon’s Cheng said.

Sanrio has come up with hundreds of creatures, all adorable and cuddly, but none with the lasting power of Hello Kitty. Forget the understated wabi-sabi aesthetic historically associated with Japan. A chameleon-like cat-girl who reflects unabashed kitsch is the cultural ambassador of a consumer-crazed, happy-go-lucky nation.

“It’s the anti-wabi sabi, wanting to be as flashy and as bling-bling as possible, like Lady Gaga. In your face, but that’s actually part of the genius, too. It’s powerful,” Cheng said.

## Squatters on your property

I'm not an attorney. That's a common thing to say when someone crosses into an area where they aren't an expert and that's what I'm saying now, to be honest. I want to raise awareness, but don't want you to think I'm the subject matter expert on this subject.

So, today's topic is about squatters. Let's start by defining 'squatter'. According to Investopedia, a squatter is "one who settles in or occupies a piece of property with no legal claim to that property. A squatter lives on a property to which they have no title, right, or lease."

States have varying laws. For that matter, there could be some who lack any laws on this. In some states, squatters can actually obtain 'Adverse Possession', which is a scenario in which a squatter might have had continuous possession without directly infringing on the true owner's rights during that period. In this scenario, a court might end up protecting the squatter over the rightful owner! This is one example of 'Squatters Rights' and without getting overly political, the variance in laws can differ between blue & red states.

Before coming to the Morgantown area, I once listed an apartment building in Parkersburg. The owner lived out of state but travelled to meet me at the complex. Upon entering one of the units, we immediately realized a squatter had been residing. I became extremely alert for a possible confrontation, but it turned out that he or she wasn't present at that moment. However, guess who was? The pet rabbit, and this rabbit left us plenty of landmines...if you know what I mean.

I have friends who are landlords and have endured similar situations. Like I alluded to at the beginning, I'm not able to offer legal advice, but please consider a few things.

1. Don't leave your vacant properties unchecked for lengthy periods. The length of time a squatter is present (at least in some states), the more legal protection they could have.

2. Learn the difference between squatters, trespassers and holdover tenants. It's one thing to evict a tenant, but trying to evict a trespasser or squatter, could imply they were previously there legally.

3. Please realize that turning off utilities to drive someone away, could have legal complications. Consult legal counsel!

Portland, Oregon developer, George McCleary, has appeared on numerous Real Estate podcasts. He's prominent on social media and offers lots of advice. He tells of stories in which property owners have resorted to rather creative methods of encouraging squatters or trespassers to leave the premises. He's cited incidents of property owners introducing rats and snakes into a home, but he also says you shouldn't try to handle a situation on your own. Not only are there possible legal nightmares, but there's the possibility of someone getting hurt if a physical confrontation were to take place.

No matter if 'Squatters Rights' are right or wrong, they exist. I do not defend illegal activity but do realize that a squatter you may encounter, might be desperate. Don't do anything rash and please be careful.

## Ask Angi: Do I need to have an energy audit of my home?

An energy audit can show ways to improve a home's energy efficiency and lower heating and cooling costs.

### Test can help determine where and how a residence loses energy — and money

If you're looking for a way to reduce your monthly energy bill, it might be time for an energy audit. From making your home more eco-friendly to lowering your energy bills, energy audits have a lot of benefits. Here's a breakdown of energy audits and how they can help you.

An energy audit is a comprehensive test that helps you find the areas of your home that are losing the most energy. And every bit of heating or cooling lost translates directly into lower comfort and higher energy bills. You can do a minor energy audit yourself, but I recommend bringing in a professional auditor for a more thorough test.

Energy audits can also help test your home for safety and health issues. The price for an audit varies based on your region, size of home and the specific tests you order; however, the average cost is about \$400.

They generally include three parts:

#### Evaluation

This is the initial visual inspection, where your auditor will walk around the interior and exterior of your home to look for anything that might cause leaks. They'll check for visible problems and areas that are likely to hide cracks where air is being lost. On the perimeter of your home, expect them to look at your walls, concrete, cracked eaves, windows and roofing. Inside, they'll pay particular attention to the attic, HVAC system, filter, ducts and water heater. (Often you'll find that even small cracks can cause a lot of trouble. An inch-wide hole in your ducts can cause significant energy loss.)

#### Specialized tests

Auditors use a variety of specialized equipment to mea-

sure the integrity, health and safety of your home. These have the biggest impact on the cost of the job; the more specialized tests performed, the higher the likely fee. Common tests include:

**Blower door test:** A large fan placed at your door measures airflow and pressure inside your home to test for leakage.  
**Duct test:** Cameras and air pressure tests can determine if there are hidden leaks in your ducts.  
**Thermal imaging:** These monitors can determine warm and cool spots on your walls, which help identify where insulation might not be thick enough.

#### Recommendations

In the third part of the audit, your pro will give you their recommendations to fix whatever issues they found. For example, they might recommend that you replace your insulation, fix problems

in your roof, or service your HVAC system. In some cases, you might get verbal recommendations that day.

In all cases, you'll receive a written report that details their findings and makes suggestions to fix them. Some of the most common solutions to problems that emerge during energy audits include insulation repair or replacement, specific HVAC products to increase efficiency, and caulking or repairs around windows and doors where air is being lost.

Seek out an auditor who has reputable credentials, such as the Home Energy Professional Energy Auditor certification. This is supplied by the Building Performance Institute, which is also accredited by the Department of Energy.

## Rapper Young Thug puts Atlanta home on market for \$2.6M

ATLANTA — A Buckhead home once owned by rapper Young Thug is now for sale for \$2.675 million.

Young Thug resided at 3511 Roxboro Road from 2016 to 2019. The home, at 10,118 square feet, has five bedrooms and eight-and-a-half bathrooms.

It has been featured in music videos for rappers Lil Baby and MoneyBagg Yo and appeared in "The Real Housewives of Atlanta."

"With potential for income generation,

this property could be used for investment purposes like production or rentals," Compass said in a press release.

The home was previously sold for \$1.8 million in 2019 by Young Thug to Alexander and Carmen Popovitch, according to tax records.

Carmen Popovitch owns strip clubs and rented the property out for multiple parties, generating numerous noise complaints and police calls from neighbors in 2020.

