WVU School
of Nursing:
Successes
and shortages

MORGANTOWN – 2024 graduates of WVU's School of Nursing earned near-perfect first-time pass rates on their national registered nurse licensing exam: the NCLEX-RN.

The Dominion Post talked with School of Nursing Dean Tara Hulseley about the numbers; and more broadly with Hulseley and Lotoya Henry-Ojughana, system director of Talent Acquisition at Mon Health System about the ongoing nursing shortage.

First, the numbers. Hulseley said first-time NCLEX pass rates are an important measure of academic excellence among nursing institutions.

WVU has two bachelor degree nursing programs: the Accelerated Bachelor of Science in Nursing (ABSN) at Morgantown and Bridgeport, and the Bachelor of Science in Nursing (BSN) program at Morgantown, Beckley and Keyser. The BSN is a traditional four-year program; the ABSN is an 18-month program for students already holding a bachelor's degree.

Hulseley said the overall rate was 99% for all campuses. For the ABSN, the rate at Morgantown and Bridgeport was 100%. For the BSN, Beckley was 100%, Morgantown, 99.18%; Keyser, 95.83%. Of 197 total graduates, WVU said, 195 passed on their first try.

"I have to give kudos to the faculty," Hulseley said. "They're very dedicated."

WVU fares better than the overall national figures, according

project along
Richwood Avenue:
'It's happening'

As the master developer for the East End Village development project, Dave Biafora has heard the questions time and again.

Is it really going to happen? What's it going to look like? "Oh, it's happening. It's happening. If I'm behind it, I'm going to make sure it happens. As long as I'm living, I'm going to get things done the best that I can do," he told The Dominion Post. "I like building. I like what I do. My hobbies are making deals and making stuff nice ... and this place will really be something."

As for what it's going to look like, a handful of stakeholders and community groups have gotten a glimpse at what Russ Rogerson, representing the Monongalia County Development Authority, calls the "final preliminary design" of the 10-acre redevelopment project along Richwood Avenue and the doorstep of downtown Morgantown.

The Woodburn Association of Neighbors was the latest to view a short video showing architectural renderings of the various planned components representing investments estimated in the range of \$115 million - all on land that once held nearly 60 old houses rented by the bedroom to college students.

The finished product will include more than 300 market-rate apartments and other housing options (condos, townhomes) sitting over retail suites and interspersed with standalone components like a grocery store, a boutique hotel and others.

"This is our vision and what our developer is out right now selling to investors so these things can be built," Rogerson said. "The main vision of this whole project was to develop new structures that would have small, neighborhood type retail and also have apartments and some activity space. More important than all that, in my opinion, is that it would fit within the



community and not look like we're building gigantic, 70-story glass structures blocking views and looking like they don't belong."

Biafora said the development is already catching the eye of national businesses.

He said the project's importance to Morgantown cannot be overstated.

"This is very, very important for Morgantown because I know it'll spur a lot of other stuff. It'll turn from a \$115 million investment, by the time

we're done, it'll change Morgantown to the tune of close to \$200 million," he said. "And I'm not talking about just this development; not just Richwood, but Wharf, downtown, the breweries, the shops. I want everybody to celebrate and do well."

The Monongalia County Development Authority purchased the property for \$11.8 million in 2020.

Rogerson estimates it'll likely take three to five years to build out the entire 10 acres.

"We own it now, the development authority, and what will happen is we'll sell the lots to the developer when they're ready to build. Whether that's one developer or five developers, we don't know. But we're going to keep management of all that under the one roof of the Biaforas, so we can maintain the property and make sure it can be policed, kept clean and not a burden on the city," he said.

Trump's family circle has a different look

WASHINGTON — As Trump prepares to return to the White House, his family circle looks a little different than it did eight years ago. His youngest son, Barron, was in fifth grade when Trump's first administration began. He's now a college freshman. One of Trump's granddaughters is an aspiring social media influencer. Trump has tapped the fathers of his two sons-in-law for administration jobs. The president-elect has five children from his marriages to Ivana Trump, Marla Maples and current wife Melania Trump. He has 10 grandkids, and an 11th is on the way.

South Korean court orders arrest of Yoon

SEOUL, South Korea — South Korea's impeached president, Yoon Suk Yeol, has been formally arrested, days after being apprehended at his presidential compound in Seoul, as he faces possible imprisonment over his ill-fated declaration of martial law last month. Yoon's arrest early Sunday could mark the beginning of an extended period in custody for him, lasting months or more. The Seoul Western District Court granted law enforcement's request for an arrest warrant on Yoon following an hours-long deliberation, saying he was a threat to destroy evidence. Yoon and his lawyers on Saturday appeared before the court's judge during a hearing and argued for his release.

Ceasefire will go into effect Sunday morning

CAIRO — Preparations continue for the Gaza ceasefire that begins Sunday between Israel and Hamas. Mediator Qatar says it will go into effect at 8:30 a.m. local time. Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu said in a national address Saturday that the country is treating the ceasefire as temporary and retains the right to continue fighting if necessary. He claims he has the support of U.S. President-elect Donald Trump. Meanwhile, families of hostages held in Gaza are bracing for news of loved ones. Palestinians are preparing to receive freed detainees or try to return to their homes. And humanitarian groups hope to send a surge of aid into Gaza.

A\$AP Rocky's shooting trial is set to begin

LOS ANGELES — A\$AP Rocky is about to go to trial on charges that he fired a gun at a former friend outside a Hollywood hotel in 2021. The Grammy-nominated rapper, fashion mogul and longtime romantic partner of Rihanna is set to be a co-host of the elite Met Gala in May, and to star opposite Denzel Washington in a Spike Lee film, but a conviction on two felony counts of assault with a semiautomatic firearm could lead to years in prison. Rocky's lawyer Joe Tacopina says he's eager to clear the rapper's name at the trial that's expected to last about three weeks. Jury selection begins Tuesday.

Russian attack kills at least 3 in Kyiv as Ukrainian drone strikes set Russian fuel stores alight

KYIV, Ukraine — Russia attacked Ukraine's capital with a barrage of drones and missiles Saturday, leaving at least three people dead, while industrial sites in Russia were set ablaze by Ukrainian strikes.

Russia launched 39 Shahed drones, other simulator drones and four ballistic missiles in the early hours of Saturday morning, according to Ukraine's Air Force. Ukrainian air defense forces shot down two missiles and 24 drones. A fur-

ther 14 drone simulators were lost in location.

The Kyiv City Military Administration said three people were killed and three more injured in the attack. A fourth victim had been assumed dead but the administration said later the case

has yet to be confirmed. The known victims are two men aged 43 and 25, and a 41-year-old woman, officials said.

Ten people were injured when a Russian missile struck the regional center of Zaporizhzhia, damaging residential buildings.

to the National Council of State Boards of Nursing, which oversees the NCLEX tests (one for registered nurses, one for practical nurses). Nationally, the 2024 first-time NCLEX-RN pass rate for U.S.-educated bachelor's degree students was 92.81%.

WVU nursing faculty are super committed, she said, and the members from the various campuses meet regularly to ensure consistency of teaching and curriculum.

Along with dedicated faculty, Hulsey credits several student success initiatives for the milestone. One is the peer-to-peer tutoring program funded by donors. Another is fairly new: Seniors work with faculty to teach sophomores.

"It's a win-win," she said. It also introduces the nursing students to teaching, which has value of its own. "The nursing faculty shortage is even greater than the practice-based nursing shortage."

WVU, at student orientation, gives the students some studying skills and lets them know to reach out if they experience any kind of struggle, so the faculty can get involved and work one on one with them.

The first-time pass rate for the Morgantown campus has been consistently high since 2018, hitting 100% twice and never dipping below 97% for the BSN. The ABSN rate has been 100% four times since 2019, with 2021 at 96% and 2019 at 97%.

The numbers for Beckley and Keyser have fluctuated. Beckley fell from 100% in 2018 to 80% in 2019, and then never rose above 86% until 2023, when it rose to 97%.

Part of that, Hulsey said, is tied to WVU Tech moving from Montgom-

ery to Beckley. Montgomery's numbers were so low the school went on probation. After the move to Beckley, there was some faculty turnover and growing and adjusting pains.

Potomac State's program at Keyser is fairly new, Hulsey said, and there was some faculty turnover there. Its first numbers are from 2021, 86%. They climbed steadily: 89% in 2022 and 100% in 2023.

One final numbers note is that West Virginia fares well overall for first-time pass rates for bachelor's degree students. Its 2023 rate was 95.5%, the highest among all 50 states, according to NCSBN.

The nursing shortage

Hulsey said the nursing shortage is a state and national issue.

West Virginia has 33,165 active registered nurses, according to the state nursing board. It doesn't post numbers for how many more it needs. But WVU Medicine told The Dominion Post that it has a vacancy rate of 18%, or approximately 980 vacant RN bedside positions.

Hulsey credits the state for making some efforts to turn that around. For instance, in 2022, the state awarded \$23 million in grant funding to 26 nursing programs to support up to 600 new nursing students, and WVU received a portion of that.

"We are making progress as a state, but we are so behind," she said. "We're getting there. It's just not a quick fix."

WVU Medicine has its own new nursing program (distinct from WVU's): the WVUM Center for Nursing Education, located in the WVU Innovation Corp. building. It aims to train nurses specifically to work in the WVUM system. It has begun accepting applica-

tions for its spring 2026 cohort. Its first cohort, fall 2025, drew more than 650 applicants for 24 slots.

A key problem is the faculty shortage — more teachers are needed to teach more students.

Part of that is tied to pay. "Nurses can make more money in practice than as faculty." So we need to look at models that attract nurses to teaching. WVU has one program: release time for teachers to work bedside for additional income. But some state initiatives are needed — perhaps tax breaks and other incentives.

Mon Health System — part of Vandalia Health — doesn't have a nursing school, but has partnerships with a number of schools, including Fairmont State University, West Virginia Junior College, Laurel College of Technology, WVU and more, Henry-Ojugbana said.

"A significant pipeline for nursing talent comes from our Healthcare RN Scholars Program, which has proven to be a good feeder," she said. The program provides financial support for nursing students employed by Mon Health System or an affiliated hospital who have been accepted into one of several area nursing schools.

"Regarding the West Virginia nursing shortage," she said, "it is a pressing challenge that significantly impacts Mon Health, Vandalia, and healthcare systems statewide."

Several factors contribute to the shortage, she said. They include the aging nursing workforce, burnout rates exacerbated by the pandemic, and a limited capacity of nursing schools to accept more students due to faculty shortages and clinical site constraints.

In 2024, Melanie Heuston chief nursing executive for the WVU Health System, told The Domin-

ion Post that all the existing nursing schools in the state combined produce about 950 nurses per year.

Henry-Ojugbana said, "At Mon Health and Vandalia, we are proactively addressing these challenges by using a few techniques and strategies. First, strengthening our academic partnerships. We have strong affiliations with various nursing programs throughout the region. These partnerships ensure that students can complete their clinical rotations within our facilities, offering hands-on experience and a pathway to employment upon graduation," she said.

"Second, pipeline development through various programs." An example is the Healthcare RN Scholars Program. "This program not only attracts new nurses but also encourages retention within our system."

Mon Health also focuses on recruitment and retention, she said. "While the schools are producing talented nursing graduates, the demand for qualified nurses continues to outpace the supply. Our recruitment efforts target both new graduates and experienced nurses, and our nursing team invest heavily in retention strategies, including flexible scheduling, professional development opportunities, and initiatives to support nurse well-being."

Henry-Ojugbana concluded, "Despite these efforts, the pipeline is not yet meeting the full demand. More nurses are needed to keep up with the growing healthcare needs of our communities, especially in rural areas. Continuing to expand nursing program enrollments and creating innovative solutions, such as accelerated programs and loan forgiveness for rural service, will be essential for long-term improvement."

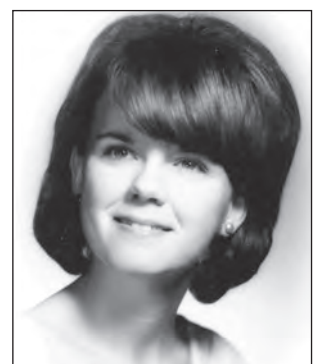

Ronald R. McDowell, Jr., 75, left this earthly out-crop Thursday, December 5, 2024, in Morgantown. Ron grew up in Boscobel, Wis., and was preceded in death by his parents, Ronald Sr. and Virginia. He is survived by his siblings, Janet and Michael, all of Boscobel. His remains are interred in Wisconsin, next to those of his parents.



Ron helped develop computer mapping software for earth scientists and engineers in Kansas, directed gold and ferrous metals exploration in Canada, and very early on, built assembly-line equipment for the automotive industry and tested telephone equipment in Wisconsin.

Here is how Ron described himself: "Rocks . . . I work with rocks, alright! I know that sounds funny, but that's what I do. I specialize in gallowes humour (and write like a Canadian 'cause I had to do that for a living once). I sympathize with illegal alien workers ('cause I also had to do that for a living once). I speak Russian to good looking Romanian waitresses in Washington, DC just to show off. My politics range from socialism to anarchy to nihilism. I'm currently embracing a 'George Constanza' philosophy - since every instinct I have appears to be wrong, doing the opposite must be right, eh? My friends say, 'He's just this guy, you know.'"

Ron's favorite quotes give you insight into his sense of humor: "Those who forget the past are doomed to repeat it . . . Let's see, what was I just saying?" "Wherever you go . . . there you are." "Religion is the opiate of the masses. Amen." "Something is causing that."

At the time of his passing, Ron worked as a senior research geologist at the West Virginia Geological and Economic Survey (since 1991). He was also an adjunct instructor at Fairmont State University, where he taught Geology and Environmental Science since 1994. Before moving to Morgantown,

Ron obtained a Doctorate degree in Geology (focusing on Geochemistry) from the Colorado School of Mines in Golden, Colo., a Master's degree in Geology (focusing on Statistics) from the University of Kansas in Lawrence, Kans. and a Bachelor's degree in Electrical Engineering from the University of Wisconsin-Madison. He graduated from Boscobel (Wisconsin) High School in 1967.

Ron was passionate about science and about anything relating to geology. He loved to teach and he generously mentored scores of students and geologists throughout his life. Ron wrote numerous scientific papers, gave many presentations, mapped several geologic quadrangles, and conducted countless field trips; thus making great contributions to the geology of the Appalachians. Ron was the go-to guy for any rock, fossil, or science question.

His friends and colleagues at the Geological Survey miss him dearly and hope he has plenty of interesting outcrops, diet coke, and orange crackers in the afterlife.

Concord University's Last Dollar CU Free Program offers tuition-free college education to W.Va. students

ATHENS – Concord University began offering West Virginia residents five years ago a creative financial aid tool for incoming freshmen, current as well as transfer students – last dollar financial assistance through its Concord University (CU) Free program. CU Free allows qualifying students to obtain a four-year degree without paying money out-of-pocket for tuition.

"If you are eligible for Pell grants, you are eligible for a free education at Concord University," said Tammy Brown, Chief Enrollment Management Officer. Established in the Fall of 2019, CU Free has awarded up to \$4,255 per year depending on the students' other financial aid to 88 qualifying students in all majors. Thus far, 37 students receiving CU Free support have graduated and are in the workforce.

"Concord University is already very affordable, but the CU Free program ensures that every indi-

vidual seeking a higher education can access it here," said Brown. "The CU Free program also allows community college students who enjoyed the West Virginia Invests Grant at a two-year institution to continue their education with no tuition cost."

Incoming freshman, current students and transfer students who meet the criteria are eligible for the CU FREE program.

- Qualifying students must:
- Be Pell grant eligible
 - Be a West Virginia resident eligible for WV Higher Education Grant
 - Have a Grade Point Average (GPA) of at least 3.0, if an incoming freshman
 - Have a GPA of at least 2.75, if a transfer student
 - Have filed their FAFSA before April 15
 - Be enrolled full-time (at least 12 credits a semester) at Concord University.

This is a last dollar in after all federal, state, institutional, and

outside resources have been applied, for base tuition only.

CU FREE will renew for four continuous years (or eight semesters) for first time, first year students. Transfer students can renew up to eight semesters depending on the credits transferred into Concord. Eligible students must also:

- Remain continuously enrolled
- Remain enrolled full-time
- Remain Pell Grant and WV Higher Education Grant eligible
- Complete the FAFSA each year by April 15
- Maintain a cumulative 2.0 GPA
- Earn at least 24 credit hours each year
- Meet satisfactory academic progress.

With a U.S. ban on TikTok hours away, Trump says he 'most likely' will grant an extension

The clock is ticking toward a U.S. ban on TikTok, but users seeking clarity on what that will mean did not get much Saturday from the company that runs the popular video-sharing platform or the tech giants that offer the TikTok app in their digital marketplaces.

However, President-elect Donald Trump said in an interview with NBC News that he was considering granting an extension that might allow TikTok to keep going beyond Sunday, when a

law that prohibits mobile app stores and internet hosting services from distributing TikTok to U.S. users takes effect.

The ban's timing has complicated matters, perhaps in TikTok's favor: the outgoing Biden administration reiterated Saturday that it considers the law's implementation and enforcement to be the responsibility of Trump, who takes office on Monday and has pledged to "save" the trend-setting app.

Under the law, TikTok's China-based parent com-

pany, ByteDance, had nine months to sell the platform's U.S. operation to an approved buyer. The law allows the sitting president to extend the deadline by 90 days if a sale is in progress.

Artificial intelligence startup Perplexity AI submitted a proposal to ByteDance on Saturday to create a new entity that merges Perplexity with TikTok U.S. business, according to a person familiar with the matter. If successful, the new structure would also include other investors and al-

low ByteDance's existing shareholders to retain their stake in the company, the person said.

Perplexity is not asking to purchase the ByteDance algorithm that feeds TikTok users videos based on their interests and has made the platform such a phenomenon. If the merger plan is successful, the algorithm would need to be rebuilt.

Trump told NBC News that he "most likely" would give TikTok the extension after his inauguration.

Extreme cold forecast for much of U.S. in coming days

BISMARCK, N.D. — Another blast of winter weather is expected in parts of the U.S. in the coming days, including bone-chilling wind in the Northern Plains and unusual snow and ice in the Gulf Coast area.

Cold weather forecasted for Monday for Washington, D.C., prompted President-elect Donald Trump's inaugural ceremony to be moved inside the U.S. Capitol Rotunda.

Much of the U.S. from the Rockies into the Northern Plains will see colder than normal temperatures starting Sunday into the coming week, including forecasted wind chills down to minus 40 degrees F (minus 40 degrees C) or colder in the Dakotas and northern Minnesota, National Weather Service Meteorologist Marc Chenard said.