The owners have listed the home mul-

iple times for sale in recent years, dropping the price over time. It is also available for rental for \$20,000 a month.

The real estate agents noted that the house is located minutes away from Phipps Plaza and features amenities such as an indoor pool connected to the main living area, multiple walk-out balconies and patios, a theater room, a full bar by the pool and a hidden room.

Young Thug is currently in the middle of a lengthy gang and racketeering trial in Fulton County.

# Surviving examples of football bank show damage from collisions

Football fans might consider it a calamity if their favorite team loses. The calamity bank made by J. & E. Stevens in the early 1900s depicts a different kind of football disaster: Insert a coin and the three players' heads collide.

Frequent collisions over time often damaged the figures, making it rare for today's collectors to find an example in good condition. The few that still exist are quite valuable. This one, featuring a college football game with a fullback from Yale and two tacklers from Harvard, sold at RSL Auction Company for \$8,027. If anything, the bank's propensity to damage makes it more realistic.

College football in the early 1900s was dangerous. Players did not wear helmets, had little protective gear and often deliberately injured their opponents. Reportedly, more than a dozen players died in 1905 from injuries during games. Football safety became a national issue; President Theodore Roosevelt met with Ivy League football coaches to discuss it. This led to the formation of the Intercollegiate Athletic Association, a precursor to the National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA). Improved regulations and better protective gear made the game safer. Further improvements are still being made.

**Q:** Do you have any recommendations on how to determine the value of an autograph I have of John F. Kennedy from 1962?

**A:** You can consult a local antiques dealer or antiquarian book dealer for assistance. Some coin and stamp dealers also handle autographs. If there aren't any appropriate dealers in your area, you may want to contact a national auction

house that specializes in autographs, like Nate D. Sanders (natedsanders.com); or political and historical memorabilia, like RR Auction (rrauction.com), or Hake's Auctions (hakes.com); or even rare books, like Swann Auction Galleries (swanngalleries.com) or University Archives (universityarchives.com). A word of caution: John F. Kennedy was known to use an autopen or signing machine for some autographs. Autographs made with an autopen have lower values than ones made by hand. If you do not know if your autograph was done by hand or made with an autopen, there are professional autograph authenticators who can help you find out.

**Q:** I look forward to your column in our Springfield, Massachusetts, Republican Newspaper. I now have come to realize the importance of antique clocks. They are like a lost child waiting to be adopted, cared for and fed. At one time, I inherited five of them and gave three to my children. The oldest clocks were from the 1890s when there was no electricity and were a treasured necessity for every family. I implore all readers to look in their basements, attics and all closets for hidden forgotten clocks. Ask your relatives if they know of any clocks. If you find any, then you need to find a skilled clock repair person to confirm they are in fine working order. You might have to ask a good jewelry store for a refer-

ence or even a friend who owns one, who they use for service. Perhaps in one of your columns, you can give a short history of the antique clock.

**A:** Thank you for sharing your appreciation for antique clocks! We have heard the saying "A ticking clock is the heartbeat of the home." Even the name "grandfather clock" and the song that inspired it capture the sentimentality and family connections these clocks can hold. We often hear from readers who would like to identify or learn the value of inherited clocks. An antique clock can last for hundreds of years with proper care and maintenance. Most people look for clocks to decorate or keep time in a home even if they are not otherwise

interested in antiques. A short history of the antique clock is an excellent idea. The trouble would be keeping it short! The history of clocks is also a history of technology and design. There are many types of clocks, styles and makers to cover. The pendulum clock was invented in the 1600s. Spring technology in the 1700s made carriage clocks, the first portable clocks, possible. Connecticut clockmaker Eli Terry patented a smaller clock mechanism in 1816 and started making shelf clocks by machine. Battery-powered clocks were made by the late 1800s but were not common in the U.S. until the 1930s. If you would like to learn more about clocks, look for books like "American

Shelf and Wall Clocks" by Robert W.D. Ball, "The Warner Collector's Guide to American Clocks" by Anita Schorsch or "Miller's Buyer's Guide: Clocks & Barometers" at your library. For more information, or to find clock restorers in your area, look to a collector's club like the National Association of Watch & Clock Collectors, Inc. (nawcc.org).

# Pullback in mortgage rates helped pave way for lower down payments

LOS ANGELES — Homebuyers opted to make smaller down payments this summer as declining mortgage rates helped boost their purchasing power, though home shoppers' upfront costs remain near their peak.

The average down payment on a U.S. home as a percentage of the purchase price was 14.5% in the June-September period, down from 14.7% a year earlier, according to data from Realtor.com.

The median down payment nationally was \$30,319, just 0.4% below what it was in the third quarter last year.

Both trends also eased from the all-time highs set in the April-June quar-

ter. In that period, the average down payment as a share of the purchase price climbed nationally to 14.9%, while the median down payment rose to \$32,659.

Years of rising home prices and mortgage rates have made homeownership less affordable for many Americans. Larger down payments reduce the amount that homebuyers have to finance, which lowers the monthly mortgage payment.

But saving up enough to buy a home can be particularly challenging for first-time homebuyers who don't have any home equity to put toward their down payment. It's one reason they accounted for just 26% of all homes sold last month, according to

the National Association of Realtors.

That matched the all-time low from August. First-time homebuyers have accounted for 40% of sales historically.

Down payment dollar amounts fell in 21 states in the third quarter, according to Realtor.com. The biggest decline was in Florida, where the median down payment fell 24% from a year earlier to \$27,000. Texas was second, down 23.2% to \$14,400, followed by Wyoming, down 22.3% to \$25,200.

Among the states where down payments increased in the third quarter were Rhode Island, up 33.3% to \$60,400; Delaware, up 32.8% to \$53,600; and Wisconsin, up 25.2% to \$35,500.

It's too early to tell whether down payments will generally ease from here. The average rate on a 30-year mortgage fell in late September to 6.08% — its lowest level in two years — it's climbed in recent weeks to its highest level in nearly three months.

At the same time, home prices have kept rising, albeit at a slower rate.

Economists predict mortgage rates will remain choppy this year, but generally forecast them to ease in 2025. That should help expand how much home shoppers can afford, giving them more flexibility on the size of their down payment, but also could lead to higher home prices if more buyers enter the market.

# City approves \$6.5M to clean up and protect Rays stadium after Hurricane

ST. PETERSBURG, Fla. — The city of St. Petersburg will spend about \$6.5 million to clean up and guard against any further harm to Tropicana Field, the home of baseball's Tampa Bay Rays that was heavily damaged by Hurricane Milton.

The translucent fiberglass dome of the ballpark was shredded by the storm Oct. 9, leaving in doubt whether it can be repaired in time to open the 2025 season. Major League Baseball wants the Rays to play home games in the area if the ballpark isn't ready, probably at one of several local spring training sites.

The St. Petersburg City Council voted Thursday to approve two contracts with firms to clear the pieces of roof that litter the ballpark, remove damaged turf and waterproof numerous areas including the scoreboard, seating areas, suites and the press box, according to city documents. The ballpark does not have a drainage system and could sustain additional damage throughout the structure from rain without its roof.

"We need to act quickly to protect the building from further damage," said Rob Gerdes, the city administrator.

An ongoing analysis will determine what it will take to fully repair the Trop, as it's known locally, including the cost and timeline for completion. A complicating factor is the city's plan to construct a new \$1.3 billion ballpark that would open in 2028, part of a much larger urban re-

vitalization project that was approved earlier this year. Under that deal, the Rays commit to remain in St. Petersburg another 30 years.

"Is this building that is only going to be used for three more years worth the investment that we are making?" said council member Brandi Gabbard.

The two cleanup and mitigation contracts are \$3.9 million to BMS CAT and \$2.5 million to Hennessey Construction Services Corp., according to city documents. The money would be part of a projected \$22 million deductible the city has with the Trop's insurers, which will insist the building be protected from more damage.

Some city council members wanted to delay Thursday's vote until more information about the stadium's future is available. But that effort failed on a tie vote and some council members said it's essential to halt any further destruction.

"This is about stopping the bleeding. It sounds like pay now or pay later, and pay more later," said council member Gina Driscoll.

Suggestions for a temporary Rays home have included local spring training sites used by the Phillies, Blue Jays, Yankees, Pirates and Tigers. A bit further away is the Rays' own spring training complex in Port Charlotte, about 85 miles (136 kilometers) south of St. Petersburg.

Another option may be the ballpark at Disney's ESPN Wide World of Sports complex near Orlando.

# Dallas-Fort Worth to be hottest real estate market in 2025

Dallas-Fort Worth is expected to be the nation's hottest real estate market for investment and development next year.

The annual forecast from PriceWaterhouseCoopers and the Urban Land Institute dubbed D-FW as the best place to buy, build and finance property in the year ahead.

The report, Emerging Trends in Real Estate, compiled data from more than 2,000 industry experts, and their insights were used to provide an outlook on real estate investment, development trends and other real estate issues across the country.

North Texas improved

upon its third-place ranking for 2024. D-FW has ranked in the top 10 for the last six years. D-FW also took the top spot in 2019.

D-FW earned its ranking as the top market to watch thanks to its "enviable" post-pandemic recovery, its size and its continued demographic growth, according to the report.

The region's total employment has grown 11.2% since February 2020, the fourth-fastest among metros in the nation. D-FW trails only Sunbelt peers in Raleigh, N.C.; Charleston, S.C.; and Austin.

The report also touts D-FW's economic diversity. North Texas is home to 23 Fortune 500 companies,

the fourth largest concentration in the country.

The area has also seen annualized some of the best five- and 10-year returns on real estate of 7.9% and 8.8% respectively. It is the only Texas metro area with that distinction, the report states.

Despite the growth, D-FW has remained relatively affordable.

Moody's Analytics rates Dallas' relative cost of doing business at 102% and cost of living at 113% of their national averages.

Median home prices in Dallas have increased almost 38% since the first quarter of 2020 to \$382,000.

That's roughly in line with the national median sales price at just under

\$400,000, according to real estate company Redfin.

These home prices are about four to five times higher than the median household income in North Texas. The region is "not quite affordable in absolute terms, but less unaffordable than most other major housing markets," according to the report.

The region's affordability, growth and economic diversity should continue to attract new residents and businesses. However, the report warns that heat stress and fire may challenge the area in the coming years.

Nationally, the forecast for 2025 is more confident than last year, but industry leaders remain cautious.

# Refresh your home on a budget with these easy house projects

More homeowners are turning toward home improvement projects as mortgage rates continue to stay high, and many people — especially millennials — are staying put as they become priced out of the market.

As a result, homeowners are looking to home projects and renovations to increase the value of their homes and make it closer to their dream, according to Angi, a home services website that allows users to search for contractors for home improvement work. The agency, which surveyed more than 6,000 homeowners in the U.S., found they spent 51% more on home projects last year compared to 2019, according to its “State of Home Spending” report.

The top reasons for not

completing work were budget related: either the total project costs or estimates were too high or there was an immediate need to do emergency or unplanned projects. Last year, homeowners spent an average of \$9,542 on home improvement projects, according to the report.

“Despite the moderate impact of inflation, homeowners are still improving their home, especially over the past five years,” the report read. “In the eight years we have tracked homeowner spending on home improvement and remodeling, 2023 is the second-highest average.”

Here are three home projects under \$2,000 that will elevate any living space on a small budget.

## Painting

Painting is easily one of the cheapest projects

a homeowner can do that has the biggest impact aesthetically, said Nick Slavik, chair of board of directors for the Painting Contractors Association.

Slavik estimates DIY costs start at \$200 for supplies, then about \$50-\$75 per room. If a homeowner booked through a professional company like his New Prague-based Nick SlavikPainting and Restoration Co., he estimates it would cost about \$450 for a 100-square-foot room. When hiring a service, homeowners are saving themselves time and effort.

“With painting, you’re going to do the most amount of change of anything you do,” he said.

For beginners, Slavik recommends starting on a small half-bathroom, where trying out new colors is easier. Plus, if the homeowner gets distracted in the middle of the

project, they can shut the door and finish up later.

The rooms homeowners should pay attention to are the kitchen and dining spaces, he said.