In such cold conditions, frostbite can develop on exposed skin in 10 minutes or less, so people should don coats, hats and gloves and minimize time

outdoors, said Connor Smith, a meteorologist with the National Weather Service in Bismarck.

The cold air will moderate as it moves southward and eastward, but the central and eastern U.S. will still be cold with highs in the teens and 20s on Monday into Tuesday, Chenard said. The Mid-Atlantic and Northeast also will have highs in the teens and 20s, lows in the single digits and below zero degrees F (minus 18 C) and wind chills below zero.

"Cold weather will impact a lot of the country, especially the Rockies and points east," Chenard said.

Unusual wintry weather of snow, sleet and freezing rain threaten Texas into northern Florida and the Carolinas, he said.

The wintry weather is typical for the area and will bring accumulating, plowable snowfall, Chenard said. Motorists could encounter treacherous conditions out East, and some airports could see issues, he said.

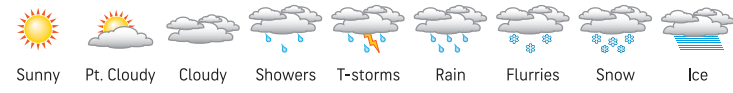
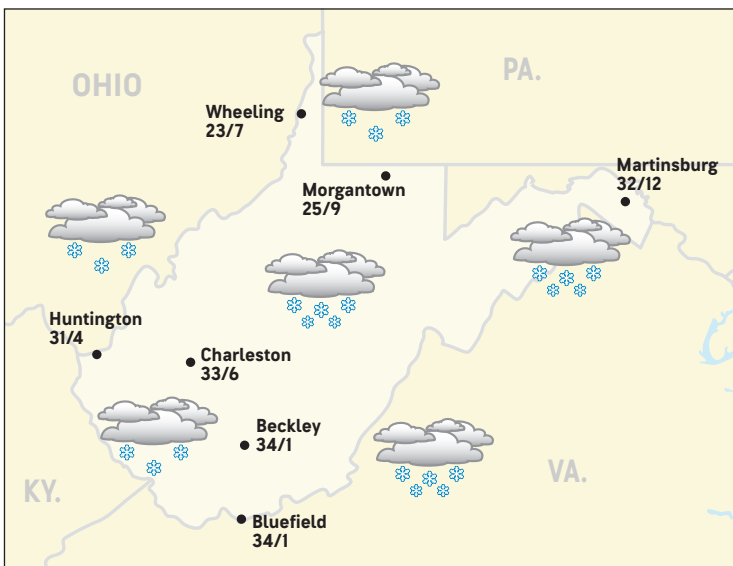

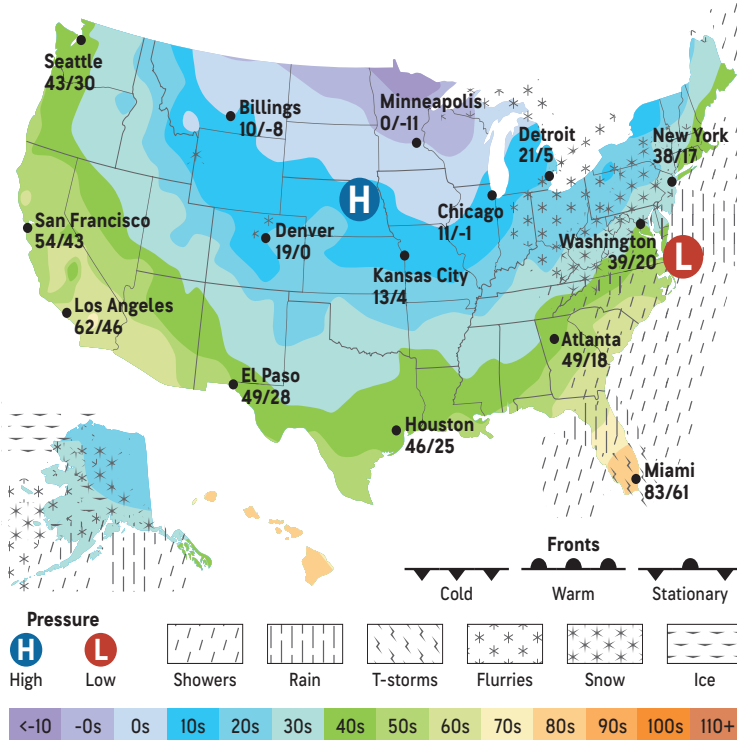

'The Room Next Door' contains good performances, but too much melodrama

END OF LIFE CONVERSATIONS ARE ALWAYS DIFFICULT. WE LIVE IN A CULTURE THAT IS OFTEN UNCOMFORTABLE WITH DEATH, SO THERE IS A TENDENCY TO SHY AWAY FROM DISCUSSIONS ABOUT HOW SOMEONE MIGHT DEAL WITH A TERMINAL ILLNESS. In his first full-length English-language film, "The Room Next Door," writer and director Pedro Almodóvar examines how one of these conversations might go.

Shortly after Ingrid (Julianne Moore) publishes a book about death, she gets a call from an old writer friend, Martha (Tilda Swinton). The two worked together at a magazine when they were younger but haven't spoken in years. They plan to get together, and Martha explains to Ingrid that she has cancer. The doctors are optimistic about her treatment, and while she tries to share that optimism, it is eventually revealed that her cancer cannot be treated and she is going to die.

Martha doesn't want to waste away and asks Ingrid to join her for a trip during which she will take a pill that will end her life. Martha will leave her door open, and when Ingrid finds it closed, it will mean that Martha is no longer there. All Martha wants is to not be alone during her final days but rather to have a good friend there to share this passage with her.

"The Room Next Door" uses the poetic language one expects from an Almodóvar film, and several lovely phrases pepper the movie. However, this can also lead to a kind of melodrama that, coupled with an overbearing score from Alberto Iglesias, makes the film feel almost absurd at times.

What saves this film from fully descending into "afters-chool special" territory are the excellent performances from both Moore and Swinton. The two are able to provide so much heart to these characters that we can

connect with the emotions that both are feeling throughout the film. Thanks to Moore, we are brought into the fear and discomfort of the loss of a friend. She beautifully allows us access to that mindset. Swinton, on the other hand, gives us a glimpse of what it is to want to choose how and when you die, particularly when so much choice has been taken from you due to a disease. And I would be remiss not to mention John Turturro, who has a small yet powerful role as a romantic partner to each woman.

This is also an absolutely beautiful film. Almodóvar uses color and lighting to draw us into this world. With so many films using desaturated color palettes, it is wonderful to watch a movie that revels in beauty.

The melodrama of "The Room Next Door" keeps it from fully resonating with me, but even so, I appreciate the willingness to tackle this subject. Themes about friendship, fear, and control as they relate to death can be taboo, and it's admirable to see them addressed with beauty and compassion.

Saturday's Unity Breakfast at WVU honoring the life and times of Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. wasn't so much about the Dream — as it was the ongoing direction of it all.

That was reflected in the young people who were recognized for their service and mission to the betterment of society at the gathering, which is sponsored annually by the university's Center for Black Culture and Research.

A key quartet of students each were presented scholarships by the center in the name of the slain civil rights leader.

There was Janelle La-Barbera, a senior from Redbank, N.J., who wants to use her entrepreneurship and innovation degree to build up small business in America.

Tysa James, a junior from Fairmont majoring in political science, wants to use that training to affect social change on a big scale.

Cheyenne Torres, who hails from Philadelphia and has a double major in psychology and art therapy, wants to use those degrees to ease the emotional angst felt by so many in today's tumult.

Gabrielle Williams, a

Palm Beach, Fla., native in her junior year, wants to use her criminology degree to ensure that justice is served in society.

Sonia-Frida Ndifon, the Dr. Justine A. Burnett Memorial Scholarship recipient from Cameroon, Central Africa, is a second-year medical student who wants to go right back out in the world as a physician tending to underserved communities on both sides of the ocean.

Meet the new boss?

A large audience filled the expanse of the Mountlair Ballroom two days before Monday's observance of the Dr. King holiday and the inauguration of Donald Trump, the latter of which set keynote speaker Tiffany Dena Loftin to wondering — even if she didn't address the incoming president by name.

"I don't know what's going to happen Monday," she said.

Except, she does. Loftin is an activist and organizer currently leading unionizing efforts of Delta Airlines flight attendants.

Before that, the Los Angeles native who now lives in Atlanta was the national director for the youth and college divisions of the NAACP.

Never mind the coming uncertainty of a contentious president who has been there before, she said.

That means the same for society, she said.

Us, she said. "We've been here before," Loftin said. "This moment."

The moment, she said, means not being afraid to engage in what she called "courageous conversations" — even with the people that you may already have inherent disagreements.

Which meant, and which means, she said, is that everyone in the room Saturday was an influencer.

And a changemaker and policy setter.

A mom's love

She pointed to the example of Alberta King, the mother of Martin Luther King Jr., who influenced his ministry and work in civil rights in ways that were righteous and loud, and gentle and soft spoken at the same time.

"Martin Luther King didn't just 'happen,'" she said.

Ironically, poignantly, Mrs. King was also a victim of gun violence.

She was shot and killed

during a service at Atlanta's Ebenezer Baptist Church — in the same place where her son had made his name and just six years after his murder.

Mrs. King, the church organist, was playing the "Lord's Prayer," on Sunday morning, June 30, 1974, when a Black man began yelling and opened fire.

There are still legacies — and legacies to come, she said. Even in the shadow of family tragedy.

"I'm looking at a roomful of future leaders in West Virginia," she said.

'And it's coming from them'

Gregory Epps Sr., the WVU Health Sciences administrator who mentors young people, said the same after receiving the center's highest recognition for service: the Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. Achievement Award.

Like Loftin, he talked about the young people he sees daily and the young who turned out for the Unity Breakfast.

"Unity," was the word, he said.

"There is hope for the future, and it's coming from them," he said, nodding over at a table of students.

"Let's not be divided."

How to keep your New Year's resolutions and meet goals

IT'S THAT TIME OF THE YEAR AGAIN, WHEN THE EARTH HAS REVOLVED AROUND THE SUN ONCE MORE, AND OUR CALENDAR RESETS ITSELF. As we entered the new year, many of us made new year's resolutions, goals we want to achieve in order to better ourselves. Some common resolutions include going to the gym regularly, eating healthier, and saving money. However, most people who make resolutions give up by mid-February.

This is often because the resolutions are too vague or unrealistic. For example, a resolution like "run

more often" doesn't define what "often" means. It's hard to perceive an actual plan that would help the person achieve this goal. We often think that to create some sort of monumental change, we need to engage in monumental actions. If we want to

be physically healthy, we need to go to the gym for one hour every day. Or, in order to advance in our careers, we need to take on every project and work 12-plus hours per day. We may feel like being productive means we have to be up at 5 a.m. every day and complete every item on our to-do lists.

It's also important to note that we can't focus on just the goal itself. If our goal is to run a marathon, what happens after we run it? That sense of satisfaction dissipates after a bit. It may be more

fulfilling to have our goal be something more habitual, more based on our identities. Do you want to run a marathon or do you want to be labeled as a runner? The key to converting our resolutions into habits (which then becomes a part of our identities) is self-directed neuroplasticity.

Self-directed neuroplasticity is intentionally changing our brains by creating habits. Compared to experience-dependent neuroplasticity, which is a passive way of having our experienc-

es change the way our brains are wired, self-directed neuroplasticity is active. Our habits affect the wiring of our brains.

In "Atomic Habits" by James Clear, he describes a couple of principles for building habits. One principle is that it's more important to try to be a tiny bit better every day. We should focus on very small changes initially where the goal is to just engage in the habit consistently. For example, if my overall goal is to be a reader, in order to make the habit more consistent,

I can start out by setting a small goal to read just one page five times per week. Once this habit is something I'm doing consistently, I can increase the intensity and read more and more pages at a time. This way I can avoid starting off too strong and end up not developing the habit at all. There are going to be days when people might not be able to engage in their goal but as long as they show up even for a little bit, they will be more likely to

Natural gas drilling permits plummet in 2024; GO-WV offers some insights

MORGANTOWN – Horizontal gas well permits dipped to an all-time low in 2023 and 2024. The Dominion Post talked with the Gas & Oil Association of West Virginia about the numbers, the trends and what might be ahead for the industry.

First a look at the numbers (summarized in the accompanying chart).

The state Legislature passed the Natural Gas Horizontal Well Control Act in December 2011, during a special session, to deal with the Marcellus drilling boom. The state Office of Oil and Gas then began compiling permit information regarding the wells falling under the act, called Horizontal 6A wells. Annual reports date back to 2013.

The business took off. There were 684 permit applications received and 661 permits issued in 2013, followed by 771 applications received and 638 permits issued in 2014.

Both numbers fell a bit in 2015 then dipped significantly in 2016 – to 264 and 223, respectively. The next couple years saw a leveling upward, in the lower 500s, then in the 400s for 2018-19.

Another big dip occurred in 2020: 179 applications received, 223 permits issued. A slight rebound followed in 2021 and 2022, figures in the upper 200s.

2023 took another dive: 189 applications received and 195 permits issued. And 2024 saw the all-time low: 130 applications received, 140 permits issued.

GO-WV Executive Director Charlie Burd shared some insights on the recent numbers.

He agreed with a sup-

position that the 2020 dip was COVID related, followed by the post-COVID rebound in 2021-2022.

“During that process,” he said, “I think there was a lot of time invested in how to drill more efficiently, do more for less, longer laterals, more efficient drilling techniques, drill fluids.”

The more-for-less concept was made clear in a 2023 The Dominion Post report on that year’s Marcellus Shale Coalition Shale Insight Conference. A Range Resources official said then that evolving technology allowed Rangeto reduce its surface impact. From 2,000 foot well laterals in the early days, a recent well reached 22,000 feet. This meant fewer pads and rigs.

A source called DrillingEdge shows that the state’s production has steadily increased even as permit numbers fluctuated: in 2013, 757,882,744 mcf (thousand cubic feet); 2016, 1,376,998,518 mcf; 2021, 2,675,207,978 mcf.

On another positive note, Burd said natural gas prices have been

holding steady. But then he addressed geopolitical challenges.

One of those has been the federal policy-driven curbing of liquefied natural gas (LNG) exports and the decline in the permitting of export terminals. This has led some other countries to pick up the slack and assume some of what had been the U.S. role in supplying LNG.

This region’s gas industry, he said, is tied to the East Coast LNG terminals, and the interstate transport is regulated by the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission. By contrast, the Texas gas industry is regulated by the Texas Railroad Commission, which is not in the habit of hampering pipeline construction.

But with a change in administrations, some hope is on the horizon, he said. “We’re hopefully optimistic production is going to increase and prices are going to increase and hold.” They hope that under the new administration’s energy policy, “we will be able to do more here in West Virginia to

enhance our ability to produce electricity with natural gas.”

That comment turned the conversation to intra-state gas business. West Virginia, Ohio and Pennsylvania for a tri-state gas region. Burd said that our two neighbor states have more than two dozen gas-fired power plants. We have none.

“We hope that will end,” he said.

It could. The CPV Shay Energy Center is in development in Doddridge County, Competitive Power Ventures reports. The \$3 billion project is estimated to start construction in the fourth quarter of this year. The 2,060 megawatt plant is projected to generate 2,000-plus jobs and power 1.8 million homes.

And in Monongalia County, the long-delayed gas-fired power plant adjacent to Longview Power is back on track. In November, the Public Service Commission granted Longview subsidiaries Mountain State Clean Energy and Mountain State Renewables an extension on the timeline to start and complete construction. They have until April 3, 2029, to start construction and April 3, 2034, to complete the job.

Beyond gas-fired plants, Burd said the hope is two-prong: to bring more downstream manufacturing into the state and to enhance what is here.

One of the major projects he cited is Fidelis New Energy – a segment of the Morgantown-headquartered ARCH2 hydrogen hub. The company lists among its projects the Mountaineer GigaSystem lifecycle carbon neutral clean hydrogen facility and renewable microgrid,

producing hydrogen from natural gas, in Mason County. Also planned for Mason County is the Monarch Cloud Campus hyperscale data center complex, also powered by hydrogen.

Also also mentioned the Nucor steel mill project in progress in Mason County and Form Energy in Weirton. “Those types of projects are exciting for us.”

Burd said industry jobs are holding steady and severance taxes are benefiting the cities and counties.

State treasurer’s office figures show that \$26.4 million went out to the local governments in 2024 and \$18.3 million in 2023. 2022 saw a whopping \$41.7 million go out. While the recent two years reflect a dip, the numbers have grown since 2013. That year, it was just \$7 million; 2016, \$10.3 million; 2019, \$16.2 million.

Burd said, “I think we should still be encouraged that West Virginia is the fourth leading producer of natural gas in the country. The challenge there is, being fourth and having no power production from natural gas is frustrating. That’s one of the things that has to change. Being fourth is good; being fourth and being able to use more of the natural gas produced in our state, in our state is better.”

He’s looking ahead with optimism.

“We continue to just do what we do best – drill and produce natural gas. We hope to get the opportunity, now that we have a change in leadership in Washington, D.C., to produce natural gas that’s used here in the state and even provide more enhanced benefits to the 1.8 million people here.”

Restrictions on drones set to expire

NEW YORK — Drone restrictions sparked by a spate of mysterious sightings across New Jersey are set to expire this weekend — even though their origins still remain unclear.

The Federal Aviation Administration announced the bans last month, barring uncrewed aircraft from operating within a “nautical mile” of the airspace over more than two dozen towns and municipalities — much of it over “critical New Jersey infrastructure” — including from the ground up to 400 feet.

The bans were implemented after flocks of drones were spotted buzzing over New Jersey and half a dozen other states, including New York and Pennsylvania.

The “fixed-wing aircrafts” initially appeared in the Garden State in late November, in the days leading up to Thanksgiving, and continued for weeks. Residents reported the drones, some of them in packs as large as eight, mostly zipping around the airspace over mid- and northern New Jersey, including near Donald Trump’s National Golf Club in Bedminster and the Picatinny Arsenal Military Base in Rockaway.

The mysterious sightings riled residents and officials alike, including the president-elect, who suggested shooting them out of the sky. Others, like Republican Rep. Jeff Van Drew, speculated the aircrafts were being sent over from Iran — a claim quickly rejected by federal officials.

continue with their habits. And if they can’t, it’s important to make sure the break from the goal doesn’t continue longer than it should.