“It’s the heart of house. If you were to chart the time people spend in each room awake, that would be there,” he said. “The most bang for your buck would be that central hub.”

The hardest part typically isn’t the painting itself, it’s choosing a color. In fact, the No. 1 reason for delayed projects is homeowners being unable to decide on a color, Slavik said. His company has a list of designers who can help clients with that.

And there are free resources for DIYers, too. Sherwin Williams has free virtual color consultations that Slavik advises his clients use.

A DIY project can take about two to three weeks to finish painting an entire three-bedroom, two-bath-

room house, while it takes professionals a few days, Slavik said.

“I think about the time it would take to install a new toilet. If everything goes well, it would take me half a Saturday,” he said. “But what am I willing to give up for that time? I have a family and business. I’d have to sacrifice something to get that done.”

## Interior design on a budget

Belkis Valdivia has seen her share of clients who turned to her renovation business, recently re-branded as Casamia Build and Design Co., after they got overwhelmed taking on projects themselves.

Before starting any interior design project, homeowners need to hone their unique style, she said.

An easy way to start is to make a Pinterest account and find images you

like, she said.

“Start room by room. Break it down so you can just work on one room at a time,” she said. “Take a look at the little elements that you’re gravitating toward. From there, you can see a pattern of what you’re picking.”

She also designed a free style quiz on her company’s website that can help people find what designs they like most. She also consults to help people begin the design process for \$120 per hour.

Valdivia said her company specializes in helping people find and build their style. For her, that means honoring her Hispanic descent with bold, bright colors and designs.

“We don’t want to be afraid to express our love for color, different designs and Spanish tiles,” she said. “We want to be playful of color and not be afraid of who we really are.”

## Real estate Q&A: How do I convince HOA to enforce ‘quiet time’ rules?

**Q:** My downstairs neighbor often hangs out on his porch, which is directly under ours, and due to his drinking and smoking pot, we hear loud, explicit conversations into the early morning hours at least twice a month.

Our bylaws state that “quiet time” is between 10 p.m. and 7 a.m., but the HOA says they can only send him a reminder letter. I work and need my sleep, but management suggests calling the police, which I’m reluctant to do. Any suggestions on how to handle this? — Donna

**A:** While everyone has the right to enjoy their property, this right does not extend to actions that prevent their neighbors from enjoying the same privilege. When someone’s use of their prop-

erty interferes with their neighbor’s peaceful enjoyment of their home, it is known as a “nuisance.” Under the law, excessive noxious smells, smoke, and noise are considered nuisances.

What is considered a nuisance can vary depending on the situation, so it is essential to figure out what would be considered reasonable in your specific case.

For instance, an occasional party that ends before most people go to bed differs from loud music that continues until 4 a.m. every weekend.

Your community association is unwilling to take the necessary action to enforce the rules, so you are left with the burden.

You can insist that your HOA deal with the situation. If you need help getting the property manager to act, attend a board meeting and politely

bring the problem to their attention.

You should also speak with your neighbor and explain that you need to work early and cannot sleep when he is being loud. He may not even know he is bothering anyone.

If your neighbor or the HOA continues to ignore the injunction, you can return to court to have them held in contempt of the order, which can lead to severe consequences.

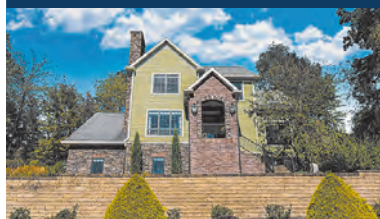

## Average rate on a 30-year mortgage in the U.S. rises for fifth-straight week

The average rate on a 30-year mortgage in the U.S. rose for the fifth straight week, returning to its highest level since early August.

The rate rose to 6.72% from 6.54% last week, mortgage buyer Freddie Mac said Thursday. That’s still down from a year ago, when the rate averaged 7.76%.

Borrowing costs on 15-year fixed-rate mortgages, popular with homeowners seeking to refinance their home loan to a lower rate, also increased this week. The average rate rose to 5.99% from 5.71% last week. A year ago, it averaged 7.03%, Freddie Mac said.

When mortgage rates increase they can add hundreds of dollars a month in costs for borrowers, reducing homebuyers’ purchasing power at a time when home prices remain near all-time highs though the housing market is in a sales slump going back to 2022.

The average rate on a 30-year home loan hasn’t been this high since Aug. 1, when it was 6.73%.

Mortgage rates are influenced by several factors, including how the bond market reacts to the Federal Reserve’s interest rate policy decisions and data on inflation and the economy. That can move the trajectory of the 10-year Treasury yield, which lenders use

as a guide to pricing home loans.

The yield on the 10-year Treasury was at 4.30% on the bond market at midday Thursday. It was at 3.62% as recently as mid-September, just days before the Federal Reserve cut its main interest rate for the first time in more than four years and signaled further cuts through 2026. While the central bank doesn’t set mortgage rates, its policy pivot cleared a path for mortgage rates to generally go lower.

But that hasn’t been the case in recent weeks because a string of encouraging reports on inflation and the U.S. economy have pushed Treasury yields higher.

On Tuesday, reports said confidence among U.S. consumers jumped more than economists expected, while the number of job openings edged lower in September, though the number of hires remained relatively steady. If the government’s October U.S. jobs report on Friday also comes in hotter than anticipated, that could push bond yields higher.

“With several potential inflection points happening over the next week, including the jobs report, the 2024 election, and the Federal Reserve interest rate decision, we can expect mortgage rates to remain volatile,” said Sam Khater, Freddie Mac’s chief economist.

## Declining mortgage rates helped pave way for lower homebuyer down payments

Homebuyers opted to make smaller down payments this summer as declining mortgage rates helped boost their purchasing power, though home shoppers' upfront costs remain near their peak.

The average down payment on a U.S. home as a percentage of the purchase price was 14.5% in the June-September period, down from 14.7% a year earlier, according to data from Realtor.com.

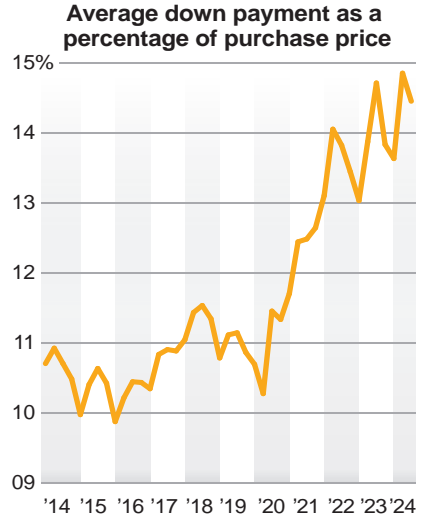
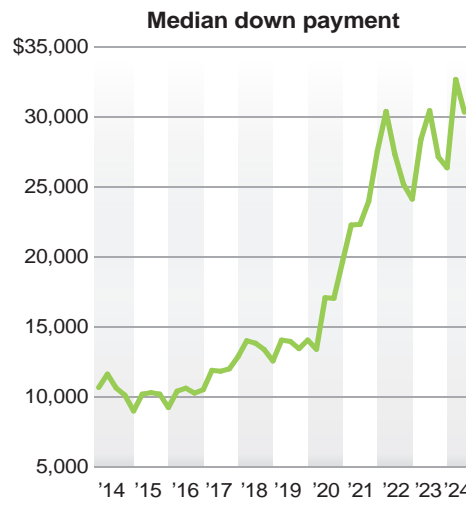
Saving up enough to buy a home can be particularly challenging for first-time homebuyers who don't have any home equity to put toward their down payment. It's one reason they accounted for just 26% of all homes sold last month, according to the National

Association of Realtors. That matched the all-time low from August. First-time homebuyers have accounted for 40% of sales historically. Down payment dollar amounts fell in 21 states in the third quarter, according to Realtor.com. The biggest decline was in Florida, followed by Texas and Wyoming.

Economists predict mortgage rates will remain choppy this year, but generally forecast them to ease in 2025. That should help expand how much home shoppers can afford, giving them more flexibility on the size of their down payment, but also could lead to higher home prices if more buyers enter the market.

The upgrade to the iOS 18 operating system on Monday arrived more than a month after four iPhone 16 models equipped with the special computer chip needed to power the AI features went on sale. Last year's premium models — the iPhone 15 Pro and iPhone 15 Pro Max — also possess a processor that will enable the AI technology after the software update is installed.



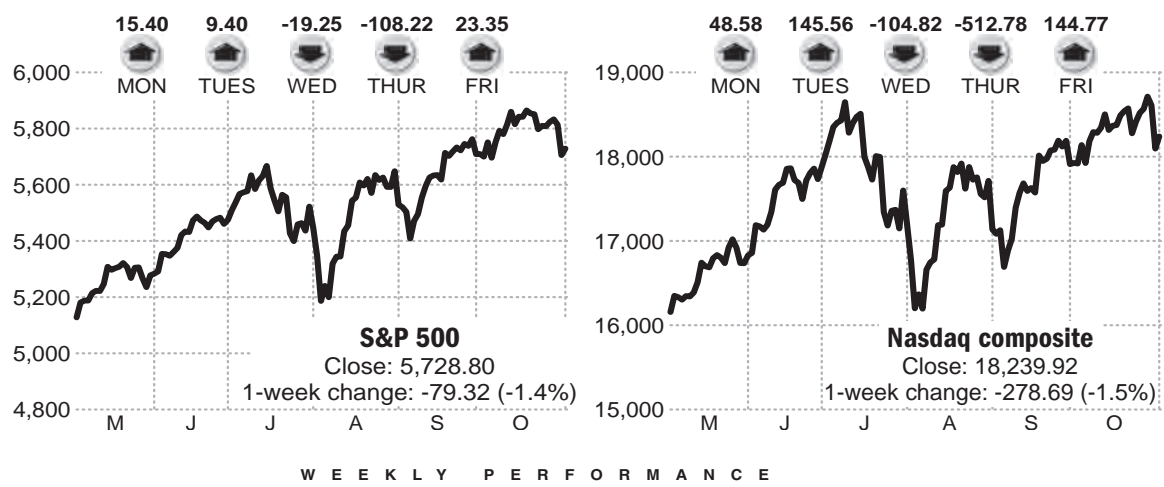
#### HELLO KITTY TURNING 50

# Swing-state housing market: Will you be able to afford a home?

Is the future generation of homeowners set up to fail?

Ahead of the upcoming U.S. presidential election, a new study of 1,000 adults from the seven swing states found that 61% of parents polled are worried about whether their children will be able to buy a home as they get older.

Over the past five years, 80% of adults in Arizona, Georgia, Michigan, North Carolina, Nevada, Pennsylvania, and Wisconsin have seen housing prices increase in their state, averaging a 33% increase.

Arizona has seen the steepest housing cost increase at 38%, while Wisconsin saw the least (27%).

## Why finding a home is tougher now than ever

The research, commissioned by Built, a real estate and construction finance and management platform, and conducted by Talker Research, revealed 58% believe it is harder to find a home today than it was five years ago. It was found to be especially difficult for those polled who are living in Arizona (63%) and Nevada (63%).

And many believe it's been caused by overall inflation (59%), rent increases (40%), interest rate increases (31%), not enough residential housing being available (28%), and increased property tax rates (28%).

Nearly half (46%) of homeowners said they were dissatisfied with current mortgage rates, with dissatisfaction reaching a high of 48% in Michigan and Georgia.

Are Local and Federal Governments Doing Enough for Housing?

Respondents were asked whether they feel various levels of government are taking adequate responsibility in addressing housing issues. Nearly a third (30%) believe their city

government is doing enough.

However, many think more action is needed at different levels of government: 48% feel their city could do more, 53% believe their state should step up, and 57% say the federal government isn't doing enough.

"With housing affordability top of mind for voters, political candidates won't be able to sidestep the pressure to deliver real, actionable solutions," explains Built CEO Chase Gilbert. "With 10% of all U.S. residential construction spend managed on our platform, we have a front-row seat to the factors speeding up housing development nationwide."

"As voters head to the polls, especially in key swing states, housing will be a pivotal issue. The right combination of tools and policies can break down barriers, ensuring homes get built faster and more efficiently

to meet the growing demand."