Clear also discusses the habit loop: cue (trigger that starts the behavior), craving (motivation to address the cue), response (action taken to satisfy the craving), and reward (relief of response). A cue could be that a person is bored, the craving would be that the person wants to stop their boredom, the response may be that they’re checking social media, and the reward is that they’re not bored anymore. These loops can build off of each other. The cue for checking Twitter can then cue us to Instagram and before we know it, we’ve spent an hour mindlessly scrolling. Based on this loop, Clear also describes four laws to develop positive habits: Make the cue obvious (lay out workout clothes the night before),

make the craving attractive (pair the workout with listening to your favorite podcasts), make the response easy (maybe the workout in the beginning can be simply stretching for five minutes), and make the reward satisfying (a celebration for small milestones). If we want to break a bad habit, we do the opposite: Make the cue invisible (keep your phone in a separate room), make the craving unattractive (make the color scheme gray and delete social media apps), make the response difficult (make it so you have to log back into your apps each time), and make the reward unsatisfying (for every time you use social media, you have to pay your friend \$5). These four laws are tied in with how dopamine is released in our brains. Dopamine typically spikes in anticipation of something rather than when something is actually happening. It spikes upon seeing chocolate bars rather than when we actually consume them. So

when we make the craving attractive for positive habits, we ensure spikes in dopamine, and when we make it unattractive for negative habits, we try to stop a dopamine spike from occurring.

By understanding these, we can turn our resolutions into habits. These habits in turn change the ways our brains are wired, and keep us fulfilled. Warm wishes for 2025, Happy New Year!

The inauguration is moving indoors, here is what to know about the changed plans

WASHINGTON — Sub-freezing temperatures forecast for Monday in Washington mean President-elect Donald Trump will take the oath of office from inside the Capitol Rotunda. Almost everyone visiting Washington won't be able to see the ceremony in person.

It will be the first time in 40 years that the swearing-in won't take place on the Capitol steps. Plans are underway to accommodate some attendees at the city's pro basketball and hockey arena.

Here's what's known about the arrangements as organizers scramble to adapt:

Where will Trump now be sworn in?

The Rotunda is prepared as an alternative for each inauguration in the event of inclement weather. The swearing-in was last moved indoors in 1985, when President Ronald Reagan began his second term. Monday's forecast calls for the lowest inauguration Day temperatures since that day.

President Joe Biden, members of Congress and other dignitaries and notable guests will be able to

view the ceremony from inside the Capitol. On Friday, workers were installing a small platform in the Rotunda.

The U.S. Capitol Police said outside ticketed areas at the Capitol will be closed "due to the extremely cold weather," so even if people wanted to gather there as Trump takes the oath inside, they won't be allowed to do so.

How cold is it going to get on Monday?

The National Weather Service is predicting that the temperature will be about 22 degrees Fahrenheit (minus-6 Celsius) at noon EST, when Trump becomes president. That would be the coldest since Reagan's second inauguration saw temperatures plunge to 7 degrees (minus-14 Celsius).

"The weather forecast for Washington, D.C., with the windchill factor, could take temperatures into severe record lows," Trump posted on his Truth Social platform. "There is an Arctic blast sweeping the Country. I don't want to see people hurt, or injured, in any way."

In 2009, it was 28 de-

grees (minus-2 Celsius) for Barack Obama's swearing-in. Biden was sworn in four years ago in a relatively balmy 42 degrees (5.5 Celsius).

A few Democrats poked fun at Trump's decision.

Minnesota Gov. Tim Walz, who was Vice President Kamala Harris' running mate in the Democrats' losing 2024 campaign, posted a photo of himself standing in a snowstorm with the caption, "There's no such thing as bad weather, just bad clothing."

Monday's forecast temperature is about the same as it was in Washington 64 years ago, when John F. Kennedy took the oath in a 22-degree chill, and after crews worked overnight clearing 8 inches of fresh snow from the parade route. Kennedy delivered his speech from the Capitol's east steps without a topcoat, his frosty breath visible as he spoke.

A half-century earlier, William Howard Taft held his 1909 inauguration indoors after 10 inches of snow fell. That's when the inauguration was still held on March 4, not Jan. 20.

How many members of the public can attend?

In his social media post about the weather-related change, Trump said that "various Dignitaries and Guests" would be taken into the Rotunda for the ceremony. It's unclear how many people or whom.

According to a notice from the House's sergeant at arms to congressional offices, the vast majority of the seats that had been planned for an outdoor ceremony will be excluded and those tickets will become "commemorative." Organizers are still deciding whether they can admit people who have tickets in sections 3 and 4, which would have been right in front of the stage outdoors.

The Rotunda can only hold about 600 people, according to the Joint Congressional Committee on Inaugural Ceremonies.

According to Trump's post, Capital One Arena — where the incoming president plans a rally Sunday afternoon — will be open again on Monday for "LIVE viewing of this Historic event." No information is available yet on how to sign up for a seat

inside the arena on Monday. The arena can hold 20,000 people.

What about the parade?

Trump also said that Capital One Arena would "host the Presidential Parade." Trump said he would "join the crowd" at Capital One after he takes the oath.

The parade is managed by the Joint Task Force-National Capital Region, which is trying to figure out what changes need to be made and how the parade will go on.

Normally, thousands of people line the route from the Capitol to the White House, which the president typically traverses following the swearing-in ceremony.

Marching bands and other participants from around the country come to Washington to participate, so presumably they will also be part of the newly arranged indoor festivities.

Are other inaugural events still happening?

According to Trump, yes. The Republican president-elect said Friday that other inaugural events,

including the Sunday rally and his participation in three inaugural balls on Monday night, would take place as scheduled.

Can I get a refund?

Tickets to the inauguration when it was planned to be outside are free, so no refunds are needed for that.

Associated Press inquiries about any plans by American Airlines and United Airlines to offer refunds or other arrangements for travelers changing their plans were not immediately answered. Delta Airlines and Southwest Airlines were planning no change in policy. Similar requests to hotel chains including Hilton, IHG, Marriott and Best Western Hotels were not immediately answered.

A Transportation Department spokesperson advised travelers to find information on its "Fly Rights" consumer guide at www.transportation.gov/airconsumer/fly-rights.

'Phenomena Tourism' Draws Travelers to Mexico

As social media users oversaturate their feeds with images of iconic manmade landmarks like the Eiffel Tower and Colosseum, some travelers seek something more challenging to experience from behind a screen: unique natural phenomena. This hot travel trend tops Expedia's Unpack '25 report, highlighting spiking interest in experiencing volcanic eruptions, mass migrations, and the Northern Lights firsthand.

For travelers who can't brave the tundra or climb a volcano, an often easier-to-spot phenomenon awaits: the majestic annual migrations of whales. With whale watching season kicking off in some of Mexico's most sought-after destinations, now is the time to quench the thirst for phenomena — with a margarita in hand for good measure.

Whale Watching in Mexico

While "phenomena tourism" is a new travel trend, whale-watching has been popular for decades. A 2009 report estimated the industry generated around \$2 billion globally, created over 13,000 jobs, and welcomed roughly 13 million spectators. Though no more recent global statistics are available, trends indicate monumental growth over the past 15 years.

Whale-watching opportunities span more than 100 countries, fueling tourism numbers and expanding the activity's economic impact.

"Whale watching has been popular for years, but we're really seeing it take off in new areas, drawing more visitors seeking it out specifically," said Sandra Felix, Commercial Director of Visit Baja California Sur, a region considered among the world's best for spotting a variety of species of whales.

Part of the appeal of whale watching, especially in destinations like Baja California Sur in Mexico, comes from its relative ease. During the height of whale watching season — between December and late March — spectators can plainly view the creatures from the sandy shorelines and balconies of some of the area's most popular hotels and resorts.

From the Pacific Ocean and Sea of Cortez sides of the region and even from the resort-saturated Los Cabos on the peninsula's tip, sightseers can observe humpback and blue whales breaching and playing as they migrate through the region's rich waters. "This makes it perfect for travelers who can't get much more 'adventurous' but want a memorable experience of spotting something incredible," says Felix.

Migrating to Punta de Mita

Baja California Sur

has long been considered a fantastic whale-watching destination, but some of Mexico's similarly sought-after destinations should also be on travelers' radars. One of the best whale-watching areas is Punta de Mita, less than an hour north of Puerto Vallarta along the golden sands of Mexico's Pacific Coast.

Unlike overbuilt resort destinations in Mexico like Los Cabos and Cancún, Punta de Mita has seen slower and more intentional growth. It's now a haven for travelers seeking a more secluded getaway, with luxury names like Four Seasons Hotels and Resorts and Auberge Resorts Collection planting flags there in recent years.

In Punta de Mita, Two Hyatt Inclusive Collection resorts have become celebrated whale-watching spots: the family-friendly Dreams Bahia Mita Surf & Spa Resort and the adults-only Secrets Bahia Mita Surf & Spa Resort. The all-inclusive,

all-suite resorts opened in 2021 and were designed by renowned architectural firm Sordo Madaleno for what feels like the perfect vantage point for whale watching.

The dramatic, modern design of the side-by-side properties creates endless ocean viewpoints from balconies and the resort's exclusive, elevated rooftop pool, which feels like a front-row seat to one of nature's most impressive shows every season. A fun touch makes the experience a group affair: a bell on the beachfront labeled WHALE alerts guests amid whale sightings.

The resorts also book carefully crafted tours designed for up-close encounters with whales, keeping whale population conservation and protection at the heart of the experience. Still, travelers will be astounded to see how close they often get to the numerous humpback whales and other species like blue whales and California gray whales, making for what is no

less than a breathtaking encounter for phenomena-seeking travelers.

Just the Start

For many travelers, watching migrating whales from a beach chair is just what the doctor ordered. Still, more adventurous spirits looking for a little more of a challenge will find plenty more in Mexico. La Paz, the capital city of Baja California Sur, is among the best places to swim alongside migrating whale sharks. Known as the world's largest fish, these gentle giants regularly reach up to 40 feet long.

Though spotting whale sharks is far from guaranteed, even at the height of their migration season, it offers much more of the thrill that makes phenomena-focused travel so appealing in the first place. Even if beachside whale observation is the extent of the adventure, the excitement and anticipation make this one-of-a-kind trend seem here to stay.

Mohigans outpace University 77-43 in season's first meeting

The Morgantown Mohigans and the University Hawks took the Mohawk Bowl to the hardwood inside the Rowdie Center on Friday night for the first of two regular-season matchups between the crosstown rivals.

Morgantown (6-1) entered Friday's contest having lost on its homecourt for the first time in 50 tries Tuesday against Spring Mills, while the Hawks (8-2) came into the evening having won seven straight games.

The Mohigans responded positively to Tuesday night with a decisive 77-43 victory over the visiting Hawks, who were playing their third game in five days.

Three players scored in dou-

ble figures, led by senior Marty Johnson with 17 points. Fellow senior Brady Savage and junior Waylon Colistra each added 16.

Sophomore Luke Byrer led UHS with 10 points.

"I thought we were a little passive on Tuesday," MHS head coach Dave Tallman said. "Tonight we got back to what we do and played Morgantown basketball. We shared the ball and made some shots, but defensively is where it always starts."

In the game's opening minutes, MHS did just as Tallman said: shared the ball, made shots, and played defense.

Senior Demarcus Bandy gave the Mohigans an early advantage midway through the

first quarter with a big block on the defensive end before hustling down the court to find his spot and nail a triple (the third of the quarter for MHS). He finished with five points, six rebounds, three assists, and three steals in the contest.

That forced the game's first timeout by the Hawks, who trailed 13-5 early.

Johnson hit a triple out of the timeout as the Mohigans took a 25-15 lead into the second quarter. He finished with eight points, three assists, and two rebounds in the opening eight minutes.

Both clubs began the second quarter slower offensively, combining for just four points through the first four minutes.

First came the drive. It was followed by the steal.

Then came some foul shots, a 3-pointer when No. 2 Iowa State refused to foul and then the dunk.

All of it came from WVU's Javon Small, who on a day when the school celebrated the life of legendary Jerry West, the point guard came up with his own version of being Mr. Clutch.

Small scored 12 of his game-high 27 points in the final 1:38, as the Mountaineers knocked off their fourth AP Top 25-ranked opponent of the season with a 64-57 against No. 2 Iowa State.

He scored on a drive and a foul with 1:38 left. His free throw gave WVU a 54-49 lead.

Small then came up with a

WVU and Iowa State set for televised showdown

The No. 20-ranked West Virginia University women's basketball team is set to play in its second nationally televised game of the season when they welcome Iowa State to the WVU Coliseum today.

Tipoff against the Cyclones is scheduled for 1 p.m.

The matchup will be the 27th meeting between WVU (14-3, 4-2 Big 12) and ISU (13-6, 4-2 Big 12). The Mountaineers and Cyclones spit the season series last season, with both collecting wins on their home courts. WVU is 14-12 all time in the series and hold a 9-3 mark when playing inside the WVU Coliseum.

Preseason All-Big 12 selection Audi Crooks leads Iowa State with 22.6 points per game. She also averages 7.7 rebounds

per game and has 16 blocks on the season. Emily Ryan facilitates the offense with her 6.4 assists per game as her 2.0 steals also leads the Cyclones.

Iowa State dropped four contests in the non-conference schedule, with three of their losses coming to ranked opponents and three teams in last season Final Four in No. 4 South Carolina, No. 4 UConn and No. 21 Iowa. In conference play Iowa State has losses to Oklahoma State and Utah.

Senior guard JJ Quinerly (18.3), junior guard Jordan Harrison (13.9) and junior guard Sydney Shaw (12.9) pace the Mountaineers scoring production this season. Harrison's 5.1 assists per game leads WVU and ranks 8th in the Big 12. Senior guard Kyah Watson has grabbed 7.4 rebounds per

game which ranks seventh in the Big 12 while her 3.1 steals per game ranks second and Quinerly's 3.3 steals per game is first.

The Big 12's leaders in steals last season, Quinerly (54), Watson (53) and Harrison (31), are at it again this season averaging over two steals per contest. Junior guard Sydney Shaw and Senior guard Sydney Woodley have also gotten in on the action with 33 and 32 steals this season, giving WVU five players with 30+ steals through 17 games.

The Mountaineers have forced 15+ turnovers in every game this season, including 20+ in 14 games, to average 26.0 per game. The mark ranks fourth in the nation. The Mountaineers have forced 30-plus turnovers in six games, including a season-high 44. WVU ranks

second in the nation with 14.8 steals per game and holds a +9.82 turnover margin.

West Virginia is averaging 79.9 points per game while outscoring their opponents by an average of 28.3 points.

Quinerly currently sits No. 9 on the all-time scoring list with 1,659, and behind Hall of Famer Meg Bulger (2008-11) with 1,665. She is 4th in steals with 285 and sits just eight away from catching Hall of Famer Rosemary Kosiorek (1989-92) who has 293.

WVU adds edge rusher in Robinson

UTSA star was AAC Defensive Player of the Year

The transfer train hasn't stopped rolling into Morgantown and West Virginia has added some more key pieces to the roster this past week to address a number of needs across the roster.

One of those additions came from Texas San Antonio edge rusher Jimmori Robinson who was considered one of the premier pass rushing options in the transfer market.

Robinson, 6-foot-5, 250-pounds, was one of the premier edge rushers available in the transfer market and for good reason. The Virginia native is coming off a season where he was named the Defensive Player of the Year in the American Athletic Conference as well as a first-team all-league choice.

Over the course of his 528 snaps, Robinson recorded 43 tackles, 17 tackles for loss, 10.5 sacks and a pair of forced fumbles in his first full year as a starter for the Roadrunners. Prior to that, Robinson appeared in 30 games over his other three years and tallied 67 tackles, 13 tackles for loss. 4.5 sacks

and a forced fumble. Prior to that, Robinson was highly productive at the junior college level where he was an all-American selection at Dodge City C.C. where he posted 20 tackles, including 10 tackles for loss.

The Virginia native narrowed his choices down to West Virginia and Virginia Tech prior to picking the Mountaineers after a productive official visit to campus. He has one year of eligibility remaining.

The football program also addressed the offensive line with a commitment from Arkansas transfer offensive lineman Ty'kieast Crawford. The offensive tackle was initially committed to UCLA out of the transfer portal but flipped his pledge to the Mountaineers after an official visit to campus.

ers after an official visit to campus.

Crawford, 6-foot-5, 324-pounds, spent four seasons at Arkansas and one at Charlotte where he appeared in 39 career games and started nine of those. A former four-star prospect out of Texas, Crawford has primarily played right tackle during his career and has one season of eligibility remaining.

West Virginia also continued to address the defensive back position with a pledge from Appalachian State transfer cornerback Jason Chambers. He spent only one season with the other Mountaineers where he appeared in 11 games and started 9 of those with 38 tackles, 2 passes defended and a pick.

Prior to that Cham-

bers was at North Carolina Central where he was a first-team HBCU all-American and a finalist for the Aeneas Williams Award given to the top HBCU defensive back in DII. During that 2023 season, Chambers recorded 41 tackles, 6 pass breakups and 3 interceptions. In 2022, he started six games and recorded 27 tackles and 7 pass breakups for North Carolina Central.

The Mountaineers also added to the quarterback room with a pledge from Charlotte transfer Max Brown. The Oklahoma native only spent one season with the 49ers where he threw for 563 yards with 3 touchdowns and 6 interceptions. Prior to that he was at Florida where he redshirted in his first season before completing 19-28 passes for 192 yards and also proving himself a dual threat option with his rushing ability.

Brown joins another transfer in Texas A&M quarterback Jayden Henderson in the quarterback room and both of those additions have two seasons of eligibility remaining.

The Mountaineers have added 28 new transfers since head coach Rich Rodriguez has taken over the program.

steal of Iowa State guard Curtis Jones and turned that into two more points from the foul line.

After Keshon Gilbert scored on a drive to the basket, Iowa State elected not to foul. There were 41 seconds left when Small nailed a clutch three for a 59-51 lead.

In the final seconds, Small — the Big 12's leading scorer — added two more free throws and a thunderous dunk when Jonathan Powell came up with a loose ball and flipped it ahead to Small.

And then ... bedlam. The Coliseum court was flooded with WVU students. WVU head coach Darian DeVries thumped at his chest and yelled joyfully at the crowd, as Small was hugged by teammate Eduardo Andre.

Iowa State's 12-game winning streak was over. The feel-good story of the Mountaineers under DeVries just continues to grow stronger.

Absolutely nothing was settled in the first half — WVU held a slim 25-24 edge after trailing by as much as seven points — except for the style of game that was going to be played.

Physical defense won out over flashy offense and runs by either team were

short-lived and countered by a run by the other.

As Jones began to get hot — he scored 11 of the Cyclones' first 21 points — WVU fired back with Small scoring an acrobatic lay-up or Amani Hansberry hitting a critical 3-pointer.

Everything else was pure defense, the kind that sometimes had as many collisions as a NA-SCAR race, and with just as much banging and positioning.