Respondents were also asked whether they were in favor or were against certain policies proposed from the two major party presidential candidates.

The results of the survey reveal broad support for both major candidates' housing policies, with stronger majorities backing Vice President Harris' initiatives.

A 67% majority supports Harris' proposal for a \$25,000 first-time homebuyer grant, with only 19% opposed, and 58% favor the construction of 3 million new housing units, while just 18% oppose this plan.

In contrast, former President Trump's housing policies face more division among respondents. Forty-two percent support the idea of opening federal lands for large-scale housing construction, but a significant 31% oppose it.

Also, 52% of respondents are in favor of banning mortgages for undocumented civilians, though 20% oppose this policy.

## Do swing state voters believe the election will impact housing?

Within their local elections, 51% believe an incoming, challenger candidate could do a better job addressing housing issues than the current incumbent.

Respondents shared which housing policies they would be in favor of if it were put into action in their local area: rent control (47%), caps on rent increases (45%), multi-family housing in single-family zones (26%), and increased residential development (26%).

Potential voters in each state shared just how much of an impact they believe the current

presidential election will have on the housing market for them.

Over half of respondents from Georgia (54%) and Michigan (51%) said the results of the presidential election will have a "major impact" for them. Meanwhile, 40% of North Carolina and Wisconsin residents agreed it will have a "moderate" impact for them.

Pennsylvania was the least concerned — 28% said the election has "little to no" impact on their state's housing market.

"During an election year, the spotlight on policies and promises sharpens," says Gilbert. "Housing costs are front and center for millions of Americans, and rightly so. The past five years have forced many to rethink their cost of living and whether homeownership is even within reach anymore — no matter which side of the aisle they're on."

## San Diego's life science office buildings sitting vacant, 'oversubscribed on space'

A couple of years ago, life science companies were fighting for office leases and developers couldn't meet the demand fast enough. But now, that hunger for square footage has diminished, and the region's available office and lab buildings have swelled to an all-time high.

The county's total vacancy rate climbed to 20.4%, according to a third quarter life science market report by commercial real estate firm Jones Lang LaSalle (JLL). That translates to about 5 million square feet of space waiting to be occupied, out of San Diego's existing supply of 24.6 million square feet.

It's nearly double the 10.5% vacancy rate recorded during the same period last year. The amount of available offices and labs has been steadily climbing since 2023, while the demand for these spaces has fallen off sharply.

The total vacancy rate — which includes space put up for sublease — is being driven up by new construction projects and a growing trend of companies offloading space. For some businesses, these real estate decisions were the result of restructurings or financial troubles.

Drug giant Takeda Pharmaceuticals, for example, recently moved out of its 163,648-square-foot building off Towne Center Drive after a restructuring shut down its local research and development office. San Diego-based DermTech previously leased an entire 110,000-square-foot office building in Del Mar Heights. But the company filed for Chapter 11 bankruptcy in June and sold its assets after struggling to secure more financing.

Then there was Cue Health, a COVID-19 test maker that grew its funding, personnel and local manufacturing facilities during the pandemic. The

company that was once worth \$2.3 billion collapsed in May, resulting in the shuttering of its eight facilities across the county.

It's a stark contrast to the beginning of 2022, when San Diego's life science vacancy rate hit an all time low of 1%, or 188,000 square feet. The scarcity of available space in San Diego's life science core had businesses fighting for leases at top dollar.

"San Diego went through an unprecedented amount of construction as it related to life sciences," said Taylor DeBerry, senior associate of JLL's life science group. "So really, what happened is we just oversubscribed on space and landlords just started building like crazy."

DeBerry said the current situation can be traced back to that period of overexuberance. While most businesses were not using their offices during the pandemic, the life science industry had a spike in demand for collaborative spaces.

"Office demands plummeted so in order to save their real estate investments, life science real estate investors came in and started converting buildings ... into life sciences," he said. "So you really had kind of a perfect storm where you had essentially people moving all of their money from (conventional) office space into life science space."

A couple of developments that entered the market in recent months include Vista Sorrento Labs, a 117,000 square-foot building in Sorrento Mesa, and a 60,000-square-foot building off Towne Center Drive in Torrey Pines. The county's vacancy rate doesn't include projects under construction; those are reflected in the availability rate, which is also at a record high of 26.8%.

A big part of this construction boom stems from record levels of venture

capital financing in 2021 that led to unprecedented growth for life science companies.

During the third quarter of this year, San Diego recorded about 3.8 million square feet of life science space under development. In the third quarter of 2019, there was just under 700,000 square feet in development.

While San Diego's life science startups continue to rake in more than \$1 billion in venture capital deals each quarter, it's a steep decline from a few years ago when startups brought in twice as much funding. There are fewer deals being recorded and that money is rarely going to early-stage startups.

There is still money waiting to be deployed, but investors are not taking risks like they were during the pandemic. This year, high interest rates and the runup to the U.S. presidential election have led investors and companies to tighten their belts.

Though leasing activity remains tepid, there was a slight increase in demand during the third quarter. The handful of recent leases were under 70,000 square feet and most were for companies growing their footprint.

For example, Mirador Therapeutics — a biotech that launched with \$400 million — signed a new 66,000-square-foot lease in Sorrento Mesa. Although some companies have failed this year, DeBerry said the ones moving forward are more promising.

"I think it's similar to what you'd experience in a forest fire, where the trees get burned but then new sprouts start to grow," DeBerry said. "Some of the companies that are out there looking for space right now have signed strategic partnership deals with big pharma companies. You're seeing a lot of that and that's resulting in tenant demand."

## Mexican film on an epic scale

### Garcia-Rulfo, Huerta star in 'Pedro Paramo'

Anyone who has ever visited Mexico (or watched a travel show set in the country) already knows that it is an ancient and dynamic land teeming with good food, colorful tapestries and a rich culture devoted to honoring the dead. While many non-Mexicans may have been introduced to its culture through American films such as "Coco" (2017) and "The Mask of Zorro" (1998) or the artsy biographical drama "Frida" (2002), Mexico has its own vibrant cinema history, which was celebrated by Netflix with a news release announcing "Pedro Paramo" this past August.

To be released just four days after Mexico's Day of the Dead observances, "Pedro Paramo" sets the tone for the country's next holiday: Revolution Day. At once a stunning visual feast and an epic tale of one man's complicated family history, "Pedro Paramo" premieres Wednesday, Nov. 6, on Netflix.

Based on the 1955 novel of the same name by late Mexican author Juan Rulfo, "Pedro Paramo" follows the titular character's son, Juan Preciado (Tenoch Huerta, "The Forever Purge," 2021), as he promises his dying mother that he will return to Comala, the town where he was born, to find the father he never knew. Along the way, he discovers that the remote town is not the prosperous

hub he had been led to believe it was, but rather a ghost town in every sense of the word.

Driven on his quest by a desire to fill in the missing pieces of his family history, Juan encounters all manner of people — some living, others long dead — who help him to understand the nuances of the hope (and the lack thereof) attached to family values, complicated blood ties and personal goals.

Adapted from the source material by writer Mateo Gil ("Vanilla Sky," 2001), "Pedro Paramo" is the first feature directed by four-time Oscar-nominated cinematographer Rodrigo Prieto ("Brokeback Mountain," 2005). The 133-minute, Spanish-language film made its official debut at this year's Toronto International Film Festival, where it was described as "a mesmerizing story of desire, corruption and inheritance."

Starring "The Lincoln Lawyer's" Manuel Garcia-Rulfo in the film's titular role, "Pedro Paramo" also stars Mayra Batalla ("Huesera: The Bone Woman," 2022), Ilse Salas ("The Good Girls," 2018), Hector Kotsifakis ("The Inmate"), Giovanna Zacarias ("On the Road," 2012), Ari Brickman ("Crime Diaries: The Candidate"), Gabriela Nunez ("Prayers for the Stolen," 2021), Dolores Heredia ("Vantage Point," 2008) and Noé Hernandez ("La Reina del Sur").

In the official TIFF description of Netflix's newest film. Colombian-Ca-

nadian festival programmer Diana Cadavid writes that "in Comala, nothing is as it seems."

"Juan speaks with someone, only to be informed that person has died," Cadavid's TIFF synopsis continues. "Deserted streets are suddenly teeming with life. Figures dissolve into soil or are washed away in a deluge. The closer Juan gets to locating his father, the more the realm of the dead eclipses that of the living, while Pedro Paramo's infamy as a merciless tyrant only burgeons. Will Juan's spirit be absorbed into the phantasmagorical tapestry of this place where the voices of those who have passed forever echo in the wind?"

The themes and questions at the heart of "Pedro Paramo" align well with the Latin-American literary tradition of magical realism, popularized by late "Love in the Time of Cholera" author Gabriel Garcia Marquez, who held the novel's author, Rulfo, in high esteem as one of his inspirations. By blending the worlds of the living and the dead and pairing that unique genre of spiritualism with reflections on memory, legacy and parentage, Rulfo — and filmmaker Prieto by extension — speak to many values at the core of Mexican culture.

This sentiment is also at the heart of a statement of release issued by Francisco Ramos, Vice President of Latin American Content for Netflix, in mid-August of this year.

"The recognition of Mexican cinema and literature within and beyond our borders is unquestionable," Ramos' statement begins. "Their quality and transcendence resonate because they define us just as we are. ... Almost 70 years after its publication, 'Pedro Paramo' remains one of the fundamental pillars of our literature, a seminal work of universal transcendence."

Prieto's film is the third adaptation of Rulfo's iconic novel, but according to LatinoSlant.com, neither Carlos Velo's ("Torero," 1956) 1967 "Pedro Paramo" nor José Bolanos' ("Nana," 1979) 1977 version was a success due to foreign casting decisions and a national film industry on the decline.

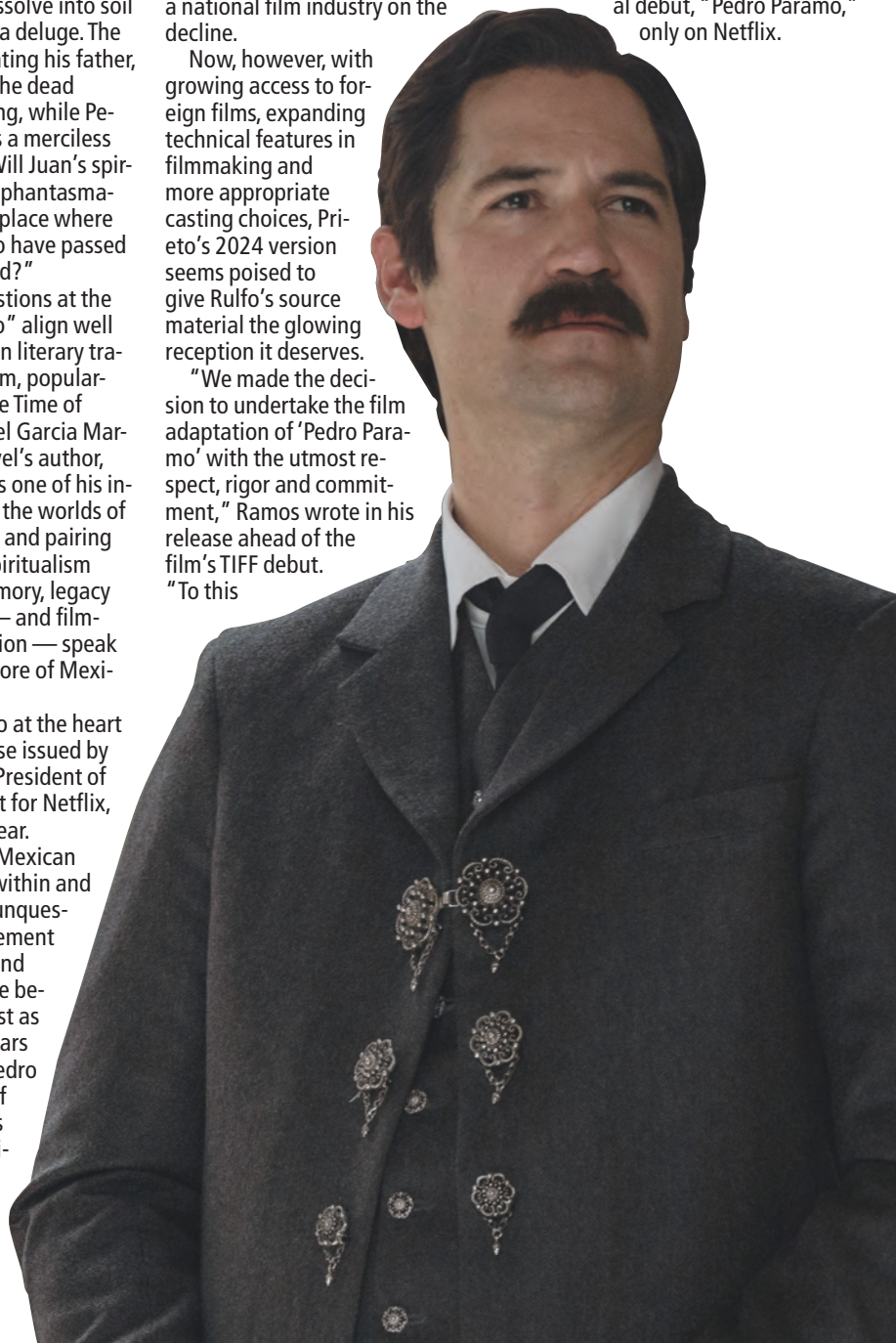
Now, however, with growing access to foreign films, expanding technical features in filmmaking and more appropriate casting choices, Prieto's 2024 version seems poised to give Rulfo's source material the glowing reception it deserves.