Maybe that's the way it was supposed to be. Under T.J. Ozelberger, the Cyclones (15-2, 5-1 Big 12) have developed into one of the top defensive teams in the Big 12, while the Mountaineers (13-4, 43-2) have quickly taken on a never-back-down persona from DeVries.

And that style of play spilled over into the second half, as the favored Cyclones kept applying pressure, while the Mountaineers never once appeared to be unprepared for the moment.

After a while, it became match play of sorts, as in I'll see your good play and just wait to see what happens next.

Jones finally took his shooting skills beyond the 3-point line in the second half, canning a 24-footer for the Cyclones first 3-pointer of the game with 13:17 remaining.

Minutes later, Small came up with a dandy, spinning his body between two Iowa State defenders and throwing up a 15-foot prayer as the shot clock was about to expire.

It was answered, cut-

ting the Cyclones' lead to 41-39 with 8:37 left.

WVU grabbed the lead when Powell nailed a 3-pointer that gave the Mountaineers a 44-43 lead and then Andre came up with a steal and a driving lay-up that turned into a 3-point play for a 47-43 lead.

Back and forth both teams went, setting up the stage for Small to become the hero late.

It came with 1:43 remaining, as Iowa State guard Tamin Lipsey saw his lay-up attempt at one end roll off the rim and Hansberry came up with the rebound.

WVU's lead was just 51-49 at the time.

He found Small with the outlet pass and the WVU point guard took over the game.

Hansberry finished with 12 points and six rebounds for the Mountaineers, who held the Cyclones to just 1 of 17 from 3-point range for the game.

Jones finished with 18 points for Iowa State.

Bears interview Vikings defensive coordinator Flores for head coaching job

LAKE FOREST, Ill. — The Chicago Bears interviewed Minnesota Vikings defensive coordinator Brian Flores for their head coaching job Saturday.

The 43-year-old Flores has been running Minnesota's defense the last two seasons after a stint as a senior defensive assistant and linebackers coach for Pittsburgh in 2022. That came after he was Miami's head coach for three years, going 24-25 with the Dolphins and making no postseason appearances before being fired.

On Feb. 1, 2022, Flores filed a federal lawsuit against the league, the Dolphins, the Giants and the Denver Broncos. Flores, who is Black, alleged racist hiring practices for leadership positions across the NFL.

Flores interviewed with the New York Jets on Friday and was expected to speak with the Jacksonville Jaguars about their head coaching vacancy. The Vikings finished second to Detroit in the NFC North at 14-3.

The Bears are looking to replace Matt Eberflus, who was fired on Nov. 29. Chicago finished last in the NFC North at 5-12 and lost 10 in a row before closing the season with a win at Green Bay.

The development of quarterback Caleb Williams will be the top priority for the next coach in the wake of the Bears' fourth straight losing season. The No. 1 pick in last year's draft threw for 3,541 yards, 20 touchdowns and six interceptions. But he was sacked a franchise-record and league-leading 68 times.

Williams, the 2022

Heisman Trophy winner out of Southern California, was shown seated courtside Saturday at the Wisconsin-USC men's basketball game in Los Angeles with his right, throwing hand in a cast or wrap. It went from about his lower knuckles to below his wrist.

Messages seeking comment were left with the Bears. General manager Ryan Poles did not mention Williams among the players scheduled to have surgery during his season-ending news conference.

The white cast or wrap wasn't Williams' only surprise on Saturday. He also sported a buzzed haircut.

The Bears have confirmed interviewing 15 candidates, a list highlighted by Detroit Lions offensive coordinator Ben Johnson, former Seattle Seahawks coach Pete Carroll, former Green Bay Packers and Dallas Cowboys coach Mike McCarthy and former Tennessee Titans coach Mike Vrabel, who got the job in New England.

Chicago has also interviewed Baltimore Ravens offensive coordinator Todd Monken, Buffalo Bills offensive coordinator Joe Brady, Pittsburgh Steelers offensive coordinator Arthur Smith, interim coach Thomas Brown, former Carolina and Washington coach Ron Rivera, Detroit defensive coordinator Aaron Glenn, former Stanford coach David Shaw, Arizona Cardinals offensive coordinator Drew Petzing, Miami Dolphins defensive coordinator Anthony Weaver and New York Giants offensive coordinator Mike Kafka.

Are CWD positive deer more vulnerable to predation?

I've always assumed that deer that had chronic wasting disease (CWD) were more vulnerable to predators, hunters, and auto collisions. That's because they have a growing number of incubating prions in their brain, and eventually they will create holes, make the deer visually sick, and unless a predator or hunter or car gets them, they die naturally.

I've assumed that was the case because there's a lot written to that effect. For example, the National Wildlife Federation states that "predators must select for infected individuals when they hunt." It also goes on to say that in that situation predators could decrease CWD in an area if the prey (deer in this case) are the most vulnerable to predation. On the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania website, it states that "studies have shown infected cervids (deer) are more likely to

die from predation, vehicle collisions, or hunter harvest, rather than from the CWD infection itself."

Later, it states, "predators like coyotes, likely select for disease-compromised cervids."

We know that CWD-positive deer die at a much higher rate than deer without CWD. This all seems pretty straight forward, but is it really what is happening? I was on the internet and found a post from the Wisconsin DNR website where their head deer researcher posted some very interesting data.

They have a study going on in southwestern Wisconsin and this biologist stated, "I thought we'd see more predation on adult deer once they had CWD and were growing weak."

However, he noted that there were deer that were visually weak from CWD that died and were not predated on by coyotes. Even more interesting he noted that coyotes don't always consume the carcasses of such deer. I can tell you that if a deer dies in the woods, coyotes will find and eat them. But apparently not the deer that are dead from CWD

in Wisconsin.

Not everybody agrees with him. Another study I found looked at CWD and mule deer that were hit by cars.

The study was done in northern Colorado and compared the estimated CWD prevalence of mule deer sampled in the vicinity of collision sites to see how vulnerable mule deer that had CWD were to vehicle collisions.

Here is the data they got. Twenty-five of 171 vehicle-killed deer tested positive for CWD. Then they looked at deer living in the vicinity of these auto collisions and found that 173 of 2,317 deer tested positive for CWD.

So, 14.6% of the deer hit by cars had CWD, while only 7.5% of the deer living in that area had CWD. So, this study showed that deer with CWD, even if the disease isn't visible to the naked eye, have a higher risk of being hit by an auto than deer living in that area that did not have CWD.

They go on to suggest that "evidence of increase susceptibility to vehicle collisions may aid in understanding vulnerability of CWD-infected individuals to other

forms of death, particularly predation."

One last tidbit on all this. I attended a seminar given by the deer research biologist from the West Virginia DNR. It was a very informative and well-done talk, and as I recall he noted that in the eastern panhandle, where there is a high prevalence of deer with CWD, they found that deer hit by cars gave them a better estimate on the CWD presence in their deer than hunter killed deer. Interesting. Thus, they continue to check all road kills for CWD.

So, what do I take from all this? The data from various parts of the country are a mixed bag. But in general, it does appear that a deer with CWD has a better chance of dying from predation, auto collisions, or hunting than deer without CWD.

Ohio State's WR tandem of Smith, Egbuka eager to see if they will face man coverage from Notre Dame

ATLANTA — Ohio State wide receiver Jeremiah Smith was able to keep a team-first approach after having extra defensive attention make him almost invisible in the Buckeyes' Cotton Bowl win over Texas in the College Football Playoff semifinals.

After all, that extra attention limited Smith to one catch for three yards but opened up opportunities for his teammates in the 28-14 win that earned Ohio State a berth in Monday night's national championship game against Notre Dame.

"I'm not a selfish player. It's not just all about me," Smith said at Saturday's national championship media day. "It's about the whole team as well. If I've got to be a decoy this game as well, all I want to do is win, so if that's what it takes, to be a decoy to win the game, that's what I'll do. It doesn't matter."

One of the key questions in the championship game: Will Notre Dame play man defense against Ohio State's receivers? That strategy has worked well for the Fighting Irish, but Smith and Emeka Egbuka are different than most receivers.

"At the core of it, we're wide receivers so we'd love the opportunity to be able to just go out and be one-on-one," Egbuka said. "At the end of the day, whatever coverages they play, our coaches are going to have a good game plan for it."

Smith was voted a second-team AP All-Ameri-

can after compiling 1,227 receiving yards and 14 touchdowns. Smith broke Cris Carter's school records for receiving yards, receptions and touchdowns for a freshman.

If Notre Dame quarterback Riley Leonard ever starts feeling too good about himself, all he has to do is look at his right wrist.

Right there, in navy script on a green wristband is a jarring reminder: "You suck."

The fact that his mom sent it to him just makes the message hit home even more.

Leonard, who transferred from Duke and has thrown for 19 touchdowns and run for 16 more this year, explains he wears the wristband because, growing up in Fairhope,

Alabama, he was a star who admittedly never went through many tough times.

"Everybody just tells you how good you are all the time, and I'd just get so sick of it," he said. "I didn't really have a lot of adversity. I lived a blessed life, and I just wanted somebody to tell me I sucked to give me a little extra motivation."

He says he shared this thought with his mom, and she "gladly took that and ran with it."

"My high school locker said 'You suck' all over it and it's just kind of been going on for a long time," Leonard said.

South shut out of its title game

Even though the national championship game is being played in the South, no Southern team is in the game for the second

consecutive season.

Instead, Ohio State has the opportunity to give the Big Ten its second consecutive national championship, following Michigan's win over Washington last year. Michigan's win snapped Georgia's string of back-to-back championships.

"It's a great opportunity for our conference," Ohio State linebacker Cody Simon said. "I'm not too worried about the conference rivalry stuff. If you want to win the championship, you've got to put together a really good season. I'm just worried about us playing our best game right now. I don't want to worry about too many headlines and the big conference talk."

Love says his knee is 100%

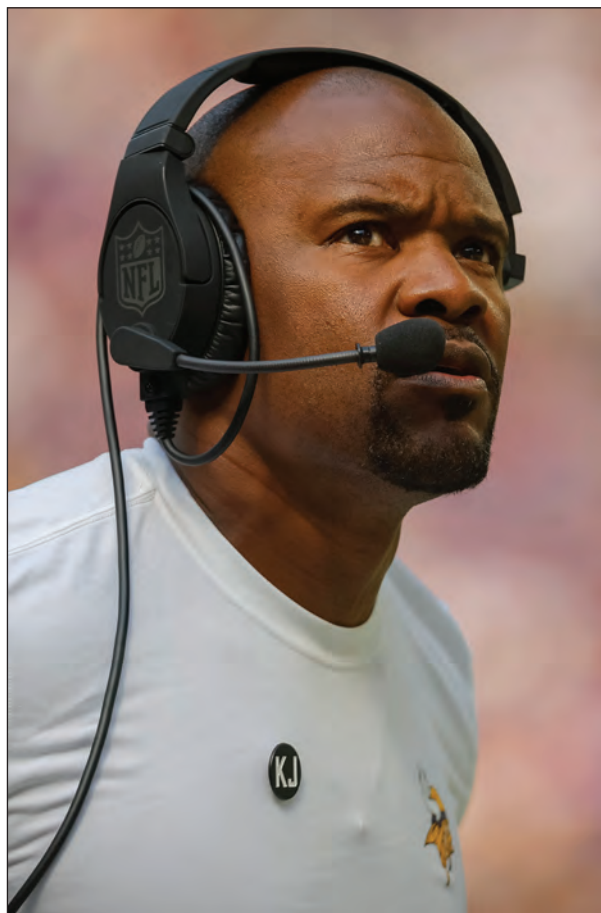
Notre Dame running back Jeremiah Love says he needed a full half in the Orange Bowl before he had total confidence his knee was ready for him to play his normal game.

The in-person interview with Saleh came a day after Dallas held a virtual interview with Philadelphia offensive coordinator Kellen Moore, who was franchise quarterback Dak Prescott's play-caller from 2019-22.

Saleh was fired by the

Jets five games into his fourth season. He was 20-36. Saleh also has interviewed for the defensive coordinator opening in San Francisco, the job he had when the Jets hired him in 2021.

The Cowboys are set for another interview with a coach with a defensive background in Seattle assistant head coach Leslie Frazier. The former Minnesota coach was defensive coordinator in Tampa Bay and Buffalo after the Vikings fired him following the 2013 season.

McCarthy and the Cowboys parted ways Monday after five seasons. The former Green Bay coach interviewed for the Chicago Bears' opening this week.

Dallas owner and general manager Jerry Jones has had informal discussions with Colorado coach Deion Sanders. The Pro Football Hall of Fame cornerback spent five seasons with the Cowboys and helped them win their most recent Super Bowl to cap the 1995 season. Dallas hasn't advanced beyond the divi-

sional round of the playoffs since then.

Jason Witten, an 11-time Pro Bowl tight end who holds several Cowboys club records, also has been mentioned as a candidate. Witten has coached a private high school in the Dallas area since retiring as a player in 2020.

Detroit defensive coordinator Aaron Glenn is another potential candidate. The former Texas A&M defensive back spent two seasons with the Cowboys late in his 15-year career.

Tom Brady rumors continue to circulate as football star prepares to call Super Bowl

Even as Tom Brady goes through his first postseason and prepares to call his first Super Bowl as a television analyst, rumors about his future continue to be rampant, much to the dismay of Fox Sports.

Fox Sports president of production and operations/executive producer Brad Zager understands the spotlight Brady and the network are under. Still, Zager said Brady is in it for the long haul.

“The whole group that said he would never be there then turned into, he’s not going to stay there. It’s just a never-ending, merry-go-round of people trying to come up with the next narrative,” Zager said in a phone interview with The Associated Press on Friday. “Tom has done nothing but be engaged with us every time he’s asked about broadcasting. When he was retired and getting in, getting ready, he talked about how excited he was for it, that he was 100% and has never wavered on that. So the fact that there are people on that crew that have to read articles and narratives and predictions that Tom isn’t engaged does wear on you.”

Zager’s comments on Friday were the first about Brady by someone from Fox Sports. Brady has not been made available for media interviews this season. He has discussed his first season in the booth during appearances on Colin Cowherd’s show on FS1.

On Thursday, Don Yee, Brady’s agent, told Sports Business Journal that Brady “has had a tremendous amount of fun working with Fox this year, and he’s really excited about the future with Fox.” Brady signed a 10-year, \$375 million contract with Fox in May 2022 while still playing for the Tampa Bay Buccaneers. He retired after that season and decided in February 2023 to take a year off before moving into the booth.

“Tom has had a tremendous amount of fun working with Fox this year, and he’s excited about the future with Fox and his growth on their team,” Yee said. “And this year was the first year of a

long relationship.”

Yee did not return an email or text message by the AP seeking comment.

Fox Sports has tried to weather the rumors and criticism surrounding Brady’s future and his dual roles as the analyst on its NFL crew and minority owner of the Las Vegas Raiders.

Everything has come to a head this week with Brady and Kevin Burkhardt calling Saturday night’s NFC divisional round game in Detroit between the Lions and the Washington Commanders.

Lions offensive coordinator Ben Johnson and defensive coordinator Aaron Glenn are candidates for the Raiders’ head coach opening. Brady is involved in the franchise’s coach and general manager selection.

Brady cannot participate in Fox’s production meetings with teams — either in person or via Zoom — watch practices, or step foot in a team’s training complex. The only team complex Brady is allowed in is the Raiders.

The league put those parameters in place going into the season after Brady purchased a 5% stake in the Raiders in May 2023. NFL owners approved the purchase last October.

Zager said any inferences about a potential

conflict of interest between Brady calling the game and being part of the Raiders’ decision-making process are unfounded.

“It’s questioning his professionalism and integrity. It’s ridiculous,” Zager said.

Any questions Brady would have for the coordinators or head coach Dan Campbell could be asked by Burkhardt or a member of the Fox crew in the production meetings. However, Brady receives the same film and statistical information as everyone else on the crew.

“Anytime you’re around crew members and doing something as a crew, that’s a good thing for the crew. So, we’ve have to overcome that. You’re not going to have that time to bond,” Zager said. “But when it comes to analyzing the game and learning information, what is available at the fingertips of the average fan now is probably light years ahead of what was available even to the broadcast crew 15-20 years ago. Not being in the meetings has not stopped him from growing as an analyst throughout the season.”

Brady’s analysis of teams and officiating is subject to more scrutiny by the league because of his stake in the Raiders, but it would have to be

egregiously critical or call into question the integrity of a team or referee.

Zager pointed out that Brady has been critical of play calls or strategy, just like any analyst is expected to do.

“It’s been awesome to watch Tom jump into this, having no broadcast experience, and calling the NFL’s biggest games. He continues to find his rhythm and those spots where he can really shine during a game,” Zager said. “I think he’s hitting a great stride as we head to the postseason in our biggest games. And I’m looking forward to these next three games, which are three biggest games, and what he’s going to add to the broadcast.”

Attention and rumors about Fox’s top NFL crew are nothing new. Troy Aikman and Joe Buck’s future during the 2021 season was constant fodder before both moved to ESPN’s “Monday Night Football.” Brady, though, did take a lot of pressure off the network before Super Bowl 57 in 2023 when he said early in the week leading up to the game that he wouldn’t be joining Fox in 2023, which allowed Greg Olsen to answer questions about the game instead of his future and not be a one-year, lame duck analyst on a top network team.

Texans RB Joe Mixon active vs. the Chiefs after dealing with an ankle injury

KANSAS CITY, Mo. — Joe Mixon was active for the Texans’ divisional playoff game against the Chiefs on Saturday after the Pro Bowl running back had shown up on the injury report with an ankle problem and missed practice late in the week.

Houston linebacker Azeem Al-Shaair (knee), right guard Shaq Mason (knee), offensive lineman Juice Scruggs (ankle) and wide receiver Robert Woods (hip) also were active. Woods did not practice all week and had been listed as questionable.

The 28-year-old Mixon hurt his ankle in Week 2 against the Bears and missed the next three weeks, though he has played in all of their games since. His ankle did roll over in Week 15 against Miami, limiting him late in the game.

Mixon played a big role in a 32-12 wild-card win over the Chargers last week, running for 106 yards and a touchdown to get the Texans within a win over Kansas City of reaching the AFC championship for the first time. It was the first time a Texans running back eclipsed 100 yards rushing in the postseason since Arian Foster in 2012.

“Joe provides confidence. He brings it every week,” Texans coach DeMeco Ryans said this week. “The way he goes about his business, what he has to say to the guys all throughout the week — he provides confidence.”

He also provides some versatility to a Houston offense that lost wide receivers Tank Dell and Stefon Diggs to season-ending injuries. Mixon had 36 catches for 309 yards and a touchdown this season, and his experience and ability in helping protect C.J. Stroud in the passing game is a big reason why Houston has won a playoff game in back-to-back seasons.

“He has been helpful to all of us, making

our alignment right,” Stroud said. “It’s nice to have that and not have a whole bunch on my plate all the time. Even when our run game isn’t working, I know he leans on me, so it’s just playing off one another, playing complementary football. But it is very helpful to have someone like Joe.”

Houston made running back J.J. Taylor, linebacker Devin White, defensive end Jerry Hughes, defensive tackle Kurt Hinish and offensive linemen Kendrick Green and Nick Broeker inactive against Kansas City.

As expected, the Chiefs had cornerback Jaylen Watson available for the first time since breaking his ankle on Oct. 20 in a game against San Francisco. He was activated from injured reserve Friday after getting through a week of practice without any setbacks.

Watson earned a starting job in training camp and had been playing the best of his career when he got hurt.

“He’s worked tremendously hard to get himself to this point, first of all, and we’ll just see how that goes as far as the game reps and all that,” Chiefs coach Andy Reid said this week. “He sure has worked hard to get himself even to this point right here.”

The Chiefs made inactive safety Deon Bush, cornerback Keith Taylor, defensive end Joshua Uche, defensive end Malik Herring and offensive linemen C.J. Hanson, Wanya Morris and Ethan Driskell.

Morris started 11 games at left tackle for Kansas City this season, but he struggled mightily to protect Patrick Mahomes. The Chiefs opted to slide All-Pro guard Joe Thuney to tackle, with Mike Caliendo replacing him at guard down the stretch, and they chose to go that route against Houston, with D.J. Humphries becoming the backup tackle.

2-time Cy Young winner Jacob deGrom feeling normal after missing most of 1st two Texas seasons hurt

ARLINGTON, Texas — Two-time Cy Young Award winner Jacob deGrom already has thrown off the mound this offseason and said everything felt normal after missing most of his first two seasons with the Texas Rangers because of elbow surgery.

The three starts deGrom got to make last September were significant for him.

“That way I could treat it like a normal offseason and not feel like I was in rehab mode the whole time,” he said Saturday during the team’s annual Fan Fest. “So that’s what this offseason has been, you know, normal throwing. Been off the mound already and everything feels good.”

The 36-year-old right-hander said he would usually wait until Feb. 1 before throwing, but he started earlier this week so he could ramp up a bit slower going into spring training.

deGrom has started only nine games for the Rangers since signing a \$185 million, five-year contract in free agency two winters ago. They

won all six starts he made before the end of April during his 2023 debut with the team before the surgery. After rehabbing most of last year, he was 3-0 with a 1.69 ERA and 14 strikeouts over 10 2/3 innings in those three September starts.

“One of the things I’m most excited about is a healthy season from Jacob, and for our fans to see what that looks like, and how good he is,” Rangers president of baseball operations Chris Young said. “It’s just electric, and coming to the ball-

park every day that he’s pitching, knowing that we’ve got a great chance to win the game, it’s an exciting feeling. Our fans truly haven’t experienced that over the course of a season. We’re excited and hopeful that this is the year they get to see that.”

Since his back-to-back Cy Young Awards with the New York Mets in 2018 and 2019, deGrom hasn’t made more than 15 starts in a season. He started 12 times during the COVID-19-shortened 60-game season in 2020.

DeGrom had a ca-

reer-low 1.08 ERA over 92 innings in 2021 before missing the final three months with right forearm tightness and a sprained elbow, then was shut down late during spring training in 2022 because of a stress reaction in his right scapula. He went 5-4 with a 3.08 ERA in 11 starts over the last two months of that season before becoming a free agent.

His fastball touched 98 mph in the last of his three starts last season, when he pitched four innings of one-run ball against the Los Angeles Angels.

“In those games, you know, it’s still a thought in the back of your mind, you just came back from a major surgery and you probably don’t get another one at my age,” he said. “So it was, hey, is everything good? And then like I said, was able to check those boxes off in this off-season, treat it normal.”

Now deGrom feels like he can start pitching again without worrying about being injured.

“Just throw the ball to the target and not think about anything,” he said. “So, yeah, I think I can get back to where I was.”

It came while the university is still investigating a Sept. 27 Title IX complaint against head coach Todd Golden that includes allegations of sexual exploitation, sexual harassment and stalking, according to copies of the complaint.

None of it seemed to af-

fect Florida with Texas (12-6, 1-4) visiting the O'Connell Center for the first time since 1996. The Gators made eight 3-pointers and outrebounded the Longhorns by eight.

The SEC's leading scorer, Tre Johnson, led Texas with 16 points on 6-of-15 shooting.

'Underdogs' Howard, Leonard will put friendship on hold in CFP title game

ATLANTA — It was one night last June when Will Howard and Riley Leonard stayed up late bonding over talk about their families, faith and what life might have in store for them.

"Genuine conversation," Leonard said Saturday.

Howard and Leonard first met two summers ago at the Manning Passing Academy but didn't really get to know each other until seven months ago when they were assigned to be roommates at the prestigious quarterback camp in Thibodaux, Louisiana.

"We were both kind of underdogs when we met two years ago at the Manning camp, and a lot of people kind of counted us out," Leonard said. "So to be where we are now, it kind of turns that conversation into something really cool."

Where they are now is in Atlanta preparing to play in Monday night's College Football Playoff championship game — Howard for Ohio State and Leonard for Notre Dame.

Shared experiences tend to draw friends closer together, and they've had a few. They've dealt with injuries. They've gone through the process of transferring from schools on the outside looking in during the race for national championships to schools long established in the college football hierarchy. Both brought lots of experience; neither would be considered a star.

While Howard led Kan-

sas State to the 2022 Big 12 championship, his biggest postseason honor with the Wildcats was second team all-conference in 2023.

"I didn't know too much about Will," Ohio State offensive lineman Donovan Jackson said. "I didn't really dive into K-State tape like that, but once I watched him a little bit and once he came in and started showing his leadership and how he took hold of the offense, I knew we were going to be all right."

Leonard's career was on the rise at Duke in 2022. He led the Blue Devils to nine wins and joined LSU's Jayden Daniels and North Carolina's Drake Maye as the only quarterbacks that season with at least 2,900 yards passing and 695 yards rushing.

A 4-0 start in 2023 began with an attention-grabbing win over Clemson. Then things spiraled. He injured his ankle against, of all teams, Notre Dame and his season ended two

games later when he injured his toe against Louisville.

Both quarterbacks said they left their original schools to grow as players and see if they could win a national championship. They said the more lucrative name, image and likeness opportunities at Ohio State and Notre Dame were not big factors, though both said they appreciated the extra money.

Howard has been the Buckeyes' starter from the beginning, navigating the one-point loss at Oregon and another crushing defeat to Michigan. Ohio State's offense has elevated its game in the CFP, with the exception of the middle part of the semifinal against Texas. In the first three playoff games, Howard completed 73.8% of his passes for 919 yards with six touchdowns and two interceptions.

"If you were to ask an 18- or 19-year-old Will Howard if he would be at

Ohio State playing for the national championship, he'd probably say you're crazy, man," Howard said. "You've got to continue to believe in yourself no matter what, adapt and change. That was one of the biggest stories of my career, dealing with adversity, dealing with success."

Leonard has led the Irish on a grinding path through the playoff, a run that has extended their winning streak to 13 games. He has completed 67% of his passes for 514 yards and three TDs, with three interceptions. He also has run 43 times for 145 yards and two scores. His signature play was his dive over a Georgia defender for a crucial third-down conversion in the second round.

"He's a guy that in the most crucial moments wants the ball in his hands, and he wants to make a play, and most of the time he does," Irish coach Marcus Freeman said.

So here Howard and Leonard are, seven months removed from four nights as roomies to squaring off against each other in the biggest game of their lives.

"To see where we are now, it's really cool because he's a person I respect a lot," Leonard said. "I always try to root for other quarterbacks in college, especially after I meet them at that camp, because you realize we're all just dudes, all just kids trying to play the best for our teams and our universities."

Notre Dame AD thinks there's a chance for seeding tweak in CFP

ATLANTA — Notre Dame's athletic director said "I think there's a chance" for tweaks to the way the College Football Playoff awards byes next year — an issue that will be discussed this weekend but that would need unanimous approval from the 10 conferences and the Fighting Irish.

Speaking at media day Saturday in advance of the national title game, Pete Bevacqua, in his first year guiding the Notre Dame athletic department, called the premiere of the 12-team playoff "a wonderful success, but look at who you're talking to."

Notre Dame will try for its first title since 1988 on Monday when it plays Ohio State.

The current format awards automatic spots in the tournament to the five best-ranked conference champions, and gives byes to the top four. The system was devised before the collapse of the Pac-12 that reduced the number of power conferences from five to four.

The result this year was that Boise State and Arizona State each leapfrogged several teams in the rankings to earn first-round byes. Both lost their first games, as did No. 1 Oregon and No.

2 Georgia.

Southeastern Conference commissioner Greg Sankey has said he hopes there's interest in changing the seeding formula before next season, while also acknowledging the difficulty of getting the group of 10 conference commissioners and Bevacqua to all agree.

For his part, Bevacqua sounded hopeful, and expected the topic to come up at a meeting Sunday.

"I think there's a chance," he said. "I think everyone wants what's best for the overall system."

Bevacqua did not indicate that any change in the seeding structure should include giving Notre Dame a chance at one of those byes. Part of the agreement struck when the playoff expanded gave the Fighting Irish \$12 million starting in 2026 simply for being part of the CFP system. It also blocked their chance of receiving a bye since they are not part of a conference.

The AD said if conference title games go away, as some have suggested they should, "then I think we absolutely have to relook at Notre Dame's ability to get a bye if we're one of the top four teams."

Call to action in honor of MLK Jr.

It is important for individuals of good will and compassion to Do Something in honor of Dr. King. There are important ways in which communities can “do something” as well. The City of Morgantown has taken some major steps in recent decades to support both the human rights and civil rights of its citizens in the spirit of Martin Luther King, Jr.

In 2001, the Monongahela Valley Community Coalition for Social Justice called upon the City of Morgantown to establish a Human Rights Commission. The City did so. Like other West Virginia communities, Morgantown tried to mirror the role of the State Human Rights Commission on the local level. That meant that the local commission was expected to investigate, adjudicate and generate down-stream solutions to human rights violations after they had occurred. However, no problems were reported that could not better be addressed by the State Human Rights Commission and its superior resources. And so, after three meetings the Morgantown commission became inactive.

In 2006, the National League of Cities, under the leadership of its new president at the time, Jim Hunt from Clarksburg, W.Va., began an “Inclusive Cities Campaign” across America to help municipalities address racial divisions. The idea of an “Inclusive City” was picked-up by several city councilors in Morgantown, and so in 2012 with the help of the Community Coalition for Social Justice, the seven member Morgantown Human Rights Commission was reconstituted. While the City Human Rights Commission could refer civil rights violations to the State Commission, its primary purpose was to help Morgantown become a more inclusive community. It did so by promoting human rights awareness and working to prevent human rights abuses from occurring.

This different vision created a foundation for a new beginning for the City Human Rights Commission. During the decade from 2012 to 2022, the commission generated a non-discrimination ordinance relating to employment, housing and public accommodations which required an amendment to Article 153 of the City Code.

The commission also generated a proposed antibullying ordinance, a CROWN ordinance prohibiting discrimination related to hairstyle/texture, and a youth mental health protection ordinance banning what is known as “conversion therapy.” The City Council adopted each of these proposed legislative changes.

In addition, the City Council adopted 12 resolutions generated by the commission during the decade which related to diverse topics such as nondiscrimination in terms of marriage equality, living and employment arrangements for LGBTQ, supporting Just Transitions for Coal Workers, Compliance with Housing Disability Standards for persons with disabilities, and authorization of an “Open to All” campaign relating to access to public locations. The commission also called for the establishment of a Minority Liaisons Coordinating Council, Welcoming Statements for the City, a Civilian Police Review and Advisory Board, and a Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion Plan for the City.

There has been no city staff assigned to work with the Human Rights Commission except

for occasional communications, but the commission is permitted to request assistance from the City Attorney’s office when needed. The commission researches issues and best practices, develops its own agendas, prepares and disseminates minutes, and creates documents for distribution to City Council. Any resident interested in volunteering for the commission can reach out. A digital orientation manual is available on the city website for interested persons as well as members.

Each December, the commission participates in observing International Human Rights Day originally established by Eleanor Roosevelt. As part of the observation, the commission and the City Council honor a local organization and a local citizen for service relating to human rights. The organization honored this year was the Morgantown Area Youth Service project. The citizen award recipient is Eve Faulkes. Eve, an illustrator, compiled the graphic novel; “West Virginians’ Experiences in Civil Rights.” This book, available locally and on Amazon, shows graphically as well as with personal descriptions,

why community engagement still matters.

Martin Luther King Jr. Day is an ideal time to reflect on the work that has been done across the nation and locally and the work we still need to do. The work of the Morgantown Human Rights Commission continues. Citizens are encouraged to apply for openings in its membership for 2025. Commission meetings are usually held on the third Thursday of the month at 6:30 p.m. at a City’s Public Safety Building conference room. Confirmation for each month’s meeting dates and times can be accessed at morgantownwv.gov.

The Community Coalition for Social Justice will be holding a Zoom event on Monday, Jan. 20, in celebration of Dr. King and the work that he has inspired. The registration link is: <https://bit.ly/41JeSJM>. Persons must register to receive the link for the Zoom program.

Day reminds us of King’s dream

Monday may be the official celebration of Martin Luther King Jr. Day in the U.S., but Jan. 15 marked the 96th anniversary of his birth.

Though King wasn’t yet 40 years old when he was gunned down in Memphis, he and others of his era inspired generations to continue the fight for civil rights, for change, for us to be the best version of ourselves. And each year, on the official holiday honoring his legacy, we are reminded of how very far we have to go.

The National Constitution Center says Martin Luther King Jr. Day “honors the total legacy of King; focuses on the issue of civil rights; highlights the use of nonviolence to promote change; and calls people into public service.”

But before he spoke in front of the Lincoln Memorial about his dreams, King talked about all men having been guaranteed the unalienable rights of life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness.

King reminded us that the American dream was to “rise up and live out the true meaning of its creed: We hold these truths to be self-evident, that all men are created equal.”

“I have a dream that one day every valley shall be exalted, every hill and mountain shall be made low, the rough places will be made plain, and the crooked places will be made straight, and the glory of the Lord shall be revealed, and all flesh shall see it together,” King shouted.

King wasn’t perfect. We’re not perfect either. But through his march was cut short, ours must go on.

For many, this country is, still, the Promised Land. Let’s use this MLK Jr. Day to remember it is up to us, now, to make sure it is truly so. For everyone.

Is the Electoral College still relevant?

Point: The Electoral College protects minority views, discourages fraud

The Framers of the U.S. Constitution designed a unique system to choose our president in 1787: the Electoral College. More than two centuries later, it remains an invaluable institution that helps safeguard us against the tyranny of the majority and vote fraud.

Back then, it was experimental. The notion of an elected chief executive was novel — unheard of, even. At first, the Framers didn't agree on what to do. Some wanted Congress to pick the president. Others wanted to vest that power with the states by having state legislatures determine the nation's chief executive. And still others favored a national popular vote. Making matters worse, the debate was embroiled in the politics of the terrible institution of slavery.

Yet, the men of the Constitutional Convention in Philadelphia, representing their respective states, shared a distrust of executive power in the wake of a hard-fought war for independence from Great Britain. The Electoral College became the compromise that won ratification of the Constitution.

Every state is allotted electoral votes equivalent to the number of representatives it has in Congress. On Election Day, voters cast a vote for a slate of delegates affiliated with a corresponding candidate on the ballot. Whichever candidate wins a majority vote in that state, the corresponding delegates later cast all the state's electoral votes for that candidate.

Citizens and lawmakers periodically call for scrapping the Electoral College (often just after they have lost an election) in favor of a popular vote. This change would require amending the Constitution. That would be a catastrophic mistake for our democratic republic because the complex Electoral College system is integral to safeguarding the voice of minority populations and deterring election fraud.

In elections, candidates campaign where the votes are. A national election decided by a national popular vote would encourage candidates to spend most of their time in densely packed population centers like New York, Miami, Los Angeles and Chicago. Those candidates would steer clear of rural areas or other low-density locales, and the values and interests of those minority populations would go unheard. A president would

be disproportionately beholden to the values and interests of the most populous regions of our republic.

Another strong argument favoring the Electoral College, perhaps unfamiliar to most citizens, is that it confines problems like contentious recounts or fraud within state boundaries. The notorious recount fiasco in Florida in 2000, for example, was indeed a lesser problem than the prospect of a nationwide recount would have been. For weeks, the news was dominated by political drama and litigation. The election results weren't even determined until five weeks after Election Day. Imagine a national version of the Florida recount ... every four years.

And consider that no matter how many fraudulent votes for president sprout up in one state, under the Electoral College system, that fraud cannot spill over into the vote results for other states.

The election of Lyndon B. Johnson to the Senate in 1948, understood as fraudulent today, illustrates this point. The decisive runoff election took a week to resolve as the Democratic State Central Committee counted votes. Somehow, day after day, new batches of votes in far-off counties emerged. Johnson was announced the winner by 87 votes out of 988,295.

Johnson's margin lay in 200 additional ballots, reported six days after the election. All those ballots were associated with a list of voter signatures at the very end of the voter rolls. This list of 200 names, in alphabetical order, was all written with the same pen and all with the same handwriting.

Counting the votes is at the center of every election. The bigger the number of votes, the more possibilities for fraud. Imagine the dynamics of LBJ-style voter fraud in a national election.

Three Democratic senators — Brian Schatz of Hawaii, Dick Durbin of Illinois and Peter Welch of Vermont — proposed a constitutional amendment to abolish the Electoral College system, touting the "simple" notion that "the person who gets the most votes should win."

Simple? Yes. Fair, equitable and safe from fraud? No.

Counterpoint: The Electoral College must be reformed

How we elect our presidents has never been more broken — and that's saying something for an Electoral College system subject to more proposed constitutional amendments than any other topic. We urgently need popular vote elections that treat every voter equally — and can do so by 2028.

When Congress recently certified the presidential election, it was based on the votes of 538 faceless electors, not the people. Those electors were selected according to laws that partisans in 48 states have ensured the awarding of 100 percent of electors to the candidate with the most votes in that state. Because of these laws, campaigns ignore states where the outcome is certain — which today means 44 of our 51 states (counting the Districts of Columbia).

In 2020 and 2024, 19 of every 20 presidential campaign events occurred in Arizona, Georgia, Michigan, Nevada, Pennsylvania or Wisconsin. The concerns of Americans in spectator states aren't relevant to campaigns and are under-served between elections. Because only swing states matter, five presidents have assumed office after losing the popular vote.