"We made the decision to undertake the film adaptation of 'Pedro Paramo' with the utmost respect, rigor and commitment," Ramos wrote in his release ahead of the film's TIFF debut.

"To this

end, we were able to bring together an impressive group of artists and technicians, mostly Mexican, headed by the renowned and award-winning cinematographer Rodrigo Prieto."

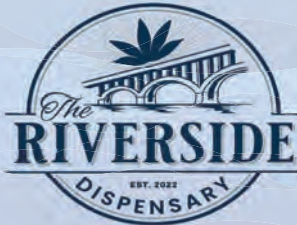

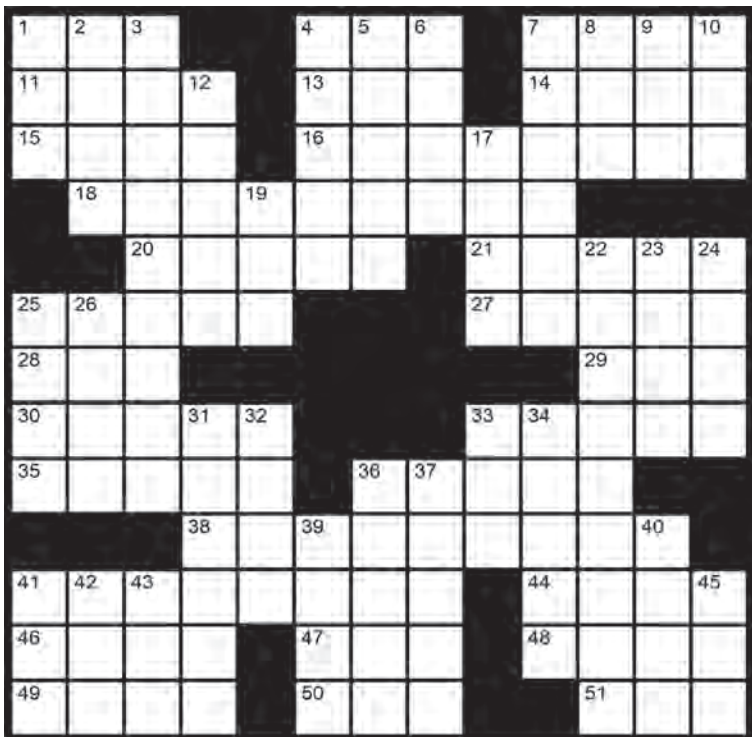

# Hollywood Q&A

**Q: I loved Lt. Dixon on "Law & Order," especially the scenes where she used sign language. Did she just learn ASL for the role or does she have a background in it?**

A: Camryn Manheim ("The Practice") has an extensive and impressive background in sign language, even if she's pretty modest about how she got it.

"I just needed to get to university so my parents wouldn't cut me out of the will," is how she framed it in a 2015 interview with The Associated Press.

When she was young and applying to university — at her parents' demand — she needed to pass two languages but had already failed French and Spanish. She said she took two semesters of American Sign Language (ASL) just to qualify for the University of California at Santa Cruz.

Years later, in an event that sounds like one of her "Law & Order" episodes, she witnessed a pedestrian being hit by a car and, when she rushed to help, she discovered the victim was deaf. With her limited ASL, she managed to interpret

for the first responders. "I felt terrible that I didn't know more," she said in the same AP interview.

So she began taking classes again and eventually became so fluent that she was qualified as an ASL interpreter.

That's how, as Lt. Dixon in NBC's "Law & Order" revival, she can speak with her character's deaf son.

Unfortunately, [spoiler alert for the new season of "Law & Order"] we won't be seeing any more of those heartwarming scenes. Her character was written off the show at the beginning of this season — the show's 24th.

**Q: What's Hugh Laurie's next project? I was sad to see "Avenue 5" go so soon.**

A: Hugh Laurie ("House") is working on two different projects at the moment, but there are question marks hanging over both.

It was announced in February 2023 that he would appear in the third season of Apple TV+'s spy drama "Tehran," but nothing's been heard of that since, even though the second season was released all the way back in the summer of 2022.

Filming was almost certainly delayed

by the Hollywood strikes (though producers reportedly signed an "interim agreement" with the actors union to film while the strike was going on), but that doesn't totally explain the absence of news since.

Meanwhile, it was announced that an even older series, BBC and AMC's "The Night Manager," is finally getting a second season. Laurie was the villain in the first season in 2016, who [eight-year-old spoiler alert] was apprehended at the end.

When the BBC announced the list of returning actors, he wasn't included. But it did say he'd be involved as an executive producer.