The yawning gap between swing and spectator states destroys common Electoral College defenses. Less populous states are ignored, with Nevada the only battleground among the 31 smallest states. Most rural Americans haven't cast a meaningful vote for president in their lifetimes.

Big-city voters should matter, too, but they won't decide popular vote elections more than anyone else. That explains why Republicans since 2000 have won gubernatorial elections in 49 states and how Donald Trump comfortably won the popular vote in 2024.

Having seven predictable swing states incentivizes fraud and divisive litigation. Trump lost in 2020 by 7 million votes, but he could claim fraud because a shift of merely 21,461 swing state voters would have reversed the outcome. In 2024, Trump won by 2,284,338 votes, but he would have lost with a shift of 115,000 voters.

Minor parties affect presidential elections far more than in other elections, with the decisive swing state winning without a majority in five of our last nine elections. With operatives cynically weaponizing voter choice, expect increasing shenanigans involving minor parties if swing states don't join Alaska and Maine in protecting ma-

majority rule with ranked-choice voting.

The Electoral College gets even worse when candidates fall short of 270 electoral votes, as can happen with an Electoral College tie or if independents win states. Imagine the chaos if Congress decided the presidency, with the House electing the president and the Senate able to pick a different party's vice president.

The status of being a spectator state is nearly cemented. Consider that Republicans hold all 48 Senate seats in the spectator states won by Donald Trump but only one in the 19 states he lost. Democrats hold 198 of the 200 House seats with a partisan index favoring them by at least 4 percent, while Republicans have 213 of 216 seats comparably favoring them. With such predictable outcomes, don't expect a new swing state in 2028.

Yet, we can take action. Barely a century ago, Americans amended the Constitution to establish Senate elections and enfranchise women. In 1969, the House overwhelmingly approved an amendment abolishing the Electoral College. It's time for a robust debate about a popular vote amendment and whether it should strengthen voting rights, allow citizens in the territories to vote, and uphold majority rule with ranked-choice voting.

States don't have to wait. Seventeen states and the District of Columbia have passed laws joining the National Popular Vote compact, which is grounded in constitutional provisions giving states exclusive control over how to award electoral votes and the power to bind their agreements. The popular vote compact establishes that once the law in states with a majority of electors, participating states will award their electoral votes to the winner of the national popular vote in all 50 states and D.C. We can have a popular vote election as soon as 2028 if just a few more states join the compact by initiative or if it wins legislatively in states where at least one chamber has passed it.

History shows that Americans can do anything when duty calls. Let's live up to our proud tradition by reforming the Electoral College.

Will Trump get credit for Biden's successes?

Trump will try to take credit for the Biden economy. Don't let him. And don't let Republican enablers of Trump or the media give him credit, either.

In 2017, Trump inherited a strong economy from President Obama and never stopped congratulating himself for it. He claimed that "we created the greatest economy in the history of the world."

Rubbish. Trump tanked the economy with his trade wars and his botched pandemic response.

On Friday, the Department of Labor reported that the nation added 256,000 jobs in December, significantly more than economists expected.

The total number of jobs created under Biden's four years is 16.6 million. That makes him the only president in history to have presided over an economy that created jobs every single month.

He has also presided over the lowest average unemployment rate of any president in a half-century, ending at 4.1 percent.

The nation gained more jobs in Biden's four years than it did under Trump's first term of office, or under either of Barack Obama's or George W. Bush's terms of office.

Working-age women are now employed at record levels.

The gap in employment between Black Americans and their white counterparts is at the lowest level ever.

Biden has also presided over an economy that has grown faster and created more jobs than any other advanced economy around the world. Under Biden, the American economy grew

faster than did the pre-pandemic Trump economy.

Yes, the United States and every other country had to deal with inflation, but Biden brought inflation down to below 3%—lower than in most other countries.

Americans have every reason to be outraged at decades of policies that prioritized corporations over people. But the Biden administration cracked down on corporate price-gouging, monopolization, and trickle-down nonsense.

All this means that Trump begins his second presidency with the best economy a president has inherited in living memory.

Will he claim credit for it? You betcha.

In addition, some of the most important Biden initiatives will start to pay off only during the Trump presidency (assuming Trump doesn't reverse them).

Biden took on Big Pharma by capping out-of-pocket drug costs for millions of seniors on Medicare. That lowered the price of 64 drugs. These changes will take place throughout 2025. More drugs are scheduled to get cheaper in the following years.

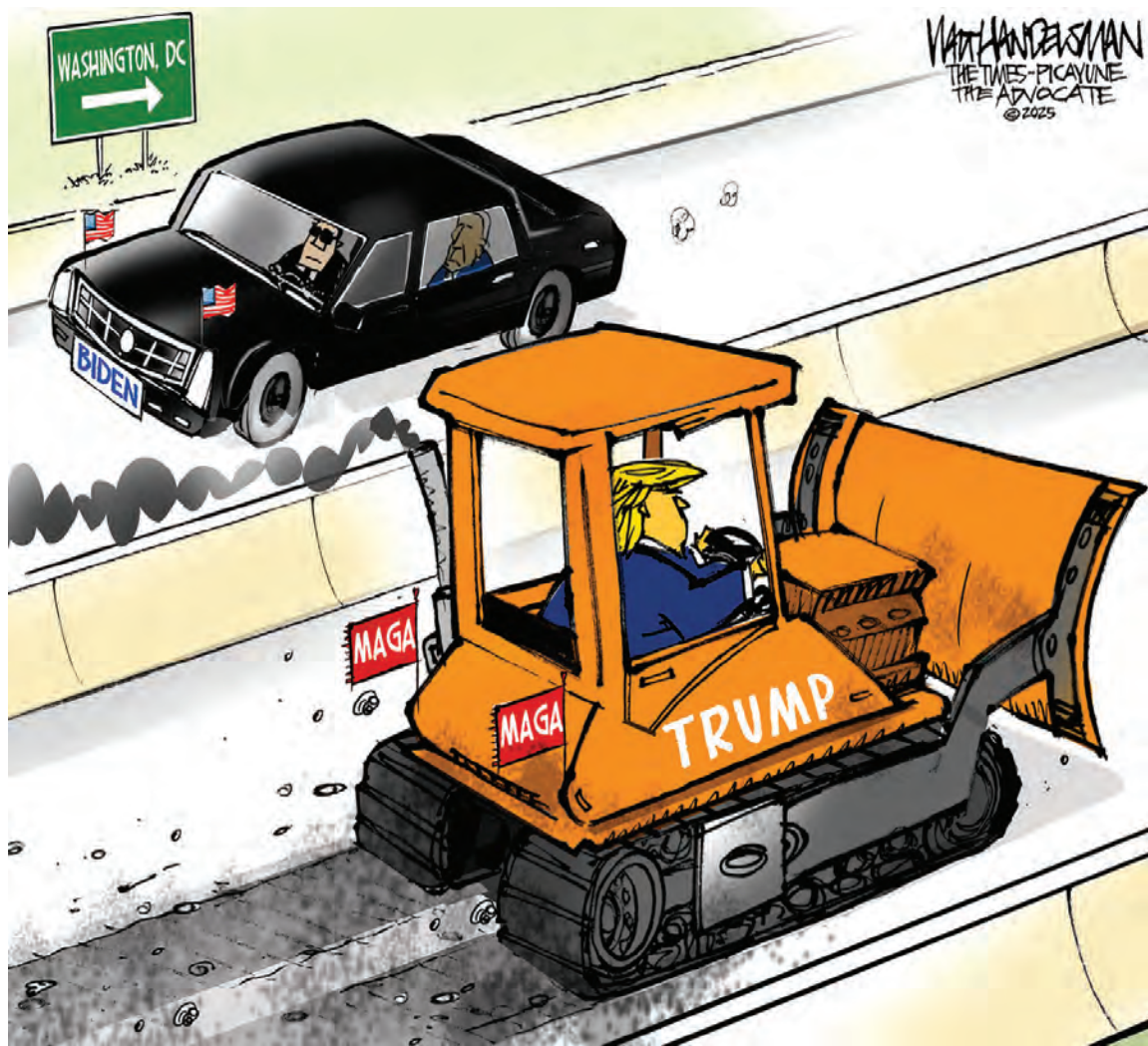
Will Trump claim credit? Of course he will.

Biden's infrastructure law will give us better roads, bridges, public transit, and broadband access. But most Americans won't see those improvements for a year or two, well into Trump's term of office.

Biden's CHIPS and Science Act will provide more American-made semiconductors, but

we won't see them for a few years, so during Trump's presidency.

Biden's clean energy initiatives will also pay off with greater fuel efficiency and less pollution. But here again, not for several years.

Will Trump claim credit for these successes as well? Do birds fly?

His whole life, Trump has taken credit for things he simply inherited, starting with his own

personal fortune.

Just as he avoids accountability for the bad stuff he's done, such as his attempted coup against the United States, he congratulates himself for the good stuff others have done.

If Trump doesn't wreck the economy with his bonkers tariff plans or cruel mass deportations, you can be sure he'll take a bow for what Biden built.

Don't let him. Don't let Republican politicians claim cred-

it. Don't let the media allow Trump or other Republicans to claim credit. Speak out. Remind America that these good things happened because of Joe Biden.

I REMEMBER WHEN THE MOST COMMON FORM OF ARTIFICIAL INTELLIGENCE WAS A 20-YEAR-OLD PHILOSOPHY MAJOR waxing wise on the meaning of life.

There was nothing real about that sophomore-year acumen.

Since then, a few things have changed, and there's a new kind of know-it-all on the block.

On your computer, in your phone, cuing up your tunes when you tell it to.

Still, it's a good example of one of the many ways AI is all around us now, whether we like it or not.

To get used to it, I've taken to having little chats with Claude, an AI system from Anthropic. Sometimes I practice conversations I foresee in my future. Occasionally, I ask it to analyze information for me. Recently, I asked it for some out-of-the-box ideas for tofu, just for the heck of it.

And while using tofu as a substitute for bread isn't the smartest suggestion I've ever heard, ol' Claude did know about throwing the silken version into a smoothie or using it to make pseudo-ricotta.

"Try blending silken tofu with nutritional yeast, herbs, and a touch of lemon juice. It works beautifully in lasagna or stuffed shells."

I have actually done this in the past and can attest that it is, indeed, delightful.

Nice work, new large language model buddy.

Now if only you could get in the kitchen and make it for me.

So far, though, I have to admit, the thing I enjoy most about Claude's and my relationship is how darn supportive he is all the time. When we do practice discussions, he goes out of his way to praise me, and break down all the ways in which I just crushed my end of the conversation.

"Excellent response!," he'll say, before offering an annotated list of all the things I did right, while also offering suggestions for improvement -- but very politely.

It's a far cry from the "lol" I get from my real-life best friend in reply when I ask for her opinion about, well, almost anything.

So I had to know: What was his verdict on this column?

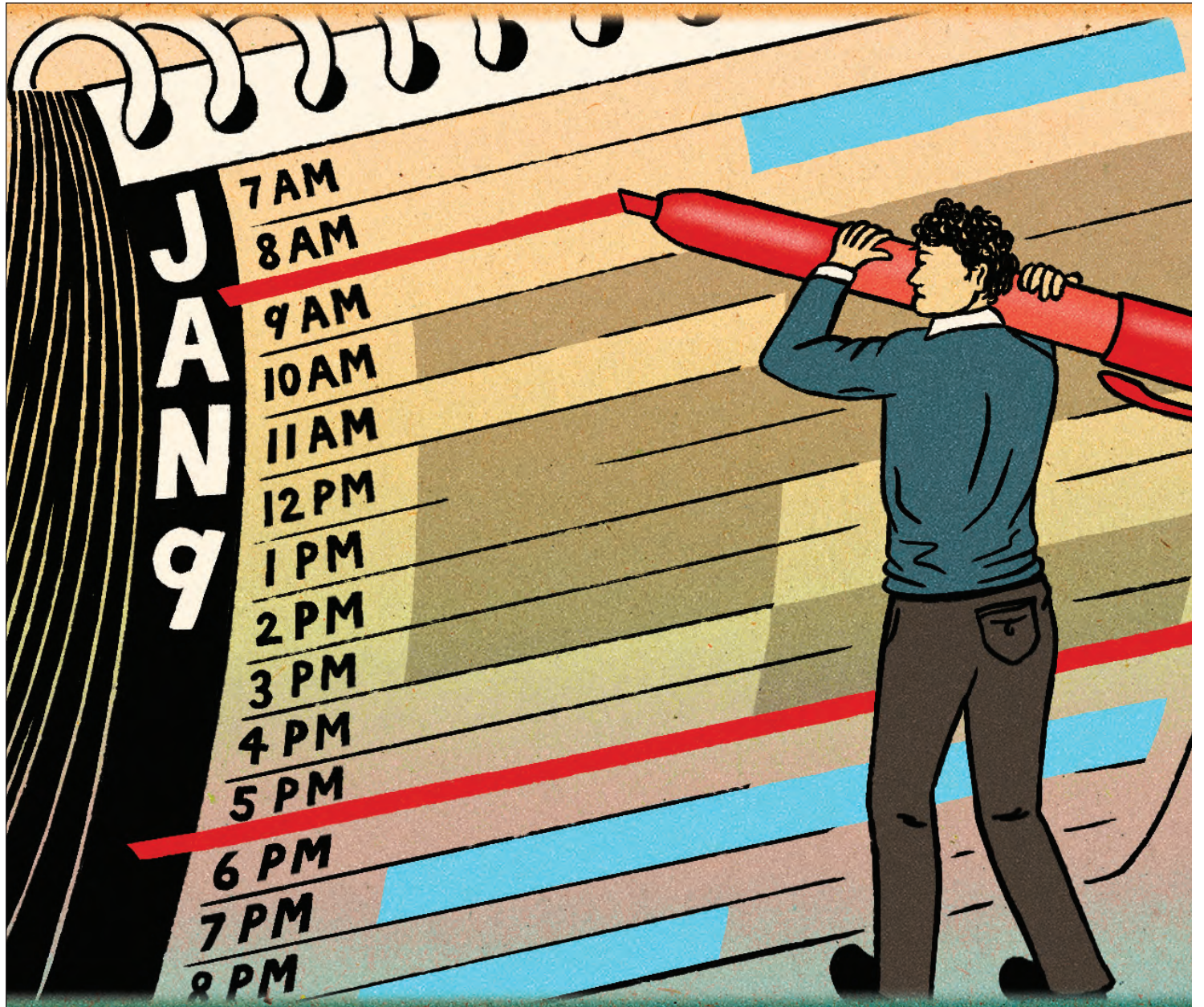
Aw, thanks, Claude. I'll take that.

Working Well

Saying no is hard, but setting boundaries can improve your health

NEW YORK — When Justin Stewart started his career, he juggled several jobs to make ends meet. He poured himself into his full-time role as a news show production assistant from 3 a.m. until noon. Then he rushed to the airport where he rented cars or to the big box stores where he pulled retail shifts.

Sometimes, he slept in his car between jobs. Then he was hospitalized for exhaustion and a staph infection.

"While people around me praised my hustle, I eventually paid the price," Stewart said. "The doctor looked at me and said, 'I don't know what lifestyle you're living, but you're too young to be this stressed. You're going to have to quit something.'"

So Stewart, now 36, began setting boundaries. He gave up the side jobs, deciding he could survive without extra income. If people from the news show texted him after-hours, he let them know he was off-duty and where else to call.

Setting boundaries at work, and in life, can be tricky. Many people find it difficult to say no, especially to a manager. Some get a sense of satisfaction from being needed or pleasing others.

But learning to turn down a request or invitation is essential for protecting our physical and mental health, experts say. And as with any new skill, drawing boundaries gets easier with practice.

Experts in well-being and organizational behavior, along with other workers, shared strategies for setting limits.

Schedule aggressively

Adding tasks to your calendar may seem counterintui-

tive if scaling back is the goal, but can provide more control over your time.

Bobby Dutton, the founder of event production company GBM6, uses a technique he calls "aggressive calendaring." He schedules the task he's most likely to procrastinate on, such as handling contracts and invoices, for every Monday at 2 p.m. To keep his calendar from becoming overloaded, he also books time for recurring routine tasks like making coffee, walking the dog and eating lunch.

Write a script

If you're unaccustomed to saying no, you can write down what you're going to say beforehand and rehearse it. Stewart worked on letting colleagues know when his assignment load began feeling too heavy with phrases like "Hey, this is a lot for me" or "You gave me seven stories, I think I can get four or five done."

Cara Houser, a workplace engagement coach, says you don't have to explain yourself when declining a request.

You can simply say you're not available at that time, followed by "Thanks for asking, and I hope to have more capacity next time."

If the recipient of your "no" tries to argue, you can respond, "I hear you feel that way. But for me, this is what I've decided to do for that day," Houser said.

Entrepreneur Amber Krasinski grew up in a working-class environment where saying no to a boss could mean losing a paycheck. As the founder of marketing company IvyHill Strategies, Krasinski worries she'll lose clients if she turns down a project. "Not yet" is her go-to phrase when one more project is too much. "That phrase has helped me through a lot of situations," she said.

Know your limits

It can be tempting to agree immediately when we're asked to chip in. But there may be times when we're better off demurring. When faced with a new work request, take five minutes to assess your

workload, energy level and priorities before responding, suggests Israa Nasir, a psychotherapist in New York.

Nasir says a former boss frequently texted work-related questions at 10 p.m. on Fridays and Saturdays. "I didn't say, 'Don't text me,'" she recalled. "I said, 'Can we check in on Fridays before the weekend? So everything that's on your mind, you can (tell me) and then I can plan my time accordingly.'"

Pay attention to the activities and interactions that leave you feeling drained or overwhelmed, Nasir said. Put those kinds of events on a "No List." The list doesn't mean you decline every time you're asked, but don't say yes right away, she advises.

Harness technology

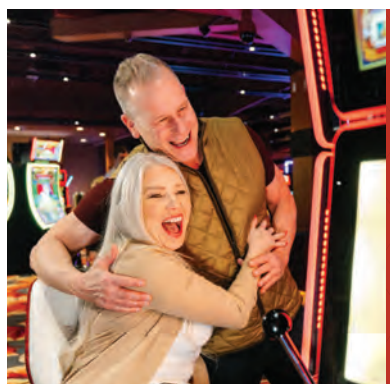
Mobile devices make it easier to work from anywhere, and harder to draw boundaries. But there are ways to adjust our devices so they're less distracting.

After noticing that she checked email far too frequently on weekends, Nasir started moving the Gmail app from her iPhone's homepage to the second page from Friday night to Sunday night.

An email signature is another tool you can use to manage expectations, by publishing working hours or upcoming vacation schedules, said Candice Pokk, a senior consultant in organizational effectiveness at Segal.

Pokk includes a "Well Being Notice" at the bottom of her emails which reads, "Receiving this email outside normal working hours? Managing a work-life balance is unique for everyone. I have sent this email at a time that works for me. Please respond at a time

THE ABOVE QUOTE BY GEORGE HERBERT, HOLDS A WEALTH OF MEANING. I have always disliked the old, worn adage, "You can't teach an old dog new tricks." Pierre learns new tricks almost daily. He recently figured out how to open a lidded kitchen trash can that resided in a low closed cupboard. First he managed to open the cupboard, then he proceeded to figure out how to open the trash can by pressing on the lid button. Certainly, I am not comparing you, gentle reader, or myself to a dog, but the implication of that adage

is that dogs and humans are unable to learn much in their elder years.

A recent AARP study reports the following: "55% of Americans age 45 and older are actively learning new things." This and other studies have shown many benefits for lifelong learning. that works for you."

Choose meetings wisely

If you're unsure it's worthwhile to attend, you can request an agenda in advance, or ask what is



the desired outcome, she said.

Give a time frame

Publisher Lori Perkins, 65, was working 12 to 16 hours daily when a cancer diagnosis halted her routine. During chemotherapy, she could only muster up enough energy

to put in four hours a day, and even then felt like she was working "in a vat of molasses."

After treatment, "I realized I was going to live, and then I said to myself, 'Do I want to continue doing this?'" Perkins said.

She now caps her work as owner of Riverdale Avenue Books at about 50 hours per week, and as a result can't review as many manuscripts. Instead of sending rejection letters, she tells authors to come back in three to six months when it's less hectic.

She practices saying "no" in her head in her journal, where she also chronicles what happened after she said it. She's gained time to visit museums, friends and the theater.

"No changed my life," Perkins said. "I am a different person than I was before I really learned to embrace no."

THE GOD SQUAD

Faith versus works

Q: I read your column every week in Newsday. I was particularly interested in a question from M in Gainesville about faith being more important than works. My 12 years of Catholic education didn't include too much Bible study, but I know "faith without works is dead." Had to look up James 2:14-26 NKJV. "By their fruits you shall know them." Matthew 7:15-20 NKJV is still true for me. What do you think? - (From V in Douglaston, NY)

A: I am from a big "works" religion. Judaism regards as a sin only an errant act and not an errant thought or belief. So, I wish Father Tom were here to offer his learned and kind view on this big question of faith. I can, however, tell you what he taught me.

The issue of faith and works is the issue of what happens to our souls if we do not do what God wants from us. God obviously wants us to do good works in the world. The Gospel of Matthew understood this as you pointed out. We are formed by our deeds and those deeds define our virtue. All this is obvious, and all this is taught by both Judaism and Christianity. The question that divided our sister faiths is the question of what happens when we fail to do good? Sin is the opposite of virtue and all of us sin because none of us, except the saintly or what Buddhist call a Buddha, are able to live a perfect life. This was the fundamental religious problem of Paul. He wanted to be saved. He knew that good works

(mitzvot in Hebrew) were the way to secure a place in Heaven (olam habah in Hebrew) but he did not believe that he could observe all the elements of the law (works) so he felt trapped, "The law taught me sin." (Romans 7:7)

Paul's solution, and ultimately the teaching of all branches of Christianity, was faith in the atoning death of Jesus whose sacrifice redeemed all sinners from the consequences of their sin. "But these are written so that you may come to believe that Jesus is the Messiah, the Son of God, and that through believing you may have life in his name." (John 20:31)

The necessity of faith for salvation also is taught by John in the famous 14:6, "I am the way, and the truth, and the life. No one comes to the Father except through me". The problem with all fideisms is the one that is bothering you, dear V. If faith in Jesus as the Messiah sent by God to atone for the sin of Adam and all subsequent sins is completely effective in atoning for sins; what is to prevent a person from wantonly sinning and then repenting suddenly and getting "washed clean in the blood of the lamb" by professing faith? The result of this theological loophole is that works mean nothing because bad works can be wiped clean in an instant.

The solution to the problem of faith and works begins by digging deeper into what Christians mean by faith. Faith for Christians is not accepting a biographical detail about the life of Jesus. Faith is a transformation of one's life through faith in Christ. If one does not change one's life at all

then their faith is not real. If their faith does indeed change their life, then a life of willful sinning is impossible because all one's efforts will be devoted to sharing the gospel and witnessing through love and kindness the grace of God through Christ.

The other side of this big question is also interesting and that is works without faith. The first problem of works without faith is the benevolent atheist. What is the religious view of people who do good but do not believe in God? Because of the teaching of John that the only way to the Father is through Me, Christianity has had to struggle with righteous non-believers which included righteous members of religions other than Christianity. I will deal with this in a future big question column but in brief it comes down to these options which various denominations of Christianity have embraced:

- Righteous people who never heard the Gospel are saved. They did not reject the Gospel. They just never had the opportunity to accept it. (Romans 10:13-17)
- Righteous Jews are saved because of their prior covenant with God. (Nostra Aetate)
- Righteous people who have heard the Gospel and rejected it are not saved. (John 14:6)

Vacuum with baking soda and essential oil

One of his standout tips involves sprinkling baking soda on carpets or rugs to remove stains and neutralize odors. He takes it up a notch by adding a few drops of essential oils to cotton balls and placing them in the vacuum bin.

Remember to let the bak-

ing soda sit for 10 minutes before vacuuming. It undeniably works, leaving the room with a fresh, subtle scent from the oils. It's a simple trick but will make your vacuum routine enjoyable.

Baking soda paste for burnt pots and pans

A Time Magazine article revealed that spending on non-electric cookware and tableware jumped 33% from the first quarter of 2019 to the first quarter of 2024 based on data from the Bureau of Economic Analysis. Beyoncé at the Grammys: A timeline of artist's historic run

NEW YORK — Give Beyoncé a record and she'll break it.

When the 2025 Grammy Award nominations were announced, her genre-defying album "Cowboy Carter" led the nominations with 11.

That brought Beyoncé's career total nominations to a whopping 99, making her the most nominated artist in Grammys history. Another amazing feat: "Cowboy Carter" tied Michael Jackson's "Thriller" for the most nominated release.

She's also the most decorated artist, having earned 32 trophies across her career. Below, ahead of next month's show, dive into Beyoncé's legacy with the Grammys.

2000

Beyoncé attends the Grammys for the first time alongside the rest of her girl group, Destiny's Child: Michelle Williams, Kelly Rowland and Farrah Franklin. Franklin would soon leave the band — but not before receiving its first nominations. "Bills, Bills, Bills" from their second studio album, "The Writing's on the Wall," was up for rhythm & blues song and R&B performance by a duo or group with vocal.

2001

Now a trio, Beyoncé returns with Destiny's Child to collect her first of many Grammy wins. "Say My Name" earns them the award for R&B song and R&B performance by a duo or group with vocal. It's also nominated in two of the big four categories, for song and record of the year.

"Independent Women Part I" from "Charlie's Angels" also received a nom-

ination, for song written for a motion picture, television or other visual media.

also receives six nominations and wins three. Her self-titled album wins for surround sound album; "Drunk in Love" takes home R&B song and performance.

2017

Beyoncé's "Lemonade" — AP's pick for best album of the decade, a career-defining and culture-shifting release — earns her nine nominations and two wins, for urban contemporary album and music video, for "Formation." She loses out in three of the big four categories — album, song and record of the year — reinforcing some critics' belief that Beyoncé is routinely undercelebrated in the general field. Adele, who wins albums of the year, dedicates her speech to Beyoncé.

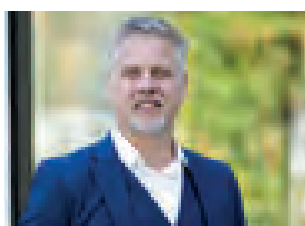

Architects are bringing nature home

By now, you may be familiar with biophilic design — it's the idea of integrating nature into design to enhance our connection to the environment. Sustainability, wellness and harmony are usually part of the deal.

Some architects and home designers are using one particular biophilic element to striking effect: trees.

We've already seen public spaces around the globe incorporate trees in remarkable and beautiful ways.

The Ford Foundation in New York boasts a 12-story-high atrium filled with magnolias, eucalyptus, jacaranda, cryptomeria, iron bark and pear trees. The Winter Garden atrium in lower Manhattan's Brookfield Place is home to 16 40-foot-tall Washingtonia palm trees. Singapore's

Jewel Changi airport features 2,500 trees — natives to Madagascar, Australia, Malaysia and Indonesia — in a 6-acre indoor forest with walking trails. If you're flight's delayed, lucky you.

Apartment complexes also have seen some striking examples of trees and other greenery incorporated into their design — the buildings are sometimes called "greenscrapers."

For instance, architect Stefano Boeri's Bosco Verticale in Milan is a 44-story tower with 800 trees and myriad shrubbery enveloping each unit. In the Netherlands, he built the Trudo Vertical Forest, a low-income apartment tower with trees growing on all four facades.

"Architects and designers are increasingly shrouding and softening the hard-edged stone and concrete planes of urban buildings with lush vegetation," says

London-based architecture and design writer Dominic Lutyens.

Private houses are also getting the arboreal love. In some, the tree's brought right indoors. In others, trees on the property are included as important partners in the home plan.

Whether it's building the home around an existing tree, planting one (or more) trees within the interior space, or simply giving the illusion of a woodland indoors, the aesthetic is green and gorgeous.

A Zen-like heart of the home

New York-based firm ODA Architecture created a penthouse home for a client in New Delhi that has a closed courtyard at its center with a reflecting pool and a ficus microcarpa tree. Raindrops land on the glass ceiling and are reflected in the

infinity-edged pool the tree resides in, truly giving an indoor/outdoor vibe.

Ryoko Okada, one of ODA's principals and its interior project director, says the firm brings the outdoors in — on a big scale like this, and on less ambitious projects — as often as they can.

"There's nothing more calming than being surrounded by nature. A living tree is a statement piece, and an art installation in itself," she says. "It'll bring you joy and peace, and as with a smaller houseplant, seeing it grow and evolve is regenerative."

The tree lives in multiple feet of soil and is supported to prevent damage to the home. The level below had high ceilings, which allowed the architects to drop the floor and establish space for the tree roots to grow.

organizers. These helpful gadgets are both budget-friendly and easy to install even for those who are less handy.

Framing the views with trees already there

KAA Design Group in Los Angeles created a modern home in Southern California that embraces the property's existing cork oaks, rare Torrey pines and magnolias. An impressive mature cork oak sits center stage. Leaving it in place took a bit of a sell, says one of the firm's founding partners, Grant Kirkpatrick.

"The client's perception was that this tree was too messy, and right in the middle of the property. We had to convince him that the tree is a 300-year-old antique that should be featured rather than removed," he said. "Once we developed the plan that literally embraces the tree, they understood."

The driveway, too, offers a Zen moment, with a black pine pruned in the Japanese niwaki style with more open branching, and a miniature rock garden emerging out of the paving like an organic sculpture.

On an upper floor, you can look out onto a grassy platform built around the gnarled branches of one of the oaks. Views out the sliding glass doors of the open-plan kitchen and dining area are framed by tree limbs, and the ocean is on the horizon.

There are ways to honor trees even if you don't have a live one

On a ranch property near Paso Robles, there'd been a fire in 2016. "It burnt several acres of the property and took some of the beautiful manzanita trees," says Kirkpatrick.

The team had recently visited the studios in Belgium of interior designer Axel Vervoordt, who's known for his "wabi," or Japanese minimalist style.

"We loved how they incorporated tree branches and other organic materials into their home space interiors," Kirkpatrick said. "Back at the ranch, we were inspired to take one of the (burnt) manzanitas, paint it flat black, and incorporate it (into the space)." It's now an eye-catching natural piece of art.

What to consider when making a tree part of your home plan

"We don't recommend planting full-size trees in

your home without consulting a landscape architect or other qualified specialist. A living tree will only thrive in the right environment, determined by region, access to light and air, and soil type. And it needs to be supported by proper infrastructure to stay alive and avoid home damage," says Okada.

"We also recommend doing thorough research on the tree's natural environment so that you're not attracting pests," she says.

Adds Kirkpatrick: "It can be tricky. At least 4 feet of soil depth is recommended. Plentiful natural light as well. The right tree for the right climate is important. And it needs to be accli-

mated in the area prior to planting."

The landscape teams of John Mini Distinctive Landscapes and Pahoek Palms, who installed the Brookfield Place palms, did just that: After the young trees were dug up in Florida, they spent some time under the protective cover of a 48-foot-high shade house, so they could adjust to light conditions in New York.

The palms in the Brookfield space need to be replaced every 10 years or so, because living indoors, they aren't exposed to elements, becoming weaker as they get taller. "Trees need to 'work out,'" says Anna Zarra Aldrich of the University of Connecticut's College of Agriculture, Health and Natural Resources. "For instance, gradually exposing a tree to more wind develops its resistance and makes it more resilient in a storm."

Once removed, the old trees are turned into mulch. Sixteen new Washingtonia Robusta palms are sourced in Florida, shipped up in groups of four by truck, and planted at Brookfield Place. The mulch is settled around native trees planted in their honor in places like serenity gardens at local hospitals.

Teal kitchen cabinetry is getting a big push in 2025 in spicing up spaces that were traditionally filled with white or stained wood cabinets.

White kitchen cabinets are so 2024. Here's what's new in 2025

Out with the old and in with the new. Interior design in 2025 is bringing in splashes of bold colors and warm metals and woods rather than the classic all-white kitchen and gray walls.

According to Sharon McCormick, of Sharon McCormick Design, the new year will bring a whole new personality to your home.

"Bold kitchen cabinet colors are replacing the all-white kitchen. Red, cobalt blue, teal, and mustard cabinets will be spicing up kitchens in 2025. Mixing these colors in with white or wood cabinetry is a great option for homeowners who are not 100% committed to floor-to-ceiling bright colors," she said.

Along with color, kitchens are in for a bit of a redesign in 2025. Banquette seating and comfortable chairs with dining tables are becoming more popular.

"2025 will usher in family-friendly eat-in kitchens with banquette seating, comfortable chairs, and dining tables for cozy, face-to-face conversations and a place to linger," McCormick said. "While islands are not going anywhere, the trend is to use them for meal prep or to incorporate a sink or appliance rather than for stools lined up in a row."

Stained wood is return-

ing for cabinetry as interior design goes toward warmth and natural materials.

"Oak, walnut, and maple are the preferred species with multiple stained finishes available from light to dark. To avoid disappointment, be sure to get a full sample door from your cabinet company for approval, as each type of wood takes stain differently," she said.

Also in 2025, it's time to look up in your home. Statement ceilings are beginning to replace boring, white paint.

"Wallpaper, painted motifs, metallics, decorative plaster, and lacquer are just some of the ways we can expect to adorn the 'fifth wall' in the coming year," McCormick said.

As far as metal fixtures go, warm metals including brass, bronze and copper are trending over the cooler chrome.

"The big story is masterfully mixing warm metals with silver finishes like nickel and chrome to add life and a bit of the unexpected to avoid cookie-cutter interiors," she said.

Avoiding cookie-cutter interiors is the main focus for where interior design is going. It's time for homeowners to have fun with their homes and put their own stamp on it rather than subscribing to a "typical" white or gray look.

Another main focus for design in the new year is bringing more nature and the outdoors inside.

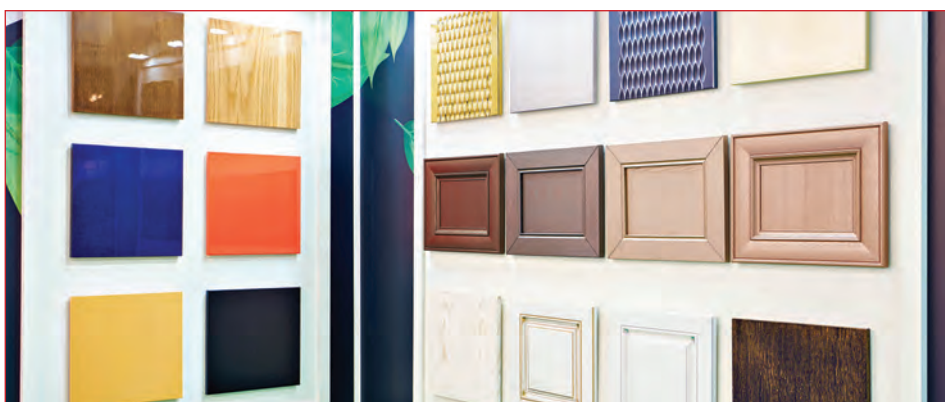
"Selecting colors from outside one's window is one of the easiest ways to accomplish the feeling of being one with nature," McCormick said. "Earthy tones like brown, beige, and terracotta work well with various hues of green and blue and create a calming effect. Decorating with artisanal objects made from wood, sisal rugs, and lots of plants add the finishing touches."

Paint manufacturers have begun releasing their Color of the Year. McCormick said shades of purple will be everywhere in 2025, from muted lilac to rich plums.

"Black is back, as is cobalt blue. Using these colors as accents in pillows, throws, rugs, and window treatments will instantly update a room and work very well with the abundance of gray furniture many had invested in," she said.

This is a continuance of "color drenching" that began in 2024 which consists of using the same color on a room's walls, woodwork and ceiling.

"The key to successfully using this technique is to use different sheens of the same color; for example satin on the walls, semi-gloss on woodwork, and flat on the ceiling. A lacquer finish can be used on any of the surfaces for added elegance and a 'wow' factor," McCormick said.

Millville, New Jersey, has unique glassmaking style

What cities come to mind when you think of glassmaking? Venice, Italy? Waterford, Ireland? Sandwich, Massachusetts? How about Millville, New Jersey? Millville had a thriving glass industry by the 1860s. Many glassworkers were immigrants, familiar with techniques like lampworking and millefiori that had been practiced around the Mediterranean for hundreds of years.

Working in the Millville factories, they developed and experimented with new techniques, often by making paperweights. These paperweights were not production items; glassworkers made them on their own time to try out techniques or to sell or give to friends and family. They were part folk art, part glass art.

The most famous design was the "Millville rose," which had a realistic-looking rose with crimped petals and leaves inside the clear glass ball. Another design, made by pulling chips of colored glass, is said to be inspired by a lily flower, but is today called the "umbrella." The two paperweight inkwells pictured here, which sold together for \$256 at Alderfer Auction Company, have the umbrella design.

Q. We have about 50 butter molds and stamps, mostly wooden, collected over the last 60 or so years that we would like to donate to a museum, hopefully in Northeastern Ohio. Are you aware of any that feature these and would like additional items for their collection?

A. We do not know of any specific museums that will accept a butter mold collection, but you can check The Official Museum Directory, published by the American Association of Museums, to find out about museum collections. Your local library, historical society or a local museum may have access; or you can contact the directory online at www.officialmuseumdir.com.

rectory.com. A museum that specializes in folk art, agriculture, local history or early American history may be interested in your collection, especially in a region with a history of farming or dairy industry. A university with an agriculture department or folk art collection could be another option.

Q. I like to collect cat figurines. We bought this pottery one at a flea market, most likely \$5 to \$10. Recently, I decided to find out about the signature on the bottom and was surprised to discover that it might be a collectible by Fantoni. I've noticed his other animal and human figurines and vases have square heads. Since this has pointed ears, I wonder if it's a fake.

A. Italian ceramicist Marcello Fantoni, known as "the master of beauty," started his ceramics studio in 1936 and kept working into the 2000s. Some of his best-known midcentury pieces were made for the import company Raymor.

We have seen a similar cat figure with pointed ears attributed to Fantoni, but we think you're right to be skeptical. There are many fake Fantoni pieces with convincing-looking marks on the market. It is extremely difficult to recognize pottery fakes from photos alone. Some of the best clues, like the weight of the piece or the texture of the clay or glaze, must be experienced in person.

An auction house that specializes in modern design and has experience with Fantoni pieces, like Wright Rago, Toomey & Co. or Palm Beach Modern Auctions may have more information and identification advice. If your cat is a genuine Fan-

toni figure, it may be worth about \$200. If it is a copy, its value is closer to \$50.

Q. I have a color print by Currier & Ives. How can I tell if it is an original?

A. Currier & Ives made their famous lithograph prints from 1857 to 1907. They have been reproduced many times since then. Check the size of your print. Currier & Ives prints were originally made in specific sizes. They could be very small (up to 7 x 9 inches), small (8 4/5 x 12 4/5 inches), medium (9 x 14 inches to 14 x 20 inches), and larger. Other sizes are usually later reproductions. Sometimes, original prints are trimmed to different sizes, which lowers their value. There are many books on Currier & Ives prints that can help you identify and value yours. Look for them at your library. A dealer who specializes in prints or books may be able to help you authenticate yours by its coloring, paper and printing method.

TIP: If using a glass shelf to display a paperweight collection, be sure it is strong enough. The ideal size is 18 inches long, 4 inches deep, 1/4 inch thick. Paperweights are very heavy, and collectors tend to add "just one more," which overloads the shelf. Glass will become more brittle and break with age.

Average rate on 30-year mortgage hits 7% after 5th straight increase

The average rate on a 30-year mortgage in the U.S. ticked up this week to slightly above 7%, the highest level in eight months.

The rate rose to 7.04% from 6.93% last week, mortgage buyer Freddie Mac said Thursday. A year ago, it averaged 6.6%. It has risen for five straight weeks.

Borrowing costs on 15-year fixed-rate mortgages, popular with homeowners seeking to refinance their home loan to a lower rate, also rose this week. The average rate increased to 6.27% from 6.14% last week. A year ago, it averaged 5.76%, Freddie Mac said.

The uptick in the cost of home loans reflects a rise in the bond yields that lenders use as a guide to price mortgages, specifically the yield on the U.S. 10-year Treasury. The yield on the 10-year Treasury has climbed from 3.62% in mid-September to 4.61% as of midday Thursday.

The elevated mortgage rates, which can add hundreds of dollars a month in costs for borrowers, have discouraged home shoppers, prolonging a national home sales slump that began in 2022.

While sales of previously occupied U.S. homes rose in November

for the second straight month, the housing market was on track to end 2024 as its worst year for sales since 1995. Full-year home sales data are due out next week.

The average rate on a 30-year mortgage is now the highest it's been since May 9, when it was at 7.09%.

Interest rates have been climbing since the Federal Reserve signaled last month that it expected to lower its benchmark rate just twice this year, down from the four cuts it forecast in September.

The Fed is tapping the brakes on rate cuts because inflation remains stubbornly above the central bank's 2% target, even though it's fallen from its mid-2022 peak. Economists also worry that President-elect Donald Trump's economic policies, notably his plan to vastly increase tariffs on imports, could fuel inflation.

Forecasting the trajectory of mortgage rates is difficult, given that rates are influenced by many factors, from government spending and the economy, to geopolitical tensions and stock and bond market gyrations.

Several economists' forecasts call for the average rate on a 30-year mortgage to remain above 6% this year, with some including an upper range as high as 6.8%.

Future rate cuts

What slower Fed rate cuts could mean for consumers

By Cora Lewis

The Federal Reserve indicated in December that it's likely to cut rates more gradually in 2025 than it previously projected. Policymakers now envision two rate cuts for the year, not the four predicted in September.

The result is that borrowers who've been hoping for much-lower-rate loans could be disappointed. Loan rates may barely budge if the Fed sticks with its plan to cut its key short-term rate only twice this year.

Here's what to know:

1 A gradual pace of rate cuts won't mean much to people with credit card debt

"Another rate cut is welcome news at the end of a chaotic year, but it ultimately doesn't amount to much for those with debt," said Matt Schulz, chief credit analyst at LendingTree. "A quarter-point reduction may knock a dollar or two off your monthly debt payment."

The average annual percentage rate on a new credit card offer, according to LendingTree, is 24.43%. In September, it was 24.92%. Further modest declines in that rate, Schulz said, are possible in the next few months.

But, he cautioned, "Anyone expecting card rates to go from awful to amazing overnight because of the Fed is going to be sorely disappointed."

2 High-yield savings accounts remain a good option

For savers, returns on high-yield accounts have dropped, too, in tandem with the Fed's rate cuts. So while these accounts are not quite as attractive as they had been, they might still be worth investigating if you haven't shopped for one recently. Some of these accounts offer yields at or near 5%.

3 Will mortgage rates ease? Maybe

Though the Fed doesn't set mortgage rates, it does influence them. Long-term mortgage rates generally track the yield on the 10-year Treasury note, which, in turn, is driven in part by the market's outlook for inflation and the Fed's benchmark rate.

That means that, at least indirectly, cuts to the Fed's key rate can put downward pressure on mortgage rates, even if they don't move in lockstep.

For people with fixed mortgages, their rate won't change unless they refinance their mortgage or sell and move someplace else.

From novel to Netflix

'The Night Agent' premieres second season

Who is the real bad guy in "Night Agent"? To those unfamiliar with the drama, the question points to several shifting plots and potential double-crosses within the storyline. For those following along with the series and patiently awaiting a second season, this question comes across as completely understandable given that series is "filled with baddies" (per Netflix).

With 10 45-minute episodes already on Netflix from Season 1 and a recent confirmation that Season 3 is already in the casting stages, Netflix welcomes "The Night Agent" Season 2, premiering Thursday, Jan. 23.

Based on the novel of the same name by American journalist and New York Times bestselling author Matthew Quirk, "The Night Agent" follows Peter Sutherland (played on screen by Gabriel Basso, "Juror #2," 2024), a low-level FBI agent who "works in the basement of the White House, manning a phone that never rings" (per Netflix). One evening, however, the phone does ring, prompting Sutherland to take on a case so big it would impact the entire country.

As it turns out (and now may be a good time to mention that several mild spoilers from Season 1 lay ahead), the basement phone is tied to "an emergency line for undercover spies" (per Netflix). When Sutherland answers the call, he hears a wom-

an's voice explain that a double homicide has just taken place and she fears she may be next. Springing into action to protect the civilian who somehow managed to find the night agents' helpline, what follows is an action-packed season filled with assassination attempts, double-crosses, brazen attacks, mistaken identities, terrorist plots and oh so much running.

"Imagine 'All the President's Men' [1976] with car chases," said creator Shawn Ryan ("The Shield") to Netflix's online publication, Tudum. "If you like the Jack Ryan books, the Jack Reacher books, if you like the Bourne Identity stuff, if you like political intrigue, then 'The Night Agent' is for you."

On the note of "political intrigue," the spy series holds nothing back. With all the twists and turns of a good murder mystery and shady, motivated char-

acters akin to "House of Cards" and "Game of Thrones," "The Night Agent" all but urges viewers not to get too attached to any one character. While audiences now know who committed the D.C. Metro bombing in Season 1, matters become far more sinister when it is revealed that others have been pulling the strings behind the scenes.

This season, the series dives into an increasingly shadowy world. After Peter's success in Season 1, he has earned the opportunity to work in the secretive organization Night Action, which pushes him "into a world where danger is everywhere and trust is in short supply" (per Netflix).

"There are people here who make bad choices for what they think are the right reasons," Ryan explains to Netflix during another interview. "But that's a slippery slope that leads to increased bad decisions, where

suddenly you look up and ... you've lost your soul."

Peter is trying very hard not to lose his soul, despite everything around him pushing toward the contrary. As the first season closes, main characters have been shot and/or killed, parents are using their children as political pawns and innocent bystanders have lost their lives in the proverbial (albeit sometimes literal) crossfire. Needless to say, it was anyone's guess as to who would be returning for Season 2 as of the first-season finale. Luckily, thanks to casting reports provided by Netflix, we now have that precious information.

In addition to the titular night agent played by Basso, returning actors include Luciane Buchanan ("The New Legends of Monkey"), who plays emergency-line caller Rose Larkin, and BAFTA nominee Fola Evans-Akingbola ("Siren"), who plays Secret Ser-

vice agent Chelsea Arrington. Joining the cast this season is Amanda Warren ("The Leftovers") as Catherine, a "veteran of the top-secret Night Action investigative program who trains and oversees various Night Agents" (per Netflix's Tudum).

Also starring in recurring roles in Season 2 are Arienne Mandi ("The L Word: Generation Q") as Noor, an Iranian woman who works as an aide for the Iranian mission to the United Nations in New York and who has a personal motive to seek a better life for her family; Louis Herthum ("Westworld") as connected international businessman Jacob Monroe; Michael Malarkey ("The Vampire Diaries") as Markus, a military leader with ties to his dictator uncle; Berto Colon ("Orange Is the New Black") as U.S. Marine-turned-fixer Solomon; and Keon Alexander ("Tyrant") as Javad, the head of security for the Iranian mission in New York.

Other confirmed cast members include Brittany Snow ("X," 2022), Teddy Sears ("The Flash"), Navid Negahban ("The Old Man"), Rob Heaps ("Imposters"), Marwan Kenzari ("Aladdin," 2019), Elise Kibler ("The Sunlit Night," 2019) and Dikran Tulaine ("The Blacklist").

The observant reader may have noticed a couple of references to the United Nations during their perusal of this article, and that would be correct: Season 2 is largely scheduled to take place in New York City — a change of scenery from the Washington, D.C., landscapes of Season 1. But don't get too comfortable; Season 3 is set to begin filming in Istanbul, Turkey, before cameras return stateside to New York once again. Thus is the life of a Night Agent — one never stays still for long.

Don't miss the Season 2 premiere of "The Night Agent," on Netflix beginning Thursday, Jan. 23.

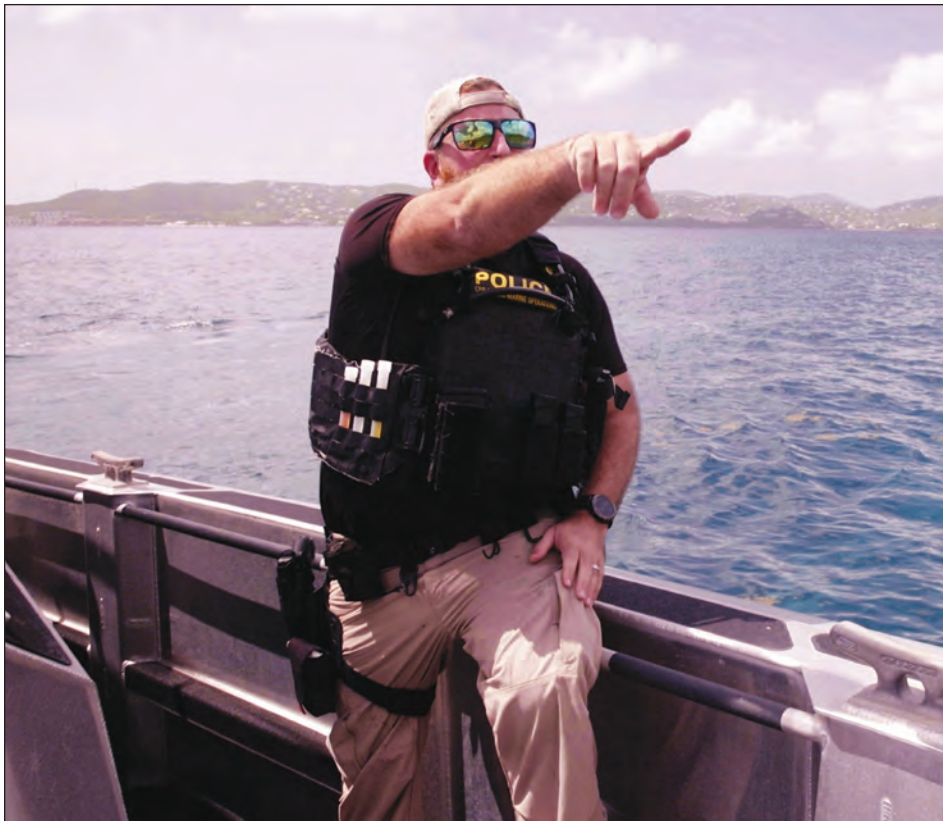

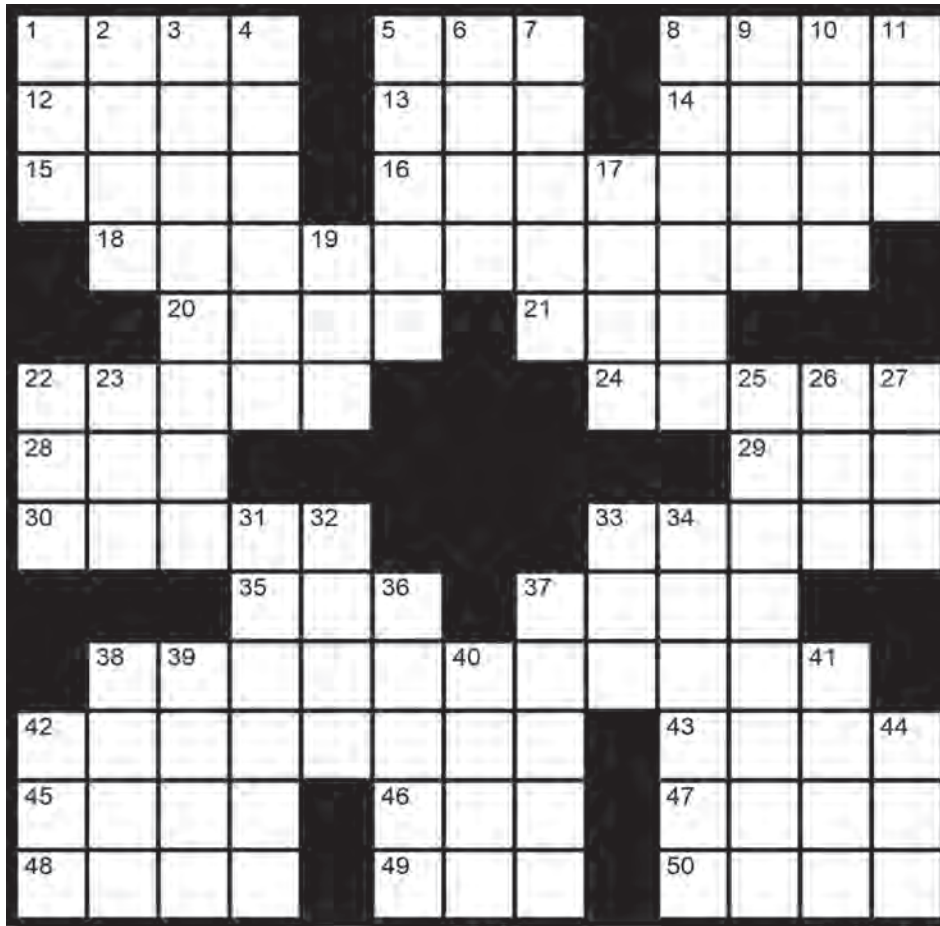

Hollywood Q&A

Q: How did they get all those people to do cameos in "Bullet Train"?

A: Big, blanket spoiler alert: I'm about to reveal multiple gasp-worthy cameos in the 2022 action comedy "Bullet Train," along with cameos in a couple of other recent action comedies. And even mentioning the names of those films in this spoiler alert would in itself be a spoiler.

The cameos in "Bullet Train" essentially all came about through a series of favor trades that are nearly as complex as the plot of the film.

Entertainment Weekly got star Brad Pitt ("Fight Club," 1999), director David Leitch ("Atomic Blonde," 2017) and a few of the film's other stars together for a 2022 interview to explain it all.

They said Sandra Bullock ("The Proposal," 2009) did her brief, and mostly audio-only, role as a favor to Pitt, an old friend.

Meanwhile, at the same time they were shooting "Bullet Train," Bullock was making "The Lost City" (also released in 2022), which co-starred Channing Tatum ("21 Jump Street," 2012). And so Tatum got on board "Bullet Train" for a cameo as well. Pitt later returned the favor by popping up in "The Lost City."

The other big-name pop-in was Ryan Reynolds ("Deadpool & Wolverine," 2024"), who appears on screen for seconds as an assassin named Carver. He did the film to pay Pitt back for doing an equally short cameo in his movie "Deadpool 2" (2018).

Leitch directed that movie as well, so this was kind of a favor to him, too.

Pitt summed up this tangled web of reciprocity pretty simply. "This idea of cross-pollinating each other's projects was really good fun."

Q: I love Derek Hough in "Dancing With the Stars." Has

he ever done any acting roles? Does he have any coming up?

A: Oddly enough, "Dancing With the Stars" dance pro Derek Hough's first screen role was a straight-ahead acting gig — no fancy feet required. He had an uncredited role as a Hogwarts schoolboy in "Harry Potter and the Sorcerer's Stone" in 2001, years before the reality TV dance craze that made him famous.

Since then, his screen work has tended mostly toward dancing rather than acting, though he's gotten to do a few characters along the way.

His next role won't be dancing or acting, but it could be his toughest gig yet: he'll be producing and appearing in a documentary about his own life.

The reason it might be tough is that it won't be about the fun parts — the stage triumphs or the Emmy-winning choreography jobs — it will be about the time his wife, fellow dancer Hayley Hough, collapsed backstage

and nearly died, and her grueling recovery from brain surgery. The as-yet-untitled documentary is filming now, with no distribution or release date set.

He is at least accustomed to appearing as himself on screen — most of his 150-odd appearances have been as a dancer, including most notably "Dancing With the Stars" as well as several Disney specials.
